"It's just an unfortunate coincidence..."

Jules compilation dogged by allegations of plagiarism



TYRANT DJ CRAIG RICHARDS has lashed out at Judge Jules over the striking similarity Jules' 'Clubbed' compilation album artwork bears to the 'Tyrant' album mixed by Richards and Lee Burridge. Speaking exclusively to Muzik, Craig issued the following heartfelt statement about the issue:

"When I first saw the artwork for Judge Jules' new compilation I was angry, bewildered, but most of all upset that the environment in which I work is creatively stifling," he said. "It is unimaginative, destructive, insensitive and ridiculous. Even the most blinkered of people would acknowledge the similarity between the two images."

Richards continued, "The information on the back of a Clubbed flyer makes for an interesting read. It states that Jules himself has been involved with all aspects of the CD. One of these aspects is design. I presume this means he is fully familiar with the commissioned artwork."

Muzik contacted Judge Jules' management company Serious, who replied thus:

"The sleeve was a product of our brief to the designer, which we are very happy with. It's just an unfortunate coincidence."

They added, "Serious were unaware of Tyrant's

marketing, being in a different music style." Craig is not convinced. "While I am willing to accept that Tyrant is not a household name and that our graphic profile within the music industry

that our graphic profile within the music industry is relatively limited, I am not willing to accept that our graphic profile is so insignificant that this could have happened 'accidentally'. It's a downright bloody cheek!"

Serious are, however, keen to apologise.

"The obvious similarities between the two sleeves are entirely coincidental," said the designer of the Clubbed project, "and we apologise for any upset that may have been caused."

The first release from GROOVILICIOUS UK, Ultra 5's 'Potion' is released on April 30th. The talented trio already boast a remix discography which includes FUNKSTAR DELUXE, ALANIS M and GINA G. Fantastic!... Reaching even higher, 'Progressive Euphoria' is released on Telstar on April 26th. Mixed by JOHN '00' FLEMING, the album includes prog nuggets from DELERIUM, STORM and SANDER KLEINENBERG... DMC return with EVERYTHING BUT THE GIRL's 'Back To Mine' album on April 30th. This after-hours album features classics from CARL CRAIG, BETH ORTON and THE ROOTS... Muzik would like to apologise to END RECORDINGS for including incorrect remix details on last month's covermount CD. ARE THE AVALANCHES the

Wu-Tang Clan of Oz pop? Possibly. Formed in deepest Melbourne during the mid-Nineties, this six-strong collective made their name with a series of madcap live shows and are now set to release a life-affirming debut album of beats, melodies and strife. Following in the footsteps of Wu, then, who would be RZA? Is there a chef called Raekwon in their midst? And which one is old and dirty?

"We have a lot of strength because we stick together," says band leader Robbie. "But Tony The Tambourine is on the run from the law. That's kind of why we're here."

"James would be Ol' Dirty," adds Darren mischievously. Any particular reason? Darren throws Muzik a look of total contempt. "He's just dirty."

Confused? Don't be. If those names mean little to you, they will as soon as you hear their album, 'Since I Left You'. For the record, Robbie Chater is their mentor, James De La Cruz is their turntable king, Tony The Tambourine is Bez with extra bass skills and Darren Seltman does drums. There are at least eight other members of The Avalanches but we don't have time to outline them all. Suffice to say, they all serve a purpose.

Visiting the UK for their first press barrage, Robbie and Darren are struggling to fight off jet lag and awkward questions from Muzik. Like, how come there are no girls in your gang?

"There was one once," sighs Darren. "We had a heavy metal drummer but she was scary and just wanted to play Aerosmith drum fills. Boy, did she love build-ups. Fantastic drummer, though."

Life on the road has been a gas for The Avalanches. On a recent tour of Oz, Rob and Darren hung out with Carl Cox and Darren Emerson, who kept them amused while they played to the hordes on Big Day Out.

"I remember Carl taking photos with a digital camera, but the camera was so small that you could see him smiling behind it!" Robbie reminisces fondly. "And we got to know Darren really well. He was wandering around by himself so we almost asked him to join the band. We wanted to put him on a little pedestal and whip him. He's just so cuddly!"

