A Brit-nominated b-boy with a solid gold pedigree in block party anthems, Theo smashed through the Big Beat Boutique and into the charts with cuts like 'Start The Commotion', 'Cowboy 78' and the ubiquitous 'Ooh La La'. 1ZOOT WOMAN

Chasing Cities (E-Klektik's Death Disco Mix)

"We wanted everyone on the label to be represented on the mix. 'Chasing Cities' by Zoot Woman maintains the band's jazz-funk, LA aesthetic – Stuart and Adam are really into Steely Dan. Mark's mix [E-Klektik is Wall Of Sound boss Mark Jones] has a funky, chunky, boogie vibe. You can tell he's into early Eighties soul and disco because his mix is so soulful. None of the tracks we chose are too banging. I prefer the funk!"

2 AKASHA

Crazy Baby (Groove Armada's Presque Celebre Mix)

"This is something that people might have missed. 'Brown Sugar' is their best-known track but 'Crazy Baby' suits the vibe of the mix really well. The Groove Armada mix is pure Ibiza. It's cool and funky but you can still play it out. Akasha aren't about big beat and remixes shouldn't be like that. And it's not."

3 CEASEFIRE

Trickshot

"There had to be something by Derek in the mix. And he told me it had to be 'Trickshot'! Everyone knows him for this record. This was one of Wall Of Sound's biggest sellers in 1995 and Derek will never let anyone forget that! This record reminds me of Dahlarge wandering round with a bottle of beer. This is movie music with solid beats and a Carlito's Way sample. A seriously funky record."

4 THE WISEGUYS A Better World Pt 2

"This was Mark's choice. Not one of my betterknown tracks, this was the B-side of 'Casino' and isn't on any album. This record is divided into two halves. The first part is melodic, the second has a huge timpani roll and b-boy workout. I'm really proud of this."

Theo's a busy boy these days. The wily Wiseguy has monthly residencies at Fabric in London, The Boutique in Brighton and Front Page in Belfast. His favourite album is David Axelrod's 'Songs Of Innocence' and his first ever purchase was 'Bye Bye Baby' by The Bay City Rollers. But don't let that put you off. Take it away, Touché!

5 PROPELLERHEADS Comintagetcha

"We didn't want to put 'Dive!' or 'Take California' on the mix because it would be too obvious. I listened to the Props album again recently and came across 'Comintagetcha' which always sounded great live. I don't think every tune in the mix should be an anthem but this still has a phenomenal amount of energy."

6 LES RYTHMES DIGITALES Jacques Your Body (Make Me Sweat)

"I love this record. It was a real turning point for LRD. Before he made 'Jacques Your Body', his music was deep and dark. But this had a really weird pop vibe. I remember Jacques playing it to me at the time and being blown away. The bass really makes it. 'Make Me Sweat' is definitely one of my favourites. A killer tune."

7 THE STRIKE BOYS Jet Set (The Micronauts Remix)

"The Strike Boys are a new bunch. 'The Rhyme' is their most popular track but I prefer 'Jet Set' because it's less obvious. This blends into the mix really well. The Strike Boys' music is very jerky but it never falls apart. The Micronauts' mix is an example of how different takes can go, but it still maintains that twitch!"

8 WRECKAGE INC

Chase (The Strike Boys Mix)

"There have only been a couple of Wreckage Inc singles but the Strike Boys' mix was always the one with the biggest response. This was the first time they were introduced to the world. So it's an important combination. It's jerky, but as the name suggests, quite frenetic. 'Chase' really creeps up on you and the bassline always works in the mix!"



9 DIRTY BEATNIKS

The New Adventures Of Sandy & Bud "When I heard this I thought it was the best thing they'd ever done. It's a mad tune and quite a departure for the Beatniks. With Mikey on vocals, it really rocks. This is the beginning of a new chapter for them. 'New Adventures' has got a really funky disco vibe and Mikey's vocals are pretty warped. Neil is really into house music but that never came across in their music before."

10 MEKON

Welcome To Tackletown (Propellerheads Mix)

"Mekon were one of the first ever acts to emerge from the label. 'Welcome To Tackletown' has always been a favourite of mine. The Props' remix is wicked. Hove the way that Evil B's vocals have been chopped up. I can always tell a Props mix from the drums they use!"

11 PASCAL-R

"This is a brand new thing. 'Killing' is their best cut to date. How big is it? It's small! The record has been cut on 10-inch! But as the title suggests, it's pretty intense and quite a mad tune. I'm still getting over it! Progressive in the best sense of the word."

12 PSYCHO COWBOYS Come On Baby

"Stretch and Vem! A recent release from Wall Of Sound, this is almost the antithesis of Pascal-R. Stretch and Vem came straight to us with this one. It's a real jump-up, dancefloor anthem. The first time I played it on dub plate Norman Cook came clamouring for it."

13 THEMROC

"This 'Boy' is Agent Dan and Steve from Agent Provocateur and delves deep into a dark electro stew. Themroc have had a lot of attention recently. A great record to end on."

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'Get tough on clubs' urges Blair

TONY BLAIR has announced major plans to step up the war against drugs. Police are to be given greater powers to search and monitor nightclubs and Blair has indicated he will reappoint drugs tsar Keith Hellawell for a further three-year term. Jim Campbell, cabinet official and Keith Hellawell's press officer, says the war has only just begun. "There are battles to be fought and people to be saved," Campbell told Muzik. "The

government's intentions has always been to out out the cancer of drugs. We've announced this legislation. Now it's up to Parliament to look at those issues."

The Prime Minister is expected to introduce the drugs bill in this year's Queen's Speech. "We have to crack down very, very hard on the drugs industry," Blair announced last month. "Parents are

petrified about drugs. A problem as big as this needs radical thinking and action."

As part of a four-year strategy, the bill is planned to strengthen the law against dealers as well as giving the EU powers to confiscate passports from offenders. Blair also plans to focus on the links between clubs and drugs, including tough regulation of bouncers and the threat of licence withdrawal.

"The government policy is to work with clubs and pubs on these issues and we welcome this," says Liam O'Hare, general manager of The End. "We're happy to be a part of anything which cleans up the industry. Of course, if you cut through all the spin, it's a huge vote winner for middle England too."

MORE THAN 15,000 clubbers will descend on Nutts Corner, County Antrim on Sunday, May 28th for Planet Love 2000.

Now in its third year, Northern Ireland's biggest homegrown dance bash promises sets from John Digweed, Paul Van Dyk, Dave Seaman and Judge Jules. Over 85 artists and DJs are expected to appear.

"WHEN people come to see us, if they like Saian even a little bit they must come with something yellow on top. So that all the crowd will be yellow and we will be yellow – yellow clothes and yellow teeth," garbles number one Saian, Feniski.

From anyone else: "nurse, the screens!" But France's Saian Supa Crew are flying the flag for old skool partytime antics – jokey raps, funky beats and beat-boxing. Plus a dose of off-the-wall humour. Basically, everything that used to make hip hop so good, and what makes them the freshest crew to emerge since The Pharcyde.

But what really makes Saian stand out is when these six friends from the Parisian suburbs gel together on stage. To hear their debut album 'KLR' is one thing, but it's when you catch their insanely tight stage show that it all makes sense. Cutting between the warped beat-box of Leeroy Kesiah and Sly The Mic Buddah are warm, hilarious raps from Sir Samuel, Feniski, Specta and Vicelow (hip hop's very own Barry White), all serving to create the most energising show possible.

As Feniski puts it, "Well, we are young. We would get bored of just standing around. But I think the live show is like the album, it will take you off in all sorts of directions."

And he's not lying. As much as the album concentrates on party vibes, it also reveals a serious edge, as reflected by the title 'KLR' – a dedication to a one-time member who was killed in a car accident.

Soon the Crew will be hitting Britain, ironically supporting The Pharcyde. But before they come Feniski reinforces his message to England: "come yellow". For Saian Supa Crew the future looks bright, the future looks... well, yellow.

Carl Cox / The Champ

A LOT of you probably remember back when **Detroit** was THE home of techno, a Mecca for a new blend of music that shook things up back at the end of the Eighties and start of the Nineties. The way early Detroit pioneers crossed electronic music with soul, gospel, vocal arrangements and strings was so radical then. You would have thought it would be the first place I would play in America. So it seemed strange that last month saw me play there for the first time ever.

Although people spend a lot of time talking about what it was like back in the day, I reckon the stuff they're doing in Detroit today is far more interesting. Having said that, there's a serious old skool/new skool divide there. And for me, I'm always looking towards the new skool, DJs like **T-1000**, **Carl Craig** and **Stacey Pullen** are the the future of the Detroit sound. It's a shame the sound hasn't developed into something more substantial. And the rest of the world has caught up, especially somewhere like Sweden, where you think of Cari Lekebusch, Christian Smith and Adam Beyer. One of the problems they had was that while it became the home of techno, there was no scene that the producers were able to graduate from. Sadly, that meant they were all clambering on top of each other to get some success and then when they got success, they were perceived to have sold out. I remember going to the Miami Winter Music Conference in 1991 and they were slagging off Kevin Saunderson because he had a deal with Virgin on the back of 'Good Life'. I thought, 'come on!' Some of the Detroit guys were even arguing about who created the techno hi-hat pattern. So

going there was inspiring because I can understand what they've been through. The other biggest eye-opener on my current tour has been playing the new 2,500capacity club in LA called Giant, which is incredible. Oh, and bumping into Lionel **Richie**, even if I was a bit mashed from the night before and in no state to carry on a conversation. Don't knock him. Back in the day, The Commodores were funky.

As some of you may have noticed, I've been struggling to get onto The Big Breakfast because I've been away, and my Radio 1 slot has sadly ended, but anyone missing their dose of the big black Cox can catch me every Friday night on the **Galaxy** network.

Yousef / The Contender

WELL, it's finally happened. Earlier this year saw the start of my Cream residency proper with a three-hour set in the Courtyard, and the week after, I did the first of my six-hour all-night sessions. It was good having just a three-hour set to start with. It gave me a chance to ease the crowd into my sound, which I think some people hadn't heard in the club for a while. The nerves held for the most part, mainly because I knew tons of people were there who'd come along to hear me. Some of them have a bit of a reputation for, well, taking their clothes off, so I got the full warning from Cream's manager and they managed to keep them on! I must be the only DJ in the country who's got (or ever had) a residency at both Cream and Ministry Of Sound. Is that a first? I reckon so. And having done my residency at

Cream, I had to jump straight into a car, fly down the M6 and do the late shift at Ministry on the same night! I have to say, I think a lot of the rivally between the clubs is just built up by the magazines and tabloids. All I need now is a residency at **Home!**

Doing a six-hour set for the first time was some experience, too. I really had to divide up my three bags' worth of records into different times of the night, and I dug deep to play the sort of stuff I might not usually spin – both lighter garage and harder, funky technol like **Richie Hawtin**. Luckly I caught James Barton getting into it at one stage, so I knew I was doing all right. The thing is, it really is grueiling doing the whole night. At the end, everyone was up for partying but had to go home to bed. Shattered. I've done another six-hour set since then, and if I'm honest with myself, I struggled a bit to keep it rolling. I wasn't feeding off the crowd, but the people at Cream have said it takes at least six months to build a good residency, so keep on trucking. I was over in **Istanbul** only a few hours

I was over in **Istanbul** only a few hours after the first set at Cream, doing a charity gig for the earthquake victims. Unfortunately, I'd missed the main party,

which had **Darren Emerson**, **Norman Cook**, **Diesel** and loads more. I just did the after-party the next night and was only there for 14 hours, so I barely saw any of the city. Off to Miami for the first time this month so should be plenty of nonsense to report next time round.

SASHA'S FAVOURITE FLYING DUTCHMAN

MACAULAY CULKIN, Marvin Gaye, Luke Skywalker – all chaps who would probably have been better off without the guiding hand of Daddy. But for Dutch DJ and producer Sander Kleinenberg, Pa's an unlikely, if generous, critic.

"Dad thinks 'My Lexicon' is the best tune I've ever made," he laughs down his mobile after an unforgettable appearance at Renaissance. "I play tracks to Mum as well."

Fair enough. But the folks, let's not forget, are getting frothy over an epic 10 minutes of pulsating, undulating peak-time funk. It's hardly Andy Williams. On the other hand, it's no ordinary tune, either. Sasha's been caning it, for one thing.

Born and raised in eastern Holland, Sander's been DJing since he was 16, with the desire to actually make the music coming later. "It evolved very naturally," he explains. "The equipment got cheaper. I messed up at school. Then I made up my mind. It took

a little longer to convince my parents." Clearly, they didn't stay pissed off for long.

After a stint with Combined Forces in Germany (where he released both 'Melk' and the haunting 'Sacred'), Sander signed to UK label London, but not before London slugged it out with EMI for his signature. The resulting deal – including an album option – is reputed to be worth a whopping \$90,000. For that, London obviously believe they're getting something special. They are: 'My Lexicon', his first release – reissued, to be precise – of the year. Beyond that, they also get Sander's take on his sound.

"It's underground house with soul. Everything's got darker. I'm feeling a new wave of electronic music coming through and the boundaries are going. It's global."

'My Lexicon' is out on May 1st on Essential. The 'Penso Positivo' EP is out now on Infusion

Tony De Vit's 12-hour set at Trade, May 6th 1995

What was it? After becoming Trade's peak-time resident and establishing the most die-hard following in clubbing history, Tony decided to give something back to those he loved. What he served up was a sensational 12-hour marathon which started light, got very, very hard, and finished with more anthems than the Olympics. Who was there? Who wasn't? This was Trade at its peak, many would argue, and the crowd that night was a



veritable who's who of London's hard house cognoscenti. Promoter Lawrence Malice, Baby Doc, Tall Paul Newman, John Truelove, Steve Thomas, Fat Tony, Malcolm Duffy, Danny Rampling and Boy George were all there at some point.

What happened? First of all, Tony paid the rest of the Trade DJs not to play (so there was no queeny bitching). Next he set the place alight with his trademark mixing. 12 hours later he staggered off the decks to the most applause a DJ has ever received in a British club. What do we say now? That this was possibly the best set ever. Tony was a workaholic, and this proved it. As Lawrence Malice says today: "Tony had to work harder because he was gay: there's a lot of homophobia out there, but he overcame it. No set anywhere in the world could beat what Tony pulled off that night."

"I FIND the majority of house music disgusting, actually," grimaces DJ Teebee. Not for him the filtered breakdowns and synth soliloquies of his fellow Scandinavian tech-house obsessives – Teebee is drum & bass to the core. Ready to prove his mettle with a forthcoming long-player, the

Norwegian national kung fu champion's 10 years of DJing experience have finally paid dividends. "Recording has really changed my perception of records," he admits. "You start to changed my perception of records, the admits, thou start to notice how many people are taking the easy options. There are only about four producers around at the moment who I rate. I'm finding it really hard to find any other good music." With quality control as stringent as this, you can guess at the attention to detail Teebee lavishes on his own tunes. Weaned

on a diet of hip hop and happy hardcore, his descent into drum & bass began when he stumbled on an LTJ Bukem white label while on a school trip to Britain.

Meanwhile, his penchant for meticulous production has seen promos enthusiastically white-balled by the UK's drum & bass freemasonry. "I wish sometimes that I'd been around two-and-a-half years earlier," he considers. "All those boys have been there from the beginning - I can't say that." Nonetheless, whenever Teebee's in London, he invariably works into the early hours cutting acetates for DJs eager to try his new material.

"All these people I used to look up to are now pestering me for stuff," he gushes. "They keep saying, 'I can't believe you're from Norway', but they've got to understand this isn't a London thing any more. This is a global thing.

"Drum & bass is only a baby," Teebee points out, and at just 23 himself, this is only the beginning.

WOOKIE is one hard man to track down. Thinking Han Solo might have detained him we almost gave up. "I don't wanna let it all out before it's time," explains Jason, the man in the woolly suit. "I'm trying to keep something back." Having worked on his trademark underground sound for the last four years

(imagine Masters At Work, Roni Size, Herbert and Barry White in a greasy spoon in Peckham), you'd have thought Wookie would have a couple of albums under his belt by now. In typically elusive style, though, he decided not to release anything.

"My music was a bit ahead of its time," mutters Wookie sheepishly, "and the garage scene wasn't big enough. Now it's time." As Scientist, Wookie has been working his magic on a right old mixed bag – from drum & bass to soul and r&b – for the last six years as part of Soul II Soul's production team.

The resulting muddle of influences is proving impossible to squeeze into any pigeonhole. "Jazzy B reckons it's funk," murmurs Wookie. "It's British, it's not copying anyone, it's our own r&b, funk, whatever. It's everything we grew up on." Vocalist Laine Grey, whose gospel-tinged melodies grace many of Wookie's cuts, says "r&b garage soul with an edge". But hold on, we could go on like this forever. Dreem boy Spoony is also a fan: "He's very talented, very musical and his music is wicked in the clubs but it's unfair to clean hold him." Biott was then

Wookie spent years going out eight nights a week taking in as much musical data as he could, and still gets down to Twice As Nice every Sunday. DANNY Tenaglia in an old-fashioned diving bell playing at 20,000 leagues under the sea where the fish are so ugly they have to keep the lights off and where each bass kick reverberates through the thick, viscous liquid like the Rank gong man smashing you in the head with a bouncy castle. Then think a bit deeper and darker and you're starting to get close to where sonic submariner and Kismet co-founder Rui Da Silva's head is at.

Rui looked anxic as the carnivoro

After setting up in Portugal in 1992 as the Underground Sound Of Lisbon with partner DJ Vibe, releasing the seminal house scream-a-long 'So Get Up' and running Kaos Records, Rui (pronounced "Roo-ee") moved to the UK in 1999, "disappointed with what was going on in Portugal". He also, bizarrely, needed to escape the sunny, addictive, 24-hour culture that was stopping him working, as "you can focus more on your work and less on partying when there's no sun!"

Setting up the Kismet label, (Turkish for 'fulfillment of destiny') with Jill Stanfield, a

veteran of Mello Mello and Cream in Liverpool ("I make the music, Jill deals with the people and A&Rs the label"), Rui already has five records ready to hit the streets.

Listen to Underground Sound Of Lisbon's 'The Lights' or Cocodasilva's 'Coisa Nossa' and you'll soil your Calvins with excitement. Check Rui's solo Earth project and you'll be floundering around in a cesspit of your own ecstatic muck.

"I get excited when people freak out to our records in a club," grins Rui, "but they're so deep, dark and very difficult for DJs unless they're playing five or six-hour sets. That's why Tenaglia plays them."

Blaming the darkness of his tracks on a reaction against the never-ending sunlight of Portugal, it can only be a matter of time before we all sink to his depths. Going down.

It kicked off, so we started the Totally Funked parties, first in local pubs, and then The Crypt in Hastings. I ended up with a residency there, which went well – I know Digweed enjoyed it! – and then I was asked to do the warm up at Bedrock. On my first night I warmed up for Pete Tong and Digweed. It was awesome!

WHAT WAS THE FIRST RECORD YOU BOUGHT? That shameful Shag record! Jonathan King was behind it!

WHAT WAS THE LAST RECORD YOU BOUGHT? 'The Double Album' by Tantra, a late Seventies Italian disco record on Unidisc. I don't play it out, but I've always been inspired by disco.

WHERE DO YOU BUY YOUR RECORDS? At 3 Beat in Liverpool, Tag in London, Plastic Surgery in Maidstone (their stuff is very deep) and by mail order from Massive in Oxford.

WHAT DO YOU LISTEN TO ON A SUNDAY MORNING? Megadeth! No, actually anything relaxing. Marvin Gaye, Air, classical stuff.

FAVE LABELS? Advance, Bellboy, Bedrock, Yoshitoshi, Creative, Weekend World, Airtight and Disclosure.

WHAT IS IT WITH HASTINGS AND DEEP TRANCE? There's a chilled vibe in the town and people get creative. We don't really have any clubs, so we make our own entertainment. It beats the pier!

WHAT WOULD BE YOUR DREAM LINE-UP? John Marsh, Deep Dish, Phiphi from Bonzai, and John Digweed. Live at Bedrock or Renaissance, of course.

TELL US SOMETHING WE DON'T KNOW ABOUT YOU. I worked as a psychiatric nurse until 1998. Also, I got banned from driving for 16 months after I got caught for speeding. I gave the copper a wrong name, but he saw a mix album in the back of the car with my name on it. It was a fair cop!

IBIZA, August 1999. Basement Jaxx have just stepped down from the decks at Space. Suddenly a confident American takes to the floor, darts into the booth, scans the whooping faces and flicks a switch. The crowd is his.

South London, February 2000. It's 3.50am and an energetic figure squeezes into the VIP bar toilet to take a quick leak. "Let me through!" he hollers. "I'm on in 10 minutes!"

