WHO SHOT TIM

HE Lambeth Country Show at Brockwell Park on July 18th was the kind of chaotic but

cheerful urban gathering which, when the sun is shining, no city does better than London. Although there were reports of some trouble in the crowd when Tim Westwood played on the Radio 1 stage, most recall a slamming mix of hip hop and a vast range of south Londoners – black and white, young and old – enjoying the day.

At around 8.15pm, accompanied by his assistant Ross Newman and four other staff from his Justice Productions company, Westwood climbed into his Range Rover and headed for home in Fulham. At 8.40pm, they stopped at traffic lights on Kennington Park Road. Two men pulled up alongside them on a powerful motorbike and the pillion rider opened fire.

The owner of a nearby shop explained: "I saw two guys on a bike. One of them was waving a gun and then, a couple of seconds later, there were two bangs."

As just two bullets were fired, it's presumed the weapon was a 9mm handgun, not an automatic weapon. The hitmen, who it's thought had followed Westwood from the festival site, left the scene straight away, speeding north towards the Elephant & Castle.

"Everyone was calm, even the people who were injured," added the shopkeeper. "I think they knew when they got pulled over by the motorbike what was going to happen. Westwood was shot in the arm; Newman in the leg. The car's other occupants received minor injuries from flying glass. The shopkeeper called an ambulance and all the casualties were admitted to St Thomas' Hospital in Waterloo within 20 minutes Westwood, in a stable condition, was immediately placed under armed guard.

The next day, he underwent an operation to clean the points where the bullet entered and left his arm. Speaking from his hospital bed, he said: "I thank God I'm alive and that everyone has survived. Everybody at the hospital has been great and I feel fine." Westwood was released from Who really is the Radio 1 DJ who controls British hip hop? And why would anyone want him dead?

Notting Hill Carnival, it seems Westwood has left behind the criticisms surrounding his accent. But KRS-One launches into a long-winded tirade against Westwood live on air, accusing him – as far as we could work out – of playing the wrong kind of hip hop. 1998: Cult TV personality Ali G emerges, his act apparently based on Westwood. The Radio 1 DJ continues unperturbed, launching a club at north London's Temple venue which draws in crowd of 3,500 and guests like Busta Rhymes and Jay-Z. 1999: Westwood's Radio 1 slot goes from strength to strength, featuring regular New York hook-ups with Funkmaster Flex and Marley Marl.











hospital on July 20th. Police refused to comment on whether the DJ would still be under armed guard, or whether they were connecting the crime to the spate of shootings in London, but said: "We are particularly keen to hear from motorists in the area at the time who saw a motorcycle being driven erratically and at high speed. The men were wearing brightly coloured crash helmets".

A spokeswoman for Radio 1 said everybody at the station was horrified by the attack.

"We're just delighted that he's out of hospital. We want him to get well and come back." Westwood's power in the rap business was illustrated when Puff Daddy, who guested on his show two days before the attack, was among the first to ring the DJ and check on his well-being. The media heard about the shooting on Monday morning and the rumours began...

Who did it?

Tim Westwood wasn't the only person shot in London on July 18th. A 34-year-old man was killed in Blackheath, while a teenager was injured close to the scene of the Westwood incident. Having dismissed the theory that, following the murder of Jill Dando, the driveby was part of a vendetta against the BBC, the tabloids were quick to link it with the recent outbreaks of gun violence blamed on the Jamaican drug gangs, the Yardies (gangs who, in fact, have never been associated with rap music).

The Evening Standard said the police were "investigating the dark side of hip hop. Implying that Westwood knew trouble was brewing, The Sun claimed he had recently turned his flat into a "fortress" putting a metal grille over the front door and prison-style bars on the windows. Even the BBC got in on the act: the Nine O'Clock news ran archive footage of Westwood on pirate radio, of him announcing over the microphone: "The militant selection. Fire at will, shoot to kill."

The unassuming, publicityshy white guy who'd defied the odds to become the nation's biggest hip hop star was suddenly receiving more attention than he'd ever desired, and for all the wrong reasons.

What's known for certain is that Tim Westwood and his girlfriend were assaulted last summer at a club night he was hosting at the Streatham Megabowl. That crime was blamed on a protection racket demanding money from him. Andy Balfour, the chief suspect in that attack was shot dead in Brocklev last April.

Like many major players, Westwood has his fair share of enemies. "He doesn't communicate with people on the street," complained one British rapper. "Whenever you see him, he's surrounded by security and if you approach him they just tell you to fuck

"I don't believe this is directly connected to him being a hip hop DJ. There isn't a gun problem in British hip hop. There are other scenes in London where there's traditionally been a gun problem and we all know what they are, but it's never been an issue in hip hop." Will Ashon, Muzik's hip hop correspondent

"This has nothing to do with rap. It's a cop-out when people try to connect it with the music, like whoever shot him put on a

record and the record said, 'Okay, go shoot Tim Westwood'. As far as I know, he's one of the nicest cats in radio. I'm upset about the stupidity of all this. Tim is trying to uplift hip hop, trying to represent London all over the world, and I Just don't think he deserves this." **Puff Daddy**

"The sad thing is, the only time anyone wants to write about British hip hop is when someone gets shot. That's all I've got to say." **Mark B, British hip hop** producer



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off. He's not like house or garage or ragga DJs who want to stay in touch - he thinks only his opinion counts. He's the only guy in UK hip hop who has a good job. He's the only one who doesn't have to hustle."

Westwood has also courted controversy over what many see as his failure to support homegrown hip hop. "A lot of people were moaning down at Brockwell Park. Why? Because he wasn't playing any British tunes," said another hip hop insider. "He's just the man who makes sure the American artists can come over here and make more money, which is why Puff Daddy gets on the phone so quick and says he's a nice guy. All he does for British hip hop is the open mic slot on his shows and that's an insult. What's he saying? Boys here aren't good enough for nothing but an amateur talent competition." However, no one believes these gripes are behind the attack on Westwood. Charlie Parker,

producer of Brixton-based hip hop outfit 57th Dynasty, is one of the few who's willing to air a theory in public. "People were shocked when

the news came through, but people weren't that surprised. It's probably to do with business and drugs, same as with Tupac and Biggie. You see, you get drugs men who've made 60 grand upwards and now they want to invest it in something more legitimate like promotion. So they approach Westwood, because he's the man you need to speak to and they say, 'Come on, get me Busta', or whoever."

Other people Muzik spoke to support this theory, saying Westwood was fighting to keep drug dealers out of UK hip hop.

Some feel he was an unknowing target chosen by one faction who wished to prove to another that they mean business. The fact that Westwood and Newman were shot at such close range, but not killed, perhaps suggests that the gunman wanted to injure rather than murder them. And of course, there's always the possibility it was a case of mistaken identity.

"Whatever it was about we don't want it to happen again,' said Charlie Parker. "London's a fucking madhouse at the moment, but no one in the hip hop business over here has ever played with guns and we can't let it happen now."

OME, the new London superclub promoted by ex-Cream man Darren Hughes, has announced more details of the venture. The most audacious club in London since the launch of Ministry Of Sound in 1991, Home is situated slap bang in the middle of Leicester Square - as revealed in last month's Muzik.

The club, which opens in mid-September, will be on seven levels. Two levels will form the main club venue, with a 1,200 capacity. Another floor is a 450capacity club, while another is a club-bar of similar size. The venue will also boast a retail and technology centre, a restaurant, and an exclusive members' bar

Claiming to be "the most cutting-edge club in the world", the outside of the club will feature a 60-foot digital screen broadcasting ISDN links, films and adverts out into Leicester Square.

"I've always had an incredible desire to put a smile into London," says Hughes, and that's what we're going to deliver. No one else in London can offer this across-the-board level of quality.

Home will also be the venue for Paul Oakenfold's first residency since he guit Cream last year. Oakey will be joined by Dave Ralph on Saturday nights, while Friday's residents include Danny Rampling and the Dope Smugglaz.

"Paul's the most professional and the biggest DJ in the world," commented Hughes, "and he cares as much about what he does as we do. I take people's fun very seriously, and so does Paul. See next month's Muzik for the

Ibiza's biggest record this summer is made by two Danish pissheads. Go figure

ELCOME to Aarhus, one of Denmark's most remote northern outposts. Folks round here like a drink. "What do people do in Aerhus?" asks Henrik Olsen, one half of Deep Dish-affiliated Danish deep housers Brother Brown. "They do a lot of beer." And Henrik and comrade Atla Thorberg are no exception. Witness Atla visibly cringing as he recalls their recent meeting with Deep Dish, when the Washington duo played Roskilde festival. The pair arrived on site at midday and immediately embarked on an extensive session of thirst-quenching. Deep Dish turned up seven intoxicated hours later.

"We'd only ever spoken to them on the phone," he remembers hazily. "We found out afterwards they thought we were going to be two black guys, God knows what they thought when these two drunken Danes jumped on them!"

Thankfully for us, Atla and Henrik manage to prise themselves away from the bar long enough to make beauteous deep house for the Dish's Yoshitoshi imprint and now, Pete Tong's ffrr label. The spooked out refrain and glittering Spanish guitars of their new

single 'Undor The Water' may well have lodged themselves into your psycho already. It's the perfect sound of Ibiza at sunrise, and seems a dortein candidate for grown-up chart action. Featuring another Aarhus resident, vocalist Marie Frank aka Frank'ee, it's the kind of euphoric sun-kissed stormer Björk would kill to make./

Marie Frank proceeds to tell us that 'Under The Water' is about a drowning woman who ends up living underwater.

"After a while she gets to quite like it," she explains. "She sees the mermaids' tails and she wants to have one herself."

Er, right. So it only makes sense that the video will see Atla and Henrik as angels of death attempting to ensnare Marie. "The directors

wanted to put me in a swimsuit," she laughs. "I put a stop to that pretty quickly." Somehow, though, you can sense this is one record that

won't need cheap wank tricks to fly off the shelves. The Brothership has landed. (BW)

IRST up this month was the launch party for my new album at the Che restaurant in London. They'd concocted these Phuture 2000 cocktails, which were the same colour as the album sleeve. I've got no idea what was in them, but everyone got really pissed.

Glastonbury was brilliant this year. I played in the Virgin Tea Party Tent, which



is a weird chill out dome done out a bit like A Clockwork Orange. And it was beamed live to all the Virgin Megastores around the country. Praga Khan were playing too, though frankly, I've got no idea why. They haven't changed a note in 10 years. Terrible. The End's dance tent was one of the most amazing parties I've ever done. Maybe because that kind of thing is where my roots are. I was supposed to get a helicopter to play Outer Limits in Bournemouth that night, but unfortunately it couldn't take off because of low cloud pressure. So I had to cancel the

gig. Sorry to everyone who missed me. The next day, I flew out to Ibiza to play at Home at Space on the opening night. I played the inside room after they'd closed the terrace and it was incredible. For the first time, Space rocked really really hard at night. The next day, we met up with Brandon Block,

F we told you that Slum Village is a new hip hop act with a distinct r&b tinge, you'd probably think, "Great! Another one!" and turn the page. If we said that the were the new A Tribe Called Quest,

were the new A Tribe Called Quest, you'd probably harrumph, and think, "How many times are we gonna hear THAT?". But if we played you their album, 'Fantastic Vol II', well, then you'd understand. The Detroit-based hip hop trib have knocked the recent efforts of Tribe, Pete Bock and ever The Roots into a cocked hat, effortlessly switching between head crunching hard on The Roots into a cocked hat, effortlessly switching between head-crunching hardcore and mellifluous jazz-hop, and displaying a sense of mischief not seen since the first Pharcyde album (who, like A Tribe Called Ouest, have benefited from the production skills of Slum Village's Jay Deel. Even if coming from the city famed for Motown and Derrick May hasn't exactly helped them in the hip hop respect stakes. "It's hard for a Detroit act to even get close," says Baatin. "Any act not from the two coasts, they don't really want to hear you. We had to use our friends, people like D'Angelo, Q-Tip and Common, to get our foot in the door. And now you've got [fellow Detroit-resident] Eminem."

