A MIX of Jamie Principle's 'Your Love' (a Frankie Knuckles Trax classic from '89) and a strident soul vocal from Candi Staton, 'You Got The Love' was a perfect example of acid house and soul synergy. The brainchild of producer John Truelove, it was the soundtrack to many a mad Muzik night out and smashed straight into the top five 10 years ago this month. Getting mad props from Garage at Heaven to Fabio-favoured Fantazia events, it was also a big favourite in the Chemical Brothers camp, and they continue to air the track in public today. Furthermore, it revitalised the career of Ms Staton, an ageing disco diva who hadn't tasted success since 'Young Hearts Run Free' and 'Nights On Broadway' back in 1977. Just to prove its worth, the track was reissued in March 1997, when it peaked at number three. And it's still just perfect for those nights when you feel like throwing your hands up in the air. (RM)

Brave Lina keeps smiling despite the growth on the side of her head

R&B songstress on the up

Imagine Billie Holliday freestyling with Guru or Q-Tip, accompanied by the Duke Ellington Orchestra, and you're getting close to the unique sound of rising r&b star Lina. Denver born, Texas raised and now a Los Angeles resident, this 20 year-old with the operatic voice and flamboyant neo-flapper visual style was hand-picked by

lina

smouldering sex dwarf Craig David for his UK tour. Why? Because her debut album, 'Stranger On Earth', eschews bog standard funk breaks for smoking hot big band jazz licks. And because, while she may be brimming with glamour, she ain't no fake diva – as she explained to Muzik during a break in her second sojourn on these shores.

How did you feel about Craig David personally picking you for his tour support?

Lina: "Oh man, when I found out that he'd picked me, I couldn't believe it. I like what he does. He's got this kind of macho thing about being attracted to a woman, but he flips it around and shows her respect, so I kind of dug that."

How would you describe your music?

Lina: "It's a kind of jazzy, swing, hip hop thing. For some reason I've always been attracted to the swing era. I love jazzy and sassy kind of singing, but I also love hip hop. And I'm happy that I can do this music because I can talk country – cos that's kind of what they did back then."

How did you create your visual style?

Lina: "I copied my mother. I loved the way my mom dressed all the time. She wore turbans around her hair, like Marlene Dietrich; she had hats with feathers on. She always stood out. So I stole it from her. But I don't like the diva thing. If I had to be a diva then I'm still going to have sneakers on under my gown. I'm not really into that glam, glam, glam."

If you had the choice between living in the 21st century and going back to the past, which would you choose and why?

Lina: "I think I'd go back to the Thirties. I don't know why I'm so attracted to artists from that period, but I do realise that it was passionate music that they did from the heart. It's not like today where the values we have are more superficial, more materialistic. It's kind of like we're going backwards. We're getting more advanced in technology, but our minds, our souls, our spirits are not being fed."

What do you think about Eminem?

Lina: "I feel sorry for him because of all the negativity. It cannot end well. I look at Eminem on TV, I look at his eyes and I don't know quite what it is that I see but I understand – kind of – what's going through his head. He's angry about something. He's rebelling. But you have to be responsible for what you put out there because it definitely comes back to haunt you. And that's not my rule, it's the law of the universe."

Who or what inspires you?

Lina: "My grandmother inspires me for the simple reason that she had to overcome so many obstacles. When she was a little girl in the south she had a friend, a little white girl who lived down the street. During the first two or three days that they played together, her friend would always try and look behind her. Finally one day, her friend said 'can I see your tail?' And my grandmother goes, 'Huh? I don't have a tail.' And her friend goes 'Yes you do, my daddy said that black people have tails.' So she showed her that she didn't have a tail and the girl felt so betrayed by her father, for all those years of looking for a tail on a black person. So what inspires me is our history. All the oppression, all the abuse and the fact that a lot of us still made it out of there."

Lina's album, 'Stranger On Earth' and single, 'Playa No More', are both out now on East West

've spent the last few weeks Down Under, legging it round Australia and New Zealand as part of the Big Day Out festival tour. It's been going for eight years but it's only in the last two that they've had dance music. This year there were bands like Happy Mondays and Coldplay, as well as Roni Size's Reprazent crew. Adam Freeland, Darren Emerson

and myself. I got to round off every night after the last live act had left the main stage and it's been great playing to a bunch of rock heads.

Auckland, New Zealand was my first gig of the tour as well as being my first time in the country. Auckland's a great place, with a young crowd and lots of cool bars. Last year Big Day Out put on the Chemical Brothers and Basement Jaxx, so they were pretty tough acts to follow. It was also a bit weird finishing at 11pm - you can't go to bed at midnight having played to 25,000 people - you're just too hyped up. . . Sleep was never really part of the New Zealand agenda.

Then it was on to Sydney where the crowd was a massive 60,000 strong, and at 120° Fahrenheit, it was possibly the hottest day of my life. Tragically, a teenage girl died during Limp Bizkit's set. She was at the front and suffered a heart attack as she was squashed against the barriers. All the bands and promoters got together to try and make sense of it and the next day we held a minute's silence for her. It was an absolutely tragic incident, which cast a pall over the remaining dates.

At the tour's end, it was back to the UK, four hours sleep and straight over to the NME Brat Awards in London's Shoreditch, where I was picking up an award for Best DJ. It was enlightening being honoured in front

It was a good evening, after which I went to bed for a couple of days! I eventually dragged myself out and headed for the Ultimate BASE fifth anniversary party at The End, which was completely and utterly off the hook. We had to turn away 600 people, and it was my best

night in the five years I've been playing there. I usually do the graveyard shift but this time I spun from 2.30-4.30am. Then Trevor Rockcliffe finished things off around 7am.

Right now I'm gearing up for my event at Twilo with Danny Tenaglia. A lot of UK DJs go to America and don't work with the US jocks (that'll be the so-called British invasion), but I didn't want to do that: I wanted us to work together and produce something really special so we're playing for 18 hours, which is fairly mammoth.

Looking back, I didn't think it would be humanly possible to get over what I've been through these last few weeks, and I'm off to America tomorrow. It's a crazy life. See you next month when I'll bring you my exclusive Twilo report.

"I'M A STRONG WOMAN. It's

important to have strong women in any industry, but definitely in hip hop. . . "

So says Eve, secret weapon of huge-in-the-States, negligible over here crew the Ruff Ryders. Across the pond, her debut solo album 'Let There Be Eve', produced largely by the Ryders' Swizz Beats, went to number one in its first week of release and platinum within a month. Nobody was more surprised than Eve.

"I was very, very, very shocked," she says when Muzik catches up with her in LA. "I never knew anything about Billboard charts, I was just like 'I wanna get my album out. Number one, cos I'm a female – I never thought so many people would be interested in what a female had to say."

To UK ears its success might seem mystifying for a different reason – Swizz is a skilled, Midas touch producer, but over here his lightly syncopated beats and synth-based production raise little more than a shrug and mutterings about 'biting Timbaland's style'. What makes the record special is the peroxide Amazon herself.

Hip hop is currently the prime exemplar of Debbie Harry of Blondie's quote, "the only people in music with anything new to say are girls and gays." And in the absence of any gay hip hoppers, it's the laydeez we've got to look to for fresh points of view. Eve delivers.

From tracks about domestic abuse that only a woman could write ('Love Is Blind') to battle raps that saw her mowing down "little dick niggaz" (on 'Let's Talk About'), Eve's debut, along with the work of Missy Elliott and foul mouthed midget Lil' Kim, put the sisters on top. Ask her about the put-upon status of women in hip hop and she's not very sisterly, though...

"I'm around like a million guys all the time, and I see how women treat them, so I can't get mad at guys for what they write. Cos I've seen bitches and I've seen hoes, you know what I'm saying?"

Oh well. Her new album, 'Scorpion', with its poppier sound, should see Eve cement her place among hip hop's royalty. She's determined to "go worldwide – to be known outside of where I'm from." So as well as Swizz Beats, she's employed the services of promising youngster Dr Dre to further her ambitions. She can't fail really, can she? The Eden of megastardom awaits.

Some records are so primitively catchy that they enter public consciousness almost by osmosis. Chocolate Puma's 'I Wanna Be U' is one such, its deceptively simple, chopped, rhythmic vocal building hypnotically until it bursts into an open space of neo-trancey synth chords. "A long time ago I was a DJ and used to play Bauhaus and The Sisters Of Mercy," says Rene. You were a goth then?

"No, no, er. . . it was a long time ago," Rene splutters. "I met Gaston 10 years ago, I used to do a radio show then. We've done tunes since as Pletch and Rene & Gaston."

An initial test pressing of 'I Wanna Be U' found its way to ears-of-the-nation Pete Tong, who has duly declared it his favourite record of the year. And it's only March! With this level of interest it's likely that Top 40 success will follow. But will the duo be doing Top Of The Pops?

"No, no no," says Rene, "Our singer Evo will do all that – he's better to look at on TV. We're not very good at just bouncing around behind our keyboards. We're better off in the studio."

No probs. Whether dodgy old goths or studio boffs, Chocolate Puma will tear your head off.

The album makes memorable listening. Hardcore poetry from fellow Dubliner Bennan Murphy ("Fuck, fucking cunt, bollocks, cuntbastard," to quote just one memorable line) sits next to the slightly more joyful warblings of veteran Northern Soul vocalists Mary

Love Comer and Linda Clifford. And the title's nicked from Bob Marley, right?

"Well originally. . . but Bennan nicked it for one of his stories based on a Guinness-fuelled night out he had. He goes out with his girlfriend to a restaurant, gets a bit boisterous, hits someone and winds up having the night from hell. He ends up back at his flat in the middle of the night and sticks on Bach's cello concerto and it's like 'sweet music. When it hits you feel no pain'."

"1987-91 was just as significant to youth culture as the punk rock explosion 10 years earlier," insists dance guru Pete Tong (who launched ffrr back in 1988 as an underground adjunct to the London Records imprint).

Tongy's nose for a hit saw his new label land chart stormers from the outset, including Salt 'N' Pepa's 'Push It' (1988), Frankie Knuckles' 'Tears' ('89) and Orbital's 'Chime' ('90), while maintaining cred with cuts like Martine Girault's 'Revival' and 'The Masterplan' by Diana Brown and Barrie K Sharp).



From Smith & Mighty to Cookie Crew, Lil' Louis to The Brand New Heavies and Goldie to Sagat ('Fuk DAT!'), ffrr

Boutique Birthday Mix Blended By Midfield General



"WE'RE FIVE. It's about time we had a history lesson!" Boutique promoter Gareth Hansome is in wistful mood. "Back in '96, we took the back room to the foreground and took a few risks in the process. I did feel the club got a bit misunderstood sometimes because certain members - ie Norman - were dominating the scene. But it wasn't a formula. We've always had an open-minded music policy. People forget that before Norman you got two hours of hip hop to house.

"Our main residents – Fatboy, Freq Nasty, Midfield General and new Fabric resident Jon Carter-are adored by our crowd because they take the music somewhere different," adds Gareth. "If you really want me to be genre-specific, I'd say we're into dirty-rough voodoo house, future funk and toxic breaks!"

What is it that makes that Boutique floorspace so unique? Is there really something in the sea air down south?

"Well, Brighton is like a little republic," nods Gareth. "The rest of England is behind us, so we don't feel any pressure to toe the line. And we have a strong acid house ethos of not paying attention to what everyone else is doing."

Mixed by Skint fat controller Damian Harris, aka Midfield General, this month's free CD was mixed in just one take on Valentine's Day.

"I had to sit through Pretty Woman, Sliding Doors and Notting Hill first," chuckles Damian. "I'd just cooked dinner and had to wait for my girlfriend to fall asleep. Not very romantic!" We're sure she'll approve of this post-movie mix.

"I tend to play a fairly diverse cross-section of records," says Damian. "This goes from breaks to chuggy house and back again. I'm just trying to capture the essence of The Boutique."

1 Si Begg Mardi Gras Bomber

"We met Si through Cristian Vogel and [Brighton club] Freekin' The Frame. He's an incredibly nice bloke who just makes tunes, from Noodles (twisted humour) to fuck-off techno and stuff on Under 5's. I opened with this cos I've always loved the track and its breakbeat. I love the way he mangles things up... it throws people a bit, cos they don't expect it to do what it does.

2 Cut La Roc Fallen (Hotbox Remix)

"This is from Lee Potter's album and features Gary from Snow Patrol singing. It was remixed by a couple of mates from Hotbox, who came up with a very lush mix which I'm really into. It's a nice fluffy way to get into the mix before I get nasty."

3 Freq Nasty Amplify (Dub)

"This is going to be on Freq's second Skint twelve, so it's one of his new tracks. It's a very exciting record. I've played it out a couple of times and it always gets an amazing response. It's hard but it still funks. It's gonna be a good year for Freq.

4 Santos Camels (DJ Zinc Mix)

"'Camels' fits in very well with the Freq track - it's another great breaks record with Zinc on top form. I was surprised that it was such a big hit, but when you get hooked by it you can see why it happened."

5 Rec Rangers Toot Toot Beep Beep (X-Press 2 Mix)

"This is the first thing X-Press 2 did for us and is probably their best remix of last year. The band are now signed to Skint and I'm unbelievably excited about the new album. They've made a track with David Byrne that's amazing – the two artists complement each other perfectly.

6 Peace Division BU4T

"I just really like their sound: it's very chunky, it's proper, well done. You can tell it's been made by someone w 10 years of going out experience. I'd be well up for them doing stuff but they're sooo busy!"

7 Lavo & Bushwacka! Low Life (Love From San Francisco Mix)

"When we did the club at The End we got to know Layo and Bushwackal there. It's quite similar to Peace Division in that this is a perfect middle of the evening record. Again, chunky, solid house music and very good quality. And it's mixed by Charles Webster-three people I really like on one record!'

8 Lo Fidelity Allstars Sleeping Faster (Hot Box Instrumental)

"This is another Hotbox remix, a version of 'Sleeping Faster', which will be the next single. It's quite Detroit-y... the original version has the Lo-Fi's on it but they're trying to get Byron Stingily to sing on it now, cos the mix is so Ten City. A fucking great record."

9 Midfield General Faster

"This is the B-side to 'Coatnoise'. It seems to be a record I keep wanting to make - I'm going through a techno stage. As that Dave Clarke mix shows, I do have my techno leanings occasionally."

10 Medicine Junior Aspirin

"I really, really like this track - for me, it's in that middle ground between breaks and house but with loads of nice little riffs to draw you in. It's not too 'smash house' either. It's just right really."

11 Danielsan No Big Disco Pun

"This is a hidden disco gem from Danny Curtis, who's been one of the Boutique residents for quite a while, though he usually gets the bar shift. A surprising little disco number that sounds like it shouldn'twork... but it does.

12 Fatboy Slim Santa Cruz

"We had to put this on – it's almost like if I had to pick one track to sum up the club it would be 'Santa Cruz' A great track to end on that STILL sounds great. It's the record the club was built for.

Senor Citizen Tech-house modernist Lars Sandberg on his Catalan conversion



We're at the entrance to the Gaudi Museum, a huge park filled with strange otherworldly structures that winds its way up one of Barcelona's biggest hills. It's a truly splendid afternoon. The sky is clear blue, the temperature's warm and the air has that cool, crisp bite that you can only find by the Mediterranean in the winter. Just as we're about to board a cab, Lars Sandberg (aka Funk D'Void) clocks a girl approaching from the other side of the street. She's breathtakingly beautiful - all big blue eyes, blonde tied-back hair and expensive looking nouveau hippie attire. Lars turns to the Muzik twosome, grinning from ear to ear as a look of pure mischief flickers across his eyes. "You don't get many like that where you're from, do ya boys?" he offers in a spot on, pisstaking mockney twang as we jump in the cab.

Lars Sandberg is clearly a man enjoying his life right now. He lives in a huge flat in one of Barcelona's smarter districts, eats out every day and generally leads the kind of life that he could only dream about in good old rip-off Britain.

Of Swedish/Australian descent, he "grew up in Glasgow, went to school in Blackburn" and got into DJing aged 15 after spending all his pocket money on 'Streetsounds Electro' compilations. Within a year he was running three under-18s' clubs.

"Having a taste of it that early in life is a bit dangerous I guess," he says with a huge laugh as we sit in the front room of his apartment later on. "I didn't think I needed anything else, I felt I'd found my vocation". And indeed he had, because from there he quickly moved into regular clubs after a local promoter took him under his

wing, came second in the Scottish DMC championships in 1989 and started producing his own tracks after a lecturer in music technology at Glasgow University heard him playing on pirate radio. "I was totally lucky. He had his own studio and he taught me the ropes, gave me the keys to his apartment and let me work away on my own."

A couple of tracks they did together for the long since defunct Bomba label soon followed, but after his mentor decided this house music malarkey wasn't really his kind of thing, Lars bought half the studio and started making music on his own.

"I was living in a bedsit with a real Rising Damp vibe. All I had was a little keyboard, an Atari and a drum machine. It was real basic stuff, but I did a demo of 'Jack Me Off' and gave it to Stuart and Orde [Slam] at some after party in Glasgow and they loved it. It's the classic story of doing your first thing on bugger all equipment, but making it work, and it became my first single."

A few hours later, we're in another cab going to the first of the two clubs that Lars takes us to that night. Looking out of the window, it's easy to see why Barcelona has become such a popular tourist destination. Gaudi's strange, naturalistic curves nestle up to fantastically over the top, baroque apartment blocks, while cool Sixties, modernist structures sit next to traditional sand stoned Catalan villas.

"I had writer's block," Lars says of his move here a year and a half ago. "I needed a fresh atmosphere because I do take a lot of influence from the things and people around me. I first came here in the summer of 1996 to play at the Sonar festival and it was a complete jaw-dropper. That's when I decided I wanted to live here. It's so serene and beautiful, but vibrant at the same time. I've never been so focused and it's definitely taken my music in a different direction."

The "different direction" Lars speaks of is in evidence on his new album 'Dos'. Where his previous material was often dark and almost aggressive in its intensity, the new album is far more subtle. His early house and techno influences are still there, but the use of Latin rhythms, electro beats and lush, soothing sounds makes for a much warmer listening experience.

It's a great album that shows Lars is maturing as an artist and it wouldn't be implausible to suggest that this is at least partly due to his moving to Barcelona. We all know the clichés about how travel broadens the mind and most of us have experienced the sense of freedom and possibility that comes with being abroad in an exciting, beautiful place. But where most of us have to return home at some point, Lars is lucky, mad, brave – insert your own adjective – enough to decide that he wants to feel that way every day. It's the kind of decision that can either make or break a person and in his case it's the former.

"To some extent I still feel like a fish out of water, but I do feel like I've been given something here and I'm just going to go with it," he says in one of his more philosophical moments. "I've got so many ideas I feel like my head's going to explode. I'm turning 30 soon and that's really kicked me up the arse. My eyes are wide open now, no more messing around."

Never cool but ferociously popular, hard house and trance are dance music's leper messiahs

The Eighties in England were a nightmare, filled with new romanticism and possibly the worst television ever (except for the present, obviously). The only saving grace was the burgeoning electronica scene. Duran Duran, Depeche Mode and The Human League convinced thousands of young men to include make-up as part of their daily routine. With influence from visionaries such as Kraftwerk, Tangerine Dream and synth guru/twat Jean Michel Jarre, the age of new wave electronic pop was well and truly upon us. Hurrah!

We had, however, to wait until 1988 for the face-painting aspects of electronica to be ditched in favour of munching MDMA and dancing around to house in fields beside motorways. Hurrah again and, indeed, 'acieed!' Over in Germany, which already had a very respectable history of electro-sonic investigation, walls were coming down. The fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989 allowed people who had previously been kept segregated to mix ideas freely. It was

a perfect time for celebrating new social and political freedoms with strenuous dancing to uplifting euphoric music. And so, while a young, cheeky-faced Paul Van Dyk was slowly getting to grips with the ancient art of mixing in Eisenstadt, East Germany, ex-Euro pop star Sven Vath was DJing around his native Frankfurt, initiating what would eventually become the notorious Omen

club. It was Vath's Eye-Q and Harthouse labels and seminal releases under names such as Barbarella and Vernon's Wonderland which provided the blueprint for all that was to follow. <u>Meanwhile...</u>

Goa, midway down the western coastline of southern India, is a magical place where, throughout history, people have travelled in their thousands to paint, write, discuss intellectual topics and get completely out of their boxes.