A couple of clubbers look suitably disgrunted but a third throws them a look of equal disdain. "That's Erick Morillo!" he says. "He's the reason half of London is here tonight."

Our observant friend is right – Mr Morillo can do no wrong. The crowd who watched him weave his magic at Space are back once again to see sparks fly. Erick plays a storming five-hour set that takes in everything from the spiralling sax of 'Mas Pito' by Mongobonix to the evergreen disco funk of 'It's All Good'. It's a sparkling, satin-coloured disco weave that could inspire the most jaded of clubbers. By five o'clock an irresistible guitar lick signals the arrival of 'Believe' by Ministers De-La Funk. An ever-present anthem in Space, this Jocelyn Brown belter has an appeal which has spread from Propaganda right through to Trade. Little wonder, then, that it's greeted like the gospel.

At seven o'clock the lights dim for the final furlong. Like classic Tenaglia in Miami, the last couple of hours delve deep into the history of house. L'il Louis' 'French Kiss' grinds into Armand's re-rub of NuYorican Soul's

'Runaway' and Mood II Swing's unforgettable tech-house take on BT's 'Remember.' An hour later the room is still rocking as hard as ever – and so is Morillo. Jumping up and down in the booth above us, he's having just as much fun as the crowd below. And that's his secret – if Erick wasn't spinning he'd be grooving too.

The Ministry of Sound has supported this vibrant and colourful scene for a long time now – "Italians are very good clubbers!" says Rulin' promoter Gareth Cooke. The Subliminal and Rulin' Italia residencies have been running at the Ministry for two years and they aren't about to let up. In fact, a hardcore of 300 Italian clubbers charter a plane over to London every time Peter Pan resident Ralf and Claudio Coccoluto are in town.

With a cosmopolitan crowd in every sense of the word, Rulin' rocks and Erick rules.

Although primarily Cox's idea, he's keen to emphasise the Master at work. "Had it not been for Jim's power and essence, we couldn't have pulled this off."

But pulled it off they have, attracting premier league DJs to a tiny, ruby-tinged venue about the size of your average superclub toilet cubicle. Clearly, they must be doing something right. Back to that Laurent moment. Stepping out of the

maelstrom for a moment, we finally see the essence of what Ultimate is about. Pure bliss.

IT'S A TAD ironic that in the week when almost the entire British music industry fucks off to the States for the Winter Music Conference, Miami's Magic Mike is plying his trade in the industrial side streets of Sheffield, accompanied by his Detroit counterpart DJ Assault.

It's the first leg of the Booty Wax tour, James Lavelle's attempt to sell the Stateside booty phenomenon to us mild-mannered Brits. Judging by tonight's performance, though, it's unlikely to make much impact on this brief trip round some of the country's cooler clubs.

With his selection of standard hip hop party anthems Magic Mike has about as much piff-paff-puff as a hungover Paul Daniels. Sure, the kids don't mind when he drops the likes of Brand Nubian, and maybe his overdubbing of 'Higher State Of Consciousness' with 'Bring The Noise' makes hands fly and smiles appear, but we're all a little tired of 'Gangsta Trippin", aren't we? When Assault appears after Mike's final faux-student tequila throwdown it's a relief. With the dancefloor offering only a smattering of stalwarts he announces his arrival with a much-needed five-minute spell of silence. Shake your rectum to any of his tunes, though, and you're liable to see your bowels slip out into your Nikes,

Assault's twisted objective seems to be to make his crowd dance to the fastest rather than the best beats. Clever he may be. Quick-fingered, sure. But inspiring he ain't. It's more akin to Rotterdam than Palm Beach and the punters respond with their feet. And walk off.

Booty bass definitely has something to offer us, but on this evidence the likelihood of seeing Cortina low-riders in the Meadowhall car park is a long, long way off.

And not any old techno, either. Tonight, the Unabombers (Luke Cowdrey and partner Justin Crawford) have enlisted the help of Detroil legend Carl Craig, who's playing a set of dirty, twisted house to some of the city's more discerning night owls.

For his part, Craig tests the water with a variety of tunes before getting it spot-on with DJ Rolando's 'Strings Of Life' update 'Knights Of The Jaguar'. "Last time he played he was a lot more reserved," claims Luke, himself about to take his turn behind the decks. "He's having more fun this time. . ."

Fun, naturally, is what it's all about here. And while in real life, fun is simply another word for small (see 'fun size' chocolate bars), or pointless (see 'fun quizzes') neither of the two definitions apply here. Tonight, 'fun' comes in the form of The Unabombers who bring the evening to a rousing, sweaty, happy finale. Later, Luke will insist the club has a (dreaded term) 'family atmosphere'. But in this case he's right. Even DJs Kwesi and Muchaill and MC L Blend, playing in a back room seemingly packed with garage cynics, manage to win more than a few converts. This crowd really want their DJs to succeed.

Electric Chair could hardly have come along at a better time for Manchester. In the wake of the closure of the Hacienda and Sankeys Soap it's provided a home for the city's clued-up clubbers. Always a sell-out, it is, to quote Bond, "positively shocking". Electric Chair Top Five

ACH! RUN. Take cover. Lock up your daughters. The Wall Of Sound crew are about to enter their Bacchanalian den. With pure party for blood, no notion of bedtime and an unrivalled taste for debauchery, they will lay waste to this luckless place. And they will do it all under the gaze of their leader, the Grand Pooh-Bah of breakbeats, the Dionysus of the dancefloor, Mister. . . Mister . .

Um, Mark Jones. Which, sadly, is not really very decadent at all. Say it backwards - 'Senoj Kram' - and there's still not the faintest whiff of brimstone. If you're going to start a label which becomes a byword for beat-fuelled hedonism, release 50 landmark records and then celebrate the fact with an orgiastic medieval feast, the least you can do is have the good grace to change your name to something a little more sinister: Severin Gutrot, say.

But no matter, the Jonester has his minions, the party freak beat scientists who make up the Wall Of Sound roster. And guess what? They're all here today. Gathered together for the first time, in fact, since the label's beginnings five years ago. And while that's not such a long time if you're an Acropolis, in the ultra-fickle and fast-moving world we call dance, that virtually makes you a listed building.

Good reason to celebrate, then. Jacques Lu Cont, the maniac behind Les Rythmes Digitales, certainly thinks so. He's here today. Only, in keeping with the theme, his hair's black instead of its usual molten lava red. Meanwhile, Will White and Alex Gifford of the label's most prominent outfit, The Propellerheads, are name-dropping. Names like, oh, George Lucas and Madonna. Signs, perhaps, of just how far the label has come. Then there's legendary caners Jon Carter and Derek Dahlarge. Bless 'em, they hug like long-lost brothers, any past animosity consigned to the dustbin of history. Already we're talking some of dance music's

heavy hitters here. Order up a tactical napalm strike on this place and Big Beat Boutique and Headstart would probably have to close their doors forever. But there's more. Still the Wall Of Sounders are trooping in. Jon Gosling (aka Mekon) has a fuck-off dog for protection. But even the sight of Sid the mutt doesn't put off Charlie and Damien from Akasha, nor Theo from Budweiser soundtrackeers The Wiseguys, nor Alex Wright of Wreckage Inc. And in the centre of it all, still resolutely undemonic, is head honcho, Senoj Kram.

Of course, it wasn't always thus for Wall Of Sound. Five years and two million record sales ago those three words were still more associated with Phil Spector than with the kind of music you'd find on a James Bond soundtrack or a Budweiser commercial. Surely some kind of Satanic pact has been signed to take the label from the dusty back room of a distribution

company to. . . well, to this? Clearly not. Beelzebub's hand would undoubtedly have steered WOS on a less rocky course, for some of the battles along the way have been bloody and vicious. Beating off several takeover bids, for instance. The will-they-stay-or-will-they-go of The Propellerheads. But more of that later.

Ultimately, it begins and ends with Kram okay, 'Mark'. He teamed up with distribution company Soul Trader's founder Marc Lessner in 1995, and the two like-minded souls took their name from Spector's production techniques, their tracks from Soul Trader's finest clients and made their mark with a stone-cold compilation album, 'Give 'Em Enough Dope'.

A celebration of all things trip and hop, the collection culled tracks from Howie B, The Ballistic Brothers and a fledgling Kruder & Dorfmeister. With their striking sleeves and admirable attitude, other artists soon came knocking.

'This label wouldn't exist without the knowledge I have from working in distribution and export,' reckons Mark, chomping on a large (chicken) breast. "And I have Marc Lessner to thank for that. I had a vision - but without the mechanics of Soul Trader, it wouldn't have happened."

The rest is hysteria: massive worldwide hits with The Propellerheads and The Wiseguys and a brace of new labels raring to go. After a brief stint at Heavenly, Jon Carter returned to the fold last vear as Junior Cartier to launch Nu-Camp, the hottest new house label on the block, while another imprint, Black Magic, offers handsomely built hip hop from the likes of Ugly Duckling and Cage. There's even a hot new pop label to pull in older (and younger) punters. As the gentle balladry of Shawn Lee will testify, We Love You is a label to indulge Jones' love of all things melodic.

"It seems like yesterday," sniffs Dirty Beatniks' misty-eyed beat-mauler Neil Higgins. "In the beginning, Wall Of Sound was Mark working

during his lunch break in a warehouse. His company was distributing a record I was putting out. We played him some music and hit it off straight away. A few other labels offered to sign us but he had a signed poster of [then-QPR footballer] Les Ferdinand on the wall beside his desk, It was a done deal."

We're swiftly moving into puppies-and-kittensin-baskets territory here. Nevertheless, there's no getting away from the fact that everyone has their own heart-warming Mark Changed My Life story to tell. Jacques Lu Cont, the label's youngest satyr, met him at a pivotal point in his life – when he was cramming for exams. "As soon as we met him, it was obviously meant to be," he smirks at fellow Zoot Woman Adam

Blake. "Six months later we failed our A-levels!" Equally, Mekon mainman Jon Gosling has his own take on the MCML story. Following a label distribution deal with Mark's employers at Soul Trader, Jon went on to work with a whole host of clubland characters. Schoolly D, Roxanne Shante and 'Mad' Frankie Fraser all made their way into the Mekon studio. "The Schoolly collaboration was completely down to Mark," says Jon. "He found out that D was in the country for one day and convinced him to come to my studio for a couple of hours. I didn't believe that he was actually going to turn up!"

And there's the rub. If you had to guess at one reason behind the label's success, you'd say it's the family atmosphere Jones creates. True, with the likes of Derek Dahlarge on board it's more Charles Manson than Waltons' Mountain, but there's no denying it's a philosophy that's oiled the creative wheels and thrown up some exciting collaborations. Who can forget 'Evil Knievel', when Dahlarge

Who can forget 'Evil Knievel', when Dahlarge hooked up with Deadly Avenger to create a song so powerful that Fatboy Slim hammered it for more than a year after he first received the first test pressing? And what about 'Sometimes', Les Rythmes Digitales' parping link-up with Nik Kershaw – an odd, endearing tribute that managed to confuse almost everyone in sight? And who could ignore Shirley Bassey's quivering contribution to the world-conquering 'History Repeating' by The Propellerheads?

Ah, The Propellerheads. If one duo pushed the frontiers further, it was them. The Bath band released a slew of classic EPs on Wall Of Sound ('Dive', 'Take California', Spybreak!', 'Bang On' and the Bond-goes-breakbeat 'On Her Majesty's Secret Service') and promptly swapped West Country breaks for gold and global domination.

Crucially, though, they resisted the temptation to stray. Ffrr's Pete Tong, in particular, came knocking with an oversized chequebook – but family loyalty proved too strong. The Props stayed put. And if that doesn't tweak your heartstrings, well, you're probably Pete Tong. "Five major labels were after us," recalls Alex, not

without a hint of pride. "But Wall Of Sound offer genuine integrity. Nothing is ever watered down.

"And now everything's gone global, it's such an amazing feeling to be in some part of the world and hook up with one or two brothers from the label. We're on a mission to bring a smile to people's faces. Theo phoned me up from Sydney on New Year's Eve to tell me that 'History Repeating' was playing as the fireworks fired off in the harbour. It's all love."

Mark Jones is only too aware of his progeny's integrity. "It was a pivotal moment in the history of the label," he smiles proudly. "The Props record gave me the confidence and faith to feel that what I was doing was right. If that record hadn't happened, who knows? We might not be sitting here having this conversation. If I'd listened to certain people around the time of that Props record, that album wouldn't have happened."

But still the slavering majors came running. They watched as The Props dented the charts and winced as The Wiseguys' 'Ooh La La' became the worldwide soundtrack to a bunch of dancing Bud frogs. They signed up their own inferior artists then tried in vain to make Mark sign his life (and label) away. So he took the free lunches, and listened to their promises. But staved firm.

"When we talked to major labels, we knew we were never going to sign," admits Mark. "We learned that we just wanted to do our thing. So it just became fun. Alex and Will proved to people that you can do it, but that rarely happens any more. People won't put their balls on the track. There are so few independent labels that make it work."

The loyalty and respect that kept The Props in situ runs right across the board. "Wall Of Sound offer musical freedom," says Jacques. "I'm making a white-boy, rock-soul record along the lines of Yes, Steely Dan and Hall & Oates! This is a label where you can record all these different kinds of music under one roof and still get the backing to do it. That's why we continue to work with them and haven't thought about working elsewhere.

"We have a relationship built on friendship and trust," he adds with such sincerity that you can't help but check to see whether Jones has a gun to his back. "At the end of the day, it's about good people. We all have our faults but there's something about us that's very honest. Everyone feels like they've known each other for a lifetime. Very rarely do people let you down – and within this business that's pretty unheard of." And not a sick bucket in sight, by the way.

Naturally, the life of your average Soundster isn't all happy families and nose to the grindstone. They didn't get where they are today by staying in and attending wood-turning classes. And if there's one person who sums up their spangled reputation it's loizan legend and hellraiser-in-chief Derek Dahlarge.

Ah, Dahlarge. . . This is the man who once challenged Liam Gallagher to a fight only to gloat as the notorious Lennon-lover backed down. The bloke who nearly recorded his (still-pending) debut album in Cuba. But despite all this, he's still the team mascot, a figure of fun for some, sure, but one of the label's biggest-selling artists. In 1995, when he recorded 'Trickshot' as Ceasefire, the record went on to be Wall Of Sound's biggest seller of the year. Who's laughing now? "If in doubt, throw in Derek!" roars Alex Propellerhead. "He's our main energy source and can keep the hordes at bay!"

And speaking of model citizens, Alex and Jacques now have designs on the world's haute couture catwalks.

"I met Madonna at the Versace show in New York," recalls Jacques. "I was playing at The Roseland and met her at the party afterwards. She came over and said 'I love your music!' I was awestruck. She's asked me to call her up when I'm in LA again." Alex picks up the story. "It was surreal. Madonna, Prince, Puff Daddy and George Lucas were there. I played the disco version of the Star Wars theme and got kicked off! I guess Madonna didn't like it!"

Thankfully, blonde ambition still drives every single artist on the label. It seeps from their grooves and shines on their (record) sleeves. It's the reason why their slates sound like the best block party you've ever been to. "We want as many people as possible to hear our music," says Mark. "We want to sell millions and millions of records. And anyone involved in music who doesn't say that is a liar."

And with that, the conversation dims to a polite hum as the Wall Of Sound crew tuck napkins into their shirts, say grace and begin their lunch. One big, happy family. Just like the Mansons.

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SOME ARTISTS talk about meaning it (man). Others about keeping it real (bro'). Then there's the rather less rumbustious MJ Cole. Just one word sums up the 26 year-old UK garage prophet and that word is 'Sincere'.

"It's a simple word and I'm down with simple things," he contemplates, sitting in London's new Thames-side club, Rock, having changed from the spaceman white of his Muzik photo shoot to real-life's plainer greys and browns. "It's not frivolous. It ties emotion with purpose and good intent and you can't complain about that."

'Sincere' was the title of MJ Cole's gorgeously slinky 1998 breakthrough single (he was on AM:PM then; now, ideally, he's on Talkin' Loud), that milestone in the super-exciting, cyclically smooth and bumpy sound of two-step garage. Thanks to follow-up singles like 'Sanctuary', he's spent the last two years continuing to garner attention from pundits and punters alike; turning out sharp, crisp remixes for everyone from Breakbeat Era to Another Level; DJing in cities around the world and, in doing so, fathoming that he loves his native London "intensely". But come June, 'Sincere' will again be the operative word, adorning the cover of his debut album.

"Calling it 'Sincere' explains that nothing's changed," MJ continues, nervously rubbing his chiselled cheekbones. "That I'm still the same guy who made that single. That it's still about being in the studio for as many hours as I can. Still about loving every minute of it."

Nothing has changed? Well, that's not quite the case, because MJ's album has changed since the version which was mooted for an autumn 1999 release. Some album sampler CDs were dished out last summer, on which two-step and 4/4 tracks sat side by side. It's a different story now, however. The Top 40 dominance of The Artful Dodger and Shanks & Bigfoot has demonstrated that two-step is destined for omnipotence this summer. Consequently, MJ spent most of last autumn working on new examples of two-step jigginess.

You'd think this need to overhaul has been a pain, but MJ says he loves the pace at which UK garage shoots forward and that now he's determined to stay abreast of the scene he played no small part in inventing. In 1997, MJ made 'Lovebug', a tune which brought many of the then nascent elements of two-step together.

"We weren't thinking that hard about what we were doing," shrugs MJ, who rates Roy Davis Jnr's 'Gabriel' as the first ever two-step missive. "It was just like 'Hmm, let's add a Tssk! here and a Pshtik! there'."

So why has interest in the sound headed sky-high in recent times?

"People are after something new and UK garage is it. We're in a new millennium and people won't accept re-hashed music. They love the streetness

of UK garage, the fact it's got pop appeal but is credible, too. Wanna know how you can tell UK garage has a good future? Not from looking in clubs but from checking out school playgrounds. It's the only kind of music you hear the kids singing along to."

Alongside its miraculous feats of flexi-rhythm and curvaceous melody, 'Sincere' is drenched in defiantly modern singalong moments. Guests include singer Elizabeth Troy and rapper Danny Vicious (there are myriad other contributors: more singers, guitarists, saxophonists, flautists, even a cellist) and tracks like 'Attitude' and 'Bandalero Desperado' have MJ balancing the silky – pretty strings, velveteen singing – with the wild – roaring sub-bass, jungle-like freaky effects. Needless to say, it's an album which reinforces MJ's steadfast, vital status at the very hub of UK garage.

Prior to the album there's a Troy-powered, chart-primed single, 'Crazy Love'. There's an airbrushed image of a champagne bottle on the CD cover. It's part of a 'luxury goods'-related series of images which will front all of MJ's releases. It's very garage, of course, but not very MJ.

"I've never been one of the garage guys who buys a $\pounds0$ bottle of champagne," he smirks. "I'd rather have 20 beers."

What about other luxury goods in your life?

"I've got a little one-bedroom flat and a 20 year-old, 14-inch Saisho TV." He smirks. "I don't walk round in Gucci doing loads of nose-up."

MJ hasn't even been to Aiya Napa yet.

"What's it like?" he asks enthusiastically. "Any place where people have a good time listening to music and not hurting each other is cool with me."

Prior to executing a natty self-edit on his name, MJ Cole was called Matthew James Coleman. He grew up in Twickenham and only flew from the family nest six months ago. His father is a veritable jack of all artistic trades: he was in the original cast of Phantom Of The Opera, he's appeared in TV

adverts, recites for Longmans language tapes and wrote a Thames Television sitcom called Sory, I'm A Stranger Here Myself (Coleman Junior has a better way with titles, frankly) which ran for two series in the early Eighties.

His parents also made sure a pre-pubescent MJ learnt to play the piano. This led to an education in classical music at the Royal College Of Music and London City University. Like fellow classically trained garageheads The Artful Dodger, MJ Cole has the nous to add intense musicality to his tunes. The smart bit is that the smoothness never swallows up the raw elements.

"I love the rough edges and the street vibe," he asserts. "I could make really smooth music but that'd bore me. I don't ever want to become a leather-trousered producer working in fancy studios."

On to the raw elements: they're sourced from MJ's rave days, from gobbling pills and hogging the dancefloor until daylight at early Nineties hardcore raves like Telepathy and Raindance. His next move was into studio engineering, assisting for the Brixton label/studio Sound Of Money, hanging with hip hop alumni Roots Manuva and Blak Twang. From there he shifted to the SOUR camp, manning the mixing desk as Ed Rush and Trace perfected tech-step drum & bass. But garage was beckoning.

"Drum & bass got too dark and the ladies left," he believes. "They went to garage nights instead and the blokes, hur hur, obviously they followed."

