

### **Dance devolution?**







### 1. Faithless

Take The Long Way Home (Cheeky)

What more can we say about the best live band in Britain?
Faithless have taken their globe-straddling house sounds all over the world and 'Take The Long Way Home' is an apt reminder of life on the road. While rapper Maxi Jazz preaches to the converted, Sister Bliss hits her Korg with unrelenting enthusiasm behind him. This track was recorded for Lamacq Live earlier this year.

### Les Rythmes Digitales

What's That Sound (Wall Of Sound)

Jacques Lu Cont has spent the last two years honing his energetic live show at festivals across Europe. With a love of jumpsuits and all things Eighties, Jacques likes nothing better than to slap his bass in front of a heaving crowd. Think Howard Jones after a crash course in breakbeat – "What's That Sound" is a squealing synth-driven effort recorded live at Creamfields.

### 3. Hybrid

Dreaming Your Dreams (Distinctive)

Having guested live at both Bedrock and the Ministry, breakbeat collective Hybrid are about to entrance us all over again on the Ericsson Muzik Awards Tour. Think BT with strings or Sasha at his most symphonic. And with former Twin Peaks vocalist Julee Cruise joining the cause, it's little wonder the band are incapable of standing still onstage. Either way, you won't want to miss out. 'Dreaming Your Dreams' was recorded at the MOS Film Studios in Moscow and at Unique Studios in New York.

### 4. Goldie

Timeless (Inner City Life) (London)

When Goldie's live show hit Heaven last year, Noel Gallagher was lured out of his house to play alongside him. 'Timeless (Inner City Life)' is arguably jungle's archetypal moment, an uplifting drum & bass cut that took Goldie into the mainstream. With a seven piece set-up orchestrated by the man himself, Goldie's live show is an incendiary experience that takes no prisoners. He jumps, he screams, he dances like a maniac, 'Timeless' was recorded live at Glastonbury in 1995.

### 5. Phats & Small

Turn Around (Multiply)

With a penchant for brightlycoloured beach shirts and
childish onstage antics,
Brighton duo Jason Phats and
Russell Small took 'Turn
Around' all around the world
earlier this year. Featuring
breezy vocals from a man
known only as Ben, this
version of 'Turn Around' was
recorded live at Bar M in San
Antonio – the ideal setting for
an Ibiza anthem of such
proportions. Just listen to the
crowd singing along!


T'S not long since live dance music was an oxymoron. A sick kind of musician's joke. Back then, PAs would consist of a bloke in a gas mask and a scantily clad bird 'singing' a sample. Or at best a 'keyboard wizard' with a box of wires and a periscope. No wonder we felt cheated.

When one hit wonders went the way of Guru Josh, real artists stepped in to fill the void. Acts like Underworld and The Prodigy took the raw intensity of rave and turned it into a real rock 'n' roll experience. Out went

the dodgy vocals, DATs and streams of dry ice. In came lights, cameras and more than a little action. Crisp beats and booming bass finally collided with smiling faces and pounding feet – and the live dance spectacle finally became an interactive experience.

It's not hard to see what's happened since then. When Leftfield stormed Brixton Academy three years ago, the ceiling crumbled in fear. The Chemical Brothers are now stadium-sized superstars and Faithless aren't far behind. Orbital are due to play 'Chime' at midnight as part of Cream's New Year celebrations in Liverpool. Intense and all-embracing, they all create an atmosphere that vinyl alone cannot compete with. Live dance music a joke? Not in 1999.

Radio 1 has a great tradition of supporting live music. Whether it's Glastonbury or lbiza, the station has embraced live dance culture in all its forms. And thanks to them, you're about to experience even more.



### 6. Propellerheads

Take California (Wall of Sound)

From their early days in Bath to the very top of the big beat pile, the Propellerheads have always given the crowd something to shout about. While Alex Gifford slaps bass and hammers on his Hammond, Will White hits the decks and drums like a man possessed. And 'Take cliffornia' is the track that broke them, an almighty breakbeat chugger recorded here for John Peel's show in 1996.

### 7. Laurent Garnier

Crispy Bacon (PIAS Recordings)

Gallic legend Laurent Garnier got everyone cooking when he made his live debut at Creamfields last year – this was raw, twitching techno at its finest. Surrounded by a wall of keyboards and some breathtaking technological wizardry, this was one live show that refused to rely on a trusty DAT machine. But it was the undulating funk of 'Crispy Bacon' which really took the biscuit. This version is taken from that show.

### 8. Freestylers

B-Boy Stance (Freskanova)

With a full band, MCs, DJs and a pair of champions busting moves, the Freestylers have shattered preconceptions of live dance music. Featuring ruffneck ragga vocals from Mr Tenor Fly, 'B-Boy Stance' is a jump-up favourite at every festival the Freestylers have ever visited. This track was recorded for the Lamacq Live Party earlier this year.

### 9. Rae & Christian Featuring Peter Parker and Sneaky (Finga Thing)

Ffathead (Grand Central)

When Rae & Christian took to the road, they found new friends in every town. The Manchester collective took street soul and hip hop and blended it into something unique, like Massive Attack and A Tribe Called Quest sharing the mic. This track was recorded live in Manchester.

### 10. Plastikman

PP001 (Mute)

Richie Hawtin is an uncompromising little fella and his live shows have always been intense affairs. Brutal and bruising, Plastikman constantly washes his disciples in thick acid baths. The live experience is an insistent mix of decks, FX and 909s. This track was recorded especially for Plastik fan John Peel in 1994.

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# Ericsson Muzik Awards 1999





HE winners of the Ericsson Muzik Awards 1999 are announced in London on Thursday October 14th. The event is hosted by Pete Tong and Zoe Ball and is now widely regarded as dance music's Oscars. The winners of the 26 categories are mostly selected by Muzik, apart from the five main awards which are voted for by Muzik readers. These are Best Album, Single, Club, DJ and the Radio 1 Award for Best Essential Mix. The event is the biggest in dance culture and this year takes place at London's Gainsborough Film

Studios. The private aftershow party includes DJs Trevor Nelson, Carl Cox, Danny Rampling, Gilles Peterson and very special guests, while nominated clubs are inviting key loyal clubbers to help with the party celebrations. If you haven't been invited, you can hear a special live broadcast from the event on Radio 1 from midnight-2am on Friday 15th, before Pete Tong's annual Awards special on his Friday Essential Selection show. Finally, on the Saturday (October 16th), Radio 1 will re-broadcast the winning Best Essential Mix. See below for a final look at the nominations

ecember 1995. Six months after Muzik launches, we decide to provide the scene with its own Oscars. May 1996 Pete Tong hosts the first awards

in Birmingham, in conjunction with Radio 1 and MTV. Danny Rampling and Carl Cox have a stand-off, Nicky Holloway strips naked at the party and Danny Tenaglia and Carl Cox tear the roof off at Bakers. Cream wins Best Club and some twat called Robert Miles wins

Best Single. How did that happen?


July 1997 Tong hosts year two in Bristol.
The Sun sponsors Best Single, Frankie Knuckles is overcome with emotion as he wins the Outstanding Contribution to Dance accolade, and Fabio & Grooverider win Best Radio Show and fly straight out to Ibiza to

continue the party.

October 1998 Zoe Ball joins Pete Tong as host and Ericsson sponsors the entire event. Kate Moss, Noel Gallagher and Tara Palmer-Tomkinson attend. Gatecrasher wins Best Club, Tall Paul wins Best DJ and Danny Rampling wins the Contribution gong and is chuffed to bits. The best event yet. April 1999 Muzik team compiles a wish-

list for a Muzik Live Tour which is not far from the final roll-call: Faithless, Groove Armada, Hybrid and Paul Van Dyk. Oh, and some bloke called Rob Da Bank. October 1999 The Ericsson Muzik

Awards take place on Thursday October 14th and the Live Tour kicks off in Birmingham. The star count looks bigger than ever, while the battle for the DJ, Club and Best Album awards gathers momentum as people even try to place bets at the local bookies! A real coming of age.

### Latest London superclub postpones opening

ITH its grand opening only three days away, the launch of new London club Fabric has been postponed. Nicky Smith, Head of Promotions at the latest London superclub, said neither the management nor promotions team were happy with the club. "The finishes aren't in place. At a real push we could open this weekend. The

problem is not having the time to test it all out. And the bar system isn't here yet.

"We just can't open without everything being in place," Smith continued. "We can't take the risk of the power going off or the toilets being blocked. It wouldn't be fair to the public or the staff."

At the time of press, Fabric were unsure whether the original DJ line-up would

change. "We will endeavour to make the line-up the same," said Smith, "but it's down to the availability of the acts."

The club will now open on Thursday October 21st. "You'll get a good idea of what Fabric is about on one night. One room will be a representation of the Friday and the other a representation of the Saturday," Smith said. All tickets for Friday 1st October and Saturday 2nd October will now be valid for Thursday 21st October.

# Clubbers steal cats' eyes off roads!

Noutbreak of theft on roads in the West Midlands is being blamed on clubbers Clubbers from Sundissential and Gatecrasher are being blamed for the sudden absence of cats' eyes on the road. Power cut disrupts Ministry's birthday



POWER cut forced the Ministry Of Sound's eighth birthday party on September 18th to close early. "It happened at about 5.05am," said a spokesperson for the Ministry. "There was a power failure at LEB. We tried in vain to find the source. Because of the size of the problem we were told it would take four hours to resolve. Three surrounding buildings were also affected. On the advice of the police, we were told to evacuate.'

For about 25 minutes everyone stood around waiting for something to happen," said one eye witness. "Then one of the bouncers shouted for us to evacuate.

Although some punters complained that the situation wasn't clear, most received re-entry vouchers for another night.

"Re-entry passes are valid for six weeks on a Friday or Saturday," said the spokesperson. "They will also be valid for Erick Morillo's next appearance on November 20th. David Morales was very disappointed and we're in talks with Def Mix to get him again before the end of the year."

Reasons for the power cut remain unclear. Some sources at The Ministry claim that it was deliberate sabotage, although the spokesperson ruled this out as other buildings had also been affected.

### Paris Techno Parade: Better than Love Parade?

HE second annual Paris Techno Parade took place in brilliant sunshine on September 18th, with an estimated 500,000 partygoers lining the six kilometre city centre route.

Some 42 official floats passed through the French capital from Place de la Republique to the Pelouse de Reuilly, a park in the north of the city where a free of charge float 'soundclash' was held until 11pm.

Floats came from all over Europe, with the UK represented by The End Soundsystem (a 'Garden Of Eden'-themed float with Mr C, Layo and Matthew 'Bushwacka' B on the decks) and the psychedelic sounds of Escape From Samsara.

Techno Parade organiser Eric Morand of F Comm commented: "The first Techno Parade sent a clear signal to the French authorities that techno music is a serious force in France, and that as a cultural group, we will not be discriminated against.

This year, the parade was better and the quality of the floats was higher, and the security was excellent. As a festival, I believe the diversity of Techno Parade is closer to Notting Hill Carnival. The event is more creative and less commercial than, say, Berlin's Love Parade, and the variety of music, from Latin through to techno, is much wider.

Techno Parade is now one of the major festivals in France, and next year we hope to march down the Champs Elysees," he concluded.

# Platipus

Give trance a chance—the label that's ripping through the UK's dancefloors

NOW your trance? Then name the biggest-selling trance single of all time and the label that released it. Give up? Well, it's Platipus, the independent imprint founded above an East End knocking shop in 1993. It's the home of Art Of Trance, Poltergeist and Union Jack. It's also very fucking cool.

Platipus went massive in 1995 when Robert Miles' 'Children' went platinum just about everywhere. In a soundscape of monster trancers, this was Godzilla. Yet Platipus is rarely mentioned alongside Additive, Perfecto or Hook. Fronted by softly spoken Simon Berry, who records as Art Of Trance, the label has released 63 workouts in seven seamlessly successful years.

seamlessly successful years.
"I first got into house," explains Simon, "at school in Dorset. Then I moved to London to get nearer the music scene and ended up selling advertising for a dodgy rave mag, I was a regular at Troll, Chemistry and The Drum Club. Next came Platipus, and our first single 'Deeper Than Deep'."

'Deeper' and top trancers like 'Two Full Moons And A Trout' went down like rhubarb and custards with the leather-trousered clubbers of the time. Then, in 1994, came a defining moment for the label. "We were in the Firestone Club in Orlando," explains Simon, "listening to Florida DJ Kimble Collins. He dropped one of only two acetates in existence at the time of Robert Miles 'Children'. We rushed back to England, signed it and had a hit on our hands."

Its success allowed Platipus to produce the next 35 hits, including the Ferry Corsten-mixed Top 40 smash 'Madagascar', Oakey fave 'Calling Your Name' and forth coming Art Of Trance album, 'Voice Of Earth.'

So what does Platipus make of the explosion in trance, 1999 style? "It's great," smiles Simon. "We wouldn't have believed it a year ago. But Platipus isn't about to change its philosophy. Platipus is about making and signing music that moves me. That's the way it's going to stay. Forever!" Don't you just love a successful idealist? (DF)



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

### Superstar DJ, heavyweight champ

HIS month I returned to Amnesia in Corsica. I was only meant to do a four-hour set, but I ended up playing six hours, till 8am, with police helicopters buzzing overhead to see why people were still there. A great party island that's untouched by even the 18-30 crowd.

After an unscheduled gig at BCM in **Majorca**, I stayed for three days' holiday as I've

just bought a villa there, in the mountains. Most DJs buy in Ibiza, but in Majorca there's more space to enjoy the island for what it is. After the break, it was over to **Greece**. First gig was Cocus in Thessaloniki. Then Cavo Paradiso in Mykonos, which is spectacular. It's on top of a mountain overlooking the sea. It was so beautiful I went on at 5am and couldn't get off the decks until 11am. A real night-intoday set. I'd recommend Mykonos to anyone.

When it comes to the **Radio 1 Roadshow**, you can forget all about the bad old days of Bruno Brookes and **Timmy Mallet**. This year, I did a date for them in Brighton, with **Tong**, Pearce and Phats & Small. 5,000 people all getting it for free, in a real picture postcard scene – sun setting, sea lapping, pier lighting up. Great fun.

i always knew Creamfields was going to be one of the go-mental festivals of the year. Cream just never put a foot wrong. This was the best – the highlight of Liverpool clubbing. From Creamfields, it was straight onto another private jet (chartered by MTV), to take me to the MTV party at El Divino in Ibiza. I'd never played El Divino and everything they say is true. It's a really nice club.

Two American nights then one in **Boston** at Axis (full of Irish people reminding me about all the old raves I used to play in Ireland!). Watch out for the club next door, Avalon, which opens soon – definitely one for the 21st century! Then our residency at **Twilo**, in New York, which for me still has THE best sound system in the world. No sleep and straight to the airport to get Concorde to make it back in time for Homelands in Scotland. All through my set, people were screaming for it to be turned up. I did my best and turned my monitors round so the people at the front could hear. Clubland is really being stifled right now by poor sound systems – it's one reason why I spend so much

### John & Daniel Kelly

DJ **John Kelly** spends most of the summer in Ibiza, dropping uplifting house and trance bombs. His teenage son Daniel made his DJ debut on the white island this summer

### **Daniel on John**

"MY dad and I have always been close – as close as you can get, really. He's my dad! We've lived together for 19 years and he hasn't thrown me out! And he's always been fair. We grew up in a working class area – that's putting it mildly. It was like Beirut – we lived in the roughest part of the roughest part of Liverpool! But I got 11 GCSEs at school and only three others got more than five. It was a terrible school – they used to teach us to rob cars at dinner time! I always wanted to DJ but my dad tried to dissuade me. I'm 19 now and I've done my Alevels, so he's got no choice. It's up to me.

"The first record I bought was probably Mr Blobby. I remember it was Number One for Christmas. Obviously my taste has improved since then!

"The first time I played at Amnesia I was really nervous. I couldn't look up for the first two or three records. Then my confidence built up. I played for two hours and went on to play for three hours at Bugged Out as well. It was half empty when I went on. Half an hour later it was

rammed. Next door Dave Clarke was brilliant. But I was better. My friends were all made up – a couple of them came over to see me play.

"I've got a sister, Sinead. She's 10 years old and she's already a star. She's the biggest show-off! She loves the attention. If she's got an audience, she'll sing and dance all day. Grandad was an entertainer and I think you either go against what they do or follow them."

### John on Daniel

DANIEL's always been a quick learner. He was walking by the time he was eight or nine months old. Daniel was quite a good kid: we never had the police at our door. He was never a bully. I never encouraged him to be a DJ. I used to lock him out of the cellar because he trashed the place and left records out – but he always used to find the key. I always said 'forget the DJing and do some schoolwork instead'.

"I hardly went to school myself. I didn't take my exams. So I came out of school with nothing. When acid house broke we wore sunglasses and carried inflatable lilos. Actually, we were doing this before we'd even heard of house music.

"My decks were in Daniel's bedroom for a long time. He's been brought up since the age of 10 in that environment. I said I'd get him a gig when he finished school. To me, he sounds very much like an American DJ like Sneak or Sanchez and he can mix as well as any of them.

"Last week we played together on the terrace at Space. It was a proud

moment. He's going to take a course in production and piano lessons.

"Am I pleased he's DJing? I'm more pleased that he's passed his A-levels!"



# Warp Factor 10



10 years old and better than ever, Warp Records really will always be with you





YOU couldn't get arrested with dance music when we started," Rob Mitchell recalls of Warp's beginnings in Sheffield. "It was literally 25 to 50 shrinkwrapped records from America." A decade later, in the same city, 25,000 ravers are set to see in the new millennium at Gatecrasher. Dance music may be in its most commercially successful phase yet, but back in 1990, Leeds duo LFO's 'LFO' – Warp's fifth release – broke the mould by spending 10 weeks in the charts, reaching Number 12 and selling 120,000 copies. One small step for a band, perhaps, but a giant bleep for mankind.

"At the time it seemed very normal, but looking back now it seems surprising because you realise how hard it is to get a record like LFO into the charts," admits Steve Beckett, who alongside Rob Mitchell, correctly figured that the white labels people brought into their Warp record shop-records like Unique 3's 'The Theme' and 'Dextrous' by Nightmares On Wax, influenced by Chicago and Detroit but with a hard, uniquely British edge - had the potential to connect with an audience outside the Sheffield club/warehouse party scene centred around DJs like Parrot (formerly of Sweet Exorcist, now of All Seeing I) and The Forgemasters' Winston Hazel. It was the beginning of their 10-year commitment to releasing what they simply call "interesting and innovative" music.

So as bleep gave way to what Parrot describes as "banging pianos and hardcore", Warp moved in a totally different direction. "People who were influenced by Kraftwerk, Depeche Mode and Cabaret Voltaire were making dance music, then suddenly realised that they were allowed to make experimental music as well," Steve explains. "The dance scene opened people up to that kind of music."

The result was Warp's 'Artificial Intelligence' compilation and series of albums, giving soonto-be household names like Aphex Twin, Autechre and Black Dog space to develop their sound beyond the stricter rhythms of club floors, and wooing both the rave set, who used them as comedown soundtracks, and the more hesitant, album-oriented indie crowd to the 'electronic listening' fold.

'We reinvent ourselves every year," says Rob. "Not always in a big way, like with 'Artificial Intelligence', but spreading our tentacles into more and more areas." Like releasing records as diverse as the guitardriven John Barry-isms of Broadcast, Squarepusher's twisted jazz odysseys, the Open University analogue pop of Plone and Aphex Twin's homage to Miami bass, 'Windowlicker', complete with its controversial Chris Cunningham video.

"We still do leftfield, interesting music, but we sell a lot of records worldwide. It's not mainstream, we just market it successfully," Steve stresses. "But you can't market shit. If the music's shit people won't buy it."

"Unless it wins the Mercury Music Prize," Rob interjects, astutely. "All we wanted was to do something along the lines of Factory or Mute-very individualistic labels that did things their own way and put out great music." And for the next 10 years?

"We just want to be the best alternative label in the world." (TM)

### **Richie Hawtin**

Warp was very influential in Detroit. When John Acquaviva and I made our first record for Plus 8 we fused the Detroit sound with the British bleep sound. We wouldn't have done it without records like Sweet Exorcist and the Forgemasters.

### Billy, Plone

"We all bought Warp stuff before we signed to the label – we were admirers of Aphex Twin and more recent stuff like Squarepusher and Broadcast. You can't pin a label on them different genres come and go, but Warp will outlive them all."



### Winston Hazel, Forgemasters/Moloko Sound System

"When Warp's artists started making music, it commanded an outlet and made the dance scene more accessible, so the music industry started taking an interest and people started to think 'we could do this as well'. They've always gone their own way."

### Richard Thair, Red Snapper

People often say 'What are Red Snapper doing on an electronic label?', but Warp's really more of an experimental label - they're always trying to stretch it more and more. I'd like to thank them for having the bottle to back us.





### Andy Turner, Plaid

They've never let fashion dictate their output and they've always made the right choices. But in the future they should focus on their act called Plaid, drop everyone else, do some heavy marketing and go all out for global domination...

### Parrot, Sweet Exorcist/All Seeing I

'Various factors came together to create the bleep sound in Sheffield-industrial and electronic music, the heavy bass of dub and the remnants of the soul scene. Stripped back tunes with lots of clicks and bleeps just made sense. Recently Warp have put out a lot of records that sound to me like noodling, jazz-rock fusion - but it's worked for them so that's brilliant."