Patife had done a mix compilation which he was promoting with a white label of the aforementioned XRS Land track. Suddenly it was hot property, with only Fabio,

Frost, Gee and Gilles Peterson owning copies in the UK. "The USA has a huge Latin

The OSA has a nuge Latin population, and obviously South America too, get me?" Gee continues, "and this style is theirs. When I played it in Puerto Rico the crowd were like, 'this is our thing'." Wisely, the V duo decided to sign some material, kicking off a collaboration that looks set to run and run, with an album and possible live shows in the offing. IT WAS OUT OF the ashes of the Smokescreen sound system that the Inland Knights emerged. After eight years of providing quality repetitive beats for the good citizens of South Yorkshire and the Midlands, Smokescreen was finally seized by local law enforcement drones in 1999, leaving co-founder Laurence Ritchie at a loose end.

Into the void stepped friend and fellow Smokescreen core member Andy Riley, already recording under the To-Ka Project guise with Steve Walker. Before long the duo were producing together as Inland Knights and Laurence was setting up the Drop Music label. Two years later, Drop Music is flourishing, with the help of a distribution deal with Intergroove, and Inland Knights are poised to release their debut album, 'Creative Spaces'. The musical feel of 'Creative Spaces' is deep and determined, with a little jagged-round-theedges sound system ruffness for garnish. And they make it all sound so very easy.

"We go into the studio and make some beats, use a sample that we might find inspiring," says Andy on the working process.

"It's best that we're not distracted by anything," adds Laurence. Which begs the question: isn't running Drop Music just such a distraction?

"I switch my mobile off in the studio now!" Laurence explains. "But I check back every half an hour or so, to see if there's any messages. Having said that though, I could do with a label manager... do you know any?"

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Warp's latest boy wonder

SINCE THE DEMISE of the grant, students have struggled to make ends meet. But 21 year-old Bristol English undergrad Chris Clark has come up with something a bit smarter than selling parts of his body to science - he's putting out his debut album on Warp. Now why didn't you think of that?

Chris started sending demos to Warp at the age of 15, inspired by 'Artificial Intelligence'. So why did it take so long for them to put an album out?

"Er, well, a lot of what I sent them was crap," Chris confesses. With the crapness problem now overcome,

Chris's album, 'Clarence Park', is a set of evocative electronic vignettes with an average track time of about two and a half minutes. In this age of epic neo-prog nonsense, that's even better news than the news that everyone involved in making Halifax adverts has been killed with an axe.

"The saying that musicians have the right to 'express themselves' has a lot of truth in it, but it also has a lot of toss in it," Chris observes, reasonably.

Chris also DJs occasionally, and like everyone at Warp, likes nothing better than having it right off.

"I ended up being sick at the last Warp night. But it wasn't rock 'n' roll sick, it was more sort of sad, 'oh I'm dying' kind of sick, in the corner." Oh alright, maybe not.

In 1990, a young Liam Howlett sent the now-Incentive boss Nick Halkes a demo tape of some scratchy four-track recordings from his home in Braintree, Essex. Halkes was immediately smitten, and within weeks he'd signed the fledgling outfit to XL for a paltry £1,500 (even Del Trotter would've forked out more). This maverick, thrusting spirit became XL's hallmark. With co-founder Richard Russell, the imprint tapped into the exploding hardcore scene and signed a slew of shockingly successful rave monsters. Remember 'On A Ragga Tip' by SL2? 'Sweet Harmony' by Liquid? Or 'Le Voil, Le Soleil' by Subliminal Cuts?

Swerving from ring road classics to unashamed money-makers like 'Doop', XL were also one of the first dance labels to stamp their brand logo on clubland's consciousness. Until The Prodigy gave XL their first bona fide pop hit with 'Charly', the circular signature appeared on every release. Ploughing the returns into acts like Basement Jaxx and The Avalanches, XL are still the hippest indie on the scene. Xtra Large indeed.

