Ibiza '99

IT'S OFFICIAL. Ibiza '99 is a sell out. Flights are chocka, the hotels are full and the clubs are rammed. And fears that this year's massive influx of British promoters – double that of 1998 – would result in half-empty clubs have been knocked into a hat. Airlines are reportedly running at full capacity. A spokesperson for Iberian Airways said, "We are running up to six flights a day to Ibiza from the UK

and they're all packed." Gol Airways has announced a new once-daily service direct from Stansted to Ibiza for just £120 return. Demand is already sky-high. "There's so much talk about Ibiza – it's where

everyone wants to go," said a spokeperson. Accommodation is also at a premium in Ibiza, with some clubbers being left stranded by the lack of available bed space. The Ibiza Town Tourist Office commented, "We strongly advise people to arrange their accommodation

before arriving in Ibiza." Early reports from the clubs have been similarly encouraging with 8,000 punters at the Manumission opening party, despite early June being a more traditional 'family week'.

The Islander

The free mag is being distributed to bars, clubs, beaches and shops all over the island. The first issue hit the streets on July 8th with a further 10

weekly installments over the summer. You can also get The Islander *gratis* if you purchase Muzik or Loaded from HMV stores throughout the UK and Ireland.

Star Bar

SAN Antonio's notorious Star Bar has been raided in a police crackdown on illegal drug use. A reported 3,000 ecstasy tablets were seized, along with two grams of cocaine and a sizeable quantity of marijuana.

The drug crackdown comes as San Antonio council decided to get tough on out-of-control revellers. The council has banned groups of more than 30 people from the town centre at night, while smaller groups have to be chaperoned by tour guides. Clubbers are reporting a more visible police presence in San An and Ibiza Town.

Majik on a track for their new album. Also featuring a new edit of the Deep Dish collaboration 'Future Of The Future', 'Temperamental' will be out in September... Once referred to as "the Derrick May of jungle", OMNI TRIO easily surpasses the Detroit one's work rate by releasing his fourth album, 'Byte Size Life' at the end of August... PHATTS & SMALL's next single, 'Feel Good' should not be confused with their remix of Earth Wind & Fire's 'September'. One's a feelgood disco house stomper, and the other's a feelgood disco house, er, oh bugger... SHANKS & BIGFOOT have written and produced the next BYRON STINGILY track, 'How Could I Know?'... Still causing havoc with 'No Scrubs' (and just how many ragga versions of that are there out there?), TLC follow up with 'Unpretty', out August 9th... Attention all scratch fanatics. The UK final of the DMC World Mixing Championships will be

Has MATRIX really done the music for the next Cadbury's Flake advert? Answers to the usual address please... MODULATIONS, probably the best documentary about dance music, finally gets a British screening on Film Four, Saturday July 17th, so set your video if you're out being big somewhere... A new management company at BAGLEYS in London has vowed incidents like the assault on Bruce Brian (see Muzik 50) will never happen again. The club is open as usual for all nights, including Freedom. Lee Darcy, general

manager, told us that the Sansom family no longer have anything to do with Bagleys, and that a completely new security team from the same company that supplies Ministry Of Sound and The Hippodrome has been installed since the assault. Drug dealers are being handed over to the police. Neither the council nor the police are expected to object when the appeal against the removal of the club's licence is heard in a few month's time. Also in Muzik 50, Det Sgt Peter Bever said that undisclosed numbers of people had been arrested "for very serious offences, including rape and drug dealing". This comment was in relation to clubland in general, and nota comment on Bagleys itself. Apologies for any confusion...

New warning on killer ecstasy



LUBBERS have been warned to beware of highly toxic Es on sale in the south and west of Britain. One man was taken to hospital when he stopped breathing after taking one. Four more experienced violent delusions, with two vomiting blood for hours.

The domed, hard gloss logoless pills are being sold under the names China Whites, Technos, Golden Eagles or White Russians. The ones with blue specks contain the toxic MDMA-variant DOB in dangerous levels and have so far been seen in Bristol and Cardiff.

Justin Carter, 35, of Bristol, who temporarily stopped breathing after taking one, said he also experienced panic attacks and paranoia for 14 hours.

"The 'trippy' experience of being on these pills has to be described as the worst feeling of my life, like being in a never-ending nightmare, not knowing what's real and what isn't.

"If I'd had a testing kit, it would have shown that they had no MDMA in them and I'd never have taken in it in the first place".

DOB is 33 times stronger than MDMA, but is usually used in small doses by 'ecstasy' manufacturers to save money. However these pills are thought to contain a much higher dose. DOB has been implicated in the deaths of at least two people in the States.

• SCIENTISTS in America have released a new study which they say shows medium term brain damage from just a few doses of ecstasy. Researchers at John Hopkins University in Baltimore tested four days of ecstasy use on squirrel monkeys. Some showed signs of damage seven years later.

Too much in & out at Trade (trade

TRADE, London's gay superclub, has returned to its original venue Turnmills – six weeks after it was kicked out. Trade had departed just four days after 18 people were charged with offences linked to drug dealing following a raid on the venue. The club continued at central London club LA2 for three weeks until the financial pressures of mounting production

costs forced a breather, but shortly afterwards, returned to its original home.

Rod Lay, Trade director, said, "We have resolved any problems we had with Turnmills. This is part of a general thing: people are going to have to be a lot



more discreet with their habits. From travelling everywhere, I've seen that the general climate of policing around the world in clubs is tougher. After the opening night at Space in Ibiza police set up a roadblock and searched everyone."

Lay called for late-night alcohol licences to be relaxed. "If they allowed drinking until maybe

6am then they're not going to force people to take so many stimulants. You could have a drink for a couple of hours and enjoy yourself that way."

He refused to comment on rumours of bad feeling between Trade and Turnmills.

New London superclub: first ever picture

THIS is the first picture of the site for the new London superclub, Home. Home, which is due to open in the Autumn, is the brains of ex-Cream man Darren Hughes and is expected to seriously shake up London's club scene. It's situated slap bang in the heart of London's Leicester Square, next to the somewhat tackier Equinox



discotheque. We tried to peer behind the scaffolding but security told us to hop it. Although no details are confirmed yet, there is continued speculation that Home will see Paul Oakenfold take up his first weekly residency since he left Cream at the end of last year. •Home has also announced Homelands festivals in

Creamfields to include outdoor swimming pool

REAMFIELDS has announced what is probably a first – an open-air swimming pool for the festival, Taking place on August 28th at Old Liverpool Airfield in Liverpool, Creamfields has already secured something of a coup in getting the Pet Shop Boys to play live. As we went to press, no details were available about how much water-wings will cost to hire. IT'S a reflection of the culture. Sweden is very clean and the lifestyle is pretty basic, but it still has a sophisticated touch. It's not about doing things the American way or the English way. We don't

try to be in front, but we try to be ourselves." Muzik is on the phone to Stephan Greider, the charismatic and excitable Swiss-Frenchman who relocated to Sweden some 10 years back and no, we're not talking about furniture, we're talking about music. House music to be precise, and not just any old house either. We're talking about the bright, airy, spaciously optimistic kind of house that has established Stephan's Svek imprint as one of Europe's finest and put Sweden, a country normally associated with rock hard loops and fierce tribal workouts, on the world house map.

"The scene and the market here is about banging techno, but our policy isn't about what the market expects, it's about having a certain direction and sticking with it. If you do good music eventually people will start to notice."

Indeed they will and have done already. And part of the reason why is down to the label's hugely unpredictable nature. Svek, you see, is all about strange surprises. You never really know what to expect, but you know it's going to be good. Artists like Adam Bayer, Cari Lekebusch and Alexi Delano have all found homes for their deeper, more expansive productions on the label, while others like Jean-Louis Huhta, Erot and

Stephan himself have put out everything from nurjazz and rolling conga grooves to classy vocal house.

Which brings us found to Sunday Brunch's glorious 'Midsummer'. The work of Jesper Dahlback (The Persuader) and Seba

Ahrenberg (who's wife Louise provides the vocal) it's a wonderful slice of gently uplifting house that's been tipped as one of this year's biggest underground anthems and has even prompted some to suggest that Sweden is rapidly becoming the new France. Not that such comparisons hold any water with Stephan. He likes things just the way they are and is quick to dismiss such comments as typically ludicrous industry hyperbole.

"The way we make our music is the same as the way we run our labels, it's low profile. There's too much fashion in music and that's because the majors are involved and all they want is money. They don't give a shit about the culture. That's why they've developed this pop-house sound with the French stuff and it's killing the house scene. Our policy is the exact opposite of that, we're long term with the music, not long term for the money." So there you have it, a top house label with an underground techno attitude from a country that definitely, unequivocally, absolutely, without any shadow of a doubt is in no way shape or form the new France. (DM)

RE Bent the Gay Dad of chill out? Producer Simon Mills, one half of this soothing new collective, doesn't think so. "I've got a lot of camp friends who collect the Shirley Bassey kind of stuff. Everyone I know who is camp or gay has got one of those record collections. And I've got one too. But I'm not that way inclined myself."

For Bent read warped. With a penchant for obscure cocktail loops and the odd vocoder swirl, the still unsigned Bent are a lo-fi take on the lush sound of Air and Kid Loco. There's certainly a Gallic flavour to their heady brew, but in fact, Bent are from Nottingham. Ex-DiY deep houser Nail works in record shop Selectadisc while penniless muso Simon tweaks away at home.

Bent's love of movies is evident in their cinematic soundscapes. "I've got a really dodgy film collection. Awful Mr T films," smirks Simon. "All the lyrics on 'Irritating Noises' derive from scenes in Superman II." The acoustic strum of 'Irritating Noises' could be the long-lost love theme from a long-forgotten Western. "I ended up singing on it as well," adds Nail, ruefully. The Man of Steel would be proud.

'Good Bloke', meanwhile, fuses windswept melodies with ice-cool melancholy. Drenched in sweeping synths and icy sophistication, the track could be the result of several weeks' studio time. It was certainly good enough to find its way onto Muzik's 'State Of Independents' CD and into an unseemly record company signing scrum. Nail actually knocked it out early one Saturday morning. "It's a bit tongue-in-cheek," admits Simon. "It took

Simon. "It took me 20 minutes," laughs Nail. "Then again, when I was doing house stuff for DiY, I did nine tracks in a day once. But I got bored of doing that."

With an album in the pipeline and remixes for Lamb and (ahem) Sash! already in the bag, Simon won't be skint for much longer. Time to get Bent. (**RM**)

Ralph Moore sees what's for the beach and what's for the bin

JESSE Saunders must be an extremely bitter man. Not content with endlessly reminding us in House Music... The Real Story (Just Say Productions) that he single-handedly invented house music in 1984, the disgruntled Chicago veteran also insists that he is the best DJ the world has ever seen. "I have a special feeling for the music," he offers, modestly. There's a chapter on why drugs are evil ("when you come down, you crash!") before Jesse enlightens us with his amazing knowledge. "Restraint of trade," he says, "is when a business is inhibited from selling a product". Perhaps his publisher should take the hint. * Far more informative are the new Rough Guides (Penguin) on dance music. Although undue attention is paid to hardcore legends like Hixxy and Sharkey, Drum & Bass is still a damn good place for novices to start. Not sure why big beat and trip hop are in this category, though. The Rough Guide To House is the better of the two. Indepth entries on the likes of Glasgow Underground, Harvey and Inner City are witty and well-written, though the odd glitch (187 Lockdown's 'Kung Fu Fighting'? Cowboy Records?! Black Box717) suggests that they were all on one when it was being compiled. What would Jesse Saunders say? *** (for both)

Much more fun is Wayne Anthony's Spanish Highs (Penguin). An East End geezer with a taste for trouble, Anthony has a disarmingly vivid memory for a man who appears to have hoovered half of Columbia into his nervous system. The one-time party entrepreneur follows up Class Of 88 with trips to Tenerife, Ibiza and Evissa Airport. If Howards Marks took a stroll to The Beach, this would be the gloriously messy outcome – Anthony is a walking danger magnet and not even some serious coke psychosis can deter him. Perfect beach fodder. ****

Family Values

EWIS Osbourne is one of the country's brightest new DJs, spinning chunky house and funky techno at House Of God, Wobble and Circo Bar in Birmingham. Lewis' father is Ozzy Osbourne, the legendary bateating, hell-raising rocker who invented heavy metal as frontman with Black Sabbath. He's also recently collaborated on tracks with Busta Rhymes and Ol' Dirty Bastard.



"MY dad has always let me get on and do what I want to do. He never pushed me into music, I just found it by accident. I've learned a lot from seeing him perform on stage because he's such a fantastic showman. And when I see him work a crowd, I try and put some of that back into my DJing. I used to be very selfish and

only play deep house which is great for home listening but no good for the dancefloor. At the end of the day people just want to dance and so I play a lot harder now.

"People often say it must have been really mad to grow up as Ozzy Osbourne's son. Everyone says I'm the spitting image of him, both in personality and looks. But he's actually a good role model. He'll be the first to admit that he's made mistakes in life but I think I've learned from them.

"He's very old skool in his musical tastes – The Beatles, Peter Gabriel, that sort of thing. But he appreciates dance music for what it is – when I played him Armand Van Helden's 'You Don't Know Me' before Christmas, he got into that. He said, 'I think it's going to do well'."

Ozzy on Lewis

"I'D always thought of a DJ being a guy in a silly hat whose job it was to get the chicks going! When Lewis first told me he wanted to be a DJ, I thought it would be another of his fads - when he was young he wanted to be a Formula One racing driver. But he's stuck with it and is enthusiastic and determined. I'm just really glad he's doing something he enjoys. He came out to visit me in Beverly Hills and I heard this awful racket coming from his room and l thought 'What the fuck is that?' And it was Lewis playing his tunes. Wow, did I sound old! I saw that Ibiza programme on TV. Fucking hell, I'm glad l'm not 21 any more – it looked like Caligula's den! "I must go and see Lewis DJ at some point. I think I'll go in disguise though. He's all prim and proper round me but I bet when he's DJing he's a right fucking freak! | hope he becomes the Ozzy of the DJ world!" (KW)

DJOf The Month

Guy Ornadel

When he's not pogoing like a maniac, Guy Ornadel plays full-on trance and manages the one and only Sasha. We caught up with him drying the dishes

When and where were you born? I was born in London in 1969.

When and how did you start DJing?

About 15 years ago, when I was at school, I listened to pirate radio like Jazzy M on the Jackin' Zone and got fanatical about jacking house and all that stuff on Trax and Nu Groove.

Where was your first gig?