### BOOK Last Night A DJ Saved My Life by Bill Brewster & Frank Broughton

YOU may shake your head, smile, mock, or turn away, but this dance madness proves nonetheless that the man of the machine age with his necessary

wristwatch and his brain in a constant ferment of work, worry and calculation has just as much need of the dance as the primitive. For him the dance is life on another plane."


There's always been a beat. Curt Sachs wrote the above about the tango in 1937. The sentiments still ring true today.

Over to Bill and Frank: "A truly great DJ can make a whole room fall in

love. When he wipes away our everyday lives with holy drums and sanctified basslines, we are quite prepared to think of him as a god." Maybe Faithless were right – God is a DJ. Paul Oakenfold – now officially the biggest DJ in the world – is only too aware of the power he has over the punters. "When people pay £15 to come and see me, they want the best night of their lives," he says. "So that's why I have to get into character."

Rather than follow the tried and tested route that takes in the golden age of acid house, Last Night... traces the history of the DJ over the last 90 years, from the early days to today's climate of hero-worshipped vinyl enthusiasts. From counterculture to mainstream leisure, the DJ has always been at the heart of clubland and Last Night... traces this story back to the Thirties. The first half is a fascinating insight into the roots of the DJ, noting the first recorded use of the term 'disc jockey' in Variety magazine in August 1941. Later, Brewster and Broughton argue that Northern soul provided an early blueprint for rave culture before examining the turntablist's role in disco, hip hop, house and techno and concluding with essays on the DJ as 'artist', 'outlaw' and 'superstar'.

Though the modern side of the tale has been told before, Last Night... is still an illuminating, thoughtful and insightful tome. (RM)



### "Wake Up America, You're **Dead!**"

### New Music Seminar, New York, 1990

What was it? This annual industry bash—which spawned Britain's In The City—provided a week-long mix of music, speech and controversy. UK presence in 1990 was high. Among the panels was 'Wake Up America – You're Dead!', chaired by motor-mouthed svengali Tony Wilson, boss of Factory Records (Happy Mondays/New Order) and The Haçienda.

**Who was there?** Joining Tony were techno auteur Derrick May, Chicago house DJ Marshall Jefferson, Happy Mondays' manager Nathan McGough and Wilson's friend 'Dr' Keith Allen.

What happened? Wilson launched an eloquent tirade against American dance music, claiming that it took a bunch of Limeys to make house music great. Keith Allen was at his most mischievous. "Listen Derrick, I might have white skin but I'm black for fuck's sake!" May was not impressed. "Our DJs are technically better than yours!" he fumed.

What do they say now? Wilson is unrepentant. "You learn the truth – that America is very strange. Derrick's a loony, he's completely neurotic! We had the best possible intentions – unfortunately, I turned up with my two mates! Keith Allen said to Derrick, 'Look at me, I'm black!' In America, you just don't do that. People just don't understand Keith..."

What do we say now? Wilson was saying that it took a select crew of Brits to make house music great at a time when it was being ignored in the US. When things got personal, Marshall and Derrick stormed off. 'Wake Up...' was a real culture clash. But we're on the same side now. Right, Derrick?

When and where were you born? Sunderland

When and how did you start DJing? I started at school, then I was booked to do an under 18s night at Stern's in Worthing in 1985. I wasn't quite playing for girls in uniform. .. but almost! I stayed with Stem's until the club was closed down years later. The other residents were Grooverider, Carl Cox and Colin Faver. I was playing with the big boys! So why are you breaking through as a DJ

now, and didn't then? In 1991 I was diagnosed as having lung cancer which had spread to my stomach. I was given three months to live. I had never even smoked! For three years, I basically existed on chemotherapy in hospital. I was looking death straight in the face, and all I could think about was that my career was finished before it had started. I had to stop working for four years.

How would you describe your set? It's trance. I've been playing trance right from the start. At the moment I prefer the harder, driving,

Where do you buy your records? I use Massive in Oxford for their excellent mail order service. I also shop at Choci's and Plastic Fantastic in London.

What is your mixing style? I like to keep things as smooth as possible, as if a two hour set is one long remix, with no gaps that anyone can spot.

How do women react to your sets? Well, you do get groupies. They want it in the box, they want to twiddle my knob, but I keep a special extendable stick to beat them off. (Oh come off it-Ed)

What's with the '00' name? Er, it's a tenuous link. Ian Fleming wrote the Bond books, and the other thing is I've always been a gadget man. Unlike the real Bond, I am loyal to Emma, my own Miss Moneypenny, though!

Favourite labels? Platipus, Eve, Data, React, Hooj, Additive, Whoop, Prolekult and Hook. Favourite DJs? It's got to be Rampling. He's got such a great aura about him. Also Graham Gold. Say what you like, but he's worth his weight.

Setting the tone for the tape with some classic soul from the man who set the standard for all crooners. I dare you not to sing along. Obviously not my era, but I probably heard it on Radio 1 back in the Seventies. I know the first two lines and then the rest is just a blur.



### 2. Stevie Wonder

As (Motown) George and Mary [Michael and J Blige, in case you're not on first name terms—

Ed/recently exposed this gem from my favourite album of all time, 'Songs In The Key Of Life'. It's the song that has it all, including an amazing gospel crescendo. It's almost impossible to choose a favourite Stevie Wonder song, but I've chosen this because of the way it changes pace and tempo. He is the greatest of all time, and not just because of the way he overcame his disability.



### 3. Earth, Wind & Fire

Fantasy (CBS)
I most definitely
grew up with this
band. They were
the first group I ever

saw live, at Wembley Arena, and I nearly died and went to heaven when they performed this. When I bought it I played the record about 20 times on the trot. Philip Bailey's voice complements Maurice White's perfectly. They're my top band ever.

### 4. Chaka Khan

Sweet Thing (WEA)
Aretha is the greatest of all time, but
Chaka in her day had the flava. A
vocalist with incredible vocal range,
this one's very mellow to be honest,
just beautiful. I used to play this when I
first started DJing at blues parties, a
kind of spliffed-up, end of the night, get
in the mix with a girl type of tune, if you
get my drift.

### 5. D'Angelo

Brown Sugar (Cooltempo) Well where did he come from? R&B seriously needed this guy and he delivered. This cut is old skool and pure vibes with a slight hip hop attitude and those vocals epitomise nu classic soul. He made me believe again: I was his A&R manager in the UK and he inspired me to sign Lynden David Hall.

### 6. Dave Brubeck

Take 5 (CBS

Five beats to the bar – a unique record and seriously cool drumming with a lazy saxophone. I wish I was around in the Sixties in the same smoky hangout, it's so damn groovy! I bought this when I was going through my jazz fusion days and thought I was a bit of a jazz dancer in the early Eighties.

### 7. Staple Singers

Let's Do It Again (Stax)
Written and produced by Curtis
Mayfield with Mavis Staples on vocals—
the perfect marriage. A melodic handclapper oozing soul. It was the title
track of a very funny movie starring
Sidney Poitier and Bill Cosby. One of
those songs that comes alive on the
soundtrack, a bit like 'Car Wash', but
more mellow. Curtis was the master of
soundtracks, he could really capture
that moment in time.

#### Side Two

### 1. Roy Ayers

Everybody Loves The Sunshine (Polydor) One of the artists who inspired my record collection, his most famous song that never dates, the man that made the vibes [vibraphone, a bit like an electric xylophone] popular and one of the most sampled artists in black music history. I've got about 30 Roy Ayers albums. I was mad! The first album I ever bought was one of his, but when I got it home it had the wrong record in it, so I took it back to Our Price and got Earth Wind & Fire's 'Greatest Hits' instead. But the intention was there.

#### 2. Prince

The Ballad of Dorothy Parker (Paisley Park) This track sounds as if it's running off centre, typical of Prince in his heyday. An irresistible bassline from my favourite album from the little man, 'Sign Of The Times'. I was never a massive fan of his albums on the whole, just particular tracks. This is one of them.

### 3. The Isley Brothers

Between The Sheets (Epic)
The original bump & grind ballad from
the inspirational Isleys, with one of the
greatest voices in r&b Ronald on lead. R
Kelly always credited this band with
formulating his sound. I used to
hammer this on pirate Kiss FM. It was
phat in '83 and still is today – ouch!



### 4. James Brown

King Heroin (King) Although I'm a massive fan of James and his incomprehensible

lyrics and grooves, occasionally, like on 'Say It Loud, I'm Black And I'm Proud', he made total sense. 'King Heroin' makes you sit and listen to the lyrics. James was inspired without the grunting and yelping. Dope!

### 5. Curtis Mayfield

Pusherman (Curtom)
I almost died the day I heard that Curtis was confined to a wheelchair. I'd only just met him a few years earlier in a hat shop in Soho, while he was over in London playing at the old Town & Country Club. He hadn't lost it and this was the standout track. Ever political, ever mellow.

### 6. Nina Simone

Baltimore (RCA)
She's a little crazy and misunderstood.
Known mainly for 'My Baby Just Cares
For Me', this is a song with a quirky
reggae feel. There's not a lot to say
about Nina Simone except that she's
a nutter and a genius.


### 7. Lauryn Hill


Zion (Ruffhouse)






Bagley's on Saturday is London's biggest night out. With the help of Freedom, London truly swings again


TRIP to Freedom is like a voyage to the past, the present and the future all at the same time. . . and no, that isn't the acid talking. Firstly, the club's home at Bagley's Studios, however many cosmetic adjustments the management make, will forever be a warehouse venue straight outta 1989. Need convincing? Then just stand by the toilets, and within three minutes someone will ask, "swiggeryerwatermate?" It's guaranteed, or your tenner back.

Secondly, since its launch in 1996, Freedom has been one of London's busiest nights out, averaging 2,500 pumped-up punters. In Ibiza this year, too, Freedom at Es Paradis pulled some of the biggest crowds on the island. The place is a superclub on the quiet.

Lastly, consider Freedom's music policy,

which allows for five different rooms ranging from garage via nu disco to banging trance, with the main resident playing a mammoth eight hour set. Sounds cool. Also sounds like just what the next range of superclubs are promising, doesn't it?

Which is not to suggest that Freedom, like, say, Home and Fabric, came about through calculated cash flow analysis and massive marketing spend. That's the beauty of the place, because Freedom is a club which has grown organically. From the labyrinth of rooms to the half-baked dusty DJ booths stuck up in the rafters of this former film studio, it's a place for real people, not aspirational lifestylers. After all, where else would you find a resident like Ariel, a Latino hunk who fled the Generalissimos of Eighties Argentina, playing next to former Page Three starlet Lisa Pin-Up? "Freedom," explains Lisa, from above perfectly bristling Bristols, "is exactly what you'd expect from its name. The DJs can play what they want, when they

want. That attitude attracts a mixed party crowd there's none of your chin-stroking in here.



As autumn closes in, sounds like we could all do with a visit...



But not in the usual sense of the word: these kids have to wait 20 years before they can buy their first home here and that's only when they've earned £10 billion or more... or something.

Jersey is a sedate little island, yet right now we're sitting outside a heaving house tent next to Elizabeth Castle in St Austin Bay, a 17th century venue more suited to medieval jousting than raving. Jersey's finest promoters Theory In Practise (aka Warren Le Seuer and Simon Gasston) are here for the first time, tempting clubbers with beer, a barbie and brutal house beats. There's even a second tent offering some Boutique-style tomfoolery. This was never going to be an ordinary night.

Rocky and Diesel know how to work the crowd, spinning future classics from Moloko and Paul Johnson for this sweaty, house-starved collective. By midnight, the tent is rammed, dripping and rocking to Graham Gold's uplifting, trance-tinged set. The punters have become decidedly more surreal as well. A couple of horny devils float by, two Elvis impersonators entertain the crowd and a loon in a Limahl fright-wig is strutting his stuff alongside a Freddie Mercury lookalike. Madness.

Nearly 2,000 punters have trekked by land and sea to hear house and breakbeat tonight. Maybe Jersey's not so tame after all. words Ralph Moore










Sweaty, sweet and street, Sugar is putting the Midlands back on the underground map

THERE are only three things to consider when running a club: the music, the music and the music. Sugar promoter and resident DJ Si Long is a man who knows how to throw great parties week after week after week. With Phil Gifford he spearheaded Wobble in Birmingham for many moons before striking out alone with a determination to give the Midlands a club dedicated to delivering the world's finest underground DJs.

A million quid's worth of investment in a sparkingly different looking club and many hours of planning later, and Sugar has shaken some much-needed life back into Midlands clubland. Based in the unlikely surroundings of sleepy Leamington Spa (check yer map!), but close enough to Coventry, Birmingham and Nottingham to pull in punters who appreciate good nights when they see them, it's only been going for a few months but has already put a smile back on the Midlands' face.

There are two neatly designed rooms to choose from - the main floor swings from deep house to funky tech-soul, while the plush barrocks to breaks, beats and assorted madness - and recent guests have included Groove Armada, Dave Clarke, Mr C, Funk D'Void, Roulé Records (who tore the place apart), Layo & Bushwacka, Justin Robertson and James Holroyd. But Si is equally proud of residents the Sugar Gang crew, who get together once a month for a no-holds-barred throwdown he swears is the best night at the club. Hardly surprising as the residents alongside Si include Italian discomeister Leo Young, New York's finest female spinner Cosmo, the Idjuts' favourite Rhythm Doctor and the Neon Heights label head honcho Cal Gibson.

Alongside Nottingham's The Bomb, Sugar is set to take credible Midlands clubbing into the next millennium. And what could be sweeter than that? words Alex Page

### "I thought I was going to die"

DJ **Rocky**, member of house outfit The Problem Kids, talks exclusively to Muzik about his successful battle to overcome testicular cancer

ITHOUGHTI was going to die, it's as simple as that," starts Rocky. "After they had operated on my bollock, I remember lying in a ward in hospital, and this chaplain in a tweed jacket with a Bible under his arm came up to me. I was in pain, and the geezer asked me if there was 'anything I'd like to discuss' with him. . . Like death?! It freaked me out. I thought the end had come. I thought it was all over."

Rocky, sat in Ashley Beedle's north London studio with recording and DJ partner Mark Wilkinson, is thinking back to the first week of May 1999. It was the month when Rocky and Mark – aka The Problem Kids – put the finishing touches to their superlative debut long player 'Pump The Dirty Groove', a 12-cut deep disco-tinged, jazzy, song-based spectacular on Manchester's Paper Recordings. It was also the month Rocky was rushed into hospital for an emergéncy operation on his left bollock. He had just been diagnosed with testicular cancer.


"It all started earlier this year," explains Rocky. 
"I had a bit of a rummage down there, after I kept knocking my balls when putting my jeans on. It hurt like it never had before: one ball felt firm to the touch while the other was soft. The doctor sent me for a scan and they immediately diagnosed cancer. That was it. I mean, you hear the word 'cancer' and you think you're going to die, regardless of where you get it.


"The doctor was quick to explain, though, that because the bollocks are outside the body, there's a good chance they can stop the cancer literally by chopping the offending ball off. It's a necessary thing, so you go along with it. Actually, no one even knows why anyone gets testicular cancer, apart from if your balls didn't drop as a kid."

"Well, there you go," adds Mark helpfully.
"Yours only dropped last year."











"Shut it," laughs Rocky. "This is serious shit for Muzik's readers. People are so fucking unaware of testicular cancer in this country it's unbelievable. It's not a thing that people talk about or know about."

"Yeah," adds Mark on a more serious note.
"I got my mate Jason to talk to Rocky about it. It's a lot more common than you'd think, especially for blokes between 15 and 40. Women talk about breast cancer, but why don't we talk about our balls?"

"Yeah, why?" continues Rocky. "Or in my case, my ball. And it's a very big ball, now, by the way, because if you lose one bollock, the other over-compensates and you end up with the same amount of sperm in a bigger sac."

"Anyway, as you can see," concludes Mark, "The Problem Kid had a problem; he was a bit Sue Lawley when we were making the album. And you can bet that he was finally pleased to 'see the release' in both senses, if you know what I mean..."

"Absolutely," laughs Rocky. "You could say I was glad to see it out..."

ROCKY first met Mark at London's Flying Records in 1991, where they were both serving up the best in US house, Balearic and the recently arrived "Italo-house scream-ups" to punters still half-caned from the night before. It was the time of Boys Own Magazine, Full Circle, Up Yer Bum, Ask Yer Dad, Up Yer Ronson, Shave Yer Tongue and Cheeky Half, and if that lot doesn't bring a tear to your eyes, you're under 25.

Anyway, back to Flying. Charlie Chester ran the show, Lofty ran the gaff, and with 'managers' like that in charge of the

proceedings, it's not hard to imagine the sort of time that was had. It was, you might say, an apprenticeship for life... nightlife, that is, and a lot more besides.

"They were fucking brilliant days," explains Mark. "The fucking parties we had in the back! And no one seemed to notice! To be in your early twenties and have a job that allowed you to go out every night, DJ and get caned was tremendous. I would roll in at God knows what time and Charlie Chester would say 'look at the state of you... Well done! I was so bollocksed that I would crash out on record bags for a couple of hours just to be able to continue serving people. Oh, happy days!"

"Yeah, and exciting times," continues
Rocky. "One time Charlie went to Italy and
made this big deal with the Italian distributor
Disco Flying Corporation. A week later this
massive truck pulls up outside the shop with
thousands of records. The shop went fucking
bananas! We couldn't get these piano tunes
out of the boxes quick enough. If we'd have
put on a piano version of 'Nessun Dorma', we
would have had 10 people fighting over it. It
was an unbelievable time. Amazing!"

And a time, of course, which saw an explosion in Rocky's career as a DJ/producer, particularly when X-Press 2 – Rocky, Diesel and Ashley Beedle – hit the big time with 'Music X-Press'. Rocky's career as a record salesman, meanwhile, had finished at the precise moment when, famously, he was asked by Junior Boys Own's Terry Farley whether he "wanted to sell records or make them".

He chose the latter, of course, and the net result was a string of hits, DJ dates with Diesel at all the top house nights in the country, and, one supposes, more money than he could spend on sherbert at breaktime. A couple of years later the groundbreaking Ballistic Brothers project was also set up, originally as a "sideline operation to X-Press 2". The Brothers (Rocky, Diesel, Beedle and Dave Hill) with their breakbeats, deep grooves and best-selling long players 'Rude System' and 'London Hooligan Soul', soon eclipsed X-Press 2 and became the full time musical concern.



the break with shop work in 1996, to take up his position of resident at Rulin' at the Ministry Of Sound. In fact, it was around this time that he rang up Rocky and asked him to collaborate in the studio. To Mark's surprise, Rocky replied in the affirmative and the duo emerged from the studio as Raw Concept with 'Don't Do It', which found its eventual home on JBO's Jus Trax imprint.

Other collaborative tracks followed, most notably 'Paradise' on Ill Sun, 'Mind Of The Sister' on Discocaine and their remix of 'Can't Fight The Feeling' on JBO until, in 1997, Mark and Rocky finally knobtwiddled 'Misbehavin'' as Problem Kids for Paper. The kids were finally ready to play. But where did they get that name? And what's the problem, exactly?

"There's no problem at all," explains



### Testicular cancer

### **Symptoms**

Hardness of the whole testicle or a lump in part of one testicle, an occasional ache or heavy feeling.



### Who is at risk?

Men with an undescended testicle who have not have it surgically corrected are five times more likely to contractit. Men aged 20-34 are most at risk.

### Where to go for help

Go to your GP or local NHS sexual health clinic. If cancer is suspected, you will be referred to the hospital urology department.

#### Diagnosis and treatment

Ultrasound, urine and blood tests are carried out. If a lump is thought to be cancerous, the affected testicle is removed under general anaesthetic. If the cancer has not spread beyond the testicle, no further treatment may be needed. Regular check-ups will be carried out for several years.

Rocky. "We came up with the name after we'd been watching this programme on right little bastards round Ashley's house. Seeing as we act stupid, he thought it would be a good name. I like it because I can't fucking stand people telling me to 'grow up.' I mean, fuck off and get a life! I'm 31, but I never want to grow up; I never want to be old. Life is all about being youthful and keeping a smile on your face."

LIFE, too, on a more prosaic level, is about working and dealing with other people. Rocky and Diesel used to go together like slap and tickle. When did Mark enter the soap opera, and how did Diesel feel?

"Ooooh, stop it, girl!" Rocky says, camping it up. "You're making this sound like a gay version of Jerry Springer. It was natural. Me and Diesel found we could earn more separately. But we still work together in the same venue every other week."

"Yeah, but I'm glad you packed him," retorts Mark. "I'm better!"

"Shut it!" says Rocky for the twentieth time this afternoon. "The truth is that we got to the point where we had done everything as a partnership. We'd had big records, we went around the world, we did whatever we wanted. We both feel that the split was right, but at the end of the day we're all still part of that old Boy's Own crew with Farley, Heller and the rest."

PROBLEM Kids – who needs 'em? Well, given the current wave of stereotypical 'trance' that's sweeping our sceptred isle, perhaps we all do. After all, no one can listen to the same type of music all the time, can they? Thank God, then, for labels like Paper for providing an antidote to the universal bang-bang; an escape route from Mitsubishi melodies. But do the Problem Kids see themselves as the saviours of British house?

