

#### A STORM BREWING



A star in the true sense of the word, Carl is as powerful as he is polite — which is quite incredible given his gruelling DJ schedule. Gigging in Australia, America, Amsterdam and London on an almost weekly basis, he also chased the sun round the world to become the only DJ to conquer two Millennium Eves.

#### 1. D'NOTE

Garden Of Earthly Delights (Ballistic Bario Boom)

"This is a wonderful piece of music. The harmonies and vocals are spine-tingling and the structure of the track is piano-driven, but with drum & bass overtones. If I play at Full Circle or a party in the UK, this is always in my box. I love the fact that The Ballistic Brothers have always stayed true to their sound. Not a lot of people do that."

#### 2. PAPERCLIP PEOPLE

Climax

"This is the perfect template for real house music. Every time I hear the whistle in this, I shiver. Once you hear it, you never forget that hook. 'Climax' came out in 1996 but I still drop this today and people think it's a brand new record, I've played this on the Space terrace and seen the crowd cry when it hits them."

#### 3. ETIENNE DE CRÉCY

Prix Choc

"One of the biggest underground records ever, and nobody knows it! 'Sensimilla, marijuana' is the coolest thing to say. It's certainly a hook line you won't forget! Better still, the music behind it sounds like a porno record, really dirty and sexy. The perfect lounge tune."

#### 4. DAVID ALVARADO

Klugh

"Another hugely underrated record. This tune has a real west coast flavour. It starts off with some cool congas and then kicks into really spaced-out vocals. It's like a vortex, it sucks you in! When I first heard this, it blew me away. It was my last record at the Twilo party in Miami. It got the best response of the night."

#### 5 SPILLER

Batucada

"This one leapt up and bit me on the arse! I was really into this Latin sound back in the day, but people prefer to jump up and down these days. 'Batucada' is such a powerful house record. I play it in techno sets and people scream because it's such a breath of fresh air. I dare anyone not to dance to this!"

#### 6 808 STATE

Cubik (Victor Calderone Mix)

"I remember playing at a party called Book Of Love – the promoter got married in front of 15, 000 ravers! It was me, Fabio, Grooverider, Kenny Ken, The Prodigy and 808 State. The guy said his wedding vows and then 808 State came on, played 'Cubik' and blew the house away. This Victor Calderone mix is about three years old and takes the track into a real New York vibe."

#### 7 GREEN VELVET

The Stalker

"I love this track. It's completely fucked up, one of those records that takes you into the mind of the person that made it. A couple of years ago we were due to play a gig together in Dublin. At the last minute, his sequencer broke down, so we did the show at the same time. I played the tracks and he rapped over the top, totally off the cuff."

#### 8 DESTINATION

Definition Of Love (G Flame & Mr G Remix)

"I've always been into bass and I want to feel the funk.

Too many people are making records with middle ground.

Not this one. I also like the fact that this track was
recorded in good old Surrey, rather than Detroit! People
like Seb Fontaine and Tall Paul are playing tunes like this
now, which can only be a good thing."

#### 9 UNDERWORLD

Born Slippy (Darren Price Mix)

"As we all know, 'Born Slippy' came out six months before Mr Tong and 'Trainspotting' gave it that push. I still play it now because it always brings the crowd together. The Darren Price mix is more subtle and gives the song a more soulful twist."

#### 10 ELECTROLINERS

Loose Caboose (Ghetto Train Remix)

"Loose Caboose' crossed over genres, so it was dropped by everyone from Judge Jules and Jon Carter to Pete Tong and Norman Cook. It's got a great, west coast, San Francisco sound that mixes dark breaks with the raw elements of house. This mix gives it a real acid house warehouse sound. A classic."

#### 11 GOLDENGIRLS


Kinetic 99 (Rhythm Masters Remix)

"A tune that keeps coming back! The strings always get me on this record. Sonically, it's really strong. This brings back memories of Temptation at Lakota in Bristol. I remember the moment the DJ dropped it—the bar, the staff, security and several hundred punters reached for the sky. 'Kinetic' has a real Orbital vibe."

#### 12 THOMAS SCHUMACHER

WhenIRock


"The crowd always go crazy when I play this. It's dark, pumping and funky. Basically, you cannot ignore it. It also made other DJs play a lot tougher – people like Sasha were influenced by how hard you could go. I've ended with this record because it's a reminder that the story's far from over. It still carries on."



#### FIVE THINGS YOU NEVER KNEW ABOUT COXY

- Carl is allergic to strawberries, plasters and certain oils in leather. "If they come close, my skin flares up in a rash," he shudders.

A benefit gig with a difference, the all-star line-up – including Fatboy Slim, Paul Oakenfold, Gilles Peterson and Tall Paul – were in attendance to help Ken Livingstone raise the money he needed to stand as an independent mayoral candidate for London.

The whole thing was a tad disconcerting. Junior Cartier's sledgehammer ragga-house was sending a packed Astoria crazy-nothing unusual there – but replacing the usual trippy fractals was the slogan "KEN 4 LONDON" on a perpetual loop. Next to Carter's head were posters of the man himself, grinning insanely to the loved-up Londoners. Hey, maybe one day all political fund-raisers will be this way.

Yet there was still an inexplicably apolitical vibe to the whole night – the security seemed hell-bent on making sure that no one could talk to any of the guests, and Ken's press officer wandered past Muzik, fretting "you're not talking about politics, are you?"

When Norman Cook finally appeared, accompanied by the great man himself, the already strange evening took a turn for the surreal. NORMAN COOK "Ken's a terrible DJ—I was trying to teach him how to cue up a record and he couldn't do it! He's never going to be a DJ and I'm never going to be a politician, so we meet in the middle. He doesn't want to see E legalised and I don't give a toss about housing problems in Lambeth. Ken is a forthright man, but he wouldn't wholeheartedly embrace our lifestyle, he's not a freedom to party kind of guy. He's a politician and I'm a stupid DJ."

We're not talking Camberwick Green here, we're talking London. He's got to know his onions, and he does. I think something like this almost proves he's got a grasp on youth culture."



JON CARTER "Overall, music is not made for politics. Norris is standing for the most disgusting liars in the political world and Dobson is just a puppet. Ken is the only man who's going to get any young kids to vote – and he's a top DJ as well!"

## **EMERSON EXITS** INDERWORL

#### DARREN EMERSON TALKS TO MUZIK ABOUT HIS DECISION TO LEAVE THE DANCE SUPERGROUP

#### INTERNATIONALLY RENOWNED DJ

Darren Emerson has left the seminal dance act Underworld to concentrate on a solo DJ career. Speaking to Muzik just hours after the move had been made official, he explained, "Looking back over the last 10 years, it's been brilliant. It's been fantastic, and we've always had a good time, but when I got back from touring last year, it had just got to the stage where I'd had enough."

Emerson - whose forthcoming 'Uruguay' mix CD for Global Underground is Muzik's Compilation of the Month - was making a name for himself as a DJ in the burgeoning London scene before being approached by Rick Smith and Karl Hyde to join Underworld in the late stages of 1990. They rapidly established a reputation as one of the finest live acts in dance music, and their albums 'Dubnobasswithmyheadman', 'Second Toughest In The Infants' and 'Beaucoup Fish' were all huge critical and commercial successes. Their signature track 'Born Slippy', from the film Trainspotting, reached Number Two in the charts in 1996 and was the biggest club anthem of the year.

Meanwhile, Darren's DJ career was inevitably sidelined by the relentless touring schedule - though he has still somehow managed to find the time to develop his own managed to find the time to develop his or unique and distinctive style, something th his forthcoming Global Underground CD unique and distinctive style, something that demonstrates in no uncertain terms. "I'm g demonstrates in 110 uncertaints.

f not the sort of person who puts compilations out every week, but the Global Underground lads have always been on my case to do one," he says. "It seemed like the right time to do it."

Anyone hoping for stories of heated arguments or dark recriminations will be disappointed. "I'm not bitter at all," claims Emerson. "I was starting to feel tied down, and just getting a bit bored. Sometimes, you come to a crossroads in life, and you have to decide which way you want to go." And although many may see the amount of favourable attention that his Global Underground mix has garnered as a reason, Muzik can reveal that Emerson, in fact, effectively left the band as long ago as Christmas. "I haven't been able to tell anyone about it because everything was being finalised with the lawyers," he admits. "Word got out - I had everyone in Miami asking me about it, I've been doing interviews for Global Underground and everyone's been asking me about it, so it's time to come clean."

For the restless Emerson, the pressures of the album/promotion/touring treadmill simply became too much; "I'm just gonna chill out and have a good time," he grins. "I've been working in the studio with a few studio mates - I was in there with Sasha yesterday hammering some stuff out. There's all these people who've always been saying 'we should make a track' - now I can!'

The other crucial factor, of course, was the

birth of daughter Robyn at the beginning of September. "It's definitely changed my life," he says. "I'd got to a point with Underworld where it wasn't exciting me, so I didn't want to be travelling around America on tour with a newborn kid at home."


"I'm still gonna be DJing two or three times a week and travelling around a lot," he adds. "I'll be going out to Ibiza a few times."

So what now for Underworld? Well, they've already confirmed a series of festival dates for the summer to accompany the forthcoming live album. "I've heard they're going to be doing it as just the two of them. But there's all these pictures of me playing at the festival - I've even had promoters phoning me up asking me to DJ after the gigs! That's why this announcement had to be made; I do wish them all the best of luck." Darren, meanwhile, is simply taking it easy

- "getting back to my roots," as he puts it, which means a bit of remixing (he's doing Slam's 'Positive Education' at the moment), developing his Underwater label, and doing what he enjoys the most - DJing. So, what's going to be his most enduring memory of the last 10 years?

"Playing to all those thousands of people," he says without hesitation. "The touring was tiring, but getting on stage was amazing. When I look back at some of the gigs we've done - Glastonbury, all these mad festivals all around the world - and think about all these people jumping up and down, it was great."

#### UNDERWORLD HIGHS AND LOWS

GATECRASHER are just three of the clubs who have confirmed they will be taking part in what looks set to become the biggest event in UK clubbing history. As reported in last month's Muzik, the Radio 1 Love Parade takes place in Leeds on July 8th and aims to bring a slice of the hugely successful Berlin Love Parade to Britain. After some initial confusion, Radio 1 has confirmed that the festival will be absolutely free and non-profit making.

Radio 1's Commissioning Editor For Live Music, Matt Priest, talking exclusively to Muzik, explained, "it's a very exciting thing for Radio 1 to be able to bring all those national club brands together in one city. I

think it's a testament to the spirit of clubbing in this country that they're all going to be in the same place on the same day.'

Commencing outside Leeds Town Hall at Som, the Parade will be made up of scores of floats, customised by the clubs involved. "What we hope to see is DJs jumping off floats and running around and playing other floats," reveals an excited Matt. "That's the whole spirit of the event." As well as the evermoving display of floats, which will circle the centre of Leeds through till 12 midnight, there will also be a Radio 1 Sound Stage hosting sets from DJs such as Darren Emerson, Seb Fontaine, Pete Tong, Judge Jules, Dave Pearce and The Dreem Team, as well as a proposed live feed from the Berlin event taking place on the same day. There are also simultaneous events occurring in Buenos Aires and South Africa.

The fact that this event has been allowed to happen represents a sea change in attitudes from the authorities, who only six years ago legislated against danse music with the infamous 'repetitive beats' clause of the Criminal Justice Act.

As Priest enthuses, "I think because everyone's heard so much about the Berlin Love Parade, and what a great party that is, that's been the catalystalong with Radio 1 – that's persuaded people to get involved. They recognise that this is going to be a great day." (JH)

THE FIRST time I went to the Miami Winter Music Conference was four years ago. It's incredible how much it's changed. Now, you've got people like Kiss doing live broadcasts from it and the entire British dance music industry heading there for the week. Back then, we were well in the minority. I remember doing a Definitive party in the Salvation club along with people like Lenny D, and it was fucking empty! The club held nearly 3,000 people and we were barely touching 300. The Americans were far more into their booty sound, the west coast breakbeat thing and good vocal house music.

Now? Forget that! The number of Brits over there has gone mad and there's loads of British DJs doing parties every night of the week. The difference is that now the Americans are looking to Britain for their

influences, to the extent that producers who used to make really New York house, are aiming more for the hands-in-the-air market, which we've taken to America.

I actually did two parties: one was for my American agency, AM Only, then the next night, we did an In-Tec label party at the new and improved Crobar. This time round, we had Sasha, Digweed and Jim Masters, with Christian Smith, DJ Dan and Trevor Rockliffe in the back room. It was awesome, though the doormen were their usual bastard selves - trying to charge VIPs \$80 to get in then putting the money straight into their back pockets. The only downside of Miami is its legendary wanker doormen. Be warned!

My pinnacle moment was when I dropped what I consider to be the hottest tune of the Conference, Josh Wink's 'How's Your

Evening So Far'. 2,500 people were mesmerised by this track. Honestly, it beats even the first time Stardust got played. I'm really chuffed for Josh, because he's had quite a hard time off the British press in the last few years. This should sort things out.

The only sad thing for me was missing Tenaglia's party, not just because it's a great party, but also because he'd actually made a tune especially for me, 'Where's Carl Cox? It's 5am'. Apparently, he even played it four or five times, turned the lights off, and flicked his torch around the room pretending to look forme. And I was at home in my kip! That, readers, is what Miami is all about.

I'VE BEEN on the Essential tours to promote Pete Tong's new CDs. People like myself, Lottie and Darren Emerson have been co-hosting them. I did the Cardiff date and the one at Liverpool's John Moore University. The decks were a nightmare, padded up on this giant foam sponge but bouncing around all over the place. The only thing to do was stop the music, rip these cushions out from under the decks and toss them into the crowd! To cap it all, it was my birthday and Paul Jackson gatecrashed the mic while I was DJing, switched the music off and got the whole crowd to sing 'Happy Birthday' - just a little embarrassing!

It's been a month of mad travels. Firstly, I finally got to go to Miami. In the last couple of months, I've taken on an A&R job for a new label. Credence, which is a cool house offshoot from EMI, so I was there in a

business mode as well as a party one. The best thing was all these little labels whose tunes I've been buying for years coming up to me, making a fuss and giving me tons of tunes. Made my week.

I didn't see many of the big name DJs at all and I didn't even seem to hear all those huge tunes that everyone talks about. Couldn't get near the Tenaglia party, the Subliminal party was okay, but the best thing that happened was ending up at a totally random party (along with BT and Graham Gold!) at someone's seafront house which absolutely rocked.

I also did a mini-tour of China, my first one for Cream. Guangzhou is the third biggest city in China but it's still very poor. Parts of it looked like a Vietnam movie. Surprisingly, though, the club itself was amazing, like something out of The Fifth Element. The

waitresses had futuristic outfits with plasma TVs on the back of them, lasers were flying everywhere and a good sound system too. Absolutely no drugs whatsoever, people just got pissed up. The food was rank. One night we had steamed chicken and it was literally just a chicken plucked and steamed, head still on and everything. Then a gig in Shanghai, which was far more like New York or Paris. It's a great place for new technology, so I got myself a tiny digital camera to finally make my travel diary.





#### JET-SETTING DJ PLANS IBIZA XTRAVAGANZA

THERE are two Alex Golds struggling in front of me in Xtravaganza's south London office.

One of them is a young, naughty, smooth-cheeked fellow who just wants to scramble behind his decks. take a jet to Hong Kong, God, maybe even back to his summer of love haunt Ibiza (again!).

This Alex tells me, "I'm determined not to let the business pull me away from the clubs. I often wonder to myself when I'm struggling to get through my promos, 'Why on earth am I doing this when I've got far bigger fish to fry?' And the simple fact is that DJing is freedom, independence, a life outside the office. For me it's like Alfred Hitchcock - I've got to be in the picture somewhere as well."

The other Alex Gold is similar but his rosy cheeks have a businessman's polished, well-groomed gleam, his mind caught between the thrall of hard-earned money and the everlasting desire to remain credible. "That's actually a Chicane gold disc from Belgium on the wall behind me," the second Alex Gold explains.

Alex has horizons beyond Anderlecht and Ghent. though: "A week ago I went to the US to see Donny Hyman, head of Columbia. They've decided to take on Chicane now and Sony US expects a Top Five single which would be phenomenal. In strategic terms my dream is for Xtravaganza to become to American kids what Def Jam was to us - a new street vibe. We're trying to develop dance acts with integrity.'

Riding high on the massive success of Chicane's Bryan Adams-enhanced James Homer trance, six hits in a row from Agnelli & Nelson, Tomski, Airscape and the rest, Xtravaganza are just gearing up for their weekly Ibiza residency at Privilege. Three hours a night every Friday for Alex, flights already booked. He'll soon be back where he began, where all the Alex Golds become forever Alex '87, the soul boy discovering the joys of Balearic beats in the sun. (THG)

From the musclebound beaches of Ocean Drive to the poolside spills at The Delano, the Conference is always brimming with the brightest stars on the scene. This year was no exception: Norman Cook, James Barton, Dave Beer, Basement Jaxx and Terry Francis were among the casualties on this year's 24-hour party circuit.

As ever, Tenaglia was the undisputed King of Miami. Jon Carter rocked hard at Dave Beer's post-Tenaglia melting pot and Sasha played at more parties than the rest of the Brit contingent put together. Grooverider swanned around in sandals, Goldie ran around in tight white shorts and Seb Fontaine sported the brightest blue shirt this side of Amnesia. Winter blues? Not in this lifetime.

And the music? Spiller's 'Mighty Miami' looks set to be bigger than The Bucketheads for Positiva and 'We'll Be In Trouble' may do for Barry White what duets have done for Tom Jones. These records look set to shift some serious units in the months to come. A year of shimmering, summery pop is upon us.

"MY MIND IS VAGUE, I can't keep it still for very long." says Agzi, aka The Deckwrecka, as we start our chat. He's not kidding. It's why his Ronin Records album 'V For Vengeance' is the finest instrumental hip hop debut the UK has given us yet: 28 tracks of brutal and blissful beats, mind-bending loop collages and enough punk-funk attitude to make big beat sound like the sterile backwater it always was.

Londoner Agzi grew up through the capital's first wave of hip hop. The seeds for his future DJ prowess were sown in 1986, although a lack of physical co-ordination helped. "I couldn't breakdance," he grins. "It hurt. So I tried graffing, but it was too cold. I guess DJing was always gonna be the perfect thing for a lazy sod like me."

After collaborations with British rappers that took him all over the world, Agzi decided to strike out alone, based on responses to his solo DU material.

"I used to make tapes for friends, always called 'Vengeance', of beats mixed up with comedy, or just assorted mad shit. That's really what the Ronin EPs grew out of, and that's why the album's called 'V For Vengeance'. I'd love to say the album was a painstaking thing I've been waiting all my life to do," he confesses, "but really it's a culmination of the EPs that you should hear in one long flow."

As for the future: "I'm gonna work with more rappers, vocalists, change everything again. Unless I change my mind tomorrow. Your guess is as good as mine!"

With the mercurial Agzi at the wheel, it's gonna be a blast just trying to keep up. Let's get Wrecked. (NK)



# GODSKITCHEN DIVINE

HARD, whip-crack beats. Pounding, none-more-black basslines. Deep, hypnotic melodies. Is the future going to be as shocking as the Future Shock name and sound suggest? "Don't doubt it," smiles Phil Dockerty, one half of Birmingham duo Futureshock and former DMC mixing championship runner-up. "The future will astound you. I have total faith in that!"

Faith has brought them a long way. Before their studio career exploded, Phil and partner Andy Tepper ran Urban Hero, the top-notch house label so beloved of Terry Farley and Deep Dish. When the imprint closed down, music was still in their blood, so they continued to follow their vision as Future Shock. In the last 12 months, they've gained props for work on records by everyone from Roger Sanchez to The Chemical Brothers. But they don't want to be pigeonholed as remixers to the gentry. "We're slowing down on those now," admits Andy. "It's time we concentrated on our own material!"

This summer they launch the Fuju label, a joint house venture with the Junior Boys' Own crew. "We want to work with vocalists who have an edge," says Phil, confessing to a fondness for Björk. A release from Peace Division's Clive Hey is also planned.

"People call us progressive, but that's too narrow a field," reckons Phil. "We're influenced by Danny Tenaglia and the whole Tribal sound. You're only as good as the next break you find."