MJ Cole makes music in a small, meticulously arranged unit in the Soho Recording Studios complex. Describing himself as a "studio-holic" he's happy tinkering away in here for 16 hours at a time and sometimes has to be dragged out into the daylight by his girlfriend.

After the release of 'Sincere', he's got a live tour to think about and is also committed to working towards a day when he's "so fine a producer that people like Björk and Mary J Blige call me up".

But mainly he wants to keep spearheading the sound which it's no exaggeration to say will soon alter dance music in Britain irrevocably. United in battle with US allies r&b and hip hop, UK garage has the profile and punch to threaten the future of house, trance, superclubs and a plethora of DJs' cosy careers. And not before time, all but those with vested interests in the old guard ought to be saying.

"I want to take the garage thing laaarge," MJ comments, signing off with a rare fit of braggadocio. "The scope is incredible. It's like, how far can we take these rhythms?"

A long way, he hopes. Sincerely, he does.

The single 'Grazy Love' is out on April 17th, followed by the single 'Sincere' on June 19th and the album, also called 'Sincere', on June 26th. All three are on Talkin' Loud

I'M ON MY HANDS and knees

desperately sucking the carpet. I haven't slept for 48 hours, 24 of which I've spent tossing and turning in my bed, and now my last chance of getting some shut-eye is seeping through the floorboards of the Metropolis Hotel.

Eschewing the deeper sleep of Valium, I've opted for the more natural sedative Rescue Remedy, but now I've knocked the second bottle over. Coming up for air with a mouthful of carpet fluff, a smattering of pubic hair and the faintest whiff of dog shit I can't go any lower. . . or can I?

A door slams shut at the end of the corridor and I hear the jovial tones of Mr C and a couple of female companions. Does that man never sleep? We're in the world's happy hippy Mecca, San Francisco. The last two days have seen me goosed on the floor at the End Up, San Fran's hottest gay club where DEA officers cruise in couples to trap unsuspecting dealers; I've been lost deep underground in the spiritual house of local DJ Rasoul and danced to Mr C at the 1215 Fulsome club.

Mr C, you say? What, you mean the "Es are good", gappy toothed, jumpsuit-sporting raver Mr C? Where does he fit into all this?

Well, if you've been anywhere near the States of late you'll realise an English invasion is afoot. Oakey, Dave Ralph and Seb Fontaine are leading the trance charge and young crystal meth heads are learning how to clutch a lightstick and wave their bizarre little furry doll collections above their heads. But, in a quieter, more subtle armada, Britain's tech-house mafia are cruising the silent night streets of the West Coast dropping deadly bass bombs and machine gun drum rattles. Small clubs, pokey sound systems, good drugs and a fresh new audience open-armed and open-mouthed, ready to take their tackle.

So the man who can wedge a £2 coin between his teeth is over here in this city of two sides. San Francisco and neighbouring Silicon Valley create 50 millionaires every day (60,000 millionaires in total so far) and yet there are Vietnam veterans with no legs being towed



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around in front of City Hall – the City Hall having just been fitted on its own customised roller skates at a cost of \$300 million in case there's an earth tremor and mayor Willie Brown's tea gets spilt.

There's precious little peace 'n' love in the bohemian community here. The freaks of legendary hippie meeting spot Haight Ashbury are being forced out by the yuppies and local club promoters are at war with the cops. Flower Power wilted and died 20 years ago but there are 60-year-old men peddling weed on the street like the Grateful Dead never died, and camp Brit chef Ainsley Harriot is the biggest thing on TV.

And standing in the middle of these dichotomies like a diplodocus in Detroit is Mr C. One minute he's a grinning loon in Latex giving (not so subtle) subliminal messages to the kids as Ebenezer Goode ("Es are good", if you're too young to remember) with The Shamen and the next he's a cutting edge tech-house DJ, trotting round the globe like he owns the gaff.

Richard West may look like the king of the conspiracy theorists – the one who fears an alien invasion through the speaker stacks – but he leaves that to his old partner in crime and fellow Shaman Colin Angus, who he sees every now and then. "He's the one stood in the middle of the dancefloor at The End with his eyes shut and when they're not shut you can't see his pupils anyway cos they're rolled up in the back of his head."

But the Y2K Mr C has his platinum blond bullet head sat firmly on his shoulders. "Trance is too cheesy, jungle never happened, they didn't get speed garage and what's left? Tech-house," insists Mr C on what's happening in the US. Then he cracks that grin where you can see his tonsils through his teeth and sniggers, "They need a new Sasha and here I am."

IT'S the day of the gig that C's come to San Fran to play, and we're on our way to meet him. We get on a bus and there's a wizened old Yoda lookalike woman drooling on my shoulder showing me a special badge she won. An Albino Rastafarian with a transistor blasting folk music is banging his head against the back window and a chain-smoking bus driver (who looks like his last job was driving the Merry Pranksters' magic bus) is making wisecracks at the hippies sweating in the sunlight. We're half expecting Janis Joplin to swing on board, jack up and start strumming away. It's a concrete Woodstock – but as Kelly from Spundae, tonight's promoters, warns: "This is the beginning and the end of the rainbow." Then he stops smiling and adds, "A lot of people jump off the Golden Gate Bridge."

Shoving a couple of skanky, skunky longhairs off the pavement into the path of a tie-dyesporting Lennon lookalike, we finally pin Mr C down to see what's up.

What exactly do you think you're doing over here?

"Ha ha! Conquering America. Sasha and Digweed have torn the whole country to pieces with trance. But America's still really narrowminded and when it comes to clubs it's gay and it's house. It's been stuck like this for 15 years and now club people are up for something new."

So what's the plan?

"Well, America likes stuff with an urban edge and the househeads are looking for something new. Tech-house has become a buzzword out here."

What's wrong with England?

"We're already massive in England! I'm playing the best clubs, doing my show on Kiss every Saturday and although 70% of my work is in Europe, it's time to concentrate on the States."

It's been 13 years since you first mounted the wheels of steel. Is this finally your big break? "The people who set up the scene in the mid "Rave killed acid house. It's time for the

Eighties – Evil Eddie Richards, Kid Bachelor, Colin Faver and myself – we always went for that house and techno hybrid, but we were always a little too far ahead. Now it's finally happening."

What happened?

"When a lot of the big orbital raves went on in 1989 our scene got hijacked. Before that everything was house, techno, electro – sort of anything goes. Then with rave, it was just who had the biggest bass sounds and the noisiest noises and that killed the acid house scene. 13 years later it's time for us to hijack it back and that's what's going on in the UK. Trance is getting boring, speed garage and drum & bass aren't gonna progress much further. It's our turn. Time for the underground to take hold again."

Where are its roots then?

"RIP at Clink Street and The Dungeon were the start of tech-house in the Eighties! It wasn't until we put a name to it that people took notice. It was a very loose genre. I mean, there's actually no such thing as tech-house, but everyone jumped on it once we came up with a stupid name. When this does blow up it'll have a lot of longevity. . . it's already been going for 15 years!"

Who else is crossing the Atlantic?

"Eddie Richards is massive over here, Terry Francis, Richard Grey, Asad Rivzi, Layo & Bushwackal – all open-minded DJs crossing the spectrum from deep house, house, acid house, electro, breakbeat and acid techno."

But isn't tech-house just for moody twenty-something blokes?

"On the contrary, you only have to come to Subterrain and see the girls to know that it's not a blokey vibe. That's the good thing about tech-house. It's techno for girls and house for boys. It's sexy, it's got basslines and it's sensual. house techno drum&bass ambient electro trance ar

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Usually boys want something techy and girls want something more groovy with basslines and vocals and tech house supplies both."

What's the story with your mix album then? "I didn't want a CD like every other one. All of those mix CDs are just tunes out of the box. Not only that, but an engineer edits them together in a studio. I wanted to do something special. I'm well-known all over the world and have mates in the right places and the DJs we have at Subterrain are always of the highest quality, so why not get those DJs and producers to make a tune with the night in mind?"

What do you like most about the British dance scene at the moment?

"London is the music capital of the world, Whatever you want, you can get and it's also a very open-minded and progressive scene. The Brits have always been a rebellious race which means that people making music and the DJs are gonna push the boat out a little bit more. People are up for it - it's an up-for-it-ness that you don't get anywhere else in the world."

And what don't you like?

"I don't like the fact that the UK dance scene is generally run by the media and the people that are really big are the people that advertise. That bugs me. Anyone who wants to go the underground route gets ignored. That's a real pain in the arse."

So is this payback time?

"Yeah, it's a new millennium, people are looking for something a bit more spaced out, a bit more futuristic and that's gonna help our specific genre."

The Shamen had that whole futuristic space/time thing - a lot of silver and funny microphones. Is sci-fi important in tech-house? "Absolutely. There are very few samples used and it's very electronic with the artists synthesising their own sound. There is a much more electronic and spacey sound on techhouse. Techno is just drum loops now and house is just pre-set sounds. It's for people that want something new. . . New? Ha ha. It's 15 years old, it's not new!"

Hmm, yes, you've got a bit of a problem with stamina, haven't you? Too much of it? "Yeah, far too much."

Have you been to bed on a Saturday night at all in the last 15 years?

"No, I haven't actually. I've had a couple of cancellations on a Saturday night so what do I do? I just go out and party all night."

Do you never get a comedown?

"Actually, no, it's really weird, I don't get any bad dreams. Tuesday isn't a blues day for me. It is for a lot of people, you know. Sunday is fun day cos that's when the party really starts at the afterparty. Monday is Monday, Tuesday is bluesday and Wednesday is the start of the weekend, vippee! I don't really get the bluesday, I think it's down to the quality of the drugs you take."

Do you do any exercise?

"Er, no. I dance a lot and I carry my record boxes and I shag, so that's about it."

What are you plans for the future? "I want to finish recording my debut album, we're

already halfway into that and it's coming along really well. I want it to be a real listening album, not just another bunch of dance tracks on an album. It's my debut album, I've been recording since '87 so it's about time. I just want it to represent the way I am, you know, a bit mad, a bit scatty but sophisticated, classy and sexy, cos that's what I feel I'm about."

Do you get impatient or do you like being on the move all the time?

"I've got the patience of a saint. It's one of those things that has served me well over the years.'

13 years of patience. . .

"Yeah, 13 years of DJing at the top level and being patient, praying that one day I'll be in the Top 100 DJs. That makes me giggle, that does."

Do you never stop to chill out?

"I can go home and chill out but I haven't got time. I have to make sure that things are done, like with my DJ career and my weekly radio show on Kiss FM. The show's called Future Music so I've got to stay upfront. A lot of my responsibilities have gone though, and Layo has everything so sewn up at The End they don't even notice when I'm gone.'

What's happened to The Shamen, then? "The Shamen thing split up officially last year so that's another responsibility less. I've freed myself up and I would like to slow down a bit. I'm no spring chicken, I'm 34!"

Should there be an age limit for DJs?

"I wanna retire from the wheels of steel at 40, I don't wanna be an ageing DJ. . . I was gonna say like blah blah blah, but I won't! I'd like to get to the point maybe where I'm 40 when I can just do extra special parties around the world."

And will you put your slippers on then? "Nope, I'd like to get into movies, soundtracks and advertising. Especially advertising, which is a great way of getting electronic, percussive sounds across to the masses. I'm the Vangelis of the future! Well, you know we did do the theme tune to The O-Zone and Euro 96 as The Shamen. Then again, I might get to 40, still be a big kid and carry on DJing.

WE live in hope! And as Mr C installs himself behind the decks at Nikita, San Francisco's biggest Saturday nighter, the West Coast goes mad for the man who became famous with his timeless rap "delivery smooth like water from a mountain/That's why I can move any mountain."

The Spundae worker next to me starts twitching and murmuring "this is the land of quality drugs. Ask Seb, ask Sasha, we've put a couple of people in hospital," as a replica Gatecrasher kid (only he's about 33) starts smearing Vicks over his eyelids and under his nose. He starts slapping it on me too and it seems rude to refuse.

In a club that's spent over a million dollars on sound proofing, where the health department send teams in to count fag butts on the floor and charges them \$1,000 a butt (smoking is outlawed in California), Mr C reigns supreme, smoking away behind the decks, ekeing another 10 decibels out of the system and waving two fingers up at the establishment.

Is he worried his mum might read this and worry about him? "Nah, so what, she smokes puff. . . Not bad for a pensioner, eh?" (M)

MDMA ecstasy was not the only drug at the Saint. No, there was also MDA, which was popular, too. There was K – ketamine – which was just debuting and quite fashionable. There was cocaine, which most members could afford. And poppers. And tiny, shining crystals of methamphetamine. There were rags doused with ethyl chloride from a spray bottle. People would dance with those bunched around the corners of their mouths, spraying and sucking with every new song

mixed in by the DJ.

Blonde hash, skunk weed, duil grey speed. Quaaludes, Xanax, Valium. THC, PCP, LSD: at the Saint disco, everything was readily available. Except alcohol. Everyone was readily available. Especially on the balconies. It was probably one of the most, if not the most, impressive gay clubs that ever existed in New York City. Built in the old Fillmore East concert venue on 2nd Avenue and 6th Street in 1980, with a price tag of \$6 million

and the capacity to hold 7,000 patrons, it was still what you would call a disco but a second-wave disco, where the music was Euro and electronic and what was soon increasingly called hi-NRG (first Boney M, later, 'So Many Men, So Little Time' by Miquel Brown and the entire oeuvres of Frankie Goes To Hollywood and Hazell Dean). It was mainly white, it was private, it wasn't cheap, and it was men only.

The Saint existed at the end of the golden age of gay nighteries. At the tail of the high disco era, where gay sex and clubs, and gay sex in clubs, became legitimate signs of a new, carefree liberation.

Everybody who went to the opening of the Saint in 1980 said it felt like a new era, a new world even. You passed through the unmarked metal doors on 2nd Avenue. Crossed into the formidable marble vestibule. Then went through the towering video screens, twinkling copper, crystal and mirror of the front bar. Walking up the grand staircases, you would start hearing the rumble of bass and the thick hum of thousands of men dancing. Saint patrons said it was then, at that exact point, that it felt like you were entering into a universe too big to fit into any city, even New York.

It was when you reached the dancefloor that you knew you had reached a new world. The creator and owner of the Saint, Bruce Mailman, who also owned the most beautiful and celebrated gay bathhouse in New York, the Saint Mark's Baths, said he wanted his disco to be a place where all time, space and limitations evaporated. An area where lights and immense sound became time and space itself. There were no columns or harsh corners anywhere in the club and its dancefloor, which could hold almost 3,000, was perfectly round. Round, and covered by the largest planetarium dome on the East Coast at that time, rising up from the floor on one side of the dancefloor. It was at about 4am every night, when the 'sleaze music', the sultry, pretty morning music (like The Police's 'Every Breath You Take', Kenny Rogers & Dolly Parton's 'Islands In The Stream', Bonnie Tyler's 'Total Eclipse Of The Heart') would start, that the cosmos was projected onto the skin of the dome. You were surrounded by all the stars of the universe and people said it felt like you were dancing in outer space. Everything belonging to real life just melted away, until you left the Saint early the next afternoon.

KERRY Jaggers was a prototypical Saint member. A beautiful, sandy-haired, blue-eyed, well-built gay man of middle-class background, he came to New York in the late Seventies from his native Texas, the state where he had launched a spate of successful discotheques as a DJ, a lighting designer and a consultant.

Jaggers' lifestyle was jet-setting and glamorous. He knew Grace Jones intimately and, back in Texas, often played host to visiting celebrities looking for decadent nights out. He vacationed on gay resort Fire Island in the summers, and his Rolodex was thick with numbers of other 'A-list' men from all over the world. Like other Saint members, Jaggers wore bandannas, fashionably ripped T-shirts and Levi's 501s tucked into Converse high-tops when he went to the disco. When he danced, he would take off his shirt like everyone else, and loop it into his jeans. The rule was comfort and maleness, no flamboyant queeny stuff.

Like other Saint members, Jaggers liked the way you could just drop yourself into the middle of the club's dancefloor and immediately feel 'as



one', somehow intrinsically connected and in love with everyone else there.

Jaggers never referred to any of these things – repetitive electronic beats, comfortable clothing, mass-identity, one love – as being part of an emerging 'ecstasy culture', the way people would eight years later when the drug hit the UK and acid house exploded. He never considered himself part of any meaning-doused drug movement when he mixed his four measures of legal MDMA powder – procured from one of the Saint's two immovable in-house dealers – into his beverages. He just did it.

"And so did everyone else I knew," says Jaggers. "But the drug was never the main focus. The drug – legal, remember – was no more controversial than baby powder. Men were the focus, sex was the focus. . . Every Saturday, at any given time, there were over 1,000 men writhing together, having open, beautiful sex on the Saint's balcony. Ecstasy is something that takes down your inhibitions; many at the Saint were pretty uninhibited to start with. You can imagine what it was like."

MDMA, acquired from labs in Texas and California, was all over New York's gay circuit by the early Eighties. Celebs and glamour-amours sampled it at Studio 54, but coke was generally

preferred at that club. It found its way into gay bath houses, but the men there usually favoured one of MDMA's chemical cousins, MDA. It was easier to sustain an erection on MDA and it felt, as former Saint party organiser Rod Roderick puts it, "less lovey, more hardcore fucky". You could also get ecstasy at the Paradise Garage, says Roderick, a man now known on the circuit as 'Disco Grandad', "but then you could get anything at the Garage, 36 different flavours. . . and all that mattered to them [the Garage patrons] was their R&B-disco-soul music. It was a black crowd, it was more music-oriented, drugs were whatever."

After 1988, when house culture had grown old enough to develop its own standardised lore and mythology, the Paradise Garage (which closed in 1987, the same year as the Saint) was the New York club that became known as the 'seminal club', the 'legendary' home of DJ Larry Levan that house-lovers began name-dropping when playing authenticity matches. In the same context, the Saint fell into semi-obscurity, a memorable club for 'fag culture' maybe, but just a pretty, inconsequential superdisco to the history of house culture a large.

It's safe to say that the Saint's hi-NRG music evolved much less illustriously than the proto-house disco-soul of the Paradise Garage. But if one is to consider ecstasy to be an important, even indispensable factor in the construction of present-day house culture, then the historical exclusion of the Saint is a very big blip. "There were, of course, many drugs at the Saint," says Kerry Jaggers. "But I still think you could say it was the first 'ecstasy club' in Manhattan – the first nightclub where there were lots and lots of people on it, reacting to it." Ecstasy was no more controversial than baby powder

Jaggers remembers ecstasy arriving at the Saint sometime in 1981. "Through one person, I believe. He was getting it from this circuit of therapists who were experimenting with it. He supplied all the dealers in the club with thousands of pills.

"At the beginning, people didn't quite know how to take it [the drug]. People tried to smoke it, people tried to shoot it, people tried to put it up their burns. Some snorted it at the beginning, because everyone was used to snorting things, but it was so caustic it would hurt, and make you cry, and it did some major damage to your nasal passages.

"The Saint had free coffee. The thing that soon caught on was putting three or four carefully measured coke-spoon scoops of the pure powder into a cup of coffee. Maybe five if you were really hardcore. It would make your coffee bitter, so you sweetened it a whole lot. And you'd chase it all down with a bar of chocolate, which was also given out for free at the club. Everybody at the Saint thought caffeine was a catalyst, that it made MDMA hit faster."

The effect ecstasy had on the Saint club may sound familiar to those who have experienced the drug in the house era. "You'd pass through the front bar, where there was all this big, carpeted box seating," says Jaggers. "And the vision was all these men with their shirts off, grinning at the air, with huge, dilated pupils.

"The dancefloor was indescribable. There is a word in German called gezellig. It's a word that the English dictionary can't translate. As I understand it, it means, like... okay, imagine Munich at Oktoberfest, thousands of people in every direction, clinking their beer steins and indulging in this very convivial, tribal, ancient thing, like they've known each other forever. When I became a card-carrying ecstasy user at the Saint, I thought of that word gezeilig a lot. Ecstasy gave us a deep feeling of acceptance in ourselves and people we were surrounded by.

"Nobody thought about it, or talked about it, but as the drug became more and more popular, I watched it change the Saint," continues Jaggers. "Change from being a buncha guys who were 'sexually liberated', yes, but underneath that still scared of their sexuality. Scared of being found out. Scared of each other. Those people blossomed and bloomed. I had never seen anything like it. It was magical." But the magic was cut short.

IN early 1982, the acronym AIDS had not yet been invented. Many in the gay community called it 'gay cancer', as the mysterious illness was still generally thought to be the fixed property of homosexual men. In the medical community it was referred to as GRID: Gay Related Immune Deficiency. In New York City, from where over half of the 300 American GRID cases reported by March 1982 emanated, one oft-used moniker for the disease was 'the Saint disease'. At the time, the illness seemed to almost exclusively strike the type of gay men who went to that club: those who had glamourous weekends of drugs and multiple partners, long memberships at both the Saint and the Saint Mark's Baths, and shared beach houses with friends and lovers on Fire Island in the summer. The 'A-list' gays.