"Well, we won't get played at Gatecrasher, will we?" laughs Rocky. "But I'd like to think that people will grow into our music, like a good pair of shoes. They will come to appreciate us like a fine wine! Everybody's into some real shite at some time or another: look at us, we were into indie dance and Euro house! But direction-wise, we only aim to keep the feeling in our music.

"You know, the only meeting Problem Kids has ever held was in the car on the way to the studio to start work on this album. We decided it would be boring to make a pure house album, as they run the risk of sounding like one remix after another. We decided to mix up the grooves and come up with something that is much more than just club music. Luckily Paper gave us the scope to produce anything we wanted. I don't think they would have minded if we'd turned up with fucking Andean pipe music. They told us the future was in our hands."

"They weren't talking about your bollocks were they, Rocky?" asks Mark. "Shut it!" comes the predictable reply.

15 years in the ring

Rocky plays his first ever gig at the Botwell Youth Club in Hayes. The DJ booth contains "two decks, a rubber band and a box."

Rocky plays his first major gig at the C&L Country Club in Northolt. Simon Dunmore (now MD of Defected Records) books him. Rocky meets other residents Dean Thatcher and Charlie Chester. It's a soul and rare groove affair.

Rocky experiences acid house with his mates at Shoom and Spectrum. He is asked by Glen Gunner, the promoter of Trance (a Tuesday-nighter in Greenford) to be resident. Rocky agrees to do it with DJ partner Diesel. "Nobody mixed anything," explains Rocky, "and as I remember, we played some fucking awful records, like a dub of Kajagoogoo's Too Shy' and a reggae version of Depeche Mode."

Rocky and Diesel are hired as residents at The Yellow Book at Rock Garden as the club takes off big time. Terry Farley and Stripey are the other residents; Nancy Noise and Steve Lee join later.

Rocky and Diesel become DJ kings of London and the 'Slough Corridor'. Remember Flying at the Valbonne in Maidenhead? Oh. Then you obviously weren't there.



Rocky and Diesel meet Ashley Beedle and form X-Press 2. Rocky explains: "We were at this Cheeky Half party in Islington, and Ashley, who was already successful as Black Science Orchestra, was playing 'Happy Music' by Cloud One on Queen Constance. It's a Patrick Adams discoproduction.



"Tasked if we could do our own version in the studio with him. He agreed, and Farley told us to do it for Boys Own, so we all went in, but we couldn't get it to sound right at all. Ashley even walked out of the studio in disgust at one point. All we could get was this one drum sound, and the rest of the track was spent just fucking around with other samples.



"We thought it was average and called it 'Music X-Press'. Then Fabi Paras dropped it at Stages in Chesham and the place went fucking ballistic! It ended up getting this amazing response from everyone from Junior Vasquez, Farley, Tenaglia, even Andy Weatherall was playing it!"

Rocky and Diesel experiment with breakbeats, then form the Ballistic Brothers with Ashley and Nuphonic's Dave Hill as a "sideline project".

The Brothers go full time and big time. They produce two groundbreaking albums and make the cover of Muzik.

Rocky links up with Mark Wilkinson in the studio for 'Misbehavin' on Junior Boys Own.

Rocky sets up the Low Pressings imprint with Flying old boy Clive Henry. Rocky also starts a DJing partnership with Mark, by this time monthly resident at Rulin' at the Ministry Of Sound. Four decks and two mixers are the order of the day again.

Rocky and Mark, as Problem Kids, release their debut album, 'Pump The Dirty Groove'.









They rocked Creamfields with the most eagerly anticipated live performance of the year. No surprise, perhaps, when you consider Neil Tennant and Chris Lowe both come from disco backgrounds and have clubbed everywhere from New York to Chile since the Seventies. They've always employed the hottest DJs in the world as remixers, and still have it right off today. Meet the original ravers. Meet two of music's coolest fuckers. Meet the Pet Shop Boys





Muzik: What was your first clubbing experience?

Neil: I came to college in London in 1972, and in 1973 I went to my first club, Chaguaramas. We called it Shagarama's. It was an oldfashioned gay club where drinks were unbelievably expensive. It was like 50p for half a lager. You could have lived on that for a day, then! That was the first time I ever heard a 12-inch remix. It was probably 'Papa Was A Rolling Stone'.

Chris: Tell them what you were wearing!

Neil: I was wearing white oxbow trousers with a little white tank top, with huge women's wedge heels. They were yellow and blue, size sixand-a-half. I have size eight feet. I can still feel the pain, but I thought it was incredibly glamorous. The following year disco finally arrived.



Then Heaven opened and changed clubbing forever. There, that's me till the end of the Seventies!

Chris: I hadn't even started going out then! Neil had finished before I started! Up in Blackpool, I was going to Man Friday's, which played disco and Northern soul. The best club night I've ever had, though, was that party after our first tour.

Neil: Or that night in Santiago, Chile. I can't remember what it was called, but we ended up standing on cars eating hot dogs.

Chris: And our first night at Paradise Garage was amazing. It was the first time I'd walked through a metal detector to go to a club. It was also the first club I went to with no alcohol. We were puzzled. Little did we realise what everyone was on!

### Muzik: So you ate the famous Paradise Garage fruit?

Neil: Yes, but there was no acid in the night we went! I think that was a little bit of a myth!

### Muzik: What did you think of Larry Levan?

Chris: Oh, it was him, was it?! I just remember feeling the music for the first time, rather than just hearing it. We went to a lot of clubs then. We used to hang out with Jellybean Benitez when he was going out with Madonna. He loved 'West End Girls'. Neil: And we used to go to Area. Area was great because it had living artwork, people behind glass panels. Then you'd go to the bar and Andy Warhol would be standing there.

### Muzik: Did your clubbing directly influence your choice of remixers?

**Neil:** We started recording in New York, so we were regarded as part of its dance scene. We've

always kept in touch with it. When we did 'Opportunities' we got these Puerto Rican boys, The Latin Rascals, to edit it. We worked with Shep Pettibone, then Frankie Knuckles in 1988, then Morales and Tenaglia. Morales did the Red Zone mix of 'So Hard', which is one of the best mixes we've ever had done.

**Chris:** We were at a party in LA once and Morales was playing that mix. Neil came up to me and asked "why can't we make records like this?" Ha-ha!

### Muzik: What about Ibiza - any cop?

Neil: I've never been. It's become an institution so quickly. Everyone wants to be hip and into it, so it was spoiled for me before I had the chance to go. Chris: Yeah, I know what you mean. Zoe Ball went for two minutes one year and now she's "really Ibiza"! And there are too many Ibiza compilations!

### Muzik: So we won't see you sashaying into the Manumission Motel, Neil?

Neil: Andy Manumission is a good friend. He wanted us to do the opening party! You'll see me there at some point; it just seems over-hyped.

Chris: The problem is it's actually really good – I love it! The first time I went to Ibiza was before the house explosion. We came from Blackpool, where the clubs close at two, so we arrived at Pacha at 11pm. Naturally, it was deserted. We left thinking Ibiza was crap for clubs and no one ever went out! Now, I go out every year. But only for a week: any more would kill me. Bora Bora and Space are the best.

### Muzik: How was Creamfields this year?

**Chris:** It was nerve-wracking, because it was such a different audience. Before we went on, Judge Jules was playing 150bpm trance anthems, and it sounded like a football stadium.

**Neil:** I was wondering why they'd want to listen to us after, say, DJ Jean. The sound was atrocious, as well. I was pleased to read in magazines that it was an issue how we would go down, though. Happily, there were a lot of people who were into the idea

of seeing us in the middle of 12 hours of clubbing.

### Muzik: But why didn't you do 'Paninaro'?

Chris: We don't do it. Neil: We should.

**Chris:** You're the fourth person to bring this up. Is this a Sun campaign?!

### Muzik: What do you think of clubland becoming more corporate?

Chris: I don't like it. My favourite time for house music was when no one knew about it, when there were no dress codes, when people used to bond in puddles on the floor. I like there to be an underground. Now there isn't one. It's like dance music won the war against rock, but the victory is hollow. I saw [Ministry Of Sound owner] James Palumbo at the back of Cream in Amnesia. He's very corporate. He wasn't into the music at all. I thought "you're literally just creaming these people. Just taking their money".

### Muzik: Did you tell him that?

Chris: I wasn't really in a fit state.

### Muzik: What are your club-related plans for the future?

Neil: Well, Creamfields proved we are relevant to the dance market as a live act. The response to our web site has been fantastic. Maybe we'll do a one-off Creamfields-style live event like New Order did. And we've written a stage musical set in a club—we hope to perform it next year. Our idea is for the theatregoers to be clubbers in the play.

### Muzik: And will you expect them to behave themselves?

Chris: We hope not!

EMEMBER Simon Bates and his golden shower, er, sorry, hour? Didn't know he was responsible for the introduction of quality house music to daytime national radio in 1991, did you? Well, he was, and very Smashey & Nicey it was of him, too, mate. Here's how it happened.

"Simon Bates was on holiday," explains Chris, "and so he asked if we wanted to stand in for him. We said sure, but insisted we played whatever we wanted live. Only Radio 1 would ever agree to that, a daytime show where we chose all the records!

"We did these non-stop DJ sets. We had Sasha and all the top names, and I remember Colin Faver did a really leftfield set. I thought it was great that this stuff was going out across the whole nation. Amazing! It was such a good time for records anyway. You could fill the show every day with quality things like Felix's 'Don't You Want Me' and 'Such A Good Feeling'. They weren't generic house tracks, they were all distinctive.

"We had our own little playlist and we jumped round the studio all morning. The fax machine was flooded with messages from fellow ravers who couldn't believe what they were hearing." "Sure," counters Neil, "but we sounded like a

"Sure," counters Neil, "but we sounded like a pirate station, very amateurish. We talked over each other, and every time we tried to do something professional it failed. Radio 1 thought we would just stay behind the microphone, but we actually put the records on. It was chaotic.

"Importantly, though, Radio 1 were very surprised by the enthusiasm from the audience for playing very up dance music at 10 o'clock in the morning. It was a real eye-opener for them.

"We were asked back the following year, but after that I guess they thought we were past it. The last time we did radio was four years ago when we did 'Merry Pet Shop Boys' on Christmas Eve. We both got drunk, played records, got more drunk and started to argue!"

ARVEY Nichols shopping bag by her feet, unlit spliff behind her ear, Sister Bliss is working on a Skunk Anansie remix. It's going okay, she announces, but it would be going better still if visions of a man with a greasy quiff, a bright suit and a lethal tongue weren't distracting her. "I'm on Never Mind The Buzzcocks tomorrow," Faithless' keyboardist shudders. "Mark Lamarr rips the piss out of everyone, doesn't he? I'm worried that I'm going to look ignorant, because I only know about house music."

What, nothing else at all? "Erm... The Stranglers?"

What, nothing else at all? "Erm... The Stranglers?"
Bliss turns back to her VDU, thumps the computer and releases another whirring sample. "I'm petrified," she mumbles, as the techno-tinged house sound booms down the corridors of The Depot, a dingy north London building stuffed full of recording and rehearsal studios. "Utterly fucking terrified."

By comparison, headlining next month's Ericsson Muzik Awards Live Tour will be a pleasure. Six dates imbued with considerable poignancy, too, since it will be the last time people get to see Faithless before they skulk off to the studio, their long neglected private lives and, in one instance, to the race track. In a massive break with protocol, the bunch we've come to know as the hardest working people in dance music won't actually be coming to a festival or concert hall near you next year. They've promised they'll be energised for the Muzik tour, but otherwise, you see, Faithless are knackered.

FOLLOWING their continued success with 'God Is A DJ' and the Top 10 album 'Sunday 8pm', Faithless are on the cusp of change, too. Ground down by the relentless touring, keyboardist Jamie Catto and guitarist Dave Randall have left the band. Sister Bliss talks more of mad machine music than proper instruments or folk-flavoured tunes. Rollo, speaking on the phone the day after we meet Bliss, says they'll never make another album as "depressed" as the Mercury Prize-nominated 'Sunday 8pm'. Album number three from Faithless is likely to rock with far more velocity than 'Reverence' or 'Sunday 8pm'.

"I'm into sounds which are otherworldly," says Bliss. "And we don't want to commit ourselves to a proper band. It's going to be about me, Maxi Jazz and Rollo getting into weird shit." Before trance was big, before Gatecrasher had found its Kids, hypnotic elements were writ large through tracks like 'Salva Mea' and 'Insomnia'. Yet Faithless' pursuit of "weird shit" certainly won't take them further down this route.

"Trance," winces Bliss, as if she's just said "vivisection",
"tuberculosis" or "Margaret Thatcher". "People are entitled
to their own opinions, but I happen to think it's shite."
Really? You played a large part in forging the sound.

"But it's turned into abrasive, crude trash. It saddens me to think that's what dance is about, rather than records with depth and class like [Future Sound Of London's] 'Papua New Guinea'." Bliss grimaces some more.

"I have to turn off Judge Jules' radio show if I listen to it for more than half an hour."

The Judge, a close confidant of Faithless' founder members for over a decade, also gets a bashing from Rollo.

"I saw Jules at Creamfields. It struck me that he was Dr Pavlov and the crowd were his dogs," Rollo recalls, his voice as blaringly loud as ever.

"They were just waiting for a breakdown, any breakdown. They'd go mad for a few seconds, then they'd stand around waiting for the next big moment."

Conceding that she's sacrificed her DJing career for Faithless, Bliss now intends to get on the turntables as much as possible. Some year off: she's got a heap of bookings already.

"I'll show people there's more to dance music than trance," she says with a mock cackle. "I get angry because people are being fed shit. I want to play beautiful, celestial stuff which inspires them."

Whenever Bliss says something flamboyant, she feels duty bound to follow it up with something self-disparaging: "God, I'm sounding like a right wanker now."

ONE part uninhibited sex bomb, two parts dippy girl next door, Sister Bliss has a painter for a mother and a jazz-playing doctor for a father (Dudley Moore drummed in his band in the Sixties; Bliss intends to pay for him to make an album on his next birthday). While at secondary school, her first band was called The Queen Bees. They covered 'Tainted Love' and, if nothing else, had their manifesto sorted. "We were a

feminist alternative to Bananarama," she smiles. "But people misunderstood us. They used to scrawl 'lesbians' across our posters.'

She confesses she was a handful back then. "I was into acting, drinking and smoking, that's all. If I was ordered to do something, I'd do the opposite, even if it was a bad move." Potentially self-destructive behaviour. "Very, though it did have its good points. I was told I'd never make it into the sixth form, so just to fuck the teachers off, I went and passed all my exams."

When acid house arrived, Bliss was immediately bowled over. At parties, she tried to convert her school friends. "They thought I was a drug addict. I'd play them tapes of house music and they just laughed.

Sister Bliss has a "dirty, lavatorial mind". To wit: "Remixes are like having casual sex. You get rid of your hang-ups, know what I mean?" And: "I've only been on the internet once. I tried to download some porn but it took half an hour, so I gave up.

Ask her if there's anyone she'd like to exact revenge upon, and she sneers: "Only the cunt who fucked me up when I was 18. He knows who he is. Evil ex-boyfriend. Psychotic person. Fuck it. Look at him now. I won't tell you what he's doing, but it's menial. Ha ha ha!'


Meanwhile, Maxi Jazz, Faithless' smoochy rapper and lyricist, is deeply in love. The woman in question, a Norwegian model, doesn't realise how he feels, but she will soon. "Maxi says they'll be married by Christmas," hoots Bliss. Protective of Maxi in the extreme, when a music magazine criticised his lyrics, Bliss wrote them a letter.


"I said I was going to smash their faces in," she remarks. "I asked if they'd ever sold out Brixton Academy or sold over four million records. I was feeling lippy.

Once the host of a hip hop show called Soul Food Café on London pirate LWR, Maxi saves his venom for charging about in fast cars. Owner of a Cosworth Sierra and a Escort MKII RS2000, he intends to get a licence which will allow him to race on proper circuits. Aren't the rest of Faithless worried that you will injure yourself? "Probably, yeah," he chuckles softly. "Some of the


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### Quickfire Q&A with Sister Bliss



Millennium hype – is it out of hand? "It certainly seems as if DJs' fees are getting out of hand. It's my birthday the night before New Year's Eve and I invariably feel like shit by the

time it comes around."

### Mel C's rock band - what's all that about?

"Oh come on, it's just too easy to say she's a load of shit. She's learning in front of a crowd of millions. There's hope for the girl yet."

### Celebrity weddings - public (Posh & Beckham) or private (Fatboy & Zoe)?

"Private! I'm a very private person. I've only been recognised once. I was in an airport and someone tapped me on the shoulder, going 'Sister Bliss! Sister Bliss!' It urned round and it was John Digweed, taking the piss."

### **Newcastle - does relegation beckon?**"Gullit's out now, isn't he? What a total cunt. Erm, what does it mean if you get relegated?"

**GM food - would you eat it?** "Yeah, if I was hungry at a festival, I would. What's a bit of GM food going to do compared with all the other shit we put into our bodies?"

Dance album of the year? "It hasn't even been released yet. It's by Bent and it's just beautiful. It's mellow, but much more cutting edge than most chill out music."

**Alcohol or marijuana?** "Marijuana. It's the Faithless tipple of choice. With alcohol."

### "Remixes are like casual sex. You get rid of your hang-ups"

Dyk, Skinny and Nightmares On Wax are contributors. Called 'Saturday 3am', it will feature on a repackaged version of 'Sunday 8pm'. Then there's the new single, 'Why Go?', a slow burn through pattering beats and despondent synths, adorned with the unmistakable voice of Boy George.

He's singing about love gone wrong, isn't he?
"Nah, he's singing about casual sex," replies Bliss,
with some degree of inevitability.

Adopting the role of production svengali, Rollo bowed out of playing live with Faithless two years ago. But he remains as committed to the band as ever.

"I'd love to get the anarchy of Basement Jaxx in our live shows," he muses. "We're going to have a fun year of experimenting with beats and sounds. Hopefully, we'll be bouncy and happy, not like last year with 'Sunday 8pm'."

In early 1998, as 'Sunday 8pm' took shape, bad vibes flowed liberally though the Faithless camp. All of the band found their love lives hitting the rocks at once. It's a subject Faithless have seemingly sworn to talk about only in the abstract.

"Everything was warped and as a result we all hated each other," sighs Bliss. "We almost split up." In the case of Jamie Catto, the heartache involved in

In the case of Jamie Catto, the heartache involved in being away from his loved ones was never resolved. He's left the band to spend more time with his young daughter, and to concentrate on his chief passion, world music.

"It was definitely time for him to move on," Bliss feels.
"I mean, we were never going to do a fucking world musicalbum, were we?"

With Maxi, the band won out over his relationship. "Maxi's fought so hard to feel this strong about Faithless that it was hard to have someone at home, telling him he hadn't done this, or he needed to spend more time thinking about that," Bliss continues. "He couldn't cope with having that sort of negativity in his life."

"I'm laughing now," points out Maxi, "but I wasn't back then. There were a lot of long faces in the band."

It's common knowledge that Rollo and Bliss were an item at one point. But quite what influence this had on Faithless' winter horribilis isn't up for discussion.

"I don't want to talk about my personal situation," says Bliss. "Let's just say it was a long, painful, difficult period in my life."

In the News Of The World recently, you said you're going to marry your boyfriend next year.

"That's just fucking nonsense. I never spoke to them." Long pause.

"Still, it's the Age of Aquarius now, so Faithless will be alright."

What does that mean?

"I don't know. But it sounds good."

FAITHLESS, you feel, still aren't completely at ease with themselves as a band. But watching them figure out their place in music has, of course, been thrilling. From lbiza to Glastonbury, Germany to Australia, their live sets have received a bellowing crowd response of almost unparalleled proportions. And Muzik has been backing them every step of the way: giving them their first cover story in 1997; presenting them with the trophy for Best Live Act at last year's Muzik awards.

"The Muzik tour will be the end of an era," Bliss remarks, again suggesting that giant-sized creative leaps forward are the order of the day for Faithless now. "Oh yeah, and it's a good excuse to get pissed and play

at being pop stars for the last time in quite a while.

Maxi can't wait to get out in the crowd, to catch the other bands. "It's no fun otherwise. I'll be there with my pint, hanging with the punters."

Before matters of the heart take precedent, he's also keen to interlock with Faithless' fan base again.

"When I'm on stage, I see couples who are at least 65. I see disco kids who scream whenever I move. I see people in their thirties, who listen intently, squeezing their eyes shut and pumping their fists whenever they hear lyrics they like. There's no such thing as a typical Faithless fan and I love that."

With the possible exception of the 65-year-olds, they'll all be there on the Muzik tour. Birmingham, London, Norwich, Cardiff, Sheffield, Newcastle – ably assisted by Groove Armada, Hybrid and Paul Van Dyk (perhaps they can discuss trance with him), Faithless are destined to bewitch every city they visit. It won't be entertaining. No, it'll be much more than that.

"Mere entertainment isn't good enough," Sister Bliss states adamantly, before turning her attention back to Skunk Anansie and Mark Lamarr. "When people come to our gigs, we wanted them to be lifted. Changed. Empowered. Moved off the ground."

That was the flamboyance. This is the self-effacing payoff: "Shit, I sound like a right daf cow now, don't I?" No, you don't.

"Oh... Okay then."