So what's the most shocking thing you've encountered so far? "Well," muses Phil, "we've had some pretty traumatic computer crashes!" Not exactly Robocop material, then. Maybe the future's not so frightening after all. (RM)

HOW DID YOU FIRST GET INTO PROMOTING? "When I used to go on tour with bands we used to do the after parties, and it just stemmed from there really. By 1988 I got tired of being on the road and started throwing illegal parties at The Haçienda. At the end of 1991 the Criminal Justice Bill was enforced. That's when we went legit."

WHERE AND WHEN WAS THE FIRST BASICS? "We started out with one floor at the Music Factory in Leeds, putting on a party for all our mates really. Before we knew it, we had the whole club! We stayed there for four years and then moved to the Pleasure Rooms. After about three years there we moved to the Mint."

WHAT HAVE BEEN THE HIGHS OF YOUR LIFE AS A PROMOTER? \*There's been loads really. I think when we were the first club to be crowned Best Club at the DMC Awards at the Albert Hall – we were so swept away by that!"

AND THE LOWS? "The car accident and Ali [Cooke]. We'd set Basics up together and when it happened it really put things into perspective."

WHO'S YOUR FAVOURITE DJ AND WHY? "I've got a lot of respect for most DJs but particularly the old ones like Derrick Carter, Tengalia, Vasquez and Knuckles."

WOULD YOU EVER BOOK JUDGE JULES? "Yeah, but only if he went under a pseudonym to keep the kids away!"

WHAT'S THE LONGEST CANING SESSION YOU'VE EVER HAD? "Ibiza, every year. I think four days on the trot was the average. Seriously!"

YOU CAN USE ANY CLUB IN THE WORLD – WHICH ONE WOULD IT BE? "Pacha in Ibiza, the Sound Factory or Peter Pan in Rimini."

AND WHAT WOULD BE A PERFECT NIGHT? "Larry Levan levitating over 10 decks on a beach in Mustique, Ibiza or Ocean Drive with punters going completely mad."

WHY DID YOU CHUCK THAT BEER CAN AT THE CRASHER KID AT THE MUZIK AWARDS? "Oh God, that was terrible. I didn't realise what I'd done until I saw the beer can in mid air and then had the awful sensation that I'd just chucked it at them. . . I sent the girl some flowers and apologised. It wasn't a statement against them or anything, just drunken bad behaviour!"

FINALLY, TELL US SOMETHING ABOUT YOU THAT NOT A LOT OF PEOPLE KNOW. "I have a birthmark on my burn. And I once was a boy scout."





"AT the beginning it was just an experiment," says an affable Stefan Betke, absently tapping the mic on the table to ensure Muzik's interview tape is imbued with the raw static crackles and crisp drum-free rhythms which characterise his Pole recordings. "A stupid one, I think."

Stupid? Let's see: last time someone twisted a lowtech studio gadget into shapes which seemed unnatural but somehow sounded perfect, they made the unforgivable blunder of inventing acid house. Oh well, accidents will happen. . .

Stefan, though, makes what he (reluctantly) describes as "urban dub". Rejecting the 303 and its thumping as companions in favour of the more esoteric Waldorf 4-Pole Filter (no, we'd never heard of it either) he's ge brought King Tubby's Seventies dub blueprint into the 21st century with echoes of ambient, industrial and

the electronica scenes of Cologne, Berlin and his native Dusseldorf, swaddling the whole package in a colossal bass coccoon and bombarding it with electronic pops and glitches.


'Pole 3' is the latest instalment. "On the first album the crackles were much louder than anything else. The second one was a statement that said 'I know I'm dub influenced and now I make dub'. On the new one the sound moves like a snake trying to find its way through the record. It's much more complex," Stefan explains, "If you're no longer interested in making functional dance music, you have to go deeper into the music and that means looking into the details."

As a former cutting engineer at Basic Channel's Dubplates & Mastering studio, Stefan is no stranger to precision listening. But his warm, insistent dub grooves ensure Pole is music for the body as well as the mind, "I've seen people sitting on the floor in a club listening to my music; I've seen people dancing to it in art spaces and vice versa. Anything can happen."

Turning his highly trained ear to his label ~Scape, Stefan has also compiled 'Staedticism', an album offering radical new interpretations of urban dub from like-minded producer friends such as Bernd Friedmann, Kit Clayton, To Rococo Rot and Vladislav Delay.

"There's one thing I don't want to be and that's unique," he says emphatically. "And I don't want to be boring." An aspiration that on current form really does seem, well, stupid. (TM)



It was a toss up between this and 'Everybody Loves The Sunshine'. I was lucky enough to have Roy Ayers as a guest on my Radio London shows and then ended up working on his music when I became an A&R man for Urban Records.

#### 16) CROWN HEIGHTS AFFAIR Galaxy Of Love (Mercury)

Another one of those disco. tunes that I used to play on my pirate radio station. This also reminds me of one of my fellow pirate DJs, Eugene, who went on to set up Kiss FM in Manchester and Leeds.

#### 20) SOUNDS OF BLACKNESS Optimistic (AM:PM)

Beautiful vocal performances, and a glorious Jam & Lewis production. They came to see us at Kiss FM and staged an acapella performance in Holloway Road - much to the delight of passing motorists. It's a sight I won't ever forget!

#### 2) DELA SOUL Plug Tuning (Tommy Boy)

The very first release from De La Soul. I'm not sure if it ever got released here. I was after a copy for ages and Tommy Boy Records main man Tom Silverman sorted me out with a test pressing on a trip to New York

#### 7) FRANKIE KNUCKLES Tears (ffrr)

This is one of my favourite records of all time. I first met Frankie on his first trip to Europe, and went to see him play many, many times at the Sound Factory Bar in New York where I've had some of my best nights as a clubber.

George Clinton was the man! I was lucky enough to meet George during my time at Radio London. He did me a personalised 'Loopzilla' cover, which was sadly stolen by a particularly discerning thief!

Run DMC were massive, but they were a real pain to deal with! I was backstage at The Odeon where Russell Simmons was almost on bended knee. begging them to do the show, and they were just being awkward. However, they made such brilliant music that I can almost forgive them.

"The compilation itself came about because I work with the guys from the Respect party organisation," continues Dimitri, with studied chin-stroking technique. "They pitched the idea to Virgin France, who saw the whole thing made perfect sense. Playboy and Respect share a vision of an international hedonistic vibe married to a laid back, elegant way of doing things. Of course I share that vision, too. I love what Hugh Hefner was putting to the world in the Fifties. I love the image."

Image. Another of those French fixations. Ever wondered why you've never seen a French white label? Well that's because no fucker would buy it. Our Gallic cousins need design, pictures, a visual code before they would dare spin a disc. Johnny Halliday with a Pierre et Gilles label sticker would sell more than a priceless promoonly Daft Punk album, no question. Pourquoi?

"In France, musical culture is not as important as in your country," smiles Dimitri while removing an over-sized umbrella from his pina colada. "The UK has always been musical. You had The Beatles, The Stones, the summer of love. In France, music has always been about artists and singers. Chez nous it's more of a visual thing. In order to make music more acceptable, our culture packages it into a style thing. We can sell music in a nice box with a ribbon on it, but if it's just music for the sake of it, it won't work. For the French, it's the cover that makes them want to listen to what's inside. It's a case of the cover making you read the book, though you can't neccessarily judge one by the other."

But enough of cultural comparisons and back to Playboy. And with stunning Playmates Kalin Olsen (Miss August 1997), Jennifer Rovero (Miss July 1999) and Vanessa Gleason (Miss September 1998) cooing in the background, that's a pretty hot option. So scaldingly good in fact that a large crowd has suddenly gathered round our poolside interview spot. Sex-starved septuagenarian Americans are snapping the ladies with disposable cameras. Somehow that doesn't seem right.

"We're used to it," squeaks Playmate Jennifer with a wink. "Did you know I also DJ? We've got a party on tonight. . ."

Suddenly, Dimitri doesn't seem quite so interesting a DJ any more. But then, at Muzik, we're professionals, and so return to work. Putting aside our rising ardour, we grope for a question, quick. Like, is he a right old globetrotting playboy himself, or what?

"Hardly," sniffs Dimitri, unamused by the unaesthetic, ageing holidaymakers. "I share elements of the lifestyle philosophy, but I'm too much of a workaholic to sign up totally. Miami is a unique place where I can work and enjoy myself at the same time. I can sit here under the palm trees, drink and talk to you, but that's rare. Apart from the actual playing of records, everything I do is work. There's no glamour. I'm not the sort of party animal who goes to all the after-hours. I'm drenched after I finish a set, go to my hotel room, crash out and hope my flight the next morning isn't too early. Miami is the opposite. I get to lounge and think. But I wouldn't want to do more than a week here. . . "

Now, if you were thinking that our Dimitri was a kinda serious guy, you wouldn't be too far wrong. And one thing he certainly takes seriously is his love of the Sixties and Seventies. Not just because he was born then, it seems, but because of the fusion of a frivolous vibe and

serious craft. And you thought the Sixties and Seventies were all about Dralon, free love. Afro wigs and bad acid? As professor Dimitri has it, if you don't understand this particular concept, you might not understand his music. Ergo you certainly won't understand him. .

"I'm a detail man," he explains, nonchalantly lighting up a Marlboro white-tip. "I'm into the small things. In the Sixties, art, furniture and clothes were very well-crafted, there was great detail, and they were available to everybody on a mass scale, whoever they were and however they perceived them. These days, detailed things can be very noodly, and they don't tend to take the average person into the equation. Today, that winning combination of populism and quality has disappeared."

"And why am I telling you this? Because it's exactly the reason I'm into music. I appreciate commercialism. I want to share music with people who don't neccessarily know anything about it, as well as the underground cognoscenti. Music for me is a combination of accessibility and detail, and people can access it on whatever level they want. And that's rare. You know, very few DJs have a strong passion for music. For them DJing is more about girls, drugs, the fast life. Music is mere fuel to their existence, not an art form to love, an aesthetic to cherish. I see that above all in England, and particularly with the younger generation."

The cocktails are finished. Our heads are hurting, and it's not just the drink. The Playmates are kissing us goodbye and the words of the departing post-modern playboy Dimitri still ring in the warm, night air. Somewhere between being and nothingness, as Dimitri might say.

Aaah, the French. . . Doncha just love 'em? (M)



HAS BUYING MUSIC ONLINE FINALLY REPLACED MASTURBATION AS THE INTERNET'S NUMBER ONE ATTRACTION? words Andy Crysell

OWNING records is great, isn't it? And the more records you own the greater it gets! Collecting makes you 'special', guaranteeing that it's always back to your place when the club closes. It hasn't been a doddle becoming this important, however. It's taken years to build up a vinyl stash that's big enough to be proud of, incalculable hours of chasing classics and burning cash you could otherwise have spent on decent clothes. Shit, ordinary folk just don't know what the record collector has to go through in the name of having the most choons.

Here, then, is a near-future scenario to have collectors shuddering. The stardate is soon, very soon, and the scenario is one in which every single tune ever recorded is easily and almost instantly available on the web. By way of your computer, television, mobile phone or robotic

space dog, the finest music, new and old, is flowing smoothly into your world. What's the point of owning a thousand records when you can click your way directly to a million? Why waste time archiving the entire Strictly Rhythm back catalogue when it's out there, ready for the taking, whenever you want it? Cue absolute musical equality, trainspotting for all. That and some vinyl-laden folk crying into their anoraks.

The twin tools of this on-line musical revolution are MP3 and Napster, though, in typical internet fashion, this could change at any second. MP3 or Moving Pictures Expert Group-1, Audio Layer 3 as it's not often called - is a software program which compresses digital music, allowing relatively speedy downloading of tracks from the internet. Part of common argot among netheads since 1996, MP3 famously replaced 'sex' as the most

popular search engine word and, depending on your viewpoint, it's either the music industry's golden future or most heinous threat.

Bootlegging is rife. For instance, it is possible to download every record The Beatles or Marvin Gaye ever made for nowt if you know which of the multitudinous 'community' newsgroups to sign up with. New York is covered in graffiti from activist groups advertising their web sites and demanding free music for all. When MP3 players first arrived on the market last year, the US record industry made a vain attempt to stop it from being sold. The judge on the case proclaimed the move "an exercise in futility". Even in the UK, where MP3 is less established, the British Phonographic Industry is now taking action against 12 sites that offer illegal music every week, as opposed to 12 a month last year.

With the backing of the record industry, new technology which may curtail illicit downloads is on its way - MP7, for instance, with which downloaded music will eventually be erased unless you get round to paying for it. But on the other side of the divide, there's Napster, a fileexchange program which makes searching for and exchanging music files vastly more straightforward. Inevitably devised by a geekylooking bunch of teenage Americans, Napster can connect thousands of music lovers, allowing them to access the MP3s stored on others' hard drives. The Napster team soon plan to link all their servers, meaning millions of users will be connected. It's presumed total access to all music ever made will finally be achieved.

Napster culture is spreading like wildfire, and an attempt at clampdown has come from the Recording Industry Association Of America. It has filed a lawsuit demanding \$100,000 damages for every single copyright which has been infringed using Napster. Don't blame us, Napster has responded. We bring people together, but we

don't tell them which files to trade.

Beyond the labyrinthine world of copyrightbusting domains, web sites offering legal downloads are ever-increasing, and operating on all levels from devoutly underground to thoroughly mainstream. Probably the best site for dance music is Crunch.co.uk (though from next month they'll be rebranding themselves iCrunch.com). The site launched in March of last year with one full-time member of staff and two part-time. Now Crunch has 30 staff and is the exclusive host to 50 (mainly dance) labels, including Nuphonic, Wall Of Sound, Pussyfoot, Tummy Touch and 20:20 Vision. Site users can check out interviews, peruse the community pages and buy tracks at 99 pence each. In March they went a step further, when Les Rythmes Digitales released his 'Live From Ancienne Belgique' album solely through Crunch. That's right, it doesn't exist on vinyl or CD. These are different days indeed from when Crunch was inaugurated, 14 long, long months ago.

"In music web site terms, we're about 100 years old," jokes Jon Davis. One of Crunch.co.uk's founders, his background is in music marketing, with DMC and Warners among his former employers. "When we started very few people knew what the fuck we were talking about. If they did know, they thought it would spell the

death of the music industry. We'd try to speak to labels but they'd refuse to pick the phone up."

To get involved you need an MP3 player, which will set you back around \$200. And it's thought that Numark are going to add to the fun shortly by marketing an MP3 mixer. But they'd better be quick, because some pundits claim MP3 will be redundant when ASDL arrives, increasing bandwidth and dramatically shortening the time it takes to download a track – or, for that matter, video footage. Whether centred on MP3s or a different kind of file, business will rise sharply, Davis believes, when ASDL kicks in. It needs to kick in, too, as currently, using a 56K modem, you're looking at between five and 10 minutes to pipe down a five-minute track.

"Right now it's easier to buy an album from your neighbourhood record store than online," he admits. "But when people can download 12 tracks in 10 minutes that won't be the case. People are already achieving this in America."

Post-internet, the big noise in new technology is Wireless Application Protocol, or WAP, an advance which turns the mobile phone into a gateway to online information. Presently, even really flash phones possess a modem speed of just 9K, meaning it would be quicker to shop at the other end of the country than to download on your mobie. But like everything else in this

age of hyper-development, this won't be the case for long. "The mobile phone, among many other changes, is going to alter the way we consume music enormously," reckons Davis.

Crunch see themselves as considerably more than just an online record store, however. The key is speaking effectively to a demographic, supplying them with the hallowed three Cs of the Internet: Content, Commerce and Community. "Music is the chief cultural driver for our audience," Davis continues. "That music influences the clothes they wear, the books they read, the films they watch and the places they travel to. Music is used by all these segments of consumer industry, whether it's the Wipeout game featuring music to communicate with this audience or Levi's doing likewise."

Locating yourself at the centre of this commercial activity is of course essential for any self-respecting, youth-oriented internet project. As proven by the number of labels who've signed their online activities exclusively to Crunch, it's clear they sense a slice of the action could come their way, too.

One of Crunch's newest additions is Soma. Jim Muotune, a director of the esteemed Scottish label, talks about their link up with Crunch.co.uk both in terms of "Soma's e-trade strategy" and "they're nice people, we're gonna have a laugh







with them". Crunch has paid them an undisclosed advance in return for becoming exclusive hosts.

"We believe the next revolution will happen online and Soma wants to be part of it," says Muotune. "We see it as a progression which will help sell niche music. Having a track like 'Eternal' (an early Soma release by Slam) available to people who couldn't get their hands on it before is very empowering."

Long-term, it seems that promoting albums using free downloads will surpass releasing singles, both in terms of market penetration and economic viability. Soma also recognise the internet as a method of communicating with their fan base, a route to giving them something A&R office or uploaded on a web site."

True to form, the major labels have made up for being late to get online by being ruthless. In the US, Sony has taken to owning new artist web sites then renting them back for \$100 a month. Of greater concern for new artists, however, is what happens if their deal with Sony should end. In an online future, it would seem these artists are stuffed, if their bandname.com is owned by someone else. Late last year, hearing of this situation, Ice-T decided to comment. "Eat a bowl of dicks," he suggested to the offending labels.

Even if you're perfectly happy with your floorspace-gobbling mound of CDs and vinyl, and fully intend for it to grow further, there are still

thewomb.com and you can have fearsome techno shaking your iMac all day. Mycaster.com allows you to host your own radio show. Before you know it, Radio 1 could be on its knees.

Mad Ash, founder of InterFACE.pirateradio.co.uk, doesn't believe this is fanciful thinking. After years of running pirate stations like Phase FM, Heart FM and Asylum FM, in 1996 a battle-weary Ash looked into the idea of shifting operations online. Hooking up with some former computer hackers in 1997 (well, you don't want to go too legitimate, do you?) InterFACE began broadcasting, making it, in all probability, the world's first internet radio station. Now, with guest DJs like Tim 'Love' Lee and Red Snapper

back. Their section of Crunch.co.uk currently features a competition to remix Silicone Soul's 'Sly Guy' track. You download it for free, do your sonic stuff, then send it back in. "I'm convinced," states Muotune, "that the next Derrick May or Slam will be discovered online."

While Slam search for the next techno star, others are thinking on a grander scale. Paul Burger, chairman of Sony UK, has pledged to break the first online pop superstar. More than seven billion MP3 files were downloaded last year, a number which makes the 'home taping is killing music' issue of the Seventies and Eighties seem a drop in the ocean.

Exactly how all this MP3 activity will affect record sales is unclear, but it's forcing the music industry to come up to speed. Some feel they're too late, that the days of the traditional label are numbered. Perhaps the first online megastar will instead come from the slew of sites offering music from unsigned artists, such as Peoplesound.com and Vitaminic.co.uk. Then again, do many of us really have the time or inclination to wade through a stack of online demos?

"There's no market for a magazine which just talks about demo tapes, so why should there be one for all the web sites which are doing just that?" Crunch.co.uk's Jon Davis asks. "Shit music is shit music, whether it's sitting in an

thrills to be had online. And no, we don't mean by resorting to the former most popular search engine word. On getoutthere.bt.com, another site aimed at unsigned musicians, you can play on an online mixer that's packed with basslines, beats and melodies provided by DJ Laurence Nelson, Better still is Beatnik.com. Download their player and you're off, remixing tracks by everyone from David Bowie to Moby. If you reckon your effort is shit hot, you can send it to a friend. It's smart, user-friendly and entertaining. Oh, and believe or not, it's the brainchild of goofy Eighties popster Thomas Dolby.

And while major label artists are struggling to retain their domain names, independent artists are having no such trouble. Tall Paul's dutyfreerecordings.co.uk lets you listen to excerpts of tracks by Robbie Rivera, DJ Lottie and Paul himself. DJ Sneak's brilliant disneak.com features tunes for download and keeps you up to date with his cross-planet DJ appearances. Mowax.com has an Asteroids game. Warp-net.com houses Chris Cunningham's nutjob Aphex Twin videos. Chuck D's Rapstation.com even boasts an online lawyer, offering advice to budding hip hop crews.

The latest growth area is Internet radio. No matter what cack is spewing out of conventional radio, click to sites like Grooveradio.com and

joining their regular line-up, InterFACE has around 10,000 people connecting to its audio stream each day and about 200,000 checking out playlists and using the chatroom.

