



IN 1988, an impish Layo Paskin got his first taste of acid house at a slew of infamous Clink Street parties in London. Drawn by those early jacked-up beats, it was inevitable the young Layo would embark upon a career behind the decks. Later that summer, Matthew 'Bushwackal' B would be greeted with similar euphoria at a Ratpack rave in a south London

swimming pool. Fast-forward to 2000 and the raw passion of those early raves is undoubtedly alive and spinning. Hammered out of Detroit breaks, saxy grooves and deep house beats, last year's 'Low Life' opus still sounds like the greatest underground ride of your life.

On this exclusive Muzik mix, Subterrain co-resident Layo says the aim was to capture the freshest chill out sounds around. "It's a summery mix that encapsulates everything from hip hop through to twisted house and funk. This is something you could listen to lying down or dance to if pumped up. Most importantly, though, it's got the usual Layo and Bushwacka! sophistication!"








FATBOY **SPEAKS**

NORMAN COOK has been speaking exclusively to Muzik about the forthcoming Fatboy Slim album, due later this year on Skint, "Someone said I'd finished 15 tracks," Cook told Muzik. "That's not strictly true – I've half-finished 10!"

As previously reported in Muzik, Norman flew to LA in late April to work with r&b sensation Macy Gray. "The Macy track is very gospel," he revealed. "I met her at the Brits and she said she was up for it!" Cook says his third album will showcase a more mature sound. "Silliness is out the window," he explained. "It's half moody and half uplifting — it's more grown-up, if you like."

Norm also shrugged off rumours that Madonna has been sending him e-mails begging for a bit of Fatboy magic to be sprinkled on her records. "I haven't even got e-mail!" he admitted.





DAZZA 'N' SASHA

WORLD-RENOWNED DJs DARREN EMERSON AND SASHA

have been in the studio together recording a track for future release. The tune in question is apparently a progressive houser underpinned by a flamenco guitar. Entitled 'Scorchio', it was aired twice by Sasha at the Space opening party in Ibiza. "It's a cross between Stardust and 'Xpander'," US trancer Brian Transeau told Muzik.

The track is actually the result of a three-way collaboration between Sasha, Emerson and ex-Spooky knob twiddler Charlie May, who works as Sasha's production partner. However, despite rumours to the contrary, a spokesperson emphatically denied any rift between the pair over the licensing of 'Scorchio'. "The last I heard was that it was going to be promoed on [Emerson's label] Underwater, and then it'll come out on Sasha's EP. But we're still waiting to find out," she said.





GERRIT FRERICHS, aka Humate, looks set to become the latest former colleague of Paul Van Dyk to launch a law suit against the star. As reported previously in Muzik, Van Dyk has just emerged from a long and acrimonious dispute with his ex-label boss, MFS head honcho Mark Reeder.


Although reluctant to go into detail, Frerichs admitted to Muzik that "there are currently some very unpleasant things happening. But things will turn out the way they are supposed to turn out, I'm pretty sure."

The main bones of contention are believed to be royalty payments and writing credits for a remix Van Dyk performed on the Humate track 'Love Stimulation' in the mid Nineties. The track was a staple of Van Dyk's sets for years, and was included on his 'Vorsprung Dyk Technic' compilation of remixes in 1997.

However, some feel that Van Dyk has taken more credit

than he deserves for the remix, to the point where there has been confusion about Humate's real identity, with many Van Dyk fans believing that Humate is nothing more than a pseudonym for their clean-cut superstar hero.

"It's something between him and me, or between his management and me, or in the end his lawyers and me. I only worked with him once and that was six years ago, and the results of that were pretty pleasing obviously, but that's how it went," was all Frerichs had to say on the matter. Frerichs is currently recording a new Humate album.



GROOVEJET TUMBLES

LEGENDARY MIAMI CLUB Groovejet has closed its doors for the last time. A club spokesman told Muzik that "extreme competition and rising debts meant that Groovejet's concept was no longer viable."

The venue opened in 1995 in the then-trendy South Beach area. However, as the area grew in prominence, locals were increasingly forced out as tourists pushed prices up to almost Ibizan levels. 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



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

TRENCHFOOT OINTMENT is not

required; superstar DJ crowd-pullers are thin on the ground and there's a total lack of Pavlovian trance, rancid burgers and invasive corporate sponsorship. But with nearly 300 musicians and DJs from all over the world set to play, there isn't a single music festival in Britain that comes close to the quality, ambition and sheer scale of Sonar, Barcelona's annual celebration of 'advanced music'.

There are two venues — Sonar By Day, based at the CCCB, Barcelona's Centre for Contemporary Culture, and Sonar By Night, a huge sports complex by the beach — hosting an outstanding selection of house, techno and leftfield artists.

Thursday 15th June

Gilles Peterson kicks things off in the Sonar Pub with a superbly judged set of



what his MC calls "original underground London style", whatever that means. "Start on the left side," he adds, presumably not referring to the acid jazz/house/drum & bass boy wonder's 'tailoring'. Over in the Sonar Park, just next to the dodgems, **Death In Vegas** prepare to underwhelm the assembled throng with their collection of turgid rock clichés, their main saving grace being that album guests Bobby Gillespie and Iggy Pop do not join them.

Never mind. **Super_Collider**'s Jamie Lidell hits the stage like a techno Tom Jones (you can't help hoping he'll launch into a rousing cyber-funk rendition of 'Delilah', but no such luck) while partner Cristian Vogel shapes a sound that's equal parts Jeff Mills and Jamiroquai. Such an unholy conjunction can surely not be strictly legal, but when it sounds as simultaneously gusset-strainingly tight and gloriously shambolic as this we're prepared to be lenient.

Meanwhile, it's time to check the **Disko B** showcase at the Sonar Chic stage. Two things must be borne in mind here: 1) there's a bit of an Eighties revival thing going on, and 2) they're German. On the plus side, though, 1) it's only the good bits they're reviving, and 2) we finally beat them at football, so it's time to be magnanimous. Label boss **Upstart**

drops classic Krautronica from Liaisons Dangereuses, followed by masks 'n' Moogs 'n' 909s in the shape of **Artist Unknown**, memorable mainly for their stoopid electro version of Guns N' Roses' 'Paradise City'. Bizarre covers are evidently the order of the day as **Gerhard Potuznik** and **Patrick Pulsinger** improvise a spaced-out rendition of 'Bela Lugosi's Dead' by art ghouls Bauhaus.

Dancing like physics undergraduates and combatting rumours of homosexuality with conspicuous consumption of alcohol and pornography, though, could only be the province of Disko B's star turn **Dakar & Grinser**, described by our salivating photographer as a "techno Black Lace". Bless.

David Morales polishes off the evening in the Sonar Club with his faintly ludicrous selection of anthemic Latino/Noo Yoik house and garage, ensuring all the while


that the half-full enormodrome can see his hard and throbbing tattoos.

Friday 16th June

A huge lizard sits nonchalantly sunning itself outside the CCCB. "It's Richie Hawtin!" exclaims ? from Artist Unknown. There'll be more from him later. Richie, that is, not the lizard.

An early afternoon set of flawless, rinsing drum & bass from Canada's DJ Maus in the riot of astroturf and slender tanned torsos that is the Sonar Village precedes the Mute Records showcase. Beautifully air-conditioned, the CCCB Hall is soon heated up by Echoboy, who could teach Death In Vegas a thing or several about combining guitar rock intensity with dance music energy. Pan American deliver 45 minutes of zoned-out ambience at the pace of a comatose heartbeat, while latest signings Goldfrapp turn the drama up to 11, combining Parisian torch songs with Morricone soundtracks for those who thought Portishead were just a bit too happy-go-lucky. Add N To (X) find their natural home among the retro-futurist garbs and angular haircuts of the Spanish fashionistas. Surely vocoders and theremins are a bit passé, dahling?


Pole's ~scape label take advantage of the balmy Mediterranean evening to













introduce some 'urban dub' to the proceedings. Spoilsport Burnt Friedman hides in the shade and plays his set on four MiniDisc recorders, while Pole's own DJ set is a surprisingly traditional old skool irie selection, perplexingly curtailed by the arrival of Kit Clayton's weird, insectoid rhythms.

Chicks On Speed later struggle to fill the cavernous Sonar Club with their determinedly lo-fi beats and screeching, and demonstrate they'd be better off flogging their wares to a sub-Saatchi art dealer than an eager dancefloor. Fortunately the reptilian Richie Hawtin saves the day with a particularly frenzied session on the decks, FX and 909s.

Saturday 17th June

The Big Chill's **Pete Lawrence** and **The Gentle People** ease us through the hangover, but for those who prefer the kill-or-cure fried breakfast treatment it's got to be Manc noise merchants **V/VM** and their splendid carnival of shite. Fat Cat's Lee Grainge and friend wave pig's legs around in time to their queasy version of 'Lady In Red'. The knuckle of one porcine limb snaps on the upswing, sending a torrent of stinking, viscous fat onto some hot and bothered spectators. Now that's entertainment.

Matt Herbert woos the crowd with smooth vocal house before improvising live on Coke cans, water bottles and plastic bags. Effortlessly blending the experimental and the accessible, he trumps most of the daytime opposition.

Come the evening, it's sleazy disco-tech all the way in the International Deejay Gigolos arena, with Miss Kittin & The Hacker, Zombie Nation (who drop their Ibiza-slaying 'Kemkraft 400' with great aplomb) and latter-day Serge Gainsbourg David Carretta all vying for attention, while Hell's DJ set starts with Wink's 'French Kiss' remake 'How's Your Evening So Far?', proving that you can climax too soon and get away with it. The vast sports arena of the Sonar

The vast sports arena of the Sonar Club is filled to capacity for one reason

only – Carl Cox. Judging the crowd perfectly, the big man plays a blistering set of hard, funky techno, setting loins aflame until long after sunrise.

Laurent Garnier – drafted in at the last minute to replace 20/20 Vision who are stranded at Heathrow – drops old school house trax while casualties flock to the nearby beach to enjoy life-changing conversations with strangers. And as if we haven't suffered a surfeit of weirdness, California's Plug Research keep the noodle beats going all night. Two of us, at least, are still awake to witness it. Sonar. We're in too deep. (TM)

The club is underground (literally) and it rocks, but best of all this month was the **Matrix** in Zurich. 




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"WHAT CAN YOU DO?" Morgan Nicholls asks in an amiably exasperated tone when told that someone walked into Muzik's offices while his new album 'Organized' was playing, and asked, "Who the fuck put Procul Harum on?"

"That wouldn't have been my top choice to be confused with," Morgan confides,
"Maybe the Mamas And The Papas or The Beach Boys, but Procul Harum. . . eeyuch!
suppose it's bound to happen because it's not modern-sounding."

Ah, but there's the rub: although Morgan borrows freely from the past, 'Organized' is as much part of our studio-effects-addled culture as Air, Bent or Bonobo.

"There's quite a bit of jiggery-pokery in there," he agrees, "but not as much as we set out to do. Obviously we're not going to put hi-hats over a Hammond ballad like 'Soul Searching' which I actually wrote about five years ago. It's one of my favourite tracks so you don't want to start doubling up bass drums, or that kind of shit."

He's right, it sounds fine as it is, as does the rest of the album. It's a scrapbook of eight years' worth of demos, filled to the brim with contributions by his family, from cousin Rose and sister Amy's sweet singing voices to schoolboy brother William's kiddy-rapping on last

year's debut single, 'Miss Parker'. And then there's his dad, Billy Nicholls, Sixties mate of Pete Townshend, whose 'Would You Believe' album (on The Small Faces' Immediate label) is one of the top 40 most collectable, rare records of all time. He's on 'Organized' too.

Some would say that with this background, 29 year-old Morgan never stood a chance. The evidence bears this out. At 13 he was already bassist for nascent indie punk popsters. The Senseless Things ("We did pretty well for a bunch of drunken idiots") until he decided to quit many years later ("We'd had too much of a good time, I think, and it took its toll").

Morgan has a less obvious analysis of the situation. "It wasn't so much that music was always going on, Ronnie Laine gave us our first flat and so on," he says. "You see, Dad never allowed me to play with all these guitars and pianos that were lying about, so it occurred to me the other day that was probably the biggest influence I could have – I was always dying to play all these forbidden instruments."

And now he does. And he even allows his old man to join in. . . (THG)

FORMER TRICKY COHORT TAPS THE POWER OF DREAMS

"WE THOUGHT IT would be perfect. But for the first three months I couldn't sleep. I was going to bed and hearing my heart beating, thinking 'what the fuck is that?'" A granny's bungalow in deepest Wiltshire: not the first place you'd associate with music that draws on Parisian torch song, European cinema and spaghetti western soundtracks for inspiration. But for nine months it was home to singer Alison Goldfrapp and her musical partner Will Gregory – a gestation period which has so far produced the dramatic debut single, 'Lovely Head' and an album, due in September. "I found an old birthday card under the mattress," Alison continues. "Someone had written to this little girl saying how much she missed her. It was pretty bizarre."

Which, conveniently, is also a fair description of the music Goldfrapp make. Alison, who in the past has sung with Tricky and Orbital ("nice blokes and a pleasure to work with, but not where I'm coming from at all") found herself "completely fucking bored" of boys-in-a-bedroom dance music and began casting around for a collaborator who shared her musical language.

"I met Will through friends in Bristol," she explains. "I sent him a tape of Francoise Hardy and he sent me some Ennio Morricone. We discovered there was a sound world we were both really into."

Classically trained Will fitted the bill perfectly, and the pair set about "trying to articulate the sounds we heard in our heads. It's like writing down a dream – as you're writing it it starts to disappear. Which is why making an album is pretty gruelling."

Particularly when your dreams are full of the gothic landscapes and severed heads depicted on the artwork for 'Lovely Head', which Alison designed herself. "The boar on the cover – that's my family crest. But my Dad looked into our family tree and apparently there are no more Goldfrapps left."

We'd better make the most of them while we still can, then. But watch out for the monsters under the bed. (TM)

Goldfrapp's singe 'Lovely Head' is out now on Mute. Their album, 'Felt Mountain' follows in September

But things change. There have always been people who have sucked Satan's cheesy cock of commerciality, but the


current state of the Top 40 goes too far. The pure pap that has come to be called 'dance music' is a mockery of everything that Muzik has fought for over the last five years.

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






















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TELL US ABOUT HEADSTART RECORDINGS. "The sound we've developed has a dark, acid house vibe. The first EP is "Taking Their Lives Away". You can also expect releases from Truth Society, DJ Stratt from France and an EP from Sons of Slough."

WHEN AND WHERE WERE YOU BORN? "Birmingham, December 27th, 1967 – just after Christmas, which annoyed me for the first 12 years of my life."

WHAT ARE YOUR INFLUENCES? "Musically, everyone from Dave Clarke, Micronauts and Andrew Weatherall right to through to the Scratch Perverts and Willie Nelson."

HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE YOUR SOUND? "Dark, thunderous electro, or deep house, or techno, or

whatever you want to call it these days. Music with depth, "WHAT WAS THE FIRST RECORD YOU BOUGHT?

"Not sure. Either 'Geno' By Dexy's Midnight Runners or Tina Charles' 'I'm In The Mood For Dancing'." (That's The Nolans, surely? – Rare groove classics Ed.)

THE LAST? "A record by It's Joe and Danny – weird, folky lo-fi country weirdness, a bit like The Beta Band."

HOW DID YOU START DJING? "Igot some decks on HP with three mates. We started off playing little pubs on the South Coast. Then I moved to London to do Total Defiance. When The Gallery started, I played trip hop in the upstairs bar. Eventually I left to concentrate on Headstart."

WHERE DO YOU BUY YOUR RECORDS? "Tag, Atlas and Vinyl Addiction in Soho. Mark in Tag is always upfront with good promos. Atlas is a little more electro; you'll always pick up strange electronic reggae and jazz!"

WHAT DO YOU LISTEN TO IN BED ON A SUNDAY MORNING? "Early Jimmy Cliff, Willie Nelson or Johnny Cash, dub reggae. Different music inspires different emotions. Absolutely no dark electro."

WHAT WOULD BE YOUR DREAM NIGHT? I'd use a place called Oasis overlooking the lake in Austin, Texas, DJ-wise, I'd have The Chemical Brothers, Dave Clarke, The Micronauts and Richie Hawtin on the lighter side, I'd have DIY, Joy Division, New Order and Willie Nelson."

It's got a great sample from a gospel group, and we've been doing it quite a bit in our live show. It's from about 1988 and lalways open my sets with it so it's ideal for beginning a tape.

6. MARVIN GAYE You're The Man (Tamla Motown)

Marvin had a huge coke habit. On his calender every single day apart from Christmas and Boxing Day said, 'Score coke'. 'You're The Man' is a very rare promo single that should have gone on 'What's Going On?'

11. LOUIS LOGIC General Principle (Landspeed)

Another San Francisco track, and about the most hardcore thing I play out. Most Morcheeba fans look really confused by it and ask to hear tracks from our LPs instead but I think it's great.

16. SON OF BAZERK Change The Style (MCA)

This was done in 1988 by the Bomb Squad who produced Public Enemy. It contains reggae, hip hop, funk, rock and it flies along at furious pace then suddenly drops out into dub. True hardcore hip hop.

20. MARLENA SHAW California Soul (Cadet)

This is the tune Gang Starr sampled for 'Step Into The Arena'. I think it was written by Ashford & Simpson. It's just glorious – you play it and the sun comes out. It's kind of funksoul, which Morcheeba have been known to dabble in...

2. THIRSTON HOWL I Still Live With My Mom (Fat Beats)

This is a really funky track. I was in a shop in New York recently and everyone was just pissing themselves because it was or funny, taking the piss out of all those hip hop headz who still live at home with their parents.



12. PACEWON Any Champion (Ready Rok)

This one has a reggae sample in the chorus. It's produced by DJ Revolution, another bunch of west coast scratch DJs. It's just awesome, a really funky track. It's the sort of thing I can relate to when I'm doing my laundry at home.

Fantastic, even though everyone at school said it sounded like a kettle boiling. Chuck D said he enjoyed making records that annoyed his girlfriend and I could totally relate to that. There were only two girls at my school who were into hip hop.

A fairly new track with a baroque kind of sample. There's some great hip hop around at the moment, the freshest for 10 years which is why so much of it features on this tape. It's moved away from that moody sound.

I first heard this when I was 14 and Rakim's voice just blew me away. I've been into hip hop since the first wave of breakdancing and graffiti. We actually did a piece on our local primary school and got caught by the fuzz (sounds painful – Ed).