I don't get a fee for DJing but they fly you out and you get to spend four or five days snowboarding with them. It was the first time for me. I must have fallen over a million times but I absolutely loved it. The club was like a Swiss version of a Western saloon barlots of big wooden beams! I'm just finishing up a remix for Aphrohead (aka Felix Da Housecat) of 'Crybaby' and then it's off to the States for a mini-tour and the Miami Winter Music Conference. I play a lot of US music so it's about time I gave them my version of events. I'm sure there will be some silliness to report next month. Laters.

Born? Ealing, London. Age? An exceptionally young 46! **First record you ever** bought? Otis Redding's 'Dock Of The Bay'. If you could only have one record, what would it be? If it's a CD, then it would be this lot! Or Joe Smooth's 'Promised Land', cos it makes me get all emotional every time. Future plans? Now I've finished Friday night Kiss, I wanna use my Monday show to finally change certain people's uneducated perceptions about me, and spend more time producing and remixing.

1. Jimmy Cliff

Many Rivers To Cross (Island, 1970)

"The title track of one of Jimmy's albums, which later ended up in the film The Harder They Come, if I remember correctly. He was up there with Bob Marley, Dennis Brown and Desmond Dekker. One night, when I was playing in Gullivers in Mayfair, this most unassuming of men came in. We met, talked, and I worshipped the chair that he sat on for months!"

2. Double Exposure 10% (Salsoul, 1976)

"Well, it was the first ever commercial 12-inch, and typified the sound of the label. Graham 'Fatman' Cantor, one of the finest DJs this country has ever produced, now sadly passed away, used to do this amazing rap over the intro when he was resident at Gullivers, before I took over. One of Salsoul's finest moments."

3.The O'Jays Used To Be My Girl (Philadelphia International, 1976)

"This label has had its tunes sampled by virtually every disco producer/ remixer going. The O'Jays were a phenomenon, and this is just one of the many great works of theirs I could have picked. It meant even more to me after I heard them sing it live at the Hollywood Bowl in LA in 1991. The night was hot, and they tore it up. I'd never seen so many stretch limos. How anyone knew which one was theirs, I'll never know."

4. Dexter Wansell

Life On Mars (Philadelphia International, 1976)

"This seminal jazz-funk classic was the inspiration for the UK jazz-funk explosion. Written, arranged and produced by this Vietnam War veteran, it encompassed all that we grooved to back in the day. One of my most memorable broadcasts on London pirate JFM back in 1986 was when I interviewed Dexter. We talked about Vietnam and the profound effect it had on his life as well, of course, as his biggest love – music."

5. Ashford & Simpson

It Seems To Hang On (Capitol, 1978)

"They wrote some of the best songs of the Seventies and Eighties. Forget the ones that went pop, like 'Solid', this was where they were at. I caught them live at The Dominion in the Seventies, and this was the one song they didn't sing. It was a fantastic concert anyway, but I still left feeling a tad cheated!" 6. Frankie Beverly & Maze

Joy And Pain (Capitol, 1981)

"They came to the fore of the soul scene due to their 'Live In New Orleans' album, and a live video from that gig. This was the anthem to end all anthems, and I was there, eight rows from the front at their very first Hammersmith gig. There's never Gullivers when they were in town and we got quite friendly. That's why I did a remake of this two years ago with Frankie's permission. I thought if anyone should do it, I should, as I was there and knew what it was all about."

7. Shalamar

Sweeter As The Days Go By (MCA, 1981)

"While Salsoul and Philly were just two of the prolific Seventies labels, in the early Eighties it was all about Solar (Sound Of Los Angeles Records). The label was home to acts like the Whispers, Midnight Star and Shalamar. This came out in 1981, but its potential wasn't realised until it became a rare groove classic in '85."

8. Willie Hutch

In And Out (Motown, 1982)

"As the labels said in those days, a '45 RPM DISCO MIX!". It all revolved around the hook, 'In and out, up and down, around and around!' This was one of THE tunes of that year, and had the added bonus of a very Curtis Mayfield-sounding Mr Hutch on the B-side with that classic from nine years earlier, 'Brothers Gonna Work It Out'."