The time when internet users in the UK will be able to stay on-line toll-free will shortly be upon us and it's expected that Internet radio listening figures will mushroom dramatically. Gearing up for video content and an online shop, Ash senses that in just two years, the traditional stations could have a stringle on their hands.

"We're flexible. We can 'eact to trends in the UK and worldwide quicker than they can. Really, I think we'll leapfrog right over them in the end.

Finally, drugs: they're not yet downloadable, but more than 1,000 web sites around the world are now offering substances for sale - including cannabis, ecstasy and cocaine. You place your order, give them your credit card details, then they mail you the drugs. "It's a difficult problem," says Drugs 'Czar' Keith Hellawell. Throw in WAP technology and it brings the time-honoured apparatus of drug dealing, the mobile phone, back into the fray, so it could become yet more problematic for the authorities. Perhaps this is why the Archbishop Of York recently told The Times that the internet is evil. Folk with a roomful of rare, valuable, lovingly archived vinyl might just agree.



the Saint, gay people were clubbing, sexing and drugging as both a celebration and a manifestation of an unprecedented amount of social freedom. In 1983 Texas, at clubs like the Starck in Dallas, people were clubbing, sexing and drugging as both a celebration and a manifestation of an unprecedented amount of green in their pockets. They'd struck it rich. It was party time.

At its core, Texas is a traditional, old boy state, where debutante balls are still written about grandly in the papers. But by 1984, the oil boom that had begun in the mid-Seventies had caught up with Texan society. People were wealthy, not just from oil, but from anything. Designers and artists had benefactors, people with a bit of property suddenly found themselves sitting on real estate gold, entrepreneurs received funding in milliseconds, and ranchers turned, seemingly overnight, into eccentric millionaires.

Dallas, the TV show, was not so far off the mark with its sequinned day suits and gaggle of chauffeurs. Texas did feel that way, almost as if the atmosphere itself jangled with coins and

New York to replace Kreuchet, was asked if he had ever heard about a drug called ecstasy. Maybe it was 'X-T-C', the investor wasn't sure. Whatever it was called, it was legal, and there was a buzz on it in Texas. Yes, replied Jaggers, he had heard of ecstasy, in fact he had brought some with him from New York, would he like to try it?

Within days, Jaggers was contacted again. The investor wanted more of this 'ecstasy' from New York, to sell over the bar at the Starck. Would Jaggers be able to hook up a connection? What neither Jaggers nor the investors knew, but would soon learn, was that ecstasy was already flooding into Texas from California and New Mexico.

Ecstasy was legal but, nonetheless, it was the underworld drug dealers, the same people who sold coke and speed in the clubs, from whom the Starck soon started ordering thousands of tablets with which to stock its bar. XTC: 15 dollars, plus tax, chargeable on your credit card. In no time, there were crowds of 300 left standing outside a packed and glamorous Starck club every weekend.

One week Van Halen's David Lee Roth was flouncing across the club, strutting to New Order's reinforced a terribly strict door policy, fixed on richesse (jet setters, celebrities, fashion or art world hipsters, yuppies) and a calculated peppering of streety style-tribe curiosities (a new wave eyeliner case here, a 24-inch Mohawk there, a Chinese goth girl on a leash, some drag queens).

But foreshadowing the UK in the late Eighties, ecstasy did erase many prejudicial hang-ups existing between people who shared a similar economic stature. "There were rich, preppy kids, wearing Ralph Lauren in there: all hugging and chatting up these wealthy gays and male fashion models - people who they would've beat up behind the frat house a year before," says former Starck regular Wade Hampton. "I think that would later happen in England with ecstasy too, but with the lower classes.

Wade Hampton III, now a record shop and label owner in San Francisco, was himself a 'rich kid', one of a growing mass of teens for whom the Starck guest list was open. These were the offspring of Texas' sprawling Sloane set, equipped with their own American Express Gold cards, left to them by their parents who were always dashing off



Starck club to open. A multi-million dollar danceteria designed in black terrazzo and white marble by French designer Philippe Starck, the most celebrated industrial designer of the Eighties. The hype preceding the Starck club was almost unbearable, building and building for months.

By May 12th 1984, the night of the opening, half of the 'in-crowd' attending were already sceptical about the place. It couldn't possibly live up to the inflated promises: a Studio 54-type club in the heart of Dallas, a place that mixed gay and straight, country club and Culture Club. In Dallas, most straight clubs were rock venues, fratland booze-bins, or tourist traps with names like The Tijuana Yacht Club. Most gay haunts, like the Old Plantation, still had signs posted outside explaining that the establishment was gay and would not tolerate any 'people who could not accept' that. And this new place, the Starck, had the audacity to use the words 'mixed club'? A mixed club with unisex bathrooms? The exclusivity of a Studio 54 was fine. The cross-cultural weirdness of New York, some Texans weren't too sure about.

In the first few weeks of the Starck, it seemed the naysayers were right. The number of patrons at the club thinned out dramatically after the opening gala featuring Grace Jones. French DJ Philippe Kreuchet had bailed, after finding himself on the French charts with a disco record. The club looked set for failure, and was already being leased out for private functions on weekends

It was at his first meeting with one of the Starck investors that Kerry Jaggers, freshly flown in from week, Grace Jones flew through with an entourage of beautiful lovers. Limos took stars from their hotels straight to the club, all arrangements smoothed by a specially appointed concierge. Unlike Studio 54, where strobe lights competed with the flash of reporters' cameras, everything about the Starck was exceedingly private. The first floor was made up of white banquettes arranged in close-quartered cubicles, with white curtains that could close the whole way round each module.

"When most curtains were closed - which was often - walking through that area was like walking through a sensual maze of white fabric, grazing this gleaming black terrazzo floor," says Kerry Jaggers. "It was almost as if the club was designed for that beautiful, hard-yet-soft clarity you get with MDMA."

It was hard to reach the bars to buy the Starck's 100% pure XTC pills. The crowds waving money at the barmaids were always four deep. There were free-floating dealers from whom it was usually easier to procure the drug. Some of the dealers even wore T-shirts proclaiming 'Buy My XTC'. Jaggers estimates that 70% of those visiting the Starck did buy it. "Without any guilt or any stigma. It was seen as high class. Some of the same people who were worrying about their kids sampling pot were downing this stuff."

XTC did not change the amount of dancing that occurred in the Starck, always more of a schmooze-o-thon club. It probably did not change the magnums and magnums of champagne ordered. It did not erase elitism. If anything, the early only-those-in-the-know aura of the drug


conferences in Washington or business in New York, Hong Kong, the Middle East. . .

These kids represented the beginning of a casual, friends-based dealing network that started connecting the dots between ecstasy and the campus. A network that would lead to the altogether surprising cases of trust fund teens being arrested for trafficking drugs in 1985 after ecstasy was made illegal in the United States. "When we started going to the Starck, like 1983, it was all quite careless though," says Hampton. "People would give us pills at the club, just to see if we liked them, and if we wanted to buy some, like for our friends. We just sold them off, made a bit of extra money."

It was a few months before Wade Hampton and his friends decided to try the drug themselves. They booked a room at the Loewes Anatol Hotel, the most expensive four-star hotel in Dallas. In the Starck's early era, the Loewes Anatol was dubbed the 'XTC hotel' by scenesters, because dealers would check in for months at a time, check out, and then check in again under a different name. Nobody asked any questions. The hotel was a five minute walk from the Starck. It contained its own luxurious club called Mistral, where the drug was also popular. "The Loewes had a restaurant in it, overlooking the Mistral club, called By The Ounce," continues Hampton. "The pun was totally intended and this in a top-of-the-line hotel. It gives you a good idea of where Dallas people's heads were."

Hampton and his pack spent their first night on ecstasy "listening to Thomas Dolby's 'She Blinded

Me With Science' for too many hours in a row." They pierced each others' ears with a Loewes Anatol complementary sewing kit. After the 16 year-old hotel heiress who put the room on her chargecard was sick all over the carpet, they began exploring the premises: the massive glass atrium, the chic mall, the Nana jazz club in one of the hotel's towers. "Nana was on the 28th floor. We just sat at a table, overlooking the whole city, breaking pills in half for hours. Those who were there that night, we hung onto each other for a year as best friends, doing ecstasy over and over."

It was not long before Hampton's group were checking into the Loewes Anatol every week. The hotel would assign a security guard to them to discreetly follow them around on their ecstasy escapades late into the night, keeping tabs on the damage they did and the things they 'borrowed' from the premises. "I don't know how many times the Nana bar was broken into that year, with every bottle of alcohol taken out of it and brought up to [our] rooms. They knew it was us, they would just charge retail price for every single bottle onto our friend's credit card. The only person she had to report back to was a horse trainer who acted as her guardian, assigned to her by her family. One of those weird, rich kid family situations."

The blitz on ecstasy in the Dallas broadsheets began in 1984, when the US Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) estimated that the number of ecstasy doses surging into Texas every month was edging 100,000. The Dallas Morning News was the most exhaustive in its coverage of the popular drug, erroneously categorising it either a 'superamphetamine', an 'hallucinogen' or, more commonly, a 'designer drug' - a drug whose chemical make-up has been changed slightly to avoid illegality. This being the high era of Nancy Reagan's mammy-ish 'Just Say No' campaign, the Morning News' reports usually came in the form of a general appeal to parents. Articles appeared regularly in the Morning News warning of the dangerous spread of MDMA but by the May 12th issue, the paper was well past the warning stage. "Ecstasy will become the recreational drug of the Eighties," wrote reporter Pat Gordon.

Gordon was no soothsayer. Ecstasy was hardly an exclusive nightworld secret in Texas any more. The drug had reached non-clubbing high-schoolers and college kids by the winter of 1984. Newspapers ran stories of affluent 13 year-olds burning out by taking a morning ecstasy every day before class, of dealers who stalked dangerously close to school yards. The successful career folk at the Starck were of little or no concern to reporters. Ecstasy was painted as a seedy street drug; something that would ruin young lives and thwart futures. But this was not just broadsheet brouhaha. It was becoming a major problem, especially with the segment of students training for government like their fathers. The students at the terribly stiff-lipped and church-backed Southern Methodist University.

Wade Hampton draws a line between his group and students from SMU. "My friends and I were true nightclubbers by then, we respected the secrecy of the Starck and the scene," he insists.

"The SMU students usually weren't connected to the club scene, so for them, ecstasy wasn't something with which to complement a fun night, it was a context-less thing to get fucked up on, beerbash stuff. The SMU kids were under pressure, they drank not for enjoyment but oblivion. You'd see the odd one careening into the Starck - taking 10 pills in one go, overdoing it to an extent that there was no possibility that the police and the newspapers wouldn't get involved. They were obvious, having to be rolled into hospitals in ridiculous states, having gone temporarily blind from overactive eyelid fluttering.

"And don't forget," continues Hampton, "they were politicians' kids. Their parents were all friends with George Bush [then Vice President of the US], for God's sake. They were the death knell for legal ecstasy, those kids."

In July 1984, the DEA announced a proposal to make ecstasy a Schedule One drug: the most restrictive drug category available in the United States. Measures were taken to curtail the usage of the drug while the proposal was being examined and processed: the sale of MDMA was made illegal, although possession was still within the law. But given the parentage of the SMU kids and their like, the heat was on to get MDMA's full scheduling through as quickly as possible.

In the months when it was still within the law to possess ecstasy but not to sell it, XTC-lovin' Texans got creative in trying to outsmart the system. Throughout 1984, you could walk into trendy stores in downtown Dallas and buy a disposable plastic ballpoint pen for 25 dollars. They gave you a 'free' ecstasy pill with the pen. Yet faced with illegality and increasingly being made and dealt by new, more underworld sources, the quality of the ecstasy being sold became dubious. "The first total fakes came about this time, along with the first variations of so-called ecstasy you could buy," says Hampton. There was a proliferation of 'Turbos' (MDA) and a drug called Eve, which was MDEA, another one of ecstasy's chemical cousins, a drug Texans believed legal.

On 31st June 1985, an exposé of ecstasy use on the SMU campus was published in the bestselling news magazine, Life. One day later, the DEA proposal to make ecstasy a Schedule One was made effective - putting ecstasy in the same category as heroin or cocaine in the eyes of American justice.

In the months between the scheduling proposal of the summer of 1984 and the prohibition of ecstasy in the summer of 1985, the Starck was having a last luxurious laugh, before an excruciating calm. Some nights would edge on the plainly loony, with patrons retiring to the Loewes Anatol atriums to fly remote-control toy helicopters inside them. "Everything was unravelling, and not just on the ecstasy level," says Hampton. "Texas oil was in big trouble economically things were going downhill fast. Everyone at the Starck was in denial."

In 1985, international oil prices plummeted 50% as a result of a market-flooding decision taken by OPEC, the international oil cartel (of which the United States is not part). Texas oil didn't have a

fighting chance. Texans were losing entire fortunes within single days. Property value sunk 25% in both Houston and Dallas. In Texas' major cities, incidence of arson had risen an astounding 20% in 1985. The problem of people broiling their own properties had become so bad that leading insurance company Aetna took out ads in Texas newspapers stating: "If you're thinking about burning down your home to collect the insurance money - think again. Aetna Life & Casualty is making arson a crime that doesn't pay."

"It's funny when you think about it now," says Hampton. "The economy falling through the floor and ecstasy drowning into illegality at the same time. I guess the only way the Starck could deal with it was through humour." On 30 June 1985, the night before DEA made ecstasy Schedule One, the Starck organised a campy 'Farewell To Ecstasy' party. "It was a packed house," remembers Kerry Jaggers. "But a very melancholy crowd. Everybody was feeling very sad and kinda afraid, wondering what was going to happen. . ."

After that symbolic party, many older or more reputation-conscious patrons of the Starck stopped taking all ecstasy products. "But the banning affected young people more," says Hampton. "And while it degenerated the quality of the drug itself, it also did something quite positive - it created a counterculture. It was the first sign I ever saw of these pampered kids saying 'fuck the system' in a big way. The banning of ecstasy invested people with this drive to be elusive; to circumvent control and be their own thinkers. People were saying 'I'm doing the right thing, I'm doing it for my own reasons and I will do it by any means necessary'."

In September 1986, months after MDMA was scheduled, the Starck club was raided. Thirty-six people were arrested and drugs with a street value of almost \$10,000 were seized, mostly ecstasy and cocaine. The place had been under investigation for months, after the police supposedly received phone calls from patrons complaining of drugs being sold and used openly. "The raid made front page headlines and a lurid, almost comical read," wrote Starck supporter Russell Smith, music critic for the Dallas Morning News. "Lawmen described how their police dogs were slipping and sliding over drugs hurriedly ditched on the elegant sunken dancefloor."

The Starck never quite recovered from the raid. After the police bust, it died a slow but sure death. When the club was on its last legs in 1988, its decor and musical policy seemed passé and its part in the story of ecstasy was finished. The house music percolating in Chicago, New York and Detroit within the very same years the Starck was kicking had reached the UK. So had ecstasy. For all of the Starck's foreshadowings, it's safe to say nobody in America expected what was about to happen across the ocean, where XTC would become E, and get tagged with the very un-Starck, big, yellow smiley as its new symbol.



Album Of The Month

#### ARMAND VAN HELDEN

Killing Puritans (ffrr)

Another year, another collection of tough love hard house from Boston's self-styled sample-slaya

IF there's one thing you've got to hand to America's house producers, it's their work ethic. Frenetic enough to make your average sweat shop look like an opium den, they just keep on churning them out. And therein lies the problem: stuck in a groove, often unable to see when the bottom of the barrel is begging not to be scraped, they miss the point that quantity and quality are rarely on speaking terms. Call it the Jason Nevins syndrome.

Barely a year after '2 Future 4 U' turned Boston's own Ali G, Armand Van Helden, into an international superstar, and he's back with another album. He may know his hip hop poses well, but clearly slouching is a nono round the Boston b-boy-turned-househead's studio. So is this a case of too much more, far too soon? Well, in anyone else's hands, this would probably be just another collection of fairly anonymous DJ fodder grooves. In the brute and disrespectful grasp of AVH, however, it ends up the perfect antidote for anyone who thought Basement Jaxx too pop, Felix Da Housecat too slick and sly. This is heavy metal house music, the sound of Daft Punk's Harley Davidson-driving, flicknifewielding younger brother raising one finger to the purists while the other middle digit gets blistered on the filtered-disco switch.

So we get dodgy German rockers the Scorpions riffing up 'Little Black Spiders' so manically you wonder whether moshing is the new raving.
'Watch Your Back' is the sound

of bastard hard techno a la Cari Lekebusch going apeshit in a Cuban disco: not big, not clever and your mother definitely wouldn't like it. And 'Koochy'? Well, this writer hates it, frankly, but only Van Helden could sample Gary Numan and (just about) get away with it.

Anyone expecting the soulful streak and poly-stylistic craftsmanship of '2 Future 4 U' will be disappointed. Even when Armand does furious electro bigbeat on 'Breakdancer's Call' it's more deranged, more funky than Clyde Stubblefield gone cocaloco. Probably the album's best cut, it's countered by the daft party-time hip hop of 'Full Moon' which sounds as if Will Smith just gatecrashed the studio.

For the rest, this is Van Helden back to the days of his remix frenzy, when originality took a back seat to brute rhythms and drug-heavy dancefloor tricks. Lengthy filtered disco tracks 'Swamp Thing' and 'Flyaway Love' are typically simple grooves twisted and tweaked to bedlam and back, 'Conscience' is 'U Dont Know Me' without Duane Harden, and 'Hybridz' is so brazen about its Eighties hiphouse stylings, it even samples all that era's greatest moments, Not Van Helden's finest, then,

'Killing Puritans' is Armand reining in the inventiveness in favour of dancefloor heroics, And when he's on this kind of blistering form, any more heavyweight boxing bouts he may care for should be a shoo-in.

#### SAINT ETIENNE

The Sound Of Water (Mantra)

London trio return with a new label and their finest outing to date

'HOBART Paving'? 'Avenue'? Saint Etienne always trod a precarious path between heavenly Europop and delicate, guitar-flecked balladry. But they never lost sight of the road ahead, and 'The Sound Of Water' is no exception. With production split between German avant gardists To Rococco Rot, High Llama Sean O'Hagan and the band themselves, this album ripples with a new-found confidence. 



The master of dubbed-out clicks, bleeps and interference returns with a third long-player

TWO years ago Basic Channel engineer Stefan Betke crept up on us with his stunning debut EP as Pole. Bringing the sound of fizzing, crackling electronic interference to the fore and underpinning it with huge slabs of dub bass, Pole seemed to simultaneously eclipse the work of his Berlin bosses and take it in a new direction: away from the Teutonic dancefloor and into the living room.

Three albums later the hive of static is still in place, courtesy of Stefan's trusty, malfunctioning filter, but the focus has shifted firmly towards the dub elements. Recognising that dub is as much a product of its Jamaican roots a product of its January as as, say, underground garage is of



inner London, he's twisted the traditional dub format to reflect the urban European experience, secularising it without losing any of its soul

Darren: "A slow builder with a heavy wobbly bass. Lots of space, more dubby than in-yerface-let's-go-fuckin'-mad. Those Eastern vocals remind me a bit of old Fabio Parasstyle but slower; more tabla than bassline."

#### BT Dreaming (Pioneer)

ANOTHER one from BT's pretentiously titled but rather tasty 'Movement In Still Life' album, which is soon to be repackaged and re-released. It's not so good when Transeau barks up the classical-ethereal tree, here assisted by Kirsty Hawkshaw's vocals, but he has a tasty way with a break and Evolution are nifty on the remix.





Darren: "Ohh, it sounds nice at the wrong speed. I don't play drum & bass but it doesn't bore me. It's got quite a good riff."

#### THE MUSIC MAKERS I'm The Music Tonite (white label)

AS we checked through this month's releases in London's Tag Records the management thrust this into our sweaty mitts assuring us it was by unguessable BIG NAMES. It's good. One side of organic, percussive dub with a woman talking about 'the rhythm', and two very trad vocal discohouse cuts, all pianos and sunshine.

Darren: "Sounds as if there's some people playing real instruments on it, a nice groove with lots of timpani. The other side's taken piano from a classic old track. Very Erick Morillo, good quality disco stuff."