WE'RE WALKING down

Tryggvagata Street, Reykjavik and the sun is shining. At three in the morning. Copulating couples are rolling round the pavement while pilled-up Vikings pillage the local kebab shop. And a hallucinating troll with a tinsel-covered arse offers us home made vodka. Naturally.

We escape to Kaffi Thomsen, a dual level nighterie rocking to Darren Emerson. Daz is a reindeer's ride from the Arctic Circle for the same reason as us – he's attending the annual Rejkavik Festival, a mixed bag musical affair featuring himself, Laurent Garnier, Luke Slater, Asian Dub Foundation, lan Brown, and, er, Ray Davies.

As you've probably heard, lceland is currently being billed as THE party island of Europe, so we at Muzik Towers decided to put it to the test. Could we swap San Miguel and sun for Bezerker lager and volcano-jumping? Is lceland really the new Ibiza?

First test was the choons, and here the ice people are pretty much on track. While Thomsen rocked with up-to-the-minute twelves, the unprounouncable Skuggabarinn served more predictable Euro fodder. Sound systems are rockin', but beware of Pacha-like bar prices. At £7 a pint, you won't get too far on a fifty. Unless you do like our photographer, that is, and leg it without paying instead.

Back at the domestic airport by six-ish, and with the sun still up, our hosts are eager to fly us to the idyllic Westmann Islands. Idyllic, that is, if you like puffinwatching and lava dodging while drinking 60% proof mouthwash. Sure, there are loads of geysers, but you could say that about Peckham high street, couldn't you? And they've got lceland, too, come to think of it.

Back on the moon-surface of the mainland we check out the festival. In the ice hockey arena that's home to the dance tent, Luke Slater warms up a vodkabolloxed crowd of around 300. Following him is Garnier, who tries to rouse the crowd with some spectacularly camp knobtwiddling. The techno-putsch fails, but it's not his fault.

Passing on a putrified shark flesh dinner, we roll downtown again, splashing another tenner on a two-minute taxi ride. Reyjkavik, we find out, is lcelandic for "smoky bay", but with puff at £50 an eighth, we can't work out why. Neither can we work out why all the Icelandic types are steering clear of English journalists. Then we see a colleague from Attitude. He's wet his pants, he's gurning like a trooper and cruising every straight boy in the bar. Hmm.

Okay, if nobody will talk to us, it's back to the festival, where the sun is still shining brightly 36 hours after we arrived. Local jock Gummi Gonzales is warming up for Sash! while ATB is waiting in the wings. In any language that means it's time to run like the Arctic wind.

And so back to where it all started, and salvation. Back at Thomsen, DJ Thor, Ymir and Arni Einar are rocking and Emerson is banging out the tunes that matter. We hit it off with some locals, blag some free drinks and hit the floor. The promoter closes the curtains to keep the sun out and the fun in. We nearly miss our plane. But would we come again?

Er, yeah. But only if they moved the whole lot to San Antonio. (**DF**)

El Divino takes a different approach to its


El Divino takes a different approach to its superclub rivals in town. Smaller than Pacha and smarter than Eden, for once, numbers aren't an issue.

nods El Divino's amiable manager Alberto.
"We have a very mixed European crowd, so
the emphasis is on quality rather than quantity."
A sharply-tailored couple helpfully glide by in
Gucci and Prada, to underline his point.



There can be no higher praise than that. (RM)














"YEAH, YEAH,

THIS IS ERICK MORILLO!" So whoops the graceful man with the big, friendly cartoon face and momentous eyebrows, cheerfully introducing himself to Muzik's tape recorder. "Live in London at the Metropolitan Hotel. May the 25th, 1999."

Er, Nineteen-Ninety-Nine?
"Shit... plus one."

Life moves fast when you are Erick Morillo. You have to hold on tight, as countries, parties, remixes, releases and beautiful people fly by in a fabulous swirl. Check the previous 30 minutes for a glimpse. First Erick is posing for photographs in NW1, suited, booted and draped in bikini-clad blondes. Next, he's clambering into a Range Rover for the drive to W1. Never more than five minutes away from a call, his Bosch tri-band cellular ought to be belching smoke. The priority link-up right now is with Todd Terry's manager back in New York, for a firm but polite conversation about a planned collaboration between the two house heroes which appears to be sliding off the rails due to strife over units and percentages.

The conversation ends when the Range Rover pulls up outside the Metropolitan Hotel. Erick is on first name terms with the rakish staff in this establishment, of course. He always stays here. Though not, it turns out when we get to his floor, in this particular room. Time to get back on the phone.

"Can I change room?" he asks the front desk, examining a dismal view of brick walls and air vents through the window. "This one is so depressing."

Still, yesterday was fun. He flew in from the States in the late afternoon, shunned all traces of jetlag and headed for Muzik's fifth birthday party at the AKA bar, cranking up the increasingly famed sound of his Subliminal label. People loved it. Some wanted to see more of him.

"This girl was all over me," he says with a broad smile. "Her boyfriend's standing right next to her and she's in my ear going, 'You are so cute, so wonderful. I would love to have you. You can do whatever you want to me'."

Funnily enough, this is not the first time that Erick has found himself in such a situation.

"I think any woman who has ever been to a party which really rocked, they've always wanted to fuck the DJ." Erick Morillo, 29, here to discuss his past as an assiduous womaniser and his imminent future as this summer's King Of Ibiza, pauses to bask in the general brilliance of his career. He adds confidently: "What is there not to like about the DJ? The DJ is in control. The DJ is The Man."

When Erick Morillo was 12 years old, recently arrived from Colombia and desperately struggling to learn English, he sat at a school desk in New York and figured that his right and proper vocation was as

a gigolo. "I wanted to make money without working too hard," he muses. "Having sex with women sounded like a great idea." Upon catching an upstairs neighbour making a funky racket on a pair of decks, Erick modified his ambitions to include DJing, producing and zooming round the world. Having sex with women, however, still sounded a great idea, and as time went on, it would turn out they were pretty keen on having sex with him.

Now reduced to "look but don't touch" status due to being as good as hitched to a New York-based English girl, Erick's days as a supersonic Lothario took shape even before he became famous. When his heart was broken by a girl who walked out on him after a four-year relationship, he decided it was time to live a little. When significant chart success with Reel 2 Real brought the chance to travel and party profusely, he jumped at it.

"I started coming to England and I was very forward with the girls," he says. "I used to go up to them and just be rude, basically; drop sick, flirtatious lines. I think the ruder you are to girls the more they like it. They'd say, 'Oh stop it!' but they're laughing and it's a great way to break the ice. Either they tell you to fuck off or you're inside their underwear."

By 1993 and Erick's first visit to Ibiza, his reputation as a bon viveur, party starter and loverman was growing fast. By 1997, it preceded him all the way across the Atlantic on his monthly visits to play at Ministry Of Sound.

"The more you rock a party, the bigger the offers are," he continues proudly. "You go from girls throwing bras at you to girls offering to suck your dick while you're DJing to having a menage å trois, which is nerve-wracking at first, but actually the bomb. Finally, you get invited home by four girls. Four girls! Ha ha ha! It's been a pleasurable decade. I've fulfilled all my fantasies, ticked everything off the list."

What's been the secret of your bedroom success? "It's a DJ power thing. Women love power, It's the same as at high school when the most popular guy goes out with the most popular girl. At a party, the DJ is the most popular guy."

Simple as that.

"Also, let's just say that the difference between

British men and American men is that British men go out to party and get fucked up, whereas American men like to look good and pull women."

You mean they're not dribbling or cross-eyed come 4am? Hmmph, that's cheating.

"It kinda puts you ahead of the field. There'll be 10 British guys and I'm straight away in the lead." Do you think we're all sexually repressed?

"I think the uptightness rests with the politicians and the upper crust, that's all. It's almost like the rest of you have had a sexual revolution in the last five years. When I first came here and talked to girls about sex, they'd be like, 'ShhI We don't do that here!' Now, though, everybody's much more free."

Not you, though. How have you managed to settle down?

"I'm now happy with my place in life. But, though I behave, I still love women," he responds. "They are beautiful creatures and they're all so different. Some of them have sexy legs. Others sexy feet, breasts, hair, lips. . . Mmm, I appreciate their beauty."

Time for a break. Erick Morillo's eyes have completely misted over. . .

Even as a youngster, Erick Morillo was on the move, though not of his own accord. Aged three, he and his sister were dispatched from the family home in New Jersey to relatives in Colombia, when their father walked out on them and their mother could not afford to keep them. Erick learnt all there was to learn about the musical styles of salsa and merengue there. With a little plastic radio as his closest companion, by six years old, he knew for sure that he loved music.

At the age of 11, Mrs Morillo called her kids back to America and moved from New Jersey to New York. Erick stepped up his pursuit of a music career after high school, when he enrolled in a course in technical production and engineering at Manhattan's Centre Of Media Arts. Though DJs were considered no more important than bartenders in the US at that time, Erick continued to practice his deck skills. He got his first gig at a club called Shanghai Reds in Weehawken, just across the Hudson river from Manhattan, where he played reggae and hip hop. His first production work was with reggae artist The General in 1992. Their collaborative effort on RCA, 'Muevelo', eventually went platinum and was voted Billboard magazine's 1992 Latin Single Of The Year.

Then he discovered the banging joys of house music. After a few unsuccessful demos, he made a track called 'The New Anthem'/'Funky Buddha', which Strictly Rhythm picked up on. Soon after, crick 'More' Morillo, as he was then known, hooked him up with Trinidad-born toaster The Mad Stuntman (who wasn't really a stuntman. Or mad) and the house-pop-ragga-salsa antics of Reel 2 Real were under way. The single 'I Like To Move It' topped charts around the world. The album 'Move It' sold more than half a million units in the UK alone. Erick Morillo was fast becoming a superstar. Everywhere except in America, that is.


"The first time I came to London and saw the reaction David Morales got at Ministry Of Sound, I was in awe," remarks Erick, who's also recorded as RAW, Smooth Touch, RBM, Deep Soul, Club Ultimate and Li'l Mo Ying Yang. "I thought, 'Holy shit, I can't believe people appreciate the music this much. I can't believe people look up to the DJ this much'. It was a different world for me."

THE DUIS IN CONTROL.

"My friends back home are still curious how this game works," he adds. "They want to know why people fly me business class around the world and put me in the best hotels in the world, just to DJ. Hee hee! Just to DJ!"

One destination that's particularly dear to the man's heart is, of course, Ibiza. Erick first went there in 1993, with the then dominant northern club outfit Up Yer Ronson. It took him a while to catch up with the vibe, however.

"They took me down to Space the day before the



party and said I would be playing on the terrace, not indoors. I was upset. I was like, 'I wanna play to the proper dancefloor'. They said, 'Trust us, you're in the right place'. They were right, of course. It was the bomb. Planes flying over, people screaming. The only depressing thing was I had to go straight to the airport after DJing. I sat on the plane thinking, 'Wow, I was born to visit lbiza'."

This year, Ērick's White Island bookings include Ministry Of Sound at Pacha, the MTV festival (where he'll be DJing and presenting on TV) and Muzik's exclusive pool party at Pike's Hotel. The King Of Ibiza: it's a title which Erick Morillo fully deserves in 2000, and he's confident he can deliver. His Subliminal label puts out records tailor-made for the place: visceral, driving tunes which are never afraid to turn up the funkiness, which are always exuberant but never cheesy. Tracks such as Harry 'Choo Choo' Romero's 'Can't Get Enough' and Joey Negro's 'Must Be The Music'.

"I used to call it soul with balls," Erick ruminates.
"But now, I go for sexy, funky, disco-y music." With trance perhaps finally on the wane, he believes the timing is perfect for the Subliminal sound.

"People wanna feel the funk again," he explains.
"The more mature crowd wants something extra and that's what I try and do. People say I DJ like I'm having sex with the crowd. You know, teasing them all night long before finally I come really hard. You fucking bang 'em and they love you for it."

People say your music ideally suits chemicalpowered partying,

"The best parties are the ones where everyone is fucked," he laughs. "I love to play to a room full of people on ecstasy. It's how it should be."

Having won the Best Independent Label prize at last year's Ericsson Muzik Awards, he has big plans for Subliminal. Later this year, the camp will spawn two new labels, one for house (running parallel to Subliminal) and one for tech-house. Having secured industry props, he's now set on introducing his label to the world at large. And that includes the notoriously house-phobic kids of America.

"As far as I'm concerned trance is opening the doors for house music in the States. Everybody stags off Paul Oakenfold, but not me. How old is he? I don't know, but he's rocking the kids and they all look up to him. I say God bless Paul Oakenfold! Because he'll make it possible for Subliminal to become the Number One house label in America."


Post-summer in Ibiza, Erick will be "pounding away in the studio for six months," producing his album with a mid-2001 release date pencilled in.

"Daft Punk, Basement Jaxx, Armand – everybody seems to be having fun making their own albums," he states. "I want that, too."

You can't move for goals, ambitions and targets when Erick Morillo is talking. 10 years ago he reached the conclusion that he'd be a millionaire by 30. "I've accomplished that. But now it's about billions. I wanna be a billionaire!" He sees himself starring in a movie before the next 10 years are up. "I will be very successful at it."

A self-proclaimed workaholic, his determination is actually sourced from a fair degree of despondency.

"Psychobabble time," he comments thoughtfully.
"It comes from having dealt with a bunch of rejection when I was younger. I was shy. I came from Colombia to America and I didn't speak English. It was difficult for me. Dating was out of the question. I didn't have sex until I was 16 and that's unheard of in America where, at 10 or 11,

you're already supposed to be rocking. I didn't fit in basically. So I became the funny guy, the comedian trying to get the girls to laugh."

When this rejection was replaced by wealth, fame and adulation, Erick admits he assumed a brash persona which wasn't altogether healthy.

"I would try very hard to impress people. I used to be manipulative and very vindictive. I would hold onto grudges for far too long. I was always stressed out, thinking, 'Right, I'll show you. . .'"

Sounds as if you were very unhappy.

"I was. I always thought that when I got the gold record and the phat car and the dope girl and the best apartment I would be totally happy. Instead, I felt so empty, like there was a void inside me."

Hard though it must have been to see problems when his life was suddenly going so brilliantly right, Erick eventually realised he needed help, and booked himself into a three day series of self-help seminars called The Forum.

"At first I didn't participate much," he remembers.
"People were saying things like, 'I'm an alcoholic,' or 'My dad abused me.' I thought, 'What am I doing here? I don't have these kind of problems."

He stuck with the seminars, though, discovering faith in the self-improvement maxim of letting go of the past, to discover a brighter future. Cheesy as this may sound, it did the job.

"I've calmed down a lot in the last two years," he offers. "I've accepted who I am. I used to be flashy, always in Dolce & Gabbana. Now it's baggy cargo pants and a T-shirt. Never let them see you coming, that's my motto. For instance, let the airlines think you're a burn off the streets and then when they fuck with you, ha, you let 'em know who you are."

Sex tales, Balearic dreams and traumatic confessions covered, Erick checks his e-mail on a palm pilot, then decides he should arrange to meet with fellow American in London, Junior Sanchez and, after that, make a dinner date with several MTV personnel. It's all work and it's all play for Erick Morillo. Time to get back on that phone. . . (M)



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BALEARIA INTHE AREA

WHO, WHAT AND HOW IS BALEARIC? COCO AND MISON HAVE BEEN AROUND A BIT, AND THEY KNOW THE SCORE

CIRCA 2000 AD, Balearic means many things to many people, but mostly it represents a sun-soaked island of sensual Bacchanalian debauch soundtracked by disco-house, pop and Euro-trance; an MTV reportage Club 18-30 on drugs. Perhaps the last shout of a decadent culture growing jaded with pleasures invented for itself in more innocent times.

Cut to 1986-7 AD: young Londoners like Nancy Turner (aka Noise), Lisa McKay (aka Loud), Nicky Holloway, Danny Rampling, Paul Oakenfold and Ian St Paul discover what hippies and the jet-set have known for some time. At open air clubs with names like Pacha, Ku, Café Del Mar and Amnesia, DJs such as Pippi, Alfredo, Cesar Di Malero and José-Marie Padilla are mixing up an unlikely selection of European pop, Seventies rock, American electronic dance and anything else that 'fits'. The crowd are glamorous (or not), black and white, old and young, mostly on drugs, mostly ecstasy, mostly handling the sensation with unostentatious panache. The Londoners decide to take the whole vibe home: "Let's start our own Balearic clubs!" The world would know the resulting culture better as acid house.

Cut to 1999 AD. It's summer and every PR person, media blagger, record company sleazebag and DJ low-life is claiming their record is 'Balearic'. Every dodgy trance record and hard house monstrosity becomes

'Balearic' as soon as Julesy or some such plays it once on a beach somewhere. Balearic, schmalearic, load of cobblers. . .

And thus back to 2000. A second generation of Balearic DJs are coming through, those who've come to the island more recently and learnt from its older peer group (many of whom are now embittered by the British rave Benidorm they perceive their paradise to have become). Not so much interested in 'avin it, with a capital 'A', they wish their musical selection to represent the mix of local cultures, the many moods of the day, and most of all, the blissed out sensation that just the right amount of sunshine can induce.

Which is why we find ourselves listening to Jonathan Sa Trincha playing everything from Limos' wonderful 'The Night' to ancient jazz records in his bar at the end of Salinas beach. It's a balmy afternoon and all around lie naked toned physiques of both sexes. At my table however are two fully clothed figures looking slightly scrawnier and more British than the assembled. Chis 'Coco' Mellor and Phil Mison both came to the Ibiza experience in the early Nineties, both are full converts and now enjoy a fruitful association with the island. Mellor once had a huge club hit, 'Feel It', as Coco, Steel & Lovebomb. He still produces under that name, though the results are often more ambient than dancefloor. Mison recently travelled the world as warm-

up DJ on Leftfield's 'Rhythm And Stealth' Tour. He's well known in Ibiza for the years he spent as resident at Café Del Mar. Together the pair have put together 'Real Ibiza 3: Chilling You Softly' for React Records, a slice of lazy sunshine for living rooms and August barbecues everywhere. Coco and Mison are taking me on a Balearic day out.

"On a Balearic day," begins Chris, iced water in hand, "You always bump into about 10 people you know from various parts of Europe. And then 10 people you don't know who eventually become your friends." He turns his attention to the music wafting from the speakers and observes, "There's a load of records that sound really good at sunset and another load that sound really good on the beach. A lot of stuff on 'Real Ibiza' is more beach than sunset."

"People imagine Ibiza a certain way in the UK," Phil continues, "but it's actually set up for a sophisticated international crowd. On this beach you'll hear Swedish, Italian, German, Dutch, Spanish and French spoken, and occasionally English."