My first real break was when Ilived in Australia and got a residency there. After that I went to America to work for DMC in 1991 and I used to play Club USA with Keoki in New York every week.

Where do you buy your records?

Mainly from Massive in Oxford, who send me records by mail order, and 3 Beat in Liverpool.

Which record never leaves your box?

Crazy Malamute's 'The Ride' on Logic Germany has been stuck in the box for ages. Only Scott Bond and me have got it. We cut it off CD but loads of DJs are trying to get hold of it now. Ha ha.

Do you find DJing helps you with the females of the species?

Not yet. I haven't got any groupies that I know of.

How do you juggle your managing career with

your DJing?

If Pete Tong can run a label, do a radio show and DJ then he's setting the pace. I manage the music side of things for Sasha, Cevin Fisher, Victor Calderone and Blue Amazon.

There's a fire in your house. Which three things do you save? My cat, my Dad's four Ivor Novello awards for composing and as many records as I could throw out of the window before I had to leave.

Is it true you're bessie mates with Junior Vasquez?

I used to be. I lived in New York for three years, just before the Sound Factory exploded. When it all kicked off I suggested to Junior that he remixed some of the big records he played. I suppose I helped break his remix career and we've remained mates ever since.

So why does he call you Touché Turtle?

How did you hear about that? You can't put that in! He thought I looked like a turtle without a shell or a home.

How would you describe your sets?

I play two different kinds. One is where I start off the night, which I love doing, preferably playing for six to eight hours. Hove the air of anticipation and slowly building it up. The other set is when I just go flat out.

And your mixing style?

I try to be as smooth as possible with long mixes. Each record has to go up to another level and build. I think that's in my subconscious after listening to Junior Vasquez and Sasha play. All my sets have to have that same curve.

Fave labels?

Fragrant, Bonzai, Alphabet City/Go For It, Tripomatic, Pagan, Twisted, Airtight, Hook and Whoop: That'll do.

Fave DJs?

DicLUCBEZIAT

Scott Bond, John Bishop (new blood at Sundissential), Darren Emerson, Victor Calderone and the usual suspects.

Clubs?

Gatecrasher, Space, Twilo and Allenby (Tel Aviv).

What can we expect from Guy Ornadel in 1999?

My first mixed CD is out which I did live. I'm going to Ibiza, then Australia for a tour and I'm hitting Israel in July. I'll be playing regular slots at Cream, Golden and Renaissance in the UK.

The people back then who knew who Herbie was were like "what the fuck is he doing? But jazz critics are just like techno critics they take it all a little too seriously.

5. New Life Trio **Empty Streets**

(from the compilation 'Universal Sounds Of America') (Soul Jazz, 1994) It's a really pretty song-it has so much



feeling and so much expression. The guy is playing what sounds simple but is really a very complex piece of drumming and the way the vocals sit over it is... I don't think anyone knows much about who these guys are. It's from a compilation with Sun Ra and the Art Ensemble Of Chicago.

6. Tonto's Expanding Head Band Jetsex

(from the album 'Zero Time') (Embryo, 1971) Kirk Degiorgio said to me "you've got to have this record, it's gonna fuck you up." And it did. These are the guys who programmed Stevie's synths. Apparently they also invented something for him called the Stevietron.



7. Goblin Markos

(from the 'Suspiria' soundtrack) (Cinevox, 1987)

It's from an Italian horror movie. There's something about witchcraft that can be a bit intriguing but scary as well. I really appreciate what happens with the whole spiritual context of voodoo music and l think that's probably going to be where I can find another world that's out there. I would really love to go to Haiti or Cuba or somewhere like that

8. Bernard Szajner Ritual

(from the album 'Some Deaths Take Forever') (Initial, 1980)

He's a French cat. It's based around the concept of how execution is wrong. But I don't give a fuck about all of that - it's just the song is cool! I saw the cover and it had a whole bunch of modulars on it and I said "wow, this is kind of interesting - let me hear what it sounds like!

9. Jon Hassell

Empire III

Angels of Love

1. It's in Italy

For obvious reasons, Italian clubbing is the best – beautiful people, stylish clothes, outdoor venues and for the house music *cognoscenti*, it's their second home outside New York. For years we've been hearing about Angels Of Love parties, mainly from dance music's creators of deepness themselves, with the likes of Basement Jaxx and the Boys Own posse raving about their stylish shows. Using different venues for winter and summer to allow them to age their skin further, they have a loyal following who respond in their thousands to Angels of Love's every call. Hence they own a thriving clothes boutique, a label and have a stamp of quality in Italian clubland which is as cool and aspirational as Prada itself.

2. It's on a beach

Muzik visited Angels Of Love for a special one-off party on a beach outside their home in Naples. A poor city some 60 minutes away from the absurd decadence and beauty of Capri, Angels pull clubbers in from miles away, all driving like maniacs to wherever they place their dancefloor. It's 10pm and having barely seen a flyer or poster to promote the event, we're wondering if anyone will reach the beach. Come midnight and 4,000 people and as many cars appear at once, taking over every area of the enclosed beach. They don't buy a drink and they don't stand around talking, they're flying already.

3. It's Louie Vega's Birthday Party

Every year, Little Louie Vega chooses this club to celebrate his birthday. He admires it for its exclusivity and for the lengths Angels will go to put on a party. The deal is this – Louie celebrates here, and he gets to choose the line-up.

4. All his best friends are here

Kenny 'Dope' Gonzales, Joe Claussell, Frankie Feliciano, Hardrive and their visionary A&R man Gilles Peterson. A line-up which leaves our man in Ibiza, Rob Da Bank, green with envy. Ibiza has nothing on this. To top it all, we spend most of the night with Louie's aunts, setting the pace as they dance until the sun rises.

5. House music all night long

Well, almost. Kenny Dope spins an inspirational set of hip hop and r&b, while Gilles focusses on the contemporary with exclusive slates of MJ Cole material. But it's the main outdoor arena where it truly goes off as Claussell and Vega drop an inspirational selection of sparkling house music with no overuse of the EQs.

6. Italians do it better

The night before, we visited a weekly outdoor club in the mountains which is as innocent as it is primitive. Even so, there are barbecues, incredible sound systems and sexy house music. Kenny and Louie partied on until 6am. Tonight the quality is just as splendid, made even more so by 4,000 bodies moving in unison from start to finish. Life is a bitch.

7. Paul Johnson's 'Get Get Down'

It was Louie who first saw this record's potential. He was handed this in Miami and has used it as a weapon in every set since, playing it at Angels of Love in April as a teaser for this evening. Louie's aunts are raving about it all day Sunday and the response when it drops at sunrise is nothing if not emotional.

8. The sunrise

It's at this point that we appreciate the difference between being in Elephant & Castle as the sun rises and being on a beach in Italy. The daylight acts as a catalyst for two hours of deranged dancing and insane behaviour as people strip naked and jump into the sea, have sex in the sand or dance until their feet bleed. In such a serene setting, it's a lot to take in.

9. The drive home

Anyone who's been in a car with any Italian clubber will understand this. Even Robert Miles was inspired to write a song about it. Yes, the Italians drive like freight trains. Luckily our lift home comes courtesy of a 50-year old coach driver who's slept all night and stops at red lights.

10. Ibiza

For a sample of the heavenly feel of an Angels Of Love party, you can find the Italians all summer at El Divino in Ibiza. It may be the night of Cream at Amnesia but this night will be the third adopted home of 'proper' house music. Enough said. Ben Turner

With the fantastic Homelands festival, a Home club in Sydney, Australia and soon a Home club in London, the Ibizan Home experience is part of a bigger picture. "It's an experiment," admits Home head honcho Darren Hughes, "it's a party for those who work on the island and the beautiful crowd. What I'm attempting to do is sprinkle a little bit of northern European gold dust over something that's Mediterranean." Sprinkling dust aside, this is probably the only club in the world that's open for 22 hours. It's as close to living in a club as you're gonna get. Imagine:

8am: Arrive at Space from wherever you last got spangled, preferably so skew-eyed you're walking into doors and the bar staff look like exotic birds.

Latin funk guerrillas coming soon to a festival near you

WE would like to dedicate this one to all the people being terrorised by NATO in Yugoslavia," Ozomatli bassist Wil-Dog announces sternly. "We as Ozomatli do not support the war, we do not support the bombing." Half an hour later he's standing in the middle of the crowd with the other nine - nine! - members improvising a samba version of the theme from Sesame Street. Ozomatli are that kind of band. Formed in East LA in 1995 as a community music project, for Ozomatli partying is a political gesture. From their multi-racial line-up to their giddy patchwork of musical styles, they practise the unity that they preach, dedicating a Cuban-flavoured number to the citizens of that victimised island. The principle is a sound one: political messages are most palatable when delivered in the atmosphere of a street party. With three drummers, two sax players, two guitarists, a trumpeter, a DJ and Jurassic 5 MC Chali 2na, they're ≩ a super-tight Latin funk band who somehow give the illusion of a bunch of colourfully-dressed drunks who raided a music shop at chucking out time and are having an impromptu street jam until the police come. It's some trick L Chali 2na makes a compelling frontman. Tall, gangly and genial, whether

delivering slick rhymes in a booming baritone, busting some looselimbed dance moves or tapping a cowbell, he's like independent hip hop's answer to Will Smith, only he can rap. But he's only one element of the Ozomatli experience, and though 'Cut Chemist Suite', 'Superbowl Sundae' and a dazzling DJ solo spot speak to their hip hop roots, there's also salsa, merengue, samba and multiple vocalists. Every band member grins like a goon throughout, including a bongo player who looks as if he's about to fall over and roll around giggling. It seems they've not been shy in enjoying Amsterdam's most famous crop.

Boing!

When Ozomatli climb into the crowd at the end for a dance and a jam, it's like Notting Hill carnival in miniature. It's obvious, witnessing their samba spot, why Basement Jaxx have asked them to rework 'Rendez-Vu'. With a spontaneous encore (in which the couplet rhyming "funky" with "skunky" says it all) rounding things off, Ozomatli's relentlessly energetic controlled mayhem makes much more sense live than on vinyl. The multi-cultural festival sound of the summer? Could be. Dorian Lynskey

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Flame-throwing midgets. Topless über-babes. Boshing trance. Irate British consuls. Ruddy-faced beer boys up the West End. 6am kebabs. More boshing trance. That's Ibiza in a nutshell, right?

On the road again

OUR journey starts in space. Well, more accurately it starts in the car park of Space, the legendary club with the even more legendary terrace. We've a lunchtime *rendez-vous* with Carlos and Miguel, two native lbicencos who've agreed to show us the lay of the land. Because the thing about the real lbiza is that it isn't handed to you on a plate. You won't see signposts saying 'This way for a Brit-free zone'.

"Ibiza has a bad image, mainly because of the San An tourist raver ghetto," says Sally Rogers from A Man Called Adam, the British band who have clasped the Ibizan spirit most closely to their bosom. "The rest of the island is not like that. If you're respectful and appreciative, you'll discover that there's so much more. You discover the island through the friends you meet."

So, with our posse firmly in place, we hit the road convoy style, heading north towards Santa Eulalia and San Lorenzo before forking right to San Carlos. It's on this road that we reach the Las Dalias hippy market. Although a bit fluoro-UVgot-any-Chakras-mate, it's still home to a wide range of authentic lbicenco produce, psychedelic threads and a cool juice bar. If you look hard you can find some bargains and load up on incense candles and I-Ching T-shirts. Well, it is a hippy market after all.

Driving east towards the coast, we reach the Restaurante Pou Des Lleó, which has a reputation for serving the best paella on the island. A short drive from San Carlos, this secluded eaterie has a fine terrace eating area and a laid back attitude which calls for a few sly blunts. "You can have both," says Miguel. "It is possible to relax in Ibiza as well as enjoy the clubs." You can also rent a double room here for just £20 per night, one that comes with a view of the bluest skies about. The mind boggles why people still fork out double that for a vomit-encrusted mattress up the West End.

The Pou Des Lleo itself is a tiny cove with a couple offishing boats, a neat little beach and a smattering of sun worshippers. The sort of travel brochure heaven you always read about but never

seem to find, "idyllic" doesn't do it justice. And the real bonus is that hardly anyone knows about it. The same can be said of Playa Augas Blanca (White Water Beach) a little further north up the coast. The beachside bar is decked out with palm trees and you half expect a perma-tanned Ricardo Montablan to step out and say "Welcome to Fantasy Island". Still, it's soon approaching 7pm and we've got a date with the sunset at Benirras. It's on the drive to Benirras that the true beauty of north Ibiza flashes into focus. The road snakes through acres of lush green forest, hardly the sort of landscape you associate with a sun-cooked Mediterranean rock. As the sun droops in the sky, we all enter a temporary trance, mesmerised by the foliage and the car stereo pulsing out, Marshall Jefferson's trippy 'Mushrooms' Benirras is home to arguably the best sunsets on the island, far better than the view from Café Del Mar. Because you have to make a real effort to get here, only 100 or so followers of the 'real Ibiza' spirit are gathered on the beach. Chilled out hippies strum guitars, topless acid heads grin slyly and the rest of us sup our San Miguels as the sun sinks down into a haze of deep red for. another of those Ibiza moments. It's a shame the legendary Benirras drummers aren't here-they strike up a percussive free-flowing groove around sundown - but we still feel spiritually sated. And there's always tomorrow.

Back on the town

OF course there is still plenty to do today and the night is young. The thing about the real Ibiza is that it isn't just fancy food, secluded beaches and jaw-dropping sungets – you may have heard about some of the clubs on the island too. It's just about picking the right bars and clubs and the right nights of the week. We drive back to Ibiza Town for around 11 and after a quick change of clobber it's back out onto the streets. Our first stop is Noctambula (Calle Passadis), a cheap, cool bar run by down-to-earth scenesters Max, Gayle and Oscar. A number of promoters (Trade, Sundissential, Bugged Out) use

it for pre-club parties, and the work and accommodation noticeboard is in heavy use. It's also the place to find out about the free parties and full moon gatherings that take place throughout the season.

Then it's on to Bar Zuka, situated on an almost exclusively gay street just behind the harbour, the ironically-named Calle De La Virgen. People come to this mixed bar to pick the brains of manager Mark Hattley. He first came to Ibiza in 1987 on the infamous summer trip with Oakey and co and later worked at Danny Rampling's legendary acid house club Shoom. Zuka is cosmopolitan (German, Italian, Swiss), classy and relaxed. When a couple of coppers stroll in for a cheeky schnapps no one bats an eyelid. And if you ask Hattley nicely he'll give you the lowdown on the club scene and may even procure you some free tickets.