"He's not really our style, but then Detroit doesn't have a style," adds T3. "Detroit has a bunch of sounds and styles mixed in. We could have easily said we were from

anywhere. But we're from Motown." Ah, the 'M' word. There are points on the album where the boys suddenly break into incredibly sweet. harmonies. Do they see themselves as continuing their home city's musical heritage? "We like to sing," smiles T3. "We're not just rappers. In

We like to sing, smiles 13. We re horjust rappers, in fact, we're not rappers, we play, we write..." "We're a three man band," adds Jay Dee. Slum Village folklore has it that the boys met back in 1989 because Jay Dee wanted to battle the other two. It never happened, but if it had... "I'd have got them," boats Jay Dee categorically. "I'd have got them with the stutter style."

"Oh, the stutter style? You'd have definitely got me with the stutter style," admits T3.

So there you have it: sweet soul, cheeky vibes and the stutter style. (PM)

YPRUS has been building nicely on its garage and twostep reputation this summer. as established over the past couple of years by Twice As Nice and Pure Silk. The club scene has been enhanced further by the distinctly un-garage presence of Cream and Freedom as well the local Faces and Kool Klub (a somewhat surreal castle in the middle of one of the main streets).

The main drawback for the gurn massive is the difficulty in finding any chemicals. It's near impossible to get anything except the odd bit of spliff without packing your own stash and risking the infamously draconian Greek customs. Rumour has it that both Nigel Benn and Paul Bleasdale had every record in their boxes rigorously searched on arrival.

Even worse are the rather restrictive Greek licensing laws, which make for something of a rude shock when, after the odd Absolut and a few M-150s (like

Red Bull only stronger and even more like Calpol), the music gets turned down at 1 am and most of the bars close an hour later. By 1.30am the main square in the centre of Ayia Napa, usually a heaving mass of British, German and Scandinavian revellers, has emptied at an alarming rate. Bars do open later (legally till 2am with a few risking heavy fines to open beyond that) but as most clubs offer free entry before 1am there's little incentive to hang around in a music-free square. The same thing happens around 4.30am when all the clubs close and you're left very awake with nowhere to go but home - all a little frustrating and a little, well, like the UK. Not really the new Ibiza then, but what are the true alternatives? And with the funky house vibes of Paul Johnson's 'Get Get Down' floating across the main square, Eyes Cream's 'Fly Away' sliding over the Kool Klub's ramparts and a strawberry daiguiri close at hand Cyprus can still claim to be the next best thing.

History **Repeating**

ITH the crossover success of tracks like 'RIP Groove' and Rosie Gaines' 'Closer Than Close', it's obvious that speed garage (or the Sunday scene, or underground garage, or...) is now a genuinely fresh new direction. Clubs like Twice As Nice, Pure Silk, Cookies & Cream and A One Night Stand have nurtured a fully



independent scene of their own. Dreem Teem, however, get into a spot of bother on a flight to Tenerife, when they light up the old jazzy Woodbines... Fat Cat, London's leading techno store, closes its doors... Detroit techno recluses Drexciva announce they are to cease all recordings after the release of current album, 'The Quest'... Back To Basics closes temporarily after a dispute with the Pleasure Rooms... Northern rave organisation Rezerection goes into liquidation... Timothy McVeigh, the man responsible for the Oklahoma City bombing which killed 208 people, is sentenced to death by lethal injection... Anthems this month include a welter of tunes from the speed garage scene (including Tina Moore's 'Never Let You Go'), along with the summer monster, Ultra Nate's 'Free', Roni Size's 'Share The Fall' and 'Fly Life' by Basement Jaxx... The 333 Club opens in Hoxton to challenge the hegemony of the Blue Note in N1..



Elsewhere, rumours as to the future status of the Hacienda are once again circulating in clubland, after its licence is revoked by the police... News filters through that eccentric British producer William Orbit is working on Madonna's album... Mark Morrison is released from jail after serving a three month sentence for possession of an electric stun gun... A Reclaim The Streets march in Bristol is followed by a four-hour rave in the middle of a dual carriageway... More flying shenanigans: Keith Prodigy is ejected from a plane for alleged hi-jinks. "The cunts fly over me house every day. I'm thinking about getting on me roof with a flare," he remarks. (BB)

OTCHED drug deals, Las Vegas strip joints, police stake-outs, candy ravers tripping the light fantastic, tantric sex, surreal Christmas dinners, winter wonderland warehouse parties... Go is an unconventional dramatic comedy, charting the highs and lows of a bunch of chancers, users, losers and abusers whose lives collide in the Los Angeles underground club scene. In true Pulp Fiction style we get three separate but interlinked stories that weave a wobbly course through the southern California culturescape and flash into focus in a dodgy LA warehouse. For a mainstream film, the club scenes are pretty realistic, leaning towards the UV-heavy candy raver side of things (think Gatecrasher meets Bugged Out), with Leftfield providing the soundtrack highlights. Director Doug Liman (of Swingers fame) gets a great ensemble performance out of the cast although Desmond Askew's turn as carrot-topped Brit abroad Simon is a guaranteed crowd-pleaser.

There are some genuinely classic moments, in particular one poor chap getting spangled on some extra-strength pills and ending up cowering in a garbage bin for the night. The narrative is strong too, propelling the viewer along on an adrenalin and narcotic-fuelled ride rather than patronising us with a few dumb set-piece explosions and a bow-tie ending. Hollywood finally recognising the financial muscle of club kids? Go see. (KW)

As far from that as possible, actually. 29-year old Johnson hails from Chicago, has been knocking out underground house jack-tracks for years and has been much praised by everyone from Dave Clarke to Laurent Garnier to Robert Armani. If his back catalogue's anywhere near as funky as 'Get Get Down', I'd better get my bank manager on my side as soon as possible. Well, I'd hold your horses if I were you. "Shake shake that ass/Play my little game/Let me stick my dick in you/And make you call my name." I bet the women of Chicago loved that one! Apparently they did. "The girls love it, man," smiles tohnson. "I made a track called 'Bend Ov Bitch' and when it came on, all the girls would the around and bend over." Clearly Germaine Gre has no future in Chicago nightclubs. But since those beady mid-Nineties days, Johnson has refine this sound with a deeper, more sould feel. Histast two albums, on Peacetrog, sampled the lines of Stevie Wonder and The Islev Prothers. New that he's about to have a massive hit. are we going to be seeing a lot more of him in the nation's DJ booths?

Well, don't hold your breath. For starters, he's notoriously elusive. The video for 'Get Get Down had to be made without him because of his continuing absence without leave, What's

Where and when were you born? Birminghamin 1968

How did you start DJing?

I started DJing in Nottingham at the Hippo Club, which is now The Bomb. A friend asked me to help him and I played across the board from house to The Specials, It was crap.

Where do you buy your records?

In England I buy them from Arcade in Nottingham but as I'm in Ibiza all summer ljust get given loads here

Which record never leaves your box?

'Funky Train' by Norman Cook on Southern Fried. I don't know why, maybe it's stuck!

Do you find DJing helps you pull more?

Thad more luck with birds when I was a window cleaner. Thave to be wary because I can't tell if girls just want to talk to me because I'm the Manumission resident.

Do you get groupies then? No, just stalkers, mad people who scare you when the sun comes up.

Which three things would you save in a fire?

We, myself and I, and my dop Dipper. There's nothing to save in our villa here, just crap!

Describe your sound.

It's all house at the end of the day, but I can play all styles. If you're pretty much a no-name DJ, like me, you have to be able to play loads of different clubs with different crowds.

What do you drink when you're DJing?

Vodka, lime and lemonade, with the odd beer mixed in and anything else anyone's left lying around.

What do you do on the island apart from DJing?

I work full time for Manumission, running around. I'm a jack of all trades and crap at all of them. I'm in charge of the door, the DJs and I look after Lord Collin of Ollars - an eccentric Scottish playboy who works with us. -

What are the best three best things about Ibiza? Spanish women, German women and the food.

What have you got planned for 1999?

Same shit, different year. I'm trying to cut back on working in the summer, but I'm working twice as hard. Maybet need a holiday!

What do you listen to on a Sunday morning?

It's normaily a Tuesday morning after Manumission, and we'll listen to Fun Loving Criminals, Morcheeba and The Happy Mondays

Favourite labels?

I really like Subliminal and Defected. I'm the world's worst DJ for knowing labels, and most stuff I get is on white label anyway.

My brother's getting married. He wants you to DJ. Have you got any Smiths?

Yeah, I have actually. The beginning of 'How Soon Is Now' is the best start to any record.

Favourite DJs? Seb Fontaine, Dave Ralph and Tim Westwood.

Favourite clubs? Obviously Manumission, Lacuna in Newcastle and The Kitchen in Dublin. (RDB)

1. Steve Miller Band

Song For Our Ancestors (EMI) This is very early Steve Miller from 1969. Most people only know him for 'Fly Like An Eagle' but he's been around for years. This still sounds like it was made a couple of years ago. The way they fuck around with guitars is beautiful and innovative and a perfect ambient record

2. Pink Floyd

Main Theme (Harvest/EMI) This is a record that doesn't leave my box when I'm playing chill out sets. Any place, any time. The album it's off is called 'More' and was recorded in Ibiza and Formentera so it is very special for me. They also made a film of it which you've gotta check.

3. Eric Kupper

Planet K (Tribal)

This is a deep garage record with a jazzy influence. I think it's one of the best underground garage records ever made and I wish more people played stuff like this. When I go more uptempo I play this but it's not at all banging.

4. UFO

Loud Minority (Talkin' Loud) The first time I heard this I was DJing for DiY in Nottingham and was acting all cool playing chill out, blah blah, and this guy Tony came on after me and just blew me away, the bastard. It's one of the most fantastic upbeat jazz tracks about.

5. Gino Vanelli

Storm At Sun-Up (A&M) This came out at the beginning of the Seventies when I heard it in a club in Barcelona when I was teenager! I got stuck on it straight away. It's the same style as the UFO track and I always play them together. A very, very rare percussive track recorded by two brothers from Canada.