Phil reminisces a while about his first visit in 1990 and his friendship with José Padilla which led to his Café Del Mar residency, then he sits back in his chair and announces, "People are always sneering and saying, 'What's the new Ibiza?' but there ain't gonna be one because here's here and it's unique."

"Balearic," says Chris, warming to the theme, "is white trash clubbers from the UK rubbing shoulders with millionaire playboys in giant yachts, mad people from all over the world coming together."

"Yeah," agrees Phil, "We don't look back to 1988. Balearic is now taking influences from all over the place, mashing them together in some way that makes sense. It's not about playing Euro trance for six hours."

Then it's time to move on, and we drive across the island, past groves of almond trees, rocky outcrops and little farms, until we reach Beniras, a beach in a sheltered bay which must have once seemed like a a timeless secret to those who knew of its existence.

"This is the hippy sunset place," Chris confirms, "There's a time in August when people come from all over the world to drum here."

We take a seat under a parasol and grab some chilled beers. Looking round at the mixed age group tanning themselves Chris observes that the Balearic vibe is ageless - "It's a Spanish thing. In the UK, nearly everyone out at clubs is 17-23. Except the DJs of course."

"Balearic can be so many things," Chris ruminates. "It doesn't just have to be spacey chill out, there's some trance and techno that fits the category - Lustral's on 'Real Ibiza', and a lot of people like the Space Brothers make Balearic as well as full-on nut-job trance. Balearic and tough house can also be connected. I've got this track 'The Beach' I did with Stonebridge and the first thing we laid down was the sound of waves I recorded over here as an inspiration. Then we built little loops on that, atmospheric but rockin' beats. It's the same with the stuff I do with Rui Da Silva, like 'Coisa Nossa'."

"We're going to Lenny next," Coco ventures, referring to the man known simply as Lenny From Ibiza who has the island's only real dance studio (unless you count Mike Oldfield). Chris Coco has collaborated on a number of tracks with him, including some of the 'Real Ibiza' album.

Lenny From Ibiza lives, as it turns out, in an idyllic hillside dwelling with a vineyard on one side and Carob nut trees on the other. We take a dip in his pool, smoke a little herbal refreshment, drink wine, and then ask him what he thinks



Balearic is. Lenny is not a man short of words.

"I've learnt to use the term now," he begins, before warming up and going into one, "but it's not actually much used on the island. In the early days you could have Farley and Grooverider in one night - nothing was formulaic. DJs like Alfredo pioneered this by beat-mixing records that had nothing to do with each other in terms of style, like going from a pop remix of the Cure into Front 242 into an American soul diva. The great thing about it was the diversity, track by track, no dancer knew where it was gonna go next. More importantly, no one knew half the tracks, no one had any expectations."

And perhaps that's what Balearic means. No expectations, just like the blooming days of modern club culture when folk went out to be thrilled by whatever the DJ chose to spin. They trusted him. They didn't anticipate a certain genre and weren't disappointed when the tunes didn't fit. Balearic is peaceful freedom to operate through a wide-ranging record collection, and at Kumharas bar as the sun sets (cliché perhaps. . . but true) Mison and Coco drop everything from Afro-eclecticism to Nightmares On Wax. The small gathering wobbles gently as the orange orb slides over the horizon. The Muzik crew enjoyed. Balearic to the max.

WHAT IS BALEARIC?

TERRY FARLEY: "I think it's about a time more than a music style. To me, it's about the period between '86 and '89 when people's tastes were clouded by a mixture of ecstasy and enthusiasm and an obsession to find the most rare records that fitted into the experience. I don't think the term works now. That spirit isn't there any more."

THEO FROM THE WISEGUYS: "It's listening to 'Jibaro' and wearing Osh Kosh dungarees with Kickers trainers - Ibiza before it became high street!"

DAVE CLARKE: "Balearic to me means Spanish guitar-flecked house music made by white people - sounds quite nice when you're drunk. For me. not being controversial, Ibiza is to clubland what football yobs are to soccer. I was living in Brighton in 1988. Balearic is not for me."

TALL PAUL: I wasn't in Ibiza in the Eighties - I first hit the island in 1991, so I caught the aftermath of that time. It's a different generation now, and there's no point mouthing off about Ibiza because you were there first. There are still places you can go and experience that Balearic spirit: on the beach, smoking a spliff and watching the sun set, for example."



TO HOOLIGANS, HOUSE & E: THE DRUGGED HOO

LET'S SAY WE'RE in the Alphabet Bar in London's throbbing Brewer Street tenderloin. For those that don't know it, it's a bit like that bar in Coupling. Lots of louche leather sofas, continental beers, nice people. And what they're talking about is this: The Footie. Girls with jobs in PR, blokes in advertising, short-order chefs and faintly recognisable actresses are all slumped cross-legged, yattering about Zola ("Gianfranco, man, he's just God") and "Kevin's" motivational skills.

This is the thing. They're talking about "Kevin" and "Luca" in the same way as they talk about "FK". Like they know them. And like they're a badge, a statement, a product. Which, of course, is exactly what these godlike icons have become. Just like Kevorkian or Morales or any other dance music exponent at the height of his game, our footballing heroes are now just a part of the uniform.

And the uniform doesn't only apply to the threads we wear. What we once knew as fashion now embraces music, leisure, sport, clobber – lifestyle. So everyone in The Alphabet Bar, more or less, dresses the same – doesn't

matter whether they're council estate kids or well-connected Henriettas, they all wear training shoes. Some of them wear Evisu, some of them can only run to Carhartt, but they're all in sportswear. Most of them seem to believe that they're, in some way, following a New York b-boy look. And everybody, more or less, likes the same music. They've all been to Home once, but they prefer Fabric because you don't get the coach parties. And they all love The Footie.

How is it that football, derided and neglected by the glamorous worlds of music and fashion for decades, has come to be the defining style factor of our nation? We need to go back, way back, to a few little scenes dotted around the country round about the summer of 1976. All of this nonsense can be directly traced to a couple of clubs: Crackers in Soho and Checkmate in Liverpool. Almost identical scenes, yet marked by their differences, too. Mention 1976 and you'd immediately and quite properly think of punk. Well punk didn't happen for a lot of kids. Not in 1976, at least. There was a whole gang of disaffected inner-city urchins who wouldn't have been seen dead in ripped clothing, and who

had nothing in common with the student-led punk thing. Tom T-shirts? People would think you were poor!

But even that is getting slightly ahead of ourselves. From 1974, young London gays breaking away from the boredom and the stigma of the check-shirted Clone look started adopting Trevor Sorbie's foppish Wedge haircut. The Wedge was an androgynous statement of intent, which makes it all the more amazing that this haircut found favour with the more styleconscious football crews of the time. The fact that David Bowie circa 'Young Americans' and Bryan Ferry quickly championed the Wedge may have made it more acceptable. Nonetheless we're talking about 40 or 50 hardcore hooligans from Millwall going to the match looking like hermaphrodites, at a time when the rest of the country was causing havoc in DM boots and Wrangler jackets.

That dressed-up element of the Millwall crew and their counterparts at Arsenal, Tottenham and West Ham were the same kids that went down to Crackers and its equivalents in the boroughs. They were soul boys, more or less, though the

were casting aspersions on the clued-up minority were themselves starting to join the new movement at football. This is where the two scenes, London and Liverpool, started to go their own way. The London 'casual' look, indeed, was far from casual. Norman Jay was another Crackers devotee. He was also becoming a well-known face at Tottenham.

"Those that knew the score wore Gabicci, Acquascutum jackets, suede cardigans, Bally shoes. It was all pukka stuff."

And ideal for going out after the match.

"Most of our lot would get back from the match and pile into the pub and carry on whatever they'd been doing before. But I hated pubs. I'd be off to a club. And I'd be dressed for it, you know what I mean?"

The London look during that era differed from team to team. But there were certain common denominators among the London cognoscenti. There was a sort of taxi driver chic – Gabicci, Pierre Sangan, Lacoste and so on – that told them apart. And the wedge haircut, of course.

Wedges only caught on in Liverpool in a huge way from 1977 onwards, but there was a continental, sporty addition to the London Soul Boy look. This can be attributed to the extent to which Liverpool fans, in particular, were starting to travel abroad. The major sports manufacturing countries of Germany (Adidas, Puma), France (Donnay, Lacoste) and Italy (Fila, Kappa) were plundered during this period. As a result, utilitarian combinations of sportswear and scallymod clothing took over Liverpool like an inflagration, boys and girls alike. One minute the Checkers Saturday-nite crew were waiting outside to chase the wedge-heads, the next thing everybody was dancing to Kraftwerk and wearing Samba. Girls wore Kickers, white socks, kilts and mohair jumpers. Boys wore Pod or any one from an ever-changing run of training shoes. Fred Perrys were big. So were Peter Storm or Adidas ski-jackets and everyone wore Lois jeans or dungarees. This was clubwear with a double meaning - football and nightlife - and again the scene had strong, though totally unsuspected gay origins, musically. On an average night in Checkmate or The Harrington

you'd hear Kraftwerk, Gina X, the occasional Patrick Crowley mix for the girls. And because hardly any motion was required, everybody was dancing. This was previously unheard of among the football crowd. They'd get up for the last couple of records, stagger around and try to cop off. But this was different. They were a part of a scally/Kraftwerk crossover. It was a rum old carry on, the main Liverpool and Everton boys letting their guard as well as their hair down, dancing to nascent electronica.

The metronomic industrial and electronic staples of the Liverpool and Manchester clubs eventually found their way back to the US to inspire electro which, in its turn, begat the first house tunes a couple of years later. Now while nobody's suggesting that British football fans invented House, the scene that fostered Kraftwerk and spawned Depeche Mode et al had a direct bearing on America's electronic groove pioneers. Kevin Saunderson would be the first to hold his hand up.

By the early Eighties, every football team in the country had its mob of well-dressed hooligans, identifiable by their sportswear, opportunist crime and independent travel. The great divide was still music. There was no unifying dancefloor movement to bond this wholly unregulated youth uprising together. This was youth culture at its best; genuinely from the street and untrammelled by the fashion industry. But it was disparate. Occasional tunes like Dillinger's 'Cocaine' would hit the same nerve everywhere, but otherwise it was a case of same tune, different beat. Ashley Beedle, an Arsenal fan of long standing, remembers the joys of combining football travel with Wigan Casino:

"You'd get the call and it was, like: 'we're travelling, man'. It was that freedom. That sense that you were in on something that only the right people knew about."

If some of Arsenal's top faces were among Wigan's chosen few, Liverpool's were in the crowd. Merseyside football fans followed The Jam as fervently as they supported their teams. As Peter Hooton recalls: "The Jam were the nearest thing you'd get to a football band."

Until New Order. They were embarrassed by it


at first. In one of their first interviews, Bernard Sumner complained about the way New Order had been adopted by "spotty students and football hooligans". More than any other factor, New Order are the link between the burgeoning football fashion scene of the early Eighties and the near-unilateral club and clubwear conformity of today. New Order were managed by the late, great Rob Gretton. He and Peter Hook used to go to Manchester City together and were well aware of the changing face of style on the terraces. There's a famous early New Order shot of Hooky backstage with trademark beard and a Lacoste.

Whether Bernard Sumner liked it or not, New Order were perries (the Manc equivalent of a Liverpool scally or a London casual). Anyone who's been away with their team, worn the right training shoes and carried a Head bag to Europe knows the score. You have to do more than change your name to Albrecht to escape your past. And it was obvious that New Order knew the score when they started wiring New York influences into their work from 1982 onwards. On the Channel Four programme, The Rhythm Divine, Steven Morris tells how The Paradise Garage galvanised New Order and, literally, changed their tune.

"We were stood there, me and Barney and it was like – there aren't many women here, are there? The music's fucking brilliant though! We just soaked it all up."

The results of the increasing amount of time New Order spent in New York are famously apparent in 'Blue Monday' (1983), for many years the biggest-selling 12-inch single of all time, and the equally revolutionary 'Confusion', released later on the same year and mixed by seminal electro producer, Arthur Baker.


In the slipstream of the New Order-led electro boom in the UK came Morgan Khan's Streetsounds series, synonymous with football fans in Fila BJ tracksuit tops. Afrika Bambaata was in the charts, people were spinning on their backs and money was too tight to mention. Against the socially fractured backdrop of Thatcherite Britain, there was fighting at the match like never before. The 1985 FA Cup




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semi-final between Liverpool and Manchester United was preceded by untold outbreaks of violence. Police displayed photographs of the armoury of weapons they'd seized, including flare-guns, spiked golf balls, cattle prods and Stanley knives. The replay at Maine Road was just as bad. Millwall fans rioted at Luton, famously routing the mounted constabulary. A Leeds fan lost his life after a wall gave way during a pitched battle at Birmingham's Saint Andrew's ground. Thirty-nine Juventus supporters died amid terrible violence at Heysel. We were directionless, clueless, tearing each other apart. Something had to give. Then came House.

For most advocates in the UK, their intro to house music came with Farley Jackmaster Funk's 'Love Can't Turn Around'. The track featured a strident and unrelenting electro synth line, and the unforgettable Darryl Pandy, a monstrously well-fleshed Chicago queen providing vocals in the most unlikely, high-pitched but mellifluous falsetto. It was inspirational stuff. And it seemed to go away almost as quickly as it came. For a brief moment kids everywhere were 'jacking' with abandon to British manifestations like Krush. And then nothing. London seemed to give up on the House Sound of Chicago almost immediately, diversifying into all manner of club scenes. The big tracks at RAW were 'Smokin" by Troublefunk and 'Come Into My Life' by Joyce Sims. But at the same time, Rare Groove was starting to happen, with Patrick Lilley's club nights taking a whole gang of clubbers back to their soul roots. Simultaneously, The Mud Club and, later, Dirtbox were playing Run DMC next to Grace Jones and The Beastie Boys' 'Fight For Your Right To Party'. The Cafe De Paris crew were rocking to the sound of, er, Nina Simone. Warehouse parties were springing up all over the capital. The scene was all over the place, but the seeds of Balearic were being sown.

Yet in the North, house music – or manifestations of it – never went away. Nude at Haçienda was the purest night, attracting bugeyed football heads including one Mark Berry and his sidekick Shaun Ryder. The Manchester tribe started to make the sounds as well as play them. Along with various ex-members of A Certain Ratio, the fledgling DeConstruction label put out tracks by Annette, DCB, Frequency 9 and their own T-Coy project. The first rumblings of Happy Mondays and Baby Ford came out in 1986/87, followed by the almighty underground anthem, 'Voodoo Ray'. All made in Manchester.

In Liverpool, Steve Proctor had started adding live performances by bands like New Order and Big Audio Dynamite to his Thursday night residency at The State. They were nights a young Peter Hooton would never forget:

"I'd never seen anything like that BAD gig. It was the first time I'd heard samples and technology used like that. It was unbelievable. Big pop songs with rock guitars and dance rhythms. And the crowd – it was all the lads from the match, right into it from start to finish. You wouldn't have thought it was possible."

Not only was it possible, it was about to take over the country's disaffected youth. With ecstasy becoming more and more commonplace from 1986 onwards, it seems likely that these disparate scenes would have gone their own happy way. But musical and cultural differences were about to be kicked into touch. A combination of Ibiza's debauched and hedonistic traditions, some Club 18-30 casualties and the

international ambitions of the football scallywags cleared the way for British youth culture's finest legacy, acid house.

The role of the ordinary holidaymaker in the much-written history of acid house is much maligned. Long before Nicky Holloway exported distilled elixir of Ibiza in 1987 and bent the nation to his will, excitable Brits were targetting Ibiza for nightclub mayhem. Ibiza has always had a reputation. And when clubs like Le Beat Route and The Wag recovered from New Wave fallout in 1982, Ibiza, along with NYC was back on the clubbers' agenda. Phil Thornton first went in 1984, on a package holiday with the express intention of finding the dark heart of Ibiza. . .

"I was told before I went by people I knew from the weekenders that I'd have to dye my hair blond and be overtly mad. They said it was nothing like here – it was different, it was mad. And it was. I saw my first live scratch-mix. Pete Tong at The Star Bar, mixing 'Funky Town' into 'Boogie Nights'."

With something as liberating as Ibiza, of course, those New Order dandies were never going to be far away. Along with The Pet Shop Boys, who'd released their 'Disco' remix album in 1986, New Order were a honing a very technical, programmed dance sound. They recorded their 1987 album 'Technique' at Mediterranean Studios on the island. The influences are everywhere, but nowhere more so than on the track 'Run', a ringer for the Sheila B Devotion track and Alfredo favourite, 'Spacer'.

New Order weren't the only scals in town. Little crews from Manchester, Liverpool and London were doing their own thing. Kiting, mainly – spending the season on lbiza on the proceeds of ill-gotten credit cards. These boys, fundamentally white, unemployed, inner-city football heads, partied harder than anybody. They knew where the drugs were. They knew the lads from Blackpool in the Rock bar. They could win at backgammon and dance all night. Andy Swallow, whose Public Demand records are currently having a nice time with Craig David, was one of the West Ham boys at Amnesia, shoulder to shoulder with Barcelona trannies in leather chaps.

Nicky Holloway and the forefathers of acid house learned as much from their new-found friends as they did from Ibiza's clubs. Prior to Ibiza, they'd had a rarified view of clubbing as a pursuit for an in-touch elite. After spending the summer with a group of urchins on the make, they realised that everybody wants to party. You just have to get the party right.

What happened next was the revolution. Clink Street. Shoom. Spectrum. The Trip. The Raid. Solaris. Queens. All London. Madchester happened but not, according to Phil Thornton, as madly as The Sun would have had us believe.

"It was six weeks in the summer in 1988. It lasted as long as the Olympics."

It was happening everywhere else, too. James Baillie recalls the impact of the inaugural Duck Call parties at Venus in Nottingham.

"Remember that the Duck Call lads are Leicester fans. At the time there was massive amounts of trouble between Forest and Leicester and Derby. But I just remember them on the dancefloor together, in love with each other. They all knew who the main faces were, and they were hugging each other. Whenever anyone asks me what my abiding memory of that period is, it's that: lads in those Paul Smith 'Olympic' T-shirts, hugging each other."



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It's a popular image of loved-up times: but it may well be gilding the lily to suggest that ecstasy solved all the nation's ills. But there's no doubt that the atmosphere around football was changing in tandem with the new club culture, not least in terms of fashion.

If the football crowd did the scene one major favour, it is that they pulled Acid House's trousers up. Ian St Clair and Trevor Fung can be thanked for many things, but their dress sense is not one of them. Acid Teds, particularly those from the outer Home Counties are responsible for some of clubbing's most hysterical fashion moments including bandanas, Illac tie-dyed T-shirts, eye patches, ponchos; Peruvian skull caps and silk drawstring pantaloons in various shades of tangerine and purple.