#### DJ JAM X & DE LEON PRESENT DUMONDE See The Light (Nebula)

MAJOR-backed 'independent' Nebula seem happy to dive into two-step garage when it takes their fancy but mainly the agenda remains trance. Jam X and De Leon, plus remixer Mr Spring, offer up formulaic trance with feminine whispering that's supposed to conjure up heavenly cosmology. It doesn't. Even Mauro Picotto's mix fails to set fire to anything.

Darren: "Occooh, no. I don't know what to say. That's the best and only thing I can say because I swore I'd be nice today."

BOB MARI FY FEATURING MC LYTE Jammin' (Universal/Island)

THIS whole 'let's-murder-benevolent-Uncle-Bob's-back-catalogue' craze seems barely comprehensible to Muzik's ears so let's turn from the desecratory 12inch proper to the limited Olav Basoski Remix. One of his usual filter-disco funkers, it's not dramatically unpleasant.

Darren: "He's quite a good vocalist, isn't he? There's a lot of disco out at the moment but if it's done right I don't mind. The 'once again' vocal is a bit boring though.

DJ LUCK & MC NEAT FEATURING JJ Masterblaster 2000 (Red Rose)

HARD to argue with. Taking Stevie Wonder's classic and turning it into an MCladen slice of two-step garage sounds like a nightmarishly bad idea but the 'Little Bit Of Luck' crewpull it off. U's singing voice is clean and clear and Neat's rap attack flows smoothly. For those who like things more darkly tweaked check 'Kartik's Remix'.

Darren: "Idon't mind a bit of two-step - this will be massive. I'm not sure though, the original's a classic. I like the bleepy mix.

BILLIE PIPER Day & Night (Innocent)

YOU might have predicted that we'd come down on this like a ton of lead but what's an honest hack to do? Here goes: piffle of the first order with teen-dream Billie tacking her surname on and hacking a Britneysized space (she hopes) in the nation's pop consciousness. Perhaps we should blame remix tart Robbie Rivera, because without his mixes it wouldn't be considered in these pages at all.

Darren: "It's going out to the young kids, going for the anthem sound. In a club no one would know it was Billie, providing you played the dub. Not my bag though."

#### MIKE & CHARLIE I Get Live (Regal)

NEVER mind the beaty 'Headbanger Boogie Mix', the electro-esque 'Dave London Mix' or chunky 'Bears Mix' - what we're all interested in is Mr Norman Cook's reconstruction, a fine amalgam of Jason Nevins drums and weed-smoking samples alongside a lyric he's adapted to sound like 'Brighton'. The man's roll never stops!

Darren: "I played this the other night, the one about smoking. It'll be massive, loads of energy and a bit more bangin' than usual."

#### LEFTFIELD FEATURING NICOLE WILLIS

Swords (Hard Hands/Higher Ground)

MOODY electro-soul is the order of the day here as all sorts of curious faces remix this album track. Two Lone Swordsmen go for smart pitch-black technolectro, Cari Lekebusch abstract houses it, To Rococo Rot are sweet, German electronica, and Leftfield are, well, Leftfield.

Darren: "Very spacey and eerie but not really doing much for me. Curious choice for a single but a nice little package if you're into the direction of their new album.

#### STONEROSES Rabbit In The Moon/Lionrock Remixes (Jive Electro)

FOLLOWING on from Grooverider's 'Fools Gold' and the rest a year or two back we now have Rabbit In The Moon turning 'I Wanna Be Adored' into a 1988-style Adamski acid thang and Justin Robertson rolling a huge dooble for his laid back 'Waterfall'

Darren: "Oakenfold once did 'I Wanna Be Adored' too. I'm a big fan of the old Roses and it's nice Justin's kept it downtempo and spacey, not tried to turn it into a club anthem. Rabbit In The Moon - back to 606, 909, 808. I bet lan Brown's got the hump about this."

#### DESIDERIO Starlight (CodeBlue)

FERRY Corsten may be on autopilot for this latest piece of Dutch Euro-fluff but happily Armin Van Buuren keeps his wits about him and delivers an intrepid 'Rising Star Remix' which builds, drops, utilises breakbeats, and generally works a crowd without going through the roof. The vocal's still horrid, mind.

Darren: "The offbeat bassline does my head in. As soon as the keys came in I didn't like it. Don't really know what to say, remember I'm trying to be nice... most of this stuff seems to sell well."

MARIA NAYLER Angry Skies (Deconstruction)

ERSTWHILE trance chanteuse and Quiwer caught in dirty, progressive slam-dunk shocker. The B-side 'Beyond Mix' may constitute everything you'd expect in terms of cutesyness (and will consequently do well) but Quiwer surprise all and sundry with a bell-clanging, angry synth-line buzz-fest.

Darren: "Quite fierce production when I was expecting more of a disco thing. Yeah, it sounds really good."

#### TOM JONES & MOUSSET Sex Bomb (Gut)

NOT content with just being horny, horny, horny, Mousse T felt compelled to combine his sensual disco antics with the ultimate lothario, the Welsh bronco himself. In fine voice, Jones has a ton of fun, and only a true spoilsport would fail to see there's giggles to be had.

Darren: "Chuggy house, it sounds really like an original disco thing. It's been out for quite a while on his album but I'd rather listen to this on the radio all the time than Euro-trance.





#### ANTHONY MORIAH Watcha Doing Now

(D'Tension) UK radio's idea of 'real house music' ancient disco records fed through a filter with a 909 kick plopped on top - is beginning to wear thin. As Tenaglia's sets prove (12 hours and not one pisspoor cut-up), disco cut 'n' paste should either get its own section/reviewer or have the good grace to die quickly. This month's best of breed, though, is the ever-dependable Full Intention, GQ's old disco break and another of those 'beige' singers. Done well and sure to be huge at a fun pub near you shortly. (TF)

# PHI ASH

Phlash 3000 (Estereo) Phil Asher is one of the UK's foremost exponents of quality house music and one of the scene's founding fathers. It's just that apart from the 'headz', nobody seems to know it. These four tracks reek soulfulness, with brilliantly programmed beats and Seventies-ideaof-futurism overtones – and not a disco sample in sight. The man's time is coming! (TF)

## KIMBU KIMRA

Raise The Dead Pt 2 (Mantis) The best British vocal record of the millennium so far gets a Charles Webster re-rub. The sleazy, sensual vocals recall uber-perv Grace Jones and work effortlessly with the pushing bassline. A cool Fred Everything mix also complements those fabulous vocals but nothing beats the original. Support. dance and scream! (TF)

#### MASTERS AT WORK FEATURING LILIANA Brazilian Beat (Mr Bongo) Kenny Dope's quirky, funky house-tempoed groove, Little Louie's keyboards

and a superb Brazilian vocal courtesy of Liliana - pure body 'n' soul and totally off the hook, as they say in Watford. Play it and sort out the headz from the Tedz. (TF)

#### PLAY FOR THE CITY FEATURING KARL THE VOICE

Interplanetary Dream (Large, US)

Out of Germany's Density Records, this ever so soulful – think Arnold Jarvis or Robert Owens - track gets some deep West Coast mixes from Miguel Migs and Dave Warrin plus cool, harder mixes from Vincenzo & Bird and Needs (not Kris) As usual Chicago's Large are spot on big room, big system music. (TF)

#### UNDERGROUND SOUND OF LISBON The Lights (Kismet)

Yes, it's been around for ages. But why is it being ignored by the radio? Darkness at its purest - hard, uncompromising sexual tension. It's Danny Tenaglia in Miami, it's druggy, it's innovative, it's not a fucking disco sample. (TF)

#### SHELTER AV

Shelter (Nylon, Portugal) One of two new hits from Pedro Passos and Tó Ricciardi's Nylon imprint (Type's 'Type' EP being the other). Shelter Av return with new mixes of their stand-out from the Nylon sampler, 'Shelter'. Check the 'Late Nite Mix' for a superb mixture of dub effects and Miguel Migs-style hypnotic house. (KIVI)

#### SHEDCENTRAL Dancing/Double Zero (Shedcentral)

A combination of Powder Productions and Nostalgia here, as Shedcentral Recordings kick off their catalogue with this doubleheader of driving grooves. 'Dancing' sounds like Cricco Castelli mixed with DJ Sneak while 'Double Zero' showcase the floorfilling house sound that has made Basement Jaxx, Roger Sanchez and Danny Rampling fans. (KIMI)

#### .... FLUID X

Change (Wave, USA) Fluid X is the work of Rob Rives, Axis engineer and former Floppy Sounds main-man. Here he leaves behind the industrial grooves of old in favour of something more subtle. 'Change' uses a combination of warm bass, alternating keyboard hooks and funky drum programming to create a sound similar to François K's 'FK EP', which he engineered. (KIM)

#### DARK BOOGIE Bend The Rules EP (Humboldt County)

Latest release from Humboldt sees the backbone of the killer Pacific label back in action. Justin Deighton, ex-owner of Pacific and Gary Marsden of Hot Lizard are the men responsible for the dark head-funk of this EP, on which 'Bellyband' is the standout track. Imagine, if you can, Weatherall mixing Mateo & Matos and you get the idea. (KINI)

#### ADDVIBE

Feels So Good (Discfunction) The Idint Boys' Discfunction picks up another strong release from Norway's Addvibe. The follow up to 'Luv & Happiness', 'Feels So Good' rubs up fat percussion, warm bass and St Germainstyle vocal drops. 'Feel So Dub' ups the tempo, loses the vox and adds a slick guitar solo. A bit like George Benson in the studio with Dubtribe. (KM)

#### GEORGE BENSON The Ghetto (MAW/

Talkin' Loud)

This, meanwhile, is a bit like George Benson in the studio with Masters At Work, . . because that's what it is! A stone-cold killer from Miami, this is 10 minutes of insanity, lavishly hand-crafted by Little Louis Vega himself, Accept no substitutes! (TF)


Kozmik Listening (Vinylicious, USA)

Disques Rotax hits double figures with this solo outing from Teddy G. If you've got any of the other Rotax releases, you know what to expect - deep, laid-back grooves with the emphasis on live instruments. Check A1's smooth King Britt-style number or B2's stoned Rhodes swing for two killer moments in French house. (KM)

Basement Boys supply the mix that Vega and Humphries rocked at The Magic Sessions and Cricco Castelli offers an instrumental Latin mix which is pretty cool. Gospel biznizz for the purists only! (SH)

# AMEL LARRIEUX

Get Up (Giant Step, USA) The former vocalist of r&b outfit Groove Theory has her debut single housed up by the ever deep Ron Trent. He's joined by Groove Collective's rhythm section, and a percussion-heavy groove is aided by Ron's infectious bassline and key arrangements. Beautifull (SH)

#### LITTLE LOUIE VEGA FEATURING BLAZE Elements of Life (MAW, USA)

This features the distinctive vocals of Blaze's Alexander Hope over a laid back Latin rhythm. It pinches the backing vocal from George Duke's 'Brazillian Love Affair to add an old skool feel. This will appeal as much to purists as it will jazz heads. (SH)

#### SPENITCH

I'm Blessed (Remix) (Basement Boys, USA) Humphries played this beauty at the Magic Sessions and on my return from Miami I find a copy on my doorstep what joy! This is a new mix, with the groove replaced by an uplifting disco vibe and a male only vocal. The result is a very chanty vocal and a relentless rhythm that's got us hooked! (SH)

#### ANNE NESBY Love Is What We Need

(Peppermint Jam, Germany) One of the projects that Mousse T has been working on is Anne Nesby's album, and this is the debut single. The main vocal mix is maybe a little too smooth, but flip over to the dub for an extremely phat mix that's in heavy rotation. Knowing Mousse, there's probably a vocal version of this. Hopefully anywayl (SH)

#### GEORGE BENSON FEATURING JOE SAMPLE

El Barrio (Verve, USA)

Taken from Benson's forthcoming album and produced by MAW and Tommy Lipuma this makes the perfect soundtrack for spring time. Benson does his simultaneous scat and guitar thang whilst former Crusader Joe Sample jams the keys. The bubbling percussive beat will have you jumping out of your seat. (SH)

#### AFRO MEDUSA

Pasilda (Azuli)

The hot producers on the block, Knee Deep, produce a remix that's simplistic in its approach but that does all the right things. They've retained the original vibe but tuffened it up and inserted some peaks and lows which make this a stormer in the clubs. Essential Latin floorfiller! (SH)

#### PLATINUM DOLL FEATURING P.Y. ANDERSON

Let Love Live (Sub-Urban, USA)

Frankie Feliciano provides some very classy, Latin-heavy mixes with Ms Anderson sounding like Carole Sylvan. Label head Tommy Musto also turns out a classy vocal mix which will only work on the most soulful dancefloor. His dub is extremely minimal but it's also extremely BAD! Dirt and funk spring to mind. (SH)

#### WEIRD SCIENCE

Feel The Need (Nulife) This peak hour female vocal track has been produced by Aydın The Funki Chile and Warren Clark. The production is spot on and the arrangement is tight, peaking in all the right places. (SH)

#### TRICK OR TREAT FEATURING MC TAILS

Wannabee (Clean Cut) These guys have been quiet for a while, but here return with a corker. The bassline is infectious; very musical and clean, and you know we love a good bassline. The vocal parts are chopped, giving this piece of work a feel of the old days. Working well in the clubs. (S)

#### MARI AINE

Step Away (Universal) What we have here is some phat beats from DJ Ray Hurley. On a dubby tip, it's definitely not a summer vocal anthem but will get the full treatment on the pirates, and on the big systems. When it appears, Marlaine's quirky voice is quite cute, but in the meantime, be entertained by a full set of beats from Ray. (8)

#### SPITROASTERS AND YARDLEY

Nitro Dust Remix (white label) This features the unmistakable sound of Robbie Craig. If Colour Girl is the queen of UK garage, Robbie gets my vote as the man on the throne. A full song from Master Craig, backed up by a nice, happy backing track. One for those who like it pure without preservatives. (8)

#### GABRIELLE

When A Woman (Restless Natives Remix) (white label) "Don't fix what ain't broke", a wise old person once said, and the Restless Natives definitely took heed. After the excellent job Wookie did on 'Sunshine', the label knew it made sense to get another beaut of a UK Garage mix Restless Natives have delivered. (S)

#### MONSTA BOY FEATURING DENZI

Sorry (white label) Yet another quality UK garage track produced outside of the M25. Song from the heart, the beats from the street, this has all the ingredients necessary to be another anthem. Huge, huge, huge for me in the clubs. (S)

#### RUFF 'N' TUMBLE Ruff 'N' Tumble (white label)

As summer approaches there is no reason why you won't be hearing a lot of this. The breakdown and vocal come just when you expect it, and when the very musical bassline then drops, it's time to party. A quality record. (S)

#### **AMAR**

Sometimes It Snows In April (Blanco Y Negro) Getting the full treatment from Dreem

House productions, the package contains two-step mixes and soulful house mixes. The dub vocal is the main mix for me, as Dreem Teem MC Rankin rides the rhythm in perfect tandem with Amar, an Asian artist going mainstream. In the current climate, there is no reason why this mix shouldn't cross over. (S)

# DJ LUCK AND MC NEAT FEATURING JJ

Master Blaster (Red Rose) The boys are back! Introducing the vocals of JJ, stepping in for Stevie Wonder as they cover one of his best known hits. Writing a brand new rhyme for every project, MC Neat has propelled himself onto the podium of MC stars, definitely aided by the production skills of DJ Luck. There are mixes for everyone, from 4/4 club to two-step dub vocal, so make sure you obtain all of them. I'll eat my Liverpool shirt if it doesn't do well in the charts. Wicked video by the way guys. (8)

The work of Adam Bayer (a producer normally associated with the harder side of techno) this is perfectly textured, deeply haunting electronic soul of the very highest order. (DIM)

At just 23 years of age Lucas Rodenbush already has a back catalogue that puts most artists to shame, and he's developing his style with each new release. Here he contrasts a bittersweet melody with a drum pattern that sounds like Jamie Anderson on acid. (DM)

#### TENTATIVE

Toxic Tunes Volume 1 (Audio Abuse, USA)

The first release on a new Californian label with four US-style tech-house grooves. Revolving around subby basslines, percussive fills and some subtle but effective filtering this is a bit like Peace Division minus the big hooks. Promising, but not essential. (DIVI)

# ROBIN PORTER & KENNETH GRAHAM

Migratory Mediums (Immigrant, USA) Terry Farley reckons that the West Coast sound will be one of this summer's biggest things. He's right of course, but it's not just house that the Californians excel at. Two of the cuts here are full-on stompers while the closing track has an old school, Scan 7 vibe. Quality stuff. (DIM)

#### KENNETH GRAHAM The Gateway EP (4 Track, USA)

There's only one track here that will be of interest to techno fans, but what a track! Built around a sparse, subdued Detroit groove and laced with some super dark strings, 'Monolith' has to rate as one the most haunting mood pieces we've heard in a very long time. (DM)

#### MAGNAT

The Saga Continues (Qub3) Deep trance: is it the emperor's new clothes? Fuck knows, but if actually exists then this is the best deep trance record we've ever heard. It builds to a monstrous climax and there's not a breakdown, drum roll, arpeggio or orchestral sequence in ear shot. Imagine Tenaglia remixing Maurizio and you're there. (DIVI)

#### ACCESS 58

Changing Times EP (Access

There was a time when techno producers named their tracks after constellations and high falutin' concepts. Thankfully those days are gone. Take by way of example the best track here. A deep, chugging percussive throbber produced in conjunction with Mark Broom, it's called 'Dirty Bog'. Now that's progress. (DM)

#### PURE SCIENCE Bare Knuckle Bassix Volume 2 (Pure Science) Further proof that when it comes to producing deep rolling grooves, Pure

Science is pretty much untouchable. The killer cut this time round is 'Ease Yourself'. Dark, trippy and sinister, it's built around an awesome groove that produces a new surprise with every twist and turn. (DIM)

#### SYMBOLISM VERSUS **INFRASTRUCTURE**

Function (Symbolism) Ben Sims returns with the second release on one of his many labels. As the title suggests, New York's Infrastructure look after one side with some midtempo locked grooves, an ambient piece and a tasty drum track, while on the flip Sims lets rip with the original mix of his mighty 'Work It'. (DMI)

Volume 1 Sampler - Part 3

The third and most essential sampler to be taken from the excellent 'Rewind: The Classics' CD. This features a track that no techno collection should be without -Laurent Garnier's acid-soaked masterpiece 'Wake Up'. A timeless gem that alongside 'Acid Eiffel' still rates as Garnier's best work. (DM)

#### MR C & TOM PARRIS

Searchin' (Plink Plonk) Scene leader Mr C's tech-house production style doesn't sound anything like the work of his contemporaries. faster, punchier and more energetic. Here he fires off another dancefloor bullet which Matthew B funks up on the flip with his electro-ish mix. (DM)

#### CHRISTIAN SMITH Mojito (Tronic, Sweden)

Christian Smith continues to join the dots between techno and progressive house with another cut that's already being caned by everyone from Darren Price to Anthony Pappa. Techno purists can either opt for Oliver Ho's funky abstraction or Samuel L Sessions' typically rolling bass and percussion fuelled mix. Good package. (DIVI)

#### ONLINE

Widescreen (Advance) Scotland's Advance have already been tipped as the next Circulation and it's not hard to see why - they appeal to many of the same DJs and they ignore all genre boundaries. 'Widescreen', one of their tougher tracks, balances its rough beats and swooshing strings with a dirty, G-Flame style bassline and confirms again that they're a label to watch. (DM)

#### TRANSPARENT SOUND Meltdown Ride 2000 (Binary

Transparent Sound are different from their ultra-purist electro peers in that they always make their material with the dancefloor in mind. This is another classic 808 mash up. (DM)

#### **BRYAN ZENTZ** Skufftones 1.0 (In-Tech)

Basing a track around the riff from the cocaine-disco classic 'I Feel Love' is

hardly a revolutionary idea. This, however, works a treat and we can confidently predict that it's going to be massive. (DIVI)

#### CIM

Warm Data (Focus)

Eight tracks on one EP is certainly value for money but when they're this good it's like finding a Ferrari in Mr Pound. Simon Walley smooths his breaks and techno into the realms of downtempo. It's akin to B12 and Black Dog but adds even more warmth and soul to the circuitry. CiMply divine. (JS)

## TIM BAKER

Side Show EP (Elephanthaus) Kneading the floor into thoroughly pummelled submission, Detroit/Chicagobased Baker outs his city's influences through the grinder with some ultrasmooth jack funk and tough minimal beats. Unstoppable. (JS)

#### HO & RUSKIN

Mutate & Survive (Meta) Two sides and two heavyweights smashing the atom with anvils the size of sheds. Except here the beats are more

refined, the grooves fluid and the tempo tribal-ised through recognisable strands of house and funk. With distorted vocal loops adding a voodoo twist, Ho & Ruskin add another string to their taut, percussive bow. (JS)

#### C2 FEATURING ALEXANDER ROBOTNICK Uh-Uh (Riot City)

An extract from a 30-minute live set, Maurizio Dami pours breaks, ambience and experimentation into the head-nod blender with an organic, live and startlingly different perspective. Electro footage is provided on the flip by fellow Cologne activists Third Electric and Klystron. Any kop then? Uh-huh. (JS)

#### CARSTEN ENVRASS Lautwandel (Muta)

The man in Markant unleashes a new label of melodic, twisted electronica and distorted sonic abstraction that's a strange hypocrisy of jagged edginess and soothing melancholy. Like Aphex trading licks with a chainsaw it's as disturbing as it is spellbinding but more importantly, Envrass remains utterly unique. (JS)

#### In The Bag

THEORY/HARDGROOVE BOSS BEN SIMS TALKS RECORDS, CATALOGUE NUMBERS AND DUBPLATES

The first one is the new James Ruskin album on Tresor. It's tougher than a lot of his recent productions and it really goes down well. Rue East Versus Ben Sims is a project that I've done with Mark Broom. It's a balance between Mark's smooth, subtle sound and my rough kind of edge.