In the early Eighties, Goa Gil (not her real name), one of the Full Moon party planners, began playing experimental electronic music from Europe. It quickly

caught on, finding receptive ears amongst the chemically activated travellers. Japanese, Israeli, European, Australian and American bodies thronged the beaches. Although the Indian police tried to clamp down on the scene, the seeds of Goa trance had been cast to the winds. Over the years that followed the UK acid house explosion of 1988, a wealth of Goa trance-inspired labels appeared: Tip, Dragonfly, Perfecto Fluoro, Flying Rhino, Matsuri and Transient all brought the psychedelic sounds of Goa to the UK.

Things were also hotting up in what would soon be known as the world of hard house. In October 1990, Troll and Attitude combined forces and opened Trade at Turnmills under the decadent leer of Mr Laurence Malice. Leading from the front on the wheels of steel were Daz Saund, Trevor Rockliffe, Smokin' Jo, Fat Tony and Malcolm Duffy. This was the birth of hard house as we know it, a sound that came out of a predominantly gay scene and drew many of its influences from the stomping sound of hi-NRG and Belgian new beat rather than purist house or disco-edged material. Saund and Rockliffe also rocked Garage @ Heaven in the early Nineties, a night that saw Mrs Wood and former barman Blu Peter make names for themselves, and provided the foundations for React Records, still home to much of the best in hard house and trance.

Trade, for most of the Nineties, continued to break new DJs such as Tall Paul (the son of Turnmills' owner), Steve Thomas, lan M and Alan

Thompson, but it was the style of the late Tony de Vit, a DJ with a long career on Birmingham's gay scene, that defined what hard house was to become. Over at Garage, meanwhile, Rachel Auburn added more than a twist of kitsch to the hard house sound to create a style briefly termed 'nu energy' by the media, then re-christened 'hardbag' (ouch).

Back in Germany, things were moving along at pace. Berlin's Love Parade was not only a symbol of a newly unified country but a breeding ground for the German sound which was gradually being picked up and promoted abroad on labels such as the UK's Hooj Choons. Noom artist Commander



Tom Volone put out 'Are Am Eye', a record which managed to cross over to both the hard house and Goa crowds.

For a while in the late Nineties it appeared things had dried up for trance and hard house, with only the occasional massive tune such as Robert Miles' 'Children' breaking the surface. What was actually occurring was a period of gestation where producers who had been influenced by early versions of the two styles were honing their own version, ready to foist on a public who were more than eager to receive it.

1999 saw the Gatecrasher phenomenon kickstart the new trance explosion. With a crowd of cyberkids with a look all their own, the Sheffield club touted a roster of DJs, including the by now ubiquitous Paul Van Dyk and resident Scott Bond, playing an epic, some might say over-produced, melodic trance made by the likes of Dutch producer Ferry Corsten and Germany's Thorsten Stenzel (aka Sakin & Friends). This stuff was massive and big British labels such as Additive, Xtravaganza and Neo were all over it.

But if 1999 was a big year for trance, then 2000 to the present day has belonged to hard house, at least in Britain (outside of central London). As the happy hardcore phenomenon died away, younger clubbers wanted something equally frantic to get off their noddle to and labels such as Tripoli Trax and Tidy Trax were joined by the fast 'n' furious likes of Mohawk, Honey Pot and DP. Far from its gay roots, hard house rapidly became the sound of Saturday night and glamorous girls such as Lisa Pin-Up, Lisa Lashes and Anne Savage were (and, indeed, are) in demand everywhere.

The final word must go to Nukleuz Records, part of the Italian Media empire. Potentially, they represent the future of both genres. Artist/DJs such as Mauro Picotto, Mario Piu and Nick Sentience fire out a white hot dancefloor hybrid of the best elements of trance and hard house with a smidgeon of techno for good measure. All this, and the boys get to wear make-up all over again. Some things never change.

Tivilo

It's the last Friday of the month at Twilo, and the queue of well-groomed kids in Stussy and Ecko crawls halfway around the block. Inside, though, past the riot of headset-bedecked security animals, excitement is not the first thing that greets you. Rather, it is a massive, Big Brotheresque sign-of-the-times blaring, "UNDERCOVER POLICE ARE ALWAYS ON THE PREMISES."

Past the placard, in the box-shaped club where the monthly Sasha & Digweed experience is about to take flight, John Digweed has just come on. Around the booth, a coven of New York PRs – the ones who do Digweed's booking, or Sasha's compilation deals, or Twilo's international promotion, stop cackling about hip restaurants for a moment and watch the crowd. The arms are already outstretched, and for a moment, everything seems still: the hum of the new New York clubland overtakes everything else in the historic room that a man named Junior built.

The Sound Factory

In 1987, when house music was first making its presence felt in Britain, and London and Manchester were gearing up for the ecstasyincited roar of '88, New York clubland was in mourning. AIDS had squeezed the last drops out of the city's formerly incandescent disco culture. The Garage, The Saint, and many of the gay and mixed haunts that had stretched the drug-pumped wahey-days of the Seventies well into the Reaganite Eighties, were gone.

Donald Mattern, who after leaving Pennsylvania for gay New York had changed his name to the ghetto-fabulous Junior Vasquez, was a Garage regular. After the club closed, Junior – then in his thirties and working at New York's Kiss FM – began DJing at his own weekly event, Bassline.

"I was continuing the tradition, basically," he says. "So in 1988, Phil Smith, who was another Garage regular, approached me to help him with a club he was opening. It was the club that would change everything again. And I helped build it – the Sound Factory – from the mud floors up."

By the Nineties, nobody would have believed anything was ever muddy at the Factory. It was the most eminent club in the world, Junior Vasquez (who NEVER missed his Saturday gig there) was the most celebrated DJ, and his drum rolling, tribal house sound was the most pervasive. Even the Factory sound system, created by a Vietnam vet named Steve Dash, was famous.

Night-time New York was revived, Junior was remixing Madonna, and the era felt trailblazing. The Factory was where the raw materials – the ketamine-snorting gym queens, club kids in platform sneakers, master-blaster anthems, obsessively crystal sound, and can't-replicate-it spirit – were mashing down. "Everything that comes now is a copy," said Junior in 1995, months before the Sound Factory closed due to permit troubles. "The Factory is the blueprint."





Tenaglia Plays Twooloo

It was only six years back that the Factory shut, but its era seems so long ago now. The Factory existed in the New York clubbing age before Mayor Guilliani's Disneyfication of Manhattan, before the rise of the internet and the New Economy, before DJ-mixed compilations were showcased at Tower Records, before Moby grew eight storeys high on Calvin Klein billboards on Houston Street. In New York City, it was still a time of scant commercial safety and of comparative naïvete. When, in record shops, arguments raged on about who was 'really underground'. When a New York DJ's in-town residency was a New York DJ's everything.

After the closing of the Factory, Junior fell into a long, deep depression, even hinting at retirement before grudgingly taking a job at Peter Gatien's Tunnel club. The main owners of the Factory, Phil Smith and Richard Grant, had parted ways. To Junior's great dismay, Grant went off and opened a fresh club bearing the Sound Factory name, installing young DJ Jonathan Peters there. "He could take the name," says Junior, "but he could not take everything I built there." This, however, was only the first blow.

Sensing a changing tide in the New York night scene, Phil Smith reopened the old Factory space, giving it a new name. "Tweela, or Twooloo, or something," said Junior in an interview conducted two weeks before the new club's debut. Twilo was the name, after a planet that Mary Tyler Moore had a dream about in some episode of the Dick Van Dyke Show. Junior was not hired. "People were saying, 'Ooh, Junior's over, he's OVER'," says Vasquez. After some shuffling, Smith hired a long-emerging DJ whose sets had become the main hype at the increasingly important Miami Winter Music Conference and whose patina seemed more 'international' than just 'New Yorky': Danny Tenaglia.

"It was a tough space to please," says Tenaglia. "Many had expectations of what should be played there, because it was still, in many people's minds, the Sound Factory. Not much had changed."

A few months into Danny's stint there, Twilo was faltering. Junior had queenily upped the pressure, having Tenaglia ushered out by bouncers when he visited Tunnel, famously stating he didn't want him 'taking notes' on his set.

"Junior was then at Palladium, gaining speed again," recalls Tenaglia. "He was doing incredible

numbers there. Half of my crowd at Twilo would leave early in the morning to go hear him."

Then Tenaglia heard that Phil Smith was trying to woo Vasquez back to his beloved old space.

Sasha & Digweed Take NYC

One of the ironies of New York City is that it is probably the most cosmopolitan city in the world while at the same time being just about the easiest place in which to forget the rest of the planet. While the maelstrom between the big room Manhattan jocks bitched on through the mid-Nineties, sucking new names like Victor Calderone and old names like Frankie Knuckles into its spiral, things were moving forward, rapidly, elsewhere.

Mike Bindra, Twilo's general manager and Friday night promoter, a kid who did some of his

growing up in Europe, found himself troubled by New York's steadfast club parochialism. Club culture was globalising. New York City, he felt, was missing the boat.

"I was like, 'why are there no New York clubs doing tours? And why don't we bring talent from elsewhere, like the rest of the world?

Or even the rest of America, where the young, affluent scene delineated as 'rave' (not the more mixed 'club' scene) had its bread and butter in British and European DJs. "Sasha and Digweed had been to FLORIDA a zillion times, but had still never played New York! It was insane.

Sasha and John Digweed first played Twilo in 1996 as a stop on their Northern Exposure Tour.

"We were SO excited," says Sasha. "And as luck would have it, that night both the Limelight and the Tunnel had been shut down by the police. Er, not that that's a GOOD thing, but. . . There was a gueue around the block. Mike Bindra was like, you have to do this every month. New York was ready for something new.

Sasha's and John Digweed's CD sales went through the roof in New York and beyond, racking up unheard-of sales for DJ-mixed compilations in America.

"Twilo succeeded in appealing to a new generation that other clubs in New York were just ignoring," says Bindra. "Kids who had grown up in the rave scene, reading British magazines, knowing everything about people like Carl Cox or Sasha and places like Cream or Ministry." Some of the Britons

energised by Sasha & Digweed's triumph at Twilo were less than discreet about their intentions to take America too. Paul Oakenfold damaged himself immeasurably when he went on American television blustering that the US was just

in full swing

'learning', by default naming himself as the one who would teach Americans about club culture.

"There are a few DJs who have gone to New York and come back with this attitude. 'I have conquered America! Single-handedly!', and putting spin doctors to work so that everyone in Britain believes it. It pisses me off," says Sasha. "We didn't go in for that shit. America just made a little space for us to fit into, and we fit in."

The Ministry Of Twilo

It's 9am on a Sunday morning, and Junior Vasquez, a comfortable 51 years old, is picking up speed on a set which will last until 2pm. His 'Saturday' sets at Twilo only begin at 5am. His crowd - many of whom went to bed early the night before - trickles in at about eight for a strobe-lit Sunday of pummelling sound. Vasquez has his own booth at Twilo, the old Factory booth, where no other DJ is allowed to play

"This is my place, this is my night," says Junior, who is presently looking into buying his own nightclub. "Mike Bindra can have his whole Euroworship deal on Fridays. The nights don't touch."

The club does lead a double life now. On Fridays, Sasha and Digweed continue their four year-old monthly residency, or other guests, like Carl Cox or Paul Van Dyk (or soon, the return of Danny Tenaglia for one night only) take the decks for throngs of slightly 'burbian, dance pressreading white kids. On Saturdays, it's basically all warm up until Junior's universe of prancing queens, black beauties and musclebound Chelsea boys descends. "You can't remove the spirit of the Factory on Saturdays," laughs Bindra, "so we figured, why not have the best of both worlds?"

'World' is the operative word at Twilo these days. "We want to be the American Ministry Of Sound," says Bindra. "You know - BRANDING." So far the efforts include a shop in the club (Twilo apron, anyone?), a label for 12-inches and CD compilations, a magazine (which has already gone bust), plans for tours, and the possibility of a stint

in Ibiza. The club has also established a roaring business installing Steve Dash's patented Twilo sound system, the Phason system, in clubs, from Fabric in London to Womb in Tokyo.

"Many people in New York have traditionally been against massmarketing with nightclubs,' concludes Bindra. "But this is how it works now. This is the new New York, and things have changed. Britain spent years taking culture from us, so now it's our turn to take some cues from what they've done with it all." Stay tuned for the Ministry Of Twilo, then? "Well, let's just say this New York club story doesn't end here.'

"This album is a symbol of my resurrection. Like, two years ago, everyone had counted me out, people had counted me for dead. I almost retired. I was out of a horrible relationship with this guy, I was finished playing this banging, hard, dark stuff at Palladium, and I was at Twilo, finding my roots again. I did 99 remixes last year. You can hear my new sound, the kind of stuff I make for Twilo. On this album I have gone back to soul, and it's good. I mean, people are not coming to Twilo at 8pm for the chicken wings. They're coming to hear what I sound like at the ripe old age of 51. There was a time I wouldn't have wanted to admit [my age], but now I'm aware that I am obviously going to go down in history, like Larry [Levan] did, so why not?"

"World, get on one / If you not afraid to fly/ You need to get on a flight/ And fly tonight. . . Nothing but love/ I'm feeling X-tra extraordinary freaky/ And I know you hoes wanna roll with me. . . Ecstasy/ I wanna fly"

On the cold printed page, these lyrics look like they're from a song by The Beloved, back in the days when singer Jon Marsh was a blissed-out Shoom regular. Listen to the track, and the music sounds like a classic rave anthem, maybe a Todd Terry classic like CLS's 'Can You Feel It'. But the word "hoes" – hip hop slang for women – is the giveaway. This isn't some old-school Balearic anthem but 'Ecstasy' by gangsta rapper Ja Rule, just one of a new breed of "love thugs" rhyming about the thrills of pills. Prime examples from the last year include such subtly titled gems as 'Let's Get High' by Dr Dre, 'Henessy & Ecstasy' by B.G., and 'Ecstasy' by Bone Thugs 'N' Harmony. And there are references to E (or 'X', as Americans call it) in tracks by Jay-Z, DJ Quik, Nas, Three-6 Mafia, Saafir, Big Tymers and Xzibit.

Rap thugz are getting loved up. But will it set them adrift on memory bliss? Or send them insane in the brain?

It's not just the stars that are indulging, either. "It's hitting the 'hoods, it's hitting the niggas," Bizzy Bone of Bone Thugz told one US magazine. At a recent show in Philadelphia, Ja Rule asked the crowd "How 'bout that ecstasy?", obviously confident that most of the audience knew the score.

What's striking about this is that Ja Rule is most famous for the menacingly drawled "Murdah" chant of his 1999 hit 'Holla Holla'. His record label is called Murder Inc, and Rule is also a member of charmingly named rap collective The Murderers. So how has Rule managed to go from gangsta rap's gun talk and bloody sagas of paranoia and revenge to loved-up ditties about nights rolling on Mitsubishis?

Let's be honest, though. The E-influenced lyrics that have emerged so far haven't seen Ja Rule and co swapping their Glocks for glowsticks. And the lyrics about dissing hoes, humiliating 'haters' (jealous small-fry), flaunting wealth, and eliminating rivals have not disappeared in favour of P.L.U.R. (peace/love/ unity/respect, the motto of the US rave scene). For instance, on 'Lights Out', the latest album by New Orleans rap superstar Lil' Wayne, rhymes like "Pop X and drink Cris'/ My life is the shit" jostle next to grisly threats like "I'll cock the Glock and spray ya". Hip hop's macho codes of behaviour are too entrenched to be melted overnight, and so far the culture has adapted ecstasy to its own needs: getting freaky between the sheets.

In 'Let's Get High', Dr Dre's lyric about dropping an E goes straight into "All these fine bitches equal sex to me," while Bohe Thugz 'N' Harmony's 'Ecstasy' has the choice verse "Feelin' hot and exotic with an arced cock/ I'm feelin' too sexy for my muthafuckin' self/ Gotta find my bitch and I'm gonna fuck her ass to death!". There are stories floating around about major playas in the rap industry throwing parties at their mansions in the Hamptons (an expensive summer home area favoured by Manhattan's wealthy and famous) where E is primarily used to get the ladies "in the mood" for sex inna multiple-partner stylee.

"Hip hop's always been a sexual culture," says human conduit between house and hip hop, Armand Van Helden. "Ecstasy is just amplifying the sexuality. I like going to rap clubs in New York at the moment, cos the girls are rolling on E and they're, like, feeling you up and stuff!"

According to Van Helden, one of the major routes

via which ecstasy use filtered into the hip hop scene was the sex industry, specifically strip clubs.

"The club owners want the girls to do the job with a good attitude, to perform and project in this really fullon way. And it's a boring job, so to make sure the girls don't get into moping, they give them E. A lot of the girls live back in the ghettos and barrios, and it crossed over that way – the strippers bringing ecstasy back to the 'hood, turning people on."

Hip hop's getting loved up is a side effect of the astonishing surge in ecstasy use among the general American population over the last two years. The New York Times reported a 450% increase between 1998 and 1999 in ecstasy seizures by police and customs. This was partly triggered by a return to reliable, high-dose MDMA thanks to Mitsubishis and other pills that followed in its wake. For the first time since the early Eighties, when ecstasy was still legal, the drug is popular outside the rave scene, with college students and yuppies throwing E parties. Finally, the drug has made significant inroads into the rap community. Van Helden says that black and Hispanic kids started attending raves, despite the fact that most hip hoppers have traditionally regarded raves as a scene for wealthy white kids or, in the case of house clubs, as a gay scene.

"They're looking for a good time at the weekend, and they can't go to bars or clubs, cos the drink laws in America say you have to be 21 to get in. So they go to raves, where anyone can come in cos there's no alcohol served. Just for somewhere to hang out. Eventually, they got cats coming up and saying 'wanna do some X?'. They'd try it, bug out, and go back to the neighbourhood to spread the news."

Another factor behind the rise of ecstasy is that its price makes it competitive as a party-hard potion. Rap playas like to flash the cash – hence the vogue for Cristal champagne and Henessy – but at a certain point the economics get undeniable.

"Ecstasy's about 20 bucks," says Van Helden. "Compare that to buying a bottle of Moet, which is about 120 dollars – for four glasses of champagne! E is cheaper and it lasts for hours."

In Ja Rule's 'Ecstasy', the rapper rhymes about how "Nobody sippin' on Cristal/ They all got an Evian or O.J." and marvels at how weird he feels, as a "big baller", to be "ordering all that damn water." Whether as a result of ecstasy use or just an eerily prophetic prelude, the last 18 months have seen a flood of rap and r&b tracks that feature techno-like sounds and riffs. Ja Rule's 'Holla Holla' used a snaking, writhing riff that sounds uncannily like a Roland 303 acid bassline. There's staccato rave-style stabs in r&b tunes by Destiny's Child and Ginuwine's 'What's So Different' and house vamps and techno pulses appear in countless tracks from the Cash Money roster of Juvenile, B.G., and Lil' Wayne. It's instructive to note that Cash Money producer Mannie Fresh actually worked with Chicago house god Steve 'Silk' Hurley a decade ago. On Lil' Kim's 'The Notorious K.I.M.', two tracks were based on 1989 house anthems 'French Kiss' by Lil' Louis and 'Break 4 Love' by Raze, and her recent single 'How Many Licks' is full of Daft Punk-like noises. Ludacris's massive hit 'What's Your Fantasy?' sounds like an old rave tune played at 33 rpm instead of 45 rpm, all stabs and muffled fuzzy bass. His 'Get Off Me' could be LFO circa 'Frequencies', while 'Southern Hospitality' (produced by The Neptunes, of Kelis fame) features 'Mentasm'-style hoover-riffs seemingly AWOL from a Lisa Lashes hard house set.



Van Helden is sceptical about the idea that there's a direct link between all these techno textures and hip hop's infatuation with ecstasy, though.

"House and hip hop have always had a relationship, they're using the same technology after all. The weird, techy sounds you get in rap and r&b now, that was mainly started by Timbaland. He invented that double-time bpm thing that's almost like an Americanised form of drum & bass. After him, all the rap and r&b producers really started attacking new sounds, and shit started flying."

Still, last year Timbaland did produce three tracks that positively dripped with the influence of European ecstasy culture, if not E itself: Aaliyah's smash hit 'Try Again' with its burbling Roland 303, Jay-Z's 'Snoopy Track' with its Human Resource/ 'Dominator' style dirge-bass riff, and Nas's 'You Owe Me', whose slinky pulsations and jerky flow sound uncannily close to two-step garage.