Ashley Beedle, a Clink Street die-hard by 1987's winter of growing content, remembers the early manifestations of the Shoom look: Clink Street was over the road from Shoom. Whereas Shoom had an open-ended Balearic music policy, Clink Street was heavy, druggy house and a much more inner city crowd. Shoom used to close at 2am, Clink Street at 4am.

"Some of them'd come in to our place after Shoom had closed. They'd have ponchos and beads and tambourines. We were like: "What the fuck?" But they didn't care."

Just as the Gabicci soul boys and the Harris tweed crew had a utilitarian logic to their clobber (looks fine day and night; Harris tweeds ideal for storing Rizlas), the Shoom outfit was not without its practical points. It was durable, didn't need ironing and allowed the air to circulate - in Ibiza. In London, in the winter of 1987 it was just plain silly. Thank Heaven for the growing influence of the football kids on the dance floors. Chevignon, Chipie, Mambo and Ocean Pacific (North) or Stussy (South) were joined on the dancefloors by new, affordable diffusion ranges from the most club-wise designers: Michiko Koshino, Paul Smith Jeans, Hamnett Active and Gaultier Junior. Paul Smith, that paragon of all things bespoke, was championing baggy, screen-print T-shirts and his own vicious mustard-coloured jogging pants. No one from the estates would've been seen dead in them, but the point was that the club kids were calling the shots.



The country was starting to sit up and take note. If 1988 was the lightning, then 1990 was the storm. Football fashion and dance music merged into one immutable force. As World Cup Italia '90 approached, the nation's clubs were awash with Duffer Of St George retro football jerseys and 'No Alla Violenza' sweatshirts. Club football shirts, for the first time in living memory, were worn as a fashion statement outside of Newcastle. In the Ibiza 1990 film, A Short Film About Chilling, Andy Weatherall described the jaunt as "Club 18-30 in a Gaultier shirt".

He was right, but there were just as many football shirts in evidence, along with the Gazelles and white Levi's. And after Paul Gascoigne so magnificently failed his country, realised it and burst into tears, there were just as many girls in football shirts, crying along with him then heading off down their nearest Balearic night. The union between the nation's two favourite pastimes was into overdrive. Tracks like 'Goal' by Depth Charge and 'Romario' by Ultraflava filled the floors. New Order took their scally-house crossover to its natural conclusion by colluding with the England team to make what remains soccer's only half-decent pop song, 'World In Motion'. A joyous pop celebration, the track was only spoilt slightly by the 'artistic contributions' of the players.

If football fed ecstasy and dance culture, it was reciprocated, too. Police initiatives to infiltrate football gangs and prosecute the main perpetrators, along with ecstasy's new enlightenment, contributed to a new, less heavy

environment at football grounds. In swift succession, the Sky Television money, the parliamentary obligation for all-seat stadia and Nick Homby's Fever Pitch further entrenched the feelgood factor surrounding football. More and more women and a more diverse social spread started to follow football regularly. But still everybody dressed casual and went out clubbing at night.

By the time the next World Cup came around in 1994, the only major differences from 1990 were changes of degree, rather than changes of scene. Cocaine had overtaken ecstasy; expensive designer casuals were as prevalent as street sportswear; and large capacity superclubs like Ministry and Cream were beginning to flex their muscles — with footballers there in droves, on the guest list.

In many ways, football has lost its edge as it has become more commercial, more of a tourist trap. You have to wonder what emotional umbilical chord binds the coachloads of daytrippers that flock to Old Trafford, Stamford Bridge and Anfield to the clubs they attend. You have to wonder where the driving passion is. Sound familiar? Look at those full-page adverts for Home. That hotline for coach party bookings has become the norm. Nobody's saying that a coachload from Portsmouth has no right to get into Home. But surely the spark that fires a scene comes from collective individualism rather than dot-to-dot conformity. It takes 50 people to fill a coach. 50 people could do something brilliant anywhere.

FOOTBALL FED DANCE CULTURE, IT WAS RECIPROCATE

Terry Farley agrees about the scene's dilution:
"I think people like Oakenfold could be more respectful for the scene they helped to create."

In an attempt to recapture the zest of the heady days of pre-acieeed house, Farley and co have started occasional nights under the banner Faith — a back to the future, open-minded microclub. Just as with Raid and Boy's Own, its fulcrum is a self-made magazine, also called Faith. It's a start. But we need more. That's what you sense in places like the Alphabet Bar. They're talking about "the footie". They're wearing the right trainers. But it's all gone on for too long and they're waiting for something to happen. Sooner or later, something will.

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



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
JURASSIC 5 MEET HOWARD MARKS. THE SULTAN OF THE STONERS INTERVIEWS THE NABOBS OF NEW OLD SKOOL PARTY HIP HOP EXCLUSIVELY FOR MUZIK


IT WAS JUST AFTER 8AM on a Friday morning, and I was flying over the North Sea. I looked down and saw a large ferryboat – quite possibly the one taking Jurassic 5 from Harwich to the Hook Of Holland after their turnultuously successful gig at London's LA2. We were scheduled to meet each other at high noon at the Okura Hotel, Amsterdam. Where could I hold the interview? At a coffee shop, obviously, but which one? Most of them are small, poky, running out of money, closing, opening, or full of irritatingly loud, first-time toking tourists. I called up my dealers. Maybe they'd know of a good one. They recommended the Kashmir lounge in JP Heijeststraat. I waited in the Okura's lobby, thinking about the forthcoming meeting.

Jurassic 5 have gained musical prominence in the UK as embodying some kind of 'back to the old skool' movement in hip hop, providing funky beats and party rhyming as opposed to tired gangsta styling. It's an East Coast sound straight outta Los Angeles. On first hearing their music, one is immediately reminded of the simplicity and innocence of hip hop's infant jam-in-the-park years of fluent flows backed by stirringly simple, communicative beats.

Despite being a nostalgic rap throwback of sorts, Jurassic 5 are anything but mere revivalists. They have the beats (funked-up and impeccably cut rather than glossily posturing jeep-beatz), the lyrics, the sounds (no creepy strings or Wu family neo-goth styling), and the showmanship required to entertain modern audiences,

A couple of hours later, the band and entourage arrived. I had a good look at them, taking a few minutes to distinguish the band members from sound and light engineers, interviewers from photographers, and record company representatives from PR personnel. This was the first time I'd been face to face with a hip hop band, and I was hit with a confusing combination of emotions: fond memories of the peculiarities of hip hop vocabulary and expression, but also harsh reminders of my days at the United States Penitentiary, Terre Haute, Indiana. The band were still buzzing from the success of last night's gig, but took a second or two to weigh me up. I could read their minds. "He looks kinda old for this shit; it's gotta be another boring interview, same stock questions as the rest. "Why are you called Jurassic 5 if there are six of you?" "What makes you different from all the other hip hop





outfits?' 'What exactly is hip hop?' 'Why are you more popular in the UK than in the US?' 'How did you guys get together in the first place?" It gets on every band's tits. I'd better make it clear I was different.

"In case you're worried," I said, "we're just going to hang out for a few hours together. I don't use a tape recorder, and I don't ask questions that are answered in the press packs."

"I guess you must have a good memory." "It's not exactly what I'm known for."

That was enough for Cut Chemist, one of the band's two DJs. He opted to pass on this interview, needing time to "get some shit together for tonight's gig". Akil, one of the four MCs, took pity on me.

"Did somebody say you used to live in the US? You ever been to LA?"

Well as it happens, I did spend one night in Lompoc prison about eight years ago while travelling from the Miami courthouse to USP Terre Haute. The Bloods and Crips were all banged up in Terre Haute when they became too much for the Californian state authorities to handle. Akil's suitably impressed.

"No kidding? You've done real time in a federal prison?"

Actually, it was how I got into hip hop in the first place. Apart from the totem poles and wigwams of the native Americans, it was the only culture I encountered in the United States. Indiana radio stations played both kinds of music: one was called Country, and the other was called Western. Occasionally there'd be a bit of rolling, but never any real rocking. The gang bangers in Terre Haute brought hip hop with them from LA to save me from the tedium of good ol' boys radio.

I'm no authority, but my understanding of the evolution of hip hop is that its rhythmic roots - as with all black American dance music - are in West Africa and the slave plantations. The supremacy of the DJ and the MC stems from the Jamaican sound systems on wheels begun in the Fifties. DJs would spin while chatting vocalists that we would now call MCs or rappers, and

known then as toasters, would extemporise on the mic. Rivalries and competitiveness spawned strange names, masked costumes, capes, swords, and armed, gangster-style bodyguards.

As well as party lyrics, boasts and jibes at other DJs, songs also began to articulate Rastafarianinfluenced sentiments of black pride and self-determination, becoming a thorn in the side of the establishment as a result. Reggae was born and in another prototype for hip hop, early reggae bands dressed as gangsters ('rude boys'), donning sharp suits and shades.

By the early Eighties, institutionalised slavery of black people had been reinstated by the Reagan administration, primarily by imprisoning a massive proportion of the black community, and the nascent hip hop culture became both an articulation of revulsion at this oppression and a means of forgetting it through the joy of tune and dance. Hip hop was the music of the ghettos, the projects, and the prisons.

Between 1991 and 1994, the Los Angeles underground was the true centre of hip hop innovation, exhibiting a kinetic musical energy and a flair for progressive beats and styles. Together with fellow Jurassic 5 MC, Zaakir, Akil was rocking and rhyming at talent shows around LA as part of a crew called Rebels Of Rhythm. They soon found the MC breeding ground known as the Good Life Cafe. The Cafe's open mic sessions encouraged a divergence from the West Coast's now all too familiar and well-known gangsta rap. Crews such as Chillin' Villain Empire, Abstract Tribe Unique, Hip Hop Clan, Unity Committee, and Freestyle Fellowship all gained recognition as a result of appearing at the venue. The Rebels Of Rhythm, meanwhile, developed a reciprocal respect and affection for Unity Committee's MCs, Chali 2na and Marc 7even and DJ Cut Chemist. This led to their working together and the release of a single, 'Unified Rebelution' on Blunt Recordings.

The group then decided to form their own Rumble/Pickininny label. The minimally titled 'EP', its only release, jumped straight into the UK

Top 40. Referring to this, MC Akil offered the following advice: "I would urge every independent artist to put something out first. If you prove yourself, both to yourself and to the people that pick up the records, then the labels will come looking for you. Let hip hop be your form of rebellion. It was mine, and it kept me on the straight and narrow."

June sees the release of their new album, 'Quality Control', a track from which ('Doo Wop') I first heard showcased at last year's Glastonbury festival. I asked if the band were happy with the new record.

"I'm happy it's finished," said MC Zaakir. "We're just waiting for the samples to get cleared. It took a while because we were doing so much touring. The subject matter's a little deeper than our last record. When you first come out, it's good not to be too preachy."

I loved the gentle strength that was oozing out of these guys. I don't know what DJ Cut Chemist generally did for kicks, but the other DJ, Nu-Mark, and the rest of the band were more than a little enthusiastic about relocating from the Okura lobby to absolutely anywhere else, and particularly to a coffee shop. We hailed a taxi and were picked up by a grey-haired female taxi driver who stared at us rather sternly. She asked what we did for a living. When Akil responded that they were musicians, her eyes lit up.

"Ah! Rock 'n' rollers!"

Well, kinda.

"Rock 'n' roll is wonderful," said the now smiling madame chauffeur. "It brings people of all races together to share the same good time."

"You could say the same thing about sex," suggested Nu-Mark.

"And drugs," I added, rather predictably. She burst out laughing and took our words as a cue to commence an extraordinary repertoire of cavalier driving. No-entry signs, red lights, and speed limits were completely ignored. Tram bells chimed in deafening panic and weaving cyclists mowed down even more than their usual daily quota of pedestrians.

A non-chemical euphoria of gay abandon captured us and took us to the Kashmir Lounge. There, we were greeted by large spacious rooms, furnished with mountains of multi-coloured cushions and sporting Moroccan hookahs, Baluchistan kilims, Indian miniature paintings, and Haight-Ashbury posters from the Sixties. I'd been at least an hour without a joint, so frantically skinned up. Akil and Nu-Mark did the same. We continued chatting and started giggling. In a few minutes, MCs Zaakir and Chali 2na, sporting massive grins, tumbled through the door and joined us. Zaakir was hungry.

"Do they have any pancakes here?"

"No, but I'm sure we could get some from nearby," I said. Dan, the band's manager and life-long friend, went off to forage. Chali asked for the dope menu, bought some Northern Lights, Jack Herrer, and Super Skunk, and then asked if he could have a small chunk of my hashish. He put some of each into what has to be one of the strongest, smoothest spliffs I've ever had the pleasure of smoking. I never thought it would take a guy from an LA hip hop band to get me properly stoned in Amsterdam.

"We Americans aren't all bad, Howard. Just most of us!" laughed Chali.

Dan returned from the street with some bagels, having failed to find any pancakes. Zaakir picked up a bagel and began eating while examining the pictures on the wall. He ambled into the next room and came back looking disgruntled. "They say I shouldn't eat this bagel here. What's up with these guys?"


"Maybe you should pretend it's a joint," said Charlie through a face full of smiles. "You'd have no problems then. This place is wild."

We got completely caned, all hovering joyfully on the edge of unconsciousness. Massive Attack came over the loudspeakers as time and spliffs passed by. In an hour or so, the band would have to go the venue, the Milky Way, just off Leidseplein. I asked about the previous night's gig. I'd heard it went well. . .

"It was like now, like a dream," Chali said. "You know man, the white and Asian kids right here in Europe want to embrace every element of hip hop culture, whereas the Black kids in the United States are mostly interested in just the rapping and the money. If I didn't have family, I'd move here to live tomorrow."

Oddly, appreciation of hip hop's original ethos is at its lowest in the black communities of the US from where it sprang. For most of them, Jurassic 5 are not hardcore enough, not aggressive enough, not nasty enough gangstas.

"Rap is engulfed in a negative state, with people talking about the crime on the street.



We try to display the flip side, like the energy from a nice party, when you have fun. Then we sprinkle the stew with things that are going on," explained Chali 2na.

"Yeah, hip hop's supposed to be about the party and establishing the good feeling of the music," agreed DJ Nu-Mark. I have to say I agree. Real and original hip hop (best exemplified by bands like The Sugar Hill Gang, Cold Crush Brothers, Double Trouble and Main Source) had nothing to do with bi-coastal rivalries, ghetto brutality, guns, big cars, cussin', bitch-ridin', cheddar-bathin', million dollar videos, or profitdriven marketing schemes. Hip hop was about DJs and MCs wowing crowds in parks and on playgrounds with breaks, beats and rhymes. So are Jurassic 5: they're bringing back and updating the best from a time when all that really mattered was the music, sharing life-affirming merriment, and a shamelessly old school feeling of community. Rather than taking the gats-andblunts approach of other Californians, Jurassic 5 have looked to the East, not only for the funk, but also for the attitude. Jurassic 5 take the pain out of living in the past. They are the saviours of hip hop, looking to the past while evolving anew.

"We even had girls chasing us after the show last night," sparked up the quietest of Jurassic 5's MCs, Marc 7even.

"I guess we all prefer starfuckers to motherfuckers," I quipped.

". . . And don't-give-a-fuckers to mindfuckers," added Chali, chuckling helplessly. Any ice that might have been ligging around was now well and truly broken. We started chatting about everything under the sun. As time plodded on, however, the conversation turned into a detailed

critical analysis of last night's performance. Like true perfectionists, they teased each other about their mistakes.

And perfectionists Jurassic 5 undoubtedly are. An hour later, they had completely snapped out of relaxation mode and were on the stage executing the most thorough soundcheck I've witnessed. It's the mark of true professionalism: you can always do it, no matter how caned you were before starting. If you can't, try another job. Vocal harmonies were painstakingly run through, as were the almost choreographed body coordinations. Lights and sounds were perfected. The stage looked as if it had been prepared for a line up of the Four Tops, Fatboy Slim, Black Uhuru and the Pink Floyd. Luckily, there was an hour to kill before show time, so there was time to pop to the nearby Rokery coffee shop for another of Chali's specials. This time a pre-stage special, a blunt with the same ingredients plus a little Purole Haze.

The show started punctually, with an explosion of full-on entertainment. The four MCs were well to the fore, singing choruses in that classic halfinterested rap style with the traditional rapper's self-promotion lying comfortably between poignantly conscious lyrics. They traded lines and phrases and fed off each other, smoothly crosscutting and intertwining, imparting a real sense of fun with outlandish, easy to hear rhymes. DJs Nu-Mark and Cut Chemist showed off their cut 'n' paste talents - utilising an archive worthy of their Californian cohort, DJ Shadow and their incredible skills in splicing together samples and scratches. In keeping with the band's participatory nature, each band member chimed in or dropped a beat into the kicked-back mix. The new album (my favourite tracks are 'Contact', 'L.A.U.S.D.', 'Improvise', and the magnificent 'Swing Set') could not have been better showcased.

But my real thrill was listening to their impeccable delivery of the foot-stepping and mind-mesmerising 'Concrete Schoolyard', which had the four MCs faultlessly chanting out Jurassic 5's unapologetic and no-holds barred manifesto:

"Let's take it back to the concrete streets Original raps with real live MCs No playground tactics, No rabbit-in-a-hat tricks, Just that classic rap shit from Jurassic." (M)

Jurassic 5 have been added to the bills for the Dance Stage at Reading Festival (August 28th) and Homelands Scotland (September 4th). Their new album 'Quality Control' is out now on Interscope

Top 10 Hip Hop Joints (Ahahahahaha. Haha. Ha)

CRACK BUSINESS' by The Sindecut (from 'Changing The Scenery')
Officially an anti-crack song, but instead of drafting in Nancy Reagan, London's Sindecut just encouraged us to focus on smoking sensimilla instead. Station additional control of the state of the instead. Sterling advice.

'MARY' by The Freestyle Fellowship (from 'Inner City Griots') A love song for a very special lady – Mary Jane. Jazz-psychodelia with what seems like far too many words far too quickly for genuine stoners.

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








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



Hoorah, then, for Jurassic 5, who eschew the hysterical tone of most big-label hip hop for 55 minutes of slightly prim, socialistic partying. Okay, so it lacks the glamour of their hardcore peers, there's evidence of a lack of rhythmic ideas (very old skool, that), and the instrumental track is unbearable. But the flows are crisp and they manage to avoid mainstream hip hop's current twin weapons of self-importance and obfuscation. Not as good as their debut, but still fun.

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

Bristol meets Cuba in an explosive rhythmic adventure...