By the summer of 1982, a palpable fear was building in gay Manhattan and on Fire Island. "People still didn't know it was a sexually transmitted disease, even doctors didn't really know," says Jaggers, who was diagnosed HIV positive in 1990. "It was commonly thought that this thing – this horrible set of symptoms killing people – could have come from some environmental cause. Was it poppers? Was it bad air in the club? Could you get it off the toilet seats? From mixing drugs? From MDA? From ecstasy?"

Some researchers at the Centre For Disease Control in Atlanta were still seriously questioning whether a 'bad batch' of poppers or another popular club drug could have been the culprit behind this disease that struck so many nightclubbers. "Everything was so unclear. People were beginning to be afraid. All we had to go on was the odd rumour or announcement."

It was a couple of years before the question mark of GRID became the understood reality of AIDS, a sexually transmitted disease, and the Saint's decline sharpened rapidly. Bruce Mailman, the owner of the club, was one of the first New York gay business owners to take a marked interest in the fight against AIDS, raising money and often giving up the club for fund raisers.

"But by 1984, 1985, people were dropping like flies," says Jaggers. "Some blamed Bruce Mailman, because people went to The Saint or the Saint Mark's Baths to have sex. He was looked down upon as killing people's friends, and the club became the centre of a very hairy dispute."

KERRY Jaggers wasn't living in New York when the ecstatic magic of the Saint evaporated. In 1984, he had received a call from Grace Jones. She said she was involved in a new club in Dallas, Texas, a place freshly designed at great cost by hot French industrial designer Philippe Starck. Jaggers says he remembers the conversation perfectly: "Daaahrling,' she said to me, 'it's called the Starck Club. We've lost our DJ. Pack your bags and come home to Texas. We will arrange for a first class ticket and a limo'." Jaggers immediately gave up his flat in New York. He stayed with his friend Rick, "an ecstasy-lover and ecstasy dealer", for a couple of days before departing. As a gift, Rick gave Jaggers a Ziplock bag filled with fluffy ecstasy to take back to Texas with him - New Yorky club drugs may be hard to come by in Texas, thought Jaggers. He travelled to Texas with the bulging baggie of ecstasy in his suitcase, "no more controversial than baby powder". (M)

WE'RE in the weirdest place in the world. It's a place where hardcore porn co-exists with Jive Bunny. Where the 'Keep Kettering Tidy' campaign somehow filters into high-octane hard house – and makes perfect sense. And where sex is everywhere.

Only in America. Except this isn't the America of Woody and Buzz Lightyear, or where one of the Friends gets slightly squiffy after a can of Budweiser. This is the US under the British influence and we, let's face it, KNOW how to party.

The invading Brits in question are Andy Pickles and, um, Amadeus Celery Mozart. Together they're the brains behind the Tidy Trax label, hard housers in the Tony De Vit mould. The invasion? Well, it's more of a minor incursion, really. It involves getting behind the decks of three clubs in San Diego and Las Vegas, standing back and watching the fireworks go off.

And what fireworks, The first display is at Club Hedonism in San Diego. Imagine this, No, don't. Christ, William Burroughs would have difficulty picturing the 2,000 half-dressed bi-boys and girls here; the blue lightsticks and bronzed bodies lighting up the room, every single one going mental to the hardest, fastest house music in town. The sound, the colour, the – yes – sex of it all.

See, whereas in the UK hard house is mainly a gay scene (see Trade), in the States, it's just pure glam. The girls are gorgeous and the men are toned, and as result Andy and Amadeus, both of whom are straight, get propositions from both sides of the border.

Take Dee Dee, for example. She's wearing a silver wig with matching body gear and she's doing her level best to catch Amadeus's eye.

"It was only after the gig that the promoter told me she had implants," sighs Amadeus, who changed his name by deed poll for charity in 1986. "They're my second favourite thing!"

And the first? "Actually feeling them!" And still the Brit-centric madness continues. A screaming queen in a bandanna passes a note to Andy. "Let me show you my bird," it says, with "red-tailed hawk" in brackets. "For your audience only! No nudity." Then he passes another card. Turns out his name is Tyrone and

that he offers private dancing for a living. None of what he's written makes sense, though. Until, that is, he props himself up by the booth and takes off his shirt. Preening and

posing for Andy, his entire back is covered with the biggest bird tattoo you could imagine. The boy means business. Or rather, trade.

Andy cowers fearfully behind a stack of vinyl. He's getting married in September. The last thing he needs is a red-tailed hawk stalking him all the way back to Rotherham. "That guy freaked me out," he shivers. "My buttocks were clenched for the last 40 minutes of the set!"

In many ways, this all makes perfect sense. Between them, Andy and Amadeus have been DJing and producing for well over 10 years now. Andy was the guiding force behind Jive Bunny, the camp, Fifties-fixated pop machine that topped the charts in the late Eighties. Amadeus, meanwhile, once worked for Keep Kettering Tidy. He's proud of it too. "Where do you think we got the inspiration for our logo from?" he points out. "Everything has to come from somewhere!"

In 1995, Andy and Amo set up Tidy Trax to champion the chunky, bouncy beat pioneered by the late Tony De Vit. In his unfortunate absence, they've continued to spread the good, hard word.

Initially, their dream was to hear Tony drop a Tidy Trax tune at Trade. When that wish came true – Amo clearly remembers the moment he heard Tony drop Signum's 'What You Got For Me' at Turnmills – they set their sights even higher. In 1999, the Tidy Boys sold a quarter of a million records in the UK alone. Clearly, Brits love them. So why the hell are they in America?

Easy. Hard house is booming on the West Coast. Ask San Diego promoter Jon Bishop, who personally invited them over.

"They're great DJs who can always throw down a wicked set," he grins. "I love their energy and enthusiasm!"

The high-pitched, high-octane sound fits in perfectly on a continent that's just woken up to house music. The Tidy sound blends elements of rave with nu-NRG and trance. It's no accident that one Tidy favourite samples 'Good Life' by Inner City: this music looks to the past just as much as the future. Slower than hardcore but faster than garage, they appeal to a mixed party crowd reliant on high-speed thrills. Little wonder, then, that they're treated like latter-day herces here.

When the gig finishes at 2am, the Brits abroad bemoan the early closing of shop. Like most of America, clubland is still ruled by iron-willed conservative politicians determined to keep the thrills to a minimum. We head to the suburbs of San Diego instead.

Our chauffeur turns out to be the one of the most well-connected men we've ever encountered. A large, imposing chap – let's call him Mike – he takes great pleasure in showing us the contents of his phone. And although he

never reveals the details of his work, he has one of the finest address books ever seen on a cell phone. Numbers for Sasha, Digweed, Oakenfold and Lopez all scroll by.

Scroll back a sec. Was that Jennifer Lopez? We stop and demand he calls her. If she's asleep, tough. If she's hanging with Puffy, tough. If she's writhing naked on silk sheets, tough! He finally relents and calls her up. Sadly we get an answerphone. For now it's enough.

Eventually we grind to a halt outside a quiet house near the hills. Several girls with Britney grins greet us and we're ushered inside by a pimp-like figure in shades. Even in this nonemore-weird night, something seems strange.

Drinks are served, snacks are spread and loud, earache-inducing techno suddenly envelops the room. Mike has forgotten to tell us that the owner of this abode happens to be one of the biggest porn directors on the internet. And that the oversized cupboard in the corner of the room is actually the largest widescreen TV we've ever laid eyes on. We're at the wrong house. The lights go down, the music goes up and a movie starts rolling. Stuff happens. Stuff we never knew was physically possible. . .

The following night the Tidy boys are playing at

Studio '64'. A multi-tiered, psychedelic venue on the outskirts of town, the atmosphere is as mad as before. The school uniforms are out in force again but they're joined by some of the friendliest folks you could hope to meet. One tiny Brit raver – the aptly named Little John – seems determined to follow Tidy Trax around the country. He tells Muzik that Gatecrasher asked him to look out for a venue out here. No wonder, really, when the crowd reaction is so extreme. America is catching on at last.

Vegas is the final stop and the boys play at Babies at the Hard Rock Café and again, hard house heaven is the result. Spinning speedy songs from Trauma, Rimshot and Tony De Vit, the club is crammed full of the beautiful people. On Sunday night, the worst weather conditions in years mean we're stuck in Vegas with no crew, no plane and nowhere to go. Andy decides the only option is to drive all night to LA. Through the notorious Nevada Desert, no less.

"I've driven 300 miles through a straight road in the desert, had an out-of-body experience and haven't slept for two days," says a slightly delirious Andy when we finally hit Heathrow Airport 24 hours later. "I'm a mess."

So are wel. So much for keeping it tidy. (M)

WALKING the sands and streets of Miami's South Beach, it's hard to remember what untanned skin looks like. Or that 36B – not 32D – is the national cup average. Or that love handles, or spots, or body hair, exist. Or that muscular gay men are actually a minority in the world at large. It's also hard to remember that – at least where we come from – coffee means a cup of hot brown liquid and not a 'frozen double latte tallboy', and that 'cute' is not the ultimate descriptive word. That thinking things like, "Ooh, I need to get more glitter gel at the shop, better put on my thong" is not in fact normal for most people in most places on this planet we call Earth.

Van tryst: Armand and his 'bird' take the air

It's early evening on a Friday in the middle of March, a defining week in a particularly hottedup presidential race in America, and yet all most on South Beach seem concerned with is where SB resident Madonna will be dining that evening. Armand Van Helden, in town to promote his new album 'Killing Puritans', walks out onto Collins Avenue from his smoothly stuccoed Deco hotel. His girlfriend, Vicky - or maybe it's Vikki - is in spectacular tow. Mr Van Helden is doing something of a nuevo-B-boy-Cuba-Libre look, in an unbuttoned orange cabana shirt and baloony combat trousers tucked into Timberland-ish tan boots. He's dripping silver jewellery, and has one of those stretchy tie-up bandanna-cum-skullcaps on - the kind of headgear that meant you were ghetto in '89, but now just means you've got that ghetto chic 2000. Vicky is in an unbelievably plunging neckline with white spandex capri trousers, a very visible G-string underneath, and teeny-tiny patent leather stilettos. Her hair is big, black, curly. Her skin is brown, smooth. Her ass is just not to be believed: like two basketballs, and even the mottles are attractive

"She was born in Puerto Rico, you know," Armand will later say, with two scoops of pride. "I met her at a rave three years ago, somewhere near New York. I was DJing, and saw her dancing and was like, 'Damn!""

Armand and Vicky walk along Collins Avenue until it merges with the gaggle of pseudo-classy restaurants and flashy 'Hot Salsa!' courtyard clubs which make up the seaside strip of Ocean Drive. The stretch is packed with beautiful people, all attention getters, all vying for attention, and yet, when the couple take the boardwalk, it's like the fucking parting of the Red Sea. Armand has this walk - not guite a homeboy limp, more like he's hearing 'Funk Phenomena' in his head and is rocking a chugachuga stride to go with it. Vicki just looks like she's living La Vida Loca. And Ocean Drive appreciates it. "Do you know who that is?" says one queen to another, as La Vida Loca Funk Phenomena chuga-chugas past. "I have no clue, but they sure look like somebodies, don't they? I bet you he's a rapper."

"Gotta get my swell on, man. And you can put that in the article, I don't care" Not far off, actually. On 'Killing Puritans', Armand Van Helden DOES rap. He also lets other people rap (best pal Junior Sanchez; Chicago MC Common). He also records a drunk friend beatboxing house tunes. He also rocks a Miami-bass booty number which samples Gary Numan's 'Cars', features N'Dea Davenport on a tribal-ish track, commands breakdancers to the floor for a breakbeat ditty, cobbles together a shoo-in Ibiza anthem with airplane noises in it, and even goes big-hair heavy metal for one track, care of a Scorpions loop and lyrics about spiders. Basically, we're talking one big, boombastic block party here.

"Killing Puritans' is about everything I am and everything I like. It's about variety, not puritan com-part-men-tal-i-sa-tion," says Armand, picking up a favourite word with silver tongs. "And it ain't about mood music, ain't about slick superclub shit, or escapism... it's the antitrance shit, my reaction to people tryin' to break into America with their poison MOOD music."

Oh, you mean. . .

"I ain't namin' no names. You know who I'm talking about. Trance! They're over there, in England, poisoning their own country, and they want to bring it over here. They totally want to infiltrate America, to get every 15 year-old American kid fucked up on E so that he doesn't even know how shit the music is! So me? I'm gonna be the antidote. The reality check. The man on a muthafuckin' mission..."

IT'S been just over a year since Armand Van Helden released his last album, '2 Future 4 U' – just over a year since he hit Number One in the UK with its first single, the vocal anthem 'You Don't Know Me', sung by Duane Harden. Since then, it's been a year of Top Of The Pops for Armand, of showdowns with Fatboy Slim, of kids loveseat, and I was like, damn! Man was so fat, he took up the whole loveseat. My man WAS a loveseat. Anyway, he had this mad entourage of bred-ren, the Cuban Lynx, and all these hot mamis were waitin' for Pun, you know, waitin' to give Pun mad love, and those Cuban Lynx? They would just be pouncin' on the mamis left, right, and all over the muthafuckin' place. .."

When Armand knows people are watching him, his yo-yo-yo schtick gets hiked up to a Spinal Tap-y '11'. His b-boyisms become more pronounced, his slang more cryptic, his body language more ghetto, his innah-city connections more star-lit. The tendency has not gone unnoticed by the many UK interviewers who have been knocking at his New York City loft all year, who have responded with a deluge of alternately affectionate and snide Ali G/DJ-in-the-Siemens commercial/creatively-bearded-poseur-dude-inthe-Backstreet-Boys comparisons.

"Fuck, let them talk," says Armand, sitting up and ready for another rant. "Fuck the British powers-that-be and all their he's-this-or-that shit. They don't get it. They don't get me. I mean, these people have been to [the US]! Can't they see hip hop touches everything here, and that if it ain't touchin' you, then you are like, someone living in a cave? Like some mad hermit shit? And that, being a b-boy, and making house music from a b-boy's perspective, it's not me tryin' to do anything fancy. It's just NORMALI"

In 1998, a word that became common cultural currency in America – at least among people who use phrases like 'cultural currency' – was 'Wigger'. The Wigger, short for 'white nigger', was the boy in The Offspring's 'Pretty Fly For A White Guy' video, the 'I'm black on the inside' kid at school with the towel around his neck and the beeper and the headphones blaring Ma\$e, but only cos he didn't know about Company

on the streets of London, Athens, Paris, asking him for his autograph. It's been a year where suddenly, his body of productions – including 1994's 'The Witch Doktor', 1996's 'Funk Phenomena', and all THOSE remixes – suddenly began seeming less like a bunch of good records and more like the oeuvre of an icon. A house icon. Which, of course, means dick in terms of street-recognition in Florida, where those who think he's somebody think he's a hip hop guy.

Holding court at an Ocean Drive restaurant, it seems like Armand kind of wishes he was. It's an old trait of his, an endearing, almost child-like trait, one which his fans and followers – not least the ones who bought his ill-fated major label foray into hip hop, the 1997 album 'Enter The Meatmarket' – have become quite used to.

"Yo, yo, yo, check it!" he says, swatting the air, making room for the 'crazy-ass' verbal nugget he's about to drop. "You know Big Pun?" Yes. Rapper. Died this year. Age 28. Heart attack. Weight 650 pounds. Difficult to find coffin of appropriate size. "Well, last year, he was chillin' at my place, at my sled – I call a crib a sled – and he was like, sittin' in this black leather Flow. The poor sod who talked the talk and walked the walk, but had no idea WHY.

By 1999, nobody used the W-word much any more, at least not derogatively. Eminem had ascended, along with the earth-shattering SoundScan statistic that hip hop was outselling all other genres in America and that 70% of its buyers were white boys. There it was: hip hop, even the more hardcore varieties, in the middle of the mainstream. "So y'see," says Armand, "callin' anyone a 'hip hop fake' is like, just mad stupid. You'd have to call every non-ghetto kid in America that! Rakim said it best: it's not where you're from, it's where you're at."

That Armand is from is a generous handful of places is something he's proud of. He was born in Boston in 1970, to an American mum of French and Lebanese parentage and an Indonesian-Dutch father.

"Dad was in the Air Force," says Armand. "We moved, like, every two years. I lived in North Carolina, New Hampshire, then bounced around Europe for most my teens. Every time I was about to make a friend? Time to pack up and leave! That did a lot to my personality, made me

Features earthy Chicago rapper Common, horny funk loops, clubby references to fucking in the bathroom, and an almost maddeningly catchy chorus. Armand says: "A few people told me they think this is gonna blow up big-time."

KOOTCHY'

A scratch-happy plea for pussy. Booty electro blips, freestyle chimes, industrial kick drums, plus Van Helden cutting in and out of Gary Numan's 'Cars'. Hardcore nostalgia to the max. Armand says: "I wanted this to sound dirty. I cut it live on a really shit sampler."

'WATCH YOUR BACK'

1994-style big-room tribal house. Steel drums, echoing breakdowns and vocalist N'Dea Davenport. Armand says: "This is like a straightahead, hard, club thing. I really like the sound of the steel drums."

'HYBRIDS'

Van Helden takes the mic with Junior Sanchez for a hip house hoedown of Todd Terry sirens, Adonis loops, and Jungle Brothers homage. They both sound Freedom Williams-ish, but make up for lousy rapping skills with barking noises and anti-trance commentary. Armand says: "This is just our total take-the-piss anthem. We're not really being that serious."

'FLYAWAY LOVE'

A Latina-sounding chick leaves a message on Van Helden's voice mail and then all hell breaks loose with a barrage of noisy staccato stabs. Then an aeroplane takes off, and the track sinks into a psychedelic Basement Jaxxstyle loop 'n' filter workout. Armand says: "Junior Sanchez said he thinks this sounds like Art Of Noise. I don't know, peoples is sayin' 'Ibiza, Ibiza' 'bout this one. And no, I won't tell what the sample for this track is. Don't even TRY guessing."

ARMAND VAN HELDEN:

FIVE HUMUNGOUS YEARS

1992: Armand moves to New York, spurred by the success of his first fully fledged production, 'Stay On My Mind', recorded as Deep Creed for Nervous Records. He subsequently goes moniker-mental, producing for a host of labels using pseudonyms like Sultans Of Swing, Pirates Of The Caribbean, Hardhead, and Banjee Boys.

1994: Armand puts his real name to his production 'The Witch Doktor' (Strictly Rhythm). In this high era of faceless undergroundism in New York' house, he also decides to put his photo on the record's sleeve, posing in Adidas shell toes and baggy track pants. 'The Witch Doktor' becomes one of the most successful house productions of that year, and remains a prime example of the mid-Nineties tribal house sound.

1995: Caught in a whirlwind of \$50,000 remix offers, Armand is accused of suffering "remix addiction" by dance cognoscenti, after reworking tracks by everyone from Fine Young Cannibals and New Order to the Real McCoy and Ace Of Base. His response at the time: "I'm a plumber. I get paid crazy money to go in and fix what's broken. Simple as that."

1996: The year Armand's influence reaches its pinnacle. A remix of the trip-pop group Sneaker Pimps' 'Spin Spin Sugar' – featuring stre-e-e-tched vocals and heavy-duty basslines – catalyses the genre of speed garage in Britain. Other output includes the remix of Tori Amos' 'Professional Widow', which reaches the UK Number One, the remix of CJ Bolland's 'Sugar Is Sweeter' plus monster groovoid hit 'The Funk Phenomena'.

1999: After being almost universally panned for essaying a major label hip hop album in 1997 ('Enter The Meat Market', Ruffhouse/Columbia), Armand releases '2 Future 4 U' on his own new label, Armed. The album's first single, 'U Don't Know Me', reaches the top spot on the UK pop charts in January.

Armand Van Helden is playing at Ericsson@Homelands in Winchester on May 27th strong, and open to any shit, you know?" Armand says he always found a buddy in b-boyism. He says that in 1979, he was "rockin' out to the Sugarhill Gang," even though he was not yet 10, and living in, er, Turkey. He seems to find many parallels between his experience growing up on weirdo military bases and that of a kid growing up in the ghetto. He says military housing was like "projects" and that "weird clique shit could go on" – but you know that he knows that he's stretching things a bit. "I'm attracted to thug aspects," he shrugs. "It's what I see."

He moved back to Boston to do a practical course in media and technology at Bunker Hill College when he was 18. In Boston, he got into the Latin freestyle scene, then got into coke dealing, then got into house music, then got into promoting house, then got into DJing, then got into remixing, then got into trouble.