We hit El Divino first and it's a blast. It's bigger than before and the harbourside terrace, with its amazing views of the Old Town, is a treat. There's a real mix of punters, mainly Spanish and other continental Europeans and hardly any Brits. We press flesh with Kaleed, the unassuming owner, who smiles benignly at the packed dancefloor. He's worth millions, apparently, so we feel it only right to blag a few drinks off him.

Pacha has every right to its claim as the island's most beautiful nightclub, the place that leaves even Renaissance's Geoff Oakes short of superlatives. Even in a haze of vodka and Red Bull it still takes the breath away. We blag our way onto the VIP stage where we can perch in special seats and ogle the backsides of the gyrating dancers. The guy sat in the next chair informs me he's paid £500 for the privilege. "Sucker," I think,

but seeing as he's dressed in a five grand suit, he can probably afford it. And quite what he thinks of the pale-faced rave monkey next to him is beyond me. But then that's the beauty of clubs like Pacha and El Divino - oiky types can rub shoulders with the improbably rich and no one seems to care.

Seven in the morning and we stumble out of the club with our tummies

rumbling. There's only one place for it -Croissant Show in Mercado Viejo, near the entrance to the Old Town. Owner André Quidu, who has a penchant for Salvador Dali-esque moustaches, started out flogging pain au chocolat to munted pill-munchers in the clubs at night. Now he owns several shops all over the island, although this one was his first and remains the best. By eight

the half dozen pavement tables are bustling with bedraggled podium queens, tanned Adonises and other interesting characters. But be sure to also try Can Font just round the corner on Calle De Jose Verdera, a tiny gypsy bakery whose baguettes have to be tasted to be believed. Suitably stocked up, it's time to head south for Playa D'En Bossa and the frazzled charms of Space.

the planes thunder overhead, ferrying in another load of eager clubbing beavers. Today's even more special as it's the season opening of the club and it's predictably mobbed. Sure, some are here for the big indoor dancefloor where Sasha is laying down hard, dark trance but the real stars of Space are the terrace residents. Daniel Klein and Alfredo drop feelgood house and groovy Latin stompers for a hyper-enthusiastic cross section of international disco disciples, who go even more ballistic when Gordon the trumpeter blows staccato riffs scat style over the top. It's as far removed from the cheesy overtures of San An as you can get and sounds bloomin' fantastic.

By mid-afternoon, we're looking for the final piece in our own real Ibiza jigsaw. The nearby Bora Bora beach parties have, in two short years, achieved an almost legendary status. The trick is to get down there early in the afternoon when resident DJ Gee tickles the sonic tastebuds with five or six hours of deep and groovy house. He spins 12 hours a day, seven days a week, not to mention numerous club guest spots. It's the kind of schedule that would put even an NHS junior doctor to shame.

'The more you do the more you want," he says. "It's like a drug. We want it. We wouldn't do it if we didn't love it." Bora Bora is popular with the club workers (flyerers, bar staff, dancers etc), who mount the tables and have it right off as Gee shifts gears around 10pm into Germanic trance and chunky hard house. When they started the daily parties two years ago, they had a hardcore following of 100 or so souls. At the end of last season they were regularly pulling in over 1,000. Jonathan Grey, who pursues a more leftfield music policy down the road at Sa Trincha beach, is similarly enthusiastic. "You're out there in the open with nature - that's the beach attitude," he says. "It's unique and quite detached from the clubs. That's what makes it so special for the clubbers - most of them don't have the opportunity to dance on a beach in a beautiful location to really good music.'

By now it's 1am on Monday and we certainly feel like we've had our money's worth. In the past 48 hours we've dined on cuisine fit for a king, chilled on breathtaking beaches, watched jaw-dropping sunsets, danced with impossibly beautiful supermodels, met billionaire businessmen, gurned on podiums to funky trance, danced barefoot in the sand to sexy house, met crazy and colourful people from all over the world and finished with enough stories to fill 50 pages of this magazine. A hundred more 'real Ibizas' exist out there, all equally vivid and stimulating. On our travels we heard about the spectacular Atlantis sands and the dramatic cliff backdrops of Moon Beach where full-on trance parties rage all night. And of course there are the dreamy soundtracks of Bruno Lepetre and José Padilla at classic chillstops like Café Del Mar and Café Mambo. But for now places like that will have to wait. After all, there's always tomorrow.

Ibiza Memories: Danny Rampling

FIRST went to Ibiza with a friend in 1980 when I was 18. It was my first holiday away on my own, so you can imagine the apprehension and the excitement. We arrived at night time and the first thing I became aware of was the scent of the island. Ibiza has a special scent with the pine trees, fresh air and with the airport being so close to the ocean. It's a magical smell to arrive to, and it gets me every time. We were young boys out for a good time. We were unaware of the Ku club, but we could tell Ibiza was a vibrant island. That first holiday had me hooked.

I went back later that summer with the same friends. And then the next summer. And the

summer after that I met Nicky Holloway for the first time. I was aware of him as a DJ and we soon forged a friendship. I went to his events and soon ended up working with him. It was a few years before we discovered the truly amazing side to the nightlife. We were still clubbing in clubs like Es Paradis but most guys weren't really into dancing. It wasn't the done thing, but we loved it. It also meant we had far more chance of meeting girls because we seemed to be more fun. And yes, they

were queuing up! But I did have hair then. I went to work and live in America for one year, and so it was some time before I went back to Ibiza. By this time, Nicky was running his Special Branch parties out there and they were a great alternative to the regular club scene in Ibiza. By now we were aware of Amnesia but these clubs were out of our price range. It cost £20 in those days, and people do forget how expensive it is for young people today. I read an article about Amnesia, about this club

which never sleeps, and I was determined to check it out if I ever went back to Ibiza. When I did, everything I had read was true. It was the first club we went to and I was captivated by the atmosphere. I'd never seen anything like it. I danced my ass off in front of the speakers. Coming from a funky soul scene into this supercharged tribal energy was incredible. I immediately noticed how positive and colourful the crowd was and people were sharing their good times, obviously with the help of MDMA. Oakey disappeared to the DJ booth for most of the night, Nicky went to the bar and I just danced and forged friendships with a few English travellers I spotted in the crowd. I was so impressed by the communication in this open-air club. At 6am the night ended with the sun coming up just as Alfredo played Cyndi Lauper. We didn't want that night to end. We did get to sleep, but it took some time. As soon as we woke up, we went straight back to Amnesia and did the same every night for the rest of our stay. We'd found the holy grail.

My experiences in Ibiza inspired me to go home and give it my best shot at creating a version of

Amnesia in London, which we did in a very different way. Obviously we didn't have an open-air club at Shoom, but we managed to create a similar volume of energy. I realise now that Amnesia was really a

continuation of the Studio 54 and Paradise Garage legacy. It was the European equivalent with many of the same people who frequented those clubs in New York.

lbiza has been wonderful to me. Hearing Alfredo gave me the inspiration to go forward and the music

I've played in clubs for the last 10 years is built around my passion and experiences from Ibiza. There is a lot of mystery surrounding the island but one always has to remember that there are a lot of people on the island with very broad imaginations! Thailand and America are also close to my heart, but Ibiza's nightlife has more to offer than any other European destination.

I don't think my love affair with Ibiza will ever end. I have made so many good friends on the island, who I look forward to seeing every year and clubs like Pacha and El Divino affect me every time I walk into them because they reflect the true spirit of Ibiza. I still enjoy their intimacy.

lbiza, to me, is simply a creative source, a friend, a lover and a home.

Cars with sound systems so loud they make you sick. Bass that blows your mind. A few saucy ladies for good measure. Welcome to the twisted world of **Fuel Records**

FUCK me, I've been dancing to the wrong bit. It's all in the bassline, innit." Such were the immortal words that went through Fuel chief mechanic Richie Warren's brain as he first fell in love with bass in 1994. Five years later and it's a miracle he can remember anything, let alone talk about it, as we cruise down Miami's louche Ocean Drive with two of the hottest Hispanic laydeez this side of Rio squashing their punannies against the windscreen of his muscle car. It's trouser tent stuff but Richie's too busy adjusting his EQ console (think the Starship Enterprise flight deck) and nattering about bass frequencies to notice.

Since that memorable initiation into the world of bass at Goldie's Metalheadz club, Warren and the rest of the Fuel team have had one goal – to create the craziest, loudest, brassiest bass-driven breakbeat about. And by the shell-shocked looks of the good citizens of M iami they're succeeding. As amused, tanned muscle Marys cover their ears and old ladies in fur coats scurry for cover, Warren cruises nonchalantly past in his Seventies Dodge Challenger, at ortoise speed, pumping out hundreds of decibels of pure sonic boom. From his expression Richie looks like he's out for a Sunday afternoon spin in Bognor, but the bass is so loud and proud you can touch it. And he's not even at half volume.

"This is serious driving music for people who like looking good in their cars," he grins as the girls slither across the bonnet. "Our music's a fashion statement for cars." If cars wore clothes, this little beauty would be stacked up on Prada heels with a Gucci G-string wedged firmly up its lithe, bronzed bottom end.

A WEEK later and we're sitting in Fuel's basement studio in London's rainy East End. Exotic girls and sunshine are a fading memory but the good (bass) vibrations still linger. "Bass is what makes music so exciting," explains Richie. "When me and Dave [Tipper, Fuel's first signing] decided to make music we went off and studied the mechanisms of bass. We could write a book on it now." A book that most independent labels with their hastily engineered, hissy records could do with reading. Fuel's motto of 'music for sound systems' means everything they touch has to be finetuned in their cars before it sees the light of day. There's a cunning plan in there somewhere.

"We found out about infrasound, the invisible subsonic sound that set off primeval instincts in people," laughs Richie maniacally, "and it's that that gets the adrenalin flowing." Adrenalin and Fuel go together like salt and pepper. Fuel's music is the sound of a

thunderstorm brewing. Eerie tunnelling basslines, scattered breakbeats whirling off into orbit, proto-hardcore synth stabs and hip hop breaks all feature in Fuel records, alongside just about any element of music from the last 10 years. There's no one fixed style but Fuel know why people like their music, whether it's running at 90 or 130 bpm.

"Thunder is the voice of the gods and it moves people. The reason the air goes dull before thunder is infrasound muting the high frequencies in the air. People know something's about to happen."



TIPPER Name: Dave Tipper Age: 23

What's your sound? It's a massive medley of influences – classical music, heavily electronic music like Warp and film music. What does bass mean to you? Labyrinthitus and years of being ill. It hurts. Muzik's Verdict: Tipper set the pace at Fuel with early cuts 'About That Time' and 'Twister'. Now signed to Fuel/Higher Ground, he's set to hit the big time this year. RADIOACTIVE MAN/BARGECHARGE Name: Keith Tenniswood

Age: 27 What's your sound? I work with Andrew [Weatheral], as Two Lone Swordsmen], but for my Fuel stuff I'm into more funky electronic music, Bargecharge is more dubby and rough. Now that's hardly going to get shown on The O-Zone, isit? "I know the film will be seen as highly controversial and some people may feel it is blatantly glamourising drug-taking, joyriding and violence," says Lorna. "I saw this as important to portray the gritty side of what actually happens in real life rather than fluffing over the concept and making it politically correct." Hollyoaks will never seem the same again.

A storm, a loud car, club or record all have the same effect: the body's alarm system gets a bit anxious, knows there's something coming and pumps out the old adrenalin rush. So, whack some infrasound in all your tunes and people are going to have to move.

In 1995, following the early prototypes of Tipper's 'Bass Gunner' and Adam Freeland's Tsunami One project, Fuel stumbled across a car with a ludicrous sound system, fell in love with it and started making driving music.

To show us why, Richie takes us "for a spin", possibly the most terrifying experience in the world and comparable to bungee jumping off the Empire State on a frayed elastic band. As he plugs in the MiniDisc, the car feels like it's being swept up on a tidal wave. Then the bass comes, eyelids flutter shut, stomachs hover in throats and yesterday's porridge threatens to reappear. "Bass is the core ingredient of music which changes the way people feel. It accelerates excitement," yells Richie over the melancholic, dark soul of Tipper's 'Get Up On Your Feet'. "We want to make it louder and louder."

Praying that God will hear me and stall the car before my eyes pop out, I think of the poor soldiers in Vietnam who had bass tested on them and watched their intestines trickle into their boots.

"I like to see people physically affected when we're playing," says Warren without a smidgen of irony. "I want to see the shift of air at our gigs forcing people to be carried out." I reach for the car door handle. "I've sat in the car until I've nearly passed out, it's got too uncomfortable to breathe and I've felt a slight heart murmur." I go for my seatbelt. "I must have good bowels but the head and nervous system do go a bit."

With that I press Stop on the monstrous system and fall back into my seat. He's not joking about the nervous system either. Going for a spin with Richie has literally sent Tipper into one. Suffering from a rare syndrome called labyrinthitus, which affects his balance and makes him dizzy, Tipper has to spin around in a circle opposite to the way he (un)naturally spins three times a day and perform tasks like throwing objects at Richie with one eye closed.

"This car is dangerous," Richie admits sheepishly, "and I've never really admitted to Tipper that his labyrinthitus may have been caused by the car. In one medical book I read, it asked if the patient had been near any explosions. Well... You've been in the car."

But Fuel records aren't just about Richter scale basslines. There's a philosophy that lies at the heart of the label, that in a world flooded with media and advertising imagery which others have created, individuals should stand up and answer back. "We're creating a soundtrack to our own lives," explains Richie. "I can put a Fuel album in a Walkman, walk down the road in my own film creating moments for myself." 'Coincidentally' they've done just that to promote the newest Fuel release – IIs' 'Idiots Behind The

Wheel', an alternative anti-drink driving video starring Hollyoaks actress Lorna snorting coke, having sex and dying. And they wonder why the the Government haven't bought it yet. So, any more practical plans for the future, Richie?

"We've already got the loudest car in the world, a sound system made from two cars acting as the left and right speakers and a Monte Carlo dancing car which jumps four feet off the ground. We're now working on the first car to flip onto its roof."

That'll be a no then.