As yet, though, you've yet to hear top rap producers like Rockwilder, Swizz Beatz, and The Neptunes bigging up Jeff Mills, Thomas Bangalter or Timo Maas. Nor has there been a big wave of hip hop fans leaving the Tunnel, where Funkmaster Flex DJs the hottest hardcore rap night in New York, to check out Twilo just a few hundred yards down 27th Street. So far OutKast are the only rap group to talk openly about being directly influenced by rave music and ecstasy culture. The duo, Big Boi and Andre 3000, have talked about going to raves in their home town Atlanta, Georgia, and even going on field research missions in London clubland. They gave their latest album, the hugely acclaimed 'Stankonia', faster bpms than its mellow predecessor 'Aquemeni' because "nowadays you got different drugs on the scene. X done hit the hood. It ain't chronic no more." OutKast even dabbled in drum & bass on their single 'Bombs Over Baghdad', trying to connect with the faster metabolic rate of "a whole new breed of kids. . . You got little kids doing cocaine, doing ecstasy and all kinda speed-'em-up drugs. That's the heartbeat of what's going on."

For Van Helden, this particular moment in hip hop recalls a lost golden age that briefly occurred in the late Eighties: hip-house. Then, you had artists like Doug Lazy, Fast Eddie, and Tyree rapping over house beats, and rap groups like The Jungle Brothers doing tracks like 'I'll House You'.

"Hip hop was uptempo back then anyway, and it was normal in New York clubs to mix it with house. Then in the Nineties, the bpm's in hip hop got slower and the clubs were moody – everybody just drinking and blazing trees [smoking spliffs], and it just kind of dragged. It really missed that kind of hands-up-inthe-air shit. I hate to say it, but E is responsible for making the rap clubs good again."

The first rapper to talk openly about his ecstasy use, of course, was Eminem – rhyming about his preference for E and mushrooms, brazenly gobbling handfuls of pills (or lookalikes) at concerts, pretending to spill little white fellers out of his pockets onstage at the MTV music awards, and even reportedly throwing Es into the audience during his tour of Germany. In a kiss-and-tell memoir written by his former bodyguard Byron Williams, Eminem is

"No, there's no pills here. You don't get them at hip hop nights. Just a bit of puff and a lot of attitude."

So says Mark, a doorman at a Brighton club that regularly hosts hip hop nights. So all that e-talk from Eminem and his Yank buddies is just faux-rebellious mouthing off? Well, maybe – it wouldn't be the first time, let's face it. But step inside the club and not everyone is so sure.

"I was working on the bar the other night and I was surprised at how many people were ordering water," says Mike, with that tone that implies "if you know what I mean."

Hip hop clubber Si is more forthright.

"Yeah I do it sometimes, and my friends do. It really adds to the music. It's not like house music, which just teases you while it wears out the drugs. Hip hop's more intense, it's got more punch. When the bass kicks in..."

Si reckons it might be different in London where there's a bit more attitude, but others disagree. Rob, a promoter, doesn't doubt that there's plenty of popping going on in the capital, and not of the caps into muthafuckas variety.

"I think it's a crossover thing," he offers. "Some people who are into hip hop now used to be into house and came through breakbeat or jungle, so they bring the drugs with them. Also, the kids are younger and it's just what you do when you're 17 – go out and get off your head. It's a laugh. The Brits are a nation of E heads."

Bizzy Bone: No lover of boy-on-boy action, he

described as a compulsive ecstasy user who has to take the drug before shows or interviews to get vibed up, and who coined personal nicknames for pills such as "helicopters" or "little men". Although Eminem's management denied the "six pills a day" addiction slurs, Eminem's producer Dr Dre has talked about recording songs during two-day ecstasy-fuelled sessions in the studio.

"We get in there, get bugged out, stay in the studio for two days," Dre told one US magazine. "Then you're dead for three days. Then you wake up, pop the tape in, like, 'Let me see what I've done."

Eminem is a perfect example of the paradoxes of the 'B-boys on E' phenomenon. MDMA softens one's emotional defences, promotes feelings of trust and tactile tenderness, melts the ego. In other words, it basically creates the exact opposite mindset to rap's paranoid aggression, its threats and boasts and delusions of grandeur. But Eminem hasn't noticeably become a more enlightened or peaceful person as a result.

Hip hop's embrace of ecstasy is changing the music and culture of the scene, but it's also challenging many of our assumptions about the utopian, consciousness-changing powers of the drug. Hip hop's ethos of 'keeping it real' conflicts with rave's ecstasy-fuelled positivity. Things are changing, but don't hold your breath for the smiley face to replace the scowling sneer of the 'screwface' that characterises hip hop photoshoots. Bizzy Bone of Bone Thugz told Vibe magazine that ecstasy "is for people who can't deal with the world." And he expressed disgust for E's swoony, androgyny-fuelling effects: "That's some feminine-ass shit, make a motherfucker act all sweet. Anything that makes a man want to drop to his knees and give another man fellatio, something ain't right. . ."

Then again, ecstasy is such a powerful drug that it's certain to have some effects on hip hop, both as a culture and as a music. But what about attitudes? Will E have the same calming effect on hip hop's tough guys as it did on the UK's soccer casuals in the late Eighties? Will Eminem use his recent duet with Elton John as the launchpad for a more caring, sharing persona? After the massive influence it's had on the global dance scene, it seemed that E held no more surprises in terms of its cultural effects. But now that the drug has filtered through to one of the few groups it had left untouched – black American youth – it could be that ecstasy has new tricks up its sleeves, new stories to tell. Watch this space. . .

Dangalter and Nomem-Christo catch the tardis back to the best of the Eighties

IN A YEAR bristling with big league dance albums (Basement Jaxx, Orbital et al), it's still fair to say that this is the one that we've been waiting for. After all, it's nearly four years since 'Homework' landed with an almighty wallop and reshuffled the dance template. Club culture's fascination with this most circumspect duo has increased exponentially ever since, as we waited, waited and waited for another house music masterpiece.

It seems then, that many are going to be disappointed, because 'Discovery' is not that record. Instead, the pair have presented us a mutilated, widescreen gaze back to the Eighties that makes Les Rythmes Digitales sound like a tribute band and AOR ironists Phoenix sound desperately uninspired.

The key, you suspect, is that instead of reproducing that era's panoramic sound wholesale, Daft Punk have merely co-opted its basic components into their sound. Where on 'Homework' they threw Chicago house and Detroit techno into the pot before working their magic, the ingredients now include Steely Dan, Trevor Horn, Vivaldi and Bon Jovi. An unholy alliance, perhaps.

But, as the saying goes, it's not what you've got, but what you do with it. Opening with the glitterball nous of 'One More Time', it is the double whammy of forthcoming single 'Aerodynamic' and 'Digital Love' which really sets out 'Discovery''s stall. Purists may retreat in horror at the former's poodle rock guitar solo and the pair actually singing on 'Digital Love', but the rest of us will be ecstatic - this is masterful future pop as opposed to functional dance music.

That's not to say that they've abandoned their roots entirely. The house massage of 'High Life', or the technicolor dancefloor savagery of 'Crescendolls' or 'Super-Heroes', are enough to let anyone know Daft Punk still stand head and shoulders above 90% of their contemporaries. The only real disappointment is the much-vaunted second collaboration with Romanthony, 'Too Long', which is just that, and sounds flat and uninspired compared to the kaleidoscope of sound on the rest of the album.

Having conquered the dancefloor so effectively last time around, Thomas and Guy-Man have been looking to expand. And make no mistake - the sonic dynamo unleashed here will make them one of the biggest electronic acts in the world. The only question left to ask, is what the hell are they going to do next? **John Hall**



FUNK D'VOID

Orgasmically lovely sliver of sumptuous techno soul from the Soma regular

AS an 'occupation', reviewing dance albums definitely has its moments, and this is one of them. After relocating to Barcelona, Glaswegian-Swede and techno lord Lars Sandberg has returned with a new album. And if the Spanish setting conjures up worrying notions of Funk D'Void descending into fuzzy contentment and sunburnt, Mambo-style ambient mush, fear not. This collection of lush techno shows that Sandberg's faculties are as crisp and sharp as they were four years ago on his stunning debut, 'Technoir'. On 'Dos', Sandberg's production gleams, yet pulses with soul at the same time. His sounds range from the majestically expansive to the softest of exhaled murmurs. Glacier-cool Midi spikes and diamondhard percussion licks are suffused with sensuality – sex, even – and there aren't many producers working in the same field who can boast such a skill.

'Dos' also sees Sandberg expand on his Detroitinfluenced repertoire to include elements of Latin, as on the shimmering 'Obrigado'; funk, as in the househomage cut '1992'; and electro, which bubbles from the heart of 'My Adidas'.

The clean-lined glass and steel perfection of his

techno is present in the tight and minimal 'To Ya Waistline' and a gorgeous, string-driven whoosher titled 'The Loquita', but elsewhere, the signs are that Sandberg is on a mission to explore.

This is best illustrated by the closing track, which he has the gall to name 'Sketches Of Spain', thereby pinching directly from Miles Davis. This is the only cut in which Sandberg makes direct reference to his new home in a low-tempo, Rhodes-built, jazzy closer, that is something like a soft summer breeze caressing your cheek. It's a hint of things that could come from a producer who seems to be approaching a spectacular and terrifically potent peak in his career. Clatre Morgan Jones

BIG BUD

Late Night Blues (Good Looking)

Cappuccino-tastic early hours jazz-fest... but good

BIG Bud, who we always presumed was a single studio player, turns out to be a five-piece band. Or perhaps he was once one bloke but has now split amoeba-like into five separate musical entities. Alternatively, on a slightly more sensible note, Big Bud himself has adopted some real live instrumentalists to fill out his increasingly expansive vision. Whichever way the bassbin crumbles, Good Looking have put out an album which belies their usual two-acceptably-pleasant-releases-a-month policy and requires far more extensive appraisal.

CD1 is by far the most fun, a 'virtual gig' in which M'sieur Bud teams up with New York keyboard player Weldon Irvine alongside a selection of chat-happy beatnik warblers and an imaginary audience who cheer at appropriate moments. Like Photek's recent outing, Big Bud strays far from his drum & bass origins and investigates any area that looks interesting. This includes the cute brushed cymbal jazz of 'On The Six', epic ethnic adventuring, replete with hoarse African singing on 'Mombassa', pure deep house on 'Sacha's Song', the live bebop of 'Soulfood', and even Talkin' Loud/Nuphonic-ish disco on 'All Over The World'. Despite wandering all over the shop in search of everyone from Charlie Parker's ghost to the beatz of Good Looking mentor LTJ Bukem, it all gels remarkably well into the cheerful 'Late Night Blues' of the title, a smoky coffee shop affair, possibly based in an imaginary city combining street-style elements of London and New York.

The second CD is almost a bonus, a typical Good Looking low-key drum & bass soul-soother for the comedown kings and queens of tomorrow, nothing particularly special but functional sonic valum all the same.

Big Bud is also threatening to take 'Late Night Blues' on the road so get your beret and spats out and let's get to the lindyhoppin'. Thomas II Green

ALPHA

The Impossible Thrill (Melankolic) Moody electronica from Bristol? Surely not

ALPHA's last album 'Come From Heaven' was an understated gem of dark Bristolian blues that somehow slipped under the radar, despite massive critical acclaim. But this, the follow up, should finally see them break free from the shadow of their contemporaries. Having ditched the MOR samples that dominated the former, the duo of Dingley and Jenks have concocted an even stronger brew this time, with languid beats and the delicate voices of Alpha regulars Martin Barnard, Wendy Stubbs and Helen White twinned with string arrangements to melt the hardest of hearts. As simultaneously sweet and vet melancholic as being diagnosed with cancer while winning the lottery. Neil Gardner

SKITZ

Countryman (Ronin) Rough and ready multi-MCed debut from British hip hop old hand

SO you wait ages for Brit hop veterans to release debut albums and then two come along at once. First Ty's debut after 400 years in the biz, and now this from older-than-Methusala west country boy Skitz. Released on 23 Skidoo's excellent Ronin imprint, 'Countryman' is like a who's who of hip hop talent from Rodney P and labelmate Deckwrecka to MC Roots Manuva and scratch master extraordinaire Prime Cuts. At times it has the feeling of being designed by committee (too many MCs spoil the broth and all that), but its rough and ready production and grimy rhyming gradually win you over. 'The Junkyard's dark preoccupations ('the sun doesn't shine down on my street') and the nightmarish 'Where My Mind Is At' cut to the chase as a snapshot of 21st century reality. Elsewhere Skitz mixes funk with snippets of folk music and a dominating dub reggae influence into a satisfying whole. Well worth waiting for. **Neil Bardner**





FIRSTBORN

When It Hits You, Feel No Pain (Independiente) Passionate, rough-edged eclectic mash-up from Eire

WHEN you hear the concept, you can't help thinking of David Holmes – after all, Oisin Lunny comes from the back alleys of Belfast, and his album is infused with the same scuzzy, eclectic love of Northern soul, hip hop and filthy techno. But while Holmes' oeuvre is filtered through the pilled up hedonism of club culture, Lunny's background as part of perma-frowned hip hop duo Marxman sees 'When It Hits You, Feel No Pain' sprouting from the ultra-gritty street poetry of the rootsiest rap.

The album, as is required in these days of the auteur producer, features a fair few vocal collaborations, but the

most mood-defining are those with writer Bennun Murphy. Coming on like an Irish Irvine Welsh trying to impersonate William Burroughs, his scabrous, stream-of-consciousness rants may be conspicuously 'arty', but add a raw, gutter-slum voyeurism to the dark and twisted likes of 'Happy Days' and the techno-on-a-bad-trip of 'Hey Mister'.

Crucially though, despite this purgatory trawl under the skirts of modern day decadence, the mood is defiantly uplifting, even redemptive. The seedy glory of the likes of 'The Mood Club' and opener 'I Close My Eyes' look at the less glamourous side of life and come out laughing. True, lovers of 'outsider' literature are going to be masturbating themselves silly over Murphy's surrealist diatribes, but for once they'll have good reason. This is one of the most fearsome explorations of the dark side of the soul you'll have heard for quite a while. John Hall

LEE 'SCRATCH' PERRY

Born In The Sky (Motion) Lovingly compiled archive of noted mentalist's early works

EVERYONE has a favourite Lee 'Scratch' Perry story, whether it's burning his own studio down in a fit of pique over someone nicking his favourite bouncy ball, or conducting fee negotiations at an English festie using a squeaky toy – one squeak for 'yes', two for 'no'. But how many people have actually heard his – often amazing - music? In a world where someone like BT or Danny Tenaglia can be hailed as a visionary, it may be instructive to check the work of a true genius. So it's handy that Motion have bundled together a fantastic bluffer's guide to early Perry, from playful rocksteady instrumentals (all previously unavailable, if you're bothered about that sort of thing) to black rivers of dub, taking in curios like a rare Susan Cadogan number and three - count 'eml - versions of 'l adv Lady' by Cynty & The Monkees, including the dub rework 'Enter The Dragon'. A must for Scratch addicts, this also comes highly recommended for those who want to sample the legend's work for the first time. **Duncan Bell**

JOEY NEGRO

Back To The Scene Of The Crime: The Joey Negro Compilation Volume 2 (Azuli)

The king of contemporary disco's latest dancefloor goodies turn out to be not all that good

"BACK To The Scene Of The Crime' is a showcase for Dave 'Disco' Lee's recentproduction and remix outings, including Sessomatto's 'Moody', the delightful 'American Booty' by Jakatta, and Yolanda Wyn's cover of Chaka Khan's classic 'I Know You, I Live You'. But although Joey has become something of a legend in the disco and house arena, in the context of an album the relentlessly high tempo, high-energy, disco-ridden tracks soon become monotonous. MANITOBA

Start Breaking My Heart (Leaf) Warm, downtempo bubblebath with a brainy twist

THERE have been some great records recently that take leftfield musical ideas and present them in a poptastic format that can be enjoyed by those who do not possess a PhD. Fizzarum, Schneider TM & KPT Michigan, Matmos. . . and now Manitoba's debut album.

Here, the irrefutably lovely opening tracks 'Dundas, Ontario' and 'People Eating Fruit' sugar the pill of an album that also employs frowny serialist ideas – such as constructing tracks from very short, repetitive loops, as on the stunning 'Lemon Yoghourt'. Naturally, the album takes the odd sojourn in the land of wibble. But it never stays there too long - this isn't music that's collapsing under the weight of its own seriousness. So can we expect to hear Manitoba on Julesey's show? Well, it's probably being a tad optimistic to expect lovers of the epic breakdown (or glock-totin' doggs, come to that) to 'get' this. It's utilisation of more than two ideas per album – in fact frequently, more than two ideas per track-will probably put them off. But more adventurous souls should track it down without delay. Time Trap Technik (International Deejay Gigolos) BEFORE Cisco Ferreira and Colin McBean conquered the world techno scene as The Advent, Ferreira had already played a major part in the formation of the first wave of European techno via his position as in-house engineer at R&S. And now the sound of old school Euro has come back into vogue, it's not surprising that he should want to step up and show the likes of Zombie Nation how it's really done. More Front 242 than Force Legato, this is a great album that retraces the steps of the cooler end of mid-to-late-Eighties Euro, while still managing to give it a bang up to date contemporary twist. JON THE DENTIST & OLLIE JAYE

Genetically Engineered (Phoenix Uprising)

Banging trance from an old master

IT'S hardly the seminal album that Baby Doc & The Dentist's 'In Worship Of False Idols' was, but hard-trance leader Jon The Dentist's first full-length collaboration with Wolves fan Ollie Jaye is a well-executed collection that does what you want when you want it to. Plenty of peak-time anthems (the singles 'Feels So Good', 'Imagination' and 'Make You See God' are typical of the Euro rhythms and uplifting melodies on show), a drop of drum & bass ('The Pyramid') and a KLF tribute ('Go'). The hilarious 'We Are House' shows the pair don't take themselves too seriously, and overall it's a collection that should see their fans smilling. **Mark Kavanagi**

TIM TETLOW

Beauty Walks A Razor's Edge (Planet μ)

Gentle electronics lightly burnished with wisps of good ol'-fashioned melody

EVERYTHING about this album, from the slightly dangerous title to the picture of Mr Tetlow standing in a boat wearing a wide-brimmed leopard skin hat, slik shirt and a Seventies Burberry-print jacket, has clearly been given a lot of thought. The music, as one might expect, is introspective, fragile and at times quite dark. There's nothing particularly groundbreaking about it, as for the most part it stays true to the already established patterns of deep atmospheric electronica. It does, however, possess a certain gentle grace that, coupled with its clever sense of space and timing, sets it apart from the ocean of other artily obscure CDs of similar studio noodling. **Dave Mothersole**

Shadow Of The Earth (Exceptional)

Japanese nu-jazz with world music tendencies

THE work of Japanese producer Calm has so far appeared only sporadically in this country, but with the recent 'Sky' EP and now this textured, sculpted longplayer, his stock looks set to rise. 'Shadow Of The Earth' is an album that unfolds gradually: the initially polite percussion and pillow-soft pads inducing nightmarish visions of bearded world-music botherers. The quiet, Zenlike simplicity of tracks such as 'Running On The Sand' or 'Aesthetics Of The Simple Chords', however, win you over with their sheer craftsmanship and attention to detail. Airight, you may well still hear this in your local organic juice bar, but when the music's this good even that can be forgiven. **Cal Gibson**

Hugely and nigglingly catchy, even irritating, but at the same time sounding like nothing else around. Absolutely bound to be massive, enormous, etc. Chopped-up vocals build and build to a cleverly d peak. Unstoppable.

Jules: "This is going to be one of the dance records of the year. On a good week it's a potential number one. It's got a really well produced vocal and literally builds from beginning to end. It would probably slightly benefit from coming out in the summer. This is getting played by everyone on Radio 1 so if it can appeal to so many different DJs it's a pretty good sign.'



on Ninja Tune and he duly has with his excellent new 'Musipal' album. This four track EP is more of a taster than anything else but contains four warped nuggets of chopped beats, alternative two-step and surreal dialogue.

Jules: "All four tracks here are really original and not too masturbatory. There's a creative use of samples and a nice mood about each one. You sometimes think that it's either the truly talented or the truly stupid who would put four such good tracks on one EP and run the risk of one getting lost at the expense of others."

TECHNATION

Sea Of Blue (Slinky) Cack with a Quake mix and dire, meaningless female vocal, every channel packed to the gills with swathes of rushinducing noise. Why not, eh? But then again, why? Gratingly offensive, super-over produced music. Sea Of Poo, more like.