"I did a club night called The Flight in 1991. It was banging! But then we moved it to a lesbian club in Cambridge Square, and there was some big, like, non-Cheers Boston, cowboys and Indians shit that happened."

Um. WHAT?

"Well, there was this gang, the X-Men, a Puerto Rican gang straight outta New England." New England? "Ooh, yeah! And one night they were in the house, and so was a Haitian gang, cause Cambridge Square was Haitian territory. . . Isn't Cambridge Square HARVARD territory?

"Oh, fuck, you don't know the half of it! Anyway, somebody ripped someone else's gold chain, and it got ugly, and there was a lesbian bar still open in the basement, and all the lesbians came up from the basement and started throwing down heads, man! The lesbians were hanging guys on fences! People are still in court for that shit!"

It would be a year still before Armand would leave Boston for New York City, under the patronage of Neil Pettricone at X-Mix Productions and Gladys Pizarro at Nervous Records ("I had to go, I was freakin' these chicks and their boyfriends just got outta jail"). Before never creased. His beard is bonsai-perfect. His outfits are always OUTFITS.

It's Saturday, photo shoot day, a day for beige XXL Ecko shorts, an Ecko belt, white tank top, a very eye-catching super-sized plastic watch, incredible hairless pecs, and a boom box. Armand and Vicky are doing that walking thing along Collins Avenue again, only this time with, rather appropriately, Sisqo's 'Thong Song' purling from Armand's stereo. "It's one of these sampler CDs I get sent to me, they are my favourite CDs to listen to, all kindsa shit all slapped together." The photo site is reached. The photographer asks for a shirless Armand. Armand dips to the ground and begins doing push ups – "gotta get my swell on, man. . . and you can put that in the article, I don't care."

Armand, typically, has got a great case of the verbals, and chats through the entire day.

A CONDENSED list of things he talks about: how drum & bass has had a huge impact on American hip hop; how Todd Terry should be given more props; how 1994 was undoubtedly the best year house ever had, nothing comes close; British slang, particularly the term 'birds' for the chicks; how the deli down the street from his New York studio will deliver anything, and he means anything; how the spoofy superhero movie Mystery Men is the dopest shit he's seen in years; 'banjee realness'; how Norman Cook has got some kinda genius in him; how the Eighties were the best decade for hairstyles; how the Wu-style house mafia called the Mongoloids, which he helped form, are going to take over the planet; and finally, Armand does manage to get in a few more words about 'Killing Puritans'.

"This is my take-the-piss anthem," he giggles, setting his boom box to the track 'Hybrids', on which he (along with Mongoloid Junior Sanchez) raps over Adonis and Todd Terry loops. "It's fully hip house." He then moves on to the track 'Full Moon', which features Chicago rapper Common, and sounds strangely like a Will Smith tune.

"Callin' anyone a 'hip hop fake' is just mad stupid"

scooting his hometown, he DJed and ran nights at a club called The Loft – a haunt which, like New York's Nasa, was an essential stop on the burgeoning East Coast rave circuit.

"At the time, it was like, 'I'm rave', or 'I'm house', it was so annoying," he says. "At The Loft I was like, 'I want rave AND house!' I had [hardcore] on one floor, and some deep shit on the other floor! It was like culture clash and I was just loving it. That was, like, the beginning of my no-compartment theories, the start of the mad mix-it-up principles I still follow."

SPENDING a weekend in Miami with Armand Van Helden means spending a lot of time waiting for Armand to be ready. Call up to his room, and you will get his most obliging voice: "Fuck, sorry, I'm ironing my shorts," or, "Only 10 more minutes, I'm still dressing". Armand is into his looks. He's big into maintenance. His duds are "Well," says Armand, pressing pause on his boom box. "Whaddaya want? It's upbeat party rap. My boys in the UK think 'Full Moon' is going to be Top 10."

And with that, Armand sets off to a Miami megaclub, to play a much more homogeneous DJ set than he would like, in trying not to clear a crowd of dancers who know him by 'U Don't Know Me', and not much else. He looks cramped at the decks, playing hard track after hard track behind a proverbial brick wall. He then drops 'Flyaway Love', the crazed, seismic stormer off the new album that some of his "people in the UK" say will be an Ibiza anthem for 2000. The crowd goes kooky, the bricks tumble down, and you think, 'he is going to chart again'. It could be with this Island-bound house record, or it could be with a straight-up rap song ("I'd be really happy"), or it might be with both, which yes - would just kill the puritans. (M)

GUS GUS VERSUS T-WORLD

Gus Gus Versus T-World (4AD) Iceland's dance renegades come in from the cold

YOU know the scene in Human Traffic when Orbital's 'Belfast' is on the car stereo? The rave monkeys are in their car heading home from a party, absolutely spannered, and the track comes in like a glint of sunlight shining into the darkness of THE FEAR. Well, the opening track,

'Anthem', of this album is like that.

Little bleepy, floaty noises envelop you, like when you were a kid and you were being swung round in a park and could only see a deep blue sky revolving into infinity (or maybe that's only in films). Or that spine-tingling feeling you get when you see someone you fancy or eat your favourite Jelly Belly. . . Well, this is it. A sort of timeless beauty up there with Galaxy 2 Galaxy's 'Hi-Tech Jazz', Speedy J's 'Ginger'... even something classical and grown up like Debussy. No wonder Darren Emerson released this as a promo-only cut on his Underwater label years back.

We can't think up anything quite so poetic for the second track, 'Northern Lights', but the title should let you into the secret of the flickering shades of colour conjured up by its harmonies. It's been a while since we heard anything from Gus Gus, a rag tag bunch of musicians, DJs, journalists and designers hailing from Iceland where they hang around with Björk and make clever things. This new album is the work of just four of the family – Stephen Stephensen, Biggi Thorarinsson, DJ Herb Legowitz and Alfred More – revisiting tracks that were made (as T-World) before Gus Gus existed but have been beefed up and re-edited.

Imagine picking up the grime and industrial edge of Detroit and plonking it into the beautiful, icy plains of Reykjavik and you can start to understand an album that owes as much to Maurizio and Depeche Mode as to the technosoul of Dave Angel. Landing amid our current fascination with all things techy and futuristic this is about as close to a voyage to Mars as you'll get this year. So next time you find yourself speeding to Saturn, on a night drive through Detroit or surfing the snow fields of Iceland, stick this in your stezza, sit back and listen to the future.

FILA BRAZILLIA Brazillification (Kudos)

Two CDs' worth of remixes from Hull's sultans of chill out swing

THEY won't send your latest teen sensation crashing into the charts on a one-week return journey. No, Ferry Corsten doesn't battle them blank cheque for blank cheque in the trance stakes. And, sorry, but you've probably only ever heard of half the acts they remix from the time you last played 'Invent a daft producer name' (Ponga or Euphoria, anyone?). But, in nearly a decade of pioneering the UK's chill out scene, Hull's shy boys Fila Brazillia haven't half knocked out some great remixes too. Sometimes you get the feeling they're the token trendy remix added on for a cheap snatch of kudos. After all, did Radiohead, Simple Minds or Black Uhuru really need Brazillifying for that extra platinum disc? We suspect not. And yet, whether it's making Thom Yorke sound like he's choking on his own melancholy or splintering Lamb's soft trip hop under-parts with some post-junglist spikiness, Fila Brazillia ooze that singular ability to turn original material into something even more startling and unique.

In their element on chill out standards like DJ Food, The

Irresistible Force and Mellow, their small-beat big-funk sound isn't afraid to hit the low-action dancefloor too, as their breaksladen takes on The Orb and Freakpower demonstrate. Equally at ease with the vocals of Moloko and Phosphorous as with the rippling Eighties indie-funk of ACR, the only questionable omission is a personal favourite – their soundclash with Busta Rhymes of a few years back. Still, on this evidence, that Britney Spears remix and a fat retirement cheque can't be far off.

The boys from Brazillia – you wanna be in their gang.

DECKWRECKA Vengeance (Ronin)

Ridiculously funky and fresh UK hip hop-wrecking decks with feeling

THE mysterious Deckwrecka, aka Adziz, is an upfront kinda guy. Opener 'The Big Up' sets the scene a block-rockin' blast of Britishflavoured breakbeat. Samples from orchestral works are woven in, while cuts from cult movies hurl around the place before the mighty 'Assassin's Road' hits in with gunshots and driving plano stabs. We're not even one-tenth of the way in and it's apparent that Deckwrecka's consumed every hip hop record ever made, absorbed all the funkiest bits and twisted the lot into his own inventive shapes. 'Vengeance' is hip hop for the pure joy of it, not an attempt to twist the genre down incompatible routes. And as a result Vengeance' is sweet.

FRESH from the Top 10 success of his collaboration with Taka Boom, the nicest man in disco returns with a cover of the ESG New York classic. As ever, this is Dave Lee doing what he does best - keeping the disco flame both alive and relevant. ...

Trevor: "Ah, Joey Negro! I know Joey Negro - he used to buy records off me! I recognise this, it's a cover. This was one of those massive tracks from the late Eighties warehouse scene, pre-acid house, and he's just made it a bit more disco and put on more percussion. The bassline's great, though. I'm not gonna diss that."

RUNAWAYS FEATURING MASTA ACE

Express Delivery (Ultimate Dilemma)

HEAD-NODDING hip hop that pushes all the right buttons, so dope you can smell the reefers. Aquasky and DJ Format bring extra. funk to the party.

Trevor: "I don't know what to make of that -Hike Masta Ace. Hike the rapping, but like a lot of this old skool stuff it ends up sounding average. The production is just too light for me-it needed to be a lot fatter." ...

Positive Sweat EP (Blue) SUPERIOR fusion of dub and techno, which work nicely as cool-down tracks after a weaty night's hedonism. Pleasant, and definitely different.

Trevor: "We had to play ambient music on the day after Diana died. The amount of calls we had, with people asking, "what was that tune?" was amazing, I swear! They'd obviously been up all night smoking reefers and thought it was great! The production reminds me of 808 State, but it's only 'Robot Blues' that grabbed me. ...

THEINFESTICONS

Hero Theme (Big Dada) HUGELY lo-fi hip hop licks that, while clearly in debt to the Slim Shady one, fuse his lyrical stream-of-consciousness with some synth stabs that verge on the hardcore, creating a distinctive affair with some of the most inventive themes seen in hip hop yet.

...

Trevor: "That delivery reminds me of Eminem, but this guy's not trying to rhyme like he does. The production is quite poor, but it's always the case with UK stuff because they haven t got any money. This is very, very underground."

BROTHERSINSOUND The High And Low Show (Regal)

THE third EP from these much-touted vounasters is a warped and twisted fusion of Herbie Hancock, weird-beard electronica and lo-fi American guitar heroes Pavement.

Trevor: "This is numbing me, I hope you know that! I can't even comment on that one. It did have some merit, I suppose, but I couldn't even tell whether it should be 33 or 45-that says it all really, don't it?"

HYBRID

Theme From Wide Angle -**Rolling Thunder Remix** (Distinctive)

WHEREAS last year's album was stuffed with richly sewn tapestries of string-scaked sound, this is a different story. Firing up all cylinders, the kind of bass that would send Grooverider crying to his mum rides some brutal four-to-the-floor battering rams

Trevor: "The problem with dance records normally, is that if I can't play them out I usually take them straight off the turntable. I haven't got the time to listen to them. I'll be quite generous to that one though - the production was really strong."

MYSTIC 3 Something's Goin' On (Subliminal)

You know when Brandon Block gets on board that you're not exactly in for a cooly studied deep house workout. Yes, it's the Phats & Small formula again, though you can't help thinking that this is perhaps one tune too far. Even the Dronez mix is fairly standard fare - a rare occurrence indeed









TREVOR NELSON'S SINGLE OF THE MONTH



CRAIG DAVID Fill Me In (Wildstar)

FRESH from 'Re-Rewind' ubiquity, Craig shows off his pure r&b roots with a silky smooth slice of pure bump 'n' grind dancefloor dynamite that's so soulful it hurts. Sunship weigh in with a two-step mix to keep Artful Dodger fans happy, but the original's so strong they needn't have bothered.

Trevor: "The Man Like Trevor, he say yes! A star has been born, basically. The fact that he can vocalise a speed garage tune, then come back with something like this says to me that he's got a lot of integrity. I don't want to seem like I'm giving this a high mark just because it's r&b, but this is pure perfection."

RELEASED MONDAY 17TH APRIL

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Trevor: "Yeah, disco, cheesy, formula It's the same old thing – generic disco sample, meaningless lyrics. It does nothing for me, but no doubt it'll do well. It'l be on all the compilations."

COCODASILVA

Coissa Nossa (Kismet) FAST shaping up to be one of THE labels to watch in 2000, this is a progressive-linged stormer with enough filtered, tribal percussion to tear your head off and shag you senseless. It's that good.

Trevor: "I think the production on this is great, much better than on a lot of the others, but I need some melody, and I need it quick!"

SANDSTORM The Return Of Nothing

(Renaissance) TO CELEBRATE their eighth birthday, Renaissance release the first twelve on their in-house label, and a headslamming dose of prime-time Tenaglia it is too. Check the 'Club 69' mix for serious sensory overload.

Trevor: "I can see that blowing up on the dancefloor. I like the percussive edge to it, and it would definitely stand out in a set of that kind of music."

LSK

Hate Or Love? (S2) A NEW boy from 'oop North', Master Leigh Stephen Kenny has served up a deliciously funky slice of dubbed-down reggae style r&b, coated with his supremely soulful yet understated vocals; it's all been set upon with a large blunt by Slum Village. Tasty.

Trevor: "Aha, some melody at last! They've got Slum Village in to remix because they're cool, and it doesn't work. The original flove – a major talent has been unearthed in Leeds!

LOCK AND LOAD Blow Your Mind (Pepper)

Blow Your Mind (Pepper) ALREADY tried and tested by Judge Jules, the sire-happy Club Caviar hard house workout is especially hard to resist.

Trevor: "There are too many cheesy noises in there, like that siren. It's like a flashback to where it all went wrong!"

.

CYPRESS HILL

(Rap) Superstar (Columbia) STILL massive Stateside, the 'Hill have never quile managed to rekindle the enthusiasm that greeted 'Black Sunday' on these shores. On the evidence here, not even rent-a-guest Eminem can inject fresh inspiration. It's by no means bad, just nothing new.

Trevor: "Now these guys have gone really far down in my estimation over the last few years. They did a few singles, but everything they've done since has sounded the same. They should have stopped three years ago."

BLEACHIN' Bleachin' (BMG)

PRIME-TIME, synth-heavy, cheerfully energetic dancefloor fodder, as you'd expect from The Man With The Hat. Breakbeats and off-kilter samples keep things interesting, while Hybrid chum out a below-par revamp.

Trevor: "Jeremy Healy and Amos work along the road. I've had this for about six months and never played it! I can't diss it – they "Ibbe round with the cocaine, goin' 'sounds good now, doesn't it?"

VARIOUS ARTISTS Ghost Dog (Motion Picture Soundtrack) (Epic)

WITH cuts from heavyweights like the Wu-Tang and Kool G Rap, this fivetrack sampler showcases the darker side of US hip hop circa 2000, though the mood gives the impression the flick itself ain't gonna be no birthday party.

Trevor: "Wu-Tang are another lot who should have quit. I'm a Method Man fan, but I think Wu-Tang got to number one in this country with their album on nothing more than hype. I hope the film's better than the soundtrack."

MJCOLE

Crazy Love (Talkin' Loud) WITH impeccable timing, NU Cole returns with a single and album just as the underground garage scene is exploding. With a fluny of mixes, your best bet is the original, a chunky, sublime slice of two-step at its best.

Trevor: "Now there's a name I recognise! I haven't heard it before, but I really like it. It's got melody, there's a really strong vocal there, it's got the production, it'd get me on the floor, bumpin' and grindin', y'know? It's a real dance record."

HUMATE

Choose Life (Superstition) ALTHOUGH this is an act with a not inconsiderable pedigree, the inclusion of a frankly terrible vocal that sounds like it was recorded in the same session as ATB's shocking 'Killer' cover is unforgivable. Go for the dub.

Trevor: "No, I hate this – this is just appalling. I hate it."

FEMIKUTI

Blackman Know Yourself (Sound Of Barclay) You can't help but feel for Femi – if you follow in dad's footsteps, then unfavourable comparisons are inevitable. Nonetheless, this is a breezy slice of summertime Afro-funk – and the cover's great!

Trevor: "His Dad he's not. I know the guy who signed him, actually, and he knew he was never gonna sell. I think he only did it so he could tell people, 'I've just signed Fela Kuti's son!' But it's reasonable, and fairly interesting. Good, world-y music!"

PESHAY

Nu Jack Swing (Pivotal) Combining the boogie of jazz with the drum shuffle of drum & bass is a trick that's been tried, unsuccessfully, many times before. Tharkfully, Peshay wisely ditches the wanky sax solos for some dirty double bass, and frankly comes up trumps.

Trevor: "Is there still a lot of drum & bass around? I expect they're glad the tourists have gone, so lhey can get on with what they're good at. This is drum & bass for sunny days. Tike it, and I'd listen to it."

MIGUEL MIGS Find What's Mine

(Yoshitoshi) A housier-than-usual outing for Yoshitoshi, this sees Migs doing what he does best-delivering a slice of unashamedly uplifting vocal house that shines like a summer sunrise.

Trevor: "I really like this – it's not trying too hard to be commercial or anything. I'd put it in the 'listen to again' bin."

LAMBCHOP

Up, Up & Away! (City Slang) THE combination of nu-folk troubadours Lambchop with ambient new boys Zero 7 was always going to be a winner, but this exceeds all expectations. Imagine the ecstasy of the Primals' 'Movin' On Up' crossed with the joyous melancholy of Air and you're still only half way there.

Trevor: "Ah, some more melody, and even a tune! I think guitars are very much underused in dance music. That makes me want to put daffod!ls in my ears and run around in a field! It would help if it was 90 degrees cutside."

ONLY CHILD The Virgo EP (Grand Central)

AMOVE away from the rump-shaking hip hop you might expect, this EPIs still a fairly accurate demonstration of the hooking up of hip hop's funk and the Madchester vibe that Grand Centralso ably represent.

Trevor: "I could listen to this, definitely. There's some interesting tracks on there. I wouldn't necessarily call it a radio record, but it's nice. Maybe at two in the morning."

JT DONALDSON &

CHRIS NAZUKA The Quiet Life EP (Nordic Trax) THIS label just keeps on serving up quality portions of tracky house music, and this does nothing to damage that reputation. Admittedly a bit too in awe of their predecessors, this EP still pulls off some pretty irresistible grooves.

Trevor: "It sounds like an old Trax record, but they always used to have interesting basslines, which this doesn't. It makes me feel nostalgic, but no one's gonna play it, are they?"

NOIZFALLS

The Passion (Code Blue) DESPITE predictions of the 'death of trance' in 2000, there's no evidence that it's happening – and with records of this calibre appearing, why should it? A real Van Dyk, tear-jerking, let'shug-everyone moment.

Grow! Music continues its strong run of releases with another sold outing from Hi-Lo. 'He Didn'! Know' is the real body-mover here, its high-octane beats and uplifting sax combining to give a real high on the dancefloor. Well worth checking. **(KIM)**

Chilli Funk – isn't that some kind of Tex-Mex dressing? Quite probably. However, the title is a tribute to author Elmore Leonard. "We were watching the adaptation of 'Get Shorty'," chuckles Lofty. "There was a character called Chilli Palmer, and he was coolest guy you've ever seen."

How did it start? Lofty and Muzik's soul don Dr Bob Jones started putting stuff out in 1996. "We started off with a track by Diesel, and a track by The H-Men called 'Fiesta De Fracas'," remembers Lofty. "It was an outlet to put out music that we were into."

What can you expect from a Chilli Funk record, then? Strictly blissed-out grooves, basically. Lofty reckons yer standard release is "something soulful, whether it's a dance track, or jazzy and downtempo, and something that sounds good on vinyl." CHILLI FUNK'S LOFTY TALKS US THROUGH HIS SPICY HOUSE LABEL

So they cater for those who still nurture a 12-inch obsession?

Definitely. As music obsessives themselves, the Chilli Funk crew go the whole nine yards to make sure their customers are getting a quality product. "There's a whole process we go through," he explains. "We make sure that the music is going to sound good when you press it on a piece of vinyl. We use the same cutting and pressing plants every time."

What's coming up then?

The second East West Connection release is top of the agenda at the moment. "We're polishing off the final bits on it now," reckons Lofty, the first fruits of which were played at last year's debauched Miami Music Conference. "It's a bit rougher, a bit deeper, and it's out in the summer."