The new Faithless single, 'Why Go'/'lf Loving You Is Wrong', is out now on Cheeky. A new version of their second album, retitled 'Sunday 9pm/Saturday 3am' album is out on October 31st

### **FAITHLESS Maxi Jazz**

Dance music's premier live act

Where would your dream gig be?

Cape Town. It's a beautiful place – it feels like home in an odd kind of way. Which is weird because I've only been there twice.

Have you ever had equipment failure? Oh fuck yeah! On the top of Mount Hemsidal in Norway because it was freezing. And in Israel, but because it was too hot. We played in a quarry which was 42°. Unbelievable.

What's been your best gig so far?

Lowlands in Holland. We had nothing left – but the crowd bellowed as soon as they saw us. As they yelled, all the fatigue and trepidation dropped away. For me, it confirmed there's energy between people. My appreciation of the crowd took on a new level that day.

And the worst? A few places that aren't used to putting on a live act. We sent one a spec sheet asking for a 35 channel desk and there was a 24 channel desk. 12,000 people waiting while technicians run around and there's nothing you can do about it.

Who would you most like to support? It would be great to do some stuff with Sugardoot Bonner and the reformed Ohio Players. I saw them two or three years ago The Jazz Cafe—I'd love to play with them.

What's on your rider? Champagne - it's good to have a glass before you go on stage. Fruit, chocolate and red wine for the crew. Sister Bliss? Vodka and cranberry juice.

What games and videos clutter up your tour bus? I'm into Playstation, though only the driving games. Films? Con Air, Independence Day, The Usual Suspects. There are 15 of us on the tour bus—we prefer music and conversation.

How live is dance music anyway? In terms of what we do, very live indeed! I'd say we're about 98% live and 2% back-up.

Who's your favourite live act?

I saw James Brown at V99 and he was fucking brilliant. I was totally prepared not to like it, but the whole show was top.

Will you still be on the road in 30 years! time? You are having a tucking laugh! I will not be taking my skinny arse up and down the country! Being on the road is great but you can't do it forever. There are other things in life.

What's been your best gig so far? E-Werk was really cool. It was such an intense club and crowd. The festivals were really special this year. Clubwise, it's difficult to judge because English club culture is so healthy, but Gatecrasher is a bit more special because of the six-hour thing.

Is there anyone you'd like to support? No, not at all! I don't see any reason for it. If New Order did a party or an event and I was part of it, that would be cool. But a New Order concert? No. I'd rather go as a guest.

How do you relax? I use a laptop computer! It's a virtual copy of my studio so I can always make or arrange music. I'm completely addicted to music, so I don't know much about movies and stuff.

What's been your best gig so far?
The Bedrock gig at Heaven – the crowd were cheering before we'd even started playing. They were even making up words for 'Finished Symphony'!

And the worst? The Eclipse. Who put up the signs warning about the traffic jams?! It was the quietest festival I've been to in my life.

Who would you most like to support? It would be nice to support John Barry on a 007 tour. We could do an orchestral breakbeat warm-up.

What's on your rider? Burgers, pizzas, lager and water. We're healthy boys! Plus M&Ms for Julee Cruise. She's a bit of a fan.

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
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


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## Burning up the Techno Parade with the producers of this autumn's essential

T the Place de la Republique it's like Liberation Day all over again. Old ladies wave homemade tricolours out of third floor windows. Tripping techno-hippies and loved-up Parisian lovelies bounce up and down on the roofs of bus shelters, shops and police cars. The pungent smell of fresh hash permeates the six kilometres of up-for-it punters. Opposite, on the Body Art float, a woman suspended by chains rigged to steel nipple plates shakes her naked arse, to the delight of suburban b-boys. It's ooh là-là all round.


This is Paris' second annual Techno Parade. More precisely, it's the view at 2pm from The End's Garden Of Eden float, where we've come to interview Layo and Matthew 'Bushwacka' B, the top garçons behind the dirtiest, darkest, break-filled, electro-infused long player of the year. It's called 'Low Life', it's the debut album on The End imprint, and it's the antidote to every cheesy Ibiza compilation you've ever fallen asleep to. Oh yeah, and it's an absolute fucking corker.

"We're over the moon with the album," shouts Layo Paskin, who runs The End club when he's not knocking off albums, as the parade roars down the Boulevard du Temple. "It was always totally conceptual, never just a load of tracks that we cobbled together, so to see the finished article is fantastic. This album is about a vibe, not about singles. It's a big picture project, where all the cuts are circular and add to the whole. Forget the

approach of your big cheesy DJs and producers who knock out big tune after big tune: we've built a feeling here, and that's why 'Low Life' works."

Matthew, sporting a tinsel wig and swigging from a litre bottle of Sea Breeze, is prone to agree: "Too right," he says, as our float's bubble machine starts up. "We took away the 4/4 beat precisely so that we could build a vibe however we wanted. By doing that we weren't limited to style, tempo or anything. It was completely liberating. We were real perfectionists, too; even when we were three quarters of a way through a track, we restarted from scratch if one of us didn't like it. Our way of working is that less is always more. We always take stuff out of cuts when we go back to them, we never embellish. Because both of us are DJs, it makes us realise how important space is."

Layo and Bushwacka, of course, aren't just any old jocks. If you've ever been down to The End's Subterrain night and heard what this two-thirds of The End Soundsystem can do (the other third is Mr C, naturally), you'll understand. If you haven't, take it from us that they can do just about anything. The sounds being sculpted are dark house, hip hop, trip hop, nu skool and old school breaks, electro and just about everything else. Like the boys said, it's not about the tempo or the beat: it's the vibe. And the vibe on the album is spiralling up and up with a passion. To

success and the high life that comes with it. So why call the album 'Low Life', for fuck's sake?

'It's really the mood we approached the project with," explains Layo as he tosses flowers into a sea of Flat Eric dolls in a packed Place de la Bastille. "You know how dance music is always perceived as 'wicked'? Everything's always 'fucking wicked', but there's far more to it than that. There might be a few people at the top who live the high life, but for everyone else it's tough. It sounds glamorous going from party to party, but it takes work, concentration and creativity. We've battled away, and it's been a tough couple of years. For me, running The Endand AKA, I haven't being getting the enjoyment out of life that I used to. And that's where a lot of the deeper, darker side of the album comes from."

And might it also come from frustration? From the lack of media attention the boys and The End have received from the mainstream music press? Let's face it, Cream, Gatecrasher and Home have received endless coverage. But have they actually created as much as a club which in 1997 alone had Roni Size and Norman Cook as residents?

"I don't really know what Gatecrasher is," claims Matthew in all honesty. "Is it that northern club? And who are Ferry Corsten and Matt Darey? I don't have a clue. To be honest, my attention has been focussed on Plank Records and engineering with Layo. It is a fucking irony that our music is better received in places like tonight's Magic Garden party than at home, though.

We've gone down an intellectual path," explains Layo, as the parade heads north up Boulevard Poniatowski to its final destination at the Pelouse de Reuilly, "and that's always a harder way to go. It's easy to make lowest common denominator music in any field, but then you can't govern what you produce. We follow our passion and that's what we have done since 1988. We've always been honest to ourselves and our vision of music.

So back to the music. The bottom line. The 'Low Life'. Critical acclaim is assured, but will the public embrace it like they might a cyber doll with a lightstick

on some Northern podium?
"Sure," reckons Layo. "If they get to hear it. All we need is for Joe Bloggs to hear it. Press attention is cool, but it's Joe that counts at the end of the day.

As night falls and the floats start their soundclash at our final destination, The End Soundsystem is mobbed. Seems that in Paris, at least, a few hundred thousand Joes are giving the thumbs up. Et vous, les Anglais?



T'S Saturday again, and you're up for another top night of jigging, hopping, quaffing and whatnot. That magical combination of music, mates and drugs that makes every weekend a blinder. Take away the music and you can still have a laugh getting spannered with your friends, while a night off the pills just proves you're not just a shallow drug whore. But tell someone you're going out on your tod, and you'll be met with an expression hovering somewhere between amusement and pity. No, lonely clubbing is no laughing matter.

You know where you are with your mates - safety in numbers and all that. More importantly, you're not that forlorn figure dancing with your head bowed, or milling around at the bar on your own. But people do go clubbing on their own - most of us have done it at least once. Maybe because you're new to an area, or perhaps you're desperate to try something new and your mates aren't. And while the phenomenon of the lonely clubber can be a truly sad and peculiar spectacle to behold, surely most of us have been tempted to nip out and 'go solo' into the nocturnal world at some point? However full the dancefloor is, you can always be sure there'll be someone there alone.

MILTON is a 24-year-old musician commonly found "frigging his booty raw" on a number of London's more soulful house dancefloors.

"Sometimes no one else is up for the things I check out," he explains. "Some of them work, some are just plain lazy. Not all my friends can keep up so I have to kick it on my own sometimes."

Milton leaves his house most nights for a spot of solitary. He agreed to be followed on a night out, but only so long as we didn't "get in the way". But as Milton joins the queue for some Soulsonic action, he looks edgy and lonely.

"I'm always meeting people when I'm out so I don't feel alone, but there are times when everyone's staring at you and I get a

bit self-conscious," he admits. "It can't be helped. At least they're intrigued as to why you're alone. I'd be a hermit if I let the way people looked at me stop for me from doing my shit."

Once we're inside the club it's a completely different story. Milton sways around the place in full disco dance champion mode and women begin to swing around him in a go-go frenzy. Are they concerned at his Billy No-Mates plight? Are they fuck. As we begin to dribble at the scores of young ladies he encounters, we begin to understand Milton. He might have arrived alone but he's the most socially successful bloke in the place. "The crowd on the dancefloor holds the attraction for me," he explains later. "You can connect with new people from just a smile or a look. You walk into the club on your own but on the floor you're never alone."

FOR 26-year old London publisher Emma, clubs aren't just an antidote to work, they also offer a welcome respite from her "grown-up and stuck up" circle of mates.

## Solo Mission

Dr Mark Griffiths, Head of Psychology at Nottingham Trent University, examines why some clubbers feel happier on their tod

"Most people don't feel secure enough to go out on their own, mainly because of the stereotypical 'I don't want anyone thinking I'm Billy No-Mates'. You have to be very strong and secure within yourself to think, 'well sod that, I'm gonna do my own thing anyway'. But you can see within club culture that certain people don't necessarily have to be with other people to have a good time. The bottom line is we all need other people, we cannot function without doing a lot of things in pairs, groups or whatever. But there are certain activities that we can do alone and feel very good about ourselves and feel very confident on our own.



outside his spacious pad in London's Stoke Newington, he has the demeanour of a man who's content with his lot. Clean cut and relaxed in the late September sun, he looks a million miles from the DJ once known for heights of Bacchanalian excess. In many ways, he's now the absolute antithesis of his old mate Dahlarge. While the king of caners spent another season immersed in Balearic debauchery, Jon took his foot off the pedal and avoided Ibiza for much of the summer - "I've been nominated as Caner Of The Year again but I've had one of the quietest years of my life! Not that it's been an easy year for Jon. Despite massive critical acclaim, the ragga inferno that was Monkey Mafia failed to set the charts on fire with its dubwise take on the big beat template, and the band was dropped by Heavenly's parent label Deconstruction earlier this year. But Jon's not bothered. Untouched by trance and bored with big beat, Carter has taken his love of dub and melded it to deep, throbbing house beats. The time that that he did spend in Ibiza this year was well spent in the back room of Manumission and the terrace at Space, wowing the crowds with raw house cuts like Basement Jaxx's 'Jump & Shout' and C12's Digweed anthem 'Hooked On Coke'. With fellow DJs, promoters and, more importantly, clubbers grabbing each other to ask who was on the decks, surrendering to house's four-to-

Jon's basement flat is the epitome of urban sophistication. There's a signed print of Primal Scream's 'Screamadelica' cover on one wall and a framed photo of Audrey Hepburn on another. There's even a bloodsoaked shot of Keith Moon, legendary drummer with The Who, by the door. 'Ever danced with the devil in the pale moonlight?' it asks. It's an apt reminder of the past. Time has been kind to Carter. Now 29, he's a

handsome figure with a head for philosophy as well as fun. When he's not enthusing about new music (Jan Driver, Olav Basoski and Gomez), he's railing against the powers that be. But personal questions are strictly off limits. Ask him if he's single ("let's not mention that") or inquire after ex-girlfriend DJ Heaven ("Clare? Again, let's not talk about it") and you'll be met with short shrift. "I live alone," he says simply.



## Now that Norman's busy making babies, there's room for a new big beat leader. Are you the man to topple him?

"No, he'll be fine! Did you hear that Underworld remix he did? Absolutely disturbing loony track! Norman's never going to have a problem. You can't say that something died just because it became popular."

Why are you making house music now?

"After Norman, I think if I'd carried on doing beats stuff, then it wouldn't have been very fulfilling for me. I've

always been into throwing lots of different things in and trying to make it work. I get pissed off when people expect to hear a certain thing. They want to hear these big beats. And I can't do what people want to hear. With Basement Jaxx, you can hear 10 years of development in what they do. That and Daft Punk, that was when it all started coming round again. For four or five years, the music was stale. Progressive house was the last thing that happened in pure house terms and it just went round again and again, just getting slightly better-produced each time as the equipment gets that bit cheaper. Daft Punk ore that open with the filter thing and the efficiency of production. Absolutely solid, proper dance music. There's creativity going into it rather than just testing out new technology."

## Your new single is called 'Women Beat Their Men.' An explanation may be in order.

"It's quite a mad, intense title without offending anyone. It's also completely relative to the intensity I like in nightclubs — mayhem on a plate! [Smirks] Women should beat their men! [Adopts menacing voice] You are entering a world of pain! It's actually sampled from a record called 'The Dominatrix Sleeps Tonight'. Junior Cartier is a new area that I want to explore. Quite electro-based basslines and production and with the most horrible kick drums, like getting beaten up. In a funky way. I wanted to put together the dumbest, most lunatic noises of pure intensity—the sound of fax machines at war!"

Monkey Mafia never took off in the way they were expected to. Do you blame yourself?

"I put in a lot of work. I did two tours that I'm so proud to have done. Commercial success didn't happen but it didn't bother me because I'm proud of myself. We supported Roni Size and Massive Attack, both bands who have got a lot in common with mine through musical roots. I did as much as I could, but record companies just see things differently."



This year I took it easy, ate some fantastic food and came home without any pain at the airport! I'm an over-excitable little fella. Maybe not so little!"

## Where will you be on New Year's Eve?

"I'll be on Bondai Beach in Sydney with a load of mates. I didn't want to be in England so I'm playing for Home on the beach. Plus there's the thing that if all the missiles go off I'm on the right side of the hemisphere! Have you ever read [Australian Sixties nuclear apocalypse novel] On The Beach by Neville Shute?

## Erm, no. What annoys you about the world?

"What annoys me? The whole fucking thing! I could go on about this all night. [promptly launches into lengthy political rantl Mankind is a disease on this planet. Why does 95% of the wealth belong to five per cent of the world's people?

## What else?

"The Pope. Fuck the Pope! Condoms are more than just common sense - it's a life-saving precaution on a basic human need. And he'll still say you can't do it, which is basically promoting the spread of disease and over-population in the name of religion. And religion causes enough wars anyway! So fuck the Pope. And Noel Edmonds.

## Er-Noel Edmonds?

'Just look at his work record! Noel Edmonds is feeding people absolute bilge. Noel Edmonds is in one of the rooms below me in hell. With the Pope. I'm looking through this hole in the floor watching Noel and the Pope ironing each other's faces flat.

## Right. And where do you stand in all this mess?

"I don't know what I did in a past life but every day every fucking second of every fucking day - I know I am unbelievably fortunate to be doing a job that I love. It means that I haven't split my life in two. I'm not caught in that drudgery and I don't understand what I did to deserve it."

## Where do you stand on the subject of debauchery?

"If you are going to drink and get intoxicated, don't lose your awareness of the society you're in. Maybe not on the dancefloor when you're listening to a massive snare roll, but when you wake up the next morning don't just sit there smoking loads of spliff watching Pingu. I've seen some people do one trip of acid and it's just completely changed them for life. In a bad way. You should just know your limitations and know what you should and shouldn't be doing."

## Do you know your limitations?

"Ido, actually. I've hit my limits. It's not that scary. I was aware of them before. You don't push yourself to a place where you're completely in the unknown. There's no bravado in it and it doesn't bring anything more to you as you push yourself further. Just be aware of what you can and cannot do. There's no shame in saying, 'I don't like drink, so I'm not going to drink.' Unfortunately, most of the nutters I know have really high limits!"

## You've calmed down then?

"I'm a much calmer person these days. When I was 20 years old, I was running like a bull straight into the fucking world! When the Heavenly Social finished, a lot of my life came back. They're the biggest collection of hedonists you'll ever find in your life. Every Saturday in Turnmills which has always been the most hedonistic crowd in the whole of London. I just like calm these days. That's all I want, calm and awareness. And that's bliss to me.'

## And the future?

'I'm 30 on March 21st next year. That's the first equinox of the new millennium - the Spring equinox. What I want to do is get my life on a real even keel rather than the hectic maelstrom that it is at the moment. I'm going to go and sort myself out a pension fund and get on BUPA.

## **Anything else?**

"Be aware. That's all I can say to anyone."

After bringing us The Propellerheads, Les Rythmes Digitales and The Wiseguys, Wall Of Sound is turning to house, hip hop and even indie. Label boss Mark Jones explains



ARK Jones is a busy man. Not content with raising his new baby George, the Wall of Sound leader is also intent on putting out stacks of fresh new music. As big beat turns increasingly towards self-parody, the originators need to explore other avenues - hence the decision to start up three new labels. NuCamp is the home of house music, Bad Magic will cater for hip hop and We Love You will offer everything in between. The Wall has been broken.




## **NuCamp**

'The breakbeat scene is the new pop," Mark Jones claims. "The music has become a parody of itself. There are so many average labels throwing out DIY

breakbeat these days. If you go to an average Wall Of Sound night you will be mostly hearing house music. Jon and Jacques don't play anything but house now. So NuCamp is

a dance-orientated house label."

NuCamp is the new home of The Strike Boys, Trainer Boys and a certain Mr Junior Cartier. Is it good to have Jon back? "He never went away," quips Mark. "He just went on holiday." Future hits include one-off singles by DJ Pierre, Jerry Caligula and new French artist Pour Homme. Do you have anything else to declare? "Yes. The whole label is based around sex and debauchery." Right-othen.



## **Bad Magic**

Mark Jones is a tad tired of having to defend his new hip hop label. "People like pigeonholes," he admits. Certain people have a preconception about what a Wall Of Sound record will

sound like. We desperately wanted to release some pure hip hop, but the b-boys of the world can be so dismissive. So there's no mention of Wall Of Sound on the sleeve." The first release, a Jurassic 5-style groove from US act Ugly Duckling, came half-disguised as a US independent record to fool ardent Rawkus fans. It worked. "I read the other day that this is all drug-crazed megalomania," he huffs, "but it's not. We've had some success and now it's time to move in other areas."





## We Love You

Although the label is very much at a fledgling stage, Mark plans to release tracks by Impulsion's Pascal-R ("gabba techno punk") and ex-Talkin' Loud signing Sean Lee ("imagine a funky Beck. Or Badly Drawn Boy with songs!") There will also be compilations in the vein of Wall Of Sound's old 'Give 'Em Enough Dope' albums, "We Love You... So Love Us" is currently mooted as a title.

So rumours that Norway is the new Paris, umm. . . Sydney. . . uhh, Prada have been wildly exaggerated. Why, then, is Muzik heading to a country where a beer costs more than a night out in Blackpool and the locals eat packets of dried up fish-bits instead of crisps?

Well, if your idea of getting away for the weekend involves something more challenging than a three-legged race around Dublin's Temple Bar or smoking yourself into a stupor in Amsterdam, Norway has to be your next stop. With flights costing as little as £29 return, some

of the most sublime landscape in the northern hemisphere and the most attractive population this side of Italian Vogue, Norway is paradise on your doorstep.

Oh yeah, and did we mention it's producing some of the most exciting new music in the world?

You might have to pour reindeer milk on your comflakes, greasy spoons are strictly off limits and they do shoot an awful lot of whales, but Norway's club underground is a different proposition entirely. From subterranean, deep techy house to glorious Eighties electro pop via some stunningly fresh hip hop and jungle, Norway has suddenly blossomed. Or is it that we're only just waking up to them?

First impressions of Norway are of a fresh, spotlessly clean and airy land. The airport's made of wood, birds and butterflies flutter about and everyone is staggeringly beautiful. For Nordic

dance music producers, though, it hasn't always been the land of milk and honey.

"Most people in Norway listen to two styles of music – either shitty Euro techno or coffee table music," bemoans Rune, who releases deep, trippy house with Those Norwegians and engrymously on Paper's left field label Repa

eponymously on Paper's leftfield label Repap.
"You've got a Massive Attack CD in every home because they've been told that's the cool thing to listen to and the best names you'll get in most of the big clubs are Quiksilver and Sash!."

Rune's friend and rising star on the Nordic deep beats scene Bjorn Torske agrees: "Apart from Oslo, Tromso and Bergen, most people here are farmers, live in the countryside and the guy with the biggest sound system in his car gets all the chicks. Dance is a bit like the new heavy metal over here."