WHEN UP, Bustle & Out make an album they don't mess about. When they talk of making a Bristol meets Cuba record, they don't simply grab a riff from some old Cuban track and smoke a few cigars for effect. No, this is the real deal. Teaming up with Richard

Egües – Cuba's number one flautist and orchestrator – this is music-making that truly honours the spirit of Cuba. Mould and D. 'Ein' Fell don't

Mould and D.'E.in' Fell don't just leave it at the music either. There's a movie and a book to boot. Slices of Jules Elvin's faded Super 8 documentarystyle film and excerpts from their Rebel Radio Diary are included on the CD.

But what of the music itself? Let's not beat about the bush. This album is superb. 'Hip Hop Barrio' rocks out with funk as deep as the Grand Canyon and rollercoaster-steep drum builds, while 'Rebel Satellite', is a mouth-organ-fest with one seriously funky drummer and some sinister electronic twists. When you add to those the laidback soul of 'Por Eso Quiero', the darkly minimal 'Havana's Streets' and the docudrama composition 'Kennedy's Secret Tapes', about the Cuban invasion, you've got an album and a half. NRK Sound Division disciple keeps it smooth and deep

NOWHERE in dance are qualities like subtlety and musicality as highly prized as they are within the deep house community. NICK Bracegirdle is the man who made Bryan Adams acceptable to a generation. Before that information becomes just another factoid, just think what it means! 'Halcyon' ain't 'Offshore' by a billion miles, but having Airscape on remix duties means matters aren't absolutely dull.

Midfield General: "This sort of music is the one strand I've never found anything to identify with. It's very well-crafted but nothing's happening for me.

CRISPINJGLOVER Fried/Thin Ice (Paper)

LOOK, it's Paper Records and Crispin J Glover-what hipster in the their right mind is going to diss that combination? Happily for those whose true taste gets in the way of their credibility, this is actually a very fruity, disco-bassline sex-bomb firing out 'nuff brass and considered percussion.

Midfield General: "Ilke the way it turns into 'Fascination' by The Human League halfway through - a great twist, very Eighties. I've always liked Paper and particularly Repap, their offshoot label, who are perfect for my mid-tempo disco-chugger sets.

DRIZA

Let It Out (Oyster Music)

HERE'S an idea. Let RIP-providers of many a memorable UK garage moment loose on the freshest material from Drizabone main man, Vince Garcia. Then add extra mixes from original house mainstay CJ Mackintosh and Craig David's buddy Fraser T Smith. Sadly, the results are indiscernible from each other: watery 4/4-beat pop-soul by numbers.

Midfield General: "It very much reminds me of the Brand New Heavies - very nice but quite generic. If I was out and heard it I'd dance on quite happily but it sounds far too much like far too many other records."

BOB SINCLAR | Feel For You (Defected)

A TRUE monster, which will be eating dancefloors across the UK and its Spanish rave-holiday counterpart alive by the time you read this. Thumping French discohouse with no affectations and an easy to

shout vocal. CZR and Spiller provide main mixes with extra-saxified jazzish versions from Astrotrax.

Midfield General: "I was a bit horrified with the saxophone mix - very Kenny G, but the original has energy and I could imagine being seduced by it. I could have a discommoment to this. It's nothing new, but Hike the hook."

INTERFLOW Feel The Music/Hysteria (Interflow)

SOUTH coast hard house trancery from Chris Hampshire of Hampshire & Weatherley. Not half bad either. The A-side uses a simple, building, dark rhythm and effects combo alongside the weaving title phrase to good effect. The other side just rocks its socks off.

Midfield General: "It's nippy! A lot faster than anything I'd usually go for. I preferred it before the sweeping chords came in,

the more minimal bit. Not really my bag, but they're from Brighton so I'm going to be polite in case I see them in Waitrose."

ELITE FORCE

Bombin' The Subway (Fused & Bruised)

UNASHAMED hardcore-influenced new school breakz thuggery from a label which knows more than its fair share about such matters. Which isn't to say this is obvious as a punch in the face. . . well, alright, actually, it is... but tasty as Hell anyway in a slow, heavy breakbeat sort of way.

Midfield General: "Like it: all those hardcore hoovery noises, but maintaining elements of groove and funk which sometimes get forgotten about. Hike the fact it's slower than you'd normally expect, because it would have been tempting to pitch it up in the studio and really 'ave it.'

SHAGGY

Dance & Shout (MCA)

MR Boombastic returns with a set of major label remixes. As well as the Jackson Five -sampling 'Shark Radio Edit' there's Pussy 2000's pumpin' house version, a collection of would-be-progressive Klub Kings takes, and MPC's two-step thing, Hmmmm...

Midfield General: "Depending where you hear this first you'll either detest it or adore it. At the moment, after half a can of Stella, I really think it's funny but I might change my mind in five minutes. Very cheesy, but I do have a history of liking Shaggy."

FRED EVERYTHING Universal Mind (2020 Vision)

THE all-consuming Fred plucks another sparse, electronic funk gem from his 'Under The Sun' album. It doesn't do very much but it does it with a certain style. Equally cool back-room mixes are provided by Atjazz and Shaboom's Mark Bell. Late night leftfield housification.

Midfield General: "I really like the groove, a quirky disco shuffle, elements of Murk. I didn't get it originally, but then it just grabs you. The sort of record I'd have a nightmare trying to mix – it'd sound like the Grand National but I'd still give it a go."

CLEPTOMANIACS Time Out For Love (Fluential)

> DEFECTED'S new baby sister runs for the sunshine in a very Defected manner. The original is a big outspoken hunk of female vocaltasticness but deeper househeads will flip immediately to the DJ Phenix remix, which squeaks and squiggles through a series of dubbier moves

Midfield General: "I actually like the breakdown and rise. It's quite good they're called Cleptomaniacs too, because they've stolen from loads of things. A Saturday night record."

TOM NOVY I Rock (Rulin')

MULITPLE mixes from German Kosmonaut, Novy. The C-side is the classiest – a smooth (dare we say it) Balearic groove. There's also a main mix which makes more use of the female vocal and a truly hideous filter discoversion. Novy, Robbie Rivera and Pete Heller are the men responsible.

Midfield General: "The stutter in the mix is good. You can hear a little trance element in the riff. It's a fairly inoffensive song, but the discoversion is horrible."

HARDCELL

Possarp EP (Skunkworks)

WE presume Nils Danielsson, creator of this single, is one of the Adam Beyerconnected Scandi-techno mafia. The 'Possarp' EP makes no bones about its intentions and consists of jagged industrial looping for European dancefloors.

Midfield General: "This has got funk and swing – it comes at you. A dirty, relentless mixing tool. [After 20 seconds] Obviously Jeff Mills would've mixed out of it by now. admire the cheek of someone who puts out a record that just loops and loops. Really grubby. I can imagine trying to play it and it not going down very well but fuck it...

AQUASKY VERSUS MASTER BLASTERS Sureshot EP (Botchit Breaks)

THE Botchit & Scarper stable is never less than interesting and these three tracks are highly attention-worthy. The title track is solid Rennie Pilgrem/Tipper-style darkness but flip over for another couple of intelligently constructed beatz adventures.

Midfield General: "This was nearly my single of the month. Both the B-side tracks are going to be a hit with me: great breaks, sort of electro, a winner. Oh yes! Brilliant! Love it! The A-side is good but the other two are exceptional.

JOEYNEGRO FEATURING TAKA BOOM Saturday (Incentive)

'DISCO' Dave Lee reappears with Chaka Khan's sister and this time he's aiming for the top slot. Barrucci go slightly hard house while two-step bods Dubaholics appease the south east massive.

Midfield General: "I'm always impressed with how lush Dave Lee gets everything. A well done disco-pop record. If it was on the radio I wouldn't rush and turn it off."

TOM HARDING Can You Believe It (Sacred)

A ONE-TIME Bedroom Bedlam winner, Tom Harding has come along way from his Bristol roots with residencies across the land. Fine deckmeister though he is, this is highly formulaic hard trance.

Midfield General: "I'd get a nosebleed playing records at this speed. Quite mental, isn'tit? Certainly not what I'd play."

SGTROCK We're In Heaven (Wiija)

THEY always tell us "Norman's been caning this" if a tune has any bounce at all, but in this case they could be right. A hip house rhythm fights it out with car homs, acid souigales and a woman informing us that she's in Heaven.

MIDFIELD GENERAL'S SINGLE OF THE MONTH

Versions from the beatsy to the housey. Fun.

 Midfield General: "Judging by the press release, I should like it more. It's alright, but it lacks that X-factor - it doesn't grab you by the knackers."

ALEX D'ELIA VERSUS **EBOPALLSTARS** Isn't Life Wonderful (IDJ)


ALL the way from Italy, master of many styles Dino Lenny is joined by Alex D'Elia and Andrea Doria on one of IDJ's astute futuretrance cutings. The 'Flat6 Remix' is a ringer for Underworld's 'Rez' while the original is more epic, choral and tune-laden.

Midfield General: "I'm always a sucker for these sort of noises, actually. This bit's ripped off 'Rez' quite blatantly. The 'Flat6 Remix' is not too offensive ... the original, however, is homble. As Midge Ure would have said, "This means nothing to me!"

FREDDY FRESH Freddy Hums Your Favourites (Kingsize)


ALTHOUGH a fellow of wide-ranging talents, Freddy Fresh has chosen lately to follow the path of least resistance, so this is over-jovial rock 'n' roll bigbeat central. Three slices of mindless bounce which owe more to Herman's Hermits than Public Enemy.

Midfield General: "I've always thought



PEACHES Lovertits (Kitty-Yo) ONCE upon a time she was a schoolteacher in her native Canada, now she's a filthy-mouthed, Berlin-based, one-woman electronic army. All four tracks are a testament to lo-fi inventiveness, dark and demanding female sexuality, and twisted, deadpan lyricism. Combining elements of Gina X and original smack-rock dons Suicide, it's probably too threatening to be as successful as it deserves.

.... Midfield General: "This is really good stands out. It'd probably be quite difficult to play out - sounds like X-Ray Spex but electronic. Hove the bass noise. It's got that element of fifth. We just signed a record with Kool Keith and Helen Hunter which is pom-related - he's an obsessive fan and it's her job. It can be a sticky area, if you'll excuse the pun, but I really like this, it's sleazy in the best way.

Midfield General: "We've had some Skint office moments to this. When everyone came back from Miami they were all talking about it. It's great, I've heard it out a couple of times and it's inventive and cheeky - a classic in the making."

there was a certain charm to Freddy Fresh records. [Darnian's universal benevolence towards fellow recording artistes briefly cracks]. Oh fuck. Possibly a bit too frantic, too much in there - so many ideas. Norman could make an album out of this one track. I think it suffers as a result."

CHANTILLY

Tasty Treats

(Peace Feast Industries)

PEACE Feast is an unpredictable Turnmy Touch subsidiary which usually strikes the right balance between funk and humour. Here, Maurice Fulton provides a bubbling, pomo-film soundtrack for Alabama goodtime girl Tiff McGinnis' sleazed up spoken vocals. Not very dancefloor.

Midfield General: "This is fucking great. Not necessarily back room for me either, because a lot of my sets are of this ilk. The crowds go for it because I'm usually the bit before Norman. Abit of character, a bit of class and the vocals are slightly twisted."

ROLLERGIRL

dreadful records like this to fund more interesting ventures. We'll undoubtedly be seeing the very tasty Ms Girl in her skates all over children's telly shortly. The tune, meanwhile, is an Alice Deejay-esque cover of the old Madonna hit. Not good.

Midfield General: "I'm gobsmacked. Don't let it be big! It's so bad it's actually funny. We had this drunken debate about Aqua the other week and I was saying that at least they know what they're doing and are aware how fucking awful they are. I just hope Rollergirl is too. Horrendous.

RICHARDF

Watcha Got To Say/Feels So Strong (Subliminal)

SUBLIMINAL has almost become a genre unto itself, and although some pundits are becoming a little tired of their sound, working DJs and the clubbing public still love it. Here's why. Thoroughly effective American house you can't argue with.

Midfield General: "The intro's good. [Quite possibly ironically] I didn't expect something to filter up through the beats. Filter house by numbers but you know you'd dance to it because it pushes all the right buttons.

ANTARTICA Adrift (Cast Your Mind) (React)

RESERVED trance double pack which plays on composer Steve Gibbs' competent musicality. Nothing to set the world on fire - the original Airwave Vs Indoctrinate Mix and the Force Mass Motion Mix are all okay... but no cigars are in the offing.

Midfield General: "I don't know what it is, maybe I find this sound too clean. [Bell-like trance keyboard comes in]. No! No! No!"

TREVOR ROCKLIFFE & DAZSAUND

Party People EP (Bush)

ROCKLIFFE and Saund began, as most dancey folk know, as a Troll/Trade hard house duo but have since been away on their own techno adventures. Sadly the lead track here is a rather characterless stroll through disco waters and while the two tracks on the other side are tougher, they're not that much more entertaining.

Midfield General: "Doesn't do much, but sometimes that's not the point. The techno side is more up my street, but I've heard so many records that filter around like this."

CRASH 'N' BURN Santa Pod (Stay Up Forever)

AARON Liberator & Guy McAffer, regulars on the London underground party circuit, borrow a few moves from The Prodigy's 'Speedway', and add their own patented high BPMs and acid mayhem. Harsh but straight to the point.

Midfield General: "It reminds me of an old Italian tune which had similar racing car effects. Nothing I'd ever play but there's a certain cheeky charm to it and it's really fucking banging. Actually, I don't mind it."

HAKANLIBDO Walk Away (Loaded)

YOU don't expect a load of throwaway tosh

from Loaded, do you? And you certainly don't get it here. Paula Lobos lays down a vocal that Todd Edwards spends some time working into his own thang while 20:20 Vision and Monophone provide alternate takes. All deep sultry stuff. It's on Damian's label, by the way.

Midfield General: "After Todd's remix of Wildchild's 'Can You Feel The Beat', when I heard he was up for a remix ljust shouted. Yes!' out of my office. Hove the way he chops records up, it's incredible. I've tried it, but I'm shit at it. Todd Edwards could probably shit in a bucket and I'd like it. Just to be impartial I'll give it...

DUTAUCHER

Science Fiction/Winterlove (Additive)

FORGET 'Winterlove (Funk Function Mix)', it's just generic Eye-O trancery. 'Science Fiction', on the other hand, contains more imagination. It's throbbing, relentless, with zippy Yomanda-like synths creeping round the top end, plus a waffly speech about "rave planets" and other nonsense which takes up the whole middle third of the record.

Midfield General: "It really annoys me when people use a name that excites you, like 'Funk Function', but then you hear it and it's neither funk nor functioning. The A-side's quite good, though."



FREEFORM FIVE Break Me (Classic)

Anu Pillai hits another home run for Classic and creates a bit of an anthem in the process. Take a Daft Punk groove, put it through the Basement Jaxx mangle then put the results on an eight track and get Funkadelic to iam over the groove and you've got 'Break Me'. The kind of record that will have DJs across the board hot under the collar and should, by rights, make Anu the star he deserves to be. Probably the funkiest record of 2000 so far. (KIM)

DJ MOTION FEATURING SOMMER TRELLA Crazy Drum (Gala, US)

Fabulously deep, funky and sexual in that dirty Chicago style. The spoken word by Sommer Trella sits perfectly with Paul Johnstone's groove and Mazi's 'Jazz Revival' mix is perfect for the heads. An all round near perfect debut for Gala, so well done DJ Motion. (TF)

COMMON FACTOR AND JOHN REDMOND World is Mine (Planet E)

As all the cheesey trance DJs go mad over DJ Rolando (nine months late, mind you), up steps another Detroit icon: Planet E. The vocals are superbly soulful, the song is wonderfully uplifting, and it's on Planet E - so we'll all buy it. of course. (TF)

HARRY 'CHOO CHOO' ROMERO

Beats Vol 1 (Subliminal)

Stark, harsh beats make this much more a Tenacla set staple than a Morillo one. Hopefully, it's a sign that Subliminal can escape from Saturday night mainstream territory. Great percussion and a driving groove that never lets up - classic dark underground house music. (TF)

X-PRESS 2 AC/DC (Junior).