Currently living: In a beautiful villa above San Antonio, Ibiza. When did you start DJing? Along

time ago, ha ha! It was 25 years ago on the Costa Brava. I started by putting on a record when the main DJ wanted the toilet or went to shag a girl. What's your favourite place to play at the moment? Apart from my house, it would have to be somewhere in the open air, by the sea, with good people.

What's your biggest new

record? It's a very strange record by Cousin Grazzly on Squutooth. That's all I can tell you.

6. Santana

Aqua Marine (CBS) Me and my friend Phil Mison save this for beautiful sunsets, it's such a classic timeless tune. The soft brushy percussion, big bassline and dreamy keyboards all give this a great watery feel.

7. God Within

Rainery (Hardkiss)

This has been in my box for years. It's an ethnic percussive track with a smooth beat and beautiful voices, almost screams, on top. It's like trip hop ambient dance... Or something. Ha ha.

Side 2

1. Frank Sinatra

I Got You Under My Skin (live at the Albert Hall, London) Frank tried to retire in 1974 and invited all his old friends to London. He did it with a big band produced by Don Costa. This is me and my girlfriend Karen's tune. We've got back together and loads of people are freaking out but I don't care. I love her.

2. Dusty Springfield

The Look Of Love (Mercury) This will be on the next 'Café Del Mar' compilation. It's a Burt Bacharach production but Dusty makes it sound even better. It's from the first James Bond film with David Niven in, Casino Royale. Hey, what can I say my friends. it's the look of love with your girlfriend and a La Bomba on the beach (chocolate milk and brandy drink favoured by Balearic gods - Cocktails Ed).

3. Manuel Göttsching

E2-E4 (Spoon) I played this in Greece the other night and it still sounds fucking amazing. It's one of those tunes where

you don't know whether to dance or sit down or relax but you can do all three to this! We should give thanks to God for people who make music like this.

4. Traffic

Walking In The Wind (Island) This track is very significant for me as it was out when I started to DJ and they were my favourite band. They opened up my ears. This is a Balearic tune from before the genre even existed. We were playing this on the beach in Ibiza 20 years ago.

5. artist unknown

title unknown (white label) I've had this for six years and I have no fucking idea what it is. The other side is by Original Rockers, I think. It's got wicked drums and solid Arab vibes. Someone always comes and asks me what it is and I still can't say. . . after six years!

6. Jose Padilla

Adios Aver

(exclusive on 'Café Del Mar Volume 6') This means 'Goodbye Yesterday' and was meant to be called 'Adios Café Del Mar' but I didn't want to put that in the end. I was writing lyrics with the engineer Steve and we both came up with the same "sunset in your eyes", "new day starting" lyrical kind of shit. Haha. I'm very happy with it, though.

7. Stan Getz

Street Tattoo (on 'Café Del Mar Volume 4') Getz is one of my gods. If I regret something in my life it's not having seen him live. He's an incredible sax player and I'm so angry I missed his last concerts. This will make you cry.

THE music's become very monotonous in Ibiza, all house and trance," complains Golchehr Ghavani, the alliteratively-monikered promoter of Cocoon. And she's right, dammit.

On an island with so many clubs and hundreds of thousands of clubbers every night, it does come as something of a surprise that there isn't more variation in Ibiza's club scene. Lightstick-waving, turbo-raving trance is all well and good, but even the most ardent fish and chips fan yearns for a chicken jalfrezi once in a while. So bravo Cocoon for pissing in the wind and braving the splashback of holding a

regular techno knees-up on the island. Amnesia, famous for its foam parties and home to British promoters Cream, God's Kitchen and Bugged Out, is on fire tonight. The man throwing petrol on the flames is Sven Vath, Cocoon resident and all-round party nutter. Standing in his luxury apartment-sized DJ booth, Vath still looks every inch the Gatecrasher kid - bleached blonde hair, mad smiling eyes and a grin so wide you could lay a track down on it and drive through on the Eurostar. Your destination would be View 60311, a converted subway station in Frankfurt, Germany, and regular home to the monthly Cocoon techno terrorists.

So why are they coming to an island so firmly entrenched in the ways of Euro-trance and mad-forit Brit-house antics?

"The music needs refreshing," insists Golchehr. "So many people are complaining this year." Not so in Amnesia tonight, where 8,000 hands hit the air as Vath bleeds in another maelstrom of funky, heads-down-see-you-at-the-end techno. From hard, industrial jacking beats to hip-swinging Garnier style, the kids got it all tonight. And while a cocoon hides something beautiful inside, this one's already hatched. words Rob Da Bank

On the eve of **Creamfields**, Cream founder **James Barton** lifts the lid with the full story of his split with partner **Darren Hughes**

They both knew it was over, and when the end came it took just five minutes. In six

and when the end came it took just five minutes. In six years they had turned an initial investment of £4,000 into a business worth millions. But the sands had shifted and the professional and personal relationship which had seen Cream become the biggest club in the country was over. Darren Hughes handed James Barton – the best man at his wedding – a short letter announcing his resignation. Darren packed a few personal items away and left the building. That was in June, 1998. They haven't spoken since.

James was fairly sure Darren was going to leave at last year's first Creamfields event, which they had set up together with the Mean Fiddler Organisation. During meetings held last summer about Creamfields '99 it became clear that Darren, along with his new employers Big Beat (whose Hughes-promoted club Home is due to open in London in September), was negotiating with the Mean Fiddler to run what would essentially be a rival festival – Homelands – in the same month and on the same site.

"We were trying to come up with names for Creamfields," says James Barton, sitting at a conference table in Cream's London office. It's a boiling hot July afternoon and the bottle of water on the table is soon finished. "The name we all settled on was the name I came up with, Creamlands. At the last minute I got a phone call from my brother who was out with his girlfriend, and she said 'Creamlands, bollocks, they should call it Creamfields'. So we changed it, and it is a great name, and to see Homelands turn up makes me fucking laugh."

At the time of their split, just more than a year ago, some predicted Cream couldn't survive the loss of Darren Hughes. One of the major competitors, on being told the news that the planned London Cream

club had been temporarily shelved and that Darren had left the company, said, "I couldn't have planned it better if I'd tried". The story of their split is the story of how club culture cast off its anarchic beginnings and firmly and finally grew up. Clubs are an industry like any other, like it or not, and with an industry you get players, and where you get players there's no room for sentiment, just the bottom line.

JAMES Barton has been running clubs since 1988, when he was 20, from The State to the 051 to the notorious Quadrant Park and, since 1992, Cream. At the start of 1997 he had an executive job at Deconstruction records in London, with Darren running the day-to-day operations of Cream in Liverpool. The club's albums were riding high in the charts, selling a total of more than half a million copies. The club was

expanding, Ibiza was getting bigger and bigger each year and the chippy Northerners were using every opportunity to cock a snook at the Ministry.

Negotiations started with Big Beat, Ron McCulloch's Glasgow-based club company, to help expand Cream worldwide. "It was on," says James, "it was off, then it was on again." The deal came back to the table: Big Beat would buy two-thirds of the company and Darren would own one-third. James turned them down flat.

"The way to achieve a plan is to control your own destiny," he states. "If you can't control your destiny you don't know where you'll end up... I wouldn't like to say how much money was involved, but it was a lot of money.

"Darren's reaction was... predictable. By that I suspect Darren was prepared to do this deal at all costs. For some reason Darren stopped listening to the people around him, which included the lawyers and accountants. Darren thought it was the right deal for him to do, thought it was the right deal for the company but went as far as thinking it was the right deal for me to do... It made me a bit angry but as I say, it's predictable." Barton's concern was that Big Beat wanted the brand, the name of the club, its

goodwill and nothing else. "Once they realised they couldn't get that, and believe me they tried a good few ways of getting that..." Such as? "I'd rather not say. It wasn't clean, let me put it that way."

According to Barton, Darren Hughes tried to poach Cream's suppliers and some staff. "As far as I'm aware everyone stayed on side. The company's a lot bigger than Darren Hughes or James Barton or whoever. There was a point where it wasn't but not any more."

Barton's changed a lot in the last 12 months. When we first met several years ago he was totally focussed on the view that the most successful clubs needed recognisable promoters. "That stopped a long time ago," he says. "It stopped when kids stopped stopping us in the club to shake our hand. Now I just look like a 30 year old guy." He stresses how important the team is working at Cream, and their reaction to Hughes' comments that he had been "the driving force" at the club. "I can only describe it as

ego, either his ego or it was fuelled by someone else. When we decided to do something the whole company kicked in and that's what happened with Creamfields. To deny them their moment of glory, all that does is create bad feeling from everyone who worked at Cream to someone who they really loved. They felt really stabbed in the back at the time."

He doesn't stint with his praise for Hughes, at one point calling him "the best promoter in Britain, in Europe, in the world, probably" and says the split was amicable, but that doesn't alter the fact he's been hurt by what happened then and since. What would he say to him if he saw him now?

"I don't know," he says quietly. How does he feel about him? He takes about 10 seconds to answer, turning his body completely to the right so all I can see is his profile. "I don't know."

He's less diplomatic on the subject of Homelands pulling the rug from under Creamfields. "Darren," he says somewhat bitchily, "had never been to a festival before Creamfields and all of a sudden he was the expert on it. Whatever... At the time we were angry but it was inevitable, what can you do? If you want to do something, do it your fucking self."

And that's what they did. "Creamfields lost money last year. If we based it on purely commercial terms the right thing probably would have been not to do the show, but obviously it was a big high profile show for us, we had created a new brand name..." Last year they looked after the music and the marketing. This year, they're doing everything. "If the shit hits the fan it's our fan," he declares, "and if it's a glorious day it's ours."

Did he ever think he'd be talking about marketing strategies and defending brands and contracts? "Maybe the jargon has changed in the last few years but then the world has changed. The best scene in Human Traffic was where those two old miserable fuckers are on the couch saying 'look at those stupid kids'. Then there's that flashback to the Kickers and smiley T-shirts. Believe me, we've all been there. Live and let live, that's my motto, all those kids running around with Flat Eric puppets and glowsticks will be sneering down their noses in five years' time at some new kid jumping around looking mad. We're all sitting here because 10 years ago we all started listening to music people thought induced some kind of zombielike shoplifters. Look at us, we're all thoroughly respectable now."

And Cream will be there with those changing times. They're going to be a little less experimental, not move as fast, but take due care with what they do well. There are plans for new clubs, for an internet launch, as well as the current 250 dates round the world and a 35,000 capacity millennium party they're promoting jointly with Liverpool council on the Pier Head in their home city. "Get the millennium out of the way and people will see the new Cream, if you like," he adds. "Fingers crossed. If we deliver half of what we've planned it'll be pretty special."

On a mission to the Love Parade with two million German ravers and the biggest trance DJ in the world. **Paul Van Dyk** on Berlin, Gatecrasher and Mitsubishis

HE security guard is the biggest man on the float; not quite as tall as the half-naked black transvestite at the front but bouncer-bulky and big on attitude. His job is to keep the multi-coloured, whooping rave monkeys down below from hitching a ride and to keep the privileged few dancing in front of the numerous TV cameras. "You are not dancing," he snaps at the Muzik contingent, currently enjoying a brief fag break. "If you don't dance you must go!" He gestures sternly to the seething masses where, if we're not careful, we'll soon end up.