And until a few years ago, heavy metal and rock

was about all you could get in the majority of Norway's few record shops. Had it not been for Geir Janssen, aka ambient pioneer Biosphere and Per Martinsen, both from the tiny northern town of Tromso, travelling to Brussels and London to bring back records, Norway may never have moved on from Thin Lizzy, ZZ Top and denim waistcoats. The new music being brought back by the two travellers was so exciting to the youth of Tromso that when 100 copies of Bomb The Bass' Beat Dis' were sent to Norway, 60 of them ended up there.

Bjorn Torske, another native of Tromso, before he moved to Bergen a few years ago, caught the bug but couldn't afford the equipment to make this exciting new music. "We used to go to the technical shops and look at equipment, ask to try it out for the weekend and then take it back on Monday. If we went to several different shops we

could set up a whole studio over the weekend and take it all back on Monday!"

It's an in-built inventiveness they've been forced to deploy with depressing regularity, as no big Norwegian labels seem keen on promoting dance music. That job has been left to a handful of independent labels (there are fewer than 10 in the whole country) and foreign majors like Virgin, who seem to have spotted the talent.

Anders Rykkja from Bergen, who runs the Mush Mush label, thinks he knows why the Norwegian sound is picking up interest. "In London, New York or other built-up cities you hear mechanical noises and people talking all the time, but out here you can just step outside and you'll be surrounded by mountains and fjords—unconsciously you pick that up."

Okay, so it's not all pastoral scenes and loveliness. There are plenty of Gatecrasher-style

clubs wedged in among the fir trees, with regular slots for Messrs Jules, Fontaine and Tong. But the beauty of the small scene in Norway arises when people who make jungle hang out with people who make house who hang out with people who make funk who... well, that's where the really exciting music is coming through.

On the down side, the booze is so expensive in clubs over there that everyone gets tanked up at home before going out and weaving their collective way into the clubs.

Cocaine trades at £150 a gram and speed bombs are big news at £30 a pop. Although why you'd want to shrink your member with any drugs at all is beyond me, when the girls are so gorgeous.

So what does the future hold for the Norwegian underground scene? "In the beginning," concludes Bjorn, "we looked to Detroit or London for our influences, but now we've developed in our own right. We've got two national radio shows playing our music and loads of young people starting to DJ." So what's the plan now?

"We're gonna rent a mobile home, all pile into it and play in all the scummy pubs in England. That should get us noticed." See you at the bar.



into fully-fledged album success. And, having seen contemporaries like Armand Van Helden and Basement Jaxx come from behind to the top of the charts, so must Roger. His album is, he says, autobiographical. Musically it takes him from Eighties hip hop jams and electro to techno and banging filter grooves. It's ace.

The past two years have hardly been uneventful for Roger Sanchez. His Narcotic record label dissolved and he now runs his own, Strictly Rhythm-distributed, R-Senal label. The first release, his friend Junior Sanchez' monstrous 'B With U' EP, has already been picked up by Manifesto in Britain. More seriously, as 'Too Many Lovers' and 'Leaving' hint, his relationship with long-term girlfriend and business partner Karen also dissolved. "It was tough," he understates, blithely, "but it's okay. We continued to work together professionally, but I thought it best to make a clean break. I wish her best of luck with everything she's doing and I'm pretty sure she wishes the same for me." He bares his theatrical fangs with exaggerated faux menace.

The one constant in Roger's life is his DJ popularity in Britain and around the world. In an international club scene that has seen the popularity of American garage eroded by the unstoppable march of the E-friendly trance behemoth, he is the one American DJ still guaranteed to pull a crowd. When Cream flew Norman Cook and Paul Oakenfold around Britain to play at each of their 1998 New Year's Eve parties, Sanchez was the American corner of their superstar triangle. Only Morillo and Van Helden come close to his popularity, and only Subliminal chief Erick comes close to the hip hop-schooled skills Sanchez brings to the decks.

Whether on the terrace at Space, at the Strictly 10th birthday celebrations at Pacha, or turning on 'Crasher kids to garage at Creamfields, a Roger Sanchez set always makes the records into more than the sum of their parts. "I like to play with three decks," he boasts grandly, "cut up two copies of a record, float an acappella over the top – anything so there's always something going on." It's not an idle boast. Roger Sanchez doesn't drink. He doesn't smoke. He doesn't take drugs. What,

you're forced to ask, do you do? He goes to the gym regularly and watches his diet fastidiously. He is, in short, a bit of a big girl. Albeit a girl who practises Shotokan karate, so it's best to rib him from a safe distance. He sees his fitness drive as a necessary rearguard action against his DJ lifestyle and slowing thirtysomething metabolism. "I got into that typical 4am fast food diet in the studio," he laments. "Now I have no red meat, and very few sweet things."

There have always been two sides to Roger Sanchez. Brought up in New York by his Dominican family, he windmilled his way into the breakdance-fired hip hop culture of early Eighties Manhattan. As a dancer he appeared in early hip hop films like Beat Street and Krush Groove. But at the same time he was in the US marine cadets, spending his weekends "running around in the woods with a gun" and practising karate. "I didn't do it because of parental pressure," he shrugs. "I just wanted to do it for myself. Because of the discipline."

Those early lessons die hard. He's still a model of duality, a mixture of DJ and self-disciplinarian. A homeboy who obsesses over gourmet Japanese food. A native New Yorker who can't make up his mind whether the current Zero Tolerance campaign in the city is a good thing, or an anti-club disgrace. Still involved in the local scene, when at home he plays a residency every Friday at the Spy Bar, a small, downtown club/bar that pulls a cosmopolitan crowd of European ex-pats and homegrown househeads.

Back at the shoot, Roger is behind the decks at the imaginary party, while the immaculate dancers vogue and preen around him. He's been there a couple of hours, moving records back and forth in that pop video DJ way, not really doing anything. Too professional to even consider complaining. The cameraman shoots in fits and starts—the same scene over and over with insane repetition until the director calls a wrap. "In any other circumstances," deadpans his manager, "if he'd been behind the decks that long, he'd be a millionaire by now." Soon, Roger, very soon. . .

## Junior Skool Junior Sanchez on his namesake and being a Mongoloid



Why do they call you Junior Sanchez? Is It anything to do with Roger?

That's my name, man! Sanchez is like Smith, it's a very common name. I have my father's name, so everyone's always called me Junior.

We hear you started out very young? I started playing when I was 13. By the time I was 15 I was playing at the Limelight and [early Nineties New York club] Club USA. I had my first record out when I was 15. I grew up listening to people like Kerri Chandler and BOP. We didn't call it garage then, it was all just house music.

How did you hook up with Armand Van Helden and Roger? I've known Armand since 1994. We met at a rave in Boston. He said he was going to move up from Boston to New York. He moved in 1995. Since then we've been a unit. I met Roger through Armand.

And you're all Mongoloids. Just what is a Mongoloid? It was a creation of myself and Armand. We wanted a Wu Tang of house, to have strength in numbers. Sneak was the first one on board, then Roger, who was kinda reinventing himself. Erick Morillo is NOT part of it. He and his boys have their own thing. But when they call themselves Mongobonix, it's nothing to do with the Mongoloids.

So is there a bit of a beef between Subliminal and the Mongoloids? No, not at all, we've got respect for those cats, but they do their thing and we do ours. It's very different.

Why are you so into Eighties music? I'm a child of the MTV generation, I'm 22 years old and I grew up with four older brothers listening to Front 242, KMFDM, the Pet Shop Boys. You can't help but keep all that in. The whole disco shit's been happening for a couple of years, and I find it tired. I wanted to do something refreshing. There's more stuff out there to sample than disco and there are other things to do with it than using a filter. Everybody's quick to diss, but nobody's doing anything new.

How did you hook up with Les Rythmes

Digitales? Jacques heard one of my records, called 'Shape Of The Eighties' on Narcotic, where I mashed up Quincy Jones with Bon Jovi. He heard it and asked me to remix 'Sometimes'. He's a very talented guy.

Tell us about R-Senal. When Roger split up from his manager, Karen, I said, 'fuck this – start a new label'. I said to call it R-Senal and that if he started this new label, I'd do the first single. I did the music for 'Be With U' about a year ago, and then added a vocal. Jermaine – who runs R-Senal – and Dajae have been friends for years and he offered to get her to sing on it. It was no big deal.

What have you got coming up next?

I'm remixing New Order's 'True Faith' for London, and me and Armand are doing a Mongoloids album. I've got a single coming out on Yoshitoshi and a single on Armand's label Armed.

are ripping him off now, but with Maharishi everything has a purpose. If you see a button it always does something. I'm into Bikkenberg and Ilike Prada and Gaultier, but I tend to dress more b-boy down. I'm not rocking Echo like Armand though. Echo is the hottest streetwear right now, it's a bit like Karl Kani, but on a completely different level. I tend to mix my clothes with a bit more of a European feel. I'm an international b-boy."

## Sneakers (Trainers to you and me)

"I supported Adidas for years, but I get a lot of Nike kicks too these days. I got these mad silver foam Nikes which are ill. And of course, I've got my favourite shell

toes. I had all the colours, but my favourites are the silver on white. I like the new Air Tiens. I've got those in the fiery reds, the silver and the very pale grey. Whenever I can, I get two pairs. Especially if I know they're limited, like the blue and yellow split toe Nikes. Royales are interesting, too, they're an Australian sneaker."



## Layo & Bushwacka

Low Life **End Recordings** 

The End nightclub's owner and resident DJ take you on a perfectly produced breakbeat and tech-funk trip

"Es are good, Es are good" rapped Mr C in the early Nineties, shortly before introducing his mate and studio hand Matthew B to another raving chum, Layo Paskin.

A few years later Layo and Mr Copened The End nightclub and Matthew B joined them as resident at Subterrain, one of the best tech-house clubs in the world. Getting busy in the studio, the end result is, as we said last month, "the album Leftfield should have spent three years making" Made in a fraction of the time, Layo & Bushwacka's debut is a cruise through

dark Detroit electro, shimmering African sunrises and English urban breakbeat.

Flowing in a continuous mix, the journey starts with 'Midi Tune Up', an edgy but warm 21st Century soundscape. 'Chapter One' jumps into a souped-up jeep and cruises round Miami, rattling old ladies off their feet with a gargantuan sub bass, while the steel drums, P-Funk basslines and ghosts of old Italian piano house on 'Spooked' are a brew we've never tasted.

This pair aren't scared to experiment with mad noises that at times sound almost cheesy. Slap bass maestro Mark King of Level 42 fame would love the axe antics of 'Bad Old Good Old Days' and the bouncing timpani and camp gramophone horns of 'Deep South' will have you imagining Windsor Davies in a cannibal's pot on It Ain't Half Hot Mum before a


bluesy Mississippi mama starts crooning. With Robert Owen's guest spot on the saxy groove of 'Low Life' and the vast, African plain of 'Kusekaya' taking you to

distant places, the only technical turbulence in this otherwise perfect flight hits on track 12, 'Perfect Storm', when the autopilot clicks off, the nose starts to dip and the passengers get restless.

The Chemical Brothers, Leftfield and Fuel Records have all released fine breakbeat records this year but none sounds as new as this. This is the underground fighting back, snapping lightsticks, punching painted faces and burning white Mickey Mouse gloves.

This is the beginning of The End, my friends.

This Constant Chase For Thrills Screaming Target

Ricky Barrow and co return from the dark side with their fourth album



AND then there were three. Now stripped down to the trio of Ricky Barrow, Dean Thatcher and Gary

Burns, The Aloof have dug themselves from the dark pit of despair that prevailed on 'Seeking Pleasure'. Free of their former major label, the mood is less brooding, the production less cluttered. They're still tortured souls – as 'Doing It For The Money', 'Infatuated' and 'Tearing Up Inside' indicate – but they also sound suitably refreshed.

Those woozy blues vocals still soar. 'So Good' is aptly titled, 'Good Morning World' is a bright, early riser and the slow-burning 'Infatuated' features vocals from new signing Jo Sims. Elsewhere, melodies are a little lacking (check 'Sold'). In fact, the best track, 'The Beach', is instrumental. A mighty

seven-minute dub symphony, it blows everything else out of the water. Serene strings, a stately melody and hushed percussion would make it a cool accompaniment to an evening at Café Mambo. Warm and uplifting, it's also a worthy successor to 'Wish You Were Here'.

So where do they go from here? The Aloof seem destined to be marginalised as others hit paydirt above them. The party's over. What we need now are fireworks.

recently we'got back into it in a big way. We've been going to Headstart, The Bomb in Nottingham and loads of little parties. Everyone's going mad about Soulsonic as well."

"He is, and under the name Spectre as well. It just wasn't working out musically. We wanted to be a band and he just wasn't into that idea. It just ran its course, really – but we're still friends."

J Saul Kane makes a 'Lust'-y return. But it's what you do with it that counts

IT'S five years since breakbeat innovator J Saul Kane's 'Nine Deadly Venoms' debut as Depth Charge. Unfortunately, he doesn't seem to have picked up many new techniques along the way. 'Lust' features plenty of film snippet foreplay, some fancy analogue frottage and beats 'n' bass of admirable girth, all familiar from Charge standards like 'Bounty Killer' and 'Shaolin Buddha Finger'. It's most satisfying when Kane veers away from time-worn hip hop thrusting into moody downtempo strokes in a Sabres Of Paradise vein, but even that's unlikely to stop you playing away from home.

FOR those old enough to remember, much hope was vested in early Nineties act One Dove. Like a blissed-

out Primal Scream with a cherub for a singer and a bucket of liquid E for fuel, they provided some of the best comedown music imaginable before imploding in a tale of record company politicking and in-band fighting.

Five years on, those memories can be laid to rest. Because their former singer Dot Allison's debut is all we wanted from that One Dove debut album, and a lot more besides.

'Afterglow' bathes in those golden hours when you're back from the club and set adrift on post-lost-it bliss. Unlike many chill out albums, however, it positively sparkles with a refined pop sensibility. No wandering ambient aimlessness for this exiled Glaswegian. Allison has a voice to charm angels

from the heavens. On the delectable 'Message Personnel' and 'Alpha Female', it swoons orginstically as overlapping crescendos of ethereal power pop come on like the Cocteau Twins produced by Death In Vegas.

It's even better when she draws on influences as diverse as Phil Spector's wall of sound and Gram Parsons cosmic country falk: 'Tomorrow Never Comes', 'Morning Sun', and 'Mo Pop', Epic strings, psychedelic swirls, crumpled lows, giddying highs and even, on 'In Winter Still', a hint of Gallic camp - all weave into 'Afterglow' to sublime effect. Only 'Did I Imagine You' and the over-dippy 'Close Your Eyes', with its painfully cliched lyrics, let the side down. Still, 'Afterglow' is a magic, heartfluttering hour of your time. All hail Dot Allison, Queen Of Comedown.







## DJ Krust

Coded Language Talkin' Loud

Disappointingly predictable offering from the Bristol jungle don's debut album

OF all the junglists signed to major labels, this scribe had his money on Reprazent member DJ Krust to come up with the real classic. After all, he's been outclassing the competition behind the decks for months. And the single that preceded this album ('Future Bound') was so bowel-quakingly fearsome, it seemed nothing could stop him. But rather than rip up the rulebook, just when drum & bass needed someone to do just that, Krust has opted to follow the increasingly predictable blueprint for big d&b albums. Namely, the seemingly compulsory sprinkling of female vocals all over the place.

Krust's vocalist, Morgan, can hold a

tune. It's just that her contribution to tracks like the almost Shirley Bassey-esque 'Re-Arrange' never quite rises above average. The Hitchcockian dramatics of 'High Plainz,' the brooding 'Tribute' and a handful of other instrumentals all show he can still be masterful when he chooses. But too often, 'Coded Language' is frustratingly familiar rather than disarmingly revolutionary.



"I've got a group of friends who will always say when something's shit! A lot of my friends aren't musical – so I prefer to play my music to them. They either feel it or they don't."





ORIGINALLY released in July, this CD was akin to a damp haystack: something of a slow

burn. But its content – bluesy, mellow soul, punctuated by hip hop samples, DJ scratches and some sing-it-for-me-sista backing vocals, has ignited, making Gray's debut one of those get home, wind down and maybe get horny purchases.

Gray's a wryly opinionated soul, acutely proud of her viewpoint, which is, essentially, all her tracks really are. Gray's approach differs from that of other crafted soul (where you believe the singer is confessing the actual content of their past) and this feeling of narration over experience shadows the majority of the material,

reiterated all the more by Gray's bold and grizzly voice. So you veer from the mildly confrontational ('Why Didn't You Call Me?'), the questioning, the motivational, through to the sexually salacious; tracks that remind you of conversations you've had with friends about uninterested guys, stop-start relationships and how disappointment in your love life can create an overall feeling of inertia before you put on a record and dance the blues away.

Your ears will prick up to the sounds of Arrested Development the closer you listen to Gray's stripped down rural style, and while there is a similarity to their pop meets blues meets soul meets mellow approach, Gray's material is not so cluttered. Her intent is clear: to write songs based on everyday circumstance underpinned by music for the people, every day.

their own before Bradshaw, tragically, fell to multiple sclerosis in August 1997. Now Morrow has picked up the pieces and recruited ex-metaller Neil Shepherd, throwing up a mix of the bouncily jazzy ('Redrum' with its ultra-choppy drums), the broodingly muscular ('Dawn' with its mounful undertones) and the squelchily hyperactive ('Field Of Action' with its slobbery analogue bass). The best moments come from vocalist Shereen: 'Destiny' is pure, swooning, ambient d&b, while 'Risk' is soulful junglism and, remixed by Blueboy, a brilllantly funky cocktail of Blue Note trumpets and swinging bass. Bradshaw would definitely have been proud.


Flat Eric creator Quentin Dupieux follows Number One hit 'Flat Beat' with witty, noisy debut

DANCE music success stories don't come much more addball than Quentin Dupieux. An underground film-maker, he was hired by Laurent Garnier to make the video for 'Crispy Bacon' in 1997. When he invented a bobbing yellow puppet for a video to accompany his own music, Dupieux and his creation shot from obscurity to Levi's ubiquity and a Number One in seven countries. Now an album of leftfield electronica made in his spare time is one of the year's most anticipated dance releases. He must see the funny side.

It's safe to say there are no more potential chart toppers here. Dupieux's gouging of extreme bass belches and analogue squeals from his machinery recalls LFO, the Micronauts and even on 'The Salad' a slo-mo Chemical Brothers. He can make his electronics chatter like cyborg rodents ('No Day Massacre') or throb like a malfunctioning Tardis ('Inside The Kidney Machine'), while throwing in frenzied hip hop scratchings and quirky samples (John Cleese pops up on 'Bobby Can't Dance'). 'Flat Beat' meanwhile is perversely relegated to hidden track status.

'Analog Worms Attack' is thrillingly noisy and clever enough to be a cult favourite with the circuit board set. Quite how it will go down with the Flat Eric fans is another question. Either way, you suspect, Quentin Dupleux is laughing.



THINGS are about to change. Having kept a relatively low profile in England of late, Sasha's sets at Twilo have been greeted with adoration in New York. The reaction to 'Ride', 'Xpander' and remixes for Madonna and The Chemical Brothers have all ensured Sasha remains a quiet but confident force in clubland.

This two-hour excursion is as trippy and twisted as you'd expect. Like Danny Tenaglia's recent excursion on Global Underground, this thrilling, relentless ride pumps hard. It's deep. It's dark. It's effortlessly mixed in Sasha's inimitable style. In short, it rocks.

The first half is cool and breezy and includes cuts from Resistance D, Medway and Orbital, but in the second half the boy moves up a gear. BT puts in an appearance with 'Fibonacci Sequence' and 'Mercury And Solace', Sasha sneaks himself in with 'Xpander' and John Digweed's Bedrock project brings up the rear with his divine 'Heaven Scent'. Add some fresh slates from Pob, Bluefish and Acquilla and you're nearly there.

1999 has been a great year for Sasha. He's wowed at Creamfields and Homelands, released the adjective-enhancing 'Xpander' and inspired a fresh generation of clubbers with his brooding house and trance in Space. This is as close as you'll get without being there. Sasha looks set to explode all over again. Here's why.

Any cop then? Leon's mix is a cracker without the cheese, but with the quality of tracks and mixes on offer, he can't put a foot wrong. Looks like Hope is going to be one of the most talked-about imprints of 2000. (DF)

#### The Sound Of Freedom Automatic

What's it all about? Freedom is one of London's top nights out, with over 2,500 pumped-up punters (including Mr Remix, Matt Darey) losing their minds to five rooms of sounds and resident jocks Ariel and Lisa Pin-Up. Here's what it sounds like.

What's on it? Pumping house from former topless model Pin-Up, including Tony De Vit's 'Are You Ready', Floor Federation's 'Music For The Masses' and Cadenza's 'Rock Your Enemies'. Argie Ariel, meanwhile, opts for subtler tactics, building from 2B Continued's 'Laydown' via Kaycee's 'Escape' to Alexander Koning's blistering 'Tiwanaqu'. Both mixes are absolutely live.

Any cop then? Abso-fuckinglutely. This is the antithesis of those 'greatest hits' comps where tracks are never given time to breathe. On 'Freedom' both jocks really do have the liberty to express themselves. (DF)



WARP has always stood up as the alternative to what everyone else is hammering, and 10 years and countless chart successes haven't changed that. Even the way the Sheffield label commemorates its 10th birthday kicks against the fashion for spurious cash-in compilations. Instead, these three double CDs encompass its roots, its bleep techno glory days and the mischievous experimentalism of tomorrow.