Another one with me on is Samuel L Sessions Versus Ben Sims (Hardgroove 003). I sent him the parts from the first couple of Hardgroove releases and asked him to make four tracks of his own out of them which I'm really pleased with.


The Joker 001 is something I got through the post. It uses a lot of vocal samples and it's got that real warehouse vibe. I'm really into it. I've got a dubplate of an unreleased Oliver Ho mix of Theory 008 which I've been playing a lot. I'm really into Oliver's stuff, he's got a very different edge. Also from Oliver with James Ruskin is a track called 'Mutate & Survive' (Meta 010), it's got that tribal influence with



vocals laid in the mix.

Raymond Lafour's 'Trainspotting', is a tough, tribal house track I picked up in Tag last year and it hasn't left my box since. Another dubplate is Hardgroove 004. It's a similar format to the first one, just club/warehouse grooves and it's been going down well. Symbolism 003 is another one of mine. It's got a house track on there, so I'm looking forward to seeing what the reaction is. I try to fit a bit of housey stuff into my sets as well and Halo Vargo's 'Future' (Siesta) is a particular favourite. 'Bubbles' by Tickle (House Jam) is another house track that I always play. It's from 1991 but it still sounds current now.







It seems US MCs just love a little UK production right now. The result is better than most, mainly because the Masta, while still resorting to the odd "NY to London" line, manages to sound like a truly classy MC with something to say.

# VARIOUS ARTISTS Hip Hop For Respect EP (Rawkus)

An all-star protest at the murder of Amadou Diallo by the NYPD, the 'Hip Hop For Respect' project was put together by Mos Def. The press release compares it to all-time stomach-turner 'We Are The World', but it avoids the shitpit of worthiness thanks to Outkast delivering the beat goods and the rhymers maintaining a fever pitch of righteous apoplexy throughout.

**HEXDRAGON** Da Boogaloo/Cocaine Psychosis (Meanwhile/Virgin) First release on Nellee Hooper's new label, so in theory there should be something behind this. The beat, though, sounds off, while the rhymes - except for the odd moment of toasting - are uninspired and mid-Atlantic. It's just not right, somehow.

# RONNY JORDAN FEATURING MOS DEF

A Brighter Day (Rawkus) Here, Mos has got together with Brit jazz-funk guitarist Ronny Jordan and turned himself into a supper club crooner. Sure, longevity is important and Mos has an old head on young shoulders, but it's surely not this old? Abysmal.

# **J88**

Best Kept Secret (Super Rappin'/Groove Attack) Slum Village do the bus thing on us -

just as 'Fantastic. . .' finally gets a nonbootleg release, the Detroit trio turn up again as J88. With crispy beats from Jaydee but dull rhyming, IG Culture's remix is still the high point.

# UNSUNG HEROES What Would You Do? (Scenario)

Scenario's other funky two-man production crew return. 'What. . .?' features J-Live, Mr Complex and L-Fudge and though the beat kicks, the rhymes sound slightly familiar. The winner is the guitar-funked 'Work It Out' with Siah, who seems to get more releases over here than in the States and never disappoints.

# BIG SCOOB AS JOHNNY FAMOUS

Can Du (Fully Blown, US) Uh? UH?!? Sometime Kane sideman comes back with an utterly unforgivable steal from 'Guys & Dolls' (yes, we know our musicals). It's creatively bankrupt, not even funny, yet is blowing up due to regular plays from Flex. God bless Americal

# LONE CATALYSTS

Dynomite (Super Rappin'/Groove Attack) J Sands and J Rawls return with some more of that conscious, soulful hip hop (not for nothing did Rawls produce a couple of tracks on the Black Star album). It's good quality, tasteful stuff which just occasionally leaves you wanting something a little more, um, garish. The bebop piano break on the

chorus kills it, however.

# Street Corners/The Life (Hi-Rise/Urban Glow, US)

Chicago native T.Cole has set himself quite a task - to recapture the flavour of KRS and Rakim. This debut suggests he has the potential to get at least some of the way there. He hits the beat hard and rhymes with intelligence. The production's a bit muffled, but there's something here.

# MASEO AKA MR BURN Words & Verbs (Tommy Boy Black)

Maseo rhymes! And he sounds a little lke King Of Shouting, Busta (ie, rough and gruff). It kind of works - and it fills a gap because De La haven't had anything out for yonks and the world continues to await their much delayed three album opus. The bear is on the mountain and the mountain is high. . .

# THE NEXTMEN Moving Amonast The Madness (Scenario)

First full-length from the Nextmen finds them in the fine form you'd expect having heard the singles. The highlight is Ty's 'Turn It Up. . .', but the line of the record comes from Penultimate: "I'm in your ass like sphincter". A rare-grooving head nodder of a record.

# VARIOUS ARTISTS 2001: A Rhyme Odyssey (Guidance)

Worthy but strangely uninspiring comp of underground sounds. Primeridian move it and Dr Oop twists things out of shape and nothing here is exactly poor, but it just doesn't hang together.

# VARIOUS Show Respect Here (Illasophic, US)

Another superb left coast comp put together and produced by Jizzm High Definition. Some great beats wired up by the man, plus his own unique vocal tones and contributions from both the great and good (for instance, P.E.A.C.E.) and the up-and-coming. And check 'Various Fresh MCs' - it does exactly what it says on the tint

# THE DECKWRECKA

V For Vengeance (Ronin) Agzi comes through with 28 tracks of kung fu, old skool, funk, scratching and stomping. You know the score - like his EPs only more so. 'V For Vengeance is the real deal, underlined by the fact that it could only be UKaydian yet has no MCs. Lovely.

# PEOPLE UNDER THE STAIRS

Question In The Form Of An Answer (Om)

The highly-prolific PUTS return once again and deliver a huge, 26-track album. Musically, they keep the sweet, multi-layered sample collages coming and even if they're not the most interesting group lyrically, the music carries it forward.

# Self Preservation (75 Ark)

Sometime Peanut Butter Wolf cohort and, more recently, a guest pupil at the Handsome Boy Modelling School, Encore rhymes straight up but thoughtful. If the album isn't bursting with brand new ideas, it's solid throughout and the penetrating insight of the man's lyrics elevates it to another level.



# PACE-ONE OF THE OUTSIDAZ TALKS US THROUGH THE GROUP'S DEBUT EP, 'NIGHT LIFE

"Night Life' was the title of the EP because it was what we were doing at the time. We was all getting together at night and just hanging until the break of day. Making songs, having fun. So when it came to name the EP we was like, What we doing right now?

We having a night life'.
"'Don't Look Now' starts the EP off - that's the energetic joint. 'Fuck Y'all Niggaz' features Rah Digga - she's in our crew as well as Flipmode Squad. 'It's Goin' Down' is one of them night life songs – we was up real late trying to record that. 'Rush Ya Clique' features Eminem - he in our rap group, too. Me and Eminem got a mutual friend – Bizarre. Back in 1995 we met Bizarre and we flew out to

Detroit and this little white geeky kid picked us up from the airport: 'How you doin'? My name's Marshall. . And ever since then we just been fly.

This is pure class, weaving unique samples into a rolling rhythm track that's chunky, funky and spunky, although not as dark as some of last year's efforts. Also includes the 'Friction Burns Remix' of 'Oh My God'. Indeed.

# Snap Ya Fingaz (Y2K)

Y2K's follow-up to Lock 'N' Load's massive 'Blow Ya Mind' is fellow Dutchmen Kumara's equally large monster, 'Snap Ya Fingaz'. DJ Ziad gives flipside 'Move Over' a fresh UK feel, but the remix to die for again comes from the high rolling Club Caviar.

# MAX & AMINO For Real (Alien Trax)

The Aliens are back, and they're coming to get you. 'For Real' is a neo-techhouse groove transformed with the addition of a Euro hook you'll be humming for days. On 'The Lost Plot', acidic bass collides with clever hi-hats, before a killer riff hops on board and takes it skywards. Resistance is futile.

# RR FIERCE Like Dis (DP)

One of the strongest singles yet on DP. The 'Stormin' Mix' is just that – a phat bassline wobbles on top of rattling beats, with insistent vocal chants building superbly to a hoovertastic breakdown. There's also a 'Cheesey Mix' which ain't so cheesy, actually.

# SISTER SUCK Equalise The Score (Friction Burns)

The cheekiest crew in town are "back for more" with a classic cut (the Deulalli Remix of 'Suck This') and future classic 'Equalise The Score', where thumping kicks and a bouncy bassline underpin a deluge of delightful loops, memorable riffs and infectious rap snippets. Hits the target every time.

# MUZZ & DYNAMIC INTERVENTION

We Are Here (Saucy House) Mik Cree teams up with Muzz for a single that's unoriginal, but invigorating. The 'Pumpin' Dub' is like a more polished version of 12-Inch Thumpers' classic 'Don't Cross The Line', hopping up and down like an Viagra-fuelled kangaroo.

# LISA PIN-UP

# Such A Feeling (Rock Hard) Gary Sharkie teams up with Lisa for a noisy affair with little or no groove and an over-loud vocal. Far superior is Lisa's solo effort on the B-side, 'Keep On'. A cool rolling groove triumphantly gathers momentum with punchy kicks, sharp

stabs, distant sirens and a vocal refrain that just won't quit.

# TASTY Make It Rock (Remix) (Honeypot)

Knuckleheadz' tough and funky remake of Honeypot's first release is a carefully crafted and well-executed mix that gives the always massive 'Make It Rock' a new lease of life. Nick Sentience's pounding recreation of Dynamic Intervention's 'Make Some Noise' gives the package added VFM.

# **CRISP & CHEWY**

Are You Ready? (Frisky) The eighth release on Sy's fledgling stamp adds Dutch flavoured hooks to funk-infested UK rhythms, while the more obvious flip, 'Let's Go' revolves around chunky beats and a big bassline, adding an effects-soaked old skool piano riff you'll find strangely familiar. Simple but very effective.

# BFG

# Clap Your Hands (Rude Boy Recordings)

BFG's kitchen sink-throwing style makes both mixes here too busy for their own good. The A-side gallops along frantically with all manner of familiar sounds, but there's some great percussion in there dying for breathing space.

# DBSK

Rocket Like This (Chunk) DBSK have become the darlings of the major labels, and there's something rather sweet about the 'establishment' using such a blend of thunderous kickdrums and Hellish sub-basses to sell mainstream product. 'Rocket Like This' follows DBSK's uncompromising formula, without ever being predictable. Bang it to bits, boys.

# DARLIDE

# Sandstorm (Neo)

Having spent 16 weeks atop the Finnish dance charts, producer Ville Virtanen's 'Sandstorm' now looks set to blow up all over. This is peak-time Saturday night fun, with plenty of drops and builds, a huge breakdown and a spunky acid riff and bumping bassline driving it throughout. There's an atmospheric JS:16 remix for good measure.

# Autumn (Nukleuz)

From the Nukleuz green label comes another anthem from Mauro Picotto (in collaboration here with Tillmahn Uhrmacher). # JUSTIN BOURNE & LEE JEFFRIES

Drop The Dime (Kaktai) The tenth Kaktai release, and the first not from OD404. The pair do turn up with a relatively subdued remix, blending dark

techno stabs and warped hoovers with quirky house beats. The original, meanwhile, is a more driving affair, with a full-on NRG bassline and fierce hooverage.

# THE SHRINK 2nd Opinion (Nutrition, Holland)

Treading a similar path to its predecessor, The Shrink's latest high-octane stampede of pumping NRG rhythms has multiple drops and builds, another wired and wonderful noise shrieking throughout, and a Lock 'N' Load-style head-nodding segment that causes mayhem. Need a second opinion? Ask the dancefloor.

# **GRIDLOCK 3000** Fantastic Thing (Return To

First surfacing a couple of months back on white label, and now due on the hot new imprint from those masters of all things banging, F1's Paul King and Tidy Trax' Paul Janes. 'Fantastic Thing' has one of the most unforgettable riffs you'll hear this year, a cheeky drop with an Elton John sample, followed by a roofraising eight bars of hoover madness.



# FRED NUMF VERSUS FIVE POINT 0

Three Nights In A Blue Room (Progressive)

The original mix builds to a full-on rave riff. May be too much for the purist, but great for those Gatecrasher moments. Flip it over to find Steve Porter's glorious remix, full of those current deeper underground sounds. (P)

# CIRQUE

Swerve (Weekend World) Every single release on this label is a winner. Weekend World releases are house rather than progressive. Deep, spaced-out, driving house - the sound favoured by progressive DJs to fill the first half of a long set. 'Swerve' comes with three mixes, all maintaining the same superb quality. Check this label out! (P)

# ANDY LING Fixation (Hooj)

Many will already know 'Fixation' from its original release on Fluid. Now the big boys have picked it up, remixed it and pointed it at the Top 40. Silvio Ecomo gives it the Euro tech-trance treatment, while the on-fire Slacker twist it into another eerie, rocking monster. With Tarentella Versus Redanka and the bonzer original also on board, this is one of this month's must haves. (P)

# PROTOTYPE VERSUS QUADRANT

Disillusion (Choo Choo) The third in Choo Choo's Limited series sees Sunkissed's Bill Hamel and Choo-Choo's Barry Gilbey go off on a techhouse journey. New Day Dawning (3 Beat) Cracking set of mixes here. The original has all the hallmarks of a crossover smash - uplifting progressive trance with a quirky vocal. The back on form Planet Heaven pull one of their greatest remixes out of the bag. Deep, funky bottom end layered with killer riffs and melodies. Cass & Slide expand into a more housey direction with crazed tribal rhythms and fucked up vocals. Supercool. (P)

# TERRA FERMA

The Wolf (Platipus) Lifted from the forthcoming LP, 'The Wolf' is a euphoric journey that will see the more commercial floors going potty. Not your typical Terra Ferma or Platipus sound, but there are enough hints of both to keep their fans happy. (P)

# ANGELIC

It's My Turn (Serious) Judge Jules dropped this at Progress back in February, causing Muzik's Tune Detect Eyebrow to raise. Weeks later, and thanks to a very helpful young lady at Serious, it arrived. Darren Tate has impressed us with this debut track. Amanda O'Riordan – Jules' other half – provides the superb vocal. Second single of the month, and worth bare knuckle fighting Charles Bronson for, (LLF)

# THE ACT Something About U

(Spot On) Do you like it banging? Do you like it hard? Do you sir, do you really? Seb Fontaine's label is going from strength to strength and enjoying huge DJ support, but this latest track will surpass them all. Watch it tear up the dancefloor like a Rottweiler with piles! (LF)

# SAVANNAH Spirit (Decipher)

This second track from Decipher features Mark Shimmon and Bernie Hurst. It's a well thought out and flawlessly produced trancer that apparently highlights the more commercial side of the label. Well, if this is what Mark and Bernie consider commercial, I look forward to the more underground tracks! (LF)

# NUW IDOL

Kick Drum Domination/ Not Afraid (Wellwicked) Michel Spiegel is a talented producer who is working as hard as he can to bring his style of music to the dancefloor. He has remixed several tracks that have caught our ears and this double A-side release is splendid. A slick piece of vinyl to suit those who like it a bit harder. Our favourite was 'Not Afraid' - it's well trancey and sounds incredible. (LF)

# BLANK & JONES After Love (Nebula)

At last, after hammering the import version since last year, 'After Love' deservedly gets a UK release. The Mauro Picotto mix is the one, though with his style of production, you'll either love it or hate it. We love it and anyone who has a problem with that can kiss our trance arse. (LF)

Transmission (EveNova) Alex D'Elia and Andrea Doria are Italian producers of the highest calibre, with a

futuristic edge that sticks out a mile. 'Transmission' is a dancefloor pounder that is not for the weak, with an archaic radio voice that makes it stand out from the pack. With a more progressive mix on the flip, this should please almost everyone. (LF)

# **GEMINI** Winter (Tonkin')

Wales is a mountainous place filled with sheep, sloth-rock bores and, most recently, quite a few dance producers. The twins - a mysterious duo who wear animal skins, drink blood and worship the old Gods - have created a snow-swept vision with this track. Apparently penguins have actually attacked, and killed, polar bears upon hearing this piece of music, but that shouldn't stop a major label p-p-p-picking it up. (LF)

# VARIOUS ARTISTS Whoop! 50th Release (Whoop!)

Andrew Lekker and Joel Xavier have spent six years building the Whoop! success story. With a huge following that includes industry giants like Tong, Jules and Oakenfold, Whoop! has always maintained quality. The 50th release has tracks by Tarrentella, Skynet UK and Cabala. Whoop! have many things to shout about, and should you require a night of cutting edge music, you should drop in on London's Velvet Rooms for the weekly Whoop! It Up night. (LLF)

# Dreaming (Headspace/ Pioneer)

Brian Transeau is a musical explorer on a mission. With a luminescent past, he has his sights set firmly on the future. He says "it's about making people dance", and we couldn't agree more. 'Dreaming' ushers in an inspired new direction. With the haunting vocals of Kirsty Hawkshaw and a remix by Evolution, this is the stuff dreams are made of. (LF)

# COMBAT FORCE The Fire Is Not Quenched (Triebhafte)

Jason Gallymour (Combat Force) has vested interests in analogue synthesiser technology and wholesale flower distribution! An unlikely combination that's enabled him to witness the Dutch music and horticultural scenes explode recently. 'The Fire Is Not Quenched' is hard and dark. It oozes a sinister intensity. It's great! (LF)

# SKOPE Back 'N' Front/G.O.R (Stonehouse)

Previously on Stonehouse, Jon Vesta surprised us with his 'Metabolism'. What will the label do now? Why, release another smooth slice of progressive thunder, of course. Where do they get them from? Who knows? 'G.O.R' was our preferred track, but both are excellent. (LF)

title unknown (Demonic) Following the split, Jim carries on with the Source Direct moniker, launching Demonic records with a release that lives up to the label's name. An unrelenting 'Amen' workout, driven by frenzied noise stabs and reverberating percussion outbursts. Flip for some hip hop flavoured funkiness.

# ALPHA OMEGA

Realism 2000 (Reinforced) Alpha Omega digs into the vaults for a stunning rework of 'Realism'. Setting off with a serious, mind-twisting horn lick before erupting into a hotbed of fierce, overlapping break madness and deep analogue tones. Check 'Jah Step' for some more psychotic beat manipulation, combined with old skool vocal flavours.

# DIGITAL

Natty Dread (Reinforced)

The mighty Digital has a host of solo releases lined up, and this is one of the picks of the bunch. A serious, superheavy dub excursion with echoing, tripped-out ragga licks, frenzied kicks and earthquake subs. 'Rockers' is minimal to the core, just severe beats and bassline in a workout that will turn your stomach.