Fun can be a serious business at the Love Parade, the largest street party in Europe. According to news broadcasts there are 1.4 million people dancing in the streets of Berlin on this sweltering July afternoon. By the time the music ends at 11pm, it's a safe bet that most of those 1.4 million people will have danced at least once to two records: 'For An Angel' and a remix of Binary Finary's '1998'. You can hear them booming out from float after float down the Strasse Des 17 Juni, just as, all across Europe, you can hear them in club after club, week after week. Both of them are the work of a modest 27-year-old Berliner called Paul Van Dyk.

High up on a lamp post by the side of the *strasse* a bare-chested raver with dyed green hair is dancing like a monkey on mescaline. To a collective gasp from those nearby he throws his hands a little too hard into the air, loses his balance and plummets to the pavement below. Smeared with blood, he staggers to his feet and, with breathtaking Teutonic hardiness, keeps dancing. Those Van Dyk breakdowns will get you every time.

IN 1999 the international sound of clubland is trance, and nobody does it better than Paul Van Dyk. The Gatecrasher Kids, Judge Jules and Pete Tong love him. So do progressive trance DJs like Sasha, Nick Warren and Dave Seaman, and less likely admirers such as The Chemical Brothers and Deep Dish. Even those who remain unconvinced by trance's unstoppable rise have to admit that Paul Van Dyk has got something special.

Van Dyk may be a phenomenon, but he's not an overnight one. 'Vorsprung Dyk Technik', the weighty, 50,000-selling remix collection that includes at least half a dozen of the finest trance records ever made, is like a musical autobiography. When, a few years back, German trance splintered into Goa, tech-trance, epic house or Europop and scene leaders like Sven Väth jumped ship, Van Dyk kept on doing his thing. From Visions Of Shiva's 'How Much Can You Take?' in 1992 through remixes of Sven Väth, New Order and BT to last year's triumphant doubleheader of Binary Finary and the re-released 'For An Angel', trance never really went away and neither did Paul Van Dyk. From Berlin to Gatecrasher to Twilo, he's now one of the biggest DJs in the world.

"If you're in the middle of it, you don't really realise it, or at least I don't," he says, all modesty. "I just concentrate on what I love and hopefully can do best. You can connect the first record I've done with the one I'm doing now, cos it's the same vibe, the same soul." Only now, it seems, everybody wants a piece of Paul Van Dyk's soul.

GATECRASHER, Sheffield, one month before the Love Parade. The Gatecrasher Kids are on the front stage, a riot of spiky hair, flashing dog collars, dummies and lightsticks. According to the Gatecrasher ethos, the punters are the stars but tonight they've abdicated their position to Paul Van Dyk. The truly devoted stare in awe at the DJ box, arms outstretched, some with flashing crucifixes around their necks.

Van Dyk is two hours into one of his already legendary bi-monthly six-hour sets. He mixes in his remix of Blank & Jones' 'Cream', a Number 24 hit and a textbook example of the art of the breakdown. As it whirs and swirls and cracks back into life, Van Dyk can see his name painstakingly printed onto homemade T-shirts, jostling for space with Mitsubishi's ubiquitous red diamonds. Somebody hands him a toy sheep which he accepts with a bemused smile and places next to the mixer. At one point some of the Kids unfurl an oversized banner, with a message written in German, and hold it up until their hero reads it.

He leans over, visibly chuffed. "It says, 'Thanks for coming. Hopefully it won't be too long till the next time. We love you – The Gatecrasher Kids."

For a superstar DJ Paul Van Dyk is an unassuming sort: humble, cheerful and boyishly handsome. There seems to be no ego there, just an unfailing enthusiasm and generosity which translates to the turntables. He first played here in late 1996 and they've loved him ever since.

"I really feel with the 'Crasher kids in some way because they are a bit like I was 10 years ago when I discovered acid house," he says in his wordy, slightly disjointed English back at the hotel afterwards.

"I mean I have to admit I never had a glowstick but I remember I had Coca-Cola red hair and this white hat. We were as crazy then as the kids here now. The only problem is we are about 10 years further in the whole drug culture. At some point I wish they maybe take one Mitsubishi less and try to get really into the music rather than into the Mitsubishi."

"HE'S a wicked, quality DJ. He's enormous now but he's also a really nice guy. His sound is quite of the moment – he fits well into the big trance explosion.

"We've done five Creams together. Last Thursday was my birthday. Me, Tall Paul and Paul Van Dyk. It was the busiest night ever in Amnesia: 6,000 inside, 1,000 outside. Tall Paul had them all singing 'Happy Birthday'!

"There's no reason for his success to stop now. Oakey and Sasha have done very well even without the trance explosion..." But surely you must have been tempted just once?

"No," he insists. "I know it sounds boring but I never, ever had an ecstasy so I don't know how it feels. It never appealed to me as really necessary."

When prompted, he'll admit to trying cocaine "two or three times", but that's all. The important thing about club culture, he will say at least a dozen times, is the music. He likes neither the drugs, nor, on his recent visit to Ibiza, the scantily clad club dancers ("I don't like to play in a strip bar").

Van Dyk has seen the unacceptable face of clubbing excess. A few years ago he was a regular guest at Disco 2000, the night at New York's Limelight hosted by the infamous Michael Alig. Alig was the charismatic, flamboyant leader of the Club Kids, bizarrely dressed, highly sexed drug hoovers who make the Gatecrasher Kids look like school disco Hooch-drinkers. The bubble burst somewhat spectacularly when Alig was convicted of murdering and dismembering drug dealer and Club Kid wannabe Angel Menendez in his apartment - the same apartment Van Dyk used to stay in when he was playing Disco 2000.

"It became really gross at the end and Michael Alig was getting the whole... [awkward laugh] *weird* thing. He was a really, really nice bloke, the only thing was he was taking too much drugs. The Gatecrasher Kids are much more enthusiastic about the music. The reason why they do it is about their club and the music in their club. In New York it was all about being trendy, being hip, being a New York Club Kid. They didn't give a shit what was going on musically."

At Gatecrasher one of the Kids is looking just as crazed as everyone else but sports a T-shirt which says 'No Pills' on the back and 'Pure PVD' on the front.

"See," says Van Dyk with a told-youso grin. "Something like this gives me a lot of hope."

IT'S the Friday evening before Love Parade and Paul Van Dyk is on his way to play his first set of the weekend for official Love Parade broadcasters Radio Fritz. It's a glorious day but he hasn't seen any of it yet.

"I've spent the whole day compressing the bass drum for the new single," he explains, hopping into the car.

Van Dyk, a self-confessed technology "freak", can talk at length about the importance of compressing bass drums, perfecting hi-hats and the like, but thankfully he decides not to. He's also spent the afternoon sorting through his mail.

"I was listening to my new records from last week and two of them – *two of them* – are okay," he grimaces. "Not great, but okay."

It's hard work being a trance DJ, when the genre covers a multitude of sins.

"I wish people tried to get into the music rather than the Mitsubishi"

The Place

In Britain we're crammed into the narrow streets of Notting Hill. In Berlin the authorities let the parade loop around two of the city's most famous landmarks: the Brandenburg Gate and the Siegessäule.

The People

Strangers hand out champagne and pills and everyone smiles at everyone else. Admire the rave Amazons, the imposing transvestites and every weird ass costume you can imagine.

The Accessories

Cheap hair dye, whistles and water pistols all contribute to the rave carnival vibe, but be warned – when you hear a high-pitched shriek in your ear for the umpteenth time you may find yourself stuffing a whistle up the arse of a German raver.

The Music

Trance and techno are the overriding soundtrack but you can also find house and breakbeat along the way. If it's got a beat and the sun is shining then it works.

The Hormones

Notting Hill Carnival is prudish by comparison to the clothes-are-forlosers ethos of young Berliners. The nearby Tiergarten is the ideal venue for canoodling if the mood takes you, as long as you don't mind doing it in 1.4 million people's piss.

The Floats

Beg, blag or bribe your way onto one of the trucks and see the whole parade route without being elbowed to death.

The Police

The ones we saw were lounging about spraying passers by with water pistols and giggling. Cop-raver bonhomie is the order of the day.

The Lamp Posts

Every lamp post hosts a cluster of ravers who know not the meaning of fear, or indeed gravity. Take bets with your friends on how long they'll last.

The Climax

The parade finishes with Berliners Paul Van Dyk, Westbam and Dr Motte spinning on the Siegessäule itself. Best skip Dr Motte's speech, though. It's utter cobblers.

The Aftermath

At 11pm you can head off to a club, play bongos with hippies in the Tiergarten or bring your own sound system and pump out techno in the street, vowing never to take the piss out of Germans again.





For every ambitious, imaginative track that pops through the letterbox, there are a dozen formulaic stinkers – rip-offs of rip-offs of five-year-old tracks. Van Dyk gets them all. One of the reasons he re-released his 1993 remix of Humate's 'Love Stimulation' last year was to counteract the flow of shoddy cover versions.

As trance feeds voraciously on its original German heyday, every month brings another outing for one of the genre's classics: Jam & Spoon's 'Stella', Energy 52's 'Café Del Mar', Age Of Love's 'Age Of Love'. This month even sees the release of staggeringly pointless new mixes of Binary Finary, barely a year after Van Dyk's definitive version. He's better placed than most to spot the copies, because he played, and often made, the originals years ago.

"A lot of German dance music is what many people call trance and I have to agree with them that this is mainly bullshit," he concedes. "The problem with this music is if you have the DJ just playing the records without understanding them and really feeling them it's the most awful DJ set you can hear. And if you don't have the right feelings to do a track, then it's most likely the shittiest record you can produce. Many of the records they call trance over here I wouldn't even put near my box."

Radio Fritz has set up its mobile studio in a gravel courtyard beneath a former department store, prestigious in the Twenties, bombed during the war and now inhabited by artists painting murals on the remaining walls. The building's peculiar history reflects that of Berlin itself, a city where half-destroyed buildings are shattered reminders of World War Two, joyless, ugly hulks recall decades of communist austerity, and both are converted into party venues at the drop of a hat. Berliners sure know how to polish a turd.

In Berlin, people are trusted to have fun without going on looting sprees or smoking crack. The authorities are helpful, the police tolerant and the city's nondancing population generally unfussed by the idea of the centre of town being overrun by whistle-blowing ravers. The only bone of contention is the city authorities' problem with the hefty £100,000 clean-up bill. Love Parade founder Dr Motte is considering moving the whole thing to another city if the same arguments happen next year. He should contrast Berlin with London and count his blessings.

The bespectacled Dr Motte is playing beneath the Radio Fritz awning when we arrive, as people sit around drinking beer in the early evening sunshine. Van Dyk is on next, leisurely building a weekend-starts-here vibe.

Four hours later he's hosting his own night at the Columbiahalle, once a sports hall for American soldiers stationed in West Berlin. When he resided at the legendary, now-defunct E-Werk, Van Dyk was the first to invite British DJs like Sasha, Digweed, and Nick Warren to play in Berlin and the Van Dyk faithful (a hardcore of 500 have been to every one of his Berlin dates for five years) are an open-minded crowd. Tonight Sasha is the guest and on Sunday, in the courtyard of an abandoned East Berlin sorting office, it will be Dave Seaman.