Jules: "It might sound a bit hypocritical to say I don't like this style of music when my wife's records sound quite similar, but we've always tried to make the song content more folky and less like a rave record of old."

BINI & MARTINI Burning Up (Azuli)

Ever since their remix of The Sunkids' 'Rescue Me', Italian duo Bini & Martini have been ones to watch. With 'Burning Up', featuring a divatastic vocal courtesy of Lisa Millet, they continue to impress. This will be as cheerily welcome on Top Of The Pops as at Rulin', and still manages to be charming. Sandy Rivera on the (filtery) mix, plus there's a lovely sax-laden dub.

Jules: "Musically solid; what I'd consider a Graeme Park record. It's not like everyone can be Lennon & McCartney but surely lyrics shouldn't just be an afterthought. The dub with the sax demonstrates why they should have invested more time in the vocals. as the music is strong.'

MODEM

Contact (Substance)

Cheap shoddy trash. Perversely likeable. 'Contact' has an enormous drum beat (especially on the Warp Brothers mix), a sample of fax/modem squealing and a teeth-shattering synth effect. It's joyously awful and doesn't care. It will also make big bucks for a coterie of conservative businessmen who don't even like dance music. But you can't have everything.

Jules: "I'm not that keen on the Warp Brothers remix; it's like 'oompaloompa' house, which some may associate me with but in truth I haven't played for a while. The original is a good example of what happens when you do hard house the right way."

LOXY & DYLAN

The Nightmare EP (Renegade Hardware)

At Muzik Towers, Renegade Hardware are regarded as little short of gods. If you like your tunes visceral rather than pussywhipped, dive in. Loxy & Dylan keep to the Renegade programme: no-holds-barred breakneck drum & bass brilliance. All four tracks are wildly and venomously energising. Last year the Muzik massive listened to one of their tunes non-stop for one-and-a-half hours. 'Nuff said. Possibly the best label in Britain.

Jules: "The drum & bass I like is the stuff that's moodier with more restrained drums than this. It would be pointless dissing it as I don't understand it. I'll sit on the fence and give it..."



BMR & LEVEL 42

Starchild (Peppermint Jam) A monster. Pop always prefers to chew the cud of familiarity and reliability rather than munch on fresher pastures. This time, Mark King's antiquated chunk of Isle Of Wight funk receives a substantial injection of Viagra. Hey presto, the whole of Ibiza will be movin' their asses when it receives a majorlabel re-release. Just like old, dead Marley's 'Sun Is Shining', but somehow not so naff.

Jules: "Level 42's 'Starchild' is probably the last untouched disco classic to have emanated from the 1975-1985 period. Not bang up my street but I've always liked the Peppermint Jam sound and this is a good example of their consistency."

AGNELLI & NELSON Vegas (Xtravaganza)

Xtravaganza have been raking it in recently with chunkier fare on their Xtrahard sister label (such as Voodoo & Serano's 'Blood Is Pumpin"). 'Vegas' sees the Irish duo take the parent imprint back to the soft-edged trance glory days of Chicanery. Except it lacks a dynamic centre of any kind. Ultimately there's not much to say about this, because there ain't much there.

Jules: "I've been a staunch supporter of all the older Agnelli & Nelson tunes but I can't get my head around this at all. For an act that have put out the best records in their genre in a very overcrowded marketplace, this one doesn't bob above the parapet.'

FINGATHING & MR SCRUFF

Just Practise (Grand Central) DJ Peter Parker and double-bass-playing partner Sneaky enlist the services of Mancunian beatz humorist, Mr Scruff. The

results are sample-laden, rather lovely and a have a smiley innocent warmth. Not a heavy dancefloor smash, mind. Two straighter cut-up moments reside on the flip.

Jules: "I like listening to this stuff in the day. The second track on the B-side, 'Slop', is a combination of slap bass and scratching that works really well. It's very listenable without being novelty whereas the A-side is maybe more novelty and doesn't have feeling."

GIRESSE

Mon Ami (Inferno)

Gary Numan may have only had a few golden moments but the doomy synth excellence of 'Are Friends Electric', which this samples, was certainly one of them. 'Mon Ami', however, created by Andy Galea (of Sol Brothers and The Freestylers) and Justin Scharvona, cannot even scale the lowly hillocks of Armand Van's 'Koochy' ('Cars'). Toytown hard house of no merit, desperately claiming a Ian Driver remix

Jules: "The A-side is way too cheesy and extremely clichéd. The only novelty is that it uses a Gary Numan sample. They've got Jan Driver to do a remix and normally I'm a fan but I don't think he's done very well on this at all."

ST GERMAIN

Rose Rouge (Blue Note) The tune from the BBC promo featuring Gilles Peterson menacing old ladies with a pair of headphones. 'Rose Rouge' fairly encapsulates why Ludovic Navarre is admired by both house and jazz boffs, containing, as it does, both 4/4 and easylistening Blaze versions, a pure organic jazz take by the Eric Truffaz Quartet, and the St Germain original.

Jules: "There's been surprisingly few records incorporating live music or indeed jazz over syncopated beats. When these two seemingly incongruous musical elements are blended sympathetically it can work, and this is a good case in point. The Blaze mix is the one for me, more of a chill out thing." ----

DJ LUCK AND MC NEAT

Piano Loco (Universal)

There'll be howls of protest from garage old-hands and 'proper' two-step clubsters when this one hits. One doubts the three-Top-10-hits-in-a-row duo will be too bothered, though, as their target audience is a tad younger. A salsa-piano pop-party record featuring mixes by Luck, Beathedz, David Howard and Tosh & McLean. Determinedly further into the kindergarten.

Jules: "This will be a hit as it's very radio friendly. It's got Spanish elements in the speech and Latin piano so it's odd that they're releasing it in March. Warm and partyish and if you've heard DJ Luck and MC Neat you'll know what to expect."

SLAM VERSUS UNKLE

Narco Tourists (Soma)

Happy 100th release to Soma. This celebratory single, however, while far from shoddy, is not the mighty, all-conquering heavyweight it should be. The bouncing, guitar-flecked original is funky fun, Slam drop a looping tech-house mix and Unkle provide a more twisted beatz version

Jules: "I suppose you'd describe this as tech-house. A lot of that stuff goes over my head as, on the whole, it needs to be played on a large system which I don't have in my convertible. I don't understand the A-side mix, it sort of wibble wobbles all over the place." (for Slam's mix)

SINGLES

MUZIK'S SINGLE

ELEKTROCHEMIE LK Schall (ffrr)

A rampaging juggernaut in the Zombie Nation vein with a rhythm that sounds uncannily like an android version of Seventies glam-rockers Mud. ffrr have licensed the Thomas Schumacher original from Germany where it's already cleaned up. They've also commissioned remixes by Trevor Rockliffe (straight techy) and Pascal FEOS (low-key progressive) but neither can surpass the majestic beastliness of the original.

Jules: "This has ups and downs and hills and valleys which makes it really good listening. I wondered why ffrr had signed it as it's not an obvious major label signing, but it has got a bit of a Zombie Nation sound to it so that's probably why."

MMV

CRISTIAN VOGEL La Isla Piscola (Novamute) Those assuming Vogel is entering the Balearic rat-race early will be sorely disappointed. Wilfully perverse as ever, he delivers a glooping curiosity with high dosages of imagination but, for most people, terminal unlistenability. Matthew Herbert dubs it into the (vaguely) danceable leftfield while the 'For The Travelling Fish Lover Version' sounds pretty much as you would imagine.

Jules: "This is music that's a bit too weird to be dancefloor-friendly and a bit too dancefloor-friendly to be truly weird. Perhaps he should go down one path or another. I don't know where it would work for me or anyone else."

ONEIRO

Classic are consistent providers of main room to the average clubber

This is like that and you have to give props for it being on its own tangent.'

CITIZEN CANED

The Journey (Serious)

On the A-side, Vangelis appears to have some tender part of his anatomy caught in the squiggly-noise button on his keyboard. While trying to perform the theme to 'Midnight Express'. At a rave. On the moon [Stop it – Ed.]. The flipside 'Surge' and 'Sionix' remixes make brave attempts to carve off a little of the Sunny Delightaddled hyper-mania.

Jules: "I have to confess I'm biased towards this as it's produced by Darren Tate, the man behind my wife's act Angelic. It's a more commercial trance record than some of the things I play, but shows the difference between the music-by-numbers brigade and those like Darren who have an intuitive understanding of chords, tones and textures.'

RADIOACTIVE MAN

The Uranium EP (Rotters Golf Club)

Great to see Weatherall returning with a new label, creeping slowly out to face the fluoride-scrubbed grin of dance culture 2001. This is his Two Lone Swordsmen partner Keith Tenniswood, a longterm aficionado of electro and squat parties, both of which appear in spirit on all four tracks.

Jules: "It's great the influence of electro has never waned, but this is very tracky. You could use it as filler but I'm not sure who or where it's aimed at.'

ANIMATED

Contact Number 2 (Deviant) Diverse and recommended four-sider from Get Fucked sidekicks Duncan Forbes and Laurent Webb. Their original is a twisted electro-esque workout, Ian Wilkie smartly Digweeds the progressive garden on his version, up 'n' coming San Francisco DJ Garth drops a spartan, sweetly laidback version and Animated close matters.

Jules: "This would be the one I'd play out of all the ones I've heard so far. I like the Ian Wilkie mix best. Every remix he's done has got the balance between not lacking in energy but not resorting to clichés either." ----

SISTER BLISS

Deliver Me (Multiply) Go straight for the jugular with the gradually building 'Mix 1' which makes the most of an unjustly neglected Beloved song and folk artist John Martyn's plaintive vocals. For those who wish to escape into the dubs. Lee Coombs' acidic Fabric-friendly version is best, while X-Press 2 come in under par.

Jules: "'Sister Sister' was a big record among DJs but lacked any hook to turn it into a real anthem. For this they've used folk singer John Martyn, taking the core mood elements from the last single and adding a distinctive vocal on top. It could maybe do with being edited down by two minutes."

DIDO

Here With Me (Cheeky) The coffee table vibes of Rollo's entirely inoffensive singing sister receive some dancefloor attention on his label. Hard to argue with except to say that a bunch of ol' coots didn't fight the punk 'n' acid house wars for this! Parks & Wilson's 'Twilo Vocal' and 'Homeyard Dub', however, come on like self-conscious homages to Mr Tenaglia.

Jules: "This track is a potential number one, but these Parks & Wilson mixes leave me cold. They've turned it into something with no groove or any palpable funk."

UTAH SAINTS

Lost Vagueness (Echo)

"Echo memo: Revitalising career of Utah Saints proving hard task. Leeds legends. Massively successful in US. But not having much luck getting anyone interested in new LP. Touting mixes by Deadly Avenger (aggressively acidic), Oliver Lieb (sedately trancey) and Josh Wink (chugging progressive). Consider digging out old 'U-U-U-Utah Saints!' sample." Nope, just makes vagueness loster.

Jules: "The Josh Wink mix is a bit too minimal and not up my street, but Lieb's is amazing: a very chunky, hypnotic take on trance. One of the biggest records for me at the moment."

MEKKA

Diamondback (Perfecto)

Oakey's moneyspinning Perfecto machine has sinister amnesiac properties that cause individuals exposed to extended doses to forget that the last Perfecto release had identical production stylings. If you want originality and a mind-expanding blast, look elsewhere, but if you're nutted on a bundle of chemical badness and want to 'lose it', the tried and tested melancholy-chords-versusdriving-drums formula should do the trick.

Jules: "This is a nice trance record that gets the balance right between pumping the crowd and not reverting to the clichés of 12 months ago. Not a record to get the peak atmosphere but a stalwart of my sets for the past two or three weeks.'

Finally (Distance)

More Masters back-slapping. This, in its KOT original was already a great song but Louie and Kenny's soulful re-working takes it to end-of-night anthemic proportions. Again it's simple, organic and so beautiful you can feel the love it generates to a proper floor. (TF)

ROOTS AND WINGS

Come Over To My Place (white label)

Rumours that this is by Joshua out of the States are unconfirmed, but it's so good we don't care. Great drums complement a funky bass-driven groove and a fab, sexy vocal. It's been about for a couple of months and has long been a Lazy Dog anthem. Ibiza beckons. (TF)

BOYD JARVIS

Atmos-Fear (Wave)

In both the 'Atmospheric' and 'Dark 'N' Dubby' mixes, Boyd is joined on the mix by François Kervorkian to give a lesson in how to create cutting edge, deep techhouse with soul. Layers of sound, acidic vibes and an old school undercurrent add up to a rich mix of textures that will satisfy floors and purist swots alike. (TF)

BIPATH

Paranoize (Saw Recordings) No details on my test pressing except that it's Satoshi Tomije's new label and that Digweed and Tenaglia are bang on it. Dark, dark drums, harsh hats and percussion make it perfect for those Twilo/Bedrock/Be Yourself moments and while it's a million miles away from James Ingram, you should hear both tunes in open minded venues. (TF)

CARL HANCOCK RUX

Lamentations (You Son) (Giant Steps)

Ron Trent takes the production duties for US black poet/singer Carl Hancock Rux. The resulting vocal performance is rich and evocative while the music is a dark, slow burn of a groove. A purist's delight, this joint is already an anthem for Timmy Regisford, Krivit and Claussell. Essential modern soul. (TF)

H.C.C.R.

Suck My Clock (Sondos, US) I'm not normally a fan of Harry 'Choo Choo' Romero's big room beats but this one is a little bit special. Here he serves up a killer cocktail of pounding beats, deep throbbing bass and the kind of relentless vocal lick that works the floor into a state of tripped-out hypnosis. It sounds like the tricks that Danny Tenaglia and Rui Da Silva used in their Tribal hevday, combined with the current production values of Futureshock or



H-Foundation. Perfect DJ tool (whoever he may be). (KIN) -----

ONIERO/ROB MELLO

Shhh!/ Scared of Losing You (Classic)

Classic's two showstoppers this month come from label boss Derrick Carter and Sensory Productions' Roberto Mello. Carter returns to his Oniero pseudonym (that last appeared on 'Seasons' - the first ever Classic release) for a floorfilling body rocker full of twisted rhythms and his trademark 'boompty' bass loops. Add to that some strange, whispered paranoid poetry and what you have is distinctive dancefloor filler from the dark side. Mello on the other hand heads straight down dub house drive for a chunky system shaker that could be Maurizio meddling with the latest sketches of Deep Dish's Ali and Sharam. (KIVI)

JAY-J AND CHRIS LUM

Give It Up For Love/ Smells Like Moulton Studios (Chez. US/Afterhours, US)

Afterhours and Chez Music present a couple of workouts from two of the West Coast's up and coming producers. Jav-J is the founder of San Francisco's Moulton Street Studios (where Migs et al record), and here he collaborates with fellow San Francisco dweller Chris Lum. For Chez they create a cool house cover of the Tata Vega classic and for Afterhours it's a solid, Naked Music style pumper. (KM)

JORI HULKKONEN Wanna Do You

(F Communications)

We've been waiting a long time for a follow up to Jori Hulkkonen's classic 'Let Me Love You'. Now, finally he returns to that subtle mixture of soul vocals and tough New York beats that made his Jii Hoo release such a massive favourite at Body & Soul. On this occasion though it's the remixes that are providing all the action with Ralph Lawson and Carl Finlow's seriously hot '20:20 Vision Mix' delivering the kind of heart-melting funk that we've come to expect from two of Britain's finest producers. (KM)

GROOVE ASSASSINS & DJ RAW

Warehouse Daze/ House Fantasy (Black Vinyl)

Groove Assassins follow up their super fat 'City Lights' EP with a joint production with Sheffield's DJ Raw. Both cuts look back to days when tracks like Blunted Dummies' 'House 4 All' and labels like Balance and Prescription made tracks that slowly lit fires on the dancefloor rather than beating it with a full-on 909 thump. If you remember buying records by Powerhouse, get hold of this immediately. (KIVI)

ROMATT PRESENTS AFRO-CENTRIC VIBE

Let's Be Free (King Street, US) DJ Romain heads deep into the drums and delivers the kind of tribal jazz fusion groove that has Joe Claussell written all over it. Unlike most of these muso-orientated ramblings, this one sounds like it will do some decent damage on the floor with 'Afro-centric Beats' a particularly useful DJ tool (that man popping up again). (KIM)

NICK HOLDER AND RAYA Inside Your Soul (NRK)

Ignore all the other mixes and head straight for the 'Hipp-E Deep Mix'. No vocals on offer and there's not much music either. just some fat beats and an unstoppable groove. But if you're a fan of the West Coast's dub house shenanigans this will sit on your Technics rather nicely. (KIVI)







TEISH O'DAY

He's The One (Dreemhouse Mix) (EMI) This talented young lady looks set to surge onto the scene this year for sure – she's already rated by and compared to some of the greats. Her album is causing a stir, but it's the Dreemhouse mix of this track that has caught our attention. Soulful UK garage at its best, the sweet beats work perfectly with the beautiful vocals. Maybe more of a radio track for some, but works well on certain dancefloors. Class.

On The Underground (Feelaood)

After the soulful summer groove 'I Can Make You' this isn't what you would expect! 'On The Underground' is a deep, dark, booming track for the bassline crew. PSG FEATURING MICHELLE HAINS

Dat's Me (Fuzzed)

PSG returns with another stormer which is already blowing up fast. A man with an eye for business, this will be released on his very own Fuzzed label which promises big things. With some hot new lyrics and an excellent female vocal, there's something to capture the attention of everyone on the scene, no matter what style they are into.

RICHIE DAN & K WARREN

Temptation (white label) When one of my favourite producers teams up with one of my favourite artists, the outcome's going to be a bit special. For those of you who have seen Richie perform, you know he steals the show, and 'Temptation' will be the perfect platform to showcase his talents once again. Bouncy and catchy yet gritty and raw – class.

SOUND DE-ZIGN

Happiness (Nu Life)

Using a piece of the anthem 'Let The Beat Hit 'Em', this has instant crossover appeal. Pleasant, easy to understand two-step, very well produced with the occasional appearance by the now customary MC. Not a full vocal by any means, but the vocal used is so familiar, it creates the illusion of being there even when it isn't. Could be a big radio hit this summer.

SPARK FEATURING MARKELL & MC SPYDER

I Dream Of U Baby (white label) On international DJ duties I was lucky enough to hear the debut live performance of this in Amsterdam. This is quality! Tight drum programming, excellent singing and Spyder offering his bit for those who like it raw, this has every base covered. I can't wait to see and hear a UK garage track produced in Amsterdam take the UK by storm. . .

CK-DJ & MUNCHIE MC FEATURING RIO BERLINDA

Play On (MSP) Being one of the scene's original MCs, I'm surprised it's taken Munchie so long to be involved in a musical project. It appears, however, that his time spent out of the limelight has been constructive, as this re-working of 'Let The Music Play' has a natural energy and vibe, ensuring a rinse-out in clubland and on the pirates. There is a 'vah-wah' bass wanting to come through, but thankfully it's been kept tactfully suppressed. It's got the right amount of vocal, the right amount of Munchie. . . so let the music play!

also a bit of a new technology addict.

"Myself and Paul Janes have just done a remix of 'Let's Rock' by E-Trax completely in Reason, a virtual studio that's a wicked piece of programming! You don't have to use any other studio equipment."

One sought-after take of this mix replaced the "let's rock" refrain with "let's moo". The crowds at Trade have been mooing incessantly ever since. "I think we can all take it a bit too seriously at times," lan explains. "I just take each day

as it comes. It's such a rat race DJing in England, just keeping your head above water is an achievement."

SINGLES

THE ORGAN DONORS

King Of Rock (Back On Plastic) Not since Honey Pot's opener has a debut excited as much as this. BOP is the outlet for Bouremenouth boys Scott and Matt, and 'King Of Rock' has more energy than 10 cans of Red Bull, and plenty of familiar samples too. Excellent production – just like the storming remix on the flip by fellow Bournemouth boyson-form, Knuckleheadz.

STIMULANT DJS

Are You Serious? (Tidy Trax) One of the more banging Tidy assaults, with the Stimulant troop leading a hi-octane charge that's got Admiral Hoover and Private Offbeat Bass in tow, and a trademark slowed-down and speeded-up breakdown bringing up the rear. Remix duties go to Paul Glazby, who adds a galloping b-line and even more hoovers.

BASE GRAFFITI

You Can Have it (Casa Dura) Dom Sweeten's finest hour has been dominating dancefloors off slate for months with a powerful combination of BG bass and beats, nagging rap snippets and an emotive, tranced-out breakdown. Worth buying for the equally playable B-side, making this a big VFM release.