# SKEPTIC

Diagram (Diagram) Latest label from the East Side/Fuze camp, concentrating on breaking fresh artists. Skeptic's debut aims for the dancefloor with its bouncy step groove, moody washes and technoid bass filters. 'Vapour' stands out with its deeper edge, a solid chugging rhythm, crisp break surges and sleazy bass hook.

# JOHN B

Hydrolysis (New Identity) One of Mr B's finest for a while, an excursion into delicate chords and seductive sax licks, tom apart by a furious barrage of distorted tones, dramatic stabs and slamming breaks. 'Xylem' opts for a driving step groove with dynamic, nervous stabs for a moody melodic technoid stamper.

STATE OF PLAY Poor Man's Dream (Aspect)

Aspect have been pouring out the soulinjected drum & bass for a while now, helped by a fine series of remixes. Here, State Of Play keep it tough and smooth with mystical vocals, technoid synths and a solid groove. Konflict take over with a nastier variation comprising the usual distorted synths and slick rhythms.

# .... PESHAY

New Jack Swing (Pivotal) This label collaboration between Phil Wells and Peshay has been running

successfully for some time now, opening up with a rather nice double pack from Quartet last year. Now it's time for Peshay to reveal all, with the traditional jazz stylings of 'New Jack Swing'. Guitar licks and double bass abound, but it's the catchy, sliding b-line and alarming funk breakdowns of 'Places And Spaces' that really makes a mark.

# ED RUSH & OPTICAL Socum (Virus)

One that has been widely anticipated, the latest double excursion from the Virus camp contains an absolute gem in the title cut, with its absorbing, insistently funky bassline and sleazy groove. The other highlight is the rough edged future funk collaboration between Optical and Trace, 'Kridian'. When it comes to that twisted analogue sound, they're still leaving the rest of the pack miles behind them.

# ....

# J YNNOL Space Off (Piranha)

Jonny L seems to get stronger and stronger. After putting out one of the highlights of recent months, the massive 'Selecta', this continues the deep, moody vibe, peppered with nasty vocal touches, dubbed-out FX and a pounding bassline that will smash the senses.

# E-SASSIN Genome (Pneuma, US)

More of that hard, west coast sound, this time from one of the country's longestserving artist/DJs. Check 'Genome' for intense, dark atmospherics building into a mammoth surge of noise distortion and thumping step beats. Flip to 'Future Shock' for further experimentation, brimming with stuttered snares and deadly analogue blasts.

# PESHAY VERSUS SPECIAL FORCES

Lethal (Photek Productions)
Here's a weird one. Photek-heads only really have the moody sparseness and grinding tones of 'Exocet' to look forward to, alongside two straight club cuts from Peshay and the stepping jazz influences of 'Freestyle'. A good DJ tool, though.

# ... DIE

Jitta Bug (Full Cycle) Die follows the enormous 'Drop Bear' with yet another storming double-header. This one's led by the bouncing tones of 'Jitta Bug', which jumps all over a steady, slapping step groove in minimal dancefloor fashion. But it's the heavy chugging intensity of 'Running Out' that comes out on top, splattered with fierce rides, neurotic noise washes and rumbling bass surges.

# DRUMSOUND/SIMON BASSLINE SMITH Plutonium (Technique)

More solid floor action from the duo to satisfy those hard steppers. Machine rhythms, moody dramatic chords and an incessant, distorted hook. 'Zeus' gets back to hardcore roots with its gloomy noise surges and slapping snare edits.

# ACETATE

# Kingsize (Emotif)

More hard-hitting, technoid offerings from Emotif. Heavy kicks, swirling electronic pads and a moody, overdriven hook provide the ingredients for a sturdy floormover in 'Kingsize'. 'Genetic Engineering' is on a similar tip but keeps the mood more upbeat with its heavy bass oscillation and bouncier beats.

# X-MEN

Bombin' (Double Zero) Second in the series of 10-inchers follows the Manchester connection but you'll have to guess for yourself who these guys are. Suffice to say, there are some Futur-istic sounds on offer with dynamic stabs working alongside a heavy subsonic grind. 'Sonic Worx' provides a more sparse dancefloor attitude with its hypnotic tones and spacious groove.



# Parklands (Full Cycle)

Always one to pull something out that's better than the norm, Suv gets deep and heavy with massive, atmospheric chords before launching into a severely sub-heavy 'Amen' groove, filled with pounding kicks and flickering electronics. Flip for some tasty, off-key rhythm work, laced with some thumping bass for a mean, minimal groove.

# THE VAGRANT Nebula (Fuze)

The ever-prolific Vagrant comes through with a stormer in 'Nebula'. Funky and hugely narcotic with its lazy chugging groove, startling atmospheric washes and virally infectious bassline, bursting into a subtle 'Amen' roll for that extra punch. Flip to 'Singularity' for some intense dark atmospherics and unrelenting bass power.

# What's it all about?

Chris Goss and Tony Coleman were making music as London Elektricity. They'd run a label before (Turn & Groove) and decided that rather than have to fight the frustrations of major labelland, they'd save themselves the hassle and put the records out themselves.

So it's just them? Well, sort of. "We'd got bogged down with admin and paperwork on our last label," explains Chris. "Hospital came about through a need for more creativity and artistic endeavour." Since then, they've picked the equally mercurial Landslide up to join the roster, but nobody else.

# Surely a two-artist label can't be a 'hip' operation?

Au contraire. If you pick up a release, you can expect to hear "high quality, deep, jazzy, drum & bass music", and with the even warmer, Latinacoustic tinge of the last few releases, that's all you really need. "We may expand if it feels right," shrugs Chris, "but for the time being, keeping things small and manageable is the right way forward." With jocks as diverse as Doc Scott, Mickey Finn and Gilles Peterson slipping their discs on the turntable, who's gonna argue?

# Should they be left on a trolley to die? Certainly not. When they

started out, "we were feeling pretty much with our backs to the wall, musically. We were feeling kinda sick." The patients, though, have become the doctors - and with albums by Landslide and London Elektricity due out before the end of the year, it's time to get admitted.





If you want something more vigorous, then 'I Can Break It Down' is king of the breaks. (CB)

FUXA/COLD HARBOURSTORES Techno Light/All That Matters Now (Rocket Girl)

Fans of Pullman and To Rococo Rot should snap up these two seven-inch singles quicker than you can say "Mmm, nice". Both ripple gently with campfire acoustics and criss-cross between Ry Cooder territory and Tortoise's playroom. Superb. (CB)

FEMI KUTI

Black Man Know Yourself (Sofa Surfers Remix) (Sound Of Barclay, France) Of various remixers here, its Vienna's Sofa Surfers who best rise to the challenge. Their 13-minute excursion into dark downtempo beats positively growls with menace, lending the chorus a chilling sense of revolution-on-the-boil.

UNFORSCENE Tall Girl (Kudos)

Be afraid, be thrilled, (CB)

A debut from a Bristol trio who have clearly been taking in all the latest Pork and G-Stone sounds. 'Tall Girl' is widescreen chill out that's as intimately funky as it is potently filmic, while Jimpster's remix taps into the increasingly popular retro Eighties jazz-funk vibe with great panache. (CB)

SIDEWINDER Flight EP (Fenetik)

The producer of Slam's radio show is galaxies away from the DJ pair's own sound. Instead, Sidewinder's Alan Bryden goes for an Afro-tinged jazzuality that works a treat on 'Flight', where Spiritual Life vibes collide in slow motion with the laidback attitude of Jazzanova. (CB)

SOLAR SPIRIT Spirit EP1 (Stoned Asia)

Proving that Ibiza isn't all cheesy trance, DJ Pathaan has been quietly pioneering the more ambient/world-beat end of things at Kumharas and his own Stoned Asia night in Brixton. 'Asiatronic' is a spaced out tabla groove complete with drifting flutes and effects, while 'Haunting' and 'OM' are in a more dubbed-out downbeat style. Recommended. (PM)

THE MEN FROM ATLANTIS

Orchestral EP (Hombre) Buck-wild hip hop stomping and sketching that's been at the moonshine for longer

than is healthy. 'Heavy Water' boasts Quincy homs and soundtrack glory, while '100 Ft Breaker' is freaky-deaky and sitarloopy. If all instrumental hip hop had this much insane bravado, the world would be a bouncier place. (CB)

UP BUSTLE & OUT

Hip Hop Barrio (Ninja Tune) This should win over anyone who's previously found UBO's pan-global partyisms a little flaccid. 'Hip Hop Barrio' is jazz in the present tense, hip hop for the future, grounded on obscenely phat beats and rocking out like a Harlem block party with Jimmy Smith on the organ and DJ Premier on the decks. Large. (CB)

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Four Fish Out Of Water (Rex) Four exclusives from four artists who've helped make Rex one of the most exciting prospects for 2000. Op:I Bastards are a pissed off Jimi Tenor, DJ Downfall peddles the darkest monster breaks and Jean-Michel is just plain weird, but it's the Avalanches' soundclash with Andy Votel, all magical analogue melancholy, which is the real winner. (CB)

JUNKBOY Robot & Proud EP (Moshi Moshi)

'Smart Guy' is the sound of Kraftwerk booted onto the 21st century dancefloor, and should get the German OAPs scurrying back to their rest home. By contrast, 'Feel So Low' wallows majestically in the post-rock stream. tearful yet joyous. No junk, no funk, just truly original creations. (CB)

... APE

Honey Drunk Drool (Sirkus) This is Ape's first new release for quite some time, having spent the last couple of years composing film music. Featuring Jhelisa on vocals, dubbed out guitars and mellow chords are wrapped around her voice to give this a spaced out, country feel. A record with massive potential, expect to hear it on national

radio very soon. (PM)

OTTMAR LIEBERT Innamorare, Summer Flamenco (Epic)

Anyone who's a fan of the sublime new-Med anthem 'Waiting 4 Stars 2 Fall' will be trembling in anticipation of this. Unfortunately, apart from the nicely chilled 'Farewell 2 Summer', most of the tracks are just inoffensive holiday programme muzak. Good news for Judith Chalmers, not so good for us. (PIVI)

KENNETH SHERMAN Why Can't We Live Together (white label)

From the Euro-Balearic version by Illusion to Sade's sultry soul interpretation, this Timmy Thomas classic has been covered innumerable times. Kenneth Sherman's version is a midtempo disco groover featuring his high pitched vocals over a funky bassline. Something you'd expect to hear in the more Balearic-inclined clubs such as Aficionado. (PIM)

Albums

MUIM Yesterday Was Dramatic -Today Is OK (TMT

Entertainment, Iceland) One of two Mums this month, this Icelandic quartet break up their brittle. abstract beats with peals of ultra-cute melodica, glockenspiel and celestial piano. If Plone were produced by Dr Rockit, they might sound something like this. An album of infinite beauty and strange power. (CB)

BUSCEMI

Our Girl In Havana (Downsall Plastics, Belgium)

One of those catch-all eclectic albums, Buscemi leaves no dancefloor turn unstoned as he mixes batucada, Latin and salsa into offbeat house, downtempo and junglist grooves. What it lacks in originality, it makes up for in sheer exuberant swagger and fizz-bomb energy. DJs looking for a hidden gem to baffle the opposition, gather round. (CB)

TARWATER Animals Suns & Atoms (Kitty-Yo, Germany)

Electronica with a sinister edge that exhudes a wiry, soporific beauty. Tarwater's latest is the sound of the Velvet Underground translated into 21st century death poems. But its dub sensitivity and interwoven moods of langour and pain make for an album that's as exhilarating as it is challenging. (CB)

MUM

Mum (Klein, Austria)

Very different from the Mum who have come from Iceland (see above), this lot take every conceivable angle on the Hammond organ, from block-rocking jams to the purest stoned chill out grooves, dusted with analogue trickery. Vienna's skunk supply must be fearsome indeed if these mothers' debut is anything to go by. (CB)



SO WHO THE HELL ARE .. THE DEADBEATS?

Dirty, good for nuttin' losers, presumably? Well, actually they are good for at least one thing. Last year's 'Lounging' album was a tasty mix of chilled soul, ice-cool hip hop and blunted beats.

So who are these bums, then? Ged Day, who works at Warp Records, and Damian Stanley, who fixes video equipment. Of 'Lounging', Ged confesses, "It was make or break time. We'd decided that if we didn't do anything off this album, we'd go and get proper jobs." Sadly, although the album tickled the Technics of everyone who heard it, they've gone and got proper iobs anyway.

How can we get them back into musical employment then? For starters, by buying their new single, 'Pick Me Up' by the bucketload. After all, it's got Wyclef Jean's brother rapping on it.

Wyclef Jean!? Of the Fugees? Are you sure? Ah, sorry, no. In fact it's lost British r&b man Wycliffe's brother. The press release got the two confused. At least this means there's nobody repeatedly shouting "one-two" at you.

Sounds like a shaggy dog story to me. Funny you should say that. Deadbeats' singles always end with wind-ups featuring someone impersonating ragga man Shaggy. Demand for the last single's Shaggy-shops-at-Fortnum-&-Mason sketch even overshadowed the excellent music on the rest of the EP.

## DJ ZINC The 138 Track (Tru Plavaz)

Hidden away on the triple pack Tru Playaz drum & bass album of yesteryear was this extra special breakbeat cut, at - you guessed it - 138bpm. Finally, a bona fide 12inch release will bring this priceless cut to its proper audience. Using all the production precision you'd expect from a d&b master, Zinc throws in diamond hard beats and a diabolical bassline for a track that will excite the two-step massive as much as the breakbeat police. The urban underground has spoken. Take heed.

# RENNIE PILGREM & UBERZONE Black Widow (TCR)

TCR boss hog Pilgrem keeps up his run of good form, hooking up with one of the States' most famous breakbeat sons for a transatlantic soundclash that made a huge impact at its debut airing in Miami. Aside from the trademark sub-bass judder, it's the tribal drums on the original and the more 4/4 Uberzone mix that will make this appeal to a wider scope of DJs such as Cox, Robertson and Cartier, Fantastic.

# GROOVE ARMADA If Everybody Looked The

Same (Icey Remix) (Pepper) The Armada's label desperately tries to plug the gap between original releases with a set of remixes that range from pretty to pretty pointless. This page concerns itself with DJ Icey's breaks-lite reworking of the chaps' first single, and dislikes its lazy, cheddary MOR approach. Must try harder.

# WISE WOMEN

Hand Of Dog (Freakaboom) Ambient backroom breakbeat that comes across as relaxed to the point of torpor. It's in no hurry to go anywhere, and none but the herbally patient will wait for it to get there. Not as strong as the last single, then, but still a label to watch.

# NATHAN COLES Plip Plop You Don't Stop (The End)

Another track from Mr C's fantastic '100% Unreleased' compilation, by another of the sarf east London tech syndicate. Sometime Matthew B collaborator Coles takes a leaf out of the Bushwacka book, and does a twostepping electronic breakbeat 4/4 shuffle all at once without ever tripping over. One to rock all manner of dancefloors.

# MR C & TOM PARRIS

Searchin' (Plink Plonk) Reviewed here to highlight the typically excellent Matthew B reworking, which the man himself professes to be one of his favourite remixes. Warm synth sounds over an electro-funk groove that will do the business from Detroit to Deptford. The original 4/4 mix is a cracker as well. Class.

# VARIOUS ARTISTS Old School Versus New School 2 sampler (Jive Flectro)

Where the splendid Freq Nasty takes 'Sound Of The Police' - one of the finest hip hop tracks ever - and threatens to rip the arsehole out of the dancefloor. Naturally. The aggression of KRS-One's delivery is more than matched by a buckfunking, bogling breakbeat and trademark bassline snarl. Jackal & Hyde's jacking techno bass beefs up Kid Rock's 'Pimp Of The Nation' on the flip.

# WAYWARD SOUL DJ Friendly (PIAS)

Party breaks with a menacing edge. Wayward Soul records could never be accused of being happy, but this does have the hint of a smile flickering over its scarred face. Normal service is resumed on the flip with Serum and its quasi-Chuck D/Disposable Heroes rhetoric over an unrepentant bassline and crunching beats. A disc jockey's chum.

# VARIOUS ARTISTS Battlecreek II (Illicit)

Spearheaded as ever by the hotly tipped Deadly Avenger, 'Battlecreek II' is a fat beat-orgy par excellence, with the Illicit hosts being joined by The Wiseguys, Organic Audio and blushing debutant, Dynamo Productions. Pick of the bunch is the midtempo electro of the Avenger's 'Fast As Daddy Love'. A cool series that will run and run.

All Blues (Botchit & Scarper) Known as Two Sinners on the Mechanoise label, Teked have to be applauded for bringing a vocal element and an old school drum & bass feel to the table. The odd tempo - pitched somewhat faster than the traditionalist would like - and the lack of dancefloor edge marks this one down as a home listening affair. Which is no bad thing.

# Desanitize (Acetate)

The first release from the Acetate label had joyous DJs jumping in the aisles, and the second release on the label will have the same effect, only more so. Progressive breakbeats at their best, synth sounds, booming beats, and one helluva sub-bassline join forces to take you to that much discussed, mythical other level'. Friction, Tyrant and Bedrock fans take special note.

# REBEL CREW Tangle Wit Me (Sunburn Recordings)

Before breakbeat pioneers Hardkiss begin their UK tour, they've decided to unleash the Rebel Crew from their San Fran homeland for some old skool electro bizniz for the breakers. With the traditional American disregard for the bassline, 'Tangle Wit Me' messes illadvisedly with Bontempi beats and what sounds suspiciously like Arab chanting. All that sun must be going to their heads.

# SHANKS & DK Assassin Star (R&S)

The erratic duo are turned over and given a firm acidic frugging by Rennie Pilgrem, though even he can't disguise the weak vocals. The dub mix sees Rennie trying out every new toy in his studio while leaving the tape on 'Record'. Not an essential release, but it might find favour on less picky dancefloors.

# Shack Up (OST Recordings) Following in the elegant footseps of Ashley Beedle's Black Science Orchestra, Theo Wiseguy remixes this classic cut for

the ever-thoughtful OST label. A healthy respect for the original restricts him rather sensibly to just beefing up the breaks. Designed for proper start-of-the-evening, head-nodding, get-in-the-groove type behaviour this is on limited release, so get vour bids in early.

# **PSYCHOTROPIC** Back From The Dead EP (Fruitbeard)

An apt title for these hardcore chaps from times gone by, who are cut to prove that old skool heroes never die, they just smoke bigger chillums. Frank Sentus throws sci-fi effects and Sergio Leone into the soup to mildly diverting dancefloor effect, but the real gem is the beautiful downtempo chill out future classic, 'Errand Boy'. Epic.

# **EUPHORIA** Delirium (Remixes) (Six Degrees)

Blissed-out beats with an Eastern flavour courtesy of stellar remix work from State

Of Bengal, Mi7, and the ever excellent Fila Brazillia. Only State Of Bengal stir themselves sufficiently for an experimental drum & bass workout, but it's no surprise that the chilled out chug from Hull's finest, Fila Brazillia, is the best on offer.

# MATTHEW B Presents Cellar Dwellas (Plank)

Fresh from tearing up dancefloors all over the world, 'Cellar Dwellas' is a nine-track LP cut primarily for home listening. Though there are dancefloor-oriented grooves in attendance, the beatless strut of 'Ambient Dub', the electronic experimentation of 'Here Us Now', and the hip hop vibe of 'Bluntski' attest to more domestic intentions. More proof of the diversity and brilliance Matthew B possesses in spades.





Produced very much in the modern Rodney Jerkins/Shekespere style, the track retains enough individuality to stand out.

# CARL THOMAS I Wish (Bad Boy, US)

Around on promo just before Christmas this track is finally getting a release. Very basic production - just a beat and some falling piano chords - provides the perfect foundation for some inspired singing. A classy little single which is definitely worth your money. ....

# Only You (Bad Boy Remix) (Bad Boy, US)

For almost three years this track has been one of the biggest records in the r&b world and still draws a roar of approval whenever it's played out. Amazingly, it's never actually seen a UK release but for those of you who missed out, it's available once again on an American re-issue 12-inch. If you want to hear 112, Biggie, Ma\$e and Bad Boy Records at the peak of their powers here's your chance. An absolute classic.

# TC FEATURING MISSY ELLIOTT

# Take That (East West promo, US)

A new male vocalist from Missy Elliot's camp with one of the best tracks of the month. From the very first listen, this guitar-sample based track gets you, with TC demonstrating a distinctive vocal style. Missy proves once again that with or without Timbaland she can always come up with the goods. An album is due out in August.