"The thing is the ability of the DJ to put your own character, your own view on the music you play, into the set," Van Dyk considers backstage. "If you gave John Digweed, Sasha, Nick Warren, Paul Oakenfold and me the same 10 records I promise you every single DJ would play a completely different set. And this, at the end, is the point of it."

"People make fun of it but I'm a big Alanis Morrisette fan"



When Van Dyk finally stops playing long after dawn, people spill out elated into the Berlin sunshine, the Love Parade only hours away.

"During the grey months Berlin can be really depressing but if it's sunny it's one of the most beautiful towns there can be," he beams and heads home for bed.

PAUL Van Dyk grew up in a very different Berlin. He was born nine days before Christmas, 1971, in Eisenhüttenstadt, a miserable, polluted industrial town built around an iron factory on East Germany's border with Poland, in, he says balefully, "the middle of nowhere".

Two years later, the Van Dyks moved to East Berlin. Two years after that his father walked out ("I can barely remember anything about him"). Even in repressive East Berlin, Van Dyk wasn't short of music. He could still tune in to radio stations on the other side of the Wall, and once drew up a timetable in his school exercise book, with a different club to go to every night and dance to his favourite bands: The Smiths, New Order and the Pet Shop Boys. At 13 he started taking care of the PAs on touring sound systems to earn money for tapes and black market vinyl. "The only good thing about East Berlin," says Van Dyk dryly, "was that West Berlin was next to it."

Applying for permission to move to the West was a tortuous process. The authorities finally let Paul and his mother leave in 1989, a week before the *Wall came down*.

"It was a lot of hassle," Van Dyk says sourly. "We were allowed to leave each with one suitcase and I actually stood in line for more than 48 hours to be allowed to take my dog with me. So two suitcases and a dog, that's all we had. And a week later all the motherfuckers we tried to leave behind us, all the communist assholes, they're all back at the table. In these terms the whole reunion thing was first a pretty hard slap in our faces. I saw this motherfucker who was responsible for giving me bullshit for three years and saying, 'Communistic life is the best thing in the world' shopping in the most capitalistic street in Berlin."

Working as a carpenter, Van Dyk bought up compilations because he couldn't afford 12-inches. In time-honoured novice DJ tradition he started making tapes for friends who were dissatisfied with the techno mainstream. Trance, far from being the norm, was the radical alternative when he played his first date at the Tresor nightclub in March, 1991.

If it all sounds a bit fairytale, then that's because it is. Paul Van Dyk fought for his right to party and won, and everything else rapidly followed: his first residencies (with organisers Dubmission and XTC), his first record ('Perfect Day' as Visions Of Shiva with fellow Berliner Cosmic Baby a year later), his first foreign dates in France and America. In each country he played, it only took one night to win them over. Only Britain remained immune to Van Dyk's charms. Early dates at the Ministry, Club UK and, bizarrely, as tour DJ for bowl-headed Mancunians (and good friends) the Inspiral Carpets, didn't exactly elevate him to the super league.

"The first club I played in Britain was the Ministry Of Sound and they don't even know that any more," he chortles. "No one really cared: 'There's this German geezer coming, who cares?' No one took me there for serious, I reckon."

With the release of his second album, 1996's 'Seven Ways', things began to change. First Renaissance, then Cream and Gatecrasher, started booking Van Dyk regularly and this year an industry poll rated him the world's sixth most indemand DJ.

Excessive jetsetting, however, is not the only reason for the non-appearance of his long-awaited third album, 'Avenue Of The Stars'. It currently rests in the hands of the lawyers after a messy 18-month dispute with his former German label, MFS.

"There was a point where I was just like, 'Fuck it, I don't want to do music any more'," he confides. "People say, 'Yeah it must have been your year, you got bigger and bigger', but the thing is this little step we took, we got a fucking hurricane blast back in our faces: people ripping things off, bootlegs, so much lawyer bullshit, so many things I had to take care of and wasn't prepared to take care of."

Fortunately Van Dyk cut his losses and made another as-yet-untitled album, the first single from which, 'Avenue', is due in October.

"It's more concrete so tracks which are poppy are much more poppy and things that are tough and hard are tougher and harder. Something in between, I'm not really keen on. I like intensity. People make fun of it but I'm a big Alanis Morrisette fan because what's coming across is really intense and really honest. Many people come up to me and tell me, 'With this song you gave me something, I heard this song and it changed something'. As long as I'm able to make this happen, I don't have any other big ambitions."

AT 9pm the Love Parade is a surreal place to be. The floats, finishing their circuit around the Brandenburg Gate, come to a halt around the Siegessäule, a 19th century Prussian victory column, atop which stands a statue of a golden angel. For two and a half miles all you can see is floats and people, some spilling off into the vast Tiergarten, the park that lines the road. The tarmac is scrunchy with crushed bottles and cans, the Tiergarten aglow with campfires. Van Dyk picks up his record box, ready to make his way to the Siegessäule with his girlfriend Natascha. He fell in love with her at the Love Parade five years ago, and wrote 'For An Angel' for her immediately afterwards. Bless.

For legal reasons, the event is still officially a political demonstration in the name of peace and love and, as all the floats' PAs are linked up, Dr Motte accordingly makes his traditional speech. Even if you understand German it is, apparently, nonsense, revolving meaninglessly around the repeated English motto "Music Is The Key".

"He's not really a doctor," Van Dyk confides. "He's not very good with words." Nor, indeed, with records, as anthems by Underworld and The Chemical Brothers suffer a messy and brutal death by crossfader and only a truly wretched, but inexplicably popular, rave version of 'Somewhere Over The Rainbow' is spared.

Fortunately, an hour later Van Dyk, who has played every Love Parade since 1991, is where he belongs – on the column, spinning a climactic half-hour set. There are still a million people dancing. Only the Pope could command an audience this big and, no offence to Catholics, his tunes aren't half as good. As the sun sets behind the golden angel, and another euphoric breakdown sends arms deliriously skyward, it looks for a moment like Paul Van Dyk really does have the world at his feet.

Now resembles any German tourist in Spain, although infinitely more pleasant.

Paul Van Dyk

Born in communist East Berlin, young Paul learned to mix with rubber bands and a wax cylinder before Mark Reader's MFS signed him up and made him an international production and DJ star. Possibly the greatest trance remixer and one of the most entertaining trance DJs of all time, he's certainly one of the few

who could give Oakenfold a run for his money.

'Vernon's Wonderland'

Possibly the greatest trance track of all time, it appeared on Eye Q in 1993.

In the trance-mad early Nineties, our man Taucher (or Ralf Armand Beck to his chums) used to put on a full wetsuit, flippers, mask and lead weights to go clubbing in Frankfurt's Omen club. No surprise that after a handful of doves (the Mitsubishi of the day) and seven hours of Sven Vath banging out Harthouse and Eye Q stunners, Taucher would pass out and have to be rescued by medics. Great floorshow! So we can expect

the same thing at Gatecrasher? Er, not quite. Taucher is one of the club's residents, but the wetsuit days are long behind him. In a recent Muzik interview, Taucher did request if anyone could do a body painting of a wetsuit though.

So Taucher spins cutting-edge space techno. But does he make any?

You betcha. In a smart move by Additive label honcho Kevin Robinson, he was signed to the imprint last year. Everything he has touched with studio cohort Torsten Stenzel has turned to gold. Like 'Ayla' by Ayla, Red Light District's 'Did You Hear Me and the big re-rub of Sosa's 'The Wave New cuts to look out for include 'Child Of The Universe', 'Bizarre' and 'Flussig', all forthcoming on Additive in the next month. Not to be confused with...

Troika - the ridiculously strong vodka that everyone's snorting at the moment.

Tiesto

What's a German doing with an Italian name?

Look, just because he plays music you could march to doesn't mean he's German. In fact, Tiesto is Dutch, from the town of Breda, and signed to the Black Hole label near Rotterdam. Why is he so well known in the UK?

For three main reasons. First, he is a monthly resident at Gatecrasher in Sheffield and Birmingham. Second, he collaborated

with top Euro knob-twiddler Ferry Corsten to produce the incredibly successful 'Gourvella' and System F's 'Out Of The Blue'. Thirdly, he is the main production man behind the Ministry Of Sound's new Data imprint, dedicated to "upfront trance, progressive and Ibizan sounds". Although only set up in March this year, Data has already had a hit with ATB's '9pm (Till I Come)'. Their second release is Kamaya Painters' 'Endless Wave'. It's produced by Tiesto and remixed by Ferry Corsten. Expect it to be huge, naturally.

He's signed to the Ministry. So he'll DJ there, right?

Well, he isn't at the moment, which begs the question: did Gatecrasher sign Tiesto on an exclusive basis? Still, the Ministry know a good thing when they hear it, so expect movement on this front soon. Data, by the way, is an MoS offshoot with a degree of independence, so purists will be glad to learn that the chance of a Judge Jules remix is remote (at the moment)...

Not to be confused with... Testa, makers of the early Nineties all-time progressive classic 'Don't Stop'.

Talla

What kind of name is that, then?

Beats us. Seems this pumped-up baldheaded bloke's name is Talla 2XLCsomething straight out of the Teutonic techno-komputer sci-filexicon. His first recording name was Moskwa TV (remember 'Brave New World'?) before he became Robotiko Rejekto. As if that's not enough, his personal logo (on all releases) is a Space Invader lookalike.

Is he resident at Gatecrasher as well?

Forget it. Talla's residency is every Friday at one of the original trance venues, underneath Terminal One at Frankfurt airport. That's the home of the worldfamous Dorian Gray.

What else has Talla released?

'What Time Is Love' was a monster smash in Germany. His hard-as-nuts remix of Smack's 'Overdose' (yes, honestly) was huge, as were his collaborations with Taucher ('Together'), Resistance D ('Love's Coming Down') and Tom Wax ('NRG'). His re-rub of Gary Numan's anthemic 'Cars wasn't bad, either,

Is he as big as Taucher and Tiesto? In his homeland, due to his residency and output on the Music Research gmbh

imprint, he's probably bigger. Unfortunately, he doesn't seem to gig out of Germany/central Europe that much. But if you want to check him out, try his web site at www.talla.de It's only available in German, naturally. Not to be confused with...

Detroit crew's debut heralds the return of Daisy Age optimism and old-fashioned hip hop skills

T'S 10 years since De La Soul's 'Three Feet High And Rising', the masterpiece that introduced goofy wit, day-glo sampledelia, and conscious optimism into hip hop. In the era of the Native Tongues (a loose alliance of De La Soul, The Jungle Brothers and A Tribe Called Quest), hip hop became generous and inclusive. Now De La are back in the studio, The Jungle Brothers are larking around in Hawaiian shirts after their big beat makeover and A Tribe Called Quest may have split, but their spirit is certainly alive and well in Slum Village. Could this be hip hop's second summer of love?