BUTCH & SUNDANCE

I Need You (Shock)

The 'Original Mix' erupts from a bongo-led intro with phat bass and Moroder-esque synths, adding layers of stabs and an insistent vocal before a trancey riff invades proceedings and it takes things in an unexpected direction. John Whiteman's more straightforward bouncy and banging approach will, however, be much more effective on the floor.

ILLOGIK & M RAMONE

Hit It Harder (Elasticman) Release number five from the Elasticman stable almost gets five marks. 'Hit It Harder' is a well playable bouncy, offbeat number with a nagging hook that fires like a laser gun in a computer game. On the flip, 'The Rebel' drives down hard-trance street and picks up some kick-ass beats and in-yer-face stabs – sounds painful, but it's far from it.

TODD TOBIAS

Nice One Bruvva (I Made A Mistake) (Freezing Point)

Hot on the heels of Andy Farley's slamming remake of The Edison Factor comes another reason to drop the temperature. New FP signing Todd Tobias gets the same huge responses with 'Nice One' as with the label's biggest hit 'The Beginning' – hoovertastic hooks sit on a bubbling rhythm track that's got a quirky stab that turns heads every time. Nice one indeed.

GRAVITY BOYS

Buzz (Tuff Twins Recordings) A delightfully different effort from Dave London and Maris, blending a chopped-up vocal with an incessant phased, rhythmic grove that's cleverly arranged and does serious damage. Meanwhile, Modelle and Porl Young add their trademark beats and bass on their bouncier 'Tuff Twins Mix'.

NIL VERSUS MISS TRACY

Millennium Fight 2001 (Spin City) A new spin-off label from TEC that promises to be a "straight ahead hard house champion". The opening salvo is a full-on four tracker which arrived with little or no information – but then who needs silly little things like track titles? Suffice to say there are enough offbeat basslines and hoovers in here to fill the average two-hour set. And then some.

ZINI & KANTINI

Kick Ass (Nukleuz Red) A former number one on the Dutch club charts, and it's easy to see why. 'Kick Ass' does just that, thanks to a brain-eating melody on a 'Drop Shot' tip, super-slick Dutch production and bits of the 'The House That Jack Built' acappella. The 'Outwatcher Remix' injects an old skool hardcore flava and a sample that will do your head in for days. Awesome.

BASS BUMPERS

Music's Got Me (Enriched) Potatohead Kaba Croll's old Bass Bumpers hit (it reached number 25 back in 1994) returns in its poptastic 'Charismatic Mix' alongside 'Rich B's Hard Mix', which is like a ride on the Euro Express, and Alan Thompson's 'Alter Ego Mix', which is almost as cheeky as Alan himself. Hands in the air all around.

MAX & AMINO

Let The Bass Kick (Transsexual Mix) (Alien Trax) Released by popular demand after its inclusion on the 'Missing Files' album caused a fuss, the subtle and funky 'Transsexual Mix' of Max & Amino's old favourite is possibly the most accessible Alien track yet. And to prove they haven't gone soft, there's the techno- and acidinfused 'Lick The Biscuit Mix', too.

STEVE THOMAS

Won't Stop Rocking (Tripoli Trax)

Proving that Sasha's not the only genius to hail from Wales, the man they call Janet returns with a gargantuan package that includes three new tracks and a Base Graffiti remix. For some acid mayhem, 'Massive Power' reveals its Mr Spring influences in a spiralling 290bpm breakdown, while the devilishly dark 'WSR' is peak-time fodder in all the right sets.

JUSTIN BOURNE & DYNAMIC INTERVENTION

Kick Up The Volume (Honey Pot)

Honey never tasted so sweet. The omnipresent Mik Cree (in his Dynamic Intervention guise) teams up with Justin Bourne (whose 'Strapped In' effort on recharge is also worth checking) for a simple but very effective peak-time anthem that's got a huge breakdown, a memorable vocal and an irresistible b-line. Remixed in fine style by Knuckleheadz (again).

DJ PRINCE & JUSTIN K

Got To Have (Mo Bizz, Holland) Red Jerry possibly won't be too pleased with it, but DJ Prince & Justin K's twisting and twittering 'Got To Have' is filling dancefloors all over with the effective use of the riff from Felix's 'Don't You Want Me'. For a stripped back, beats and bass version, the B2 mix is pretty useful.

MARK TYLER The City (Re-Entry)

Fresh madness that first surfaced on lan M's stunning 'Trade' set – the 'Mark Tyler Versus Dynamic Intervention Mix' of 'The City' completes a trilogy of tunes using the same samples and fuses techno attitude with hard house sensibilities to great effect. Also features Canadian jock Android's take on 'Rush', a screeching percussive workout in a long, dark tunnel.

KYBOSH Playing With My Mind (Baroque) Kevin Swain and Dave Snell have exploded onto the flourishing deep progressive house scene. In what seems to be a relatively short space of time, they have taken a

commanding lead in the competitive world of production. Support has ranged from Emperor Tong to Princess Tenaglia. The Sleepfreaks remix is unreal. Baroque is absolutely committed to the highest levels of professionalism. This review is made up of six short sentences. (LF)

'Song For Zoe', in our humble opinion, is far superior to 'One', with the original mix superbly complemented by Fade's re-jig. (LF)

We told you to keep an eye on Pod and their latest release justifies that warning, as Matt Phillips effortlessly captures a dark, compellingly hypnotic slice of 21st century tribal progressive. It's minimal and dirty look at the pods on that! (LF)

SIMON

Free At Last (Positiva) Martin Luther King had a dream. Now, he has a kicking dance tune as well! Simon Pearson, originally from England, now resident in San Francisco, is the brains behind the track that looks set to bring Dr King's message to the dancefloor. With a politically correct set of remixes from Futureshock, Bushwackal and DJ Pierre you can be assured of two things: quality and colourful packaging. (LF)

SCHILLER

Ruhe (Data)

Stand by for the biggest thing to come out of Germany since smoked sausage! Last year, 'Das Glockenspiel' caused uproar, especially when drunken people tried to request it in clubs. Schiller's latest offering is a neat blend of techhouse and progressive. But let's not split hairs over genres, this is simply a superb piece of music. (LF)

ANIMATED

Container No. 2 (Deviant) Duncan Forbes and Laurent Webb have been raising eyebrows all over the place with an outrageous selection of comedy wigs. Not only that, but with support from the darker end of the DJ spectrum, this, the second release from the album 'Tempting Fate' looks set to send Animated's career into overdrive. (LF)

YVES DERUYTER

Back To Earth (Bonzai) In the current climate of commercial trance. you might wade though several piles of vinyl to find a track that didn't sound like 'Binary Finary' or 'Sandstorm'. Thank God then for those intuitive A&R people at Bonzai, who had the good sense to license this bone vibrating thumper from that shining production luminary, Yves Deruyter. Head straight for the B-side 'Progres Mix': it's rib-snappingly good. (LF)

12 MOONS

Northern Star/Bland Man's Vision (Dragonfly)

It just doesn't get any better than '12 Moons', unless of course you find you are suddenly immortal and have just won the lottery jackpot - that might be interesting. High class progressive for the discerning palate. **(LF)**

ADAM DIVED

State Of Panic (Additive)

Artists are like wine: it can take a long time for each producer to develop and reach the required maturity. After 10 years of music, does Dino (aka Adam) have the odd tipple to help him produce? We haven't a clue, so let's just say that his latest effort goes down like the sweetest amber nectar. With a dark tech-house feel, this is going to surprise a few pigeon-holers. (LF)

ROCCO & HEIST

Paradiso Rush (Neo) Liverpool, home of Brookside, drive-by shootings and Cream. Soon to be added to that glowing roster of fame are Rocco & Heist, Michael (Rocco) has been playing with his equipment, in the studio, for some time now. Rob (Heist) was one of The Porn Kings' original members. And it looks like Neo have signed another monster club hit. (LF)

FRED NUMF VERSUS FIVE POINT 0

Hong Kong Junkie (Tune Inn) This label usually leans toward the more techno edge of progressive house, but every now and then they release a much more widely appealing gem. 'Hong Kong Junkie' is one such. A double pack, this features mixes from the great Medway, Force Mass Motion and an incredible mix from Mark Shimmon Versus 3rd Degree with a 'Netherworld' style riff. (P)

LUCIEN FOORT Gemini (Sonic City)

The mad Dutchman has broken away from his increasingly hectic DJ schedule to continue his production career. 'Gemini' will not appeal to all Lucien's fans but will excite a wider audience than he has reached before. The signature groove is evident, although the main melody and choice of sound veer off in a bit of a cheesy direction. Saint & Sinners remix in their usual tuff, club rockin' way. (P)

JAMEX PRESENTS TATOINE

Music (Fluid) The original on the fantastic Dutch Touche label had it all: an awesome string section plus chilling female and spoken male vocals forging a true classic. Now Fluid have picked it up and it's even better! Evolution remix it themselves in their new found 'deeper' style, still giving it the UK edge, 16B do the do too, infallible as they are with their twisted percussive house thing pushing the limits. (P)

'Reservation', as you would expect from these three, pushes and pulls you from pillar to post, always evolving and always testing your imagination. Where's it going? Who knows - but what a journey! (P)

DJ GOGO

Adyssa (Cyber) Well-respected and prolific Dutch progressive label Cyber find themselves with a huge number of bombs just about to drop. The one guaranteed to fly is 'Adyssa' due to its inclusion on Diggers forthcoming Global Underground CD. The build and the groove is where it's at. Layer upon layer of subtle rhythms grow to a simple, swelling synth break. It's dead simple, but boy does it work. (P)

REFLEKTIVE FEATURING LOUISE DE FRAINE

Echoes (3 Beat)

With a Dutch house vibe running through but never leaning too far towards any pigeon hole, new artists Reflektive pave the way to crossover success. A cool vocal by Louise De Fraine compliments the great melodies of the track itself. The hardened underground progressive fan should head to the Origin remix where tuff tribal rhythms meet a mountain of gyrating sound. (P)

DAVE KANE

Clarkness Remixes (Plastic Fantastic)

This Plastic Fantastic bargain bin discovery by Lee Burridge has been remixed by the superstars of progressive house Slacker, who take that moody Euro synth ride and beef it up into one of the best records around at the moment. Correlian & Burridge give it a similar driving feel with rockin' rollin' beats and clever use of the breakdown. (P)

OUR HOUSE

Soliton Wave (Global) This Aussie outfit - who previously released material with Oakenfold's mighty Perfecto - consists of Sean Quinn and Kasey Taylor, the biggest DJs down under. 'Solitan Wave' has all you would expect solid bottom end, a whole array of wonderful, mind bending atmospherics and acidic warblings. Full but not full on and no elongated breaks - a winner! (P)

KYBOSH

Playing With My Mind (Baroque)

The pioneers of the UK take on Tenaglia's NY Twilo sound have once again released a belter of a track. It's all about the drive, the groove, bass-heavy tribal rhythms and electric percussion. Excitement comes from an array of menacing spoken vocals scattered throughout the mix. Sleepfreaks provide the remix. (P)

New York Sessions (Euphoria, USA)

Recorded in New York, influenced by London and pressed in Chicago. Euphoria has to rate as one of America's most individually minded labels and better still, this is one of their best releases so far. Just check the mad, cascading rhythms and fantastically squelchy acid lines on 'Smurfette's Big Night' and you'll see what we mean. Viva acid house. (DIVI)

TREVOR ROCKLIFFE 2001 Jack (Mentor)

The second release on Trevor Rockliffe's Mentor label and boy is it a good one. '2001 Jack' is very much in keeping with the style Rockliffe introduced with his 'Visions. . .' single - fast, percussive and full of beans. The flipside meanwhile (made in conjunction with Mr G) is a kickheavy tech-houser with a funky keyboard pattern and loads of attitude. (DM)

MARINO BERADI

Untitled Loops (MB, Holland) Beradi's 'Can't Stop the Groove' single was a big favourite with DJs like Mr C and Darren Emerson and even though this isn't quite as strong, it's still a good, solid mixing tool. The rhythm sounds like a cross between Halo Varga and 16B, but what makes this stand out is the spooky, old school keyboard hook that rises up gently in the mix. (DIVI)

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Native Sampler 3 (Native) Native is one of Ben Sims' labels, but don't expect any fierce tribal loops because this four-tracker is all about the deeper, more soulful side of techno. Broom and Hill's string-led track is particularly good, while Nuron's new version of the pathos-laden, deeply introspective 'Electric Arc' is nothing short of brilliant. (DIM)

TRANSITIONS

Gaining Ground (Immersed) More deep, backroom techno vibes from Edinburgh's Immersed. As usual the beats are gentle, intricate and funky, the sounds are lush and the arrangements tailor-made for long, smooth mixes. Another great record from a label that's pioneering its own, very original style. (DM)

SLS

New Soil (SLS)

After laying his successful Cycle label to rest, Samuel L Sessions is back with the first fruit from his new imprint. Stylistically, it's pretty much business as usual, although the use of Reese-style basslines and old school Transmat-esque hooks on a couple of the tracks does make for a pleasant change. (DMI)

KILLER LOOP

Organism (The End) Mr C and Layo with a track that originally appeared on The End's '100% Unreleased' compilation. Perhaps not as instant as the duo's 'Blue Hour' single (which is also included here in both original and remix form) 'Organism' is a dark, trippy affair that reflects the main room sound of The End club. (DIM)

RADIOACTIVE MAN

The Uranium EP (Rotters Golf Club)

Forward looking electro that actually works on the dancefloor isn't always that easy to find, which is why this - the third single on Andy Weatherall's new label is such a welcome release. A mad combination of techno sounds, 808 beats and housey hats, this really is some of the darkest, druggiest, most deranged electro in ages. (DM)

GIDEON & ROB H

Adrenalin (Wiggle) The lead track here is fairly typical of Gideon & Rob H's style - all snares and fat rolling bass - and as a club track it works well. The flipside though is the one to check. Underscored by a deep, dubby rhythm that's layered with dark swirls of chemical strings and detached vocal hooks, it perfectly captures that wonky, lost in the groove at 5am feeling. (DM)

ASCENDENCE

The Lost Track (Qube)

Weather it's tech-house, electro or deep proggy gear. Qube always keep the quality control high. This time round they've gone for a couple of tracks that combine Maurizio-style filtered effects and lush sounds with clean, crisp atmospherics and laid back, dub influenced grooves. (DM)

ANIMATED

Container No. 2 (Deviant) Worthwhile remix package that includes a rather pleasant breakbeat version of

'Container' by Greyhound's DJ Garth. The flipside, meanwhile, sees the Animated crew of Laurent Webb and Duncan Forbes deliver the sort of rolling, bass-heavy groove that's sure to drop on any tech-house floor. (DIM)

KLART

Pussy Shaver

(Rotters Golf Club)

Imagine Christopher Just's 'Disco Dancer' rinsed through the Razzle and Knave production mill. Yes, Mr Weatherall's new chairmanship is off to a thoroughly mischievous start as Klart set a stonking electro beat to Stephen Hawking's twisted vocoderisms espousing the virtues of keeping a trim quim. Naughtier than Sid James in a convent. (JS)

KARACHTER

Roots Of Highlife (Cosmic/ID)

A new Karachter hits the Bicknell/Rashit camp with industrial African rhythms, rolling percussion and a subtle touch that separates it from so many of today's hamfisted tub thumpers. An ideal tool for those who know how to mix strength with depth and a thoroughly essential purchase. (JS)

PERCY X

Maintain (Soma)

Dark, brooding and inescapably funky, Percy X has maintained a quality and depth throughout his productions that has made him Soma's best secret weapon when a full-on floor strike is required. Expect no prisoners here as Mr Bicknell gives it some cosmic welly with the superb Where's The Music?' stealing the show at the death. A big thumbs up. (JS)

RICHARD HINGE

The Return Of Freya (Disko B)

In a word: mental. Blowing circuitry at every turn, New York's Conrail playa gets unHinged with bad-ass electro and some downright scary shit on this killer floor thriller. Remember that the 'B' in Disko B stands for bombs. So beware. (JS)





SONIC SUM

Himbro St (Ozone, USA) Although this single is ostensibly to promote last year's excellent 'Sanity Annex' album (to be re-released in April), it's the bonus track, 'Paste' which demonstrates why more than one label is chasing Rob Smith and crew and why this will be their breakthrough year. A fantastically driving punk bassline is anchored by shuffling drums and the echoes of keyboard phrases, while Smith manages to be abstract and heartfelt without it even seeming like an effort. Pure excellence.

This is fine – a solid piece of reasonably funky hip hop featuring (surprise surprise) Rasco. But is it going to inspire anyone? Not 'ere..

SAUL WILLIAMS

Penny For A Thought (Ozone/American, USA)

With his album finally set for release in the UK (via Talkin' Loud), the people at last get a chance to buy some of the new material rather than just hearing it on the rado. It's almost exactly what you'd expect: conscious, written-in-stone lyrics combined with a great splash of overlaid musical styles. Black rock as much as hip hop, it's a powerful package.

JEHST

The High Plains Drifter (Lowlife)

Jehst shifts over to Lowlife for this selfproduced, self-featuring EP. And it's a thoroughly accomplished package – Jehst the producer combining an array of jazz samples with harsh cuts and rock solid beats. Lyrically, he's sounding more Landan than before, but you can't argue with his range of ideas or flow.

JUNIOR DISPROL

Fight Club (Samefamilydifferentballbag) Junior Disprol (last heard of here destroying monsters on Hombre) returns with new Fleapit partner Secondson and shows a tenuous grip on reality, but a steel fist grasp of what makes an awesome, nasty nasty hip hop tune. Very funny, and while his guests on 'Junq Waffle' all come good, Junior can do it all on his own. Watch for the Fleapit material soon. . .

DADDY JAES

Live From The Cranium Stadium (Mofu)

Featuring some of the artists who recently impressed on the Café Recordings sampler, Daddy Jaes combines beats that can run from the semi-conventional ('Frequencies') to the positively unhinged. It's all quality, but the highlight comes with the latter – Me-God telling us about his 'Suit Made Of Food' – bonkers but bnilliant.

THE PRUNES

Blow Up Factor (Grand Royal) Yeah, yeah, yeah, every fin-haircutted, square-glasses-wearing hepster's favourite Danes are back on another painfully trendy, underperforming label. Guest US MC, Freestyle (of the Arsonists), sounds on good enough form (despite a chorus that makes you wince

The Ultramagnetic veteran Moe Love returns to the fray with MCs the Slaughterhouse Cartel. 'Talk Of The Town' quickly establishes that while the rhyming may not be exactly pushing the envelope, Moe Love still has a talent for a sparse, bass-heavy beat. Good to have him back.

LARGE PROFESSOR

Blaze Rhymez (Matador) Extra P continues his Matadormasterminded rehabilitation with a slightly pedestrian-sounding tune. The beat doesn't do a whole heap and the Professor isn't dropping a lot in the way of science. However, standards are maybe higher for him than for others and this isn't bad.



Move It (Superrappin')

Madlib and his cohorts are currently coming up with some of the laziest, most heavy-lidded styles in hip hop and Declaime is the most screwed of the lot (and yes, that includes Quasimoto). Just what you'd expect, then – opium-jazz samples and a whole load of stinky talk.

BEATS IN PROGRESS

Crumpet Chase (Breakin' Bread) In which the South London club gives another group of hip hop producers the chance to put out something a little faster than 95 bpms for their ultra lo-fi seven-inch series. B.I.P. deliver a funky number on side one and a right DJ carry-on on the flip. Pants and pants without being pants.

ALBUMS

DJ HASEBE

Hey World (WEA, Japan) Featuring everyone from Mos Def to Beenie Man, Doug E Fresh to Omar, this is one of those records which shows Japanese producers' skill at combining pure pop with some eccentric stylings. Not strictly speaking a hip hop record, but Mos' appearance is one of the best he's made for some time. Interesting...

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Landspeed Underground Hip Hop Sampler (Landspeed) It couldn't be clearer, really – a double CD, 36-track epic taking us through much of what Landspeed (currently holding a similar position in underground circles to Fat Beats a few years back) is releasing and distributing. It's a huge, unwieldy and slightly exhausting comp with enough good moments to convince you they're on to something.

J RAWLS

The Essence Of J Rawls (Superappin')

Ohio producer J Rawls is indelibly linked with the new jazzy sound that has captured the mainstream of the underground, but here on his album he not only comes through with a series of fine, fine beats, but throws in a couple of guests you might not expect (Dose One? Saxophonist Charles Cooper?) and generally charges it up enough that you don't feel drowned in good taste.