# COMMON

The 6th Sense (Something U Feel) (MCA promo, US) One of the few tracks on Common's blinding new album 'Like Water For Chocolate' not produced by JD and Ummah. Produced by DJ Premier and built upon a piano sample, this is real quality. If you like Mos Def then you have to check out Common's album, which is easily his best to date and generally one of the best hip hop albums of the year so far.

# Time (Remix) (MCA promo,

The best track from Mary's last album is remixed, but not too radically. Retaining its nagging Al Green-sampled drum pattern, the main addition is the appearance of a rap from newcomer Quasar. A good club track.

Featuring various rare Mary tracks, including such tasty morsels as the recent Mobb Deep remix of 'Deep Inside', Mary's version of the Angie Stone song 'Everyday' and, from way back when, the remix of "Lave U" from her second album featuring Smith & Wessun. Naughty but very nice and it's certainly worth tracking a copy down.

# ANGEL LEE What's Your Name (360/WEA promo)

A UK hip hoppy, r&b track from a new female singer that really grows on you. Remixed by Artful Dodger and Black Jack, but the haunting original album version (no producer credit given) is still the best. A strong song with some original production touches. It would be interesting to hear some more.

# DWAYNE WIGGINS Strange Fruit (Motown promo, US)

The ex-Tony Toni Tone member releases the first single from his debut solo album. A very nice song with a mixture of live and programmed production that exemplifies all the best things about Tony Toni Tone. Not exactly a version of the Billie Holiday classic but using elements of that song, this is overall a slick piece of work. However, it's unlikely we're alone in wishing Wiggins and the other ex-Tony singer Raphael Saadiq would get back to working with one another.

# BIG SCOOB AS JOHNNY FAMOUS

Can Du (white label, US) Following on from Jay Z and Craig Mack, this is another track built around a chorus sample from a Broadway musical and is apparently a big radio and club track in New York. Not quite as good as Craig Mack's track but if the rumours are true and his main competitor is having difficulties with sample clearance, then Big Scoob may clean up. Whatever, this must surely be the final record in this vein. Please.

# LYNDEN DAVID HALL Sleeping With Victor/Used To Be Perfect (Cooltempo promo, UK)

A nice package with a bit of originality to the production. The main track gives a definite nod to 'Around The World In A Day'-era Prince, and is helped by a breakbeat-driven Dual Control remix Even better though is 'Used To Be Perfect', a track whose backing is almost dancehall in its rhythm and which has a nifty 'My Jamaican Guy'-style riff on piano. Good stuff.

## TONI BRAXTON

The Heat (LaFace/Arista) After a prolonged absence, Toni Braxton returns with a new album that matches her sexy new image. Like Whitney and Mariah, Ms Braxton has swung away from the middle of the road to a more urban sound, produced in the main by Rodney Jerkins. While the growing popularity of the first single 'He Wasn't Man Enough' shows that she's more than capable of doing this sort of stuff, it's when you hear her let loose on the

traditional Braxton ballads like 'Spanish Guitar' that you're reminded just how great her voice is. Overall a strong album and of the quality we've come to expect from LaFace.

# VARIOUS ARTISTS Romeo Must Die (Virgin)

Every year there's one outstanding soundtrack among the usual dross. This year, this album is the one. Produced by Timbaland for the new Aaliyah/Jackie Chan movie vehicle, it's well up to the standard Timbaland set for himself with his 1998 Dr Doolittle soundtrack. Indeed it's worth it for the trio of new Aaliyah tracks (including a duet with DMX). Add to this new tracks from Destiny's Child - produced by an interesting newcomer called Geo - and Ginuwine and it becomes irresistible. Even the bailads are good.



# **Buried Treasure**

ONE OF PUFFY'S GREATEST CREATIONS FROM BAD BOY'S GOLDEN YEARS IS RE-RELEASED AT LAST

# ONE OF THE biggest tunes on the r&b scene since the day it was released, 112's 'Only You' (Bad Boy Remix) has finally seen a re-release, albeit on a US import. It's strange that this absolute anthem has never been officially released in Britain, even though in clubs it's still greeted with cheers over three years after its release.

Listening to it today there's a heavy air of melancholy hanging over this tune. At the time of its release, the record summed up all the youthful arrogance and promise of Puff Daddy's Bad Boy empire. This is encapsulated in Puff

Daddy's heroic bragging - "I thought I told you we won't stop!" - at the track's start, before Notorious BIG launches into one of the best raps of his career, matching playa bravado with breath-taking delivery. 112 then croon in with a heartfelt, perfectly harmonised song. The final touch is the big stage debut of Ma\$e, who


never sounded better.

The video, meanwhile - with the whole crew cruising down Broadway in an open top people carrier - was so popular on The Box video channel that it remained on the playlist for literally years.

The sadness is that for all those involved, things never seemed so good again. Notorious BIG was dead soon after 'Only You' was released, 112 would never have such a good song again and Ma\$e would eventually decide to concentrate on God rather than his musical career. Puffy continues, but for him and Bad Boy, other than the odd flash of inspiration, it's been a question of diminishing returns.

But you can never write him off and just for tracks like this you'll always have to respect him. If you don't own a copy do yourself a favour and hunt one down.

JIMMY COBB So Nobody Else Can

Hear (Expansion) One of the most sought-after jazz/soul albums, from 1983, finally receives a justified reissue. Fittingly, it appears on the UK's finest purveyor of everything soulful and more, Expansion Records, Featuring the gorgeously infectious vocals of Gregory Hines, accompanied by Freddie Hubbard, Marilyn Redfield and a cameo from Bill Cosby, this really is a hidden gem, unearthed for all to sayour, and a superb example of something that has truly stood the test of time.

ANGIE STONE

Life Story (Arista/Devox) You should by now have got yourself around the lady's debut maxi 'Black Diamond'. If you haven't then shame on you as you are missing one of the true voices of the nu-age soul movement. 'Life Story' is one of those head-nodding midtempo grooves, with a tune that you'll be whistling on the tube. Raw and stripped to the bone, it really is something to be reckoned with, and should, by rights, push Ms Stone into major chart action.

DAISY HICKS Don't Even Go There (Concept Music)

Ms Hicks' influences are soul, jazz, funk and disco, but here she delivers an average performance in an r&b style, and sounds like most of the singers on this circuit. The tune is pleasant, but nothing to write home about. Now if those influences could be brought out a bit more then it might be a whole new ball game.

EAST WEST CONNECTION Rollin' (Mixes) (Chilli Funk)

One of the most requested cuts from the trio's debut album finally sees the light of day with a rewash from Ballistic Brother Ashley Beedle. The man ups the pace and his 'Black Science' mix puts this slice of modern jazz-funk firmly on the main dancefloor. This is another delightful case of 'soulful music for funky people' and should not be ignored at any cost.

Sampler (Gee Street/V2)

A sweet taste of Harlem from a talented young man who began his musical career at the tender age of four, before giving a series of ecstatic appearance with the world renowned Boys Choir Of Harlem. 20 years later he's again stunning the music world with this taster from his forthcoming album, 'Soul Catcher'. He has a wonderful voice, individual and absolutely the real thing.

LACARNO & BURNS Love The Rain (white label)

This London due have built a reputation as the producers to keep an eye on with their hypnotic, soul dance grooves. This infectious slab of soul features the alluring vocals of the previously unknown Jehlazz, sighing over Latino funk beats and a tough bassline that makes you head straight for that floor.

SOULCAMP

Que Onda (Soulcamp) The second single from this Berlin-based outfit delivers the real deal. From a country that is more at home with distinctly unsculful mechanical beats, the hints of Latin that float in and out of this superb beat track really are a great surprise and give us a new insight into the soulfulness of central Europe.

CAROL THOMPSON

Flying (Victor, Japan) Released last year in Japan only, this has taken quite some time to track down. A perfect mix of soul and some floating reggae, it deserves to be aired despite its scarcity. Faultless soulful performance by Carol and why she isn't on a major label in the UK, we'll never know. Seek it out,

VARIOUS ARTISTS Strange Games & Funky Things 3 (Barely Breakin' Even)

One thing you can depend on from the BBE crew is class. Everything you ever wanted on the Quality Black Music tip is featured here, including the mammoth 11 minute plus opus of Herbie Hancock's 'Stars in Your Eves'. Crammed full of well collectable goodies from yesteryear, it really is a joy to behold, and is worth a place on anybody's turntables.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Urban Essentials 2

(Stonegroove)

Second compilation of the cream of today's r&b talent put together with love and affection by DJ Bigger. Like its predecessor, this album showcases artists who demand to be taken seriously. Carl Henry, Ola and Blacksmith should be up there in the big league, and maybe with Craig David scoring the big one, the doors will finally open for the rest.

SYLEENA JOHNSON

Love, Pain & Happiness (Jive) Ms Johnson has no need to fear being in the shadow of her famous dad, Syl Johnson - one of the voices of the Memphis. This is superb musically, and so deep vocally - the lady cannot do a thing wrong. Somewhere between Badu and Aretha, Syleena is unique and delivers something faultless and unmissable.

**EN VOGUE** Album (Elektra)

Haven't heard much from the ladies of late, and the time when they were top of the tree is passed. This 'comeback' is alright, but I fear that they are trying to be too fancy for their own good. Sometimes it works but the overall feeling is so-so. Maybe they have to sit down and make some new plans. . .

LEDISI

Soulsinger (LeSun Music) Here, a real talent for vocalising jazz soul is brought to our attention. Her vocals hit

the spot and her range is so incredible that it could shatter glass. The songs are extremely infectious and for once the production gets the balance just right. Another unmissable talent to keep our

eyes on.

VARIOUS ARTISTS The Desco Funk 45 Collection Part 2 (Desco)

Forgive my ignorance but I don't actually remember Part 1, but then Desco are

one of New York's best kept secrets. As the title suggests, this is 100% top grade, f-u-n-k from some of the movers and shakers from their Desco, Soul Fire and Robin Sound collections.

VARIOUS ARTISTS


Disco Juice (Counterpoint) Here we move into Harlem to rediscover the infectious sounds provided by P&P Records. This underground collective survived for eight years from 1976 and provided us with some of the most wanted tunes on the planet. Unlike their neighbours, P&P's rhythms were very ruff 'n' ready, incorporating soulful Latin and Afro-funk beats. At last this collectable

motif has a new lease of life. One to savour, no problem.

KEITH AILER Spaces And Places (Jazzateria)

You have to admire artists like Keith Ailer who, regardless of trends, produce beautiful music full of feeling and emotion. This is an out and out jazz vocal set, on the downbeat tip, but what makes this so special is the man's ability to express his feelings, without any frills and glitter to hide what is meant to be heard. This is full of musical goodness deep and then some.



# **Producer Profile**

What were your first and latest productions?

My first major production was the SYLK130 album, 'When The Funk Hits The Fan'. I just completed the follow up, 'Re-Members Only'.

If you could work with anyone - alive or dead who would it be?

It's funny, this album gave me an opportunity to work with almost all of my heroes – Alison Moyet, Martin Fry, Kathy Sledge, De La Soul. But I've always wanted to work with Mark Hollis from Talk Talk.

Your new album features unusual collaborations what's all that about?

This was the opportunity to put some of my heroes' voices in a new light. Like the Alison Moyet track is very organic and lush and the Martin Fry track is very Prince-ish.

What sort of reaction are you hoping for?

I just want everyone to approach this as part two of the first album. Also, to all the fans of the guests, keep an open mind. You won't hear 'Poison Arrow' part two - this is SYLK130 baby!"

KING BRITT

Are 'techno' and 'soul' a lot closer than people think? The word 'techno' is derived from the word 'technology'. Since I've been listening to soul music, technology has been a crucial part in the music - Herbie Hancock,

Afrika Bambaataa, Maze, Miles - they all used technology to push the boundaries of soul.

What kind of music is influencing you at present? 4Hero, Stereolab, Ursula Rucker, Kelis and Arto Lindsay all are stimulating the system.

How would you describe your production sound? "Sexy, dreamy and always funky!"

What else is coming up in 2000 for King Britt?

I am very proud of the production on the ROSE project, she's a talented young lady from Holland. Just finished remixes for Neon Fusion, I:Cube, and Silent Poets. The new SYLK130 and soon the new SCUBA Project. Also a mix CD on Dynamite Joint Recordings that will be out in the summer.



# Singles

## MAPSTATION

Mapstation (Soul Static Sound) A five-track EP from To Rococo Rot's Stefan Schneider, who strips his band's already spartan sound to an austere minimum. Each track features just one or two instruments in a slowly evolving loop: mechanical it may be, but it's also very atmospheric, if slightly low on tunes.

# **ICARUS**

UL-6 (Output)

From hyperspeed breaks and ominous field recordings to a track comprised wholly of samples from well-known pop tunes, everything about this record is highly unusual. Even the cover looks like something you'd fish out of a hospital skip. Like the majority of Output's, um, output though, it's well worth investigating.

## PIANO MAGIC

Panic Amigo (Morr Music) Thomas Morr's Morr Music label has released a wealth of excellent melodic electronica. This latest from the prolific Piano Magic sees their warm, emotive pop tunes tastefully retouched with gentle breakbeats by Rephlex's Ensemble Denmark's Future 3, Isan and Opiate, who's now working with Björk (but don't let that put you off). Lovely.

# Albums

Pop (Mille Plateaux) 'Pop'? On Mille Plateaux? If we inhabited one of those improbably lush Star Trek planets where your every wish is made flesh, this latest collection of nastoral, vapourous ambience from Cologne's Wolfgang Voigt would indeed be shooting up the charts in place of the poisonous banality we're accustomed to.

THE DYLAN GROUP

Buy this album and change the world. . .

Ur-Klang Search (Bubblecore) Are there are any young Americans with interesting facial hair out there who don't play in bands that sound like Tortoise? Vibes, marimba, sun-kissed jazzy chord progressions. . . you get the picture. It's not bad, but the more experimental leanings on last year's 'Ramda' by Mice Parade (drummer Adam Pierce's spin-off) showed that they're capable of better.

# VARIOUS ARTISTS

Alt Frequencies 4 (Worm Interface)

From the four corners of the Earth come the post-'pusher, apres-Aphex hordes. Sweden's Plod are Boards Of Canada with a comedy accent; Freeform is, he'd like us to know, "a bad mutherfucker" and Canada's Meek are a bashful Autechre. The real star, though, is Japan's Himuro, who is obviously deranged.

## FUNKSTÖRUNG

Appetite For Disctruction (!K7) Funkstörung may once have been the world's premier Autechre tribute band but since remixing Björk, Wu-Tang Clan and others they seem to have found a new voice. Or, more accurately, three new voices, as a trio of guest vocalists add gruff raps and breathy trilling to the Munich duo's trademark polyrhythmic digital precision. A good idea hampered by heavy-handed execution.

# TELE:FUNKEN A Collection Of Ice Cream

Vans Vol 2 (Domino) This sounds like it was recorded in a pre-war telephone exchange with noises supplied by the BBC Radiophonic Workshop and off-kilter melodies by US arthouse legends, The Residents. It's actually the work of Brum resident Tom Fenn, whose friends include Broadcast and Plone. His idiosyncratic analogue pop is reminiscent of both but sounds like neither. If you see what we mean.

## ....

# DAVID SHEA & SCANNER Free Chocolate Love (Sub Rosa)

Neo-exotica? Retro-futurism? Whatever you want to call it, this re-evaluation of easy listening 'themes' - space age bachelor pad music, laid back Latin etc is mercifully free of the tiresome 'aren'twe-ironic' kitsch you'd associate with Mike Flowers and his ilk. Even more surprising, for a project involving Scanner, is that it's also quite entertaining.

# ICEBREAKER Distant Early Warning (Aesthetics)

In an idle moment not spent bombing Iraq or killing civilians in Kosovo, NATO set up an arts-funding body called NATOarts. This album, inspired by remote Arctic radar stations, is one of its first fruits. Based around solemn organ, subdued electronics and melancholy Pan American-style dub effects, it's as bleak, compelling and picturesque as a burning oilfield.

# FOEHN

Hidden Cinema Soundtrack (Fat Cat Splinter Series) The title of Debbie Parsons' third album is particularly apt. 'Hidden Cinema. . .' is like falling through a hole in the road and waking up in an unfamiliar, grainy netherworld populated by sinister grotesques and monsters from the id (a bit like Hoxton Square). Mixing electronics with piano, cello, trumpet and found sound, it's as beguiling as a recurring dream.

# KID SPATULA

Full Sunken Breaks (Planet µ) Another alias for Mike Paradinas (see also µ-ziq, Tusken Raiders), who has the uncanny knack of writing seven different tunes into a single track, then setting them about the head with exquisitely programmed turbo-gabba breakbeats A riotous return to form, this will scare seven shades out of coffee-table dabblers won over by the more palatable orchestrations of his previous album 'Royal Astronomy'. Superb.

## ENSEMBLE

Sketch Proposals (Rephlex) A new Anglo-French, girl/boy 'denatured pop' duo from the Rephlex camp. The 12 'proposals' feature Chanelle's plaintive baby-doll vocals over rhythms seemingly beaten out by flies trapped against a windowpane. It has the same selfeffacing charm as Iceland's Múm, or erstwhile indie shoegazers Slowdive backed by a heavily sedated Aphex Twin.

# VARIOUS ARTISTS

Sonig Comp (Sonig) Sonig is co-owned by Mouse On Mars, whose joyous blend of high-brow

avantgardism and future pop sensibility reached its peak on last year's 'Niun Niggung' album. But this label showcase tends toward the academic, with only Lithops and MOM themselves hanging their excellent processed sounds on anything resembling accessibility. A pity.

# CONJOINT

Earprints (Source)

Vibes, complex progressions. . . hang on, that was The Dylan Group. Conjoint, unlike the plaid-shirt post-rockers, apply their jazz dexterity (nice) to a techno aesthetic, producing music to accompany fine cognac and cheroots on a luxury cruise to Bolarus 5. We'd hate to use the word 'fusion', but if the cap fits. .

# KID 606 & FRIENDS

Volume 1 (Tigerbeat6) He's come out of nowhere (well, California) has already made records for numerous labels, and as Hrvatski, one of the 'friends' on this album of remixes and collaborations, notes, "he's only 19". Elsewhere, underground luminaries such as Matmos, DHR's Christoph De Babalon and Max Tundra provide furious breakbeat. glitch electronics and twisted pop. Grrr.

ZAN LYONS Desolate (Foundry)

If you've heard either of Lyons' two EPs you'll know the score: creeping strings, brittle melodies and dark, distorted drum & bass rhythms. 'Serial Killer Stories', 'Demon' and 'Oblivion' are all frightfully scary. . . except they're not, really, and this kind of hammy, B-movie horror has already been done with added psychotic panache by Panacea.

# ..

BEIGE I Don't Either (Leaf)

As every good Cologne minimalist knows, a well-placed click or finely-honed bleep can be every bit as exciting as the rawest Seventies funk riff. But Oliver Braun's gone one better and expertly combined the two on an album that's as tight as Bootsy's codpiece and as fanciful as George Clinton's views on space travel

# So Who The Hell Is. . . Kid 606?

Well. . .? No. actually, he's "tired, sick and turning German" after a brace of gigs in Hamburg and Berlin. But he's also the San Diego-born boy wonder who's injecting some snotty punk attitude into experimental electronica.

What does he sound like? After early experiments with gabba and hardcore, Mr 606 discovered the joys of malfunctioning technology and began producing tracks with his friends Lesser and Matmos: "Broken down Autechre crap. Skippety, glitchy stuff that we started making songs with".

Songs? Yes. The Kid is keen to dissociate his music from "shitty DJs who start getting praise because they just play to people who are fucked up".

# So what's his alternative?

"We can use electronic sounds, randomness and digital processing to make emotional music," he reckons. A chorus of agreement has been raised from some unlikely quarters; not least Faith No More's Mike Patton, who's releasing Kid 606's first "proper" album 'Down With The Scene' on his Ipecac label.

What else? Plenty. A remix album 'Kid 606 & Friends' on his own label Tigerbeat6 is out now; an album for Mille Plateaux and an EP for Kit Clayton's Musork Orthlong are forthcoming. Oh, and there's a 3-inch CD tribute to NWA.