Great vocal track comin' straight outta Luton. . . with the vocalist (sounding very much like Darryl D'Bonneau) as featured on Sonz Of Soul's 'Race Of Survival' from yesteryear. The best version has to be the Master Blaster Club mix: a simple disco groove chugs away with the emphasis on the high-octave bassline and catchy chorus hook. Stevie delivers it with conviction. Top! **(BH)**

MICHELLE WEEKS

Gotta Keep Tryin' (Basement Boys, USA)

Teddy and Jay borrow from the Teddy Prendergrass classic 'You Can't Hide From Yourself' to create the hock on this upbeat production for the Baltimore duo. Michelle always sounds pretty powerful, and this has been popular in the clubs. The verses are in typical B-boy style but really take off on the chorus and latter half of the record, which makes it a biggie for the dancefloor. **(SH)**

DJ SPEN Disco Dreams Revisited EP (Black Vinyl)

Following on from the popularity of the previous 'Disco Dreams' EP, B-boy Spen hits back with some ammunition for Alan Russell's label. Our favourite here is the Talking Heads- (we think) sampling 'Tedd's Beat Goes On', lifted from the previous EP. It's been reworked with phat new drums and a mean bassline for maximum foot movement. SOUL VISION FEATURING D'LAYNA You've Been On My Mind (Deep Vision, USA)

Sandy Rivera has certainly stepped up the energy in his productions lately, 'Don't Stop' and 'The Path' being good examples. JOLYNN MURRAY

Wrapped Up (HoneyBeat) Originally hit the streets as a US garage track, but has been given a wicked UK workover by the rising star Zed, known for his more aggressive programming and beats. One out of the soul section of the box, but Zed wouldn't be Zed if the drums didn't kick. As the music gets more vocal and musical, grooves like this are the future of the scene. Love it. **(B)**

JUICE AND LEWI I'm In Love (Moist)

A Y2K rendition of Evelyn 'Champagne' King's classic, produced by DJ Lewi, formerly of London's pioneering pirate station Freek, and Juice from the legendary Anthill Mob. Vocally it was always going to be difficult to cover because it is one of those classics, but the guys on the buttons have definitely got the beats right. OK smartass, we know we've reviewed this before, but it was so long ago (and if we're honest) unavalable. After appearing exclusively on Pure Silk's 'The Third Dimension', they liked it so much, they bought it! The Dan Man needs no intro after being the vocal talent on two of the biggest tunes in the genre's short history – 'Are U Ready' by MasterStepz and M Dubs' 'Over Here'. UK garage meets reggae and Tudor England! **(S)**

PHAZE 1

Nicole's Theme (white label) Snares, kicks and bass! If you are going to do something simple, do it like this. There are vocal snips placed strategically in the right places, not enough to get a vocal tag, but enough for a dub vocal. The bassline is the hock, it's infectious, and rolling like a SL600 downhill. Look forward to more from this gang. **(8)**

DIVINE STYLER Directrix (Mo' Wax) One of the two crews who have been credited with the 'two-step pioneer'

mantle, Dem 2 are in-your-face on remix duties, after what seems like an age away from our decks. A bopping tune, designed for the clubs, but lacking an ingredient to take it from an ckay track to a wicked track. Like it, though. **(S)**

TJ CASES AND THE CUT 'N' PLAY FAMILY It's My Life (Cut 'N' Play)

Remix, remix, remix! And what a wicked one! Known for his ability to combine sweet songs with bad beats, TJ here flips the script, and combines bad beats with a sweet song. The passion can be felt and heard on every revolution of the vinyl. As the tune develops Kat Blu starts to ad lib, the brass section (well, the saxophone at least) comes into play and the beats just get funkier. More magic from the big man. **(S)**

THE FIRST ONE is this track called 'Groovejet' by Spilla (white label) which is a disco-ish tune with a lot of filtering that works really well. Next is mine and DJ Shorty's 'Chocolate Sensation' (ffrr), and it's an anthem! It's working really well next to this Sting garage vocal bootleg called 'You Can't Go Wrong' (white label).

Next, I've got this new track from Paula Ralph, 'Ain't No Running Away' (Stereo). It's a peak-time record, as is So Switch's 'Believe In Yourself' (Yellorange), which is instant gratification!

Shazz's 'Inner Side' (Distance) is a classic garage mix – everyone knows it – while Jasper Street Company's 'Till I Found You' (Basement Boys) is a totally classic record. Then we've got Georgie Vanelli, 'Don't Bring Me Down' (Dreambeat), which is a real vocal peak-time record.

Black Mass's 'Wonderful Person' (MAW) is basically Brazilian with a vocal underneath it. People love it.

Finally, we've got **Barbara Tucker's** 'Stop Playing With My Mind' (Strictly Rhythm/ Positiva), which is funky, filtered disco. It's something I was working on acetate for a while. Barbara's vocal on it is so strong that it works as a full release.

Solid State get called in to rework Jennifer Bolton's sweet seductive vocals into an intricate slice of melodic pleasure. Big strings, spacious keys and a solid groove provide the perfect backing. The heavy bass drones come out for the tougher stepping beats and moody atmospherics of the 'Club Cut'.

POLAR Mind Of A Killer (Certificate 18)

Polar is grabbing some attention, and deservedly so with his off-key technoid slant providing a much-needed neural edge. Here he reworks 'Mind Of A Killer' into a twisted collage of stuttering breaks, haunting pads and a crisp tripped-out synth hook that should appeal to the more neurotic minds.

VARIOUS ARTISTS World Of Drum & Bass Pt. 3 (Formation)

Leicester's mighty Formation stable follows up the hugely successful 'World Of Drum & Bass' showcase with a double-pack of remixes. Twisted Individual gets looped out on the bass contertion for 'Wales', Matrix and SS provide a slick stepper on 'Ireland' and Accidental Heroes weigh in with some old skool stabs.

KARL K Synapse (Higher Education, US)

Karl K steps in with some growling hip hop flavours as manic scratches combine with jumpy distorted tones for 'Synapse'. But it's those drum & bass regulars, Konflict, who will attract most of the attention with their typically stabbing techno flavours, punching rhythms and sliding bass drones.

TWO SINNERS Second Thoughts (Mechanoise)

One of the men of the moment, Marcus Intalex, is handed the job of of remixing the tight acidic breaks of 'Second Thoughts' into a slick epic of mystical pads, flickering sequences and an irresistible stepping groove, driven by a deep, moody stabbing bass throb.

DECODER & SUBSTANCE Dysfunctional

(Breakbeat Culture) Breakbeat Culture get underway in 2000 with the latest team-up, keeping it hard but funky with the crazed jumpy bass overdrive of 'Dysfunctional', peppered with percussion switches and hallucinogenic vocal washes. Flip to 'Robbery' for more of those tried and tested dancefloor elements. ...

DJ REALITY

Cobra EP (Trouble On Vinyl) The TOV stalwart DJ Reality provides a healthy helping of aggressive synth power on 'Cobra', followed by the

unrelenting acidic lines of 'Anger', but the mean, determined analogue sliding of 'Scalpel', featuring Usual Suspects, provides the highlight.

ELEMENTZ OF NOIZE Awareness (Fuze)

Newcastle's E.O.N. return to Fuze with one of their best, a feverish dancefloor driver packed full of busy stepping drums, stabbing bass tones and old skool keys that shed a new light. 'Terminal' piles on the angry pressure with its slamming kicks and deathly rumbling subs.

MANIFEST Firing Squad (Hardleaders)

Pleasantly titled latest from Manifest, and as you might expect it's aggression all the way. This is pretty much as hard as it gets, as crashing industrial drums run riot among a sea of droning tones and filtered effects. 'Third Eye' gets a little more chilled but still keeps the analogue tones working away. ...

DISTORTED MINDS U Know (New Identity)

The latest from the Formation offshoot, another double helping of that two-step sound that we're getting to know so well. It's executed well, with the opener 'U Know' providing a deep, bass-heavy, sparse groove. Then 'Delirious' gets fullon with the bass squelching followed by the frenzied overdriven stabs of 'Factory 1'. The rhythms get more adventurous to good effect on the hardest cut here, 'Decoy', letting off steam with some tortured acidic mayhem.

LOXY & INK Quasimodo EP (Renegade Hardware)

Hardware continue the roll with a track that's been smashing dancefloors for a while now, as the DJ/producer duo launch a spellbinding hardcore workout with the clattering drums, searing noise and nasty subs of 'Quasimodo'. Two more deep-edged rollers complete the set, highlighted by the frenzied rhythms and nasty stabs of 'Sabretooth'. Oh, and then there's the Digital and Spirit remix of 'Airlock'...

VARIOUS East Side 2000 Vol 1 (East Side)

First in a series of double A-sided releases from the trusty imprint, with Majistrate getting hard and noisy on the chugging analogue rework of 'Return'. The baton goes to Embee for the jazzual delights of 'Images', bursting into a hive of dynamic percussive rhythms and a booming double bass hook.

KENNY KEN & FOOTMASTERS Turnaround (Unkut)

Debut release for the Footmasters' imprint, incorporating the sounds of Kenny Ken for the pounding 'Turnaround', with its vocal-intoned intro erupting into a blaze of frantic bass contortion. More dancefloor activity on the flip, 'Imported Images', with analogue tones building on layers of hardness. ...

REDLINE Explanation (US Advance)

The US drum & bass explosion continues with the latest from this Boston label, headed by the vocal breeze of Redline's

'Explanation', already scheduled to appear on a showcase from Astralwerks. layered with melancholic synths and wailing techno slides. Label head P Hinchey debuts on the flip with the acid burbling of 'Phantom Limb'. ...

SUPPLY & DEMAND Pure & Simple (Chronic)

After a lengthy absence, Chronic returns with a double-pack explosion. Having already unleashed the massive Trinity EP, it's time for Supply & Demand to get dirty with the sculful vocals of 'Pure & Simple' rising above a minimal bass groover. Check 'Freeze' for some neat and nasty chugging and 'Show Me' for a loopedout warbling bassline stomper.

MOVING FUSION Atlantis EP (Ram)

The duo deliver four dancefloor cuts, headed by the stabs and old skool off-key tones of 'Peace Keeper'. Twostep meets 'Amen' for the rasping noise surge of 'Atlantis', while 'Fishtank' adds a technoid musical edge with its stabbing chord hock, then it's over to the analogue filtered blasts of 'Benchpress'.

Roots? Loxy and Ink both cut their drum & bass spurs on the DJ circuit. "We met through DJing on pirates like Underground FM and Kool and hanging around at Speed," Ink tells us. "We were both huge fans of LTJ Bukem."

Trademark sound? Ink's involvement with drum & bass's more melodic side and thus the affection for Bukem's tracks - is continuing apace with the Architecture label. But as the title of the pair's new 'Quasimodo' EP suggests, the sound they make together is fearsomely endowed with hulking, gnarly basslines and raging 'Amen' breaks,

That'll be new skool old skool drum & bass, then?

"It can't be retro," Ink maintains. "It's more to do with getting back that grit that the old style had. The sub-basses are coming back big too, which I personally think is a good thing.'

Hence those 'Amen' breakbeats, seriously back in fashion... "Again," adds Loxy, "it's what you do with it that counts. I mean, everyone's 'Amen' break is different, they're all chopped up differently and put through different EQs."

And why name the EP after the hunchback of Notre Dame? "It's

something to do with the bell sound," Ink recalls. "It just reminded us of him, I guess. It seemed to make sense to name it after a nasty, big, lumbering monster.

What's your connection with XL? Well, I'm an XL A&R man and they own the label, but I run it on my terms. Sadiy that doesn't mean I've got a lot of money to spend, but then Rex is about finding people doing interesting things.

What's coming up on Rex? An Avalanches album, a

Prince tribute album from lots of acts and a compilation series, 'Rex In Effect', which is a New York-style bootleg tape series of leftfield music.

THELOX Ryde Or Die, Bitch (Ruff Ryders/Interscope)

A favourite record of the past few weeks sees The Lox settle in nicely at their new home, the Ruff Ryders label. Having already been involved with some pure classics at Bad Boy with 'All About The Benjamins', 'If You Think I'm Jiggy (Remix)' and 'Money, Power, Respect' (an early outing for The Neptunes) things look set to continue at Ruff Ryders. Propelled by a chugging guitar sample, Eve adds a great guest rap and The Lox deliver as always. The B-side is the album title track 'We Are The Streets' produced by Swizz Beatz.

MARY J BLIGE Give Me You (Universal UK promo)

...

Mary unleashes her album's Dianne Warren ballad on us but thankfully adds a couple of nice bits to keep interest up. First off is a 'Royal Garden R&B' mix which moves the track into mid-tempo territory but isn't massively club-friendly. Perhaps more interesting is the inclusion of an extended version of the album track 'Sexy' (the one that borrows its chorus from Michael Jackson's 'I Can't Help It'). Not radically different, the 12-inch cut does, however, feature a rap by Jadakiss and is pressed nice and loud.

BRANDY

U Don't Know Me (German Atlantic plus white label versions)

If you thought the stunning Rodney Jerkins remix of 'U Don't Know Me' was the last word on this track, then think again. First off, a German 12-inch has been popping up which, alongside the Rodders remixes, features a new 'Jazz Animal' remix of 'Never Say Never' by the UK's own Ernie McKone and Crispin Taylor. As the mix names suggest this is a vibey jazz-tinged mix and very nice it is too. The record also features a useful acappella for 'Never Say Never'. Next up there are unofficial white labels of a Swizz Beatz remix which is worth picking up but will probably get some sort of official release. Finally, there's a bootleg street remix which mixes the remix acappella over the backing track for 'Vivrant Thing'. Just a shame it's spoilt by a badly mastered sound.

DMX

Party Up (Up in Here) (Def Jam, US)

DMX shows no signs of slipping as the current king of rap. As the name suggests this is a party record and it more than lives up to the description. Swizz Beatz produces and pulls another irresistible synth-heavy groove out of the hat. The instrumental alone could get you going but DMX gives it a trademark shoutalong chorus. One for your box.

FUNKMASTER FLEX AND BIG KAP III Bomb (Featuring LL Cool J)/ Confrontation (Featuring Mary J Blige)

Two of the best cuts from the recent Funkmaster Flex album get released back to back. We've reviewed the Mary track before, so enough said. The real revelation is the LL cut which is, without a doubt, his best for a long time. Using elements of David Porter's 'The Masquerade Is Over', first used by Biggie for 'Who Shot Ya!', LL shows that 15 years on he can still hold it down. A very strong 12-inch.

TONI BRAXTON He Wasn't Man Enough (LaFace)

After the trials of the last few years, which at one point saw Ms Braxton and LaFace in court, the two sides seem to have kissed and made up. As a result we're treated to the first Braxton release for ages. That man for all seasons, Rodney Jerkins, is at the controls. A real grower but possibly not on the level of a Whitney. This is certainly going to be Ms Braxton's strongest offering for hardcore r&b fans since those 'Groove' and 'Dancehall' remixes of 'You're Making Me High' way back when.

....

O-TIP Let's Ride (Arista)

Even with two excellent singles the ex-Tribe man's debut solo album has apparently got off to a slow start in terms of sales in the States. Maybe this has influenced the choice of 'Let's Ride' as the third single. Of all the tracks on 'Amplified' this was the only track with a distinctively Tribe Called Quest flavour and the one most likely to motivate Q-Tip's old fanbase. That's by no means a criticism and, with its nagging jazz guitar motif, 'Let's Ride' is already a favourite for many. Let's hope the album starts getting the sales it deserves.

KEUS

Good Stuff (Virgin)

Brilliant as Kelis's album is there's no obvious follow up to 'Caught Out There' on it. Tracks like 'Mars' and 'Game Show' are probably too quirky to follow such a mammoth hit, so the record company have plumped for the most club-friendly track on the album, 'Good Stuff'. Apparently there will be some sort of remix, but it will probably come from the US rather than UK.

CRAIG MACK Ooops There Goes (acetate)

Craig Mack comes back from the wilderness with a huge track which is selling out and looks set to be picked up by a major. Using a Frank Sinatra and kiddle chorus sample, the track then launches into a killer groove and the sort of driving rap which made 'Flava In Ya Ear' such a hit all those years back. Good to see the wanderer return.

SISQO

Thong Song (Def America)

Sisqo is definitely aiming for world domination and is looking to follow up the success of 'Got To Get It' with a song about knickers and his most commercial effort to date. Some might feel that the man with the silver hair is taking perhaps a step too far, especially the bit where he begins on 'La Vida Loca'. We'll leave you to come to your own conclusions about that one.

SHOLA AMA Imagine (Freak Street/ Warners)

A reasonable track but you can't help but feel that when UK artists go to the States to get songs their place is usually at the back of the queue - unless they're the Spice Girls! Hence this Dark Child production is produced by Fred rather than Rodney Jerkins. Various mixes are offered, and our favourite's the 'Spa Mix' featuring Iceberg Slim. By no means a bad track. ...

Album

RZA PRESENTS VARIOUS ARTISTS Ghostdog OST (Epic)

Over the last couple of years it really got to the point with the Wu-Tang Clan where you felt you could have too much of a good thing. Thus, having approached the soundtrack for the RZA's debut as a film director with some trepidation, it was a really pleasant surprise. RZA's obviously going through a Willie Mitchell/Hi Records phase because Al Green samples abound from the opening track, Sonz Of Man's 'Strange Eyes', onwards. A particular favourite is Bang Bang's 'Wu Stallion'/'Don't Test' which uses the strings of Green's 'Simply Beautiful' as a base for a roots reggae epic (no kidding!). This is followed by a similarly strange, almost disco-style track from singer Tekitha called 'Walking Through The Darkness'. If you're an original Wu fan who's been turned off by overkill this could mark your return to the fold.

THE FIRST ONE is a track from the film Ghost Song by Mr Sugar Sugar Bang Bang called 'Don't Test' (Wu-Tang), which is this reggae guy doing his stuff over a loping hip hop groove. Then there's Malik Pendleton's 'Ghetto Brothers And Ghetto Sisters' (Atlantic) which sounds like a Seventies soul tune with contemporary production.

Kelis' 'Suspended' (Virgin) is one of the most beautiful soul records ever made, while Dennis Taylor has got a track called 'Enough Is Enough' doing the rounds on white label. He's basically Donnell Jones but with a real twist it's quite a sweet little tune.

Mary J Blige has got a great track on that Funkmaster Flex compilation called

'Confrontation' (Def Jam), which is like rougher versions of her album material. Then there's this thing on a label called Mastermind 3.5 which is really quite mad. The vocal side is called 'Playa Haters' by Shaun Paul, but the dub is a mix by Sly Dunbar from Sly and Robbie, which is like a Sixties soundtrack with a reggae rhythm underneath it.

Finally, 'The Diez Brothers' by Tony Touch (Tommy Boy) is a great Latin-sounding hip hop record, and I've got to mention the new album by The Common - 'Like Water For Chocolate', If you like Mos Def, you'll love this.

Paul Van Dyk fans will need rubber underwear for this one, his newest, and in our opinion, best piece of work to date. To start with, Saint Etienne's Sarah Cracknell has the voice of an angel and Paul's production envelopes the listener in a bubble of liquid trance. (LF)

DAVE DEVIL Mind Opening (EveNova 7)

This is the classic Italian trance sound reworked for 2000. All the mixes are good, but the original is the best: intelligent and interesting. Slip me another slice of pizza, dammit (LF)

SAGITAIRE Shout (C'mon) (Nu Life)

Les Hemstock and Chris Jennings have pooled a wealth of experience in the world of promotion and production to bring you Sagitaire. If you don't like this track you must be an awkward bastard, because with mixes by Airscape, Switch and Sagitaire it has it all. It's even had radio support from the big blokes. (LF)

OLIVER LIEB

Subraumstimulation (Data)

Oliver Lieb's latest project is a tricky one to ask for in a record shop unless you're well versed in German. The original mixes definitely hit the spot, but the Sander Kleinenberg mix is a real work of art. (LF)

N-FLUENCE Interrupted Journey (Polar State)

Roland Van Gelderen's follow-up to last year's 'Sweet Substance' is just as good, if not better. The Dutch sound is here to stay. Some people will say "cheesy". We, however, say "Get a grip, miserable no-fun moaners". This is a wicked pumping trancer that delivers. (LF)

MARKUS SCHULZ You Won't See Me Cry (Eve)

Under his Edge Factor guise, Markus Schulz has remixed for Blue Amazon, Madonna, Bedrock and even Grace Jones. This has been a monster hit in the US, and with mixes by Deepsky and notably Mara, it locks like repeating that success in the UK. (LF)

BEHIND THE SCENES AT CHOO CHOO

What can punters expect from Choo Choo? Music that progresses from almost deep house through to darker, more evil-sounding stuff. We've developed a sound that has bollocks but we recognise that hard doesn't have to mean fast.

Which artists have you released records by? Mara, Jarrod & Gilbey, Hyperion, Cass, Red Devil, Hamel & Lacy and Praxis.