ACEYALONE

Accepted Eclectic (Project Blowed/Ground Control/Nu Gruv, USA)

He's back and, as ever, dropping the classiest lyrics around over some fantastic backdrops. How underrated is this man? Intelligent, soulful, funny, moving – he can do them all, utilising an awesome technique to make genuinely brilliant music. Go and buy it, get his other solo stuff and all Freestyle Fellowship material. Your life will be richer for it.

M-BOOGIE

Laid In Full Chapter 2 (III Boogie/Superrappin')

M-Boogie returns with the second volume of his beats-and-rhymers series. While the beats here are above criticism – funky, harsh, out-of-the-ordinary – there's a homogeneity to the lyricism which means it doesn't quite hit like the first record. Still, pretty good for the music alone.

QB'S FINEST Oochie Wally (Remix) (Columbia)

OB's Finest are a Nas-led Queens hip hop supergroup whose LP 'Queensbridge The Album' surfaced at the end of last year. This track was tucked away originally on the back of the first single 'Bridge 2001', leading many people to miss it. Now public demand sees this mix of lewd lyrics, Chinese beats and an infectious chorus get a welldeserved proper release. An essential tune.

Dance With Me (Bad Boy) With legal problems apparently preventing In Essence from officially releasing their Mobb Deep 'Quiet Storm'-sampling street r&b cut 'You Will Never Find', Bad Boy's premier boy band sneak in with a song built around a 'Quiet Storm'-style backing track. Okay as far as it goes, but not a touch on In Essence or 112's previous hits.

CARL THOMAS FEATURING HOODRATZ

Emotional (Remix) (Bad Boy) Yet another strong single and remix from Carl Thomas seems to suggest that Bad Boy Records are genuinely back on track. Completely stripped down and, thanks to the Hoodratz, almost sounding more like a hip hop tune than an r&b track, this is one of this month's essential purchases.

TOYA I Do (Arista)

Ex-original Destiny's Child member La Toya drops the 'La' and resurfaces with a solo deal. Her debut solo single is a solid effort and might be a grower but probably won't be causing her former colleagues too many sleepless nights.

EVE

Who's That Girl (Ruff Ryders/Interscope) Ruff Ryders' first lady returns for her second album with this single. A Latin sounding affair with some tasty horns, it's a nice piece of work and thankfully nothing to do with the Madonna song of the same name. Worth a purchase.

USHER

U Turn (LaFace)

The follow up to the massive 'Pop Ya Collar' with another Shek'spere production which – to these ears – sounds like the more immediate hit of the two. Usher takes us through a catalogue of previous dance crazes before arriving at his own, newly invented dance, the 'U Turn'. Another Top 10, no doubt.

INDIA ARIE

Acoustic Soul (Motown) A much sought after four-track sampler from a new US singer/songwriter/ guitarist who looks set to be this year's Jill Scott or Lauryn Hill. 'Video' is the tune that's picking up most play and urges the sisters not to do themselves up like video fodder. 'Brown Skin' is very Lauryn Hill-like but is a quality track as well. Expect the album any day now.

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Typhoid Rydim (white label) The charmingly named popular ragga rhythm called 'The Typhoid' works as a musical bed for six r&b to reggae

BILAL

THERE'S A serious dichotomy about Bilal Oliver. Chatting casually, he comes across as shy, reflective and thoughtful. But get him in front of a mic, and he transforms into a flamboyant sonic hurricane, as evidenced by his recent appearance at Guru's Jazzmatazz show at London's Forum.

The 22 year-old from Philadelphia is a classically trained singer/songwriter, and is already moving in the right circles. His vocals have appeared on Common's 'Sixth Sense' and Guru's 'Certified', while his own first single, 'Soul Sista', appeared on the 'Love And Basketball' soundtrack.

Bilal's music blurs the lines between r&b and hip hop, and draws clear inspirations from the world of jazz.

"A lot of my musical ideas are shaped by the exposure I've had to the jazz," he explains. "I especially dig Miles Davis. I'm not setting out to break down musical boundaries, but if I can play my part by just doing what I do, then that's cool." '1st Born Second',

his debut album, is now released.

"I used that title because nothing else was working. It's saying I'm the first born child of my family, and this is the second coming of the soul movement. And that's it!" (MD)

Real Slim Shady (Bootleg Mixes) (white label)

Some very poor mixes of Eminem over backings from the likes of Janet Jackson, DMX and even Britney Spears are saved by the inclusion of Christina Aguilera's answer to young Marshall using his backing track. Previously only available as an MP3, Christina scores more than a couple of direct hits as she urges the Real Slim Shady to "please shut up".

SHAGGY

It Wasn't Me (Universal) By the time you're reading this, this record will no doubt be everywhere. Shaggy turns out yet another one of his hip hop/reggae crossover monsters with irresistibly comic lyrics. Now just sit back and wait for all the reply records.

DJ RUNNIN' TINGS

Various Volume 10 (white label) This bootleg mix series has been running for years now and reaches volume 10 with six unofficial mixes of tracks from the likes of Shaggy, QB's Finest, Next, Outkast and Pru. The best on offer are Shaggy's 'It Wasn't Me' over the backing track for JA Rule's 'Every Little Thing', plus QB's Finest's 'Bridge 2001' run over Mobb Deep's 'Quiet Storm' and 'Shook Ones Part 2'.

JT MONEY

Hi Low (Freeworld/Priority) JT Money enjoyed a huge street level hit last year with 'Who Dat?'. He returns with a new album from which this is the first single. Sticking with a winning formula, 'Hi Low' is a blend of twittering southern beats and gruff chanting. Not as immediate as its predecessor, but still strong dancefloor fodder.

KORRUPT FEATURING NATE DOGG

Behind The Walls (Aviatar)

PHAROAHE MONCHE What Is The Law? (Aviatar)

Taken from the soundtrack for the cult US prison TV drama Oz, these two tracks are about the joys of the US penal system. Of the two, Korrupt's driving, bass-heavy 'Behind The Walls' is the better, with Nate Dogg's laconic rhymes continuing his rehabilitation to hip hop's premier league.

COMMON

Unreleased Shit (white label) Two nameless outtakes from Common's recent album grace each side of this American bootleg. The stronger is a piano sample-led track, which sounds like it's produced by Premier. Something for fans and completists.

JILL SCOTT

Long Walk (Epic)

One of the best tracks from the Britnominated Jill Scott album is a vehicle for the UK's Dodge to build on his excellent Al Jarreau mis from last year. Aided and abetted by a Jay Z style rapper, Dodge offers both uptempo and downtempo mixes. Good work.

ALBUM

THE TRANSITIONS

Back In The Days (Biv 10/Universal)

If you like Jaheim's vocal style then you need to get a copy of this excellent debut album from new male vocal trio The Transitions. Available at present on a much sought after (and expensive) vinyl promo, this is that rarest of commodities: a strong album all the way through. As the title suggests, there's a slight retro feel but overall, this is true gritty, modern day soul. Highly recommended.





TERRY CALLIER Alive (Mr Bongo)

Cast your mind back to 1998 and London's Jazz Café. It's so quiet you can hear a pin drop and there's a single spotlight on a humble genicus playing his guitar, giving a simple message of peace and joy, and reaching every heart and soul that fills the place. Well imagine no more, as every ounce of his pure emotion is included here for us all to enjoy. Oh yes my friends, it doesn't get any better than this.

The reworks are okay compared with the attractive original, but FLC know how the story goes and respect is due on both sides. Cool, extremely cool!

MUSIQ SOULCHILD

Girl Next Door (MCA Universal) The man of the moment gives us another insight into his soulful life and – as with his acclaimed long player 'Ajuswanaseing' – this deserves massive needle-time. It's so good to see some young guns respecting what's gone before and getting back to basics, producing meaningful songs full of inspiration and life. For once in your life you had better believe the hype.

COURTNEY PINE & KELE LE ROC

Love And Affection (Universal) Almost a straight cover of Joan Armatrading's pop ballad from yesteryear, but with a sting in its tail. Gorgeous arrangements, smooth as silk and a vocal

that warms you from the inside. Courtney really has created a great soulful vibe full of pure love and affection.

CARL HANCOCK RUX

Lamentations (You, Son) (Giant Step)

This is a really moody offering from New York's Step: spaced out vocals over a stripped back beat and an infectious Ron Trent production that takes you somewhere you want to go. This is how soulful American dance music should be; faultless and so damn good. Deep and then some.

AL JARREAU

In My Music (GRP)

The unsung, almost forgotten soul jazz vocalist from the Seventies, whose velvet tones were the order of the day at Caister Soul Weekenders, makes an extremely welcome return to our dance floors. Pulled from his 'Tomorrow Today' maxi, this is vintage Jarreau with some subtle nu-age funk thrown in for fun.

ALBUMS

RAE & CHRISTIAN

Sleepwalking (Studio !K7) This Manchester-based outfit have been flying the flag for quality black music when all around them seem to fall. The rhymes and rhythms are raw, and ruff 'n' ready, while the street cred guests and friends add those all-important, inspiring ingredients. The real deal for those with open minds and not for the faint-hearted.



BACK TO BLACK

MORGAN KHAN ON COLLATING A CENTURY OF BLACK MUSIC

CREATING an audio chronicle of every major trend in black music since 1900 is no easy feat. But veteran 'Street Sounds' compiler Morgan Khan has done it. 'Back To Black', a two-years-inthe-making, 10-CD, 220-track box set, is finally ready for release.

The set is arranged in chronological subdivisions, starting with the ragtime jazz of the Scott Joplin era, and progressing through early rhythm 'n' blues, rock 'n' roll, Motown, funk and disco, finally arriving at the likes of Blackstreet and Mary J Blige. Needless to say, compiling the series was a mammoth admin task, as Morgan explains.

"We had to get everything onto 10 CDs, which is about as many as you can expect the average enthusiast to buy, before things start getting unwieldy. We also had a few licensing problems, from Jimi Hendrix and Bob Marley's labels, for instance. You cannot have a black music collection without those two, and I resolved to scrap the whole project if I couldn't get over this! In the end, I approached the estates of both artists personally, and they were only too happy to offer their cooperation." (MD)

DAVID AXELROD

Axelrod Chronicles (Fantasy) A true hero to lovers of the eclectic side of jazz, and although he emanates from America's west coast, he has a southerm feel to his beats that fingers his spiritual home as Louisiana or Mississippi. This has all the funk and feel of a premier division musician. Please do not pass on this: you need these grooves. Oh yes, yes, yes!

VARIOUS ARTISTS

As the title suggests this collection of 'must have' goodies pays homage to the black side of tracks that were put down around the mid Sixties to early Seventies. These are raw beats and pieces, extremely poignant and worth it just for Yusef Lateet's bluesy take on 'See Line Woman'. Made for those who like their music darker than blue.

BIG BOSS MAN

Humanize (Blowup) Solid ebony sounds that merge Latin, funk, rhythm & blues and soul. Aiready gaining fans from a recent appearance with The James Taylor Quartet, this Newbury-based outfit are quickly becoming the dons of the underground with their Hammond-fuelled licks. The beats are a little on the refro side, but still seem tailor-made for 21st century groovers.

SHUGGIE OTIS

Inspiration Information (Luaka Bop)

Rarer than hen's teeth, this has been a well kept secret to those in the know since it first saw a turntable back in 1974. If you can find an original vinyl copy, you are looking at a tidy sum of money. But now, at last we can all savour this piece of real vintage gold. Timeless, quality music.

MORENO VELOSO

Music Typewriter (Hannibal) This young Brazilian head has the magic gift of making beautiful, haunting rhythms that leave a permanent buzz in your head and bring that feeling of well-being out into the open. Simple, enduring music that's so good for your heart and your soul, you will press 'repeat' time and time again.

BLAZE

Natural (Lifeline)

Oh yes! This has been a long time coming my brothers and sisters, but phew! The wait has definitely been worth it. A complete collection of all things soulful and more is included in these rine songs. The harmonies are outrageous and the words tell the truth, yet at the end of the day it sounds so easy and so uplifting. One to be appreciated for many years to come.

VARIOUS ARTISTS

The In Crowd (Castle Music) Last year Mike Ritson and Stuart Russell delivered the definitive written word on the Northem Soul scene with 'The In Crowd'. Now, this double CD collection of the tracks that fuelled the floors and still keep the flame alive provides a sonic counterpart. Pure unadulterated black soul, and you need this, believe me.

LAMONT DOZIER

Peddlin' Music On The Side/ Right There (Castle Music)

Now his Columbia and ABC catalogues have been raided, it's now time for the man's Warner Brothers output to resurface. This duo are both great moments in the history of soul. The original 'Going Back To My Roots' is included here in all its nine minutes and 45-second glory and is not to be ignored at any cost. A truly gifted genius at last gets his recognition.

FLORA PURIM

Perpetual Emotion (Naradajazz)

A perennial favourite among the 'heads' at London's Ronnie Scott's, and the lady's Milestone vibes are still causing musical madness on the world's most discerning dancefloors. Here she is some 25 years on, still making it happen and keeping the dream alive with faultless vocals and lyrics that definitely hit the spot.

JAZZTRONIK

Inner Flight (Counterpoint) Big, big respect to the Counterpoint crew for putting their hard earned cash into this eclectic offering from Tokyo. A superb album – future jazz? But of course; no problem at all.

The Certificate 18 label boss has been running Chew The Fat, the finest – dammit the only – weekly breakbeat night in the country and 'Crisis' sums it all up. Thunderous beats, a strong hip hop break and a late night trancey vibe make this the biggest record in my box for months.

ARTIST UNKNOWN Bebop (white label)

There's no doubt that the cheeky bootleg is here to stay, not least because the best of them end up becoming legal smashes. 'Hip Hop Bebop', Doc Scott strings and kung fu samples make up this breakbeat stepper, ensuing it will find favour from Beatfreaks to Bugged Outl. Yes.

MEAT KATIE

Work Your Body (Kingsize)

Mark Pember digs out his Zapp records and gets up to get down. Strange that after the effortless funk brilliance of 'Rotten.Com' when he wasn't trying, the overtly funk-influenced 'Work Your Body' seems flat-footed in comparison. The Marvin Beaver-assisted 'Dirty South' fares much better.

BACKDRAFT

Backdraft EP (Botchit Breaks) Debut single from Paul Chadwick and Lisa Price on Botchit & Scarper's dancefloor nephew sees them revisit their drum & bass past at 130bpm. The best track, 'Manic', is atmospheric, broody electronic breaks, with 'The Reckoning' and 'Demons' heading for the middle of the night with electro and hardcore influences in tow.

LYRICISTS LOUNGE

Oh No (DJ Hype Remix) (white label) Whatever next? Our junglist friend is getting a taste for the midtempo dancefloor and its dollar. And why not, if record companies are going to continue to fan him with fifties. Chunky beats culled from his d&b spares pile and a speeded up Nate Dogg vocal will work stunningly as an occasional party trick. Just the once, mind.

DOUBLE 99

Freakazoid (Satellite) Oh lookee here. Another 138 re-rub by DJ Hype. It's got time-stretched vocals, some severe low end theory and hardcore style drums as well. Cool, huh? Once is naughty. The same tricks twice is criminal. Will be huge.

VARIOUS ARTISTS TCR 50 (TCR)

The first sampler from the excellent compilation from the breakbeat scene's leading label. Many styles, vibes and ideas from the breakbeat spectrum kick off with rising talents Vigi & Flip and the acid funk of Silicon Valley Def Stars.

SHUT UP AND DANCE

The breakbeat garage crossover seems to suit SUAD to a tee – those sick basslines and steppa beats have found them shifting

Vigi & Flip – 'Subsonic' "A monster that destroyed Friction's Xmas party at The End."

Koma & Bones – 'Morpheus' "There is only one word to describe this

PLANET FUNK

Chase The Sun (Adam Freeland Remix) (white label) Fans of the blond boy wonder will lap this up, and house herces afraid to break may convert. With the help of engineer Mark Woolford, Planet Funk are subverted into an 11-minute feast of half time beats, dusky bass and Fabric atmospherics. Yes, and yes again.

9 STYLES

First From (Sacred)

Another release of repute from Sacred in the shape of Luke Gordon and Max Moore, who record as Spacer for the Pussyfoot label. Their first 12-inch of interest to this page is a metallic, percussive, laid back, shuffling slice of electronic breaks for the head or the headstrong.

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Electric Kingdom Volume 2 (Electric Kingdom)

Part two of three in Wayward Soul's breakbeat odyssey sees Si Begg don his Buckfunk 3000 disguise for twisted electro pressure bound to find favour from Weatherall downwards. Better still is Override's ace 'Machines Do The Work' with its Psycho strings, electro breakbeat shuffle and Kraftwerk vocal.

GROOVY ONION

Memphis Funk (Carbon)

Carbon released one of the best records of last year, with the Lee Coombs remix of Thrust 2. Now they're back with some southern fried funk breaks that are tougher than the artist name suggests. Seek out and be surprised.

ANIMATED

Container 2 Remixes (Deviant) Duncan Forbes' project returns with a rather fantastic remix from man of the moment DJ Garth, the Greyhound Records boss from San Francisco. Eschewing the 4/4 for seven minutes, this is Klute-style dubbed out breaks bliss well worth investigating.

MEKON

The Mekon Revue (Phat Jam) Beat science from, or remixed by, John Gosling, and all wrapped up in polythene like an American import as well. Cool. Paul Mersonary sends Deckwrecka undercover for a mid tempo hip hop head nod, but best of all is the Mekon electro remix of Beatheads' 'Easy Love'. A very nice surprise.

RADIOACTIVE MAN

The Uranium EP (Rotters Golf Club)

From the ashes of the excellent Emissions Audio Output rises Rotters Golf Club, the new off-kilter outlet for the Andrew Weatherall and friends. 'The Uranium EP', the third release, sees long time collaborator and technical genius Keith Tenniswood explore his electro passion over four tracks, the standout vibe being the title cut. Collectors get ready.

STABILISER

People Come Up (FUNctional Breaks)

More breakbeats of a progressive hue from the south west, with Stabiliser getting into a groove and exhorting da people to do the same. Phantom Beats chill more than usual and the remix is the better for it, while Spoon Wizard adds to his reputation on the flip.

ALBUM

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Remember them? Car enthusiasts and the great while hopes for the breakbeat scene? Thought they'd disappeared up an exhaust pipe? Not so. Dave Tipper and his men are back with the same sonic sorcery in tow. Buckfunk 3000 and Andrea Parker join the melée, alongside new artists Cold Fusion Mafia and Phoenecia for more bass-heavy, metallic, scientific soundscapes. Watch this space.