Last words? "I have to make music to justify the fact that I don't do anything else."

ONE of New York's hottest house and garage teams, production duo John Ciafone and Lem Springsteen - aka Mood Il Swing - have been working together since 1992. Effortlessly creating anthems for the underground and the charts alike, their birth followed an aborted r&b project with Masters At Work's Little Louie Vega. The MAW connection proved invaluable in helping them launch their career. Springsteen co-wrote Barbara Tucker's 'Beautiful People' with Vega and went on to write many classic

Ciafone and Springsteen's first release was 'Helpless' in the guise of Urbanized. Featuring vocals from Silvano, the track appeared on Max Records in 1992 and was one of the year's underground garage anthems. They cemented their burgeoning reputation n 1993 with the classic 'Critical' as Wall Of Sound on Eightball - released through Positiva in the UK. Further Wall Of Sound cuts on Eightball included 'Run To Me' and 'Penetration' in 1994 as Mood II Swing Featuring Carol Sylvan. They continued to rock dancefloors with 'Closer' on King Street released by Red Cat in the UK. The Swing II Mood dub went on to become an all time classic on London's pirate stations and is still in demand today.

Equally sought after and another recommended classic is Mood Il Swing's 'Call Me' on Music For Your Ears. Released in 1995, it

had a big impact on many UK garage and house producers. There were also two remix twelves of 'Call Me', the second of which was limited to 500 copies on red vinyl.

In 1996, John Ciafone assumed the Mood II Swing crown and released two classic EPs through Groove On, 'I See You Dancing' and 'Do It Your Way'. Both are excellent.

John Ciafone has also been busy outside of Mood II Swing, releasing material under the names Full Swing and Chiapet. As Full Swing, he released the classic 'Choices' / 'Freestyle Groove' in 1993 on Strictly, which was re-released on Groove On in 1996. In between these you'll find 'I Need To See You Soon' on Strictly Rhythm and 'Be Yourself', on Defender's 'It's A DJ Thing' (Volume Five) in 1997. As Chiapet, Ciafone has taken the dubbier end of Mood II Swing in a much darker direction. 1997's 'Tick Tock' on Deep Dish's Yoshitoshi imprint was picked up in the UK by Phonography and released as a double pack with remixes by artists such as Two Lone Swordsmen and Herbert. And last year he released the equally brooding 'Westworld', also on Yoshitoshi.

Mood II Swing's initial success came via their production work with Loni Clark on Nervous between 1993 and 1997. 'U' became an instant anthem both in the US and UK and was followed by 'Pushin" and 'Love's Got Me' in 1993 and 1994

respectively. In 1997, Loni Clark's 'Searchin" became an anthem at New York's legendary Body & Soul club. Having worked briefly with Ultra Nate in 1993 on a mix of 'How Long', their reputation and bank accounts went into orbit when they produced Ultra Nate's 'Free', released on Strictly Rhythm in 1997 and picked up by AM:PM in the UK.

Ironically, some of Mood II Swing's better remixes never made it past the promo stage. A prime example is the double pack of 'Stand Up' by Precious. Other notable Mood II Swing mixes that didn't make it to the shops were their dubs of BT's 'Remember' (Perfecto promo, 1997), Ali's 'Feeling You' (Wild Card promo, 1998) and Crustation's 'Flame' (Jive promo, 1997). Luckily, many of their mixes have actually seen the light of day. Highlights of these include 'Love Revolution' by Mysterious People (Yoshitoshi, 1996), 'When The Funk Hits The Fan' by

Sylk 130 (Ovum, 1996), 'Fly To The Moon' by Indigo (Defender, 1995), 'Learn To Love' by Kim English (Nervous, 1997) and A:XUS' "Baghdad Cafe' (Guidance, 1999).

A lot of Mood II Swing's work is still available through secondhand sources. There is an excellent album on Nervous, imaginatively titled 'Mood II Swing: Nervous Tracks' which features their remixes of the Clubb Kidds, Loni Clark and Kim English. It's a great place to start.

# HELLER 'N' FARLEY PROJECT - 'FROM THE DAT VOLUME 1' (Jus' Trax, 1995)



"IT WAS supposed to be an underground record," laughs Junior Boys Own legend Terry Farley. "Even the song titles were silly!"


'From The Dat' featured four killer cuts. 'Golden Afro' was a grinding Gary Clail remix that Paul Oakenfold foolishly rejected for Perfecto ("it had an Afro vibe before Afro was trendy"), 'Jus' Friends' was a dub mix of the JBO hit 'If You Should Need A Friend' and 'Boy Black' was deep house written

with the EP in mind. But it was the undulating funk of 'Ultra Flava' which caused the most damage. Originally a reworking of Ultra Nate's 'How Long', it was a perfect example of the art of the mix. "Unfortunately, she got dropped," Farley fulminates, "so we never got paid!

But the track refused to die. Inspired by frequent visits to The Sound Factory in New York, 'Ultra Flava' soaked up the Wild Pitch spirit and spat it back at the dancefloor. In Ibiza, it became a peak-time anthem, selling over 1,000 copies a week in the summer of 1995. The song was picked up by AM:PM in 1996 and reworked by Grant Nelson, but none of the remixes matched the charm of the original.

Terry Farley agrees. "It's all down to Pete's cheeky little bassline," he chuckles.

The classic Swing II Mood dub still rocks. Any UK garage DJ worth his salt during the mid Nineties would have had this in his box.

Two mixes from Mood II Swing, though the excellent dub was never released. Bright and busy with an eye for goals, as Ron Atkinson would say!

# TURNING table

WILL THE TECHNICS MONOPOLY EVER BE TOPPLED?

TALL PAUL & DJ LOTTIE CHECK OUT THE COMPETITION

## Pro Turntables

Anybody who's been turntable shopping recently will have spotted that the legendary Technics SL1200 and 1210 are not as lonely as they used to be. Although there have been alternative decks to tempt you for quite some time, most of them were barely up to scratch for learning on, and for performing in a hot sweaty club in front of 5,000 people they were about as much use as a 78rpm Dansette.

Times are changing now, and recent releases from Technics' rivals are going to finally give them a run for their reputation.

This is the first in a series of brutal, head to head assessments of what's on offer in music

technology today. We set out to discover whether, after 21 years of absolute rule, Technics may finally have some worthy challengers.

Going in at the deep end, we invited along the dangerously outspoken Tall Paul and the winner of Muzik's Best New DJ award in 1999, Lottie, to sample our banquet of turntable delights.

All three furniable contenders were easy to set up and are constructed to standards that fit their prices. In terms of sound quality they are all good, although all except the Vestax Pdx d3 MkII suffer from a degree of body resonance (ie, if you tap the body of the deck while it's playing your hear a booming sound). Let battle commence!

## The Champ

Selling at around £399, the Technics SL1200/

1210 have been in production for 21 years, which is remarkable in itself. The specs for the two models are identical, the only difference being colour. They have a direct drive motor with torque of 1.5kg per square cm and a pitch adjustment fader with a stated adjustment range of +/-8. They have an adjustable, Shaped tone arm and a superb reputation for reliability in extreme conditions. If you are unfamiliar with

the appearance and capabilities of the mighty SL, I say to you "welcome to our planet, visitor from space."

Paul: "Like anything, if you've been brought up on something for 15 years you generally stick to it."



### The Contenders



#### **Numark Pro TT1**

£329.95 inc VAT

The Pro TT1 was one of the best of some excellent Numark products in '99. It's damned sexy looking, has a very powerful direct drive motor (1.7kg/cm³), platter reverse, adjustable tone arm and a large backlit display. It will spin at 78rpm, has a pair of carrying handles moulded into the case and the pitch fader has an adjustable range of either +/-10% or +/-20%.

#### First impressions?

Lottie: "They're the most beautiful things I've seen in my life. I think they're absolutely gorgeous. I like this display. Whoever has done the design is spot on, I like the simplicity of it." Paul: "It definitely looks the part. It's not a complete rip-off of the Technics layout wise."

#### The pitch fader?

Lottie: "When I'm mixing I try not to touch the platter and do it all with the pitch fader. When I can't I tend to speed up the pitch a little further

than it needs to be and then use my hand to slow it down, rather than try to speed the platter up by touching. This pitch fader is heavier than the others, but it's not necessarily any worse, it just feels different and will take a little getting used to." Paul: "With the pitch slider it still has the same problem with the area either side of zero but it didn't seem to be as bad as the Technics."

# What about being able to change the range of the pitch fader?

Paul: "It's a much more versatile deck, you can mess around mixing hip hop beats and you can slow stuff down incredibly – double what you can do with a Technics."

Lottie: "I'd never really use that because most of my records are at around the same bpm."

#### The platter?

Lottie: "The reverse switch on the Numark turns the record around much more quickly than the other two and that suggests to me that it does have a more powerful motor and it really is a case of getting used to the feel."

Paul: "The platter was good, no problems there, but the supplied slipmat is pretty bad. The foam is just no good, it wasn't letting the platter spin properly."

#### It's the little things that matter

Lottie: "In the olden days when I had to carry my decks around everywhere with me, which I did, those handles would have been brilliant."

#### In a club situation?

Paul: "Yeah, I'd be quite happy with these. You know, I'm not going to start, I've played on much worse, mate."

#### Vestax Pdx d3 MKII

The Pdx d3 MKII is a beast of a machine. It has a digitally controlled, direct drive motor (1.6kg/cm²) and features the incredible Anti Skipping Tone Arm System – a short, straight tone arm which gives it unbelievable stability and reduced body resonance. As usual with Vestax, it's crawling with innovative features. Like a slinky pitch fader that can be set to either +/-3%, +/-6% or +/-12%, a digital display showing amount of pitch adjustment, platter reverse, motor off and a pitch bend system based around a dinky little two-direction lever (also adjustable in terms of the amount of bend it applies). It even has a very attractive orange target light.

#### First impressions?

Paul: "It looks very impressive."
Lottie: "I think it's quite an ugly deck, but it doesn't matter what it looks like, it's a sound thing really, isn't it? With these I've used them once before and had to go straight in to my set and it was a bit weird. It could be because I've used it before but this time it was much easier."

#### Mixing with 'em?

Paul: "To be a true DJ, a true master of the pitch, you should never have to touch the platter, you should be able to do it all on the pitch fader, that's how all the top boys do it. With this deck you simply do not have to touch the record once it's on. Once you've got the rough speed you just cue it up, drop it in and with all the gadgets they've got on there you should be able to keep it sweet. If you can't pull it off with this deck you're in trouble."



Lottie: "These were definitely the easiest to mix with. I did the same mix on all three decks and I got there quicker with these."

# What do you make of that little pitch bend lever?

Lottie: "This pitch bend was much better. Because it's got the two different directions, it's subtle enough to use."

Paul: "That little lever is really the thing which stops you getting your grubby fingers all over the record. It'll do it much more smoothly than touching the record. It was a little difficult getting it just right but this was the first time I've used it, and by the end I was getting the hang of just how responsive it was. You've also got the adjustments to get it exactly as you want."

# What do you make of that pitch fader?

Lottie: "The pitch fader is brilliant. Again there's no glitching at nought, it's really smooth and it's just more sensitive. When you move it the platter is at that speed in a snap of your fingers, you don't have to wait. That was the problem the first time I used them, I was so used to a Technics that it was almost too quick and I couldn't get used to it." Paul: "The pitch fader is great, it's so true and precise. Sometimes it's even too precise."

#### What about that tone arm?

Paul: "When you look at it you think it's just not going to work. When things are different people think it can't be right but I gave it a few spinbacks and a few scratches and it held brilliantly."

Lottie: "I'm not a scratcher so it makes very little difference to me but it is rock solid. It's like a tank of a deck. I really like them now!"



Like much of the Gemini range, the PT2000 has established itself as a popular, low cost alternative to the SL. It has a direct drive motor (1.5kg/cm²), an adjustable tone arm, pitch range of +/-10% and the MkIII now sports a pair of pitch bend buttons and a platter reverse button.

#### First impressions

Paul: "A bit of déjà vu going on here really. It looks very much like the Technics, but you can just feel that it's not."

#### The pitch slider?

Paul: "Yeah the pitch seemed true to form. In fact there's a disadvantage with the Technics in that this little area around the zero, probably about 1% either side of zero is not a true representation of what the rpm should be. This one hasn't got that little gap around the zero and it held the mix."

#### The platter?

Paul: "For some DJs who like to touch the side of the platter, it was not very responsive in terms of getting back to the correct rpm. You could touch it and it'd slow right down and when you gave it a little touch to get it forward a bit, it would race ahead."

Lottie: "It's not as responsive as it could be, but as a beginner's deck it's fine."

#### The reverse?

Paul: "Yeah, it's good if you want to get tricky with it. You'd want to get pretty used to it if you wanted to use it live because if you get those things wrong, they sound terrible."

Lottie: "It sounds really good with just the beats running."

# What about the pitch bend buttons?

Paul: "It's a good little invention, something someone has obviously looked at. Rather than touching the record you can touch these little buttons. It's a good addition, although they didn't seem too responsive."

Lottie: "The pitch bend was too dramatic. Obviously when you touch a record too much it jumps quite suddenly and the buttons were a bit like that. It wasn't as subtle as it should have been, so I found myself slowing it down in the usual way."

#### What's the verdict?

Paul: "A definite try out with options for looking at something a bit more tasty in the future. It's not cheap, but for the price you've got a pretty good set up that'll get you to a stage where you'd be able to cope in a club. I'm not quite so sure about using the Geminis in a club though."



THE MC-307 is the latest generation of a breed of Roland music creation machines that goes all the way back to the early Eighties. The original Micro Composer line has now evolved into the dance-friendly Groovebox concept, previously seen in the MC-303 (which is emphatically not to be confused with the TB-303) and 505.

#### What is it?

The Groovebox format is a beginner's entrance to the world of music making hardware. The idea is simple – you have a box full of tweakable sounds, a few effects to splash about with and a sequencer that allows you to turn the sounds into music.

#### No previous experience required

As with its immediate predecessors, the 307 can be used as a music toy and DJ tool, straight out of the box. You can get a very long way with it, without even beginning to

consider programming your own music. There are 240 pre-programmed patterns on board, each of which is made up of a rhythm part and a selection of instruments. You can keep yourself happy for quite a while, simply by leaving the patterns looping and switching the individual instruments on and off to create tunes.

When you've had enough of that there's Real-Time Phrase Sequencing which includes 470 elements like drum rolls and beats, strings, sequences and basslines, which can be dropped in with a single button push. You're also provided with dedicated knobs for the filter and LFO plus four multi-function knobs that – in conjunction with a bank button – make 12 effect, envelope and quantize parameters available for easy, hands on tweaking, meaning you can alter the sounds and patterns as they play.

The patterns are actually rather well put together. They spread their net wide stylistically – so the 307 suffers a little from

trying to be all things to all people - but the basic elements of the presets are very usable. Perhaps the most obvious musical enhancement to a DJ set is drums and the 307 holds a thumping selection. Adding an extra layer of drums at those peak moments can add stacks of drive and energy to a mix.

#### Sounds

For a beginner, the range and quality of the sounds on offer is astoundingly good. The drum sounds are of the classic 'drum machine' type, rather than sampled 'live' drums. The synthesiser provides a decent range of musical elements. There's more than enough good quality, inspiring sonic material in here to get



you writing and performing your own music. Many of the sounds will be useful forever as 'stock' sounds.

However, it would be unfair to expect a multi-purpose machine like the 307 to deliver the same sonic performance as dedicated synthesisers costing anything up to three times as much. Compared to Roland's own professional sound modules, the sounds show a certain lack of density, detail and originality and in a head to head with a TR-909 drum machine, for instance, anyone can hear the difference. It's not a professional sound engine, then, but it's still very good - better than anybody would have expected at this price a few years back.

#### Getting in sequence

Writing your own patterns and arranging them into songs with the 307 is dreamy. The combination of step and real time record sequencing employed is a tried and tested classic. Anyone familiar with Roland's other Grooveboxes will be at home with the 307. The step sequencer gives precision control, but it can be time-consuming. Real time recording, using the keyboard pads or a controller keyboard via MIDI allows much quicker entry, and any bum notes or mistakes in timing can be corrected using the step sequencer and the grid quantiser. Patterns can then be locked together to form songs.





## How it works

The MC-307 is the familiar Groovebox desktop slab, but from the first glance it's obvious that Roland have had a pretty drastic design rethink, greatly simplifying the display from the rather busy MC-505.

The new, simpler approach involves four multi-function knobs, a row of four multi-function buttons and eight instrument selection buttons placed in a pyramid below the screen. There are various 'mode' buttons and a new set of cursor buttons to accompany the data wheel.

This may sound a bit complicated but it's actually very user-friendly. Although many of the hundreds of

parameters are accessed by scrolling through menus on the screen, all of the most useful functions are available for real time control. Everything is logically organised and altering most things is done with the same set of knobs and buttons. Your hands stay in one place and the content of the screen changes rather than reaching around all over the place trying to remember which button does what.

#### Using it live

The masterstroke of the 307 is so simple it hurts. They've added a pitch slider that can shift the tempo by +/-10% on the right side of the front panel. The action of the fader is smooth and precise but the response

is fairly slow. It's great for tempo matching but you can't hold and push downbeats together with the pitch fader like you can with a turntable. So it's a good job they've also included a pair of useful CD style pitch bend buttons, labelled 'push' and 'hold'. You also get 'pitch' and 'bpm' buttons that allow you to have the fader adjust either or both of them. Being able to transpose on the fly by an octave in either direction without altering the tempo is extremely useful.

Also on a live tip, they've included a three-position toggle switch or 'grabber' for the effects. It allows you to switch a pre-programmed combination of effects on and off, and has a sprung action that allows you punch them in.

#### Does it cut the mustard?

The MC-307 is excellent for first time musicians or anybody who wants to write and perform their music in a very hands-on way. It's incredibly good fun and an obvious next step for DJs who want to go beyond the turntable. The pitch control system makes mixing easy, the sounds are good, and the writing and arrangement tools are a splendid way to become familiar with how music is put together.

Overall, the 307 is an excellent all-in-one starter option for those who want a stable piece of hardware that works straight out of the box (unlike a computer) and is suited to a life on stage (also unlike a computer).

#### HE MAY BE 57, BUT TONE IS A REGULAR GUEST AT LONDON'S 333 Tony Blackburn CLUB. HE'S ALSO LANDED AN IBIZA RESIDENCY. GREAT, MATE!

How did your 333 gigs come about? "I do a lot of Seventies nights; I guess that's how the people at the Renegade Pop Party heard about me."

What's your set like? "It's a party atmosphere. I dress up in a sparkly costume and sport a medallion the size of a manhole. My show's pure entertainment. Someone else puts on the music and I jump around doing Seventies numbers like 'Dancing Queen' and a cracking ballet routine. I broke my leg doing it last year."

Do you still play pure soul sets? "On the radio, like Capital Gold in London and Jazz FM in the North West, but not really live. My kind of soul is Anita Baker, Luther Vandross, Shalamar and Philip Bailey."

What happened to Arnold The Dog from your Junior Choice show on Radio 1? "He died years ago. I keep him stuffed in the boot of my car. If he was alive today he'd be 36."

Which modern DJ do you most respect? "They're all lost on mc, to be honest. I've heard that Fatboy Slim is successful, but I've only seen him on the telly. These modern guys don't know how to perform. Anyone can stand behind a desk in the dark and play records! I challenge Fatboy to a contest! Actually I went head to head with Dave Pearce two times last year and won on both counts. Dave used to work for me at Radio London, getting the acts on and off stage..."

What do you think of Radio 1 these days? "Zoe Ball was quite good; I was quite surprised. I don't really listen to it, though. It was a popular station when I opened it, the 'jukebox of the nation'. That's all changed!"

What do you think of the money modern DJs earn? "I'm very jealous of DJs like Pete Tong and Paul Oakenfold. They earn five grand a set for standing there unnoticed in the dark. I challenge them to do a better show than me! Let the people decide! People who enjoy me understand what fun is. Come to Eden (Tone's Ibiza residency) and see what I mean!"

What's it like to be a DJ with a personality? "It's important to have a personality, not like those guys who play three records in a row and do a time check. Most modern live DJs are just boring. I would rather go and see a blank wall. What I'm about is pure entertainment. You can't take music too seriously, and as far as I'm concerned all this mixing and scratching is a medical condition!"