9. James Ingram

Yah Mo Be There (Qwest, 1983)

"Well, I'm not religious and never counted myself a Michael McDonald fan, but when Quincy Jones produces a track and the legendary Jellybean twiddles the mix knobs, you're

guaranteed something special. James, one part of Ingram (who show up elsewhere on this tape), is a legend and this all fits to make a perfect tribute to the Man somewhere (allegedly) up there. And my copy is

signed, too!"

10.Ingram

With You (Other End, 1984)

"The first record I ever played on legal radio! It was the Saturday night/ Sunday morning five-hour soul and dance show on London's Capital Radio. I followed Mike Allen who used to use fuckloads of reverb on the mic. It was a 'hot seat' affair, so I had no chance to test the mic. That first link threw me completely as I hadn't got a clue why I was sounding so spaced out in my headphones, and I was already the most nervous man in London that day anyway!"

11. Original Concept Can You Feel It?

(Def Jam, 1986)

"The title vocal line is now probably one of the most famous in house music, thanks to someone called Todd Terry. Produced by Def Jam supremo Rick Rubin and the band, this was raw, sparse and dirty as you like. And the dancefloor rocked!"

12. Soul II Soul Fairplay (10, 1988)

"Jazzy B & Nellee Hooper were the UK's answer to Jam & Lewis, but more 'street'. Purveyors of polished, solid midtempo grooves, this, the band's debut, with Rose Windross (Norris Da Boss's sister) on vocals, captured the imagination of the soul fraternity like no one else had in recent years. The odd thing about that whole era was I was playing tunes like this, which was 101 bpm, and also DJing International, Nervous and Strictly stuff in the same

club. Oh, the joys of being a six nights a week, eight hours a night resident. I did that for eight years!"

13. Joe Smooth

Promised Land (DJ International, 1989)

"'And the angels from above come down and spread their wings like doves/ And we walk hand in hand/ Sister, brother, we'll make it to the promised land'. The most emotive lyrics in house music and a record that needs nothing more said about it."

14. Lionrock

Lionrock (Deconstruction, 1992)

"This was the first Lionrock tune from Justin Robertson, as far as I'm aware, and while 'Packet Of Peace' was brilliant, this is THE record that reminds me of the whole 1991/92 era. Spirit at SW1, The Jungle down the Epping on a Sunday and I think even the early part of Gism above the shoe shop in Islington. Full house at 11pm and no one left till 7am. At 120bpm, it now seems pretty slow, but I played it at my 30 years party in November and Danny D (ex D-Mob and producer of Juliette Roberts et al) went ballistic over it."

15. The Police Voices Inside My Head (AM:PM, 1995)

"Well, I reckon this is Roger Sanchez's best ever mix, done when he used to remix as just Roger S. I very rarely start sets from cold, as I think it's almost disrespectful to the DJ before you, but this has such an emotive intro that it'd be rude not to. Luckily enough I had the chance to tell Roger when we re-met in Mallorca a few years ago. He was sitting down eating with Junior and Big Nick. I went up to introduce myself and Roger got up and said "Hi Graham, how ya doin' mate" in that London accent he does. I'd forgotten we'd met before (don't ask) but he immediately remembered me."

16. Incognito

You Are The Universe (Talkin' Loud, 1996)

"Incognito's main man Bluey was there at the start, the middle, and will be there at the finish I'm sure! Our friendship was cemented back in 1979 at a venue called The Royalty in Southgate where the band played live. There have been many top recent tunes from Incognito, but the melody and the lyrics in this seem, for me anyway, to have that extra special whatever-it-is that earmarks a classic."

Nukleuz Bomb Mixed By Nick Sentience



"WE JUST USED TO GET a van with 10 friends, find an address and party," explains Nukleuz' 22 year-old production/DJ prodigy Nick Sentience. "I was hooked up with a guy called Martin and a guy called Tom. Martin was the guitarist and used to link up synthesizers to his guitar pedals and play keyboards. Nuts! I'd play techno out of a Groovebox, 303s and stuff."

This outfit was called Sentience, and so Nick Fryer garnered a new surname. Nukleuz picked up on one of his demos, and released 'Purple Twilight' in early 1999. While Nukleuz has two main styles - trance and hard house - Nick Sentience's forte is adding techno bottle to the cocktail, a dirty squat-rave edge. Catch him in action at Riot at The End every Sunday from 2pm or, if direct action is not your strong suit, his side of the 'Big Room DJs' compilation rocks. Hard.