'Influences' is a comprehensive guide to late Eighties classics. From the Chicago house of Phuture and Farley 'Jackmaster' Funk and Juan Atkins and Derrick May's Detroit techno to timeless UK gems from 808 State, A Guy Called Gerald and Unique 3, they'll have you cursing your Guru Josh records within seconds. Ditto with 'Classics'. The stark, turbo bass sound of LFO, Nightmares On Wax, Sweet Exorcist et al helped shape jungle, big beat and speed garage as well as techno and house. But it invariably feels more futuristic than most of the music that followed. Finally, 'Remixes' waves the flag for the leftfield wrigglings of Squarepusher, Surgeon and Boards Of Canada and the wigged out post-rock of Mogwai. Stereolab and Broadcast. Refusing to be intimidated by the classics in their clutches, the radical overhauls here will irritate purists and delight the open minded. All of which leaves us with one solitary gripe. It's a shame the brightest new star in the Warp firmament couldn't be arsed to join the party. Come on Aphex.

IF Cyprus was your holiday destination this year and/or you live in south London, this one is dynamite. If you don't, you'll still have heard the likes of Zoe Ball caning it. It's been around on slate for a year, and is proof positive of the crossover appeal of two-step garage, albeit with the lovely Neneh's help.

Graham: "Did we need this record again? The answer to that is a definite fucking 'no'. As for the mixes, you know what Dreem Teem sound like, so make your own mind up. It's not for me at all, but it will probably do all right sales-wise."

#### **Moby** Why Does My Heart Feel So Bad Mute

Many housey folk can't quite get their heads around Moby, so no surprise that he's gone for a textbook selection of remixers. ATB temporarily escapes from his twangy electroguitar fixation (thank God), Dutch master Ferry

Corsten does exactly what you'd expect, as do the Sharp Boys in their purist hard house vein. Interesting, if not quite inspiring.

Graham: "Originally I ignored the ATB mix because if I heard anything that sounded like '9pm (Till I Come)' ever again I would smash it into 10 million fucking pieces. But ATB has actually done a good mix, especially using that bit of Moby's dark vocal. I've been playing this for three weeks in a row and it really kicks arse. Whether Moby chose these remixers himself is another thing, though."

#### Starecase First Floor Deadlock

IT'S only one year old, but already the Bristolbased Hope imprint has made its mark in the progressive/france world. Here Starecase show exactly why: the production is as tight as a vicar's arse, the track drives forward like a charlie-fuelled Lamborghini, and the

Graham: "This is exactly the sort of thing you'd buy at Tag in London: very drummy and progressive, sort of Steve Stoll-ish. A nice little drop as well. It's got nice appeal without being too underground. I could see Coxy or even Mr C playing this."

#### Electrique Boutique

Revelation Data

JERRY Bouthier, Paul Woods (A&R for the Cream label) and Simon Grainger on keys serve up a stunning progressive pounder which was originally on Continental Recordings before being snapped up by Ministry offshoot Data. It's dedicated to Jerry's brother Tom, who recently died. Trance with soul, you might call it.

Graham: "I 've been playing this for a while and it really works. It's got a breakdown with a vocal about Jesus in it and I was a bit worried that people would think I was on a religious Farley Jackmaster Funk trip. When I played in Northern Ireland recently, loads of nutters were rushing up to request it. Very cool."

#### **Richie Hawtin**

Orange Is Derived From Yello Minus

CANADA may have gone trance mad of late, but one Canadian at least is sticking to his highly individual techno guns. Written by Hawtin and Yello's Deiter Meier (the track uses a sample from Yello's 'Oh Yeah') this two-mix excursion into percussion-led groove provides the perfect antidote to endless gurnathonic rave monkey fodder.

Graham: "I like the first one, it's got big organ lines and it's very drummy and funky while remaining quite minimal. It's more of a groove than anything. I'd use it in an early set, or as a track to build a set. Rich on the drums and powerful, this one."

Graham: "The Klute mix says 45, but I reckon it should be 33. #### **Special Forces** Something Else Photek Productions

Graham: "He cites Dave Angel, LFO and Carl Cox as influences, but LFO were much more thoughtful in their production. This cut is soulless bleepy house music. A complete no-no for me, despite the LFO reference."

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



As with Stardust, jocks from garage, trance and even jungle backgrounds are dropping this tune... even if it's when everyone else has gone home and they can have a private boogie undisturbed.

Graham: "It's got one of those vocals that really gets under your skin. It's quite subliminal in the mix, but it's there and it grabs you without being in-yer-face. It's very appealing. After the drop I would have liked it to have done more, but the opening groove is cool. It will definitely have its players. I have heard better Strictly records, and many have graced my records, and many have graced my box, but then Strictly have been doing this for 10 years."



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

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

Crikey, this is a deep one. So deep, in fact, that it sounds like listening to Pole in the bath with your head completely submerged as a steel band warms up by the sink. Weird and pretty darn wonderful. (DM)

Ian Pooley

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The Allnighter Remixes (NRK)

Excellent remix package in which the Slam boys prove that when properly administered, even ingredients as overused as filtered. disco loops and crashing cymbals can sound totally fresh. Meanwhile the rough and ready filter-free 'Slam Dub' on the flip side looks after the discophobes. (DM)

**Hutton Drive** 

Push It (Soma)

If Domenic Cappello's last outing as Hutton Drive had come out of Detroit in 1991 instead of Glasgow in 1997 it would have been hailed as a classic. And by the same token, if this had been released on New York's Bassic in 1992 and credited to Mike Perras, people would be falling over themselves to get their hands on a copy. Funny that, innit? (DIM)

Hardcell

Skunkworks 1 (Skunkworks)

After years of trying, and for the most part failing, to emulate the minimal sound of Detroit, there finally seems to be something new happening in Europe's more banging techno clubs. Hard, funky and very percussive, this is a good example of Euro-techno's new direction and a style that's pitched somewhere between Ben Simms and Adam Beyer. (DM)

**Yamaoka** 

Kotono EP (Kazumi, Japan)

Hard techno EP with two tracks that feature some of the most absurdly booming bass frequencies we've heard in ages. So booming, in fact, that the overall effect is not dissimilar to the sound you hear when rushing your nuts off standing in a queue outside a warehouse, as a 20k turbo rig belts it out inside. (**DM**)

Circulation

Limited 4 (Circulation)

Without question one of this month's loudest, brashest and quite frankly maddest releases, 'Limited 4' is absolutely chock-a-block with a whole artillery of truly berserk, almost industrial sounds and hard banging beats. If this is tech-house tech-house must be changing. (DM) \*\*\*

E-Dancer Banjo (KMS/PIAS, Belgium)

Two new and equally good interpretations of one of the key tracks from last year's 'Heavenly' album, Funk D'Void's mix is smooth and almost orchestral, while UR's Mark Flash turns in a more uptempo, hi-tech funk affair. Thankfully they both keep the heart of the track intact by making good use of Saunderson's trademark strings. (DM)

**Den Nard Husher** Nard's Groove Volume 1 (Thule, Iceland)

A surprisingly uptempo double pack from a label that normally concentrates on more horizontal material. Taking in everything from hard loops and deep dubs to funky tech-house, most of the tracks are produced with DJs in mind, but the rhythms are strong enough to be more than just mix fodder. (DM)

Gideon

Upsundowns (Swag)

Gideon

What You Need (Eukahouse)

There are plenty of people making tech-house records at the moment but Gideon Jackson's productions have a certain edge that makes them stand out. Check out the acid-tinged electro track on the Swag release and his cheeky use of samples or the way the arrangement works on 'What You Need' and you'll see what we mean. (DM)

**Various Artists** 

Native Sampler (Native)

Four deeper shades of techno from Theory's esoteric offshoot. Stasis appears with a previously unreleased gem from 1993, Ben Simms goes head to head with Steve O'Sullivan, Paul Mac delivers a multi-layered tech-funker and best of all new boy Des Williams gets super deep with some lush expansive electronica. (DM)

Transparent Sound Slang City

(Transparent Sound)

More spooky, atmospheric electro from Bognor's favourite b-boys. As with their last couple of twelves, the three tracks here are very much in the Anthony Rother mode, with sparse punchy beats, eerie string and old school techno sounds. (DM)

Newcleus/Extra T's

Jam On Revenge/ET Boogie (Regal)

Two of electro's best loved tunes together on the same double pack alongside some spanking new mixes from the likes of Luke Slater and Bronx Dogs. But perhaps unsurprisingly, given their respective backgrounds, it's Juan Atkins' spacey take on 'ET Boogie' and Kirk Degiorgio's firing mix of 'Jam On Revenge' that fare best. Recommended. (DM)

**DMX Krew** 

Good Time Girl (Rephlex)

This month's electro pop record comes as a seven-inch picture disc in the shape of Ed DMX himself. The music is pure Eighties electronic non complete with a vocal in which Ed denounces DJ groupies and as an added bonus the record even features Melissa from Chicks On Speed on the phone. It's not cool, but neither is it trash. It's cool trash. (DM)

Rue East

Summer Of Blood Remixes (Pure Plastic)

Surgeon and Ben Sims rework Dave Hill and Mark Broom's Rue East project into the sort of driving techno-funk that could slit your throat, nick your drink and then drive you to emergency and stitch you back up like new. Blood-y marvellous. (SJ)

Awakening The Sentient (Blueprint)

Ho hits where it counts with raw, tribal funk and abstract sonic warfare shrouded in beats the size of of an atomic bomb blast. Dark, minimal, ultra-sinister and highly

individual, this is the sound of tomorrow at today's prices. Time to wake up! (SJ)

**Ben Long** 

Prime Time EP (Primate)

Cunning dancefloor electronics from norf London's Potential boss and Space DJ that dips into the deranged, scattered loopiness of fellow Spacer, Jamie Bissmire's Ground sound before taking on a house classic just for the sheer hell of it. Prime time indeed. (SJ) \*\*\*

Dahlback/Krome

The Real Jazz (Remixes) (DK)

A double pack of remix madness for one of 1998's dancefloor gems as Sneak, Roc Hunter, Adam Beyer and Erot turn the thumbscrews up to 11 for maximum effect. This time the deep house boys come out on top as both Beyer and Sneak's reworkings fail to ignite the techno torch paper. (SJ)

**Various Artists** 

International Deejay Gigolos CD3 (International Deejay Gigolos, Germany)

Eclecticism in techno is a great idea, but unfortunately it doesn't work. At least it didn't until Gigolos came along. Like their first two CDs this collection covers everything from deep tribal house to Eighties-style Euro-pop and tough new electro. The glue that binds it all together is label boss DJ Hell's spot on taste and keen ear for refreshingly unusual dancefloor treats. (DM)

**Various Artists** 

Series (Morpheus)

Dirty Chicago funk nestles snugly next to UK looped grooves as Robert Armani, Ben Sims, Morpheus Productions and DJs Funk and Hyperactive go head to head. The UK's Oslim Jims proves to be the healthiest option. (SJ)

Producer Profile

West London techno-futurist Oliver Ho on music, minimalism and Meta-physics

How would you describe your sound?

It's strongly influenced by tribal music from around the world. I don't worship Detroit - there are people like the Kodo drummers from Japan whose music has been around for thousands of years and is so much more powerful and relevant.

What were your first and most recent productions?

My first was Blueprint 2 in 1996 and the most recent is the 'Sentience' album. I'm also working on the next Meta release [Oliver's own label] and starting a new label called Colour, with the accent on more atmospheric and arrhythmic music.

What are you listening to at the moment?

Autechre. And Steve Reich - he has the ability to show that simplicity can be very powerful.

Have you worked with any other producers?

James Ruskin. I generated four samples and we made tracks individually from the same source material. But I find it hard to be in the same room with anyone else when I'm making music. Language gets in the way.

So who would be your ideal non-verbal collaborator? I'd say Tulok Gurtu - he's the best Indian percussionist I've

ever heard. I've got lots of ideas about mixing live performances with electronics.

What's the concept behind your new album?

Sentience' is about awareness, consciousness and flexibility. The more fluid you make yourself, the more potential there is for creative and personal progress. words TOM MUGRIDGE

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



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## Singles

Mauro Picotto Iguana (Nukleuz)

The official follow-up to 'Lizard' arrives in a number of well playable mixes, not least the stunning hoovertastic Blank & Jones remix with its big breakdowns; a bubbling, acidic Hardfloor-esque 'RAF Mix' by Picotto and a more typical, Capricorn '20Hz'-influenced, Mediterranean progressive styled MAS mix. An excellent package. (MK)

#### **The Generator**

Where Are You Now? (Tidy Trax)

A stunning Ferry Corsten and Robert Smit production in its mesmerising and uplifting hard trance-styled 'Moonman Remix', licensed from Tsunami's Polar State spin-off. Unfortunately these two twelves don't come with much else in the way of hot new mixes, unlike the Tidy releases of old, when every mix was a killer. Has the bubble finally burst? (MK)

#### Brainbashers Cum On (Shock)

There are two equally usable mixes of Rachel Shock and Graham Eden's latest Brainbashers effort. The anthemic A-side teases a cheeky Frankie Goes To Hollywood sample in and out of a slamming mix of tough beats and familiar old skool noises, while the bass-heavy B-side goes for a sparser arrangement that's an ideal in-the-mix DJ tool. As reliable as you'd expect. (MK)

#### Dealers De Funk

New Jersey (Sub-lime)

Alan Thompson's fledgling label comes of age with this proven wild and funky groove, licensed from Germany's Clubstar label. The new mixes are superb, with Olav Basoski turning in one of his most accomplished treatments, and original Trade DJ Smokin' Jo delivering a filtered freakshow that makes a mockery of most other records in its style. (MK)

#### Digitale New York Doll (Y2K)

Steve Hill's been making a lot of waves with his Y2K imprint, not least because it's the home of he and Mick Shiner's Nylon, currently the darlings of the major labels, thanks to their Signum-styled trancey house remixes. There's a top one included here too, accompanying the pounding 'Thrillseekers Remix' and the delightfully Dutch-sounding 'Original Mix'. (MK)

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#### Kay Merry Go Round Tales From The Crib (It's Fabulous)

The bright and breezy Dutch anthem from a couple of years back gets a well-deserved re-release. The classic 'Original Mix' and the import's rather dated 'Klubbheads Mix' are joined by a pounding and pumping Rachel Auburn remix that perfectly blends all her trademark sounds with that memorable riff that you'll be humming from now

until Christmas. (MK)

#### Twin

The Sound We Need (Waako, USA)

A new Swedish act Twin launch with an exciting debut. Their 'Club Mix We Need' cuts up an infectious female vocal and drops it intermittently aloft a rough and ready house groove with disco overtones. Alex J supplies a floor-filling disco-house mix, but the real joy is Alan Thompson's beefed up remake, which puts plenty of fun back into the funk. [MK]

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#### FPI Project

Rich In Paradise/Going Back To My Roots (99 North)

Some club classics bring back memories of the eye-watering kind, and this Italo-house anthem is one, if you're old enough to remember it from first time around. This rerelease is unlikely to have the same effect on today's tranced-up kids, but the new mixes from Dillon & Dickins do it justice, even if the ones from Loop and The Phantom do not. [MK]

**Lost Witness** 

Red Sun Rising (Sound Of Ministry)

The Lost Witness follow-up to Top 20 stormer 'Happiness Happening' is an equally catchy Euro proposition which is finding huge favour with Judge Jules and your usual party DJs. The Lange or Balearic mixes will be the ones to spin for most jocks. (DF)

#### **Mobile Bitch**

Sex For Pleasure (Bitch)

Caned on test pressing by Anne Savage, Nick Rafferty and Craig Daniel, Mobile Bitch's latest is already bubbling under sufficiently to secure Bitch's next big underground hit. The original stays hard and banging, while Orange Monkey reworks it on a more progressive tip. (DF)

#### Que Pasa

Dream On (Manifesto)

One half of the Sol Brothers, Andrew Galea, and ex-Uno Clio member Steve Turner are joined by Spanish songstress Silvia La Rosa for a diva dancefloor belter. 'Dream On' nicely samples the piano line from 1991's Italo-screamer 'Electric Choc', by the way. (DF)

Trouser Enthusiasts Sweet Release (Delirious)

They've remixed PSB, Karen Ramirez and Armin, and now the Trouser Enthusiasts unleash their debut single. Featuring the fierce vocals of Mitch Stevens and an Olmec Heads reworking for tougher floors, this is a quality production all round. (DF)

#### Starfighter Apache (Neo)

The tune that rocked Space and Bora Bora in Ibiza this summer on promo gets a full UK release... and about time too! Big with all the major players and seemingly able to slide into any set – from Coxy to Lisa Loud – so you know this tune is going to fly. Chart success? We hope so! (DF)

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#### **Producer Profile**

Simons Poole and Kempertake us to the charttopping world of groove that is **Lost Witness** 



#### How would you describe your production sound?

Our second track as Lost Witness, 'Red Sun Rising' is Balearic—the sound of libiza. Originally we were much more commercially based, like 'Fine Nights' on the Ministry and Gatecrasher compilations. At that point we were very much into hard house—I was label manager at Tidy Trax for a year. That's where we met. We're trying to do something more ambient, yet still housey, for the third single. We don't want to be pigeonholed!

What were your first and most recent productions?

My [Poole] debut twelve was back in 1994 with By-Si, a discoesque EP through OBV. Our most recent production, as Lost Witness, is 'Journey To Your Eyes'. It's led by the vocal. Tracy [Carmen] has such a strong voice that she can carry the track.

#### What are your musical influences?

It's difficult to say. I [Poole] have been DJing for 15 years, through hardcore, early house, Todd Terry and so on. We believe in song-based music, something you can relate to. If we had to put our finger on a track that influenced us it would be something like Patti Day's 'Right Before My Eyes'. Now that's classic house!

Who have you enjoyed working with, and who would you most like to work with?

The vocalist out of the Cocteau Twins, definitely – she's superb. Also Björk, she's got an amazing vocal range. Instrumental tracks are two a penny, but if you can work with someone with a distinctive voice, now that's something. Up to now, we've only produced together, and for a short while with Nick Bracegirdle of Chicane. Hopefully with the success of 'Happiness Happening' and 'Red Sun Rising', more doors will open for us.