Gatecrasher used to be a club – now it's a phenomenon. Trance, homemade costumes and toys rule – and they're coming to a club near you soon. Muzik went to the home of the Gatecrasher Kids to meet the new mental generation





UMMIES, badges and lightsticks are not the usual tools of revolution. But in deepest Yorkshire, 20 young dance devotees are preparing for their annual assault on Lotherton Hall in Leeds. Driven by Mitsubishis and adolescent enthusiasm, these are The Gatecrasher Kids, a wide-eyed, clean-cut collective that thrives on trance. These self-proclaimed Shiny Kids have come from all over the country to reach obsessive Gatecrasher fan Andy Bonner's Bradford house. As we walk towards it, a neighbour shakes her

head in disbelief. The locals just don't know what to make of Andy's day-glo compatriots. But for these hardcore clubbers, Gatecrasher really is more than just a weekend activity. It's a way of life.

In five short years, Gatecrasher has gone from being a Bank Holiday knees-up in Birmingham to the biggest club night in the country. With a playlist favouring pumping house and Oakenfold-endorsed trance, The Republic has brought new meaning to clubbers' lives in Sheffield. But it's so well-positioned that people travel up and down the motorway just to pass through its hallowed portals. From Birmingham and Bradford to Northampton and Derby, the club's catchment area is enormous.

"Cream used to be number one but now it's going on the back burner," says Andy Bonner excitedly. "Gatecrasher is taking over big time!"

When Muzik first reported on Gatecrasher in 1997, the atmosphere was more glam than glowstick. In the back room, the promoters tried out fresh artists such as 4 Hero and Richard Fearless. But with trance now providing Britain's biggest soundtrack, they've turned their back on the eclectic selection. Since the advent of the now legendary Mitsubishis the punters simply aren't interested in eclectic music any more: they'd rather listen to Scott Bond and flash insane grins all night.

This is a cult without leaders, without a tradition, although everyone agrees its origins lie somewhere between Ibiza and Berlin's Love Parade. But they do have 'rules' – an A4 sized, tongue-wedged-in-cheek code of conduct couched in quasi-religious tones and including such gems as "Saturday is a special day" and "Music is... how we have the ability to LIVE FOREVER and NEVER GROW OLD." Their loyalty to the club is frighteningly fierce. No wonder Judge Jules has dubbed them The Deranged Generation.

Andy's bedroom is a shrine to the Sheffield superclub. His walls have been daubed with bright red Mitsubishi logos, Paul Van Dyk's 'For An Angel' is on permanent rotation and there's a silver alien signed by their spiritual German leader sat on the Technics deck. There's a record box crammed full of Additive and Hooj Choons twelves, a drawer of discarded rave toys and a stack of old flyers. Everywhere you look, there are more signs of adoration. "Paul Van Dyk is a god!" says Andy. "The next time we see him we're going to give him a Gatecrasher top." It's just as well the popular Berliner is a monthly resident, then.

Gatecrasher devotee Andy Bonner is 20 and studies multimedia technology in Bradford. "University always comes first," he fibs transparently. Tonight he's wearing Tsubo trainers, silver trousers, black eyeliner and a triple-pronged hairdo. He says the initial inspiration came from a visit to Café Mambo and Sundissential in Ibiza last year. "I think about Gatecrasher all the time," he says. "This week I haven't been at university, so I've sat in bed half the day thinking about stuff. I try and do something that other people haven't done. For the last six months I've taken different inflatables and other people have taken six metre signs to put across the front of the stage. One of the main things that we have to think about is the toys that we're going to take."

With a shock of pink hair and a fluorescent, translucent sarong, new recruit Heidi Tomlin looks like an extra from Batman as she talks us through the contents of her goody bag. "Bubbles, glasses, hundreds of hair grips and Mini-Monopoly in case we get hored," she lists. "In previous weeks, I've had crayons and childrens' puzzle books as well." What is the toy story, anyway? "During the week I feel grown up and serious and at the weekend I get to feel like a little kid again," she smiles. "It's really an excuse to be a child and have a laugh."

Although the average age here is around 20, not all the kids in this house are bright young things. 36-year-old Jim Byng is Director of Vocational Educational for Birmingham City Council. Incredibly, he's also a teacher. Wearing a spray-painted lion logo and charcoal face-paint, he's less flamboyant yet still looks the part.

"I saw [Andy's friend] Lee at Sundissential in Birmingham and recognised him," says Jim of his initiation. "Still as mad as ever. Doing different lines to what he used to do! Don't quote me on that!"

And does Jim have an explanation for the current toy explosion? Sort of. "People learn in different ways and visual aids are the best way to learn," reckons Jim. "So if you have a toy, it's a good way to express what you're trying to teach. And what they're trying to tell us is that they're happy and that Gatecrasher is the place to be." He even plans to take his mother to Manumission this summer. ("She' going to show us the way!") What exactly is a sensible, law-abiding citizen doing in this place anyway? "I get a lot of respect from the kids I teach," says Jim. "They see me as someone who's real, wears ridiculous clothes and has a good time. Teaching's all about preparing kids for life. It's all about working hard and playing hard. Well, that's how I see it." Unsurprisingly, Jim is keen to stress he doesn't take ecstasy. "All I need is a good dose

He's not the only big kid in the clan. Cyberdog-clad Tim Wheeldon, 38, has been clubbing ever since he took a trip to Wigan Casino in 1978. Back then he was into Northern soul, but his tastes have moved on since those early all-nighters. "I'm into trance now," grins the web-faced veteran, "but I still get exactly the same buzz today." He too has a taste for toys. "If anyone's feeling a bit unwell I've got a stethoscope," he smirks, pulling out a miniature tool kit. "I've got a hammer for when you're hammered and a saw for when you're sore! It's worth doing just for the looks you get. People can't make you out."

The Shiny Kids revel in the confusion that they cause. And that, in essence, is what defines them. They are a reaction against anyone who ever wore a Ben Sherman shirt, a fierce blow against conservative clothing. For some, the look is inevitably too much. Unlike combat trousers or Air Max, this is clothing that could well earn you a good pasting. Andy admits the beer boys occasionally give them grief. But do they ever have problems from the infamous bouncers? Student Tom Morris reckons the queue stories have been exaggerated. "I've never queued for more than 20 minutes to get in," he says. "And I've never not got in."

Andy disagrees. "Two people in front of me got turned away because they were wearing checked shirts," he recalls. "I unzipped my fleece and I was wearing the Mitsubishi logo. But I got in! I think Gatecrasher know that there's a big drug thing in there. The police are doing stuff about it outside, stopping cars on the motorway and searching people in the car park. But the bouncers are more interested in guns and knives than pills. That and rave toys."

JUDGE Jules certainly upset a few punters earlier this year when he suggested that lightsticks ought to be banned. "They say that someone's eyebrow got pulled out with one," huff's Andy, "but that could happen with anything." It seems the Judge has other grudges too. "He threatened me from the DJ box," laughs Andy. "He stuck his fingers up: I thought he wanted some poppers. And then someone said 'it's your dummy! And he was like, T'm going to whack you if you don't get rid of it!' So I got a few people on the bars with dummies..." Andy says Sasha was also unhappy about toys in the middle of the dancefloor.

But not every big name DJ is so negative. Pete Tong reckons they're an inspiration for The Essential Selection. "I think they're really special. They encapsulate all the excitement about the weekend. And this is what people live for, you know? Right now The Gatecrasher Kids are probably the best in the country because they put so much effort into it. It means so much to them."

He's right. Watching them get ready, it's clear that these clubbers pay incredible attention to detail. Some insist on wearing different apparel to every single club night. It's not about being skint, it's about being individual, about wearing hand-stitched, homemade clothing, not just buying off the peg. They'll befriend almost anyone as long as they haven't blatantly stolen a costume idea. And even though they all dislike the term, there are undeniable elements of rave culture in their (out)look.

They're the friendliest bunch of clubbers you could ever hope to meet. "Everyone at Gatecrasher becomes your best friend after 30 seconds of talking to them," smiles Heidi. But there's more to the Gatecrasher phenomenon than that. The fluorescent colours, the

super-smart Es and the conversion of the yellow smiley face into a shiny, silver hue reflect a new breed ready to raise their arms in rapture come sundown. By 6 o'clock, everyone is





ATECRASHER owner Simon Raine declined to speak to Muzik about the club's history and its infamous crowd. Many are asking questions about Raine's views, claiming that he was behind Judge Jules' outspoken comments on the banning of lightsticks. However, in a Muzik interview back in 1997, Simon Raine made these telling comments: "We change things quickly at Gatecrasher. We'll keep changing it until people come up and say, 'Yeah, that's wicked'. It's punter-led, it's not led by us. You've got to move with the times. For the 18-year-old kids here, this is the beginning. For them it's new and different and exciting. And at the end of the day, they're the ones paying the bills " By not participating in this celebratory feature, Raine is leaving it to the Kids to talk. But to say it's a "punter-led club" should mean they are allowed to wave lightsticks without being cictated to. One thing's for sure: Gatecrasher has revolutionised UK clubland and the only people capable of turning off the lights now are the owners themselves.

buzzing. The girls have gone for dummies and tight, customised T-shirts; the boys favour a robotic, Acupuncture look. It's an impressive sight.

But be warned: the fickle hand of fashion has hit Gatecrasher as well. "Flashing tops are out and signs are dying out too," says Andy earnestly. "I'm never going to do a sign ever again because it's been done. Mitsubishi logos on your clothes is dying completely. But the Gatecrasher lion is pretty cool at the moment."

Later, in the grounds of Lotherton Hall, their numbers grow rapidly as friends arrive from other parts of the country. Sweets are swapped, fun cameras snapped and fluffy toys traded. As lollipops exchange hands, you can't help but think that this is the clubbers' equivalent of a school playground. They all twitch excitedly to melodic trance in the distance. Old enough to know better, but still too young to care. In Ibiza last summer, Andy's friend Lee swapped a trainer in Pacha to get a different look. All of a sudden, we're the ones who look out of place. "People overintellectualise it," says Tom sagely. "They're actually reading stuff into it, saying 'this is due to the rave generation', that it has roots in new romantics and that the spikes have come from the punk generation. But a lot of it is just fun." One girl is wearing a sign that says 'I'm way round wrong'. He has a point.

So what does the future hold? More fluorescent acolytes, if Lotherton Hall is anything to go by. It's a look which will undoubtedly make its way back to Ibiza this summer. Here in Leeds, it's everywhere. Some punters have adopted a subtle spike or two while others have opted for coloured contact lenses. The hioctane, day-glo message is spreading fast. When Judge Jules makes his entrance later that night, they're already down the front. The sense of euphoria is incredible. "Every week more and more people are starting to dress like us," says Heidi. She's right. And not just at Gatecrasher: whether at clubs like Passion in Coalville or in the trance tent at Homelands, these Shiny Kids are multiplying so fast, by this time next year they'll dominate clubland. Gatecrasher is growing and so is its legion of followers. The Kids are on the move.

Muzik readers vote Gatecrasher Club Of The Year at the Muzik Dance Awards. Their first compilation, 'Black', is released on INCredible. 1999 The entire club undergoes a major refurbishment. "This is the second most expensive thing I've done since buying the place!" says Simon Raine. Enter the Gatecrasher Kid phenomenon . On February 6th Paul Van Dyk plays his first sixhour set at Gatecrasher. In March, a clubber dies after taking an ecstasy pill during one of Judge Jules' sets, and Jules calls for a ban on lightsticks. In June Gatecrasher returns to Lotherton Hall for one of the parties of the Nineties.

Cream blamed the likes of Jeremy Healy for the influx of dickhead clubbers and spoke out against handbag music. The club has scaled itself down slightly, but the atmosphere is back to its best.

Gatecrasher, Sheffield (1999)

And here it is. The Sheffield superclub went supernova after its relaunch in 1999 and is now the sacred home of the Deranged Generation. With Scott Bond and Judge Jules residing, the club also houses six-hour sets from Paul Van Dyk as well as making names of upand-coming jocks like Guy Ornadel. But can they cope with their new found stardom? Many are suspicious of their true feelings towards the people who've made this club great. Coincidentally, word has it that Gatecrasher is set to team up with Cream for a series of parties. Watch this space.

Likes fast cars, politics, hard techno, vintage port and cigars. Dislikes drugs, bullshit and other people. He made the defining techno album of the Nineties but hasn't released a record since. **Dave Clarke** is not your average DJ. But then who wants to be average?

Dave Clarke is in a confessional mood months, he says, he was addicted to speed and Mitsubishis. Until the last six

"You get used to thrills and you want bigger ones," he admits. "Some DJs have cocaine habits. I was addicted to fast cars."

We're sitting in the most obvious symbol of the older, mellower Dave Clarke, a diesel-powered Mercedes off-road hulk with a nodding dog on the dashboard to keep him calm. It does 0-60 in 30.2 seconds, a fact which continues to amaze Clarke; his last motor did it in 4.2. Clarke likes statistics. He admits, with a mixture of contrition and barely concealed pride, that he once drove from Gatwick to his home in a West Sussex village in 12 minutes, when it should take 40, and that he used to spend \pounds 80,000 a year on new cars. A cocaine habit might have been cheaper.

"When you're driving around in a Mitsubishi Evolution Lancer you just see corners as your fun. I used to drive up to gigs in Liverpool and do about 160mph. It got to the point where I thought, 'Should I have six gears put in so I can make it do 210?' People used to think they'd never see me again. I'd have probably died by my own cliché."

In January he had his first serious crash while, ironically, driving under the speed limit. A week later, in Mexico, he was involved in another one and decided it was time to kick the habit.

"It made me focus a lot more," he considers as we wind leisurely down a country lane, "Since the crash I've actually got the desire to speed up even further and work my tits off even harder. I've been a boy racer for 12 years," he cackles. "But I've mellowed out."

TECHNO needs Dave Clarke, perhaps more than it ever has. While Clarke is obsessed with momentum, the music he loves has slowed down and stepped back. Since his seminal 'Red' trilogy and three Top 40 singles culled from his 1996 album 'Archive One', techno has had barely a whiff of mainstream success. 'Archive One' was a great, boundary-breaking techno album that showed how flexible and visionary the genre could still be. Only Dave Angel and Luke Slater have come close since.

It all seems a very long time ago and it will be even longer before he releases another record, of which more later. But even outside the studio, Dave Clarke is British techno's most thrilling and controversial DJ. He's the one who rocks the boat, pisses people off, breaks with the chummy etiquetie. According to the cliché he's a cigar-chomping, fast car-driving, purist, humourless techno grouch. Only the bit about the cigars is true.

"I'm quite pensive," he explains over green tea and cake in the living room of the house he shares with his wife, Laura Jane." I'm not superficial and there's a lot of superficiality. I think it's a load of bullshit to go 'Alright mate, how are you doing? Largin' it! Got your lager?'. I see my job as entertaining the people, not entertaining the people within the industry. That may make me seem obstinate or difficult but I am a very private person."