So the boys are back in town - with a track that's apparently big for DJs as diverse as John Digweed and Smokin' Jo. A wild, dark noise moves throughout the track, making it slightly disturbing. Underneath the percussive groove is classic Xpress 2 - one of those big, funky Space terrace records. (TF)

MKL VERSUS SOY Her Song (Dance Trax)

Fantastic NYC block-party music. A classic reggae vocal reminiscent of Winston Rodney, roots, reggae, horns and a cool funky house groove. A wonderful, emotive song about the man's love for his lady - pure delight for Central Park Sundays. (TF)

MJ COLE Sincere (Talkin' Loud)

Modern house's finest exponents, Miguel Migs and Jay Denes, take on Cole's sublime anthem. Migs' vocal is a smooth sensual ride through deep house, while Jay takes things slightly jazzier on a wicked Rhodes-driven dub. Just wait till Faith favourite 'Rough Out Here' hits the streets. It's gorgeous. (TF)

ONIONZ AND MASTER D Celia (NRK)

The fresh breeze that the whole west coast new school have given us is being undermined by a deluge of average product. Too much, too samey, too soon. This, however is of a different quality, and a somewhat cooler vibe. Wonderful Latin female scat vocals plus cool keys. You need this record. (TF)

NOVA NOVA Plaid (Agua Bassino Mix) (F Communication)

Edinburgh's Jason Robertson has been a bit quiet of late. Thankfully, this tasteful remix of 'Plaid' comes just in time to save the withdrawal symptoms. Like the best of his work, this dub mix combines warm pads and dreamy, wandering melodies into a 4/4 cocktail of late-night bliss. Another perfect Bassing moment for warming up or winding down. (KM)

BELUSHI Evolution (Loaded)

I don't own many jungle records but Ils & Solo's 'In the Area' is one of them - it sounds great at 33. Here, Mr Solo (presumably the same one) pops up on Loaded along with Dave Stone as Belushi. 'Evolution' comes across like a breakbeat dub version of 'Papa Was A Rolling Stone' topped with some cool, Sixties-style cinematic samples. (KM)

JOE SILVA Pick Me Up (Viva, USA)

It takes a little while to get into this, but after a few listens Joe Silva's bass groove gets into your system. Head for the 'Deep & Jazzy Dub' for a cool combo of funky keyboard stabs and a killer string line, rubbed down with some tight swinging bass. Classy stuff. (KW)

JUNIOR SANCHEZ Manhattan Melody (Yoshitoshi, USA)

It's not often you get to play Yoshitoshi records these days unless you're hammering it full throttle. Here Junior Sanchez (of all people) provides a discotinged groove for the deeper floors. Like a House Of 909 tune from a few years back, 'Manhattan Melody' lays a rising 'Summertime'-style synth line over a Miguel Migs-like backing track to create the kind of cut that you'd hear raising the roof in the Sub Club at 2am. Choice. (KM)

AQUANOTE


True Love (Naked Music)

The real delight however, is the awesome, downtempo tones of 'Latenite'. Imagine Photek's 'Into The Nineties' done all in electronics and you're there. Superb. (KIM)



DAVID HARNESS The Beginning EP (Look At You, USA)

Head straight to 'Your Spirit' - a deep and moody female groaning cut for serious late night action. Louis Vega played this after Pepe Bradock's 'Burning' at the Magic Sessions in Miami, and thus holds very fond memories for me indeed. True underground! (SH)

ROCHELLE FLEMING It's Not Over (Remixes) (Afterhours, USA)

In my humble opinion this is one of Full Intention's best remixes of late. They've brought out First Choice diva Rochelle Fleming's vocal over a very soulful but energetic backing track. If you liked their re-working of 'I Never Knew' by Roger S then you'll dig this. (SH)

DRIZA

Let It Out (Oyster Music)

Driza get a remix treatment from RIP, with a catchy, filtered loop for peak time play. CJ Mackintosh adds a more traditional vibe, with warm Rhodes, chugging bass and crisp drums. Smooth! (SH)

A MAN CALLED ADAM They Just Want (Strictly Rhythm, USA)

This one's guite self-indulgent but it has a vibe all of its own. Deep Philly vibes set against a filtered groove that's broken down and rebuilt, topped with unisex wailings and a haunting harmonica. Deep shit! (SH)

KNEE DEEP Knee Deep EP (Fluential)

'Can We really Do This' is the standout track here, using the 'My Loleatta' acappella to great effect. K-Klass turn out a very soulful but more pumpin' version, while the flip features the deeper, discofied 'Your Love' and the atmospheric, deep house of 'The Limit'. A strong EP. (SH)

MARIE ST JAMES Closer I Get (Remixes) (Yoruba, USA)

We liked this the first time around, but the mixes were too mellow for club play. Now, this delightfully sweet female vocal track has been given a reconstruction by Frankie Feliciano in his familiar style, while Johnick create a cheeky mix, using a lick from 'I Wanna Be Loved By You' which works rather well. (SH)

MARIAH CAREY Can't Take That Away (Sony, USA)

Once again, David Morales gets to tweak Mariah Carey for the dancefloor. Go straight to his 'Revival Triumphant Dub'

where he lays Mariah's sensual improvisations over his consistent Defmix sound. You either love or hate this type of thing, and we're smitten! (SH)

ARTFUL DODGER & ROBBIE CRAIG FEATURING CRAIG DAVID Woman Trouble (ffrr)

Robbie Craig on form on an infectious and original song that presses all the latest buttons, and will no doubt top the UK charts. Sunkids provide a disco-flavoured remix that hits the mark for more traditional dancefloors, and there's even a Latin-vibed mix which also works well. (SH)

SUTRA Free (Delerious)

The original mix is definitely one for the boogie boys and Paul 'Trouble' Anderson at The Loft springs to mind. This syrupy female vocal dancer is very early Eighties in feel and will keep the purists entertained for a while while still moving the more discerning clubbers. (SH)

DEA PROJECT Music Is My Life (DEA International)

The Dub Enforcement Agency return with their best single to date. This remix package contains some excellent work from Y Tribe, cheekily using the bassline from Salt 'n' Pepa's 'Push It'. It contains the original vocal, MC-style, sitting pretty over some wicked music. The original version still sounds cool, but it's all about the Y Tribe mix. (8)

MJ COLE Sincere (Talkin' Loud)

The follow up to 'Crazy Love' looks to go straight where it's predecessor went before - high into the UK Top 40. MJ himself does a full vocal rub for the clubs; a fat, bassy affair produced with all the class and guile you expect from the man, with vocals from his favourite lady, Elizabeth Troy. MJ's one of the genre's brightest stars-long may his music live on. (8)

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N'n'G Life Ride (Telstar)

Another one from the vaults gets a well deserved release. It features the microphone skills of the legendary Creed and some rasping vocals from Rose Windross, Grant Nelson completes the team. It's an all star cast, and an all star tune: big beats, bigger vocals and hopefully a huge chart position. (8)

CRAIG DAVID 7 Days (Telstar)

Is this another hit for the boy wonder? Yes, if Sunship has anything to do with it! A song about dating a girl and the subsequent week's events, it has success written all over it. Coupled with Sunship's work, it can't fail. Sweet, clean song, sweet, clean production. (8)

SHANKS & BIGFOOT Sing-A-Long (Chocolate Boy)

As it's the summer, it seems fitting that the guys have chosen to release their follow-up to the seminal 'Sweet Like Chocolate'. The original mix of this sounds like the first single, but Wide Boy's version is absolutely wicked. It needs to be listened to loud, with the windows open, and roof down (so there's no chance of it happening here) as this has so much feelgood factor in it. (S)

....

SO SOLID CREW It's Just The Little Things (Paper Money)

This young crew of DJs and MCs from south London are creating a bit of a buzz for themselves, reinforced by this slammer of a tune. In true club style it features the MCs doing their stuff, with the occasional female appearance to sing the chorus. It you like soft, gentle and smooth beats, you ain't gonna like this, because they are ruff, tuff, but wicked. It has rocked every club I've played it in, and it's taken pride of place at the front of my box. (8)

ANGIE STONE No More Rain (DeVox/Arista)

UK garage meets r&b, and properly, as Wookie was flown to the US to reproduce this gem. There is nothing left for me to say about this producer, as over the last two years I've used every superlative in my vocabulary. A cameo appearance from his main and lead vocalist Lain takes this onto another level, and after a couple of plays it's become a firm fave. It doesn't get much better than this. (S)



So Who The Hell Is. . . Lonyo?

ONE-TIME PRO FOOTBALLER AND VERY POSSIBLY THE NEXT BIG NAME IN TWO-STEP

Whaddya mean 'pro-footballer'? Starting out as a youth player for Fulham, Lonyo ended up in the reserves at QPR before he decided to

concentrate on a musical career.

How did his team-mates respond? "They took the piss. cos they thought it was gonna be some song like that Hoddle and Waddle thing. Actually they took the piss anyway.

More history, please. Now 24, Lonyo grew up in London and formed the group D-Firm who recorded together for three years, their sound based in their passion for soul and r&b. But it wasn't until Lonyo quit and signed up for university that things really started heating up. He started a series of parties

where he MCed as Comme Ci Comme Ça. Femi B then asked him to appear at his Rotation night at Subterania. So it began.

Anything else? He provided the vocal for Dem 2's 'Destiny'. Oh, and Janet Jackson asked him to sing at her album launch party.

What's he up to right now?

Enjoying my second season in Agia Napa, getting a lot of love playing Twice As Nice with the Dreem Teem. My tune's getting caned over here because it's sunny and beautiful, so Summer Of Love' seems apt. Maybe when the summer finally kicks off in Britain, so will my record." (THG)

FREEFALL FEATURING JAN JOHNSTON Skydive (Remixes) (Renaissance)

One of the most important releases of recent times makes a welcome return with two outstanding new mixes courtesy of a back-on-form Way Out West and those Sheffield scoundrels, Mara. Nick Warren and Jody use a silky smooth build to entrap you before letting loose their twisted effects on those vocals awesome. The Mara mix looked unlikely to see the light of day when a certain German label refused to release it, but here it is. Deep, dark and very minimal. Anthemic stuff! (P)

One of last year's gems gets a second release with a host of awesome mixes. Azzure give the quirky oddity a full on rework that packs a serious punch. Jarrod and Gibey once again take the dark noute and Berocca drops a driving mix with lifting appeal and deadly submarine bass. (P)

Dreaming (Headstate)

The king of progressive house is back again with one of his largest releases, taking his excursion into the world of breaks and beats one step further with the addition of Kirsty Hawkshaw's vocals. Joining the party are Evolution, Libra and Science Department. A must. (P)

INNATE Changes (Baroque)

The follow up to 'Oddessi' that also makes great use of cut up spoken vocals. They are carefully placed over the top of a minimal house groove with some haunting breakdowns. A distinct Twillo vice, with two mixes to choose from makes a package that you cannot go wrong with. (P)

GRAHAM CAMP Solid State (Automatic)

Automatic must be commended for the brave move away from their typically more lively sound to a deeper, relentless technouse vibe. 'Solid State' excites for one simple reason – the bassline. It sounds as though it was lifted straight from an old Trax release – add some poished modern production and you get a subtle twist on the original house sound. A marvellous if slightly strange release. (P)

SUGARGLIDE Let Me In (ADSR)

We almost got away with it, but no, a Cass & Side mix slipped in again – do these guys ever sleep? Apparently it's an older mix that's been held back for a while but it's another winner from the dynamic duo. Hooky, percussive drive is the name of the game. Add some dark stabs and screwed up vocals and hey presto – arms aloft dancefloor mayhem. (P)

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SONIC TRIBE Rotation (Journey)

'Rotation' foo's you into thinking it's just okay, but furking beneath the surface is a beast that will eat your dancefloor alive. The mix in question here is the 'Remy Mix', a cool blend of Dutch funkiness and sheer power. The original ain't bad either, bridging the gap between the deeper progressive sound and Euro trance. (P)

XPANSION Isolated (Niche)

One of this year's great finds has been the dark and underground world of Niche. Once again they deliver a release that's pure house in essence with massive dancefloor appeal. Two mixes are on offer here, both of them excellent. (P)

BLACK DOVE Capsule (Vapour)

Vapour hit you in the face with another monster. 'Capsule' is best enjoyed in its Ocean Wave mix — a solid, rockn' club mix with bags of bass, quirky riffs and that unique Ocean Wave sound. Big with all your usual suspects. (P)

THE INFERNAL MACHINE

Realistic (white label)

Hailing from Holland and coming in a Sander Kleinenberg/DJ Remy style, this is punchy, melodic Dutch house – a beautiful piece of work. Expect major label A&R chequebook wielding action very soon. One of the anthems of the year so far. (P)

....

INSIGMA Odyssey 1 (Atcr)

If you were stunned and left in awe by the engineering precision of Insigma's first release, prepare yourself: 'Odyssey' 1' is exceptional. When you hear 'Odyssey' for the first time, you will be left with a serene feeling of contentment. It also leaves dancefloors looking like Berut! Superb trance for those who wish to listen and hear. (**LEF**)

DIGBY JONES Eternity (Academy)

By day a mild-mannered accountant, Digby Jones leads a daring double life. Music and production have always been close to his heart, but it has taken him several years to actually sit down and produce his first track. With a whole host of personal influences, ranging from Hybrid to BT, this is a man with varied tastes, and his debut release is testament to his musical abilities! (CIP)

JOHN VESTA Coaster (Stonehouse)

With almost no time for the dust to settle after his last club rocket, John (Swan) Vesta has another scorcher for the nation's dancefloors. 'Coaster' is a breathtaking piece of music. Joh's production skills really shine through on this beautiful and melancholy track. Amethyst are also on top form with an equally impressive remix. (CLF)

SPECTRE Evolution (Tonkin')

Tonkin' Records has an absolutely blinding selection of quality music due for release over the next few months. The material is some of the best that we've ever heard from them. Spectre's 'Evolution: Destination 1' is a Balearic trancer, 'Destination 2' is a darker and more progressive mix. Both versions are worthy of peak time play. **CLEF**)

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ROLAND & REMY Air Walkin' (Tune Inn)

After causing a stir with 'Inner Laugh', Tune Inn have licensed this deep and funky track by Roland Klinkenberg and DJ Remy for their second release. A rich and intelligent groove, perfectly complemented by the Mark Snimmon and Bernie Hurst remix on the flip. Pete Gawtry has an uncompromising attitude to his label's material: only the best will do. (LLF)

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JON LAPREVOTE Shades (EveNova)

Jon Laprevote is a new player from Sweden full of fresh and innovative ideas. Unquestionably, "Shades" is a vibrant summer record, perfect for hot lbiza nghts, while the darker material on the flip reflects a more subtle direction. (LLF)

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DEJURE Do You Believe (Spot On)

On the scale of things, you get 'big tunes', 'dub anthems' and then 'mind boggling monsters'. Spot On seems to have a heard of these to release on the unsuspecting public at will. 'Do You

Believe' is a devilishly cunning track, made by blokes with lots of studio equipment and small magic wands. Keep your eyes open for this one people! (LIF)

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IN SECT Slammer (Transient)

Transient must be feeling very pleased with themselves. The debut collaboration between Allan Lidström and Vibrasphere's Richard Bergiof is a deep and menacing journey. The production is flawless and smooth and each sound is engineered to dark perfection. Perhaps this is an indication of the direction that the everevolving trance scene is taking. (LLF)

SLINKY Factor 3: Various Artists (Slinky)

With the holidays fast approaching the opera house-based superclub is preparing for the summer compilation assault. With so many dynamite tracks due for release soon, it's going to be a hard choice. The Stinky 'Factor 3' compilation will be high up the list, with some of the best trance and hard house releases this year. (LIF)

Why did you form Nebula?

*An opportunity arose as an offshoot of the compilation consultant work I do for Virgin Records. I was coming across tracks from abroad that could cross onto the UK dance scene and potentially become hits."

What do you hope to achieve? "There's no great


achieve? "There's no great

In the pipeline? *2000 BC, a commercial project from Chris & Bradley from the Ruff Driverz; Blank & Jones' 'The Nightfly'; DJ Hitch Hiker's 'Cabal (Energy Flow)' with a very fresh sounding DJ Tiesto remix. Allure, which is a Euro-progressive Tiesto project, Ramsey & Fen's new material and lots more."

BLIM Earthman (Botchit & Scarper)

BLIM releases are as rare as the proverbial rocking horse shit, so we always rejoice here at breakbeat central when one comes along. Detroit emotion tethered to London technology throws up a future classic more than capable of holding its own at Underground Resistance's round table. The sparse, almost militarystyle digital funk of 'Metronydazyl holds its own in the style of former running mate Freq Nasty on the flip. Not as good as the epic 'Chronologic' - not much is - but a masterpiece nonetheless.

CREATIVE INVASION COLLECTIVE Conundrum (Boombox)

A tougher sound for Boombox, who follow up their excellent 'Stabiliser' release with a minimal crossover groove tailor made for the big system. A pulse beats harder than Gripper Stebson while the hi-hats lift the track skywards.

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BELUSHI

Evolution (Loaded)

Belushi and Loaded keep it real on the south coast. The ''2nd Stanze mix is top quality tech-house sprinkled with breaks, but the real deal is Hakan's interpretation of 'Papa Was A Rolling Stone' on the flip. Funking the floor, avoiding the cheese while harging tough is no mean feat, and this does all three with aplomb.

....

MR C Electronische (The End)

A different direction for Mr Plink Plank. Beats heads should seek out this techbreaks island amid the choppy, tech-house waters of the fourth '100% Subterrain' EP. One to slot between a 4/4 and breakbeat set and complete with enough electronic soul to keep the androids happy until the next Layo & Bushwacka joint.

....

BUSHWACKA! Monster (Plank)

Cut and paste pressure from Mister B. Instantly recognisable sampledelica allied to the usual tech-funk from the Bushman makes this another credible notch in his belt, even if it's not his best. The electric and eciectic, mid-tempo 'Herbal' on the flip is like last year's 'Pig Chase' at half speed, and equally fresh.

...

SCUBA Z Hip Bounce (BLIM Remix) (ODD)

As is customary, the below average original by Scuba Z is handed over to one of breakbeat's leading lights for a radical makeover. BLIM follows in the footsteps of Freq Nasty and Ils by getting evil with a hardcore-esque bassline. A peaktime box moment for a few weeks at least.

...

KERBCRAWLER Crack Whore (Whole Nine Yards)

Uncompromising breaks with a less than charming name. Solid Ground turn in a thudding, uninspring DJ tool to please only the most right wing members of the Breakbeat Party. Quin Walley's more experimental, electro breakfest however, should entertain boys and girls allike.

...

ISSI NOHO First Snow (Acetate Ltd)

Above average prog-breaks fodder from rent-a-remix General Mici. 'Issi Noho' benefits from all the tricks of the trade, with Beber-esque bass booms, and a constant, trancey synth hiding in the background. Acetate remains a label to watch for and the General is still a major takent, but this is not either's best work.

...

THEMROC The Frozen EP (Wall Of Sound)

Second release from Dan Peppe and Steve White nods towards techno, dirty electro and breaks and then dismisses them all for their own minimalist funk. Another sharp turn left for Wall Of Sound and a lesson in contro

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DETROIT GRAND PUBAHS

Sandwiches (Pepper)

Destined to be one of the biggest records of the summer and already

reviewed a few months previously. Now it's back agan due to an excellent Krafty Kuts remix. The vocal is beefed up by an electro shimmy that's rougher than his big beat past suggests. The only slight shame is the obligatory drum & bass, sub bass drawl. But nitpicking aside, a fantastic rerub, up there with the original.

....

OSCAR GOLDMAN Thrust 2 (Lee Coombs Remix) (Carbon)

Lee Coombs can do no wrong at the moment. With patronage from Tongy for his last release, and a stonking remx just completed for Mob Records, his time seems to have come. For the equally cool Carbon label he's put on his house/breaks boots, thrown some electro strings on as an overcoat, and headed for the dancefloor. With the likes of Lawler behind it this it could cross over with style.

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MEKON Calm Gunshot (Wall Of Sound)

The first release since the Schoolly D collaboration of yesteryear is a full on twisted guitar and beats release – Camden K-hole music too harsh for these delcate ears. Thermot try to steer the mess from beer-scaked to smoking dancefloors with little success. A Wall Of Sound throwback with limited appeal.

..

YOUNGSTA True VIP (SUAD)

From the SUAD stable comes another monster mash-up of breakbeat and garage, an awful lot of bass as you would expect, and a funky guitar injection courtesy World Of Crime's 'Ride The Funky'. 'Funk Power' on the flip follows the same successful formula.

...

SILVIO ECOMO Standing (Hooj Choons)

Oh look! It's General Midi again on the remix tip. As you'd expect, the emphasis

is on the progressive side, with deep basslines, a peculiar warped vocal and a sexy, chugging beat. A lot of effort has gone into this and it shows. It's good to see a quality label like Hooj supporting breakbeats, too.

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THE HIGHTOWER SET An Evening With The Devil (Passenger)

Four tunes of varying quality from this fledgling label with 'Part One' acting like big beat never ended, shufflebump oddness on 'Part Two', more sub-Fatboy rock on 'Three', and 'Part 4' stroking its jazz beard at high speed. Might get Beelzebub bopping, but we're not sure.