Well, maybe not quite yet, but Slum Village hark back to those days when mainstream hip hop's lyrical options weren't limited to (a) "popping bitches" (b) how much your Rolex

cost, or (c) the impending apocalypse. This Detroit trio sit at the same table as Jurassic 5, The Roots and The Pharcyde and, as their feelgood debut album suggests, you're welcome to join them. On numerous sneaky bootlegs, 'Fantastic Vol II''s glorious sprawl of beats and rhymes has already gained a cult US following.

Only the deaf could miss Slum Village's debt to vintage Tribe. No wonder, considering producer/MC Jay Dee honed his breezy, laid back grooves as a member of Tribe's production arm, The Ummah, and with fellow MCs Baatin and T3, he also trades rhymes with a fluid ease worthy of his mentors. In fact, Q-Tip seems to anoint them as his crew's successors on the surprisingly jaded 'Hold Tight': "*Hold tight, this is the last time you hear me/I'm out* now, this is the last time you cheer me/Niggas in the game is getting too slimy/l'm 'a leave it in the hands of the Slum now." This album is laced with sideswipes at the

music industry, but unlike Public Enemy's

latest it doesn't sound like sour grapes. On the syncopated, Busta-style flow of the stinging syncopated, Busta style now of the stinging 'Jealousy' or the lazy afternoon smoothness of 'Get Dis Money' they walk it like they talk it. 'Fantastic Vol II' has something for everybody: cerebral sex rhymes ('CB4', 'Cli max'), juicy block party funk ('Eyes Up', 'Wh at's it All About'), superior skits (a bizarre Louis Armstrong impersonator singling Diana Ross Armstrong impersonator singing Diana Ross and Prince) and a stellar line-up of guests, including Busta Rhymes, the underground's favourite superstar D'Angelo and old-timer Pete Rock. The haunting xylophones on Rock's contribution, 'Once Upon A Time', and the sampled soul croon on 'Fall In Love' show that Jay Dee knows the skill of hip hop production is in the details.

If the only recent hip hop album in your collection is 'Jurassic 5', make room for another. Can Slum Village kick it? Yes they can.

Tricky Juxtapose Universal/Island The Thekster returns with his most moving and daring album to date



WHEN Tricky moved to New York in 1995, he took up residence in a Greenwich Village apartment numbered 666. Whatever deals with a certain tailed and horned gent went down there, we will probably never know. But, judging by the demonic forces at play on his fifth and best album to date, Tricky must have bartered bimself a pretty cood deal

himself a pretty good deal, You heard right. Tricky's best album. One that will no doubt be lazily referred to elsewhere as a return to the glory days of 'Maxinquaye', but in actual fact is way more complex and puzzling. The chronic introspection that dogged 'Pre-Millennium Tension' and the Nearly God project would seem to be at an end. The Tricky at play on 'Juxtapose' is sharper, wittier and more emotionally engaging than ever before. And, indeed, more unpredictable and volatile.

Who else would berate rappers for their macho posturing on 'For Real', then immediately follow it with a classic bragging session like 'Bom Bom Diggy'? Or, come to think of it, relocate his trademark sound somewhere between battered four track lo-fi and Timbaland-strength hip hop. 'Hot Like A Sauna' and 'I Like The Girls' (bound to attract controversy for its vivid depiction of a torrid lesbian orgy) boast all the unsettling schizophrenia of 'Maxinguaye', only bolstered with swaggering fighting talk where once desperation lurked. An entirely uncomfortable listen, for sure. All the

same, precisely the record we've all been willing Tricky to make for years.

ALEX Gopher's credentials in the Paris scene are faultless. He was in the band Orange with a pre-Air Nicolas Godin and Jean-Benoit Dunckel, contributed two tracks to Super Discount' and has generally been a French name to drop for the last few years. BRISTOL just keeps churning out dance innovators. There must be a secret underground bunker where rows of embryos are intravenously fed hydroponic skunk and old Studio One records. Now Roni Size has hired an exbusker vocalist called Leonie (pronounced "Lenny") Laws, and suddenly the increasingly blokeish and characterless world of drum & bass seems 10 times as lively. Welcome the first true vocal star of jungle.

'Breakbeat Era' was originally a track on the 'Music Box' compilation. Now it's Size's fulltime project, harder and grittier than Reprazent and full of wonky synths, Van Halen-style guitar licks and gothic paranoia instead of jazzy smoothness. Imagine Krust's 'Warhead' played on live

instruments, with vocals by Siouxsie Sioux, Except that would be horrible, and this is excellent

Things kick off with 'Past Life', a musclebound roller that reminds you how devastating Size and Die are as dancefloor junglists. Then we get 'Rancid' -kind of a hardcore version of Reprazent's 'Watching Windows' - and by the sexy, sleazy, wobbly funk 'n' bass track 'Ultra Obscene' you've made your mind up you've got to see this band live. You can tell by Laws' scary lyrics about wanting to fight everyone ('Time 4 Breaks') and women who look like men but give good head ('Sex Change') that she's not the sort of drum & bass diva who's just there to look good in a dress and provide some sexy warbling. This is more like having your ass kicked by Tank Girl to the tune of 180bpm breakbeats. Bristol, you've done it again.

His output has, however, been subject to a certain laxity in the quality control department, as mundane disco cut 'n' pasters regularly satalongside more inspired dancefloor outings. Perplexing offering that loiters somewhere between high-art concept and street-level piss take

YOU thought you knew where you were with Sheffield threesome All Seeing I. They did that wonky, Buddy Richsampling bossa-house smash 'Beat Goes On', right? Right. But then they swung back with the obscure yet irresistible Jarvis-penned techno digicabaret of 'Walk Like A Panther' and you thought: "Eh?" And now they deliver an album that sounds like Carl Craig, Karl Denver, Carl Jung and Carly Simon knocking back several gallons of Carlsberg in the region of Karl Hyde's brain that's totally

untouched by sanity. Great. No, *really* great, actually. If All Seeing I's world view is at all times profoundly skewed and their method decidedly 'experimental', it speaks volumes that so much of 'Pickled Eggs' is infused with the idiot-savant brilliance that fireballed those tracks into the charts. They can make slinky, tweety chi-house (the sublime 'Sweet Music') but they prefer 'First Man In Space', an intriguing 21st-century lament whose drizzling pseudoprofundity would put Beck to shame. They can construct snarling darkcore speed garage such as 'Big Pecker', but the Dick Van Dyke across-the-rooftops Iullaby of 'Stars On Sunday' is what you'll be returning to time and again. That, or the gruff balladry of 'Nicola', or the waves-lapping acappella of 'No Return'. These are nursery rhymes and

folk tales from the interface between pop, acid house, science fiction and surrealism and they're probably brilliant and penetrating insights into the world you live in, only delivered in a language no one understands. Go figure!

Shakta's Seb Taylor is nobody's fool, though. He's seen 'Trance Nation' flying off the shelves so, whereas two years ago the 'Enlightened Ape' would simply have pummelled your brain into submission, now there are more progressive elements on show. Sure, upcoming single 'Zevel Boy' is unlikely to bother the next Cream compilation and Chakta leave the box marked 'euphoric strings and piano riffs' well alone. But still there's a lightness of touch here, a welcome lack of the bunker mentality that dogs much of the psi-trance currently on offer. Phew.

Omni Trio Byte Size Life Moving Shadow Orchestral drum & bass innovator now onto his fourth album and still going strong

THERE aren't many drum & bass artists with four albums under their betts. If this was rock 'n' roll, Rob Haigh would be deep into his experimental mandolins- andtrumpets phase by now, or holed up in a French mansion with a cocainesnorting supermodel. Unfortunately, jungle doesn't pay that well, so the bloke who singlehandedly converted half the country's techno fans into junglists with the sublime 'Renegade Snares' back in 1993 is still plugging away with his lush, string-laden, rush-inducing take on drum & bass.

After a couple of acid-tinged analogue stompers at the beginning, we get the highly polished 'Brothers In Detroit' and 'Meltdown', which have already graced Bukem's turntables – as has the much tougher roller 'Beyond The Fundamental'. But for sheer, dawn-over-Ibiza loveliness, it's got to be 'Native Place', a return to his goosebumpinducing early Nineties roots. They used to call this stuff ambient hardcore, you know. Ask your dad.

Another chill out great from Hull's finest label

NO ONE said it was easy making chill out records. You must be everything - and yet nothing, as Yoda would have said had he ever bothered checking out Sunday Best. Making a gently funky chill out album doesn't seem to prove all that much of a challenge. The real trick, judging by the ever-expanding pile of discarded, disposable mellow beats in the Muzik office, is making one worth actually buying, keeping and listening to without losing that essential inoffensive vibe. Pork, Hull's long-standing stalwarts of the languid beat, have often fudged that particular issue, but 'East Coast Chip Shop' is both relaxingly groovy and robustly unforgettable. Techno – with singing? Bring forth the guillotine!

'TOUGH on techno, tough on the causes of techno', could be Tobias Schmidt's motto. Alongside fellow sonic seditionaries and Tresor recording artists Cristian Vogel and Neil Landstrumm (whose Brooklyn-based label is responsible for this offering), he's sensed the genre's stagnation and set about reinventing it with bilious gallows humour, queasy electronic funk and a healthy disregard for shaved-head, stony-faced etiquette – "I'm a DJ/A techno DJ/I'm a cliché "he huffs grimly on 'I'm A Cliché'. Imagine one of Green Velvet's sordid vignettes transposed onto the dark lo-fi minimalism and industrial sleaze of Throbbing Gristle's 'Persuasion'; add a Shane McGowanstyle rant and you've got 'Roses'. Confusing indeed. But one thing's for sure - this particular French Revolution' is as far removed from the filter disco and enforced bonhomie of Cassius, Impulsion et alas Robespierre is from Jacques Tati, and it's not afraid to stick its neck out.

Afterhours Eighties Chicago house-master finally gets debut album out

OLD-SKOOL house guru. Decides to make album just that little bit different. Throws in jungle, Latin and even opera. No, we're not talking Todd Terry, but rather, Ralphi Rosario, the man behind the classic 'You Used To Hold Me' (dateline – 1987). Unlike Todd however, Rosario's rarely got close to the starting grid of the Pioneering Producers' Grand Prix. So whereas Todd's 'Resolutions' was a brave attempt to pound out some futuristic takes on bass science, '45 Miles' varies from adequate to abject. Most of it is Tenaglia/Murk-style dark garage, but there's little here that would have Danny looking nervously over his shoulders. The more adventurous rest has all the right moves but with precious little conviction.

THE gypsies who introduced flamenco to Spain from India would be stomping their clogs in their caravans if they could hear what Nitin's done with their centuries-old rhythms. And as for lovers of classical Indian, drum & bass, Balearic, tabla and soul music, well, that doesn't bear thinking about.

Nitin Sawhney, you see, paddles his way through themes like an Olympic rower. One minute he's floating down the Ganges on a spiritual raft, the next he's offering a social commentary on nuclear weapons. Mixing more melodies than a musical Moulinex, each track carves out an individual, positive message searching out and celebrating multi-culturalism around the globe. If that sounds a bit stuffy, well, we've almost forgotten

what dance music with a

conscience sounds like. Or were too bored to listen. That's rarely the case here, thankfully, 'Homelands', blending Nitin's

"Homelands", blending Nitin's flamenco and Asian roots, is a sunset symphony at the Café Del Mar while the sublime piano on "Tides' has more in common with Michael Nyman or Benjamin Britten than any other dance act but exposes the raw moods used in any dance tune. 'Nadia' uses traditional ancient Indian vocals for an intense lesson on immigration.