What has been your most successful release? Mara One was a huge release for us. For months it was impossible to go to a club without hearing it.

What inspired you to start Choo Choo? We got pissed off with rejection letters. In the summer of 1997 Mara made their first track 'Learn To Love' and we went to Ibiza and handed them to anybody with a record bag. We got back to a pile of faxes from DJs and discovered Kiss FM were using the tune as part of Gatecrasher's ad campaign.

FREE RADICAL Surreal (En-Motion remix) (ATCR)

Free Radical's Richard Helstrip is one of those little green shoots that is without doubt going to grow into a whacking great beanstalk! This is fucking brilliant. Expect more from this talented 14 yearold soon! (LF)

ELEMENTAL Want You (white label)

If you're lucky enough to track down one of these, buy it immediately! At the moment it's a very limited test pressing and we can't say who it is, but this person has an excellent track record and is no stranger to the trance scene. A monster summer record. (LF)

AURORA

Hear You Calling (Alphabet City)

Originally on Additive, this uplifting trancer has now been licensed to top German label Alphabet City, and both mixes will send the average clubber into a frenzy. A very pounding import indeed. (LF)



What makes Choo Choo different? Probably our nondance background. From an early age it was rock bands all the way for us. Having an intimate knowledge of every dance music record that's ever been written is great but it can become baggage. To be honest we don't give a fuck about the past. We're only interested in the future.

What does the future hold for you? A mix album called The Future Sound Of Chapeltown', Mara have just signed to Therapy Management and are about to release 'Fall From Grace'. We have just launched our web site (www.choochoorecords.com) and plan to do more club nights and gigs.

Where the hell does the name Choo Choo come from? We thought it would be a laugh to write deep, dark music with a stupidly named label. We were right.

QATTARA

Synthetic Reason (Steel Fish)

Mike Marshall (Tooting massivel) and Alex Whitcombe are past masters at tough, progressive 'metallic' house. Oattara have always had this futuristic, tribal alien feel which is superb and transfers well to the dancefloor. Sounds a bit evil? Good! If the Borg listen to music, they listen to Qattara. (LF)

UK GOLD Soulless EP (Primevil)

UK Gold is apparently the underground alter ego of some big-time production outfit and it must be said that the vocals on two of the tracks do sound very familiar. Not that we're particularly interested in the vocal tracks, because the cut that's doing the damage here is 'Confined'. There's not that much to it perhaps, but sometimes all you need is a fat rolling rhythm. They don't come much fatter or more rolling than this. (DM)

No surprises there, but what is surprising is that cheesemaster Judge Jules has been spotted dropping a few Samuel L tracks of late! In the words of John Lennon, these are "strange days indeed". (DIMI)

MARK BROOM VERSUS PLOYFEX Vol 2 (Speaker Attack, Switzerland)

Good value for money this one. Ployfex turns in a couple of forward-looking, very useful electro jams, while Broom keeps it strictly techno with a track that's so irresistibly funky it has to rate as the best thing he's done in ages. (DMC)

GRAYLOCK CTM Remixes (EC, Holland)

The Steve Rachmad 'Longcut' mix is the one to go for here. Okay, so it's not that original and it does sound a lot like an E-Dancer tune, But, so? The way those magical strings unexpectedly shimmer through the mix is nothing short of heavenly. One listen and you're hooked. (DM)

PAUL MAC Authentic Moment (Fragmented)

When it comes to straightahead minimal techno, Paul Mac is better than most. To our ears though, he really comes into his own on his more esoteric material. Here his deep, reflective, string-soaked techno is so heart wrenchingly melancholic it's up there with the best of old skool Detroit. Well, almost. (DIM)

FRANKIE BONES Saga EP (Pro-Jex)

Ooh, what a saga, as long-time hero of the beat and one of Noo Yoik's finest, Frankie Bones, cusses his way through four darkly twisted slabs of night-time raw funk and beefed-up Sonic Groove bass for one glorious dancefloor meltdown. A proverbial diamond in today's current big bucket of shite. (JS)

LOVEABLE ROGUES Time Zones EP (Evasive)

The third release from a south London label with a sound that lies somewhere between the deepest deep house and the wonkiest off-kilter techno. All three tracks are very playable but 'Time Zones' stands out with its weird, vintage Plus 8 sounds and fat bumpy bassline. (DM) ...

FBE

RetroActive Funk (Jump, USA)

There aren't many artists who can marry real musicality to proper, funky rhythms as well as Lucas Rodenbush (EBE). Whether calm and mellow ('Intuit' and 'Blissful') or hard and driving ('Werk'd'), his tracks let DJs drop some real soul and feeling without losing momentum. (DMI)

CHRIS JACKSON User Defined (Resource, USA)

San Jose's Chris Jackson with perhaps his most varied release so far. His trademark hollow, metallic sounds are still very much in evidence, but this time he's wrapped them round some tough electro beats and even thrown in a groovy,

bass-fuelled house track. (DIM)

MORGAN RENO The Race Is One EP (Zones)

The first release on the Zones imprint for what seems like ages and we're glad to report that it was worth the wait. Produced by the man behind the thoroughly excellent Grain material this is pure, no-nonsense, hard, funky techno that gets straight to the point with minimum fuss and maximum impact. (DM)

SVEN VATH Dein Schweiss (Virgin)

SLAVE The Grind EP (London Housing Benefit)

Colin Dale and Affie Yusef get together for the third release on a label run by Croydon's Swag Records crew. Both tracks are minimal in the extreme, but because the grooves are so quirky and the sounds so strange, they work. DJ tools for adventurous spinners. (DM) ...

IGNACIO Take One/Take Two (Scorp)

A cryptic clue in the label leads us to one of Holland's finest producers. Steve Rachmad. Rolling staccato funk, bubbling basslines and razor-sharp hats are what's on offer as the 'Black Scorpion' pierces the dancefloor iuqular with two potent stingers. Ouch! (JS)

OLIVER HO Colours For The Blind (Sequential)

Quality debut release from this new stable sees Ho delivering three shades of driven, juddering rhythm washed with glacial sweeps and stabs. With NY's Damon Wild on remix duty, these colours will be running straight out of the shops in no time. (JS)

VARIOUS ARTISTS The Sound Of Eukahouse (Eukahouse)

Eukahouse, under the supervision of Nathan Coles and Nils Hess, has become one of the most consistent tech-house labels around. Here you get the story so far with 14 of their best moments in a non-stop mix by Hess himself. (DM)

NUBIAN MINDZ New World Chaos (Archive)

Exploring the point where Detroit meets drum & bass and jazz, this refreshing album could almost be described as Bohemian techno. Highbrow but also very streety, this is chill out music with real soul, funk and attitude. Recommended. (DM)

KEV FARQUHARSON FROM ADVANCE TELLS US WHY HE THINKS PIGEONHOLING IS BOLLOCKS

What can people expect when they pick up an Advance release? The utmost quality in dancefloor music. It's music that's written to evoke emotion as well as make you dance.

Who works at the label? Myself, Chris Lyth and Miles Hague, who also does discohouse stuff on the Derby Street label.

What's been your most successful release? Our second release 'Real Time' by Dominica. Sasha licensed it to his Global Underground CD and after that the sales just went through the roof.

How do you feel about the current interface between tech-house and deep trance? All these genre names are all bollocks, they just complicate things. But the way the scene is going is very encouraging. Darren Emerson has just licensed our

'Pump Action' record for his new CD and John Digweed's taken our next release. But we get people like Colin Dale and Terry Francis ringing up as well. It's about whether a record is good or bad.

What's inspiring you at the moment? Our residency at a club in Toronto called The System; being in Glasgow is always inspirational and obviously all the music we listen to - whether it's soul, funk, hip hop, DJ Q or Global Communications

What have you got planned for the coming months? We've got a single coming out by The Disco Kings which we'll be remixing. We've got our first CD coming from Weekend World and a possible collaboration with the Circulation guys. We'll also be doing something for Hope. We've got our first CD coming the deviation by the source for out and obviously we're releasing a lot more records.

VARIOUS Ropeladder 12 (Mush, USA)

A new(ish) label launches its programme with a stunner of a compilation. Highlights include the awesome Radioinactive. Labtekwon, So Called Artists (the Anticon bunch), Jel, Aesop Rock and Reaching Quiet (some Jonathan Richman hip hop shock). If the comp occasionally steers a little close to trip hop, 'jazz' beat and other horrors, it never reaches them and the six acts mentioned create enough thought for most double CD monsters. Strange, beautiful and stunning.

LA Underground stalwart Awol One (Shapeshifters and Mass Men) drafts in 2Mex and Kool Keith for 'NME', but it's 'Sleepin' All Day' that really does it urban blues for the dysfunctional and a genuine contender for the Tom Waits Of Hip Hop crown.

BEANS

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Nude Paper (Mo' Wax Vecta) The Anti-Popster returns with a one-off (to launch Monsignor Lavelle's new imprint) taken from his Consortium's 75Ark album (see below). It's what you'd expect and none the worse for that.

MARK B & BLADE Ya Don't See The Signs/24 Hours (Everyday) (Wordplay/Source)

Somewhere between a second single from the 'Word Lab' album and a taster for their forthcoming LP, Mark B comes through with more of his trademark bassthick funk riffology, while Blade sounds ever more determined to prove his longevity through pure skills. As if he still needs to prove it. . .

DILATED PEOPLES The Platform (ABB, USA)

Dilated release their lead-up single for the much-anticipated ABB/Columbia. album set to take them into the hip hop aristocracy. This is another solid, bassed-up ode to the joys and rewards of the true skool - if it isn't exactly breaking the Dilated mould, it's still straight quality.

PEOPLE UNDER THE STAIRS

Youth Explosion (Om, USA) If you like hard kicks and snares combined with musical rare grooves, then PUTS are for you. Another LA crew with

a little in common with Dilated, they keep the lyrics simple and concentrate on showing how well they can put together what's in the crate. And it's quite a crate.

PHI-LIFE CYPHER Earth Rulers (Jazz Fudge)

The Bedford trip best known for their Skitz collaboration show that Jazz Fudge is still building despite the influx of money into UK hip hop making it hard for the little labels. Everything here is good and the album should take it even further.

TOMMY EVANS Time Capsule (YNR)

Another release from Jehst's YNR Productions, this one has six tracks of straight up rhyming and some good beats from Leeds-based Tommy Evans. Mr Evans can do stories, little flights of fancy (his favourite hip hop albums on 'Desert Island Discs'), civilisation theory and a superb posse cut ('Don'ts & Dos'). Very promising.

FUNKY DL

I'd Like To Know (Washington Classics)

DL keeps on keeps on coming. A one-man industry, the Funky one releases more records than most MCs have verses. He still shows his love of all things Tribe here, but with a little more skank than normal in the bassline.

NON PHIXION Black Helicopters (Matador/Uncle Howie)

Non Phixion preview their new album with the strongest track they've done since the seminal 'I Shot Reagan'. Both 'Black Helicopters' and 'They Got. . are exercises in the creative use of paranoia - so much so it's surprising any of 'ern dare leave the house. It's an august tradition in hip hop and they deliver with conviction. Watch your back.

THE PLANETS Circle Of Light EP (Red Sea)

Excellent EP from sometime Mecca To Medina man Normadic Poet, along with Sonrize and Bongo's DJ Kam. The real standout is 'Knowledge Of Self' (as featured on the UK hip hop comp 'Raw Materials') but the whole EP is distinguished by its intelligence and the sharp, tasteful beats.

MAD SKILLZ Ghost Writer (Eastern Conference/Rawkus)

Virginia's Mad Skillz returns at the start of a long run-up to another volume of 'Soundbombing'. While 'Ghost Write' is fine, it's 'Together' that'll attract the attention - shufflorchestral production from Timbo resulting in a three-way alliance which would have been impossible a year ago. It's kinda fly, too.

NETWORK REPS The Music (Stonegroove)

The Reps return on Stonegroove for a really rather good one-off. It's NY hip hop, but from the funny, slightly silly, effortlessly funky end of that spectrum. As such it's an amiable and laid back thing that should keep your head nodding and your smile slopping.

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DAMAGED GOODZ Keys To The City EP (Powercut)

The Glasgow pairing of Bee Jay and Steg G return with five new tracks and instrumentals. Steg shapes moody, woozy sounds and menacing beats while Bee Jay gives the lyrics the full Scots flavour - independent and better for it.

THEE INSEKT FEATURING BLADE Warp Zone (B9, Belgium)

DJ Grazzhoppa hooks up with old sparring partner Blade for some hip hop mayhem. 'Mothership Rebels' is a roaring sci-fi epic while 'Your Manager's On Crack' carries on where the other left off - one of the most crunching, cut-up, all round nasty slabs of vinyl you'll hear. Oh, and it's quite hyper, too.

ANTI-POP CONSORTIUM

Tragic Epilogue (75Ark, USA) Beans, Priest and M Sayyid launch the

new Automator-related imprint with one of those albums that, if you give it a chance, you'll still be picking over in a decade. Featuring special guests Pharoahe Monch, Aceyalone and Apani, you know that the healthy disrespect these artists have for rap comes from a liquid intelligence and a pure love of hip hop. Unmissable.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Ego Trip's The Big Playback (Rawkus)

The launch of Ego Trip's epic, essential 'Book Of Lists' is an excuse to pick out 12 classic hip hop cuts from the Eighties and put them out on Rawkus. Really, the guiding principle (that they're all listed somewhere in the book) is little more than an excuse. Who cares? It's a great little record.

JAY I E SURGEON OF THE NUMSKULLZ GIVES US THE LOWDOWN ON HIS PRODUCTION IDEAS

What is your musical background? It's pretty much always been hip hop for all of us, I think. Nothing grabbed me before that.

How did you get into producing? Just through having a little bedroom set-up, really. Just hassling people, going over people's houses and having a little fiddle on their equipment!

What was the first and the last record you made? The first record was 'Nothing But The Music' which came out on High Noon. We made the music in '96 and it came out in '97 when Fresh '97 was on. The last record we made was the 'Ad Infinitum' twelve which is coming out after the album on April 24th.

How would you describe your sound? Kind of soulful and quite smooth. It's not really jagged - our sound always seems to merge into being quite smooth. It's subliminal, really. I think a lot of the things we try to do with the music and the sound,

even where we think we're freaking it all out, it's actually really quite smooth. And quite electro in a way.

Who would you most like to work with? I'd like to do something with Dilated Peoples. I'd also like to work with quite a lot of British people. I well want to do a tune with Skinny Man. I've always wanted to do a tune with him. Yeah, we need to swing that. . .

What does the future hold? Hopefully another album! And some Two Amigos stuff. And getting out there doing live shows. A bit of liveness! We've got a guy who plays bass and guitar on one of the tunes on the album so we'll get him in and change everything a little bit. Rola isn't one of the most animated MCs onstage so I think it'll work really well having other people doing things around him - to keep your eyes occupied. .

Dark Globe's production seems to have improved since their jump to Mark Pember's Surrey stable, and 'Re-Ascent' is the proof – heads down breakbeat that welds retro synth stabs onto punchy futuristic breaks without disappearing up its own sampler. Top boys Terminalhead turn in a spanking electro break mix of last year's 'Arnica'. Very good indeed.

The label's 50th release is remixed by the whole stable, with The Wiseguys' 'Shaft'-style booge beat bonanza, Zoot Woman's faithful boss aeffort and the future funk of Themroc being of primary concern to the beats page. WOS completists will be wetting themselves, but with three slabs of viryl to choose from there's something for everyone.

THE ODD TOOT Love Bubble (Hydrogen Jukebox)

Simon Smith, the odd bloke in question, returns with two off-key beard-stroking moments par excellence. The skittles jazz breaks of 'Terry's Vdeo' weave in and out of a persistent 4/4 rhythm while taking on vococlers and a melodic analogue riff. The paranoid schizo beats of 'Love Bubble' run a close second.

Theme From Sticky Trumpets (Sunburn)

Breakbeats from the west coast of America, an area that's been pretty quiet of late. Gavin Hardkiss records a psychedelic cde to the monthly Sunburn partes he and his posse throw. Low on basslines, high on 303 action, and a useful addition to the box for those outdoor moments.

TIMO MAAS Der Schieber (48K)

Destined to be a big hit in its other guises, there's no reason why this shouldn't have the same impact in the breakbaat community. The 'Funkin' For Hope Mix In NY' follows the same structure as his previous 'Doom's Night Mix', but thankfully resists the urge to clone too directly. Housey breaks and a progressive Ick should see this class act stick around for a long time yet.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Kingsize Remixed Volume 2 (Kingsize)

Taken from the abum project of the same name, Surrey's finest show what good friends they all are by offering a helping hand on each other's records. Aah. Sr Drew's 'Let's Get Some Girls' is given the funk makeover by Meat Katie, while Meat Katie's avesome 'Can't Hear Ya' bends over to get the Chicken Lips re-rub. Not as strong as the originals, but the kids will love it all the same.

MAX TUNDRA Some Best Friend You

Turned Out To Be (Domino) Prodigiously talented multi-instrumentalist and former Warp artist Max Tundra spent a year eating nothing but houmous and pitta. If the resulting album were a kebab, however, it would contain not only the usual recovered meat products and slurry but also battery acid, custard, frozen peas and Trill. Inspired combinations abound, then, none of them as unpalatable as you first thought. How did Warp let him get away?

DO MAKE SAY THINK Goodbye Enemy Airship The Landlord Is Dead (Constellation)

Seven tracks of uncompromising instrumental guitar music from the label that brought you the baroque histrionics of Godspeed You Black Emperor! Like their closest UK counterparts Mogwai, Do Make Say Think rely heavily on quiet then LOUD and slow then FAST for impact. It works, but with only heavyhanded sax and trumpet for company, the formula soon begins to grate.

SAVATH & SAVALAS Folk Songs For Trains, Trees & Honey (Hefty)

Savath & Savalas is in fact just one person - Scott Herren - and 'Folk Songs. sounds like Tortoise would have sounded had there been just one of them rather than, ocoh, about 38. Touches of Latin, jazz and hip hop are infused with summer warmth and punctuated by electronic passages which deftly prevent its descent into post-rock-by-numbers banality. More to come soon on Warp and Schematic. ...

EINSTÜRZENDE NEUBAUTEN Silence Is Sexy (Mute)

Strange choice of title for a band who once attacked stages with road drills, but Neubauten now wield understatement with no less intensity. 'Silence Is Sexy' features tender songs about Berlin, the sounds of cigarettes being smoked and hydraulic pistons pumping air, and even a dainty tango. It's beautiful, and a salutory lesson for those who think musical innovation means turning the 'filter' knob up to 11.

The lovely Lisa finally launches her new label. The mean and moody 'La La' kicks like the proverbial mule, building superbly with lots of choice percussion loops and odd little samples before the slithering hoovers creep in. Fipped by a bright and bouncy remake from Aussie Nick Skitz.

RHYTHM MASTERS MEET DJ TRIPPLE A 4 The Hard Way (Dis-funktional)

If you like your house rough and ready, this slamming four-tracker of raw, filtered funksters will do the trick. Standout cuts are the nasty 'Overdose' and the wild 'I Like You', which sounds like The Sharp Boys after a hefty dose of ketamine.

SUGAR CAINE Queer Disco Sensation (SUB-lime)

If you can sit still to this, your legs must be broken. Marcia Farhany's DTPM anthem employs a booty-shaking bassline from heaven and beats that would put a smile on the face of Victor Meldrew. More top bassline action on the 'Kart Remix' from label boss Alan Thompson hitched up with Kinky Roland.

OBERON & HARDING VERSUS OS/2 & CHRIS LIBERATOR The Key (Chug 'N' Bump)

Given the artists involved, 'The Key' is a relatively tame but nonetheless addictive inection of hypno-house that locks you into a deep, relentless groove with the aid of some superb shimmering synths. An equally deep groove builds on Oberon & Harding's dark and moody 'Possession'.

ANTHONY ATCHERLEY Dig It (Under Siege)

Two solid tunes ideal for the mid-set heads-down mix. The simple and effective 'Dig It' is built around what sounds like half the bassline from Hardfloor's mix of 'Yeke Yeke' and suitably crisp percussion. Even more effective is the tough Euroflavoured but breakdown-free 'Surreal'.

BUG

So What (Serious)

Dispensing with most of the vocal from the phat and phunky original, this weaves choice beats, bells and twittering synths around a booming sub-bass and the subtlest of synth hooks. Euro fans will love the flipside's pumping 'Kriana Mix'.

TECMANIA REBEL Circus Beats (Untidy Trax)

The sort of essential hard house release that will never make the Top 40, and Amen

to that! 'Circus Beats' is an irresistible slab of dirly, sleazy house prodded by old Todd Terry samples. It'll be in your box for months, especially with the firing new UK mixes from Untidy Dubs and Bulletproof.