1 Bob Burns Jnr Rock Hard 2000 (Champion Burns Mix)

"This sounds like nothing else, which can often make it hard to find something to mix with it. That's the only downside to it, though. Play the intro in any club and you can't fail to grab the crowd - it's my secret weapon.

2 BK & Andy Farley

Concentrate

"In a two-hour set I'll sling in three or four anthems to give people a lift. This is one of the main ones I use - it's a jigsaw of a million sounds. Andy Farley's a really good friend.'

3 Mario Piu Presents DJ Arabesque

The Vision (BK & Nick Sentience Mix)

"The Italian stuff is inspirational - big, phat and warm. This remix came out really well, a really good hybrid of trance and hard house."

4 Nick Sentience

Discotech

"I wrote this just before I went to Australia last summer, so it's been around a while. Everyone who comes up to say hello at a club usually tells me it's their favourite track of mine.

5 BK & Andy Farley Up Da Bass

"Wicked new-style hard house, pure groove all the way through, no particular breakdown or build-up. It never gets boring, though - totally groovy!

6 BK & Nick Sentience Go Again

"This is the only Club Cuts release [Nukleuz' housier, red-sleeved brand] I've ever done. We were both a bit apprehensive about releasing it because it's so far removed from anything else we'd done at the time – full of conga rhythms over a tribal beat and featuring a funky guitar.

7 BK & Andy Farley **Beef Jerky**

"Called 'Beef Jerky' because it's beefy and jerky, apparently. A deep, dirty techno groove."

8 Nick Sentience & **Phil Reynolds**

Instru (Mental)

"Phil Reynolds is one of the top trance DJs in London. He has a residency at Frantic and he can pull a crowd like no one else. If you want the more bangin' end of the trance spectrum, he's your man. Last Sunday at The End I heard this five times.

9911 The 4 Commitments (Lee Janes Mix)

"Wicked hard trance. The original is a really cheesy Dutch hard house thing with sirens and things going off. It's got a good breakbeat section in the middle and I used to be a total breakbeat person - so it's 30 seconds of going back to my roots

10 Nick Sentience

Ride The Groove

"This is my new single - out now - plug, plug. There's an acid mix but this one's a bit more technoflavoured with an electro breakdown."

11 Praga Khan Injected With A Poison

(BK & Nick Sentience Mix) "Oh my God! This was my first ever favourite rave track. Ben [Keen-ie BK] was playing the Baby Doc mix out and he said, 'Why don't we sign it and do a mix ourselves?'. Incredible-it's a really weird feeling to remix a track you loved when you were 12. And the number of DJs we've caught out with the turntable stopping noise in the middle. Ha!"

12 Mauro Picotto Iduana

(BK & Nick Sentience Mix) "When 'Iguana' was released over here it was

quite high profile but there was nothing about it that appealed to the harder end of dance music. We [Sentience & BK] changed that."

13 Lisa Pin-Up **Baddest Mother** (BK & Nick Sentience Mix)

"She's in the studio with Ben at the moment. She needed a harder mix. People absolutely love her. I stood beside her when she was playing in Ireland a couple of months ago and she totally went for it. This is probably the most full-on track on the CD.

Jungle family tree

Rewind and come again, all junglist massive. From darkcore holocaust to progressive jazziness, it's all absolutely T for tremendous. Booyakka!

Since jungle's power derives from its conjunction of the very new (the quasidemonic power of technology) and the very old (the forging of complex, danceable rhythms), any attempt to trace its real roots is bound to get lost in the mists of prehistory and aimless waffle. Looking for a more recent precedent, it's impossible to overlook Kool Herc's well-documented breaks parties in the early Seventies Bronx. Unwittingly creating a culture based around the isolation and manipulation of breakbeats, Herc paved the way not only for hip hop but also for its younger, wilder cousin.