Slip in some Urdu verse, a dancer chap speaking about the rhythm of his fancy footwork and the Prime Minister of India proudly announcing the success of his country's first nuclear tests alongside members of Dream Warriors, 4 Hero and Smoke City and a *real* musical journey unravels. A 'difficult third album'. In all the

THEY'RE the Todd Terry it's okay to like. The Masters At Work who've got opinions and aren't afraid to voice them. The Kings Of Tomorrow who know the world doesn't need more stick-in-the-mud purists. They fall out with each other. They've got a devious sense of mischief. They're Americans who feel Britain's where the cutting edge is sharper than ever.

There are many reasons to treasure Washington DC's Deep Dish duo of Ali and Sharam, and with 'Yoshiesque' they've just given us one more. Here at last is the ultimate crossover between the darker, more twisted sound of New York house and Britain's own burgeoning progressive trance scene.

The track listing alone is enough to raise eyebrows. As well as plenty of tracks from the duo's own Yoshitoshi label (hence the title), there are surprising appearances from Fluke, Amoeba Assassin, Lo-Fi Allstars and even Quivver's mix of Culture Club. The mixing is sublime, adventurous and subtle. The acappella of Satoshi Tomile's 'Darkness' is woven like a black chord of nastiness through the second CD, while the sound of pumping tech-house gives the first one an irresistible thrust.

It might have been nice to hear them work their way up from stand-still to peak-time, but minor quibbles aside, 'Yoshiesque' is one in the eye for all those who thought the Iranians' time had already passed. Judging by this, it's only just begun.

Thankfully, 'Mambo Café Ibiza '99' won't require too much foraging around for you to discover its joys.

Even though Café Mambo isn't renowned as anything more than San Antonio's coolest sunset venue (sorry, Del Mar, but unlike Grace, it's over now), its mix albums have managed to perfectly capture the entire 24-hour losing it lbiza experience. Bypassing the standard 101 anthems formula that makes most others entirely interchangeable, 'Café Mambo' takes a day and night approach. One CD for chill out, a second for 'hammock house and garage'.

Translated, that means 16 tracks of immaculate downtempo bliss chosen with such expertise, you'd think the impeccable hand of José Padilla was behind it, if only he hadn't upped sticks from Mambo last month. A Man Called Adam, Underworld's mix of Simply Red, Nightmares On Wax and even lan Pooley's simmering mix of Inner City's 'Buena Vida' are all present and slouching. The uptempo CD is just as good, crisscrossing between house anthems (Moloko, Stardust, MAW's 'To Be In Love') with deeper US vibes from the likes of Ananda Project and Dubtribe.

Magical sounds from a magical venue. Just sprinkle on the sunshine and go.

Fine songwriting, remixes from Beber and Interfearence, and Hybrid's own 4/4 Echoplex mix should keep the progressive trance massive happy.

Ali: "It's got Julee Cruise on it? I love her voice. It doesn't sound like her here though This sounds kinda like some of the new stuff BT's been playing us, but not as good."

Sharam: "We love some of that Sasha/BT breakbeat. That one they put out on our label was amazing. We'll put out whatever style, as long as it's good."

Sharam: "This is cool but it really sounds like A Tribe Called Quest."

Bad Boy/Arista

HE hasn't, has he? Oh, yes he has. Hip hop's karaoke king goes back to the old skool, but inevitably it's someone else's old skool. 'Public Enemy Number One' to be precise. There's a puzzling Spanish version and a rock version on which Chuck D, supposed scourge of commercial rap, swallows his pride and cashes his cheque. Strangely depressing.

What are the aims of the label?

We set Kingsize up in 1993 to release music we like, basically. The first release was the 'Federal Law' EP by Jason O'Brien, who was one half of Ceasefire. The first 10 records we did were all pressed on 10-inch vinyl. Since then we've done 20 other releases, eight albums and our second compilation is out this month.

Who records for the label?

Meat Katie - real name Mark Pember - has been with the label from the start and he's probably got the highest profile. He's a bit of a man about town. Then there's DJ Stix, Outcast (who is the Kingsize MD Davide Arcoleol and Hardwire who all do breakbeat music: Voight Campf and Brood who do mellow, abstract tunes, and most recently Sir Drew, who used to record for Athletico. He's currently on a major P-Funk mission.

What is the sound of Kingsize?

We're not a label to be easily pigeonholed. We release a lot of different music by a lot

So who are they then?

How long have you been asleep? Five multi-talented MCs, breakers, DJs and producers - D-Stroy, Swel Boogie, Jise One, Q-Unique and Freestyle-debuted in 1995 on Bobbito Garcia's Fondle 'Em imprint and picked up a Vital Single in Muzik in the process. They put out another couple of singles, collaborated with other people and generally made a reputation as leading lights of the New York Underground.

So they put out all their own records and go on about how true they are to the music, yeah?

Not exactly. As Q-Unique puts it, "We're not underground, we're not commercial, we're a hip hop band." They're signed to rock indie Matador now and have at last got an album out. "We're interested in hip hop no matter where it comes from. Just persevering and surfacing and making its way into the world because hip hop right now is possibly one of the most powerful forms of music.

Are they Johnny-come-lately kids from the suburbs, then, telling everyone else how it should be done?

Hardly. Puerto Rican and Panamanian, children of Bushwick and the Bronx, The Arsonists have a true hip hop pedigree. Q-Unique has been a member of the Rocksteady Crew for 11 years and "just

recently Crazy Legs put the whole Arsonists crew down as the Rocksteady Crew MCs". So are they old skool?

They respect the roots of their music without being retro. Anyway, they re more than just one thing - the new album is by turns funny, funky, fucked-up, strange, straight-up and serious. "To me music or any form of art is supposed to come from the emotions. So that's what we did. It's a trip through different emotions.'

What are your main influences? Everything really – rock, funk, blues, jazz, reggae, classical, Detroit... I'm very into my analogue stuff, so early boogie stuff like Herbie Hancock. I love Earth Wind & Fire as well. Reggae was really important.

What's influencing you at the moment? Kings Of Tomorrow. I'm really into Angel Alanis – boy, he could give Armand Van Helden a run for his money.

Do you think the techno scene is moving more towards house again? I think we're heading back to that era where

we're gonna be able to play everything under the one roof and the way to move towards that is to slow the beats down. But I also think that techno will turn round on its head again. People like Umek and the Space D_{Z-} they're wicked, hard as fuck, so I don't know.

So what happened with The Advent? Nothing, it's just that I'd been on the road Rob Alcock/Tommy Gillard Nature Continual

The Ealing Techno Massive (ETM) prove that they're all cock and no bull with four slabs of dense, groove-fixated rhythms that'll have Lost and The Orbit screaming like big girl's blouses. Long may they continue(al). (SJ)

Tube Jerk Eight iLL

Tim Wright (aka Germ/Tube Jerk) continues to furrow his own, distinctive path as dense moods and schizophrenic tech-house turn into a sub-bass monster of arse-quaking proportions. With Buckfunk 3000's wobbly bleep-a-thon rework on the flip this should see you sharing breakfast with Kool Keith & Co after three-and-a-half listens precisely. Nurse! (SJ) ***

Rubberneck Pot Remixes Konsequent

Originally appearing on Hardfloor's Jackpot label in 1632 (approximately), Rubberneck (aka Swedish hot shot Cari Lekebusch) gets roasted over the dancefloor coals by Messrs Claude Young and Christian Morgenstern and Thomas Brinkmann from Germany for some prime time, jiggy bizniz with extra wobbly bits thrown in for nowt. **(SJ)**

Fenton/Thomas Mind Games EP Advanced

Heading straight for the Fenton side we find two heavy cuts of tough DJ tackle to blow your socks off to while the Thomas tracks, although lacking their counterparts' immediacy and invention, still manage enough right moves to pull it off on a big system. Game Fenton. **(SJ)**

M-DUBS tell us why they're one of London's best production duos

Who are M-Dubs?

Me, Dennis M and my partner Ras Kwame. We also own the Sugar Shack record shop in Hounslow.

How would you describe your sound?

Breakbeat funk. We don't really think of it as UK garage, because we're more sort of electronic disco. When we started we were more four-to-the-floor, but we changed.

What were your first and most recent productions?

Our first was 'M-Dubs Volume 1' on our own Babyshack label, about five years ago. It had 'Over Here' on it, one of our biggest tracks, which was licensed to BMG. We've got two tracks out just now, 'Bump 'N' Grind' and 'Body Killing' which is on our Madshack label.

What labels have you worked for? And under what names?

We always just do stuff under our own name on our own labels. But we have remixed Chantay Moore, Deetah, Sie, Anne-Marie Smith, London Jones, MC D and the 49'ers.

What's influencing you right now? Kwame listens to a lot of r&b, soul and hip make you move, and the vocals are not offensive, for a footballer. An all-round credible debut. **(S)**

Producer Profile

YVES DE RUYTER, production king of Bonzai Records and in demand trance remixer, presents his personal profile

How would you describe your sound? Music for the people!

What was the first record you made? 'Animals', a white label that came out nearly 10 years ago.

And the last?

'Factor-Y', my new single to be released in September. My first releases had that typical hard and fast Bonzaï sound. Now things are less fast and a combination of trance and techno.

What labels have you recorded for and under what aliases?

I've only recorded for Bonzai under names like Yves Deruyter, D&S, Extreme Trax, Interstate and Cherrymoon Trax. Bonzai has just launched in the UK, by the way.

What are your influences?

I've been DJing now for nearly 12 years. I started as a commercial jock and became one of the pioneers in Belgian techno music. I think that demonstrates that I'm pretty openminded! Recently, music by Kraftwerk,



What did you grow up listening to? I grew up with all kinds of music. I appreciate every style, even classical artists like Andrea Bocelli.

Will today's trance explosion last?

Perhaps things are exploding in the UK today, but Bonzai started its Progressive Trance label in 1994. Other countries have had trouble keeping up. Belgium, and Antwerp, where I live, move very fast.

Who is your favourite trance producer? MIKE, because he's able to make any kind of style, from club trance to techno trance via progressive trance!

Where is the best trance scene?

In Belgium, because we're open for any new thing!

EGATIVLAND'S story is a cautionary tale for anyone who's ever used an uncleared sample. Their 1991 EP 'U2' used sections from the Irish pomp-rockers' hit 'I Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For' alongside out-takes of US radio jock Casey Kasem describing the band in less than complimentary terms. Legal action forced the record to be withdrawn and almost bankrupted Negativland, who then embarked on a campaign to reform copyright law, stressing the crucial difference between creative appropriation and placiarism for profit.

creative appropriation and plagiarism for profit. 'Escape From Noise', though, was recorded in happier times. A collection of hilarious bitesized pastiches of everyone from radio pluggers ('Announcement') to heavy metal hedonists ('Backstage Pass') to ranting fundamentalists ('Christianity Is Stupid'), it's probably the best example of Negativland's undisputed mastery of sound collage. Recording since 1979 and coining the phrase 'culture jamming' to describe their method of manipulating 'found sound' to expose the inherent absurdity of mass media messages, Negativland are the obvious precursors not only to pop art pranksters like the KLF but also to satirists like Chris Morris and Michael Moore.