DAVE RANDALL & THE ALIEN THING

Power Kutz Vol 1 (Power Kutz) Two of the circuit's most trusted names

team up to launch the new Power Kutz stamp. The A-side mix is an understated, hypnotic groove, layering mesmerising synths over razor-sharp beats. For dark techno beats, head for the B-side. Intense doesn't begin to describe it.

The 'Max & Amino Remix' strips it back and toughens it up.

FERGIE & BK House Of Pain (Nukleuz)

There have been many comparisons between Tony De Vit and Fergie, but there will only ever be one TdV, like there's only one Fergie – and here's the record to prove it. The lish turntable trickster at last captures the spirit of his DJ sets on vinyl and takes NRG into the new millennium in the process. And with BK at the controls, you know it sounds as cool as fuck.

TALL PAUL Freebase (Duty Free)

The master of all things bouncy returns with a single that leaves you begging him not to leave it so long next time. The smile-inducing 'Original Mix' is already a proven anlhem, but don't overlook the equally large, and tough-as-nails, tranceinfused reworking from Jam & Spoon in their Storm guise. It's a killer on the loose.

LOCK 'N' LOAD Blow Ya Mind (Pepper)

Dutch anthem of the Klubbheads ilk – many of you have probably worn out your import copies already. Set to cross over into the mainstream now with a gloriously fucked-up new mix from Belfast boy wonder Paul Masterson in his Yomanda guise and a pumping punter-friendly version from DJ Ziad.

....

BRAINBASHERS Do It Now (Tidy Trax)

Underground bods Rachel Shock and Graham Eden brought to the masses by the House of Tidy. You should be familiar with their awesome '1999 Remix', joined now by a fierce remake from Houserockers and a fire-starting smash from Lock 'N' Load (who burnt down their studio making the mix – we kid you not).

DAZ SAUND & ANDY ALLDER The Feeling (Rude Boy)

One of the original Trade boys, Daz Saund, returns with D:Bop's Andy Alder in tow. Their 'Original Mix' is an infectious bounder which stands out from the Euro crowd, while the 'Funky Feeling' mix drops the vocal from Fargetta's 'Music Is Movin' over fresh beats. There's also a trancier mix from Duplex to raise the roof with.

BAZOOKA JOE Rock Da Party (Pig Pen)

No-nonsense adrenalin-charged S&M house to whip any crowd into a frenzy. Contagious rap snippets (sounding like Monie Love), battering ram kicks, 'Subway 26'-styled bass and killer beats that knock (and knock and knock) you into submission. Please sir, can I have some more?

....

ANTHONY ATCHERLEY One For The Burglar (Honey Pot)

Anthony goes for the jugular with a mesh of ratiling percussion, screeching Dutch stabs and nagging riffs. His 'Old School Mix' fuses Moroder-esque rhythms with disco sensibilities, while the 'DBSK Mix' is a seriously good attempt at blowing bassbins everywhere. And wait till you hear their 'Din Dah Dah' remix on Nebula.

ROBERT BURNS

Funk Rock (Third Degree Burns) Rob Burns launches Friction Burns' harder sister label with two masterpieces. The first bargs it to bits with Knuckleheadzstyle funk, while the second mix is a techno assault heavy on the Frank De Wulf influences. Expect lots of 'what the hell was that?' queries at the DJ booth for both.



So Who The Hell Are ... Pants & Corset?

Pants & Corset? Must be a drag act, right? Although you will find their records played in lots of clubs where drag queens have been known to make an appearance, Pants & Corset themselves are not. They are Paul King (better known, perhaps, as F1 and Trauma) and Chris B (who runs the rather good Solid State Record shop in Bournemouth), and they got together initially to record 'Who Killed Kenny?', a special track made for lam M to play at Trade's eighth birthday party.

So are they a novelty act? Far from it. 'Who Killed Kenny?' was an updated version of Commander Tom's Trade classic 'Noom 13', which proved so popular that the boys had to sneak out a few whites while keeping their identities secret.

Do they only make records for the Trade brigade? They followed 'Who Killed Kenny?' with 'Dammit Janet' (a dig at Trade DJ Steve Thomas, whose nickname is Janet) and 'Malice In Wonderland', a tribute to Trade owner Laurence Malice. Now they also make records for Manifesto and Ministry Of Sound.

Have they sold out then? Not on your nelly. Earlier this year, they released 500 copies of 'Sacrilege', a stunning remake of the Marmion classic 'Schoneberg'. The ensuing rush of cheque-waving major label reps led to a plethora of remix commissions for the big guns and 'Sacrilege' being signed to Incentive.

So what's next? Lots of hard work. Chris is busy with the shop and its label, Paul is starting a new label with Paul Janes from Tidy Trax and the pair are being asked to remix everything in sight. Oh, and there's a new Pants & Corset single on the way too.

Pants & Corset's 'Sacrilege' is released in May on Incentive. The Pants & Corset remix of Spoiled & Zigo's 'More & More' is out now on Manifesto

THE INSIDE TRACK ON HUNTING DOWN RARE VINYL

Warp Records

LAST year, the techno boffs at Warp celebrated their 10th anniversary in considerable style with a whole raft of double CDs and viny! box sets covering the music that influenced the Warp sound, as well as hard-to-find classics and tribute remixes of artists past and present. It was a fitting showcase for one of British dance music's most enduring and innovative labels and its impressive roster of artists.

Warp Records began life as an independent record shop set up by Steve Beckett and Rob Mitchell in Sheffield in 1987. In 1989, encouraged by the success of pioneering UK artists like 808 State, A Guy Called Gerald, Bang The Party and Baby Ford, who had in turn been emulating the exciting acid/techno music of Chicago and Detroit, Steve and Rob launched Warp Records, the label.

The first release (Wap 001) was originally meant to be 'The Theme' by Bradford's Unique 3, a dark and moody bass-heavy instrumental and one of the first 'bleep' classics. But Steve and Rob failed to secure Unique 3's signatures so the accolade went to the Forgemasters' 'Track With No Name' which was

released with the help of a government Enterprise Allowance grant and in association with Outer Rhythm, as were the first 10 or so releases. The 'bleep' techno theme continued with their second release, 'Dextrous' by Nightmares On Wax, at the end of 1989, which even breached the Top 40. Eighties electronic pioneer Richard Kirk from Cabaret Voltaire released the bleep

anthem 'Test One' with DJ Parrot (now of All Seeing I) as Sweet anthem' Test One with DJ Parrot (how Of Al Seeing) as Sweet Exorcist in early 1990 with the 'Test Four' remix the choice cut. The follow-up, DJ Mink's 'Hey Hey Can U Relate' was a frantic hip house track saved by an instrumental B-side. In the summer of 1990 there was no looking back for Warp as their fifth release, LFO's 'LFO', sold 120,000 copies and went Top 20, as did Tricky Disco's 'Tricky Disco' (Wap 7). More classics followed, like Nightmares On Wax's 'Aftermath' (Wap 6, 1990), Sweet Exorcist's 'Clonk' (Wap 9, 1990), Tuff Little Juit's Juin The Euture', Wap 12, 1991) and Coro Steel &

Unit's 'Join The Future' (Wap 12, 1991) and Coco Steel & Lovebomb's 'Feel It' (Wap 18, 1992), Most of the first 20 or so Warp 12-inch releases will cost between £8 and £20 each. Don't look for Wap (single) or

Warp (album) 13, though - they don't exist. (On the subject of unreleased catalogue numbers, Warp mirrored the antics of Eighties indie label Factory by allocating a Warp party and Warp artwork with Wap 30 and Wap 99 respectively.) Early compilations 'Pioneers of the Hypnotic Groove' (Warp 2, 1991) and 'Evolution of the Groove' (Warp 5, 1992) go for about £15 each. Meanwhile, the first Nightmares On Wax album, 'A Word of Science' (Warp 4, 1991 – vinyl version) complete with stickers and cigarette papers is quite scarce and valued at around £20.

In 1992 Warp took a slight turn in direction and coined the term electronic listening music' with the release of their 'Artificial

Intelligence' compilation (Warp 6), with tracks by artists like Intelligence compliation (Warp 9), with tracks by artists like Plaid, Autechre and Aphex Twin geared towards a post-rave 'comedown' audience. Warp releases by Aphex and Black Dog from this era have been covered on these pages but other collectable albums include Autechre's 'Incunabula' (Warp 17, 1993) and B12's 'Electro Soma' (Warp 9, 1993) with initial coloured vinyl pressings fetching around £20-£25.

Autechre have gone on to become prominent artists on Warp and are quite collectable. The 'Basscadet' EP (Wap 44, 1994) came as a set of three 10-inches in a box valued at around £30. The 'Splitmx' 12-inch (Wap 124, 1999) was limited to 500 copies only and will cost £15-£20. Autechre also released a 12-inch as their alter ego Gescom, 'Keynell',

also released a 12-inch as their alter ego Gescom, 'Keynell', (Wap 87, 1998) which is now valued at £10. Other tasty bits from the vast Warp back catalogue include the Sabres OI Paradise album 'Sabresonic' (Warp 16, 1993) with limited edition seven inch at £20, Drexciya's 'The Journey Home' 12-inch (Wap 57, 1995, £15), Speedy J's 'Ginger' on ginger vinyl (Warp 14, 1993, £18), FUSE's 'Train Tracs' on white vinyl (Wap 38, 1993, £10) and David Holmes' 'Johnny Favourite' 12-inch (Wap 42, 1994, £10). Warp continue to breach the boundaries of electronic dance music, from the mellowest of chilled vibes to the soundtracks to your worst nightmares, but for the time being here is a selection of collectable snapshots from the past.

Buried Treasure

VARIOUS ARTISTS - FREEZONE 2 Variations On A Chill Mixed by DJ Morpheus (SSR, 1995)



BEFORE Bristol brought an ice-cold chill to the musical map, Belgian DJ Morpheus was freezing the French airwayes from his home in Paris. Inspired by the lazy funk of D*Note, DJ Cam and Dorado Records, this disque jockey gave us a sneak peek into his blissful, blissedout world. The tracklisting was as eclectic as it was futuristic - and five years on it still reads like the most definitive after-hours collection you could own. 4 Hero, LTJ Bukem and a fledgling Kruder & Dorfmeister all showed early promise on this album. Bukem's 'Rainfall' was seven

minutes of languid, sweat-soaked jungle; 4 Hero's 'Escaping Categories' proved they had no desire to be pigeonholed and T Power Versus MK Ultra's 'Mutant Jazz' was a lithe, saxsoaked drum & bass anthem that regularly shook the Heavenly Social back room. Jungle was rising and Morpheus knew it.

The scope of his vision was startling. Inspired by his all-encompassing Lysergic Factory radio show, Morpheus joined abstract musical dots with verve and glee. Where else could you find The Ballistic Brothers and Josh Wink nuzzling

comfortably alongside the cinematic sweep of a flick-fixated Snooze? Morpheus was an early champion of Hull's Pork stable - and it showed. 'Lights On The Vibe' by Solid Doctor and the soul-stirring vibe of 'EVA' by Heights Of Abraham proved that chilling wasn't necessarily wafer thin.

The packaging offered an ostensibly icy brew: 50% trip hop, 30% ambient techno and 20% jungle - but this chill was as warm as a late-night log fire. And then some. words RALPH MOORE

THERE'S BEEN an inordinate amount

of confusion regarding the identity of the many-tentacled entity known to one and all as DJ Food. While the moniker was initially a pseudonym for Coldcut bods Jonathan More and Matt Black, it's now the alias for long-time Ninja Tune associates Strictly Kev and PC, known to their mums as Kevin and Patrick. Their forthcoming album, 'Kaleidoscope', is a monster mash-up of ambient soundscapes and jazz-nological funk - a British take on DJ Shadow-esque sample manipulation, if you like.

Surprisingly, then, the complex soundscapes are not produced in a five billion-channelled studio using the latest technology, but are an awesome indication of what can be achieved with nothing more than a computer, some decks, a hefty record collection and a lot of imagination. "I've got a Mac upgraded to 190 meg installed with a Korg 1212 soundcard, and an AV hard drive," explains an almost embarrassed Kev. "Then there's three Technics 1210s hooked up through a Mackie Micro Mixing Desk, which you can pick up for around £300, and, er, that's it!"

Unbelievably for an album composed entirely of samples, Strictly Kev has yet to purchase a sampler. "I tend to just play a sample straight from the record into the computer," he says. "The whole album is samples, it's just all cut up and manipulated inside the computer. None of it's scratched in or anything, I just get the sound in off the record player."

For such a complex album, you would have thought that the pair would have some stock tricks. some favourite effects to pull out of the bag when a track's going pear-shaped. You'd be wrong. "We don't really use tricks as such," shrugs Kev. "We use effects and delays, like the Magnito compressor on the Mac which is really good for the harder stuff, like drums. It's not really a trick, though. I would call a trick something like the Cher vocal vocoder thing, which we're not really into. The effects don't make or break a track, they merely add to it."

Come on, that swanky Micro mixing desk must have some cute little functions to spice up a track, mustn't it? "No, it's really under-used, actually," he chuckles. "I use it is as nothing more than a

patching thing, to route the DAT through and route the computer through. What we've basically got is a more hi-tech version of the guy with a tape machine and a sampler, cutting things up. The sound goes from the decks into the mixer, then through the desk into the soundcard. I always process the sounds on a program called Peaks, which is a nice editing program for topping and tailing things, to trim. Then it all gets chucked into Cubase to arrange it, but it's all in audio. There's no MIDI, and there's no sampler. Eventually, I'm going to get a sampler and trigger them through the keyboard. This way of doing things is pretty inexpensive, but it's not particularly versatile." Listening to the results, that's something that you may wish to take issue with. The most important

piece of technology on an album like this is that low-tech commodity, the record collection, which, in both cases, clearly borders on the mind-bendingly eclectic. Speaking of low-tech, the other portion of Food is perhaps even more basically equipped than his partner. Admittedly he does actually have a sampler, but instead of a Mac there proudly sits a decade-old Atari 1040 ST computer.

"I use the Atari computer and this really old program called Creator," he demonstrates. "It's all I've ever used - I've been using this set-up for about 10 years. You can create very minute and very detailed sounds on here, and the time-stretching is very exact, so the rhythms are



really tight. I could get into using a hard disk if I really needed to, but I find you don't get the same level of control. It's strange - because the program's less detailed, it gives you more scope to be detailed yourself, but you can also be more sweeping, make big strokes. With really detailed programs you can tend to get a bit bogged down."

The same applies to samplers. Patrick's contributions to 'Kaleidoscope' (the album is equally split between the two) were recorded using a relatively old Akai S3000 XL, which you can pick up for about £500.

Again, Patrick doesn't see the need to update for the sake of it. "I actually bought one of the later models, the S5000, a little while ago," he grins, "but it never really left the box. I thought buying a new bit of gear would give me a good kick up the arse, but I found that I didn't really need it. It's got loads of filters, 120meg and about 60 outputs, but it's a bit of a scam because you have to pay for more memory every time you want to use extra filters or outputs.'

As Kevin explains, "the more you get to know



something, the more you're going to be able to get out of it. If you've got all the latest software, you're constantly trying to keep on top of the system, but you're never making that much progress because you don't have the time to delve into whatever you've got. If you really learn how to use a program, you can get it to do things it's not really supposed to do. It's not quite as intuitive as working on outboard equipment, but for that you need thousands of pounds of gear and a proper studio, which is exactly what we haven't got."

Indeed, the pair are living proof that the electronic revolution can (and already has, in many ways) successfully eliminate the need for the major label sponsored studio bigwigs.

Predictably, the pair's live antics are supported by a similarly lo-fi approach to their turntables.

"There's various things you can do to get different sounds," Kevin considers. "If you drill a hole just off centre, it makes the sound go 'wee-ooh!'. Then, we've got this highly technical gadget to make the records play backwards, which is basically a camera film container with a piece of wood stuck to the top. You stick the needle upside-down, put the record on top of the gizmo and it's reversed. You can get turntables now with a reverse switch, but most of the time if you go and play in a club, you're gonna be getting a pair of Technics."

Common to both Patrick's and Key's DJ sets is the use of a guitar effects pedal for a warmer sounding distortion effect. "Mine's made by Line 6, the D4, which should set you back about £200," says Kev. "It's got all sorts of really old delays and echoes on it that are great when you feed records through it."

Happily, in honour of the forthcoming DJ Food tour, Kevin has allowed himself one small indulgence - he's just bought a new mixer! "This is my dream mixer, basically," he declares, misty-eyed. "It's a Rane TT54, it cost me about £750, and it's what I've always wanted. It's got all the hamster switches on the crossfade which I've never had. It's got the crossfade where you can have it cutting at full volume all the way along. instead of fading it across like a normal crossfader which is great for scratching. It's got supposedly 'clickless' switches, again for scratching, which you can rotate 45 degrees to suit your style. It's even got a master switch so you can do a soundcheck before you're plugged into the mains; you can hear what'll be coming out on the mains through the headphones.'

Boys will have their toys, eh?

3D Future Beat

Roland MC307 (price £649 inc)

Four years ago, it was Roland who poured petrol over the beginners' music production bonfire with their MC303 workstation' and it's Roland who have taken the next simple but very important step. Their latest offering in the genre, the MC307, slants the whole thing heavily towards the DJ by adding a pitch slider and a set of nudge buttons, much like those found on a DJ CD player or turntable. Putting a DJ set together is difficult enough as it is, so anything that makes the process simpler and more intuitive is always a good move. The MC307 is based on the MC505 in many ways with a similar sound engine, although they've doubled the wave memory to 800 sounds. Pursuing the DJ-friendly theme, Roland have also simplified the operating system so that you can get at what you need with less button pushing. They've rounded the DJ-friendliness drive off with the inclusion of the 'effects grabber', a sprung switch that punches effects in/out and the 'isolator' (kill unit) from their DJ2000 DJ mixer. EMU XL1 (price £569 inc)

Having staked a tasty claim for a huge chunk of the high class, workhorse sound module market with the Proteus 2000, EMU are to release a successor to the Orbit and Audity modules. The XL1 (Xtreme Lead 1) offers up 32MB of cutting edge synth sounds aimed squarely at the trance sound that's filling floors at the moment. As usual with EMU you get a well-chosen range of sounds and tweakability looks cool thanks to their superb filters, 12 assignable controller knobs and a flexible virtual patching system. The XL1 retains the Orbit's ability to download and play back MIDI sequences from any other sequencer but is now able to cope with up to 16 at once in a new 'Super Beats' mode that gives real time dynamic control over sequences. You can't take a computer out live but downloading your sequences into a solid little box like the XL1 is a solid foundation for a live set-up. Contact: 01753-630-808 www.emu.com

you're on the lookout for a new portable MiniDisc player, by the looks of things you could do a lot worse than examine the new SJ-MJ75 from Panasonic. It's not exactly a budget machine at this price but it's a slinky little beast and it makes up for the price with a couple of handy features. The most important of which, particularly for the large numbers of aspiring DJ/producers out there who like to use their MD machines to play out their own productions in their DJ sets, is the presence of 20 seconds of anti-shock memory. The backlight display on the remote looks handy too and the SJ-MJ75 uses their swanky rechargable Ni-Cd battery which provides 44 hours play time and a battery status indicator in the display. Korg MS2000/MS2000R

In the sea of vintage synthesisers out there, the MS10, MS20 and Monopoly by Korg are among the most soughtafter thanks to their characteristically chunky and twisted sound. Korg have endeavoured to use their stupendous virtual modelling system to recreate these monsters with the MS2000. It shapes up to be a bit like having four virtual MS20s in one box with the added devastating ability to link all eight oscillators together to form one huge instrument. Both the rack and keyboard versions also obviously follow the traditional analogue way of instant editability. What could be simpler or more intuitive than reaching over and turning a knob? As you would expect it's packed with a huge selection of analogue-style synthesis tools and it keeps to the MS tradition of allowing you to patch in sound from a stereo external input and use it in place of an oscillator. 3D Future Beat (£19.99 inc)

This is another of those PC software music toys that offers to get you making music in seconds. Not a new concept, but 3D Future Beat sports a couple of cool editing tools which increase the creative potential nicely. The thing is based around a sci-fi style graphic interface that allows you collect a selection of samples from a 20 musical 'style'-based library of 1000+ ready made loops and then arrange them into a song, either 'on the fly' or via a track editing window. It does all the usual autotimestretching stuff, doesn't have an effects section but it does have a 'wave editor' which allows you to apply effects off line and a 3D positioning feature for use with the new generation of 3D games-oriented sound cards (it requires a Direct Sound equipped card so won't work with high end cards like Gadget Labs or CardDeluxe or DSP Factory). The neat bits are a 'drum editor' and solo composer' that allow you to load .WAVs into grid based sequencers that are capable of reproducing your samples at different pitches up to a five octave range.