A few years ago he moved to the countryside, to a village where Vote Conservative signs proliferate and they don't warm to strangers. There are wellies in the hallway and 19th century illustrations of farm animals on the walls. It seems like a strange place for the so-called 'Baron of Techno' to live. "I need this to keep sane," he explains. "If you travel 800,000 miles a year and

then you live in a city you're going to flip out. I need the space, I need the quiet."

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Clarke loves his three dogs and 18 chickens because, he says casually, "I don't like people. Obviously I like specific people but when you look at what people can do to each other then I don't like them as a race."

This is the sort of thing that gets Clarke – who is witty, polite and generous throughout the interview – into trouble with clubland.

Here are some more. He favours port and cigars over drugs ("I am against drugs in quite a big way and I think that hasn't helped in this industry"). If it wasn't for DJing commitments he would have joined the wellied masses on last year's countryside movement demonstration in London. Passionate about health and education, he once wanted to be a politician, and even tried to stand as a candidate for the Euro-sceptic Paforandian protection in the last in the l

Referendum party in the last general election. Brandon Block does not do this. Clarke, though, prefers it that way.

"It's always better to be out there on your own, isn't it?"

BIRMINGHAM, nine days earlier. Dave Clarke is playing at Atomic Jam, currently relocated to a smaller venue so it's more of a – ho ho – Subatomic Jam. He's astonishing to watch, cutting and crossfading tracks into 30 second snippets like a hip hop turntablist. For Clarke, DJing is about vinyl manipulation rather than playing a series of tunes; his records are less important than what he does with them. Even his own crowd-pleasing remixes of Underworld and DJ Rush only make cameo appearances, forced out of the mix by the galloping, mixer-hammering pace. It's the sound of technology fucked up and short of sleep: raw and red-eved.

British clubs, though, are only a fraction of Clarke's fan base. He's perhaps the most prolific of the club class of DJs – LTJ Bukem and Derrick May are two others – who have traded a high domestic profile for an ambassadorial role. He reckons he flies around 800,000 miles a year and has his own seat reserved on every British Airways plane, boasting that "the only people who travel more than me are heads of corporations."

Four years ago, when handbag's mascara was beginning to run, other genres were tipped to storm the mainstream: drum & bass, trip hop and techno. Superclubs started to book DJs like Clarke for their backrooms, but the crossover never happened. Now, you could compare techno to Northern soul or heavy metal: a rarefied world of diehard fans cut adrift from the Mitsubishi mainstream. Clarke is unconcerned.

"It doesn't bother me that it isn't going to be mainstream," he says in the car afterwards. "It's probably healthier for it that it's not. The thing you've got to remember is techno is quite anarchistic. Commercial dance is your Liberal Democrat, Paddy Ashdown music, but techno is a way of life. You DJ and you're communicating with people with something that isn't cheesy, obvious-at-the-first-listen wank. You do shit with it. You're changing it each time you play it. And that's what it's about - constant progression and constant interpretation. It's never static." But hasn't techno lost its futurist edge? Where are

"Yeah," Clarke concedes. "It's not the best period at

the moment but techno will always be futuristic because it's based on technology. At the moment,

world, and Clarke is the crack that can't be papered over. "My manager thinks I'm paranoid," he admits. "I still

feel that I'm not firing at 100%, that I'm being held back." By whom?

"Some journalists," he ventures cautiously. "Certain record company people. Certain DJs."

But why would they want to? "Various different reasons. It's basically self-interest.

If I come through then they're worried about their own particular position. I'm uncontrol lable in certain ways and they'd rather have someone they can control, then eat them alive and spit them out."

don't forget, technology is a little bit staid. We're now at the stage where we're not looking for the next thing in technology – we're looking at how to use the technology differently. Techno is about working the crowd, working the music, working the decks, working the mixer, working everything. If you want to be lazy go and play shit house; if you want to take it to another level play techno." –

Dave Clarke has never had much time for the clubbing mainstream and it hasn't won him any friends. Dance music thrives on the illusion of a cosy, backslapping all-mates-together It sounds like a conspiracy theory. Are people really devoting that much energy to bringing down one mouthy techno DJ? Maybe they are, but perhaps we need some context. Dave Clarke made his debut album for Deconstruction. He won't be making his second for them. Apart from remixes for the likes of Underworld and Moby, he hasn't produced a track in two years. Clarke may be outspoken but he's not stupid. He 's keeping schtum. "Td rather not talk about it at all," he says slowly. "Right now I don't think it's wise to go into detail about any particular facet. I'm frustrated about it but I don't want people to take that frustration and use it against me. I would love nothing more than to make another record but at the moment the situation isn't there and I can't talk any more about that." Clarke thinks the whole music industry is "fucked up", that it's all about the money, that Radio 1 "isn't a public service any more". It could, in part, be bitterness. After a 13 week stretch filling in for Annie Nightingale in 1997, and countless appearances for his hero John Peel, he was tipped to be the first DJ to host a techno show on national radio. It didn't happen.

"I was very disappointed," he says. "Not just for myself but the progression of the music scene. They obviously had their own reasons. Pete Tong was quoted as saying that he doesn't see the need for a techno show, so there you go."

An hour later we arrive at Cream, the current home of Manchester's techno mecca Bugged Out. Justin Robertson plays a fine set before him, but Clarke works on another level. Speed is everything. His fast car fetish conquered, DJing is where he takes his corners, his handbrake turns and his risks. You slow down, you lose concentration and you crash.

"Sometimes I can get on a spiritual plane," he explains afterwards. "Hike closing my eyes and getting sensory deprivation so I can expand my ears. It's very difficult DJing with your eyes closed but I can do it. I was born to DJ. I always wanted to entertain people with music that deserves listening to."

All this is no doubt true, but there's more to Clarke's ambition than that. Running alongside his passion for the music is a fierce desire to succeed and be the best at what he does.

"Obviously a lot of ambitious people are like that because they had a fucked up family life," he concedes. "I'm probably the same in that respect – always looking to replace the childhood you lost in some way."

He laughs self-consciously.

"It's getting a bit Freudian, isn't it?"



never made it to college, drifting through a series of jobs until he could get enough DJ dates. At his second residency he fell in love with the

manageress, Laura Jane. Making his name as a hip hop DJ, he bought one of the first copies of Phuture's 'Acid Trax' in London and raced back to Brighton to introduce it to the puffa jacket crowd. He was bottled off. By the time rave came along, there was no place for acid house and techno in Brighton and Clarke killed time by making tracks. First, under the imaginative moniker of Hardcore, he was on XL, then the first British artist to be signed to R&S ("stick an A in front of it and an E after it and that's what you get"), and then ran his own short-lived Magnetic North label as his DJ career gathered momentum.

The rest you know: the revolutionary 'Red' series that broke down the barriers between house and techno; acclaimed remixes for, notably, Felix Da Housecat, Inner City, Death In Vegas and The Ghemical Brothers; 'Archive One', which combined techno, Chicago house, electro and orchestral melancholy (he doesn't listen to it now: "it upsets me"); 1997's brilliant discofied 'Shake Your Booty' single; the Radio 1 slots; occasional hip hop and electro sets at clubs like the Heavenly Social and a reputation as one of the best DJs in the country. Was he ever happy?

"I don't like people. Obviously I like specific people but I don't like them as a race"

DAVE CLARKE was born in Brighton on 19 September 1968. ("I'm one of the few Brightonians who was actually born there.") His father, an accountant, and mother divorced when he was 13 and he doesn't see his father any more ("that was his choice").

"They should have split up when I was four because it never worked out," he says matter-of-factly, "but they kept it going for 'my sake'. It was fucking hardcore. I was living in this two and a half bedroom house and I had the half bedroom. Constant arguments, constant shit going on, a really horrible environment that really fucked me up. That probably made me the way I was. It doesn't help you trust people when that shit's going on around you."

Clarke, then as now, was never part of a gang. At public school (his parents saved up everything they had to pay the fees) he only had one close friend and was expelled four or five times, for being "a pain in the arse".

"I used to think it was a good prank to overdub the air raid siren from Frankie Goes To Hollywood ['Two Tribes'] and edit it into a five minute tape, then put the speakers out of the window when they were playing cricket and put it on really loud. Unfortunately they didn't see the funny side."

In the army cadets (membership compulsory) Clarke would hack into the communications equipment so he could listen to the radio.

At home, he'd retreat to his room and listen

"I was a very AYM: Angry Young Man. I'm not so angry now. It's a deeper anger, whereas it was more in your face then. Music has always been therapeutic to me. It brings a lot of things out and takes you to a higher plane. That's why I want to make another album because I feel I need that therapy right now."

THERE'S a paperback on Dave Clarke's coffee table of short stories by American author Tobias Wolff. On the cover is a picture of Clarke's Neapolitan mastiff, Devo, taken from a Muzik photo shoot four years ago. The picture is credited as "Dave Clarke, Red 3".

"People will think I look like that," he laughs. He's pleased for Devo nonetheless. What makes him happy?

"Having a really nice life makes me happy. My wife. Beautiful animals. Caviar. Pre-Second World War port. Smoking a cigar. Driving around in the countryside. Every time I fly over Gatwick and I see all the fields I think, 'Wow. It's good to be alive.' I love traditional things and yet I love technology. It's a constant contradiction and that's what makes life interesting." The country-dwelling Baron of Techno shrugs cheerfully.

"I can never find the middle ground, ever. I don't see the point." Dave Clarke chooses his favourite own productions

DVERTISEMENTS should rarely be believed, but surprising as it sounds, the future really is orange. That and pastel blue and emerald green and salmon pink and numerous other shades, depending on what

Carl Cox Phuture 2000

Worldwide Ultimatum/Edel Turntable hero confounds expectations with his second album of wilful eclecticism

WHERE 1999 has seen the likes of the Chems, Orbital and Underworld release albums that have consolidated their respective sounds, global superstar tech-God Carl Cox has reached for something altogether more pluralistic. Maybe he'd score more than the seven out of 10 as a producer he reckons he deserves (see last month's interview) if he let fly with 10 boshing cuts of the hard, dirty techno his sets are full of. Still, you can't help but admire his widescreen attitude.

If anything's been apparent throughout his career in dance music, it's this - Carl Cox has never been about doing what's expected of



him. He could have coined it in as a cheesy ravemaster on the hardcore circuit at the beginning of the decade but instead set out to pursue his first love - quality, underground techno. So it's interesting that tracks like 'Cosmic Dawn' and 'Been Smarter' hint at his former life as a purveyor of proto-jungle breakbeat science. In contrast, opener 'Black Shaolin' and the Dave Angel collaboration 'Yeah' are defiant dancefloor grooves, but the rubberfunk jolt of 'The Mission' and the electro-disco of 'Another Place' are what hold the attention, tracks that go beyond the purist mindset.

Cox will be seeing in the new millennium twice, in Sydney and Hawaii. It's doubtful he'll use something from 'Phuture 2000' to mark the occasion(s) - it's not really that sort of album and after all he has 64,000 other records to choose from, But as an all-bases-covered long-player to help you through the inevitable monster comedown, 'Phuture 2000' is surely in for a rotation come January 1st.

HIP hop with a distinctly British, lo-fi sensibility, this has more in common with Warp/Ninja-style leftfield scratchedelia than the pared-down beats and rhymes of the current US hip hop template. Put that down to Bryant Dryden and Josh Virgin's intercontinental crew of aides: Freddy Fresh and Bassbin Twins from over there, Fridge's Kieran Hebden, Steve 'Stasis' Picton and Swag's Chris Duckenfield from over here. Subterrain anthem 'Dark & Dirty' is perfect late night body music while the smooth breakbeats of 'Momentum' owe as much to Detroit as they do south London's Wiggle posse.

Some say tech-house dwells in a no-man's land, lacking both the inherent funkiness of house and the abrasive edge of techno. 'Dot To Dot' scotches such assertions with a ridiculous ease.

Rawkus Presents Heavy Beats Volume 1 Rawkus

NY hip hop production wizard showcases his skills with a little help from his friends

"THE Beats On This Joint Were Made Strictly With Original Breaks. No Bootlegs, Compilations Or Reissued Shit – You Hear?" DJ Spinna's boast on the sleeve may not mean much to anyone who doesn't spend their time flicking through dusty old funk records in darkened basements, but it might explain why the affable, dreadlocked New Yorker is the most exciting producer in independent hip hop.

As one half of the Jigmastas, the brains behind the Beyond Real label, and remixer for the likes of 4 Hero, Rae & Christian and Nightmares On Wax, Spinna has built his reputation on rich, complex productions. 'Heavy Beats' is themed around the old skool idea of the neighbourhood DJ laying down beats for a host of MCs. The opening track sets the tone with: "A bunch of guys were sitting around rapping". In Spinna's case, that bunch includes foul-mouthed white boy wonder Eminem and Blackstar's Talib Kweli. Kweli offers an impassioned history of slavery alongside female MC Apani B on the shimmering, moody 'Time Zone' and Eminem duels with the throaty Thirstin Howl III on 'Watch Dees', a haunting mesh of Jaws-style strings and spectral voices in which he claims, "I'm the old man who lives upstairs and starves his pets".

Spinna's skills really come to the fore on the instrumentals. 'A Grooveamungus' is DJ Shadowesque funk, the uptempo 'Rock' could be Jadell or The Wiseguys and 'The Haunted Space Freak' is all sci-fi shimmer and squelching bass.

The only problem? At 32 minutes and eight tracks long, 'Heavy Beats' is way too short. Roll on Volume 2.

F Communications Double-whammy reissue for the moody Frenchman who put Paris on the map via New Jersey

PARIS. A city now known for Daft Punk and Air. But long before Stardust made their mark, another Frenchman was quietly starting a revolution of his own. And even today, the question remains: how did an introverted, moody bugger from the outskirts of Paris ever come to make such soulful, spiintual house music?

Although Ludovic Navarre namechecked Todd Terry and Roger Sanchez on the hypnotic 'What's New?', the trio of 'Boulevard' EPs were more than just a homage to his New York house heroes. Cannily sidestepping the traditional garage template, he added authentic Cajun, reggae and hip hop elements to a tried and tested blueprint. Reputedly recorded as jam sessions with live musicians, Saint Germain's bluesy soundscapes trawled the Deep South rather than the sidestreets of Paris and Boulevard' was a breath of fresh air. When all three EPs were collected onto one awesome album, it was no surprise it was our Album Of The Year in 1995.