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Albums

VARIOUS Super G1 (Slalom)

Tucked away in the West Country and claiming a slice of the electronic pie is the Sialom label. An underground byword for quality, it's been championed by the likes of Adam Freeland, and is second home to Propellerheads' Will White, and ones-to-watch, Three Mile Island. 11 tracks of class from a label you'll be hearing a lot more about.

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7-HURTZ Audiophiliac (Output)

10 tracks of classic lo-fi electro from Trevor Jackson's ever excellent, ever-challenging Output label. From the nagging synth bassiines to the electronic tics flowing in and out of the mix, this is an album that will no doubt be ignored by the masses, but is more worthy than much of the tin pot tesh trying to pass as old school out there. Put together for £100 but sounding like a million dollars.

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In The Bag / Danny McMillan

MJ COLE'S 'Strung Out' on Talkin' Loud is a real end of night bomb. Next up there's BLU MAR TEN's 'The Conversationalist' which is only on dub plate at the moment. Since I joined Kiss to co-host the breakbeat show with Adam Freeland, this jazzy number has been a regular show starter.

Everyone's on to MATTHEW 'BUSHWACKA' B these days and 'Bluntiski' (Plank) is a good example of why. It took the roof off at Buzz in Washington DC. 'Gilken' by GIZMO is another big track. Like the Bushwacka

one it makes most sense on a good clear, huge system.

Next there's WAY OUT
WEST's 'Untitled – Y3K Volume
2'. Me and Jody [Wisternoff]
bump into each other a lot in the
States. I'm still waiting for my
copy of the new album, though.

AQUASKY's 'Hypaspace' is the best thing Botchit Breaks have put out since Blim's 'Chronologic'. THE PLUMP DJS can turn a party around with one of their tracks or remixes, and their version of ELEKTRONAUTS' 'Bumper' (Lacerba) is outstanding.

VETERAN OF BEATZ OUTINGS ON A VARIETY OF LABELS TELLS US WHAT'S COOKING IN HIS CURRENT VINYL STASH

Still in the box since before the Miami Conference is the link between two-step and breakbeat – STANTON WARRIORS' 'Da Virus' on Mob. And last but by no means least there's a brand new white label from THE DUB MARINES which is so fresh it doesn't even have a name yet. This is a warm, summer smash with good vocal hooks.

McMillan and South's 'Ritual Gelebrations' is out now on 10 Kilo. Catch Danny on Kiss 100 every other Thursday, 2-4am



IT'S THINKING Afterglow (EC, Holland)

A timely re-release for a record which originally came out on Malego in the mid-Nineties and has been an underground anthem ever since. This time round we get Matthew 'Bushwackal' B's excellent new breakbeat version alongside an equally splendid, ultra-deep rub from Mr C. But it's the group's own '2000 Mix' that really hits the spot. Beautiful, hypnotic, proper soulful techno of the very highest order. Classic. (DIVI)

A very strong contender that only missed Vital Release status because it's only available as a limited edition white lahel. Taking in influences from electro to garage. 'London' is beautifully arranged funkiness. The snares snap, the 808s click and the bass surges like a runaway steamroller down a steep hill. (DIVI)

MARK BROOM New Arrival (Pure Plastic)

Nowadays, finding a decent string-based tune with real dancefloor appeal is a hard task. Which makes this wonderfully emotive string-led groover an even greater catch. Think classic Detroit with new school know-how. (DIVI)

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BRIAN ZENTZ Faculty X (Zozan)

Another string-based tune, but one that makes absolutely no concession to current styles. So old school you'd be forgiven for thinking it was some lost Blake Baxter classic, and the sort of tune that Laurent Gamier could turn in to anthem. (DIM)

....

MINO

Some Kinda Move (Cy-cle)

The first release on this label showed a lot of promise, and this is the business. Check out the awesome groove on Mino's track or the acid sweeps in on T-Jay & LE Bass' flipside and you'll see what we mean. An imprint to watch. (DIVI)

SAMNERIC

Crazed Cello (Silver Pearl, USA)

The Aquatherium remix is the one to go for here. Splendidly funky from start to finish, it features some of the best percussion we've heard in ages alongside a dark, twonote bassline, some fat chunky breaks and a killer arrangement. (DIVI)

HIPP-E & TONY Soul Interactive (Soma)

San Francisco's Hipp-E and Tony have released some of the most exciting records of the last couple of years. Like most of their material this is deep, but effortlessly accessible 3am dancefloor tackle. The difference this time round is the addition of some more overtly techno sounds. (DM)

ZETA REPUBLIC EP 1 (Electrix)

The work of Umek, the first side features a couple of old school electro tracks, but it's the more contemporary sounding flipside that really hits the spot, with a track that sounds like a super dark, European version of tech-house. A great start for what looks like being a very interesting label. (DM)

HAWKE Monk For A Day EP (Fiji, USA)

Hawke's 'Three Nudes In A Purple Garden' was one of the best records of the Nineties and this is another awesome tune. Consisting of little more than a freestyle conga groove, laced with some soaring, very filmic strings, it's beautifully simple and absolutely unforgettable. (DM)

JOHN TEJADA AND ARIAN I EVISTE Focus And Temper (Immigrant, USA)

Not exactly dancefloor-friendly, but those into the deeper side of techno will find plenty to keep themselves amused here. It's well put together and some of the melody lines are a joy. (DM)

VARIOUS ARTISTS Subterrain 100% Unreleased Sampler 4 (The End)

The best instalment from Mr C's mix CD. This one features a tough Pure Science track, some swirly acid business from C himself, Eddle Richards getting housey and Asad Rizvi rounding things off with one of his clean cut mixing grooves. (DIVI)

VARIOUS ARTISTS Designer Music Sampler (Planet E)

As a taster for Carl Craig's collection of remixes out later this year, how about this little teaser featuring the previously unreleased Craig reworking of Alexander Robotnick's classic electronic disco cut. 'Problems D'Amour'. Yes, thought so. Race yer down the shops! (JS)

DANIEL WANG Silver Trophies (Environ)

Balinu boss Wang lays down three more superlative tracks to show that he still is the man with the glitterball plan. If melodic and harmonic funk, cascading through disco showers of shimmering pulses, stabs and chords sounds up your alleyway then 'Silver Trophies' will take the prize any day. Well polished. (JS)

JAMES RUSKIN/ OLIVER HO

The Divide Part 2/Tides (Unreleased Mix) (Blueprint)

As split 12-inches go they don't get much more bass-looped and frenzied than this. Ruskin raids the vaults and glues the classic 'Divide' bassline into a lockedgroove vortex. Ho charges headfirst into metallic rhythms while flame-throwing around high-pitched abstraction. (JS)

MIKE CLARK PRESENTS AGENT X

Deep in Brazil (Planet F)

From early Eighties Detroit parties to involvement in Members Of The House, UR, Shockwave and Happy Records, Agent X is a techno veteran. He's earned his stripes the hard way and 'Deep In

Brazil' keeps the samba/experimental axis firmly in the ascendance. Arribal (JS)

VARIOUS ARTISTS Chelsea: Bottom Heavy (BMG, New Zealand)

Believe it or not, tech-house is very popular in New Zealand and that's due in no small part to English DJ Chelsea's devotion to the genre. This, her second mix CD, features artists like Nathan Coles, Asad Rizvi and Circulation all spotlessly blended in to a programme that sounds as good on a buzzed up Saturday night as it does on a monged out Sunday afternoon. (DM)

VARIOUS ARTISTS DJ Bone : Subject Detroit Volume 2 (Eukatek)

Proper Detroit techno with 27 tracks mixed with real Motor City know-how. Classics by Scan 7 and Derrick May rub shoulders with new material from the likes of Access 58 and Funk D'Void and there's even the odd melody clash to add that live feel. A great CD that will please old Detroit fans as much as curious newcomers. (DIVI)

VARIOUS ARTISTS lan Void : This Is The Colour We Are (Geushky)

A good document of the harder, faster end of European techno. Void's mixing is tight and dynamic, and everyone from Umek and Chris McCormack to Jamie Bissmire and Adam Beyer is represented. (DIVI)

THE DETROIT DON ON HIS NEW MIX ALBUM AND THE TECHNO JOYS OF THE ELECTRONIC MUSIC FESTIVAL

"WE'VE JUST HAD our first Electronic Music Festival in Detroit and it was amazing. It was downtown at this open-air site, right on the water. We had one and a half million people there. I've been to parties were you have a real good line up and 50 people show up, so to have that was amazing."

We're talking to a tired but enthusiastic DJ Bone on the phone. He touched down in London a few hours ago to start the first leg of a tour promoting his new mix CD - an amazing 27 tracks by everyone from Jeff Mills to Laurent Garnier, alongside a lot of new material from his own Subject imprint. Along with the usual deck trickery, the most striking thing about Bone's style is his ability to move from the hard-as-nails to the beautifully soulful without missing a beat or losing any momentum.

"I did this CD to show people what I can do," he explains, "I

can't go to every place in the world and I wanted to make people understand that they don't have to listen to what the media tell them to listen to, and to hopefully just light that spark of imagination."

Does he envisage a time, especially in America, when the sound of Detroit is accepted?


"No, because there's no marketing for it. The media don't want to push anything that's faceless and the guys in Detroit just want the music to speak for itself."

So given that, is there any real hope for techno?

Sure there is. Detroit is about having an independent state of mind. That's what techno is about - evolution, soul, funk and innovation. That's what we need to bring back,"

It's not quite as big as 'Sandstorm', but East Anglan Nigel's debut is another rather large Neo tune. A bouncy little houser with tough beats, cheeky riffs galore and a siren that drives them bonkers. Also includes the darker 'Ariel's Paradise Factory Mix'.

Let The Rhythm Move You (Nukleuz)

The first solo single in a while from the master of the offbeat isn't as full-on as recent blue Nukleuz outings, but bound to be just as large nonetheless. The 'Diamond Geezers Mix' on the flp works wonders on the floor.

So Who The Hell Is. . . Tom Stephan?

A 'Filthy Hetero'? No, that was just the name of his debut single, released back in 1993 as Tracy & Sharon. Tom went on to secure residencies and guest spots in some of London's trendiest gay clubs, He had moved to London in 1991 to study film-making, but the course was crap so he went clubbing all the time instead.

So he's a party animal from hell? Well, he was then, 'but I'm retiring from that now!'.

Tom's penchant for the nightlife began while dancing to Junior Vasquez' legendary sets at The Sound Factory. "Prior to that I was into industrial stuff like Nitzer Ebb, but after seeing Junior I was converted to house music overnight." When Tom moved to London his mission was to spread the 'deep, dark, druggy, tribal rhythms" he'd heard Vasquez spin.


So Vasquez is his hero? Not any more. Junior's arch-rival Danny Tenaglia's the man now. Tom has started a track with him, and the highlight of his career was when they DJed together at Vinyl in New York.


Who else has he recorded with? His new, "atypical" single was originally recorded with Gerideau four years ago and he's done remixes for Nomad,

Pet Shop Boys (who he shares management with) and Eartha Kitt. He'd most like to remix Madonna and Depeche Mode.


Anything else? Tom's best known for his work under the guise of Superchumbo. He was signed under that name to Twisted in 1996 and produced a couple of singles and a number of remixes for the label. "My production work is an extension of my DJing — when I make a record it's usually one I need for my set that I haven't found yet." While everything with Twisted is "up in the air" at the moment, he is hoping to record a new single for the label later in the year.

Spice gets hard and heavy with the intense textures of 'Dynamite', launching into an unrelenting, monotone 'Amen' workout that will have any sound system busting at the seams. Flip for some '4 Play': a tidy, funky groover with its tight bass groove and guitar licks.

JB WILLIAMS Bonjour Mes Amis (Shoebox)

JB WILLIAMS Translocation (Shoebox)

Trainspotters take note: these both arrived in the same package but with different catalogue numbers, so we've no idea if it's a double pack or not. Four cuts from our old friend Mr B, opening with the tranced-out, old skool leanings of 'Bonjour Mes Amis' flipped by the unsurprising 303 tweakings of 'Acid Clamp'. The highlight is 'Move Your Body' on the second twelve, all luscious strings, sparkling synth arpeggios and chilled rhythms.

TOMMY KNOCKER Milton Playhouse (Intercom)

E-Z rollers' label continues to plough the stepping jazz vibes, with Intercom debutant Tommy Knocker. He provides the usual plethora of brass stabs, big breakdowns and bouncing double bass hooks for all lovers of that 'Miles From Home' sound. 'Twin Face' gets into some bass distortion for a jumpier vibe.

RANTOUL

Central (Lookin' Good)

Well, you must know by now - huge pad swirls, loping bass tones, and atmospheric melodies. 'Central' lacks the dramatic breadth of some of its ilk, which gives it a grittier edge. 'Ocean Breeze' wins out, with its melancholic but funky appeal and intricate harmonics steering it away from textured drifting.

TOTAL SCIENCE Cashflow (Timeless)

Hot on the heels of their mighty 'Advance' album, the Oxford duo mint another release for Timeless. The deep chord washes and moody, stabbing subs of 'Cashflow' make for a spellbinding mover. Elsewhere, 'PSI's whining loops, clanging beats and deep, dark stabs, underlined by thunderous subs provide minimalism with a tough edge.

STATE OF PLAY Searchin' (Aspect)

State Of Play return with more soulful lyrical touches from Jenny Burell, floating over a feverish analogue groove, peppered with synth stabs and filtered surges. Matrix, having been pretty quiet

since the release of his album, takes over for some remix action. A splendid mix of ethereal effects leads into an absorbing analogue twister, building the pace without getting too noisy.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Back 2 Back Vol 1 (Formation)

Two heavyweights of the scene team up with a side each on the opener from this big series from Formation. Shy FX steams in with more of that irresistible funkiness that made 'Bambaataa' so massive, adding nasty noise surges to the frenzied percussion and thumping tones. SS goes for some hard and noisy stepping on '13th Floor'.

USUAL SUSPECTS/ SOURCE DIRECT Recharged (Apollo)

The first stage in a series of five twelves, re-interpreting last year's 'Charged' project on R&S offshoot, Apollo. Usual Suspects turn in a deep, mystical analogue variation, sliding from twisted ambience to moody growling for a chilled stepper. Source Direct dives into a tasty, sleazy, jazz-funk driven beats workout.

DIVINE STYLER Directrix (Optical Mixes) (Mo' Wax)

More remix pressure. This time it's Mo' Wax calling in the big boys, with Optical providing the reverberating acid touches to 'Directrix', flying around a collage of stabbing keys, upsurges, and a typically percussion-laden step groove.

VERTIGO

The Drained (Droppin' Science)

Global Communication's Mark Pritchard and Danny Breaks team up on the longstanding imprint for some severe technoid tastiness. 'The Drained' boasts intense, discordant atmospherics and distorted blasts, giving way to a stomping beats workout. Flip to 'Migraine' for more overdriven synth mayhem.

SWIFT

Jaws (Charged)

Stepping, growling mayhem from Swift. Speed the bassline up on this one and you could almost get that infamous Jaws theme tune. Then it's off on a bouncing roller that serves its dancefloor purpose well. 'Reality', meanwhile, utilises some looped-out tones for a minimal stepper.

LEXIS

Album Sampler (Certificate 18)

As a taster for the forthcoming 'Branch Of Knowledge' debut album, Lexis - aka Universal - lets go the Photek rework of the classic 'Groove Therapy', which originally appeared in limited quantities and is still much sought after. The slickest of rhythms and funkiest of basslines, floating underneath some

luscious keys and string crescendos. Check 'Mind Games' for some smooth, downtempo synthetic funk.

HYBRIDZ

Eyewall (Perpsective)

This one hits with some rearranged old skool break flavours before sliding into all manner of jumping tones and moody synth lines. Code take over for some growling noise explosions and hard, slamming beats on 'Carbon'.

RASERBI ADE The Scorpion (Streetbeats)

Debut release for the Raser and Blue partnership, utilising that classic 'Scorpio' break which probably helped to inspire the title, blending with grizzly noise stabs for a funky little roller. Flip for some downtempo funk madness, launching into a slick, minimal, overdriven chugger.

DISTORTED MINDZ Snuff Baby (Formation)

And it's that 'Scorpio' break again. You don't hear it for a while, then it's being pulled right out after 'Drop Bear'. This

one is along the same lines as the Raserblade cut, letting the beats do the work with touches of acidic mayhem laid over the top. 'Load Jump' gets hard and industrial with its machine beats and wobbling, distorted bass hook.

DYLAN & FACS Plankton (Technical Itch Remix)

Although it's listed as a sampler for the forthcoming '20th Century Dust' EP, this actually won't appear on it, so grab it while you can. Mr Itch toughens up 'Plankton', giving it that in-your-face feel, with huge noisecore breakdowns and

E-Z ROLLERS RS2000 (Moving Shadow)

solid, thumping beats. Hunt it down.

This originally appeared as part of a very limited white label double pack released late last year. Now, the vocal version of 'RS2000' gets a full release due to popular demand, with its intoxicating sliding bass hook, driving beats and rushing vocals providing further crossover dancefloor potential. Flip to more of the same funky vibes on 'Science Funktion'.

Heart Of The Platter

QUIFF AND SPINBACK - AKA **TOTAL SCIENCE** - TELL US ABOUT THEIR LONG AWAITED ALBUM ADVANCE

Quiff: "Our mix of 'Champion Sound' [the seminal 1993 tune Quiff made as Q-Project] starts off the album. There's a lot of old stuff coming out again now, but we thought it was justified because there's been so much interest in it since Bad Company's remix last year. Also, there's a lot of different styles on the album. The whole thing is based on bringing the funk back into it, but not in that wall-to-wall jazz way. More in a soulful way, instead of all the mechanical, two-step drum & bass that's been around recently."

Spinback: "People like Hype and Kenny Ken, who we haven't heard from in ages, are ringing up and raving about it.

There's definitely a shift going on in drum & bass." Quiff: "I'm glad we waited this long before we did an album. We were offered several deals before, one of them with not a bad little advance, but I'm glad we didn't, because some people did those deals and the records never even got put out." Spinback: "And although we've been putting out records for ages, up until two years ago, we didn't have a studio of our own. We had to go round to other people's places! We weren't really totally happy with anything we made up until then."

Quiff: "We're still bedroom musicians, though. My studio's next to my bed, anyway."





HORACE BROWN Shake It Up (R&B 2000 International)

A new label through Sony France that appears to match US r&b singers with backing tracks from DJ Abdel and Cut Klier. The first release is this rough and ready, uptempo groove track with a good song and great vocal arrangement courtesy of Mr Brown. There's another 12-inch floating about on the same label featuring Alphonzo Hunter called 'Gilffrend' which is a bit smoother, but also definitely worth attention.