From the straight jazz of '4 Miles' to the haunting duet with Beth Orton on 'Love Can Do', this set captures all your emotions in one hour of your life... Spiritually uplifting and totally awesome. #### East West Connection Three's A Crowd (Chilli Funk)

Released by demand from the UK trio's top selling album 'The More I Get...', this is one raw, stripped piece of unadulterated jazz dance. The major force in this Nineties phunker is the incredible talent of Dennis Rollins, whose mean trombone solos take you way up and beyond. Add to that the production talent of Graham Jeremiah and Tony Economides and you have one mother of a tune. (BJ)

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#### Chari Chari

Across The Universe (File, Japan)

Tokyo-based label File is following Flowers into the 'most wanted' sections with its reputation for quality black vinyl. Reaching towards the musical end of soulful dance, this includes a rewash from our own Frankie Valentine. The end result is incredibly entertaining and full of jazzy vibes, one for those of us who like a little depth to our soul. (BJ)

#### Jaymz Nylon

Know A Place (Out Of The Loop)

A brand new motif surfaces from Manchester with this debut cut from New York's Jaymz Nylon. Calling upon the vocal prowess of Mooney, with mixes from Shades Of Black, this is one infectious cut that gets right inside your head and is a surefire winner on our more open-minded club floors. (BJ)

### Aphria

I Got It (Betty Cann)

This new London outlet was put together to showcase up and coming UK talent. This first release sees young gun producer Tony Economides introduce the attractive soulful vocals of Ricki Collins and the ruff bass of Paul Falloon. This is uplifting future dance with the added bonus of the evergreen Bobbi & Steve in the mix. This cannot fail to ignite the floor. (BJ)

**SR Smoothy** 

Inside Of You (Disorient)

Another moment to savour from the land of the rising sun. This is a lush, laid back late summer soulful experience featuring the unknown 19-year old Ria, who voices her opinion with such maturity for such a young head. The whole plot is respectfully remixed by our own DJ Harvey. Truly a future gem. (BJ)

#### Eve

Gotta Man (Ruff Ryders/Interscope)

Eve provided the rap on Blackstreet's 'Girlfirend/Boyfriend' and now appears with her first and very impressive solo outing. Produced by man of the moment Ruff Ryder's Swizz Beatz, the track features an irresistibly funky, jerking rhythm and squeaky sung motif throughout. One of the tunes of the year. (TF)

#### DJs Runnin' Things

Reggae Exclusive Volume 2 (white label)

The latest in the excellent series of unofficial DJ Tool EPs from New York. This one features a reggae remix of TLC's 'No Scrubs', Buju Banton's 'Sensi Persecution' over the 'Scrubs' backing track and D'Angelo's 'Devil's Pie' and Mary J Blige's 'I'm Going Down' over the classic 'Ring The Alarm' reggae rhythm. Now that's value for money. (TF)

#### IMX

Stay The Night(Universal)

The return of the late lamented boy band Immature in a new guise. No details of the producers on this scarce US promo but the stabbing rhythm track soon gets in your head and stays there. The boys offer their trademark vocals and this has 'r&b hit' written all over it. (TF)

## Albums

#### Ola Onabule

Precious Libations For Silent Gods (Rugged Ram)

A credible UK talent who always delivers an inspiring set and this is

no exception. Using the cream of session and tour musicians this maxi takes his musical aspirations

into another dimension. Full of mature songs and spot on 'live' production, he really is a force to be reckoned with. (BJ)

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#### Chaka Khan

I'm Every Woman... The Best Of (Warners)

What do you say about this voice that hasn't been said before? One of life's truly inspiring singers who always reaches with the incredible power of her vocals. All these cuts are

tried and tested dancefloor nuggets and you would have to be soulless and devoid of any feelings not to get off on this compilation of classic soulful club anthems. File under timeless music. (BJ)

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111 From Tha Soul

111 From Tha Soul (BMG, Japan)

This collection of modern day soul songs comes from an American threesome, who amazingly enough couldn't get the props in their own yard so they locked further afield to the land of the rising sun. This album is cool beyond belief and has taken its influences from the Sixties and Seventies roots of black music, but brought them right up to date. This is one of the soul albums of the last decade — miss it at your peril. (BJ)

#### Joyce

Hard Bossa (Far Out)

With Cuban and Brazilian music being accepted *en masse* on our dancefloors, it is quite appropriate that Brazil's finest sister should invade our speaker space with her latest offering of raw Rio beats and pieces. Self-produced with a helping hand from the dedicated Joe Davis this, as the title suggests, is one for the purists in the house. Sao Paulo soul and another winner from Far Out. (BJ)

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#### Natalie Cole

Snowfall On The Sahara (Warners)

Over the last few years Natalie, daughter of the late great Nat King Cole has been to hell and back, but now she has seen the light, fought her way back to the top and has produced a superb offering of soulful songs full of love and devotion. This is pure chilling music, one for a romantic encounter, those cold shower moments when we like to get it together with the one person we really appreciate. Deep and then some. (BJ)

#### Ade

Spiritual Soul (YAM Entertainments)

Moving through a veritable melting pot of quality musical influences and joining the dots between reggae, funk, gospel and soul, Ade has created a beautiful and emotional album for the debut release on YAM. Lovingly put together with the help of the UK's top black producers Jimmy Haynes, Derek Johnson, Carlos Edwards and Defoe, this truly is an uplifting experience. (BJ)

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#### Hil St Soul

Soul Organic (Dome)

It's been a while since the UK could embrace a quality r&b outfit, most of those around are but shallow copies of their American cousins. Hilary Mwelwa and Victoria Redwood-Sawyer excel where others have not — their sound is unique, unbelievably fresh and above all so so deep, black and very soulful. This is the highest quality music from the street and if the media and public miss out on this then the future of UK black music is very grim indeed. Truly this is the real deal and it doesn't get much better than this. (BJ)

Various Artists Blue Streak (Epic/Sony)

A soundtrack notable mostly for the first track, Jay-Z's slamming 'Girl's Best Friend', produced Swizz Beatz from Ruff Ryders and almost a partner track to Eve's 'Gotta Man'. Elsewhere it's variable. Two Rodney Jerkins tracks of which Keith Sweat and Da Brat's 'I Put You On' is okay. Better are two productions from Dru Hill and from Foxy Brown and Ruff Endz. (TF)

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#### **Donel Jones**

Where I Wanna Be (La Face)

A samplet from Jones' eagerly awaited a burn shows that the wait might be worthwhile. The massive 'U Know What's Up' is joined by another uptempo cut 'When I Was Down' (sampling Curtis' 'Freddie's Dead') but it's the slower stuff that might rule the roost. Particularly strong is the piano ballad 'Where I Wanna Be'. Quality stuff and a worthy successor to Jones' acqlaimed debut. (TF)

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#### Heart Of The Platter

Quizzing **Gabrielle** on why hernew album 'Rise' is autobiographical but not sensationalist



"THE album is a part of me, part of my growth. It also shows my maturity and strength and shows Iwill never allow myself to be put down by any circumstance, person or thing. I will triumph above it all.

"That said, 'Rise' does allow people to nosey into a little bit of what I'm about. A lot of my songs are a itobiographical in a roundabout way and I've talked about my personal life, but I try not to think about it as betraying a secret, because there are some beautiful secrets you want to share with the world. It's just one of those things. This is me, this is who I am and if

you rieed to know anything about me, it's in my music. I've always been able to write like that anyway – it's not deliberate, it just happens. It's a case of 'I'm feeling this, so I'm gonna write about it'.

"None of my albums have followed a trend. There's room for all of us and there's room for all this great music and I just love all the variety out there. But when I do my own stuffl try not to take the outside world on board because that's not me. Only they can do what they do and I can only do the best that I can do, so that everyone can say there's only one Gabrielle. I didn't think like that in the early stages of my career, but that had more to do with a lack of confidence. But I'm here with my third album. Doing what Gabrielle does."

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# **BREAKS & BEATS**

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#### **Various**

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Y3K (Distinctive)

Guy Hatfield aka DJ Hyper aka Mr Waxworks has compiled and mixed an album dedicated to the more progressive side of breakbeat and this first release from the album shows what treats are in store. #### Medicine

Capitol Rocka (Next Century)

An excursion into 4/4 for the Next Centurions, but 'Capital Rocka' still packs enough beef to knock most other house-orientated breakbeat grooves into the hereafter. Think oceanic washes of dubby horns, a ragga vocal with all the menace of Tek-9 and the kinda bass frequencies vou'd rather not meet outside Friction on a dark night. Fantastically dark, darkly fantastic. (KB)

#### Sir Drew

Disco Freak (Kingsize)

Squawking dancefloor freakshow that resolutely refuses to hang up its starburst shades and stop pretending to be Rick James Boasting cheesy synths, a wiltingly camp electro-disco pulse and a vocal line that's equal parts Prince, George Clinton and Papa Smurf, it's almost like the Nineties never happened. Tough shit, trance fans. (KB)

#### **Chicken Lips**

Git Back (Kingsize) 'Shoe Beast' ruled, and here's

Chicken Lips - namely Dean Meredith and Sir Drew's Andy Meacham – back to cause more damage. 'Git Back', a bottom-dollar 303 colossus, sounds the most like Saturday night incarnate, but 'Master Jammin''s freeze-dried filters and glittery samples would be perfectly attuned for the full Travolta on any evening of the week. (KB)

#### artist unknown

Shady (white label)

How many more times can you bear to hear Eminem's 'My Name Is... diced and liberally sprinkled across a bootleg? At least one more time if they're as competent as this blistering, break-based deconstruction of the omeletteheaded one's paean to diminished responsibility. Unsubtle, ingratiating in the extreme and downright rude, it's a fitting tribute, all told. (KB)

#### Simon Samplar

Gunshot (Poumtchak)

Ragga samples back on the dancefloor: about time. All the more so when they're complemented by a groove that's a third cloppety twostep garage, a third sizzling disco out-takes and a third itchy funk. Add James Brown samples, scratches, dancehall shouts and there you have it: all your favourite music rolled into one authentically, unbelievably fab tune. From France. Bastards. (KB)

#### Martin

Free Delivery (Under Fives)

Don't be put off by the 'enigmatic' name: on the evidence of this daft and inspired record it shouldn't be long before Martin graduates to a place alongside Skint's mainstays. Comprising kitchen sink erotica ('Rita, Sue & Bob Too'), late night monologue ('Free Delivery') and gleeful character assasination ('Tipper Gore'), this is an unlikely must-have. (KB)

#### Waveform

Deep Dubs (TCR)

Mikey James' exercises in bassline electronica are never less than enthralling, but 'Deep Dubs' sounds like an entire series of 'Tomorrow's World', so uncompromisingly scientific is it. Still, not too square to get booty shaking when manipulated by the right set of hands. Intelligent breakbeat, anyone? (KB) \*\*\*

#### Stereophonic Rockers Expanded Groove (Boombox)

If we're not very much mistaken, this is a nu skool version of Lonnie Liston Smith's jazz-funk staple 'Expansions'. Cool! Possibly one of the first instances in which a jazz bassline has tangoed with a 303 and not badly lost out, we're glad to recommend this for its academic value as much for its sheercheek. (KB)

#### **Resident Filters**

Get It On (Lacerba)

Chart-inclined big beat that's renounced all claim to underground cred, but which still manages to

sound eminently likeable. It is, however, the honking mix by cheese merchants Krafty Kuts that'll either take this onto TOTP or, failing that, right onto the student union floors. You'll love it, but you'll hate yourself for it. (KB)

#### **Various Artists**

Finger Lickin' Sampler (Finger Lickin')

No vinyl pressing of Finger Lickin's debut comp so search for this limited 12-inch sampler, or you'll miss Ben Chapman's superslick take on Soul Of Man's 'Gonna Keep On' and Krafty Kuts' semi-nu skool revamp of Flint's 'Everbody's Funkin" Dreadzone and Danmass also contribute canyon-deep reworks of the FL back catalogue. (KB)

#### **Ecologist**

She Loves You (Preacher Gus mix) (Moksha)

Rampaging breakbeat workout of Ecologist's Beatles pastiche moment with dive-bombing 303 muscle, nuclear-assault axe riffage and all manner of beastliness that would sound totally wicked on nine pints, five Es, a gram of speed, a line of K and a bottle of amyl up your bum. Approach with extreme caution at all other times, however. (KB)

#### **South Sea Bubble**

First On The Left (Pussyfoot)

Fans of Jacknife Lee, Tim 'Love' Lee, Freddy Fresh and Norman Cook will love this record, a cheeky, organdriven schwing across the boulevards with a Panama hat in one hand, a Havana cigar in the other, a cranium packed with top-grade class A drugs and a warrant for your arrest on charges of being the new acid jazz. Stay detuned, folks...(KB)

#### Language Lab

Recaffeienate (Kahuna Kuts)

More perky than a Blue Peter presenter mainlining triple-strength speed, this brassy ode to the joys of coffee combines a booming rap. bulging horns and the resurrection of Soul II Soul's trademark rhythm. Not quite as vivid as 'Burning Disasters' but it still rocks. (KB)

#### Dee-Kline, Baffled & MC **D** White

Expressions (Fifty First Recordings)

Wicked breakbeat/garage fusion which is bringing the UK garage sound much closer to the world of breaks. Cool (very UK) MC vocal over big basslines and phat beats. The breaks DJs are getting into this sound and the garage producers are getting into the breaks. Exciting times ahead. Maybe they'll get married. (RP)

#### **Filter**

Welcome To The Fold (F111)

American rock band Filter move temporarily to Warners' dance arm

for this track with a Freq Nasty mix and a rather disappointing Moving Fusion mix. Freq Nasty keeps things hard but this time mixed with a wicked tripped-out dubby noise that grooves the track along very nicely. This was recorded in the infamous Westway Studios and his production sounds all the better for it. Will work any dancefloor, (RP)

#### **Timo Maas**

Der Schieber (Hope)

Only their eighth release and Bristol's Hope already have a quality back catalogue. This has a tech-house mix on one side and a breaks mix on the other. The beats are rolling and the bass is driving. Perfect in a club with a refreshing lack of noodly bits. (RP)

#### **Timo Maas**

Mad Dogs (Planet Breaks)

The second single from Timo Maas, this time for new label Planet Breaks, is another slice of wellcrafted breakbeat with all the right

ingredients. The beats are good, the bass is nice and nasty and there are even some classy melodic bits. For once the Germans weren't there first but they're not far behind. (RP)

#### Tsunami One &BT

Hip Hop Phenomenon (Marine Parade)

Brilliant, of course. Dropping his prog cheese merchant tag in favour of nu skool darling, it's BT's contribution that elevates this intelligent roller into the stratosphere. Diamond hard breaks, sub-atomic basslines, express funk to go. This rocks hard. (KB)

Bovell Earthling (Ziarox)

The most original track for quite some time - lovers' rock vocals over incredibly sparse beats and an ohso-simple bassline. The kind of track that doesn't have much going on but that sounds great anywhere. Definitely worth looking out for. (RP)

#### What are your influences?




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

You'll be shouting its brilliance from the rooftops till next year. (CB)

Cars (City Slang)

Minimal electronica straight from the heavens doesn't come any finer than this track from TRR's recent The Amateur View' album, Ticking rhythmically like Global Communication's grandfather clock, it's as gentle as goose down, the kind of rare chill out track that always gets asked about. Celestial. (CB) \*\*\*

**Procreation** 

Us Vs Them (Compost, Germany)

Introverted, intricate nu jazz experimentalism from Switzerland. But this being the Compost label, it never descends into atonal freeform. 'Sundance' in particular hits the sweetest of funky horizontal notes, while the lead cut shimmies onto the coolest of dancefloors like a Holistic outcast in bebop heaven. Unusual and complex. (CB)

#### Shaboom

Gypsy (Shaboom)

The Blackpool house label, like its Toko counterpart, seems to be diversifying into ever more skilful non-house territories these days. The Jaz Twit remix takes the Spiritual Life route to sublime Balearic vibes replete with Spanish flamenco madness, a Khaled-style wailing vocal and rolling summer nightfall beats. Pure Med magic. (CB)

South Sea Bubble

First On The Left (Pussyfoot)

Howie B's label is back on track after plentiful releases in the wilderness. South Sea Bubble's quirky organ-fuelled weirdness is a pleasure somewhat akin to The Gentle People covering Donovan's 'Sunshine Superman' while Fridge man the synthesisers. (CB)

Phased (Bobby Hughes Experience Remix) (Disco Volante)

Of a triple-pack of mixes for this new British singer, the Bobby Hughes Experience effort is the

one to head for. Confirming the talent his debut album already prodigiously displays, Hughes' remix is pure Jazzanova-style excellence, as he allows Santessa's breathy vocals to drift delicately across a soaring, vibe-soaked, summery soul groove. Plush. (CB)

Terranova

Just Enough (Copasetik/!K7)

The German lot's roots in early Bristol trip hop are there for all to see, but 'Just Enough' lifts itself strategically out of the copyists' mire thanks to Coco Krebitz's menacing half-sung, half-whispered vocals, plus a stark, gothic edge that puts its clammy hand on your hips and sways them slowly. (CB)

**Bougie Soliterre** Something (Flipside)

From the same west London clique as Main Squeeze and the awesome People labels, more of that unique sound (part garage, part soul, part experimental jazz) that's being called broken beats. It makes sense here, as the groove is a radically splintered take on garage, like Timbaland producing Jazzanova, coupled with a subtle soaring vocal that's pure summer breeze. (CB)

**Immense** 

Death To The Gremlins (Fat Cat)

Where their debut was pure adrenalised white noise. Immense's follow-up is more like Fridge or Fretless AZM after a mug of mushies. One side is wistful instrumental pluckings, while 'Don't You Know...' introduces a swinging groove as it works its way up to a beautifully laconic fury of flying sax and thrusting bass. (CB)

**DJ Krust** 

One Moment/Overture (Talkin' Loud)

A limited seven-inch single with the Bristol junglist venturing into 4 Hero-style orchestrated territory. 'One Moment' is a beatless orchestral crescendo, best kept for those end-of-night moments. But 'Overture' is altogether different -a fractured torch song, like Dot

Allison or Beth Orton slowly drowning in a sea of murky halfspeed jungle beats. Strange and rather wonderful. (CB)

Tricky

Product Of The Environment (Sampler) (Palm Pictures)

Glorifying a load of old gangsters by letting them tell their stories over soundtrack beats. might sound like a bit of a cheap publicity gimmick, but this fourtrack sampler is actually startlingly good. While the dialogue is straight out of

Lock Stock land, Tricky and his keyboard player concoct dazzling background music that's as haunting as it is funky. (CB)

Various Artists

Wave Summer (Sampler) (Wave)

An EP from Wave featuring mostly average housey goings on, apart from François K's track 'Capricorn'. Starting with spacey effects and a chugging mid-tempo beat, it builds with a simple bassline and whispered Italian vocals into something which wouldn't have sounded out of place on any late Eighties Balearic dancefloor. (PM)

State River Widening Your Chance Ended There (Empire)

Imagine Nick Drake floating downstream with Augustus Pablo on a summer's day and you're half way to getting the feel of this record. David Sheppard (of Ellis Island Sound fame) takes acoustic guitars and works them round drums. glockenspiel and Hammond sounds to create a track of downtempo excellence. Essential. (PM)

\*\*\* Vera Mera

Saudacao Aos Orixas (Ibadan)

More Brazilian flavoured house from the ever consistent Kerri Chandler. 'Orixas' is a full vocal workout complete with Latin percussion while 'Pancho' is a more melodic Spanish guitar workout which would have benefitted greatly from a less thumping kick drum. (PM)

Albums

Karma

Thrill Seekers (Spectrum Works, Germany)

Not exactly revved up to the max, but that's just the way we like 'em round here. Karma's second album is a truly splendid 14 tracks of divine, lounge-tinged, softly swaying post-Air bliss, rarely rising above the slumber level on the stereo, but never failing to invigorate with a supreme mix of funky breaks, stoned psychedelia and soundtrack vibes. Mmm. lovely. (CB)

De-Phazz

Godsdog (Mole Easy Listening Pearls)

Ultra-kitsch easy listening with a strong Cuban influence that's so wimpily groovadelic it makes The Gentle People look like Hell's Angels. In parts, it's just too silly for its own good, but when it hits those bossa beaches with more than a hint of Deee-Lite tangoing with Kruder & Dorfmeister, it's just about Godsdog's bollocks. (CB)

Lafayette Afro Rock Band Darkest Light - Best Of Lafayette

Afro-Rock Band (Strut)

One of the great and most sought after Afro-funk fusion bands of the Seventies finally have the compilation they deserve from those ever-astute Strut people. It's all here - 'Racubah', 'Malik', 'Soul Makossa' and the title track itself, with its Public Enemy-sampled horns. Still pounds harder than an electronic pestle. Essential. (CB)

**Daddylonglegs** 

Horse (Pussyfoot)

Label boss Howie B teams up with Naked Funk man Jeremy Shaw for an equine-themed album that's definitely not a load of old pony. There's a sharpness of melody and funtime suaveness that makes the duo's analogue funk something of wonder, as it crosses between chunky beatnik grooves and more laid back fare. Saddled up for maximum swingers. (CB)

Visit Venus

The Endless Bummer Remix Appendix (Yo Mama, Germany)

The original album may have passed us all by, but for a line-up of remixers, the German funksters head straight for the Man Utd of downtempo cool: Jimpster, Rae & Christian, Groove Armada and Jazzanova, plus fine interpretations from Erobique, DJ Koze and Runaways . Only bummer is it's only on CD-why? (CB)

So Who The Hell Are...

The Bobby Hughes Experience

Any relation to the Jimi Hendrix Experience? Not in the familial sense, no. But musically, well, they're certainly living as much in 1969 as 1999.

So who is this Bobby Hughes then?

He's Norwegian Espen Horne. The alter ego arose when he combined studying fashion in Preston with goalkeeping duties for both Wigan and Preston. Lacking the work permit he'd have got if his name was Emlyn Hughes or Mark Hughes, he changed it on the team-sheet to Bobby Hughes.

And saved them from relegation with an injury time winner in the last game of the season?

"No, that's the Carlisle goalie you're thinking of. I only played a few games before I decided I'd better concentrate on my studies," says Espen.

You said his music's more rooted in 1969?

Horne's hero is jazz-funk organ dude Brian Auger. Which might explain why his debut album, 'Fusa Riot', features the Hammond on every track. It's a riotous and very impressive paean to hard-funkin' Sixties Cavern wig-outs.


Is it all his own work?

Not at all. Horne lays down the beats and basslines, often culled from obscure Scandinavian jazz, and then lets his mates come in and jam their groovy wee muso hearts out.