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THE BIG BOSSA

Catford Classics Volume 1 (Viktor)

It takes a lot for something to remind you of summer in the middle of a dreary English winter. But this record certainly does it. All the tracks have a rhythmic, bossa feel complete with snippets of Brazilian vocals and carnival style percussion. An impressive debut and something you'll be hearing a lot of in the next few months. (PM)

BENT

Swollen (Sport)

The Bent boys take what most people consider to be the best track from their album 'Programmed To Love' and come on with a very strong remix package. There's a supremely dreamy and soft interpretation from Dusted for the sunset crew and some lovely mellow house business from François K. A hit. (CC)

BANZAI REPUBLIC

In My Home (Music For Dreams, Denmark)

This is the first single release from what looks like being an inspirational chill out label. Banzai Republic create a deceptively simple groove overlaid with sparse, unintelligible vocals, a bit like a trippier version of Nightmares On Wax. Whatever, it's a real grower that you will learn to cherish. (CC)

MARCOS VALLE

Para De Fazer Besteira (Farsoul Recordings)

Marcos Valle is a legendary Brazilian composer who has been working for over three decades. His writing credits include the classic 'Summer Samba' Here he collides head-on with the UK's own 4 Hero who create a 21st century bossa nova masterpiece out of a tune from his forthcoming new album. This is the sound of the summer. (CC)

EPB VS UNFORSCENE Bang Bang You're Dead (City Slang)

Experimental Pop Band get taken apart by Bristol's own cinematic chillers Unforscene. This isn't the most friendly tune (check the title), but it does have enough attitude and atmosphere to make it onto this page. On the flip is a crazy drum & bass mix from the excellent Fauna Flash. (CC)

CALEXICO

Crystal Frontier (City Slang) Skip the Mexican madness of the first track and check the rest. This is a fascinating package including an affecting acoustic version and an extremely bouncy Buscemi instrumental remix of 'Crystal Frontier'. Plus a moody little country number called 'Chanel No 5' and an (inevitably) experimental Two Lone Swordsmen remix of 'Untitled 3'. (CC)

ALEX KID

What I Did On My Holidays (white label)

An excellent release which has a Fela Kuti meets Dub Tribe feel. 'Arbore (Part 1)' is a laidback Afro groove featuring jazzy Rhodes, percussion and spacey effects. 'Arbore Part 2' has a meandering sax solo over a more housey beat, but ultimately it's 'Part 1' which has more dancefloor appeal. (PM)

Who are Snooze? "My first single was called 'The Spy from Ankara'. I imagine that Snooze is a special agent working for radio alarm clocks." Why is your new album called 'Going Mobile'? "I like the idea of movement. I try to be anti-static!" You have a lot of collaborators but no regular band. Is Snooze a collective? "I've always worked alone. The Optimist (Source) Turin Brakes are definitely indie chill. The duo make delicate, acoustic, sad songs about modern life. On this album they have kept the production simple, adding a few extra layers of music but keeping the innocence and precise, clean beauty of their sound intact. Slide one of their tunes in between Calm, Bent and Brian Eno and you will feel the connections. Top tracks for chill-heads are 'Feeling Oblivion', 'Future Boy' and 'Starship'. Compost Community (Compost)

Here's a great way to catch up on some of those Compost releases you've missed and pick up a few unreleased gems at the same time. Standout tracks on this latest compilation from the jazzy, beaty German label are Fauna Flash's 'Mother Nature': the classic Swag vocal mix of Beanfield's 'The Season' and the very mellow 'Procreation' from Citizen. Also included on this varied selection are tracks from Voom: Voom, Trüby Trio and Minus 8. (CC)

The Standard - Room Service (Sweet Mother Recordings) A compilation album celebrating the

This new album doesn't break down any musical barriers but it does contain some very cool tracks. Favourites include the slightly quirky, reggae-influenced 'Planet Tears' and the more experimental 'Tokyo 2'. (CC)

FILA BRAZILLIA

Another Late Night (Azuli) This is the first in a new series of artistmixes-up-fave-chill-tracks compilations from the home of house, Azuli Records. As you might expect, Fila Brazillia certainly do mix up the styles. The set starts with the theme from The Persuaders TV show then slips nicely into the slightly wacky 'Firefly' from Homelife. Mr Scruff's classic 'Get A Move On' is in there as are tunes from The Beta Band, Brian Eno, David Holmes and Nightmares On Wax. Also included (and available on a limited seveninch with a short story on the flip) is Fila Brazillia's cover of the Nat King Cole standard 'Nature Boy'. Each of the albums in this series will include a cover by the artist/mixer. Overall it's eclectic, interesting and very well put together. (CC)

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Blueprints Volume One (Slip 'N' Slide)

A complication of contemporary jazziness featuring the likes of Laurent Gamier and Beanfield. The standout tracks are the excellent 'Music Box' by Native Force which has a trippy, Ibizan feel to Jazzanova Versus Har-You Percussion Group's 'Welcome To The Party', an elongated, spaced out jazz classic. (PM)









VARIOUS ARTISTS Plastic Surgery 2 (Hospital)

The 'soulful' side of jungle goes from strength to strength. This is a fine compilation by any standards, featuring Carlito & Addiction, Total Science and London Elektricity, but it's a pair of tracks from lesserknown outfits that make it essential. The jewel in the crown is High Contrast's warmly rolling 'Suddenly', a sublime piece of 21st century disco that improves with every listen. And how to describe Kalm & Citizen's 'Venus'? Fusing taut scissor-breaks and weirdly articulate bleeps, it tells you more about the shining goddess than whole libraries of learned texts. The rites of spring start here.

SINGLES

TWISTED ANGER Dread Come To Conquer EP

(Dread) With an array of sounds that seem to have been fashioned from razor-wire, industrial waste and the light from long-dead stars, Twisted Anger's output is about as far from feelgood as it gets. The maraudingdread bravura of the tille track aside, most of this stuff's like placing your ear next to the throbbing nerve centre of a Siberian salt mine. And that's not nice.

DYLAN & LOXY Evolution (Cylon)

Third release from Loxy's promising new label. The title track, a shrill piece of Total Science/Phantom Audio-style hardcore, lays that old 'hear the drummer get wicked'' sample over metallic bass stabs and a blink-and-you'll-miss-it break. Flipside 'The Temple (Of Doom)' is distinguished by a thunderous bass drop and a break with the bristling energy of a plague of killer ants.

SAPPO

What I Need (Emotif) A dense miasma of moaning bass, vaporous ghost-tones and ecstatically chattering drums, 'What I Need' is modern hardcore at its best. You can see why Grooverider loves it – like a noxious gas-leak from the infernal regions, it envelops you in a pall of quivering malevolence. 'Smokescreen' is almost as good, its tight-but-warm breaks peppered with some classical-sounding loops.

TEEBEE

Deceive (Subtitles) More overtly hardcore than most of his output, Teebee's latest almost trumps Total Science for Dionysian abandon and sheer velocity. Flipside 'Meet Your Maker', as doom-laden as your average 'dark' track but with a characteristically agile break, keeps all the drama more under wraps.

The shadowy sounds that Teebee uses

DIGITAL

Warped (Function)

are, as ever, second to none.

Sounds like the walls are closing in on Digital. 'Warped' is possibly the gloomiest piece of nu-skool hardcore to have come this way so far, scared shitless but still unable to rouse itself from a catatonic torpor. The considerably more upbeat 'Squad 51' is like viewing a rainforest through a crystal, a cubistic frenzy of tropical chatter and fragmented snarls. Don't mix with anything stronger than milk.

THE OUTFIT

Cold Crush (Frontline) The Outfit's second showing on Frontline mixes the future-disco strings of artists like Carlito with clumsy bassstabs and infectiously restless

CO-FOUNDERS TEEBEE AND K SPELL IT OUT

WHAT'S the philosophy behind the label? "Subtitles will always be about approaching drum & bass from a different angle, pushing the boundaries a little bit further. We also want to try to bring up fairly unknown but wicked talents. The scene needs some new blood. We've already got Future Prophecies from Norway and AngelZero and DJ Abstract from California in our stable." How would you describe the Subtitles sound? "On a long-term basis we don't really want to have a distinct Subtitles sound, but we'll always focus on good quality production. We want to give people a little bit more than machine-gun beats and tractor bass. We aim for the head." How has drum & bass

evolved in the last couple of years? "Drum & bass has definitely

grown a lot recently: we see more people trying to do their own thing rather than jump on someone else's. We've got wicked artists like Marcus Intalex, Total Science, Digital & Spirit and Klute who all have their very own sound but still get played out." What's in the pipeline? "We're just gonna push the sound further, do our own thing. We're both also very busy with other projects on the side, so we're always on the lookout for fresh talent to join the Subtitles empire."

percussion. 'The Jackpot' over on the other side makes use of the same nimble/heavy contrast, with scuttling drums running rings around lumbering dollops of bass. Another good release from this consistently interesting label.

LEMON D

B Boyz Revenge (R&S) It seems that R&S (who courted artists like Wax Doctor back when drum & bass featured in Sunday supplements) are getting the jungle bug again. Lemon D returns with a jittery piece of arts-in-yourpants funk, Hype doing his scratching ting over the fluttering percussive web. Why?' is a more typical fusion of smarmy strings and monumentally brutal beats that sounds like, er, Godzilla at the Paradise Garage.

TECH LEVEL 2

Tempest (Hardleaders)

More intricate and organic-sounding than your average slab of tech-step, 'Tempest' livens up the ubiquitous metallic snarls with some spectacularly nimble rhythms. And it's these that carry the track, conjuring images of frenzied voodoo priests or some multi-limbed Indian god armed with a drum kit. Turn to 'Lexicon' for some truly glacial breakbeat pressure.

DJ DAMAGE

Poltergeist (Spektrum Audio) Yet more theme music for interplanetary wars. 'Poltergeist' wafts deep space synths over a host of resolutely uncuddly sounds and that rattling Phantom Force break. 'The Dawn (The Future)' is similarly sombre but with sharper, more free-flowing drums. Big with Daleks.

BERT

Green Miles EP (Valve) Last heard (alongside schoolfriend Dillinja) on 1993's seismic 'Lionheart', Bert makes his comeback as the first guest artist on Lemon D and Dillinja's Valve imprint. Skip the solid but not overly exciting title track and head straight for 'Mix It', a thoroughly obnoxious example of jungle at its rawest. Equally impressive on the rumblin' front is the stripped-down malevolence of 'Doomsday'. The line between music and heavy artillery gets ever hazier.

LONDON ELEKTRICITY FEATURING ROBERT OWENS

My Dreams (Hospital)

The second track in recent months to feature the silken tones of Robert Owens – following on from his chilly Photek collaboration – has a similarly old skool feel in both vocals and production. What's best about 'My Dreams' is the contrast between Owens' restlessly versatile singing and the unwieldy bassline that underpins it. Turn to 'Dub My Dreams' for a taut and somewhat nervier mix.

SWIFT

The Resurrection EP (Charge)

Four deeply moody tracks from Swift. 'Trippin' is the most instantly likeable, a bewitching bleep riff (one you're sure to recognise) dancing over muscular beats and ominously droning bass. But don't let that blind you to the subterranean charms of 'Illusions' – featuring those long-neglected timestretched breaks, it's an awesomely tense piece of music that forces your attention onto the texture of the rhythms. Proper dark.

SPECIAL BRANCH

Dub Transmission EP (Penny Black)

Rub-a-dub jungle pressure of the most unreconstructed type, Special Branch's debut makes up in livid intensity what it lacks in innovation. 'Set Piece' and the tille track are grainy slices of speed-freak dub, replete with dancehall sound effects and indecipherable ragga chatter. 'Exhibit A' is more contained, a crisp hardcore cut reminiscent of the last Phantom Audio EP.

FUTURE PROPHECIES

Cosmic Energy (Subtitles) What marks 'Cosmic Energy' out from thousands of superficially similar tracks is the elusive breaks that skip and dart as if possessed. Label boss Teebee, as you might well guess, co-wrote and produced this one. Pick of the other two cuts is the painfully bleak 'Fatal Error', a svelte piece of tech-step that contrasts velvety thythms with wasteland-evoking atmospherics. This future's far from orange.





VARIOUS ARTISTS

Re: Kusaki (Angelika Koehlermann) This Austrian label, a wayward spin-off from the Cheap and Mego stables, has carved its own distinctive niche by releasing accessible and refreshingly nonformulaic electronica. Ostensibly a collection of remixes (of Japanese starlet Michiko Kusaki's 'Bye Bye Baby' album), this comp deserves Vital status for the mighty Atari of Bodenstandig 2000's re-rub alone, though Jo Ashito's self-explanatory 'Digital Haemorrhoid Mix', GD Luxxe's New Order tribute and DMX Krew's electro party beats are close contenders. If there's a downside, it's the dreary looping of Console or the increasingly irritating Chicks On Speed. But on the whole, even the alitch-meisters 'ao pop', and it suits them well. (TW)

the rarest slates by the least

the rarest slates by the least hard working man in showbiz

RIGHTLY HAILED as a techno legend,

Derrick May's lustre has never dimmed in the eyes of the purists – despite spending the Nineties putting out records about as frequently as pandas in captivity have it off.

May launched his Transmat imprint in 1986, initially as a subsidiary of Juan Atkins' Metroplex. The first release was a collaboration between May, Atkins, his brother Aaron and Kevin Saunderson called 'Let's Go' as X-Ray. Next up was May's first release as Rhythim Is Rhythim with 'Nude Photo', which had more of a futuristic techno feel than its predecessor and included 'The Dance' on the B-side.

But it was the next Rhythim Is Rhythim release – 1987's 'Strings Of Life', with its unmistakable piano riff – that would become a landmark track in the late Eighties rave era. 1988 brought us another Rhythim Is Rhythim classic with the sublime 'It Is What It Is', backed by 'Feel Surreal' and 'Beyond The Dance'.

1989 began with a collaboration called R Tyme with Darryl Wynn for the essential 'Illusion'/' R Theme' 12-inch on Transmat. Then 1990 saw the release of 'The Beginning', flipped with the impressive 'Drama' and 'Salsa Life'. Oddly enough, the latter twelve was poorly received by the critics and some say this is the reason for the lack of new May material in the Nineties. In 1992, the Belgian label Buzz released the Transmat compilation 'Relics', which included reworkings of Transmat classics, Carl Craig tracks on Fragile and exclusive early out-takes from May's personal archives. They also released a 12-inch with the ambient mix of 'Strings Of Life' which had previously appeared on Network's 'Emotions Electric' compilation.

1998 saw the release of 'Innovator' on R&S Records, a title previously given to a six-track EP on Network in 1991. The album contained tracks from 'Relics' alongside his standard classics and came as a five LP box set and double CD.

Though his remixes outside of Detroit have been few and far between, they have usually been top notch and well worth tracking down. His reworking of 'Sueno Latino' in 1992 has often been hailed as the finest techno remix ever, though equally worthy of your attention are mixes of De Lite's 'Wild Times' (Circa 12-inch 1989), Annette's 'Dream 17' (Deconstruction 12-inch 1989) and two A Guy Called Gerald tracks, 'FX' and 'Automanikk' (CBS, 1989 and 1990). More recently, he remixed Aztec Mystic's 'Knights of The Jaguar' on UR/430 West and rumour has it that there's new material on the way. But until it emerges, the May mystique remains intact. (PK)



THE BELOVED

Duried treasure the beloved 'X' (CastWest)

From the Balearic hush of 'The Sun Rising' to the sweet harmonies of, er, 'Sweet Harmony', The Beloved – groovy house spouses Jon and Helena Marsh – always pushed a positive message. But 'X' was different. Inspired by the burgeoning deep house sound, their third album forged a darker path. 'Missing You' was steeped in sorrow while 'Ease The Pressure' recalled New Order at their most majestic. It was too good to be true, of course. The public scratched their heads in confusion, 'Deliver Me' was senselessly pulled as a single and their record label cruelly waved them goodbye. But that's not the end of the story. Sister Bliss has covered the very same 'Deliver Me' with bearded folkster John Martyn. Five years down the line, 'X' still hits the spot. (RM)

NEW YORK CITY. It's President's Day and to celebrate, Carl Cox and Danny Tenaglia are going back-to-back at Twilo. But we're not there just yet. We're at GBH, where they're having their own little soirée with house legends Tony Humphries and DJ Disciple. Just down the road from the turbulent Twilo, it's world away from the heaving, hustling madness that goes with the two biggest names in dance.

It's also a lot better. With more of an underground feel and a menu of rocking US house, Centro Fly (also home to Morillo's Subliminal Sessions) greets the glamourous polysexual punter with Sixties decor while the staff flaunt bright orange mechanics' overalls with headtorches: strange but cool. Even better, the main room holds several hundred fabulous looking folk while the back room houses an ultra-cool crowd listening to S slick chick Penelope Tuesday.

Contrary to popular belief, when it comes to clubbing, New York is definitely not where it's at – particularly when us Brits are a decade ahead in the

game. Everywhere you go, it's the same. The door staff are rude, club employees extraordinarily unhelpful and aggressive bouncers the size of brick shithouses glare at eager punters desperate to get out of the cold. Clubs have always been more concerned with money than people's pleasure.

Until GBH that is. Three years ago Tom Dunkley, Alejandro Torio and Carl Kennedy, bored of the club scene, fed up of paying extortionate rates to get into an average night and finding only 'candy ravers' as companions, set up GBH (previously known as Great British House).

"We wanted to go to a decent house night," states co-promoter Tom Dunkley, "but there were only clubs that played hip hop and cheesy trance. And coming from Britain where the scene is so vibrant, we wanted to bring a little bit of that to New York".

And that's exactly what they did. With a fabulous American line-up and some great British touches like flamboyant dancers and lavish decor, Twilo may be rammed tonight but so is GBH. And while Twilo has the bigger line-up, there's still something missing. Whatever the secret of great clubbing is, the GBH boys are in on it. . . So what's the secret? They throw me a knowing look. "Well, we ain't telling!" (KY)

ONCE in a while a new club night comes along that turns its venue's history on its head. Turnmills – now nudging 15 years old, and home to all things boshing and progressive – is currently undergoing just such a reputation-fondling culture shock with London Calling.

Like Morillo's Subliminal Sessions, London Calling – a joint venture between The Gallery and Clockwork Orange – stands for quality US house, garage and filter disco. Which between you and us, is just what the city's been crying out for. Lottie, Paul Warren and Terry Farley have all answered the

call, eager to provide an alternative to the increasingly dominant tech-house phenomenon.

Full of chic young things, this ultra-bright night has more heat than a furnace full of foot and mouth-ridden livestock. Hosted by Danny Rampling, the brand new London bash has been causing monthly roadblocks all over Farringdon. And the end of the Subliminal Sessions at Ministry can only see the numbers swell further.

"The essence of the club is to revive quality house music on a Saturday night," says Rampers matter-of-factly. "It can be a bit wobbly in London!" As the instigator of infamous city shindigs like Shoom, Rampling knows a thing or two about quality, and he's pretty chuffed with his latest venture.

"It's progressing really well. We're getting a lot of DJs from America and Italy over, people like Ricky Montinari, Claudio Di Rocca and Ralf. I've always admired the Italians – they have so much style and energy," he says. "And it's such a pleasure to play for a crowd who come along for the music."

London Calling: well we were there too. And you know what he said? Well some of it was true. Well alright, all of it. **(KY)**

Disaster strikes at Jungle Magic as one punter is shot and another one's hands go all numb

A JUNGLE in Scotland, you say? Surely such natural phenomena only occur in hot climates and could never thrive in the chilly, some might say sub-zero, atmosphere of Edinburgh? Well, it just so happens that the necessary subtropical conditions are regularly recreated every month at The Venue, courtesy of one of the city's premier beat-breaking clubs. It's exotic, exciting and there's even a strain of wildlife that's there for one purpose and one purpose only: to give it up for guality drum & bass.

Since its inception in October 1998 as a sister club to the long-running Manga, Jungle Magic has acquired its own glowing reputation for serious atmosphere and topnotch sounds. In fact between them, the two clubs have the Scottish drum & bass scene firmly sewn up.

Adding a sprinkling of classics to an intoxicating brew of upfront cuts, residents Kid and Tania Swift are only too happy to give the crowd a thorough monthly workout, spinning anything and everything from Bristol rollers and darkside anthems to jazzy numbers and vocal floor-stormers. There's never a shortage of early birds willing to sweat it out from the moment the doors open, and by the time the guests arrive – the likes of Goldie, Hype, LTJ Bukem, DJ Rap and TeeBee have all had a crack at the decks – the main room typically turns into a sea of jacking bodies, drowning every available space with tops-off, hands-in-the-air abandon. Take the recent 'ladies night' for example. With an all-female line-up including Storm and Wildchild, the girls (and the boys) are as beat hungry as ever, getting tribal to some seriously unladylike grooves. The beats are as hard as nails, the bass bravely goes where no bass has gone before, and snippets of vocal echo through the speakers as the Jungle Magic crowd do what they do best – throw every ounce of energy into those 170bpm moves.

"Ug! What this?" Homo Jungulus is bemused to find a female of the species in his domain

That Edinburgh's d&b crowd know how to abandon themselves to musical debauchery is self-evident. And as long as the Jungle Magic and Manga crews keep bringing the party to the people, it'll stay that way. Just remember: it's a jungle in there. . .

SUPPORT acts offer certain opportunities. For the band themselves, there's the chance to expose new material to an unsuspecting audience and for the headlining act there's the option of either showing the largesse of patronage or publicly pissing on the competition. Tonight, it's the latter. With an onstage ensemble that resembles a half-empty flea market, Eric Truffaz are as messy in the flesh as they are in the groove. After enduring about three weeks of their freeform jazz noodle we head for the bar.

Needless to say, there are Frenchmen everywhere. They're on the underground, in the pit and flooding out the men's room. And there on stage is the biggest Gaul of them all - Ludovic Navarre, the jazz genius with a pony tail and a ready smile. Orchestrating proceedings from the back of the stage, the former 'funny melon farmer' sits behind a bank of computers in an attempt to out-techno that Roni Size stage show. He damn near pulls it off, too.