DE LA SOUL FEATURING REDMAN Ocoh (Tommy Boy)

Keeping with what they know best this latest De La Soul offering really gets under your skin and no doubt rocks the party (as they used to say). Vintage-style production with a nagging loop and Redman helps out with a chorus that's right down his street.

DEMOZEL What Goes Around (white label promo, US)

Every very big hip hop track will spark a cottage industry in variations on its theme and Black Rob's 'Whoa' is no exception. If you've got your unofficial copy of the Bad Boy remix and you're bored with your DJ Runnin' Tings ragga version, here's a girl råb vocal track to add to the collection. Using that main string sample rather than the whole backing track it's a very nice piece of work. Get mixing.

BUSTA RHYMES Fire (Crib Undergound, US)

An unofficial pressing of a track from Busta's forthcoming album. This is totally leftfield, with a hammering beat and one of those raps that only Mr Rhymes could pull off. If you felt that the current official single, 'Get Out' was too commercial, here's the underground antidote.

MACY GRAY I've Committed Murder (Epic promo)

If all Macy Gray records sounded like this, then I would be as big a fan as everyone else seems to be. It's remixed by DJ Premier in the same vein as his work on D'Angelo's 'Devil's Pie'. Knocking around on a UK promo – hunt down your copy today.

RKELLY

Bad Man (LaFace/Jive promo, US)

This is lifted from the forthcoming soundtrack for the remake of 'Shaft', starring Samuel Jackson. Robert goes into his unique, street ballad mode to tell us what a bad man he is. If you're a fan like me, you'll lap it up. If you're not you'll probably just groan.

MAD LION Bring It If You Want (Reprise promo, US)

In the early Nineties, New York dancehall MC Mad Lion made a series of classic hip hop/ragga records for Wieck. He's now back with a new record deal and pretty much picks up where he left off. This is a hard hitting track with a chanted chorus, made for flugged out dance floors. Also featured are a track's worth of ad libs and rhymes from Mad Lion to scratch or sample. Good idea.

THE LOX Recognise (Ruff Ryders promo, US)

The Lox have really hit their stride and follow up their humangous 'Ryde Or Die Bitch' with one of the biggest hip hop tracks currently about. Produced by that man DJ Premier, it features his current trademark, piano-sampling tricks to full effect and the MCing is as top notch as you'd expect.

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LI'L KIM No Matter What They Say (East West promo, US)/

(East West promo, US)/ Suck My Dick (white label promo, UK)

After an eternity, Li'l Kim is finally set to release her new album. Two promo 12-inches are currently doing the rounds as a result. One is called 'Suck My Dick' in which Kim goes in to some mind-boggling detail imagning just what mayhem she'd be able to reek if she was transformed into a man. It's probably safe to say that this won't be her new single. A better candidate is 'No Matter What They Say', a track that takes the current craze for Latin rhythms to an extreme via a José Feliciano sample. It takes some getting used to but it does grow.

BIG SKOOB

Kryptonite (Fully Blown Recordings, US)

Big Skoob drops the crooner samples for his follow up to the recent 'Johnny Dangerous' single. In its place are some Superman affectations and a driving, thugged-out tribute to Brooklyn. Not the most subtle of records, but it does the job nicely.







Señor Coconut's 'El Baile Aleman' album is out now on MultiColor. 'Pop Artificielle' by LB follows on July 17th on Output









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



Desert Island Disco

THE INSIDE TRACK ON HUNTING DOWN RARE VINYL edited by Ralph Moore



ALTHOUGH they are to continue as a two-piece, the recent departure of Darren Emerson from Underworld marks the end of a relationship that gave us one of dance music's most enduring crossover acts. Unfortunately, pre-Emerson, Underworld were unusual to say the least (or dreadful to say the most), and his departure after a decade raises doubts about the remaining duo's

ability to scale the same heights.

In 1991, a year after Emerson teamed up with Hyde and Smith, Underworld released 'Mother Earth'/'The Hump' via the design company Tomato. Limited to 500 copies, it still sells for £40 plus. The following year, a change of name and a change of label saw them release 'Dirty'/'Minneapolis' on Junior Boys Own as Lemon Interrupt, followed in the same year by the rather large 'Eclipse'/ 'Big Mouth' also on JBO. Both fetch around £15 each.

1993 saw them revert to the Underworld name, when they released a one-off 12-inch, 'Mmm... Skyscraper I Love You' on Boys Own. Very soon it was back to JBO where Underworld released a string of twelves on their own Collect imprint. The first release, a one-sided white label of 'Dirty Guitar' (Collect 001. \$40+) was a revamped version of 'Dirty'. This was followed by the equally scarce pink vinyl release of 'Rez'/'Why Why Why' (Collect 002, £40+). To confuse the issue further, 'Rez' was re-released soon after with 'Cowgirl' as the B-side, though its value diminished when it was re-issued in 1995 (JBO 1001). Underworld rounded off 1993 with the awesome 'Spikee'/'Dogman Go Woof'.

1994 kicked off with the critically acclaimed 'Dubnobasswithmyheadman' album, hailed at the time as one of the most important albums of the Nineties. Killer opener, 'Dark And Long', was released as two separate twelves in the summer of 1994 and was an instant anthem at Cream. 'Born Slippy', meanwhile, the lager anthem of the Nineties, was released as a one-off single in the spring of 1995 with that infamous 'Nuxx' mix on the B-side. Due to public demand and the massive success of Trainspotting, 'Born Slippy (Nuxx)' was re-released in 1996 with new mixes. A club classic, it went on to sell well over half a million in the UK alone. Prior to this, an impossibly limited promo 12-inch of 'Rowla' / 'Deep Pan' (UW promo 1) hit the streets. Limited to just 75 copies, it still does the rounds for £30 plus.

Still a bona fide classic, their second album, 'Second Toughest In The Infants' (JBO, 1996) was followed by the single 'Pearl's Girl'/ 'Cherry Pie' in the spring of 1996, re-released over a series of twelves later in the year following the success of 'Born Slippy'. In 1997, they recorded 'Moaner' for the appalling Batman & Robin film. A one-sided JBO test pressing sells for around £20.

Returning to their Essex studio to tweak new beats, things then went quiet for a while. 'King Of Snake' was released at the end of 1998 over two twelves featuring mixes by Dave Clarke and Dave Angel and re-released in 1999 with new mixes by Slam and Fatboy Slim. The third album 'Beaucoup Fish' arrived in March 1999 with three further singles – 'Push Upstairs', 'Jumbo' and 'Bruce Lee'.

There are also some ice-cool imports out there. More information about these can be found via the internet. One recommended web site to check is http://www.dirty.org Some of Underworld and Darren Emerson's remixes are as

collectable as the band's own material. Underworld mixes to track down include 'Thrill Me' by Simply Red (East West, £30), 'Black Sky' by Shakespeare's Sister (London, \$20) 'Water From A Vine Leaf' by William Orbit (Guerilla, \$20) and 'Leave Home' by The Chemical Brothers (JBO, \$20). Of the Emerson mixes, expect to shell out £20 for 'Tonto's Drum' by Eagle's Prey (TEP) and Gat Decor's 'Passion' (Effective).

So where do they go from here? '8 Ball', their most recent release, was a promo-only 12-inch taken from The Beach soundtrack. Written without the aid of beatmeister Emerson, it's a gentle, Stone Roses-style lament with strong acoustic leanings. The future may be more mellow than you think.

Buried Treasure

ZERO B 'LOCK UP' (ffrr)



OVERPRICED BIG TOP raves with hopelessly inadequate sound systems, Gestapo-like security and grey-faced 15 year-olds overdosing on bad pills. Minnie Mouse vocals, whistles and white gloves. Yep, the early Nineties hardcore scene can bring back some pretty painful memories.

It wasn't all bad, though, and despite its many excesses, hardcore did produce some truly awesome records. None more so, perhaps, than Zero B's 'Lock Up'. Originally released in the


winter of 1991, it was an instant anthem, and alongside Urban Shakedown's 'Some Justice', still best captures the raw excitement and energy of a good hardcore night in full flight.

Production-wise it was far from perfect - the breaks sat together awkwardly on the first few bars, and because it was a good deal slower than most hardcore records, it was hard to mix into a set, even when pitched to plus eight

However, most DJs quickly learned that they

would get an even better reaction simply by playing it from the top. The heavenly vocals at the beginning offered a brief oasis of calm before the breaks kicked in, quickly followed by one of the most effective bassline drops ever. By the time the synths broke through a minute later, the crowd would be well and truly 'on one'.

An imperfect record it may have been, but it still perfectly sums up that quick edit, heads down, hands in the air approach to dance music. (DM)

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


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Ireland

SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS

THE TERM 'system requirements' is always fantastically vague. As a rule of thumb, you will need the biggest, fastest mutha you can lay your hands on. In comparison to office utilities and even games, music makes great demands on your processor, RAM and hard disk capacity. It also needs your system to be configured

slightly differently, so read the installation notes and follow them. Generally, the faster the processor and more RAM your machine has, the more tracks or effects you can run at once and the less likely the system is to collapse.

and the less likely the system is to collapse.

Windows is designed to be all things to all users and consumes a lot of system resources not needed for music making. You should get better performance from the same PC hardware when running the new, modular BeOS operating system (www.be.com).

A sensible minimum requirement would include a Pentium II 200MHz processor (or equivalent); 64MB RAM; Full duplex 16BIT sound card; graphics card; 2GB HD. This should be well within the limitations of most modern PCs. Our test machine was a Compaq Laptop with Pentium II 400MHz processor, 64MB RAM, built in sound and graphics facilities and 9GB HD, and it worked perfectly (mostly).




GROOVEMAKER 2.0 is immediate fun. The idea is to load in up to eight samples from a bearable (but not ideal) pop up menu system and jam. The software automatically alters the tempo of samples to fit the tempo of the song. Setting a sample playing is a case of clicking a little button at the top of the wheel. It'll play eight samples at once, has 'solo' and 'group' functions so you can switch several samples on and off together and is an excellent way of learning about music. Making songs is a case of finding combinations of samples you think work well together, 'marking' them and then making a list of the order in which you'd like Groovemaker to play your various combinations. The selection of samples on offer isn't vast but the quality is better than you might expect. There's even a collection of synthesiser type sounds accompanied by an arpeggiator that automatically generates musical patterns for those trance moments. A fantastic toy.

LEE: "Very easy to use. It's a great introduction if you've never ever made a piece of music before in your life. It gives you the impression that music is very easy to make; it's simple, accessible and everything's there. Good little selection of samples and the fact that you can load in your own samples expands it a little more. It's visually quite pleasing and well laid out and just dead simple to use. It's the new drum kit isn't it? You know, 'mum can I have a Groovemaker for christmas?' It's gonna really annoy the shit out of parents when it's plugged into that silver Amstrad stereo blaring out so-called 'techno'."

What do you make of the fact that it's all so musically predictable?

"Well, if you're gonna sell something to people you need to sell it on the most obvious level. You've got to have accessible loops and make it sound instantly great. Unless you load in your own samples there's no way you're gonna make a product that could be released or anything but if you did it would be really good for just working out ideas."




MIXMAN STUDIO is a bit like Groovemaker's big brother. It can play 16 samples at once, chosen either via a right mouse click or a double click (drag and drop from an Explorer window would be better). It matches the tempo of samples to your song, has solo and group functions and crucially allows you to turn your samples on and off using keys on your computer keyboard. This makes for a much more free flowing experience than working with a mouse. Mixman also uses a system whereby when you click on a sample it only plays for as long as you hold the button down. This makes for a more intuitive 'playing' of samples, rather than mechanically triggering loops. Its killer feature, however, is a superb sounding selection of effects. They can be applied to the whole mix in real time or applied to individual samples 'off line' in a separate multi-effects editing/processing window (unfortunately Lee managed to crash it a couple of times by getting a little over excited in here).

Creating tracks is achieved by recording a real time performance which can then be edited in a separate 'block style' linear editing window. It even has a section where you can record your own audio from a microphone or other input. Cap it off with a very fine library of samples and you have a near perfect combination of user friendliness and depth.

A stripped down version of Mixman that only has the main arrangement window and real time effects without the 'off line' effects, or block style song editing is also available at \$29 for PC and Mac.



There's a wide selection of very well thought out layers of samples that are there for you to mix between. Out of the lot it's the one that's got the most to offer if you're looking to discover whether or not music making is for you. The ideal thing for a long plane journey or just sitting at home killing a few days."

ALTHOUGH seemingly a little on the pricey side these days and lacking effects, Acid DJ is a quality item. It has a very impressive time-stretch that ensures your samples fit both in terms of tempo and key, a very nice interface to work with when it comes to cutting up and rearranging samples and it also comes with a very strong CD full of particularly good samples. Bear in mind that your average professional sample CD costs around \$40 to \$60\$.



IN TERMS of sheer value for money Music Maker 5 is very difficult to beat. It's colourful, well laid out, stable, user friendly and boasts a staggering 2,000 samples (of varying quality and cheese factor), a 32 track arranger, a programmable synth, a drum machine, sample bpm calculation, on board effects, directX effects support, freehand filtering, team sessions via the internet, and video support. It's definitely worth a look.

I WAS EXCITED when I heard about Play R because the rest of the Magix range is so excellent. It offers a pair of virtual turntables complete with pitch, nudge and auto-bpm calculation, a crossfader letting you mix between the decks, a playlist function, video mixing, directX effects compatability and eight sample playback per deck. On paper a lovely combination of DJing and remixing. In reality, it's a very worthwhile step up from your standard MP3 jukebox, adding samples and effects (although there are no effects actually supplied), but it has a fair distance to go in terms of beatmixing and remixing.


LEE: "Play R deluxe: the title says it all really. That's exactly what it is, an MP3 (and other formats) player with a few samples you can throw in over the top. That's no bad thing, but if it professes to be an introduction to studio technique it's not a very good one. Unfortunately it seems to have trouble matching up the bpm of the two 'decks'. Often when you try and combine samples, it's all over the place and sounds appalling. The interface is not at all self explanatory. Mixing with it is fiddly, in fact the whole thing is fiddly. Erm. . . not for me."

MAKING WAVES is in a league of its own for anybody who really wants to make their own music but is short of money. The interface may not be very appealing, but the people who wrote this software are more interested in what it can do than what it looks like, and we love them for it. It can do one particular thing that a number of professional packages costing around 10 times the price can't. If you want to play any sound over a range of pitches, with anything else you have to use a sampler and trigger it via MIDI. Most people go for a dedicated hardware sampler, but an increasing number are opting to try and run a software sampler alongside their sequencer on one computer, which eats computer power horribly. Making Waves uses a familiar Grid style edit window but manipulates .WAV files direct from your hard drive. It's an extraordinary, versatile tool that is fast and simple to use while maintaining a very low system overhead. Making Waves does, of course provide all of the other things you need to get started making music including real time effects and a CD full of decent samples.

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THEY MAY NOT SEEM all that exciting but headphones are essential. Once you've owned and trashed a few pairs you start getting hungry for something with a little more longevity and less ear fatigue to them. Strap on a decent pair for the first time and you could be opening up a whole new world of musical enjoyment and DJing confidence.


This particular range of headphones is a new brand built especially for DJs. It's the offspring of a union between the Ministry Of Sound, who need no introduction, and a company called Ixos, who are a respected manufacturer of high quality hi-ficables. The range is split in two. At the top we have the "professional" DJ1001, DJ1002 & DJ1003 with the DJ1004 & DJ1005 coming along as distinctly different bedroom alternatives.

the posh jobs

Design-wise they've done everything right. The cups are hinged so they fold away into a neat little ball or the cups swivel so they sit flat in a record box. The headband is super springy (and adjustable) so they grip your head magnificently and the cups flip over so that the padding is pointing away from your head, so you can position them wherever you want and they'll stay put while you bounce around. The padding on the cups and headband is very slinky, enhancing the extra comfy fit. They have a chunky, single-sided wire with a springy section in the middle. The points where the wire attaches to the cup and the jack plug have fatique protection. The 3.5mm to 6.3mm adapters are of the screw thread variety and won't accidentally pull apart. The 1001s also have an incredibly handy mono switch. Best of all, they're screwed together so they come to bits for repair, and replacement parts are to be readily available.

save your ears

They sound superb. The models obviously vary a little, but all of them have wonderfully crisp high end; smooth, spacious mid range; tight, very well-defined bass (stretching right down to very deep indeed with the 1001s) and an overall gorgeous warmth. The closed cups shut the sound of the outside world out scarily well and they have the

kind of power and definition in all the right places to help those all important hats and kicks cut through.

the budget babies

At these prices you can't expect the kind of feature set found on the pro range, but they actually bear up rather well. They don't fold up or have swivelling cups so transportation isn't such a dream. The cups don't flip over and the headband design is very different so they don't have the same super grip but they do hang on as well as most of their competition. The cables are single sided but without the curly section, neither do they have the extra fatigue protection - but they're good quality. The adapters are not of the screw variety. What makes them truly competitive though is their sound. They have considerably less subtlety than the pro range but they do have a surprising amount of power, and it's the right kind of power. The high end and bass response is rather good. With most budget headphones the necessary volume needed to cut through in a club is achieved with excessive amounts of mid range, which is precisely what causes ear fatigue and permanent damage.

the business

A great deal of design and manufacturing professionalism has gone into this range. The pro trio are every bit as good as the existing competition in every way and they have what could be a crucial edge when it comes to the definition of the bass response. The budget contenders hold their own well, with a much better than average sound quality at this price.



DJ Kit

Denon DN1800F (£549)

HAVING solidly re-established themselves at the top of the pro install market with their magnificent DN2600F, Denon are now shipping a very slinky new machine for those with a more modest budget to play with. As you can see, the most obvious departure with the new baby is the bright white paint job. What doesn't come across from the picture is the way the face plate is now set off by amber 'disc loaded' lights which make the whole thing glow wonderfully. The machine has anti-shock memory, platter stop emulation, fader start and that all important Denon logo. Contact: 01753-888-447

RED XS-FX (price to be confirmed)

RED are to follow up the arrival of the Infader digital DJ mixer with a new stripped down version of their superb Federation tempo synchronised effects units. The XS-FX is to be a very cute little aluminium box, featuring the same combination of Resonant Filter, Flanger, SPS Panning, Cutter and Delay as the Federation but the format revolves around 50 editable presets. Although the joystick that mixes between effect types remains, the dedicated controls for each effect have been cut back. They've also added balanced outputs and a frequency separation section that enables you to add effects to just one band of frequencies.



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