There's more to the genius of Navarre, though, as 'From Detroit To St Germain' proves. Here's an odds-and-sods collector's album that's almost as good as 'Boulevard' itself. As well as the epic 'Soul Salsa Soul' and the deep minimal funk of 'French' and 'Jack On The Groove', the Todd Edwards remix of 'Alabama Blues' is often hailed as a pioneer of the two step garage sound.

Navarre tapped into a vibe that was more MAW than the Masters themselves. The production is faultless, the sound thrillingly huge in its scope. Here's a slice of history no good home should be without,

A French football team, Paris-based, non? No, And neither is Ludovic Navarre "a funny old melon farmer", as CJ Bolland suggested. In fact he was a slightly shy young man from the provincial town of St Germain-en-Laye

(hence the name), very popular in DJ booths and hairdressers' salons in the mid Nineties. Signed to F Communications.

Hang on, that's Garnier's label, isn't it?

Yeah, but Navarre was as far from 'Flat Eric' as it's possible to get. Here was a producer rated by everyone from Rae & Christian to Roger Sanchez, who could knock out anything from ultra-smokey dub to the purest of New Jersey garage, who would get jazz combos into his studio to jam live over his beats and basslines. He even managed to make a killer deep techno EP for DJax, as Hexagon.

So it wasn't just thirtysomething house for people too stoned to dance? Just ask Deep Dish if you need peer approval. Sharam says: "Him and Laurent Garnier are the godfathers of the French scene. His stuff was incredible -- it was so deep! It had a lot of soul and a lot of pain, blues house if you like. It's very tricky to do something that fresh and that's what makes him so unique." Oh, and the Todd Edwards mix of 'Alabama Blues' is something of a classic on the underground garage circuit.

Wow! Laurent must have been right chuffed to scoop up such a talent. Perhaps. Perhaps not. Navarre, as well has having rather poor fashion sense, was notoriously moody and difficult to work with. Word has it that he and Garnier haven't spoken for years.

Typical Gallic behaviour, eh? So where is he now?

At one stage he was being chased by the majors for megabucks, but no one's heard from him since 1996. He's rumoured to have some material surfacing some time next year, but don't hold your breath.

Sharp Vs Sharp - The Album React

AT last, the first ever mix album from two of the biggest party animals in the business. It's four years since The Sharp Boys launched their DJing career in front of 4,000 Trade fans at Gay Pride, and since then they have guested all over the world, while establishing two pivotal and acclaimed London residencies at Heaven and Trade-Lite. Not to mention a Saturday night show on Kiss FM that has the whole of London rocking to their blend of cutting edge American-influenced house with tribal overtones. Back in 1994, Derry boy Steven React ditched his A&R job at React and teamed up with former journalist George Mitchell to launch Sharp Recordings with a maxim of 'quality not quantity'. 14 releases later and it's one of the most respected house labels in town, and with all the singles (from artists like Killa Green Buds, Hip Hoperation, Sara

Parker, Logan Circle and The Columbian Drug Cartel) included here, it's easy to see why. 'The Album' also includes a host of hot and highly sought after Sharp remixes of Josh Wink, Kathy Brown, Joe T Vanelli, Cevin Fisher, All Saints and The Backstreet Boys, all of which sound as fresh as ever. IF Manumission, Bar Mambo and merchandising that would make the Spice Girls blush make up Ibiza '99, Phil Mison is on hand to remind you of the White Island's heart and soul. While not strictly an Ibiza album – more of a sunset over two decades of deep house, global percussion sessions and mellow grooves – 'Soundcolors' sums up a summertime parallel universe. One where the people are smart, where the music trips off the decks into glasses of cold beer and nights are warm – a small piece of heaven condensed into a mix album the summer months were made for.

Unobtrusively mixed, Phil Mison draws on the skills gathered during two summers at the Café Del Mar. It's a globallyreferenced selection of house music that ignores the 4/4 master and avoids noodling itself into a boring dull-de-sac. Native Elements' 'Brazil Minus 6' lifts you up and drops you somewhere between Orbital's 'Chime' and 'Sueno Latino', Jersey Street's 'Cry Me A River' is a soulful Latin skank. By the time you reach Mr Hermano's ultra Balearic shuffle 'Caxixi' you've already entered the warm zone, where stuff just feels right and everything in the world is, well, okay.

The INCredible Sound Of Jo Whiley INCredible

Yomanda Synths & Strings Manifesto

A NO pretensions, no nonsense party stomper, 'Synths & Strings' is fantastically effective drivel, like the Vengaboys' slightly older sister. Disco stabs, whoops, handclaps, filtered breakdowns, sirens, alarms and pounding glitter-ball strings are all present and correct. Then again, producer Paul Masterson is apparently the man behind the Blind Date theme tune.

Sasha: "Are we deliberately starting off with the worst record? It's formulaic, and dare I say it, cheesy. Manifesto isn't really a label I check for. It's lowest common denominator – drum roll, disco break... I know this whole sound is massive and the record will be huge, but it doesn't touch any buttons for me."

Isolee Beau Mot Plage Classic

LICENSED in from Germany, 'Beau Mot Plage' is a stunning deep house groove that's been rocking the Muzik office on a daily basis. Shimmering with a hazy dub feel, acoustic guitars and Afro-strumming faze wonkily in and out of the mix, making for the kind of hallucinogenic magic you'd get if you crossed Basic Channel with Spiritual Life. Delightful.

Sasha: "Ican see why Danny Tenaglia and François K have been playing this out-real tripped out deep house. Fantastic. I can never get enough of this kind of stuff. The sounds on it are excellent. It's still got that German edge to it. And the production is really different too. I think this'II be getting played at Twilo. Can you get me one?"

The 3 Jays Feeling It Too Multiply PHATTS & Small have plenty to answer for, not least the explosion in post-Turn Around' vocal disco-house. Boasting members of PF Project and Huff & Herb, the 3 Jays (Jimmy, Jeff and Jamie) have bypassed the bargain bins reserved for most of those tunes, thanks mainly to a Marshall Jefferson sample and a sung-notsampled vocal.

*** Sasha: "Sounds like it'll be absolutely enormous in Ibiza. I didn't like Phatts & Small – first time I heard it, I just thought 'yuck'. I loved Stardust till everyone caned the shit out of it and even then it's still a great record. This just isn't original. Actually, okay, I quite like this, it's not too offensive. It's better than Phatts & Small."

Ray Keith Substance Dread

NOW here's a man who should have been involved in that Gary Numan remix project last year. 'Substance' is the bastard offspring of Numan's 'Cars', mutated into a 21st century postapocalyptic slab of darkcore jungle that is literally terrifyingly funky. No wonder his label's called Dread.

Sasha: "God, that intro does sound like Gary Numan. I like a lot of the darker jungle actually. Things like Optical. The production is so extreme, the

energy is phenomenal. Me and Ray used to play some of the same raves back in the day." ***

DJ Dan

Presents Needle Damage (That Zipper Track) Ultimate Breaks PERHAPS better known for being America's West

Coast breakbeat/funky techno Dan, sorry, Don, 'Needle Damage' is a more full-on techno onslaught that's caught the ear of

Sasha: "DJ Dan is a really sweet guy. I've played with him quite a few times. He came over and played at Tyrant and I've played with him in the States too. I can see why this is one of Jules' big records – it's got that dirty, raw feel he likes. That Lectroliners' record, 'Moose Caboose', the one Camisra sampled, that's been in my box for three years now. I really hope this does well for him."

Tipper Supersport Higher Ground/Fi

Higher Ground/Fuel

THE elusive, but much fêted boy wonder of the nu skool breaks label takes the genre on a pounding ride to the darkside. Part 808 State around 'Cubik' time, part jump-up jungle on downers, you'll need to wait till the rather glorious Andre Estermann remix to find the merest glimmer of light.

Sasha: "That Tipper remix of Grooverider was excellent. He did some mixes for BT last year which I don't think ever came out which were fucking amazing. He's played a Tyrant night for us too. I see that Fuel car driving around west London all the time. It was parked outside MTV House in Miami when I was there and the sound system from the car outside was louder than the one I was playing on inside, so I had to go and send someone to tell them to turn it down! A lot of nu skool breaks stuff is dark and fiddly, but the stuff that Tipper does is well produced. He creates a really interesting space in his records and doesn't rely on formulaic sounds." ****

Doolally Straight From The Heart (Remixes) Locked On

TIMELY cash-in for one of Shanks & Bigfoot's previous alter egos. The original's parping ska horns and fractured two-step groove still sound great, if not as instantly cross-over friendly as 'Sweet Like Chocolate', while Tuff Jam and Bump & Flex provide the remixes.

Sasha: "Nah, I didn't like 'Sweet Like Chocolate' and I'm just not into this at all."

Roots Manuva Motion 5000

Big Dada

SLICK, ever-so-slightly sick hip hop taken from his 'Brand New Second Hand' album that proves Roots Manuva is a true original. A revelation on the Jo Whiley show, 'Motion 5000' lays on a gentle string duet to rub gently against mic flexing that's as robust as anything from these shores in recent years.

Sasha: "British hip hop? Uh-oh!! [Listening] This sounds really good actually. I really don't ever buy any hip hop. BT's been working with Peanut Butter Wolf from San Francisco and Wolf's rapper. It's a fucking amazing record - pure West Coast hip hop jazz. This is wicked, Ilike it. Good mix of strings and beats. British hip hop's not as bad as I thought!"





Tsunami One & BT Hip Hop Phenomenon Marine Parade

ANOTHER killer from Adam Freeland's highly-rated nu skool breaks label that's been consistent from the very first release. Teaming up with a currently label-less BT, the duo churn up the electro-convulsive grooves, whacking up the reverb and stomach-turning bassline. The key lies in the way the chunky, funky feel is never overwhelmed by the studio trickery. Though quite what the hip hop influence is, we're damned if we know.

Sasha: "This is one of three or four tracks of BT's new stuff I've been sent. It's areal nu skool breaks record, but it's got all Brian's sounds floating away in the background that create a really beautiful vibe. In a club it sounds absolutely massive. I'm really into the Tsunami One stuff. Iloved his mix of The Orb. And as a DJ he's been doing some really great sets with loads of energy, whereas a lot of nu school breaks DJs get really fiddly and noodle around. This is the perfect record to go from house or trance into a breaks set."

MJ Cole Waiting For The Day Talkin' Loud

FIRST single from the underground garage producer no doubt dubbed "most likely to do a Roni Size" at Talkin' Loud towers. 'Waiting For The Day' has that polished yet raw, early Masters At Work US garage vibe, which makes it very popular round here. But it's B-side 'Sanctuary' that's getting all the plays, a smoothly soulful exercise in two-step sensitivity.

Sasha: "I must admit, I've never heard of him. 'Waiting For The Day' is funky and soulful, like a kind of old skool house record. Not something I'd play though. I've not really been checking out the twostep stuff, that really skippy garage stuff just isn't my thing. The production on 'Sanctuary' is really nice – the drums are really crisp and it's got a nice warm feel. It's very musical. A beautiful summer record."

Scott Grooves Mothership Reconnection (Daft Punk Remix) Virgin

ADMIT it, you're starting to miss them already. Bangalter and Homem-Christo seem to have been on hols for donkeys now, so the reissue of their only remix from last year is especially welcome. P-Funk goes filter disco mad as George Clinton himself beams down to Paris for hard-bop boogie. Slamming.

Sasha: "This was originally really hard to get hold of wasn'tit? It's excellent, I love it. Daft Punk don't do many mixes, but they consistently deliver groundbreaking material and this is superb. I probably wouldn't play their stuff out though unless it was on the terrace at Space or 9am at Twilo, when you can play out in any direction." ****

Marc Et Claude

Additive

SINGULARLY refusing to name their tracks with anything more than two letters, the follow-up to last year's 'La' instead uses a very Nicolette-sounding sample for its sensuality this time, though it's the Moonman (aka Ferry Corsten) mix that's really doing the damage. Mixes come from Van Bellen and Kaycee, while the original of 'La' is also included.

Sasha: "These mixes you've brought me are nothing special, but the Van Bellen mix Ireally love. It's really deep and it's got a bit of a drum roll. I've been playing it a lot over the last four or five months. I love Van Bellen's mixes. He's from Holland and he does these long tripped out deep records that are perfect for Twilo." ** ** (Van Bellen mix) * (The others)

Orbital

Nothing Left (Remixes) London

WE'RE not used to the sight of Orbital put through the remix grinder, so it might take a while to get used to the Way Out West, Tsunami One and Les Rythmes Digitales versions here. Hang in there, though, as LRD in particular find the perfect match for their stuttering Eighties electro-pop in Orbital's glistening textures.

Sasha: "Shit, I've got two mates doing mixes on the same record - Adam Freeland [Tsunami One] and Nick [Warren, of Way Out West]. The guy Adam works with, Beber, is superb. I think Breeder have done a mix of this as well, which I've been absolutely caning. It's got a bit of an American groove to it, but it's still very clean sounding. The last couple of times I've heard Adam playing, he's been absolutely amazing. In San Francisco, he dropped the tempo by about 10bpm, but it totally lifted the roof off the club. He puts together breakbeat sets the way house DJs build their sets - building up the energy all the time. His mixes are great."

MAW Featuring India To Be In Love Defected

THE biggest, brightest, loveliest, cuddliest import garage anthem of the last two years finally gets a belated release over here. No matter – this is still bound to be massive and



with fresh mixes from MJ Cole and Kenny Dope in hip hop mode, this is essential.

Sasha: "MAW's production is amazing. Consistently, from day one, they've turned out... Every one of their records just sounds like a classic record. The grooves are so funky and they always manage to put together these beautiful soulful records. The 4 Hero mix of 'It's Alright' was beautiful too. This is great, another classic in waiting."





Death In Vegas Dirge Concrete

CURIOUSLY apt title for the comeback single for Richard Fearless' lot. Sasha: "Ilove Dot Allison's new album so much. I took it on holiday to Thailand with me and just caned it the whole time. I love this too. I've only met Richard a few times, even though we're signed to the same label. This is very psychedelic. If the rest of the album's as good as this, I'm really looking forward to hearing it."

Sasha: "It's funny, it sounds like a Manchester record! It's got that ACR [A Certain Ratio] feel to it. End of the Eighties, Factory vibe. Me and Justin have played together a lot, though not back in the day because he had his Most Excellent thing and I was busy playing illegal warehouse parties. When I was in Manchester we'd see a lot of each other. This is great. Very different, very nice. I'm impressed." ★★★

Freestylers Featuring Definition Of Sound Here We Go Freskanova

"HERE we go on a ride with the new

Freestylers" goes the chant, but actually this sounds just like the old ones – the usual chunky beats, ragga nonsense and user-friendly big beat hooks. Still, good to see they're literally keeping it old skool by getting in DOS, who last saw chart action circa 1991.