And where Negativland are concerned, life also tends to imitate art. A recent example: Fatboy Slim sampled 'Michael Jackson' from 'Escape From Noise' for his track of the same name (on 'Better Living Through Chemistry'). Norman paid \$1000 to SST – the label Negativland had by then severedalllinks with as a result of the 'U2' debacle – for use of the sample, despite the fact that the band "wouldn't have cared" if he'd used it for free. In fact, Negativland had themselves lifted the sample, *without* permission, from a 1966 religious flexi-disc which, the band say, "a Negativland member LITERALLY stole from the basement of a church in Concord, California." The Fatboy Slim track has apparently now been

The Fatboy Slim track has apparently now been licensed for use in a Coca-Cola commercial, thus indirectly implicating the king of big beat and everyone's favourite soft drink manufacturer in both copyright infringement and church-robbing. Now that's entertainment.

The Record Buyer's Guide To: Sasha

HILE he might have been overtaken in terms of commercial success by other socalled big name DJs in recent years, very few of them can match the aura of excitement and expectation that the name Sasha conjures up. To many Sasha will always be 'the man like. .' and even if they can't grasp the subtleties of his recent darker and deeper sets the legendary mystique surrounding those celebrated residencies at Shelly's, Shaboo, Venus and Renaissance lives on. Surprisingly, Sasha has not produced a large amount of solo work and he's admitted this is down to his own lacklustre approach. His first foray as B.M.Ex (Barry Manilow Experience) was with 'Apollonia' on VCR (1992, £10). This 60-minute opus was the epic/progressive house blueprint so often copied in the years to follow. The following year came the disappointing 'Together' with Danny Campbell. Barely adequate by his own standards, this and the follow-up 'Magic' can still be found quite cheaply. Around the same time (1993/'94) he released the 'Qat' (pronounced 'Ghat' after the leafy Eastern stimulant) Collections Volumes One and Two which were compilations of previously released material and are also guite easy to track down.

In 1996 came his most successful release so far with the Maria Naylor collaboration 'Be As One'. Quickly disappearing off the shelves, it now changes hands for up to £20-£30. The less anthemic follow-up 'Arkham Asylum', can be swapped for a clean pair of underwear. It's with Sasha's remix work that we strike gold, with the early Nineties being his best period. His first ever vinyl outing was his mix of Evolution, (lateralso to sign to Deconstruction), 'Came Outta Nowhere' on Positive Vinyl (1991), a ravey anthemic affair which goes for around £20. Of similar feel and price were his remixes of Evolution's next release, also on Positive Vinyl, 'Metropolis'. M-

People owe a lot to Sasha's studio skills, especially on the club classics 'Someday' and 'How Can I Love You More' (Deconstruction, 1992). Going back to 1991 Sasha hit the heights with his massive mix of Urban Soul's 'Alright' (Cooltempo, £15-20). Also in 1991 was his DMC mix of Jim Polo's 'Better Days' (DMC, £50) and an obscure mix of Orbital's 'Midnight' (ffrr, £30). The following years saw

him in great demand, remixing D-Ream, Jomanda, Mr Fingers, Judy Cheeks, Hysterix and even dog-on-string combos such as Eat Static and Hedningarna (bit of a mouthful, innit?), both the mixes of the latter artists going for £10-15. 1995 saw epic house fans drool over his mixes of The Reese Project's 'Direct Me' (Network, £10) and Seal's 'I'm Alive' (ZTT, £12), ably assisted by Brian Transeau for whom he remixed 'Embracing The Sunshine' (Perfecto Promo 2x12, £15). More recently Sasha has remixed various tracks for Madonna including 'Ray Of Light'. Limited promos of these vary in price from £20 to £50. A compilation of his early remixes was also available around 1993, so keep your eyes peeled.

Sasha completists won't be seen dead without a copy of his 2 Phat Cunts collaboration with BT, 'Ride' (Yoshitoshi 12-inch, 1996, £8). There are plans for a full album.

John Digweed has been Sasha's closest ally throughout the Nineties and their classic 'Renaissance' mixes released in 1994/'95 on the Network offshoot Six6 still set you back at least £20. Their 'Northern Exposure' series through Ministry Of Sound is a more subtle affair and the limited edition vinyl copies of 'Northern Exposure Volume One' (1996) go for up to £30. It is interesting that many of the tracks on these mixed compilations have steadily increased in value over the intervening years. Check out Sasha's Global Underground CD from this year for his sparser sound. But old school fans will want the old Mixmag Live CD containing the much bootlegged 'Blade Runner'/'Till We Meet Again' mix and there are also stacks of early 'Sasha at Shelly's etc etc' tapes doing the rounds.

Drum & bass don **Grooverider** puts the latest range of DJ effects units through their paces



DJing used to be such a simple art. You turned up with your records and headphones and you did your thing. But times change. Everybody, as De La Soul put it, wants to be a DJ. And so it's harder than ever to stand out from the wannabes.

Which explains the current boom in DJ accessories. From souped up mixers to external EQ units and effects boxes, technology that was once either too bulky or plain expensive to haul out of the studio is appearing behind the decks. Not that the old guard seems to mind. At least, that veteran of acid house, hardcore, jungle and drum & bass, Grooverider, seems to be enjoying himself.

He doesn't seem to mind being stuck inside the box-sized DJ room of his south London residence on the hottest day of the year so far. He's more interested in subjecting his copy of Links' 'Close Your Eyes And Listen' to all manner of sonic manipulation through the tiny box that's perched on his mixer.

"You'll have to watch me," he tells us with a booming laugh, "I'll carry on all day if I get the chance." That's fine by us. We are here, after all, to test out a

selection of the latest gizmos for DJs. The first of which, the Korg Kaoss Pad (£250), seems to be rather to Groove's taste. With speak and spell-style pads that light up and instant access to a barrage of effects and filters, not to mention a built-in sampler for dropping in extra loops, it's tailor-made for use in front of an audience.

"Oh yeah," continues Groove, "this is good. Check this filter."

The music dives suddenly and then gradually resurfaces. It's a sound straight out of the Daft Punk 'Homework' handbook. His final verdict?

"Some of the effects are wicked, but it's also quite hard to control. Good fun to mess about with, but I

wouldn't use it as a DJ. I don't think I'd be able to predict what it was going to do accurately."

We move on to the Vestax Graphic Frequency Eliminator (£195), a tiny metal box that the average DJ could squeeze into his pocket. It's a six band EQ unit to help DJs trim their vinyl into shape in painstaking detail. Cream apparently liked them so much they bought nine and added one to each of the club's decks. Grooverider seems equally impressed. "Oh yeah, I've seen these before," he says. "They're definitely smart." He starts by dropping the bass clean out of

the mix - a clinical slice any Harley Street doctor would be proud of.

"It's good for an EQ unit, definitely," Groove pronounces. "The separation between the frequencies is really clean and tight, it's good enough to use in the studio really. A lot of EQ units simply aren't that clean - because you've got those extra bands you can control the sound a lot more closely.

Red Sound's Federation Pro (£549) is next under the microscope. Endowed with more knobs than the House Of Lords, the Pro is a MIDI-friendly box of effects controlled by a four-way joystick, meaning you can put four different effects onto the music at the same time and then mix them together or pan them around the room.

"Yeah, it's good," says Groove, without going overboard. "Although I think you'd need a couple of months of experimenting to really get inside it. Like with the Kaoss Pad, there's almost too many effects here - in a club situation you need something you can switch on and roll with straight away. As a DJ I'm too busy to fiddle around with something as complicated as this.

So what would Groove use himself? "This..." he says, indicating his own Pioneer DJM 500 mixer (£799). "This is the fucking bomb." It's a pretty hefty mixer in its own right, what with a BPM counter and built-in three band EQ controls on each channel. Rather than coming overloaded with effects, though, the DJM 500 only contains about six or seven basic effects like phasing, delay and timestretch, all easily manipulated using just one fader.

"I started seeing them when I was on tour in Australia last year. The moment I got back I had to buy one, because for DJing it's fucking perfect. There are only a few things in there, but everything I need as a DJ is here and you can switch it on and get going without having to set anything up. It's the king mixer at the moment.

And it sounds it. He restarts the record for what must be fifteenth time and then swoops through a quick succession of sonic tricks which really bring the vinyl to life. It's nothing less than gobsmacking, And somehow we know that Grooverider, as we suspected, isn't going be seeing much daylight today.

Stupidly heavy, of course - I nearly gave myself a hernia carting it around to gigs. But it was one of the first keyboards that had MIDI - I was top kid on my block for a while. It's nothing like a computer, you just switch it on and get going. Loads of people have used them in the past, although they're mainly horrendous Eighties bands, I have to say. But there are some really cool house records that use it too: Larry Heard used one, I know that. People have realised it's a pretty tasty bit of gear again. For a few years you could pick it up dirt cheap, but these days one in good condition could fetch between £600 and £700. I couldn't part with mine now."

Where did they get that from?

Basement Jaxx: 'Same Old Show' (XL) Sample from The Selecter: 'On My Radio' (Two Tone/Chrysalis)

Simon Ratcliffe: "We did it about a year ago. Rather than playing the latest house tunes, we'd go into the studio and make up a track of our own, just to have something different in our DJ box.

"I was 11 when 'On My Radio' came out and it kind of reminded me of my childhood. We have got a copy on seven-inch somewhere, but we bought a CD of it

to sample. The bit we sampled is from the bridge of the track. It's very English. Quite crude and punky. We've been called 'punk garage' a lot, but his is the real garage punk' track on the album. It's

oi'-ness about it.

"The other bits we added are from KRS-One's 'Hip Hop Versus Rap' and an Armand Van Helden mix of Veda Simpson's 'Ooh Baby', which is where the moaning comes from. I think we did it all in about three hours. We just wanted to do a record that would make people go bananas.

"We always got an incredible reaction whenever we played it out, so in the end we decided to put it on the album.

"A lot of kids who are between 18 and 20 probably don't know the original and they seem to love it. But we do get people coming up to us saying they loved The Selecter's version and they love this too.

"It was a statement about the house scene at the time. The energy and balls had gone out of it. It was the same old show, we were hearing the same old ideas over and over again. So we decided to do something about it.

just two years ago but have already formed a formidable deep house DJ partnership. Tamma used to spin warm-up sets at raves back in his native South Africa but moved to London because it's "the main place for dance music". Similar reasons prompted Scotsman O'Connell's relocation. They say their tag-team sets are all about feeling and keeping a smooth edge throughout. They're frustrated by clubs which they feel are "too banging" and by the fact that DJs often play safe rather than experimental. So far their gigs have been confined to bars and a one-off Notting Hill Carnival party but feel that their musical chemistry will see them through. They've made the inevitable move into production and have knocked out a few tracks which they're hawking round the labels. If they're just half as good as this mix, we're in for some quality grooves indeed.