Highlighting the brightest moments from Saint Germain's most recent opus (the shockingly accomplished 'Tourism'), this is just about as good as live jazzdance is gonna get. The roar of applause that accompanies 'Rose Rouge' is a testament to the track's euphoric edge; that it effortlessly segues into Miles Davis' 'So What' is further proof of its timeless charm. On trumpet and sax, Pascal Ohse and Edouard Labor can barely hide their glee. Navarre looks on unabashed, of course, barely registering his accomplished band whose playing on licks like 'Latin Note' is damn near perfect. And when they resurrect 'Rose Rouge' for the encore, it's like Carnival all over again. Nice. (RM)

RIGHT, first things first. Let's drop all these Tricky and Orbital references - if there's one thing her 'Felt Mountain' debut proved last year, it's that Alison Goldfrapp's passionate, soul-melting voice had been restricted to cameos on other people's work for far too long.

But perhaps her burgeoning presence in the media spotlight isn't entirely to her liking either. When she delivers a venomous "fuck off" to the bevy of flash-happy photographers assembled at the foot of the stage during the pulsing, orchestral, punk rock scissor-kick of new single 'Human', it becomes obvious that she possesses a considerably feistier bite than even her most demonic songs might suggest. As tonight's venue is a converted church, such outbursts could even be considered tantamount to blasphemy. But it's such an ideal setting for Alison's opulent tones that it seems plausible that its Christian builders knew she'd be paying a visit one day.

At times she's a wailing banshee, luring the audience onto her craggy aural rocks, at others she's the Bond Girl next door - the booming Bassey incarnate. When the band returns for the first of two encores, Alison dons Olivia Newton John's plimsolls, scuffs them up and transforms the Grease star's 'Physical' from a coy come-hither number into a sleazy haze of man-hungry lust, so triumphant that you almost expect a shower of pyrotechnics every time she reaches the chorus.

Tonight, in the end, it seems Goldfrapp wants to be your baby, rather than Rosemary's. Devillishly good. (SM)

STUDIO EFFECTS & THE ART OF MIXING

six box





it's no coincidence that 'effects' have come to be used as an ideal introduction for DJs to the world of production. As dance music comes of age, we're running out of basic sounds. We're using 20 year-old synth and drum sounds and sampling sounds from records which by their very nature have already been used. Making sounds fresh and exciting is at the heart of electronic music. Our

need for tools for transforming sound has never been greater. Effects are our main tools for sonic alteration (although there are others). The range of effects on offer has not changed much in 20 years. We now also have a few computer/sampler based tricks like timestretching, much cleverer filters (analogue and digital) and a few esoteric software packages that do really weird shit but the four old favourite effects are still the mainstay of most studios: 1) 'Delay' – full on dubby echo tends to be avoided these days but listen carefully to synthesizers on trance records and you will hear that that complicated riff is often actually a very simple riff which has been fed through a rhythmic stereo echo. 2) 'Flangers'/'phasers' (aka modulation effects) – these are used on drums a lot. Listen out for the soft buzzing sounds that gently rise, fall and evolve as the beat goes on and you'll be hearing a main tool for adding interest to a repetitive hi hat/snare pattern.
3) 'Reverb' – makes things sound like they've been thrown down a well or are going through a long, dark tunnel.

4) 'Distortion' – adds grit. Use in large amounts for that speedcore effect, or in a more subtle and sparing manner. It's the one you don't always realise is going on – it adds solidity to thin things. Most of the machines we have here use all four of these at once

and are known as 'multi-effects processors'. To get an expert assessment, we flew to Belfast to team up with

two remarkably successful producers with a reputation for remixing: Chris Agnelli and Robbie Nelson. It turned out they like their effects either cheap 'n' cheerful or rather posh but not the ground between (they're buying the $\pounds1,199$ Lexicon MPX1 and the $\pounds1,585$ TC Electronic Fireworx multi-effects). As a result the debate was lively. . .

the revso is a very fine sounding 32 bit reverb which has halved in price since its release. Just at the moment it is an absolute bargain. It also happens to do a pretty decent, rich vocal reverb which is a thing you won't find in your average budget multi-effects box. The operating system works well and there's plenty to edit.

Chris: "I don't like Yamaha. The last Yamaha I used was the SPX90 [which is more than 10 years old] and I don't think they've been in this market since [we definitely don't agree with this statement!! The REV100 is a great machine and for a lot of the reasons why Chris says he likes budget effects – it has a unique and awesome lo-fi sound and couldn't be simpler to use]. I've flicked through a few things but I still generally

don't like Yamaha stuff. So as far as the operating system goes, because I am not familiar with the Yamaha way it took a while to get to grips with. I think it's over-complicated. I know they have to have selling points, but I'm not a nerd who sits in the studio tweaking things, I probably should be but I'm not and I think they're trying to do too much. The reverbs were nice. Basically that's what it's aimed at, it's meant to be expensive reverb but again it's that cheap trying to be expensive thing. I will be honest and admit that I just flipped through it. went yeah, yeah, Yamaha, got a bit bored with it and left it alone. There's a thing in the back of my head that's anti Yamaha." 4/10

the boss VF1 is essentially a guitar effects unit. Guitar effects are designed to make shit guitars played through poxy little amps sound big and full of energy, which is something that should appeal to those who need to mangle samples and synths. This one also uses a set of digital models which simulate the sounds of different classic/vintage amplifiers and speaker cabinets which happen to phatten almost any sound you feed in. It doesn't just do distortion, you get everything else you'd expect from a multi-effect, but with added oomph. It's a perfect tool for electronic musicians.

Chris: "I've been getting very into distortion on the actual keyboards like the Novation

Supernova and JP8000 and I love it. So the VF1 was a load of fun. I love it. It's just toylike. It immediately makes you smile. It's not trying to be big and serious. It's got a good graphical user interface, it's got all these really dodgy, really bad little graphics on the screen and that's loads of fun. It's the same architecture as the VG880, again it's aimed at guitarists but I found that great for dance music too. One of the other things we're buying for the new studio is a Bass Pod Pro (£239). We put a few bass sounds through it and suddenly they sound brilliant and just lethal. This does similar things. 8/10

tC electronic are revered for their high quality effects processors. The two we have here are the cheapest they do.

Chris: "They look great and stuff, all flashy and cool but I tend to find TC generally slightly overcomplicated. I think generally effects can be a bit wanky. You can do so much that is just meaningless. You know, you have all these settings for 'diffusion' or 'lightening' or 'darkening'. For me if it sounds good, it sounds good and I don't want to sit there for ages adjusting it. I'd rather have things be a bit more instant. Physically I was disappointed with the jack inputs and outputs, I'd have preferred XLR because I'm moving the studio up to that level."

The D-Two.

This is no ordinary delay. It has a maximum 10 second delay time, a button to tap in the rhythm for your echoes, it can do some very complex 'ping pong' delay patterns, some excellent tape echo emulations, reverse echoes and it has a filter to help you sculpt. It is more like a rhythmic instrument than a mere effect.

Chris: "I like the D-two simply because I like delays. You pointed out that we're still using the old Alesis Quadraverb, well that hasn't moved from the ping pong delay setting for years because I haven't been able to find anything that sounds quite like it and this finally matches that for me. In particular the tempo tap button is great. It removes all that sitting around trying to figure out all the maths of whether I want a quarter note or 16th note repeat or whatever and makes the process simpler. I also like the wee tempo control on the screen so you can just set your tempo and it'll quantise your taps which is a great thing. But it'll also do that live feel too. I love all the old space echoes and stuff, so that side of it really interests me. I could actually think about purchasing one of these... even though we're already getting the Fireworx." 9/10

The M-One

The M-One is a multi-effects workhorse of great power and subtlety. We think it sounds brilliant, is great to use simply by running through the presets and has plenty of tweakability, which many feel is important.

Chris: "The M-One I didn't like as much as the MPX1 but then there is a big price difference. I think that's where my little gripe with it is, that it's a cheap machine trying to sound like an expensive machine."

They're $\pounds400$ a piece so compared to a $\pounds100$ Zoom they're expensive.

Chris: "Yeah, but to me the £100 Zoom sounds like a £100 Zoom. That's what I like about it. There's hiss, there's dirt, there's noise and I sort of like that. Compared to the Digitech and stuff, yes of course it's a lot better, a lot cleaner and a lot sweeter. The reverbs I liked, but then I like TC reverbs anyway. The algorithms seem similar to what we have as plug-ins in the computer. It doesn't do anything I haven't heard before but then I hadn't really taken in that it was only £400 and it's pretty good for £400 I guess." 7/10

Our remaining two suggestions were both conceived as DJ effects units but have turned out to be a little too complex for the pressure of a DJ set. They have, however, been selling to studios. Our reason for including them in this round up is simple. Unlike studio units, they don't really have operating systems. Each parameter has been given a dedicated knob so editing is a case of getting in there and messing about.

The knobs all transmit MIDI Continuous Controller information which can be recorded on a MIDI sequencer. This means that you can get all the advantages in terms of musical feel and sheer fun of knob twiddling but record your performance so that it's reproduced every time you play back your track. Using MIDI Controller and Program Change information is an increasingly popular way of controlling all of the synthesizers, sound modules, drum machines and most other hardware found in a studio from a computer via remote control. Most people use a bit of software called Sound Diver by Emagic which allows users to build on-screen graphic interfaces for their equipment. As an extension to this there are now a number of stand the entire studio.

This approach to music may take a little time to get set up in the first place, but once you have set up an on screen editor for everything in your studio and figured out how to assign the things you want to the knobs on the 'control surface', then you have a much more immediate and fun studio at your fingertips. Both of these machines, but especially the Federation, could be used as 'control surfaces' for the rest of your studio.

Unfortunately Chris and Robbie decided to assess them strictly as DJ effects units and didn't try them out in the studio. They came to the same conclusions as everybody else. . . that they make a great sound but are too deep for DJs. Time constraints prevented them from finding an additional slot in their schedule to look at them again in their studio. Which is a shame because once Chris got over the initial boredom of setting it up he'd love this way of working and it would bring the kind of immediacy he loves to his new luxury effects units.

But as you can see, it also has a Kaoss Pad slapped firmly in the middle of the face plate. This is no ordinary Kaoss though - it is an upgraded machine with 80 presets rather than the standard 50. Each channel of the mixer has its own tempo analysis system, so the effects are automatically tempo-matched individually to each channel. There are much improved sampling facilities with 23 seconds of 44.1kHz/16bit memory, a set of dedicated sampling buttons and an ability to resample via the effects. Even more intriguing is the promise that "effects can be used to crossfade between the two input channels for exciting new mixing possibilities," which we hope means that this is the first DJ mixer with a touch screen that can be used as a crossfader. Technology goes curvaceous

The gadget fetishists among you are in serious trouble. The Air FX is the slinkiest, coolest, most appealing gadget we've met for ages. You're gonna ache to own one.

Getting a machine to ooze style is half the battle when it comes to selling stuff these days – just look at how the iMac rescued Apple from

ALESIS ARESIS

oblivion. As you can see for yourselves, Air FX is all nubile curves, cutaways, habitat colouring and shiny breast references. People put uglier stuff on their mantelpieces as ornaments... so does it really matter what it does or how well it does it? Of course it does!

Luckily, Alesis grew to their current stature by building shit hot, entry level products for musicians and they still know how to do it. The Air FX is very simple: it's an effects unit which you manipulate in real time by waving your hand around in mid air.

Physical practicalities

Despite following the current trend for providing a dead simple user interface for applying preset effects to entire pieces of music, the Air FX is not strictly a DJ's machine. It can't be because the first thing you notice about it as a DJ is that there's no phono level input or grounding post, so you can't hook up a turntable directly to it. It also has no headphone monitoring facilities. Neither does it have any form of input or output level monitoring, or any way of adjusting the input or output levels. Unless you're using CDs you have to get a DJ mixer with an effects

send/return system (and be very careful about your levels) or process the main output from your mixer, none of which is ideal for a DJ. On the plus side, on the base you'll find non slip rubber feet and a threaded hole that allows you to screw it to the top of a standard mic stand, which is a very cool idea.

How it works

Selecting an effect program is done via the smallish, silver, dual action data wheel/button. Turn this wheel and the numbers in the display will change and a little dot will appear in the bottom right corner of the display (indicating that the effect number on the screen has not been engaged yet). To engage the effect you push the wheel, the effect kicks in and the dot disappears. Push the wheel again, the dot re-appears and the effect is bypassed.

Editing your chosen effect is a case of moving your hand around above the shiny dome of delight. It works using an infrared beam. The beam comes out of the top of the dome and if it hits your hand it is reflected back downwards and hits one of a ring of sensors around the edge of the dome. In this way it can measure the position of your hand in three dimensions: left to right, front to back and up and down. Alesis have assigned different elements of the effects to each of the three axes (eg depth, feedback and delay for a flanger). Even cleverer, Air FX can detect how fast your hand is moving so a number of the presets use this for a fourth parameter, adding even more sophisticated control.

Once you have found a sound that you like you can freeze the sound of the effect at its current setting by keeping your hand still and pressing down the wheel for about a second (so it's a twohanded operation). Pressing the wheel again releases it.

The sound

The range of effect programs on offer is centred around filters. flanging, phasing, distortion, vocoder style things, autopanners, pitch shifters and basic synth tones. There are no delays or reverbs. Many of the effects automatically lock on and synchronise to the tempo of your audio and do it very well. They sound superb - the quality of the effects is a step up from most of its competitors. The AD/DA conversion is 24 bit rather than the usual 16 bit and it shows. In particular the pitch shifting and vocoder effects sound excellent, the filters and distortion work very well and the flangers add a lovely sense of extra depth. The synth tones are interesting - they allow you to play notes in over tracks in a fairly similar way to the classic Theremin.



In use

The beam controller is infinitely more responsive and sensitive than any other commercially used controller. The range of sounds you can get out of the effects by putting your hand in different positions around the dome is awesome. The instant fun factor is very high. It really couldn't be any easier to just mess around with and get some hugely impressive sounds you will be wowed by. As a straight down the line toy this thing is fantastic. It's well worth the money and very difficult to beat as a toy.

However, repeating the same thing twice is rather difficult, takes a bit of practise and actually demands a bit of 'musical instrument' style physical discipline. The machine demands a good. repeatable human performance to be usable in a professional sense. It also has problems from a strict DJ viewpoint. The data entry wheel is very slick and does its job very well but it's too fancy. Having to push and hold the wheel for a second to freeze the effect settings and having to push the same wheel to switch the effects on and off is a little unwieldy in the heat of a DJ set. Multi-function controls in general and push/hold controls for basic functions on DJ equipment are not generally a good thing.

We feel it would have been much better (if not quite so clever and stylish) to provide a simple knob for selecting programs and separate buttons to engage and freeze the effects. Also, even an experienced keyboard player would find jamming live over records a challenge so trying to get anything usable out of the synth tones setting within a DJ set is unlikely.

Split personality

There are loads of absolutely superb things about Air FX. It looks the business, the sound quality is excellent, the effect programs are very well put together and the beam controller is fantastic. It is a hugely entertaining sonic toy that will sell by the shipload.

From a pro DJ view it has a few drawbacks. The connections and monitoring system leave a lot to be desired, the data wheel is too complex and achieving a repeatable, controllable performance can be tricky with some programs. Why it's a good buy

The Triton Rack takes the well-proven pedigree of the Triton workstation keyboard and builds on it. A workstation provides everything you might need to create electronic music from start to finish in one neat package and the Triton is one of the few workstations of sufficient quality to make music that sounds good enough to release.

The Triton Rack is a sound module. The idea of a sound module is basically to offer you a library of pre-prepared sounds that you can lay your hands on in

a hurry. A sound module only works as part of a set up where MIDI sequencing is done elsewhere (probably a computer). Triton uses the stunning Korg Sampling And Synthesis sound engine which provides traditional instruments like pianos and string ensembles as well as analogue style sounds, textures, good basses of various types and a generous selection of drum sounds.

The point here is that most of you will not have the facilities or skills to make high quality samples of real instruments. Neither will you have the time or patience to then program those samples into usable MIDI instruments. With Triton Rack you have 800 of them a button push away. What's more, words cannot express just how gorgeous these sounds are; you simply have to hear it in action.

It also has six expansion slots which take cards that contain collections of sounds like the awesome Vintage Archives – which is a selection of samples of classic Korg synthesisers – or the equally awesome Moss card which is essentially a Z1 analogue modelling keyboard on a single card. With a little expansion, the Triton Rack becomes a dream workhorse that can provide you with exceptional sounds covering more or less everything you might need.

Sampling on the Triton Rack is a fairly painless process that makes the best use out of a good operating system and the on board screen surrounded by buttons. In the context of a studio however, you're more likely to use a computer for sampling and simply need a sample playback device to reduce the load on your computer's resources. For this the Triton Rack is also excellent with nice filters, etc, and the ability to read Akai and WAV format files (although you'll probably want to fit SCSI expansion).

To crown matters off, the Triton Rack also has a magnificent effects section, a massive arpeggiator, plenty of expansion possibilities including digital I/O and MLAN and much, much more.

You want one

Almost all producers rely on Sound Modules during the writing process. It's great to be able to quickly reach out and grab the kind of sound you're after. The relationship between how good your sounds are and what kind of music you end up with is fundamental. The less there is wrong with the sounds you start out with, the less you will find yourself searching for ways to breathe extra life into them in the final stages of production. In fact you may never be satisfied with the music you make if you start out with inferior sounds. This is a difficult lesson we all learn and most of us end up trading in our first Sound Module for a better one. Save up and buy a Triton Rack in the first place and save yourself a lot of grief.

Dane Bowers

From total lack of cred as one of Another Level to collaborations with Victoria Beckham and big love from the garridge massive, Dane has done it all

The Bowers: The thinking woman's slightly chubby former boy band crumpet So, first things first: is your new single ('Shut Up And Fuck Off', or something) about your ex-girlf, Jordan? "It's got bits in there about her, yeah. The whole album is pretty autobiographical. It's not the exact story but... there you go."

How would you describe the song, then?

"It's an r&b/pop song, really. It's a song with great energy, a lot of attitude, and it was something that I wanted to get out as the first single... yeah, it's pretty different to everything that's out there at the moment and it's just pretty typical of me, really."

Is the album finished yet?

"Yeah, it's called 'Face In The Crowd' and it's out in May. I wanted to make it very different. It's got drum & bass loops in there, hip hop kinda sounding kinda things... very poppy sounding songs. It's a very different sounding album. Very new and fresh."

You have big respect from the garage scene, which is surprising. How did you manage the transition from Another Level boy band hell? "We were quite lucky in that as Another Level we always had respect from the underground cos we had a lot of great mixes of our songs. I've built up a rapport with the garage circuit, DJing and doing PAs... Iwas

When you were in Another Level, were you plotting your escape from it then?

a DJ before Another Level, so I've

built it up as I went along really."

"No, no I always very comfortable in Another Level. We had a very positive effect on UK r&b and I was proud of that. Now I'm trying to take it to a new level, picking up where Another Level left off."

How did the collaboration with True Steppers come about?

"I met them on Top Of The Pops and they said 'would you like to get into the studio and write?'. It ['Buggin' Me'] was never meant to be a single, but it was great and everyone liked it so it got released... and then I wanted to do like an 'answer' record, a second part with a female vocal and Victoria Beckham was the person we got..."

Do you think Victoria saw it as a way of pulling away from the Spice Girls?

"Yeah, it was obviously meant to give her a bit more credibility and also to kick off her solo career. We had a great time, we're great friends and it was an amazing couple of weeks leading up to the release."

Were you really pissed off that you lost the race for number one to Spiller?

"It was disappointing, but this was a record that we put together very quickly, designed to lead into our respective solo careers, and it was a new idea that nobody knew whether it would work or not. . . and it was an amazing success. I thought the Spiller tune was a pretty good tune."

Your media persona is one of a man who likes the odd ruck. Do you feel you always have to watch yourself in public?

"Yeah, it's like I walk out of a restaurant with a girl and apparently I'm married, do you know what I mean? But that's just the way it is. The tabloid thing is a pain in the arse cos you can't argue your point back and people just tend to believe what's written which is a shame. It'sjust something you have to get used to."

Have you ever taken anyone to task for writing horrid things about you?

"I have, yeah, but it doesn't work. What can you do? If you try and say something about what they've written it's not like it's gonna go in the paper, and it's too late by then anyway. It gets on my nerves immensely but there's nothing I can do about it."

Have you DJed much recently?

"Yeah, I help run Twice As Nice, so I DJ every weekend in Romford, Kingston. . . and hopefully soon the Red Cube in London."

What did you think about Twice As Nice having to move after that shooting?

"It was a shame cos [the shooting] was quite a way down the road but it was perceived to be people from the club, and so it had to move. But we're getting it back up and running." **(DB)**