Sasha: "Not really my cup of tea. I haven't been into hip hop for a while now. I was, back when Definition Of Sound were first around, when Graeme Park and Mike Pickering used to mix it up. But I haven't been following that scene for a while. The last Freestylers' single sounded quite Fatboy Slim."





Paul Johnson Get Get Down Defected

YOU couldn't have written a more unlikely story, really. Paul Johnson, wheelchair-bound since childhood, is one of those insanely prolific Chicago house producers with such a frantic work rate that only about 15% of his output ever makes an impact over here. Suddenly, out of nowhere, a track from his album gets picked up by the likes of Cox and Jules, the majors are in like Flynn and now he's almost certainly Top 40 bound. Essentially, all 'Get Get Down' does is have some bloke singing Down, down, down' over the catchiest housey piano groove since Morales' 'Needin' U', but it's set to snare an entire nation in its relentlessly cheery grasp. A monster, with a fairy tale behind it too.

***** Sasha: "This is amazingly bad. It's your Single Of The Month? You're mad! I can't believe this was the subject of a bidding war – good job I don't work at a record label, eh? I don't like the production. I mean it's cool because it sounds like an old skool house record mixed about four years ago, but it just sounds

like a novelty record to me."

Basement Jaxx Rendez-Vu XI

YOU might just know this track! Another anthem in waiting from the boys behind the album of the year, the main reason for getting this is the infamous 'bootleg' cut-up of 'Rendez-Vu' into the old disco classic 'I Believe In Miracles' on the flip, which tore up our 50th birthday at Bedrock. Oh, and bonus cut 'All U Crazies' is lost-it punk garage in a hair-raising way. Essential.

**** Sasha: "The heavyweights. Their production is just superb. I mean, it's not music I play out very often, but they make this incredibly beautiful soulful music. I missed them DJing in Miami, sadly. I was gutted I missed their parties in London too."

Quake Mantra (Forever) Essential

GUARANTEED to give you flashbacks and get you doing the big-fish-little-fish if you've seen Human Traffic (all three tracks here feature in the film), 'Mantra' is the big one, having already featured on the Gatecrasher compilation. Produced by Sundissential North resident Rob Tissera and Dream Frequency bod lan Bland, if you're after a bit of Paul Johnson-style novelty pianotastic house, head for 'Push It' instead.

Sasha: "Phew, I'm not too sure about this. It'll probably be a huge record, but it's the kind of trance I stay away from. I'm more into the deeper stuff. Ian from Quake used to be in Dream Frequency and I used to play gigs with him all the time. I know Rob Tissera too – I was at that warehouse party he did when it got busted, though just as a punter. I remember them playing Candyflip's 'Strawberry Fields Forever' as the police dogs burst in. It got really heavy, some girl in a wheelchair even got kicked over."

Mauro Picotto Pulsar

Nukleuz

APPARENTLY opening Tall Paul's sets at the moment, the 'Lizard' man returns with another dark and cavernous slice of harder-edged pumping house that makes up for its lack of inventiveness with a pristine production that makes it a dancefloor certainty. ***

Sasha: "This is horrible. Why are you playing me all these shit records? It's formulaic trance music. I'm just not into that whole production and pace. It's not that it's too fast, it's just so intense and there's so much going on. There are build-ups and drops, but they're so over the top, it's like taking a sledgehammer to crack open an egg."

Sasha: "I love the DJ Q remix – brilliant sounds, really raw and dirty. It's kind of driving. I prefer it to the original mix. I should check some of his stuff out – it's



the kind of tripped-out stuff we play at Twilo, trying to steer away from some of that new trance stuff to find records that just really work on that sound system. We play a lot of deeper stuff out there that we wouldn't play over here. I like the Dave Angel mix here too. That's the best Ken Ishii record for ages."

Frankie Knuckles Presents Satoshi Tomile Tears (Remixes)

Essential

ONE of the all-time Eighties house greats gets a rather unnecessary remix from Full Intention. Okay, they treat it with a certain amount of reverence, even slowing down to keep in time with the original, but the most



useful thing about this package (unless you don't have the original) is the acappella.

Sasha: "They've updated the original but kept all the original sounds. It's really impossible to remix an old record like this. For my sins, I remixed Orbital's 'Belfast' and it was the most impossible thing I've ever done. It took me about a month, I never thought I'd be able to deliver it. I tried to do what they've done here, which is to keep all the original sounds, and update it, but it just doesn't work, because they're both classic records. But to do a mix and take it in another direction with new music is almost completely pointless. These old songs should really be left alone." ★★ (the original) ★★ (the remix)

The Morrighan Remember (To The Millenium) Serious

EVER wondered what would happen if you took Clannad or the Riverdance troupe down Gatecrasher and pumped them full of Euro-house? This, produced by the chap behind Crescendo, might just be the result. Great if you like Oirish trance and violin action. Remixes come from Lange, Snowflake and Huggy.

Sasha: "According to the press release, I've been giving this 'heavy support'. [Listens] Dear me. I did get given this – the Snowcrash mix is one of the first things Lee Burridge has done I should be diplomatic, but he's actually done some things since then which I have been playing out. I'm not really into the original or remixes here. Lange again is that sort of rough energetic end of trance I just find really cheesy." *** (Snowcrash mix) * (others)

But here in the London office we've concentrated on artist based projects over our three year history, shifting the emphasis from techno to US

Which artists have you released records by?

based house and garage.

Most recently New York's Kings Of Tomorrow and Detroit's Alton Miller, but also Larry Heard, Gemini, Chez Damier, Kevin Yost, Romanthony and USG (Ron Trent and Anthony Nicholson).

What's been your most successful release?

'One Starry Night', the debut album from the jazz house maestro Kevin Yost, licensed for Europe from New York's i! Records. It's unusual for us to license an album but with sales of over 15,000, we're pleased we did.

What's inspiring you at the moment?

The deep, percussive Afro-influenced sound of US labels such as Prescription, Clairaudience and Spiritual Life. It's also inspiring to see the success of house tracks such as 'What U Need' by Powerhouse and Pete Heller's 'Big Love'.

What makes Distance different? The underlying A&R policy is real house with

a soulful flavour, but that encompasses

more competition in trying to sign this thumping disco groove from Henry Street. Hopefully these killer new mixes from Mutiny UK and the Rhythm Masters will have the likes of Multiply sending their A&Rs to some decent discos and put some fat cash towards a label that richly deserves it. (KM) ***

Yes and no. This lot are a 1999 version - a north London collective whose tunes are hogging the decks of every major drum & bass player at the moment. Grooverider's just signed them up for a single on his Prototype label called 'The Pulse' and Ed Rush & Optical have just nabbed a 12-inch for Virus too. But the string of releases planned for their eponymous label is kicking up impressive amounts of dancefloor dust too.

So what's this lot's history?

When Jason Maldini and Darren White (formerly Future Forces Inc) and Dan Stein aka Absolute Zero decided to quit Renegade Hardware last year, they roped in erstwhile Japanese rave promoter Micky Woijicki and set up Bad Company Recordings. "This way we'll have total control, " says Darren.

What's the music like?

Germ warfare drum & bass. "We've all come from this rave hardcore philosophy," reckons Dan, "and the energy of that music has been missing in drum & bass recently." They reckon it's time for drum & bass to stop courting the mainstream and concentrate on moving dancefloors.

No relation to Seventies rockers then?

It's the name of a 2000AD comic strip. "It was about a group of soldiers on a mission that never ends," says Jason. Dan concludes: "That just about sums us up, really." words Ben Willmott

So he's an awkward bugger?

No, he just plays by his own rules. Tracks like "Voyager 1.56" on Manifesto (with the fastest ever breakdown at 1040bpm), Anon's 'Let's Skate' and his bootleg UXB remix of The Bucketheads are all in-yer-face floorfillers. But he also makes crazy shit like 'Blaxxtraxx Volume 3' and 'Profondo Rosso'. " I want people to think 'What is thaaaat and why don't I know it already?' when they hear my tunes. I'm after individuality and originality."

What makes Spring's records so special?

His modular synth for a start. "It takes up 30 rack units. I'm making some sounds that even I have never heard before." He's also prolific, having released over 200 tracks since 1933 on labels like Red, DT, Vale and Manifesto, and he's remixed Kathy Brown, Josh Wink, Pat Metheny, Mary Kiani and Armand Van Helden to name but a few.

So how come I've never heard of him? He doesn't like publicity, for one. And he's also been recovering from major surgery. "I'm only doing mixes for mates at present, but by August or September I should be back up to my stupidly hyperactive output of three tracks a week," he says. Can't wait.

For the most part I'd say fairly straight up UK hip hop. With all the different releases I'm just trying to cover all the styles you can get within UK hip hop. From fairly lyrical stuff to straight up jam tunes and everything in between.

Which artists have you released records by?

Quakes, Lost Island, UK Kartel, Mad Doctor X. Def Tex, Huntkillbury Finn,

What's been your most successful release?

The Lost Island twelves have probably sold the most cumulatively and the quickest selling has been the Def Tex 12-inch which is still selling. Critically it's been the 'Neptune' single by Quakes, but critical acclaim and sales seem to have very little relation to each other

What makes Son different?

It's a fairly open musical policy. It's all British but it's the whole spectrum and I don't really think there's a lot of people doing that. Other labels have got a specific

'Rock' by DJ SPINNA is brilliant old school block party hip hop. It's an obvious choice but a brilliant record. AFRIKA BAMBAATAA & WESTBAM's 'Agharta: The City Of Shabala' (Low Spirit) has got a lot of Fatboy Slim/'Brimful Of Asha' overtones and a ploddy reggae bassline and rock guitar line that are very Norman Cook, but it rocks. It's a bit cheesy, but it's cool. The FRESKA ALL-STARS' 'Get Fresh' is the usual Freskanova groove with loads of hip hop samples thrown all over it. Its break is stolen from Norman Cook: it's a revenge sample since Norman stole one of theirs for 'Right Here, Right Now', allegedly.

Various Artists Tech-House Phenomena 2 Sampler Eukahouse

A two track vinyl sampler featuring two of the highlights from Nathan Coles' recent 'Tech House Phenomena 2' CD. On one side it's that man Pure Science again with an unbeatably driving, rock solid tribal groover, while on the other Coles and Matthew B get into funky breakbeat mode as the Mash Up Headz. (DM)

E Troneek Funk Everytime Fast Forward, France

Geushky Portsmouth's best answer to a night out gets jggy wit it as Geushky deck helmsman lan Void cranks it up like Stakker Humanoid with a hangover on the label's first outing. The flip 'According' rumbles like a grizzly with PMT. Beyer and co look out! (SJ)

Remote The Swarm Underground Resistance

Leading in with teasing guitar licks, 'The Swarm' circles into a frenzy of bass-stinging funk pinned down by fat, analogue blobs of honey-coated machine 'Mad'-ness while 'Protecting My Hive' buzzes about like George Clinton nutting the window in a novelty insect outfit. Different, smart and a real killer 'B'. **(SJ)**

Producer Profile

The eccentric **GRAIN** talks about wires, ear flutes and classical music

How would you describe your sound? I wouldn't have a clue. I don't really like terms and pigeonholes. Some people call my stuff tech-house, which I'm quite unhappy about because that stuff gets right up my nose. Twiddly nonsense.

You use a lot of loops, is that an integral part of your sound?

They may sound like loops but they're not, they're tiny little snatches of samples. 90% of it is stuff I've made myself.

What were your first and most recent productions?

Grain 001 was the first. Grain 003 is the latest.

Have you done much engineering for other producers?

Yeah, quite a bit. The most famous person I've engineered for is a classical composer called Burt Banks. Recently I've been doing a lot of speed garage. I've engineered folk stuff and country & western as well. I had a 14-piece band in my studio last week and it's only an 8'x12' room.

What's influencing you at the moment?

I'm very influenced by Steve Bicknell and the sound of Lost, so when I do the Grain stuff I usually think about that. I'm heavily into wires at the moment as well. I'm working with this professor from Brighton University and we're making new types of wires.

Who have you most enjoyed working with?

An ear flautist called Niko from Thailand who's on the first Grain record. He closes his nose with his thumb and his finger, shuts his mouth and blows pressure out of his ear into this little flute. It's a strange sound, man.

Who would you most like to work with?

Tony Bennet. No, Dean Martin. No, Istoa Tsmirtoai. He's a Japanese classical composer.

Nitegrooves, USA Previously only available as a limited bootleg, Masters At Work have performed the mixes which slip between the world of house and acid jazz, driven by a powerful breakbeat, fretless bass by Gene Perez and to top it all India on vocal duties. Sounds like an essential 'Jazz In The House' contender. (SH)

Deborah Cox It's Over Now Arista, USA

Arista, USA

Hex Hector of all people comes correct with this firing remix for the r&b starlet. He takes a chunk of Harold Melvin & The Blue Notes' Bad Luck' and weaves it around the vocals so well. This sounds heavily influenced by KCC's bootleg remix of Whitney Houston's 'It's Not Right...' and should lead to Mr Hector being inundated with tons of remix offers. (SH)

Platinum Doll Featuring PY Anderson Believe In A Brighter Day Sub-Urban, USA

Huge buzz on this after Miami and rightly so. Great song and vocal performance with additional production by Tommy Musto, who's definitely on form. Matthias Heilbronn also provides some impressive mixes but no matter which mix you go for, this classy double pack won't disappoint. **(SH)**

Extortion How Do You See Me Now 7

This early Nineties Easy Street classic has been revived by Dave Lee aka Joey Negro. His mix is rather faithful to the original but is suited to today's dancefloors. Bini & Martini create a more commercial, energetic mix but it's the Negro man's mix that does it. **(SH)**



DJ Spen Presents Jasper Street Co God Helps Those (Who Help Themselves) Basement Boys, USA

DJ Spen is joined by Teddy Douglas on this heavy gospel number which is done so well by the Jasper Street Co. Not as impressive as their previous hits but a refleshing alternative to most garage plodders. Full-on preaching and hand clapping is the vibe, so beware the spirit doesn't take you while playing it! (SH)

DJ Spen Disco Dreams Volume 2 Black Vinyl

Spen shows his tracky side on this consistent three-tracker. 'Craze At Midnight' is a minimal, tuffer-edged disco groove with a zany Patrick Adams-type analogue synth solo. Flip over and you'll find 'Da Changez', a soulful, DJfriendly groove, and 'Back When', with an infectious disco/boogie loop and snippets of female vocals. Good stuff! **(SH)**

Kerri Chandler Digital Soul

The first legal dance radio station is due to come on air in Dublin in the autumn (with Storm FM tipped to scoop the licence), and on September 18th Ireland should have its first open-air dance festival. Archaic planning permission laws block most open-air music events, but the organisers of Homelands Ireland got around the problem by booking the Mosney Holiday Centre just outside Dublin. The capacity is 20,000 and it will run from 1pm until 2am the following morning. The line-up will be similar to that of Homelands UK, with homeboys like Johnny Moy and Billy Scurry thrown in for good measure. As host of one of the six arenas, national pop station 2FM (which recently extended its weekend dance coverage from four hours to fourteen) will also broadcast much of the event live. See you there. Buried Treasure The one that got away

STEVIE WONDER SONGS IN THE KEY OF LIFE (MOTOWN, 1976)





TEVIE Wonder has influenced almost every soul singer of note. Of all his releases, it's the double album 'Songs...' that best reflects his global influence on contemporary soul, jazz funk, rap and pop. Not just because George Michael, Mary J Blige. Blackstreet, Coolio, Will Smith and Donnell Jones have covered some of its tracks, but because Wonder's confessions and opinions inspire others to relay their own.