Lost Island

Dear Journal EP (Son)

The Notts fellas return, keeping it funky, funny, laid back and large. Strangely reminiscent of Black Sheep, you can fuss about whether they should lose the Yank accents but Lost Island render the issue redundant by continuing to do what they do and doing it so well. (WA)

**Shapeshifters** 

2012 (Scriptures Of The Sacred, USA)

The Shapeshifters specialise in the kind of polysyllabic attack the Left Coast has made its calling card. Humour, clever ideas and superb value, plus crazed live drums, slide guitar slips and staccato pianobics. It's really quite summat. (WA)

TTC

Game Over '99 (Cro2) (Ozome, France)

Truly fucked up maxi-single from France, where producer Flash Gordon supplies the Nintendo beats while TTC attack with the oddest styles you've heard in a fair while. Okay, the high-pitched fella knows his Cypress Hill, but this is nothing like that. Who knows what they're saying? Who cares? (WA)

Cliffhangaz

Ready 4 War (Fat Beats, USA)

Presented by none other than Mista Sinista, this is NY hip hop on the orchestral loop and sharp beat tip. Of the two tracks it's the B-side 'Curry Chicken Head') that does it. Simple,

AKP

The PIT (Cause 'N' Effect, USA)

We're meant to be excited by this because Deejay Punk-Roc used it on some dodgy comp. It's r&b meets wannabe Wu-Tang vox, the kind of record that fat men in suits can pretend to be down to. Oh the pain. (WA)

Skitz & Rodney P

Revolutionary (Ronin)

Not only can Skitz wire up a nice beat with extra skank, he has impeccable taste in MCs. Rodney P

takes to his elder statesman role (it's been 10 years since 'Gangster Chronicle') by getting deep with the slackness. Lovely. (WA)

Tame One

Trife Type Times (Fat Beats, USA)

but simply effective. And as you'd

expect, the cuts are nice, too... (WA)

Tame One isn't really so tame, but the real interest here is Geo's production, a melée of battling trombone and clarinet riffs which give the whole thing an odd claustrophobic feeling. Unfortunately, the intense looping has becomes a little monotonous before you reach the end. (WA)

**Lone Catalysts** 

Due Process (Rawshack, USA)

Sometime Black Star producer J Rawls teams up with J Sands as the Lone Catalysts. It's jazzy, intensely soulful hip hop with a fantastic little guest slot from Talib Kweli. Nothing to take you by surprise, then, but nothing to regret either. (WA)

**Public Enemy** Do You Wanna Go Our Way? (PIAS)

'There's A Poison Goin' On' was hailed as a return to form by the giants. Well, the artwork was at least. '... Our Way?' is alright in a guitar nonsense vein, Chuck D sounds as angry as ever and Flavor Flav is the don. But is this really blazing new paths? (WA)

**Phife Dawg** 

Bend Ova (Groove Attack)

Can the 5 Foot Freak cut it post-Tribe? No. The beats (courtesy of Jay Dee) are funky as fuckery, guaranteed to fill club floors. But Phife's attempt to shake off the conscious image with his ode to the female back passage is a little floppy. (WA)

Tilson

Action (K/Impact, USA)

Coming out of Olympia in Washington State, Tilson's producer Hampton adds a slightly future tint to what is basically laid back, jazz-influenced hip hop with lyrics to match. Having said that, its jagged, off-centre feel is certainly different. (WA)

Nick Wiz & UG

Do You (Know Who You) (Bronx Science, USA)

UG of the Celladwellaz returns solo with beatsman Nick Wiz and comes through with a couple of hard tracks over which he delivers his drifting, beat-pulling style nicely enough without really making you feel you've been missing anything much while he's been quiet. (WA) \*\*\*

50 Cent

How To Rob (Columbia)

At last available in Britain, albeit buried on the 'In Too Deep' soundtrack album. 50 Cent, a newcomer with a style midway between Jay-Z and Cool J, takes the piss out of practically every other rapper and r&b star around with a non-stop string of one-liners in which he wonders whether or not they'd be worth mugging. The verdict? Hilarious. (AB)

**Puff Daddy** 

My Best Friend (Puff Daddy)

A would-be emotive ballad using an over-familiar sample ('Sailing', though disappointingly the Christopher Cross song rather than the Rod Stewart one), Pee-Diddy seems determined to alienate even his most loyal fans. His touch doesn't quite desert him on this song to the Big Fella (no, not Notorious, God), but he's really pushing it this time. (AB)

Wyclef Jean/Bono New Day (Columbia)

This is pretty much exactly what you'd think a Fugees/U2 collab might sound like. Released to raise awareness for October's NetAid concerts and to encourage banks and governments to drop the debts of developing nations this episodic chugger is clearly a Clefdesigned vehicle, but turns into a U2-type cut for a few bars in the middle. It's also very, very funny-and deliberately so. (AB)

Quannum

Spectrum Instrumental (Mo' Wax)

Just what it says on the label really. 'Spectrum' was far from being the best release ever issued by what used to be the Solesides family but, high expectations aside, it had some fine moments and they're nice enough without the rapping, too. (WA) \*\*\*

57th Dynasty The Spoken Word (Fas Fwd)

The Brixton collective's debut LP is way beyond promising, though they still have some way to go before they can match the effortless energy of their live performances. This comes coated with that grimy, street-level

Ruff Ryders First Lady (Interscope)

This 20-year-old Philadelphian already has a CV the length of your arm that includes spots with The Roots and a track with Dr Dre. 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

#### **Black Science Orchestra** Sunshine (Afro Art)

Terry Farley and Pete Heller remix this summer beauty that's been an obvious hit in a warm place beginning with 'I'. This samples Ramona Brooke's 'I Don't Want You Back' with added musical touches and works exceedingly well with the vocal, although I must confess to opting for the 'Faith On Sunday Dub' which filters and builds until the chorus kicks in taking the track up another level. (SH)

# Russell

#### Fool For Love (Basement Boys)

Not another record based on Al Hudson's 'Spread Love'? But don't despair, as this is definitely the most innovative of all the versions. It has a completely new song delivered with enough conviction by a newcomer to the b-boy's camp. Live bass, trumpet and sax add spice to this real garage delight. (SH) \*\*\*\*

#### **Smokin' Beats**

Dr Love (Playola)

The First Choice classic gets reworked for what's left of the Nineties dancefloor by UK duo Smokin' Beats. Their mixes tend to be instrumental, adding their own musical vibe to the original parts, but using just enough of the backing harmonies and chorus vocals to create a hooky version that's been rocking the clubs lately. (SH)

#### **Full Intention Presents** Hustle Español

Spanish Hustle (DTension, USA)

After hearing Humphries bust the original back in Miami, the boys were totally inspired to re-tweak it for today's market, and what a job they've done. Alright! Some of us may know the original but an awful lot of people don't, and this may make them seek out the original source of this Ibizan summer monster! (SH)

#### Wiseguys

Cowboy 78 (Wall Of Sound)

Roger Sanchez takes some inspiration from Basement Jaxx's 'Rendez-Vu' and gets in the same guy who played the wonderful flamenco guitar for them to do much of the same and a whole lot more. A deep, groovy bassline and the S-Man's trademark beats provide the weight on this essential Balearic bubbler. (SH)

#### **ATFC**

The Voice (Slip 'N' Slide)

Up and coming production talent Aydin 'The Funk' Chile is one to watch, judging by this storming club track. Previously doing the rounds as a white label, this track rips the hell out of The Dells' 'All About The Papers' and coats it with Loleatta's ad libs from 'Hit 'N' Run'. Absolutely essential - and even if you have the white label, buy it to check out the new bonus dub. (SH)

One of my favourite cuts by Dave Lee from 1998 has rightly become an anthem at NYC's Body & Soul and Shelter parties. The Kay-Gees never sounded so good. Now it features a heavyweight mix from Baffled, who take on their American sounding alter ego, doing a good job of tweaking this for the bigger dancefloors. Totally addictive. (SH)

#### **Brass Tooth & Francis** James

Pleasure (Well Built)

He may not be the best looking producer (he'd be the first to admit it!) but for wicked underground garage, you'd have to kiss many frogs to better Brasstooth. The man behind one of the best underground tunes ever, 'Celebrate Life', adopts a more rugged approach. He's teamed up with DJ Francis, who gave it the 'turn the bass up' bit, knowing phat tunes get rewind treatment quicker. Coupled with a vocal (whose owner remains anonymous) and calypso/samba drum programming, it's a recruit to the tunes of the year stable. You know we love you, Nev! (S)

Special Request (DJs For Life)

Double G is an up and coming DJ, but if he keeps producing tunes like this, his headphones will only be for use behind a bigger mixing desk This is a clever reconstruction of the classic 'Take Me Away', but for those too young to remember the original, it don't matter, the tune is baaad anyway. It has a little 'Special Request' MCing on it, Anita's 'Come With Me To The Dancefloor' interpretation, and the Double G beats made famous on 'Get Loose'. Was getting the rewinds off acetate, but now it's on vinyl there are even more opportunities to hear this one from the top. (S)

#### Eliy & JJ Lewis

Freak Show (Southside Recordings)

Using the "Let the freak inside of me show ya "sample from Cinnamon of yesteryear, here is a slick fusion of UK and US garage. Better known for illicit and commissioned mixes of Whitney's two hits of the year, this latest is gaining momentum quicker than the Shearer Out campaign. The track is quite percussive, with the ever popular snare giving it a definite two-step flava. No speeded up vocal, just phat beats and bass. (S)

#### **DJ Luck & Shy Cookie** Troublesome (Remixes) (Kronik)

Further dispelling the myth that garage and reggae don't mix, here's another banger! Produced by the team behind the seminal 'Little Bit of Luck', Luck and Cookie stay with the MC style, recruiting the aptly named Troublesome to the mic.

'Aptly', because Troublesome sounds like he was running round the studio all night, jumping on things. If I had to find an MC who exudes so much energy, it would be Busta Rhymes Get the picture? The girls love it, the guys love it and of course, the DJs love it. A Liverpool ticket for anyone who can tell me exactly what he's saying! (S)

'The Journey' is simpler, not cluttering the mix but letting each element breathe and therefore giving a more pleasurable ride. (P) \*\*\*

#### Desyfer

831 (Global Beat)

It's not often these days that a progressive house vocal works but when it does it can be the perfect finish to a piece of music. Desyfer, along with Leigh Ann on vocals, have come up with an awesome hands-in-the-air anthem oozing with old skool 1995 flavours. But who cares about the influences when they sound this good? (P) \*\*\*\*

#### Franco & Grimm

Latex Lover (Dorigen Music)

Licensed from the Dutch label Simple Symphonies after receiving some quite heavy rotation from the big guns off the back of both the Fade remix and original mix 'Sneaky Alien' brings a fresh techhouse vibe to the release, cleverly intertwining the big tranced out synth melody during the break. A subtle destroyer. (P) \*\*\*

#### **Paragliders**

Paraglide (Superstition Classics)

First released back in 1994, this record still sends shivers down the spine. Not many records can stand the test of time like that. This reissue comes with Oliver Leib's original 'Blue Sky' mix and the beautifully melodic Humate mix. If you only buy one record this year make it this! 'Paraglide' is quite simply one of the best records ever made! (P) \*\*\*\*

#### **Digital Monkeys**

A strange bunch, those Digital Monkeys, but their releases are always interesting. Here we have a four track EP with a wide variety of styles. 'Tycho', a super-acidic chugger is followed by 'Kuda', another acidic workout with a spacier feel and Euro filtered stabs. Then there's 'Skyline', a Café Del Mar ambient dream and 'Skyline Reprise', a full on heads down drum & bass rocker. Strange indeed! (P)

#### BBE

Seven Days And One Week (Additive)

The tune that opened the commercial market up to Euro Moguai remix captures the original's deeper vibe and redevelops it with a weird but exciting break. Kai Tracid gives it a full of drum rolls and chopped up melody. Stick with Moguai's and you won't go far wrong. (P)

The gruesome twosome are back with another cracking little number. This one-sided limited release is seductively underground and captures the whole essence of house with its hypnotic melodies, simple, deep groovy bass and eerily moody synths. Without them you couldn't hear the music. Same for my amplifiers and decks.



Follow Me (Sony, 1995)



AM & Spoon wrote the blueprint for modern trance with 'Stella' back in 1992 but the Frankfurt based duo reached trancefloor heaven with this. Speeding up over 11 minutes from mellow minor chords into a stomach-turning, earpopping acid stomp, Follow Me' is the granddaddy of all trance records. Like all good stompers, it was all in the breakdown. A nasty, growling monster coming out of lush chords with an acid line that left you quivering. Whether you heard it in a Laurent Garnier sixhour techno seminar or in a full on traveller acid rave at Glastonbury, this record was beautiful and terrible all at the same time. words FRANK TOPE

Journeys By DJ (JDJ, 1995)



OLDCUT could never be accused of being conservative. Having topped the charts with 'The Only Way Is Up' in 1988, Matt Black and Jonathan More turned their back on a potential pop career for a more adventurous musical path with their label Ninja Tune. This 1995 mix album sacked the straightforward DJ mix for a stunning computer-aided collage. Dropping classic Mantronix and Masters At Work cuts in with more chilled beats by Photek, Jhelisa and Harold Budd, this was a wilfully eclectic selection. The beats were broad, the samples were smart and the atmosphere electric. words RALPH MOORE

# The Record Buyer's guide to: Kevin Saunderson

FALL the Detroit techno pioneers, only Kevin Saunderson can claim to have recorded house, garage and techno classics and still have had an influence on the development of drum & bass.

Kevin Saunderson's debut release was the New Order-influenced 'Triangle Of Love' on his KMS label in 1986, which also came out on Juan Atkins' Metroplex, both now going for £10-15. 'Groovin' Without A Doubt' as Inter City (£20) followed and in 1987 'The Sound'/'How To Play Our Music' was the first of his collaborations with Santonio Echols as Reese & Santonio (£15). 'The Sound' was released the following year with new mixes along with 'The Groove That Won't Stop' on a silver KMS label but just credited to Kevin Sanderson (£15), and 'Rock To The Beat' was released as Reese & Santonio on UK ffrr (£10). Finishing off the early KMS releases there was Reese & Santonio's 'Truth Of Self Evidence' (£10) while as Reese he gave us 'You're Mine' in 1989 (£8) and as Kaos 'Definition Of Love' 1989 (£8).

The big break came with the arm-waving anthem 'Big Fun' by Inner City Featuring Paris Grey in 1988 (KMS original £15). It was picked up for the 'Techno-The New Dance Sound Of Detroit' compilation on Ten Records who released it over here to a massive response.

Inner City's follow up 'Good Life' (Ten, £6) also in 1988 caught the mood of the UK's new house scene perfectly and outsold 'Big Fun'. After that their path was slightly rockier but highlights were 'Pennies From Heaven' (Ten, 1992, £10-15) and 'Praise' which came with Carl Craig and Derrick May mixes (Ten, 1992, £10). In 1993 they were dropped by Ten who promptly re-released 'Good Life' (promo 2 x12-inch, £15-20) and put out the limited edition double album of remixes Testament 93'. In 1995 Inner City released the back to basics track 'Ahnongay' as a limited edition doublegrooved, one-sided gold vinyl 10-inch (Six6, £10) and later released it in the same year as a 12-inch with Dave Clarke and Carl Craig mixes (Six6, £12). Since then 'Your Love' and 'Do Me Right' in 1996 hinted at former glories and this year 'Good Life' was released again as 'Buena Vida'.

hit in 1991 with 'Direct Me'. Thanks to Joey Negro's remix Network released it as two separate 12-inches (£8 each) and in the US it was picked up by Giant (£12), and of course there was the classic Sasha remix in 1995. Going back to techno, Saunderson released the classic 'Let's Let's Let's Dance' as Keynotes in 1987 on Incognito (£20). The following year on the same label came 'Just Another Chance' as Reese (£20). Its dark sinister bassline later became much-sampled by the drum & bass posse. Saunderson also crossed over to the hardcore scene with 'Bassline'/'Funky Funk Funk' also as Reese on a blue vinyl Fragile 12-inch in 1990. But it was with his Tronikhouse Project that did the business, releasing the 'Savage And Beyond' EP on Incognito in 1991 (£15). He followed it up with the 'Hardcore Techno' EP on KMS 1991 (£20) which contained the breakbeat classic 'Up Tempo', remixed by Grooverider on the B-side of the 'Spark Plug' EP in


Despite the massed media bitching their heads off about no toothpaste in the toilets or too much ice in

EQ takes a day trip to the **Plasa** '99 show at London's Earl's Court Exhibition Centre to see vinyl history in the making...

# Vinyl Solution

T'S turntable heaven. Around every corner of the cavernous Earl's Court exhibition centre there's a Paul Oakenfold or Scratch Pervert on the decks. Legendary DMC competition winner Cutmaster Swift is even giving a scratch workshop.

And everywhere, absolutely everywhere, there are toys. New mixers that convert your sound into analogue and back to

digital again – don't ask us why – and decks that reverse at the flick of a switch. Everything from the stages the DJs play on to the needles they use is here. And yet there is one thing in particular that has drawn us to Earl's Court on this muggy Sunday afternoon. No, it's not the sight of Oakey looking distinctly disgruntled, playing trance at just under four decibels. Although that's quite entertaining, too.

In actual fact, it's the world's first home vinyl pressing machine. You heard right. A machine that will let you cut your own vinyl

from the comfort of your armchair. Still in development, this single prototype is the only fully functioning model in existence. Vestax couldn't resist showing it off, however, and flew it over especially from Japan for the Plasa show. So naturally, EQ couldn't resist a peek either.

"Anyone who says vinyl is dead now obviously has their

head stuck up their arse," proclaims Vestax's Alex Hazzard. "You only have to look around and see the amount of turntablism going on at this show."

The Vestax VRX-2000 Vinyl Recorder

The Vestax VRX-2000 Vinyl Recorder, he explains, was developed in reaction to the freedom CD writers had brought home producers. With so many DJs vying for attention in today's clubland, he reasons, spinners need more and more exclusive vinyl to stand out. Home producers can use the machine to road test their vinyl and make vital adjustments long before they reach the cutting room. Oh, and that's proper vinyl, too, not the less enduring acetate usually used to make dub plates. Scratch DJs, who find that dub plates wear out particularly quickly, will think it's Christmas. They could even, with a bit of practice, cut 30 or 40 different separate loops into a blank. So that'll be veteran hip hop spinner DJ Pogo, fresh

from demonstating Vestax's new anti-skipping scratch needles, visibly trembling with excitement.
"This is what we need." he tells us. "It's a DJ

dream. When this comes out it'll all be over, won't it? Vinyl's never going to disappear then."


When the machine's launched next year, you'll be able to buy packets of three blank 12-inches for £25. With the cost of cutting a single dub plate in a studio currently running somewhere between £30 and £50, that's a considerable saying.

It attracts a steady stream of salivating DJs all day long. Those we spoke to seemed gobsmacked by its simplicity—it has only a handful of buttons, plus a suction pump to dispose of vinyl shavings easily—as well as the way it bypasses the complicated and expensive traditional processes of vinyl production.

"It would solve all my problems," gushes DJ Barry S from Southend. "I play house, garage and trance and it really bugs me when I can't get the more commercial stuff on vinyl. I've tried DJing with CDs but I've never been comfortable with them."

Brothers Darren and Neil Ball agree it's a DJ dream

come true. "As long as the sound quality's good you'll be able to do whatever you want," reckons Darren, also mentioning his frustration that many commercial releases never make it onto vinyl. "People always ask for them," his brother adds, "but if we haven't got them on vinyl we won't play them. If I had the money, I'd definitely get one."



"The projected price is something around £5,000," Alez Hazzard tells us, "although it could be cheaper. It depends on how long it takes to finish, but after five months we're nearly there."

As well as the machine and the blank vinyl, you'll also have to buy a new needle (about £50) after every 3,000 hours of cutting. But prices will come down after it's been on the market a while. And while that obviously puts it beyond the reach of most of us, this still feels like a momentous occasion which will have reverberations for years to come. You only need to witness the enthused feedback it gets, at a show brimming with new formats.

Today, we have witnessed the future. And, as we suspected all along, it's round, black and exactly 12 inches in diameter.

Not exactly a new model it's been out a year – Denon's double MiniDisc mixer is emerging as a frontrunner as home producers and commercial DJs catch on to using MiniDiscs. So, what do you get for your £1,500? A pitch control, obviously, and two hi-fi quality players, plus instant playback buttons and program points you can set and access at the flick of a switch to loop up certain sections of tracks.

# PIONEER DJM-600 MIXER

The 'go-faster' update of Pioneer's popular DJM-500 mixer, with a bevy of inputs and effects. And while EQ couldn't squeeze a projected price out of Pioneer – they won't say until it reaches the shops in early November – the DJM-600 is sure to live up to Pioneer's fearsome reputation.

# STANTON CM-2 MIXER

After grimacing one too many times at the ugly digital distortion most mixers give out when overdriven, Stanton has fitted its new mixer with valves rather than microchips, which should respond with sweet harmonic distortion when pushed slightly too far. A built-in filter and 15 more effects, malleable controls and advanced EQ also give DJs extra freedom to improvise on the spot. No UK price as yet, but with US models currently selling for between \$1,600 and \$1,700, it's definitely one for the more serious spinners.

# NEXT! STANTON DJ ACTION PACK

You'd be hard pushed to find a more comprehensive DJ starter pack than this. Selling for a bargain \$399 in the States and due here before Christmas, the Action Pack not only gives you a pair of decks and a mixer, it adds headphones, needles, a glossary of scratch terms for those who can't tell a hamster from a crab and an Invisibl Scratch Picklz turorial video.

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

# Neil Barnes, Leftfield Sony CD-35 Recorder

"IT'S a voice recorder. A little grey box you talk into, basically, and leave yourself messages to remind you to do things or whatever. It runs off one battery and you can take it anywhere. I've only had mine four days. We got given them by Sony because they're giving some away with our album. You can play the messages back at different speeds, there's a volume control and you can wipe stuff when you're finished with it. There are three files on it and there's space for 16 minutes

on each one, which is pretty impressive. It's certainly less hassle than dragging a DAT player around with you. And it's great for secretly recording people at parties."

# EQ Machine Of The Month Yamaha SU700

YAMAHA's low budget SU-10 sampler opened the sampling door to thousands

of beginners not only with its knockdown price, but also with its simplicity. The SU700, retailing for about £700, is the next step up for samplaholics hooked by the SU-10, who are now looking for more studio-friendly quality and flexibility. You certainly get a lot more for your dosh. It's laden with an array of smart effects like LFO, filters and EQ controls. There's something approaching 90 seconds of top range 44k, 16 bit sound - many times more than the SU-10's capabilities - and it



ups the four sample polyphony its little brother offers to a colossal 40. Its editing facilities are incredibly detailed and quick to pick up, although your fingers will soon tire of spinning the wheel used to control start and end points. There must be a case for including the SU-10's style ribbon filter in the future – much more convenient for playing around with sections of large samples. A control for moving start and end points together would have been handy too, but on the whole this is a flexible and high quality sampler.



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