Lauryn Hill is the clearest beneficiary of this approach. 'Isn't She Lovely', Wonder's celebration of his new born daughter, morphs into Hill's intimate paean to her son, 'To Zion' while his childhood reminiscence 'I Wish' finds a new home on Hill's 'Every Ghetto, Every City'. D'Angelo, whose instrumental proficiency and awe of love as an entity rivals Wonder's, was moved enough to share its impact on his highly respected debut, 'Brown Sugar'. The pleading, conceptualised angle of Wonder's 'Love's In Need Of Love Today' must also have encouraged Maxwell, creator of r&b's first decent concept album in years, 'Urban Hang Suite'. Wonder's narration of innercity decay ('Village Ghetto Land') is updated on Erykah Badu's 'Outside The Game'; Jamiroquai's Jay Kay undoubtedly has 'Contusion' coursing through his veins and encourages his band to reach for similar heights.

'Songs...' speaks to the adult mind, politically, racially and emotionally. It shows how shockingly talented Wonder is, especially at merging and separating live instrumentation and electronic wizardry. Most tellingly though, it stands the test of time 23 years after it was recorded.

The Record Buyer's Guide To:

Classic Weatherall Mixes (1990-1992)

words JOHN TYRELL

ITH most house producers claiming to have grown up listening to Salsoul and disco in the womb, it was hardly surprising that Andy Weatherall's mixes were a bit different from the norm. With a pre-house music background misspent listening to industrial, punk and the dub noise of Adrian Sherwood, his 1989 mix of Deep Joy's 'Fall' sounded more like Pigbag or Maximum Joy than an Italian piano stormer. By the time he remixed Primal Scream's 'Loaded' he was charming both ravers and indie shoegazers.

1990 was a vintage year for Balearic chuggers, as documented by Channel 4's 'A Short Film About Chilling', shot in Ibiza that summer and featuring Terry Farley, Orde Miekle, A Man Called Adam and Rocky. The soundtrack included no less than four Weatherall productions. One gem was the seven-inch mix of the Farley/Heller/Weatherall supergroup Bocca Juniors' 'Raise' which unlike the 12-inch kicks in hard from the intro. Also in the film were St Etienne's 'Only Love Can Break Your Heart' (A Mix Of Two Halves), his inspirational remix of My Bloody Valentine's 'Soon' and his lump-in-the-throat version of Primal Scream's 'Come Together'. Other Weatherall prize-winners of 1990 were Happy Mondays' 'Halleluiah' (with Oakey), 'Psyche Out' by Meat Beat Manifesto, The Grid's 'Floatation', Jah Wobble's bass monster 'Bomba', James' 'Come Home', England/New Order's 'World In Motion' (with Farley) and Sly & Lovechild's 'The World According To...', an early release on Jeff Barrett's Heavenly label.

The gravy train sped on into 1991 with three mixes of Love Corporation's 'Give Me Some Love' with its raucous tubular bell hook line, featured on the Chemical Brothers' recent mix album. Another notch in his bedpost was Finitribe's '101' which boasted the sound of a cash register in place of drum fills. This was also the year that he peaked, creating the comedown classic Screamadelica' with Primal Scream. The album instantly eclipsed his previous work and his Scat Mix of 'Don't Fight It Feel It' became ubiquitous in clubland. The rest of the year saw him go to work on S'Express, Bumble, The Orb and A Man Called Adam and carve a real spine-tingler out of Jah Wobble's 'Visions Of You'.

Then in 1992 he got all bad-assed on Galliano's 'Skunk Funk', kicking acid jazz right in the nuts with the mother of all dub basslines. The covetable highlight of 1992 has to be 'Weatherall's Weekender', the vari-speed opus with Flowered Up which still sets pulses racing today. Dream ticket of the year goes to One Dove's sunrise classic 'Fallen', which led him to produce a further three singles for the band as well as their debut album.

Weatherall also mixed a good few tracks which fell by the wayside even then. Weatherall & Farley's mix of 'Abandon' by That Petrol Emotion, Deep Joy's 'Fall', Word Of Mouth Featuring Linda Love's 'What It Is', 'Imperfect List' by Big Hard Excellent Fish and Moody Boys' 'Centre Of The World' either didn't quite capture the imaginations of the Weatherall-hungry or else were on major labels, resulting in no shortage of copies.

Other oddities include an early Weatherall mix of West India Company's 'O Je Suis Seul' and his remix of 'The Drum' by The Impossibles, which are both difficult to lay your hands on. And you can't beat a good promo double pack for sheer desirability. Much fuss was made over the promos of Espiritu's 'Conquistador' and Stereo MCs' 'Everything', which both contained mixes never commercially released. The future held hard techno, breakbeats and ska with Sabres Of Paradise and the electro dub of Two Lone Swordsmen. But in those two short years, anything was possible.

The last Freddy Fresh EP. I bought about 20 and sold two. Which is a shame, because I like his stuff. We hear you do a bit of production

EQ takes to the wheels of steel this month with a DJ special. Come and sweat it out at a

DJ mixing school,

then pick up the pearls of wisdom cast by top DJs from both sides of the Atlantic

technology



The boy from Brazil looks uncertain. "You really expect me to be able to do this?" he asks as he hovers nervously in front of the decks. "Go on Pedro. Just imagine you're Carl Cox," suggests Phil Benedictus, our DJ tutor for the afternoon. It's a slightly tall order, given that you could probably fit four or five skinny Pedros inside the hulking frame of Monsieur Cox.

Still, he does it all the same. The records start spinning, Pedro starts tweaking the pitch controller and eventually, amazingly, the two unwilling bits of vinyl begin to sit comfortably in the mix.

We're at Point Blank studios in Greenwich. While waves lap idly against the shore outside, a group of would-be Sashas and Digweeds is sweating away inside.

Some, like Pedro, had never touched a pair of decks in their lives before this morning. Others are bedroom DJs who've beavered away behind closed doors and now want to take things further.

Phil's tutelage offers the complete guide to DJing, from absolute basics like getting records in time to CD mixing and studio work, all spread over two eight hour days.

But before anything else, Phil shows the students how tracks are structured in blocks of sound using Cubase technology.

Then it's on to the decks to learn about dropping in beats. Child's play, you'd have thought. But no, we look at the individual beat patterns and analyse the phrases for the best place to drop the second record. Phew, we never realised



it was all this complex.

"I know," agrees Rob Cowan, who owns the studio and wrote the course with Phil. "It wasn't until we sat down and started writing it that we realised what a big subject it is." Now the courses are even college-accredited; quite right too – as Phil points out, you can get free guitar lessons in every state school in the country but DJing classes

are few and far between, even though Technics now outsell guitars in the UK. But is the art of the DJ one that can really be taught? Isn't locking yourself away in your bedroom for weeks on end the only way to learn the skills to pay the bills?

"Of course, there's no substitute for practise," Phil agrees. "The DJ who teaches our scratch course does things with two decks that leave you absolutely slack jawed, but still practises three hours a day to take it on to the next level."

The main point of the course, he says, is to give students all the technical information they need to become a great DJ. But there are also pointers on navigating the unscrupulous jungle that is the music business itself.

Not to mention the priceless nuggets of unofficial advice that slip out here and there. Probably the best of which comes as our friend Pedro attempts – and subsequently becomes messily entangled in – another difficult mix.

"Just remember the golden rule," relates Phil. "If anything goes wrong, punch the air and pretend it's deliberate. Look like you know what you're doing, even if you don't." Sound advice for life and DJing alike, it doesn't come any better than this.

Point Blank is staging informal mixing courses in Ibiza, every evening at Bar El Divino (next to Café Del Mar) from 5pm-8pm until the end of September. Celebrity DJs are also expected to join the workshops. The Point Blank Collective, including DJs, MIDI technicians and scratch jocks who all teach courses at the studio, play every Saturday night at the Sak Bar, 49 Greek Street, London W1 "Right. By the end of this lesson, you'll be able to mix seamlessly between Squarepusher and Vengaboys using only your eyelids"

Celebrity DJ Tips

"It's a long time since I've pulled any DJ tricks. The days of flying windmills and scratching with my head are long gone! But the best advice I can give is, wherever possible, stay away from the middle of the pitch control. You can get into all kinds of trouble around that centre indentation. I don't know why but when you're trying to mix around there, the speed of the record seems to get really fucked up. No matter how hard you try, the two records will not go together. So just speed up the record that's already playing until you're clear of it. The thing lused to do when l started out was to pitch the records up pretty high. Some people say it's easier to mix them like that, but I'm not sure. What I do know is it makes everything sound that little bit clearer and punchier. There you go - I've taught you everything I know in three minutes!"

"My favourite trick is to take two copies of the same record and effectively remix the track. Quite often I'll find a record I want to play, but the second verse is a bit weak, so I just play the first verse again. And it means you can draw out a good track and make it twice as long, too."



"I only have one favourite DJ trick. It's called The Crab and it involves taking two copies of the same record – the first time I saw it was with LL Cool J's 'Rock The Bells' – and mixing between them, only with the DJ using his back to move the fader. You have start facing away from the decks and bend over backwards as far as you can reach to do it. It all depends on the size of the DJ – if he weighs 200 pounds he's going to find it pretty hard. So the skinnier you are the faster you can mix! I can't do it, but one of the other X-ecutioners, Roc Raider, is an expert. He can mix faster like that than some DJs can standing up straight. Give him five seconds and he'll have done five tricks."

My Favourite Gadget



"ILOVE a lot of old analogue synths but this is definitely my favourite. I like it so much I named my album 'Kiss My Arp' in honour of it! It's not actually mine though, it belongs to David Morley, who produces my music in his studio in Germany. He's actually got two of them, the lucky bastard! I've no idea how much you'd have to pay to get one now, but I remember David telling me that when they first came out in the Seventies they cost the price of a house. People have cottoned on to analogue synths in recent years, so you'd still have to pay quite a lot to get your hands on one. You make your own sounds up rather than just running through a load of preset noises. You know

you're getting sounds out of it that no one else has ever heard before. There are loads of knobs to play with – lots of oscillators and LFOs. Usually I take a quick polaroid of all the settings so I know I'll be able to get it again. People say analogue synths are unreliable and that they go out of tune, but once it's warmed for 10 minutes or so you never get any problems. Kick drums are the best thing to do on them – a lot of the really heavy, clanky kick drums on my records are from the Arp."

We started doing a live version of it as an encore, like the version of 'Tomorrow Never Knows' we used to do, just messing around with the samples pretty much off the top of our heads. We started putting things on top and it gradually developed into something else altogether, so we cut an acetate and started DJing that out and eventually it became 'Hey Boy Hey Girl'. We always like to put information about samples on our record sleeves – I think it's pretty important, actually. I got into so much great funk and stuff through listening to Public Enemy and tracing the music back to where they sampled it from. Plus, it's nice to think of someone like them or Blake Baxter, who we've sampled before (on 'Brothers Gonna Work It Out'), getting this nice big cheque through the post every now and then. They deserve it."

magnificent ESP club in Portugal earlier this year. In fact, it was in a bar (the appropriately-named Bedlam in south London) that Muzik editor Ben Turner first heard Spectrum - so impressed was he that he gave Spectrum a card and implored him to send in a tape. And the tape measured up to our expectations, a collection of boshing house and uplifting, peak time trance gear. Spectrum is also a DJ who believes in the music he's playing, unwilling to compromise for the sake of an easy buck. "I don't necessarily play what's hip and trendy," Spectrum says. "I've turned down gigs at techno clubs because there's no point in playing music that I don't like."

Favourite DJs? Skol, Drew and Roosta from Sunnyside Up and, rather bizarrely, Jeremy Healy: "I've got a lot of respect for the way he mixes things around and changes the styles in his sets.

Favourite labels? Additive, Hooj Choons, Tinrib and Tec. Favourite clubs? Rude Not To, Sunnyside Up and Fever-"Because they've all got that intimate underground vibe"

He utilises both fluid mixing and a more choppy style when necessary (always a good sign) and keeps the energy levels peaking throughout the 90 minutes. With this sort of music it would be very easy for interest to wane after a while but this mix kept us engrossed throughout - and even kept us awake during a few night shifts on the mag! It's very much the sound of the moment - boshing Mitsubishi trance and all that - so we expect the likes of Sunnyside Up, Gatecrasher, Slinky and the rest to wake up to the talents of DJ Spectrum this very instant. You know the number.

"BACK in the Eighties I was into your typical hip hop thing-breakdancing, BMXing, bad clothes and so on. It was 'Crucial Electro Volume 2' that got me into DJing-I wondered why there was no gap between records and it suddenly clicked. I started to make pause button mixes on my cassette recorder using three fixedspeed record decks. It used to take me hours to find two records that were the same tempo! There were only two people in Stockport who weren't into shiny pop music-one other bloke into house and then there was me. So I was more or less in complete isolation. But that was good in a way because when I got my first DJing gigs, I progressed really quickly. I wasn't one of those 'I'm really good, here's my tape' DJs-I'd feel cheeky if I said that. I always got gigs through recommendation. The most important thing is there's no point in copying what other people do-you have to be yourself and just play good records. Don't get stuck on the whole mixing/tempo thing. Tempo can be a very dynamic force you can build things up by slowing things down and dropping in a massive