When acid house hit these shores at the end of the Eighties, there was already a thriving breaks scene in place. Just as significantly, the British sound systems exhibited an eclecticism that would never have been possible in the States. A generation raised on everything from rare groove to Afrika Bambaataa via the boneshaking dub of Jah Shaka would take house music and turn it into something rich and strange.

The first truly British house tracks were those known as 'techno' at the time (as many genres have been at various points in dance music's development) and then, in retrospect as 'bleep'. Heavily influenced by the reggae sound systems of the north, ultra-minimal cuts like Unique 3's 'The Theme' were an early template for the glacial bass-pressure of darkcore.

Down south, meanwhile, a certain Shut Up And Dance were experimenting with

the short-lived 'hip-house' sound and coming up with some extraordinary proto-jungle releases. The raw, looped breaks and cheeky Suzanne Vega sample of 1989's '£10 To Get In' anticipated a million hardcore records, while The Ragga Twins' 1990 track 'Spliffhead' (released on the SUAD label) was rude-bwoy jungle three years before its time.

Two further influences were crucial to the next phase of development. The first was the sudden availability of cheap samplers and home studio programs, facilitating the cut-and-paste aesthetic and weird and wonderful sounds that characterised





hardcore. Second was the brutal snarl of early Nineties Belgian techno, epitomised by Joey Beltram's seminal 'Mentasm' (recorded as Second Phase in collaboration with Frank de Wulf). The harsh metallic stridency of tracks like 'Mentasm' still resonates in drum & bass today.

A hyperkinetic amalgam of sped-up breakbeats, rumbling dub basslines, Belgian horror-riffs and piano motifs nicked from Italian house tracks, hardcore was the first real incarnation of the sound that came to be known as 'jungle'. Tracks like Cosmo & Dibs' 'Oh So Nice' and Kaotic Chemistry's 'Space Cakes' (released on Moving Shadow in, respectively, 1991 and 1992) were unbelievably manic barrages of intensity that sounded, quite simply, like the most thrilling music on Earth.

Towards the end of 1992, for numerous reasons (the increasing populism of 'rave' and the psychic fall out of long-term ecstasy use being paramount), hardcore began to turn gruesome. The new sound of 'darkside', foregrounding the intimations of dread and madness that had always lurked below hardcore's jittery surface, engulfed the listener in a murky aura of tangled polyrhythms and Hammer horror tremors. Many were alienated by this new development, ravers leaving in droves for the blander shores of house and the emergent 'happy hardcore' scene. What's less often acknowledged is that the battery of fucked-up sonic effects developed by darkside producers (exemplified by the rhythmic psychedelia of Metalheadz' 'Terminator') took the music to hitherto unexplored levels of intensity and paved the way for jungle itself.

As the Nineties progressed, the techniques used to chop up, layer and reprocess rhythms pitchshifting/reversing, timestretching and ghosting being just some of the many terms used developed into a veritable 'breakbeat science'. British b-boys had, in any case, always been more interested in this more experimental side of hip hop than in its politically conscious, verbal aspect. Now drum-literate producers like Danny Breaks, DJ Hype and Aphrodite began making genuinely radical tracks that exemplified avant garde composer John Cage's dictum that "percussion music is revolution". Taking the rhythmic sensibilities of rock 'n' roll to undreamed of levels of complexity and intensity, cuts like Hyper On Experience's 'Disturbance' were soundtracks to as yet uninvented religious ceremonies.

1994 was the year that the mainstream, after years of ostracising them, finally woke up to the allure of rolling beats. Focusing initially on the more ragga-influenced side of things, the media frenzy exaggerated tales of guns and crack use at clubs and propelled artists like UK Apachi and M-Beat high up the charts. Meanwhile, yet another permutation of the breaks-and-bass blueprint was taking shape. Defining themselves initially as the opposite of darkside's garbled malaise, producers such as Omni Trio and Foul Play had begun making tracks that combined the same fractured rhythms with sounds that were more sweetness and light than doom and gloom. "Industry bigwigs who had derided hardcore as boring and uninventive rubbed shoulders on the Speed dancefloor"

By 1995 this anti-dark, anti-ragga contingent had coalesced into a scene. Centred on Fabio and LTJ Bukem's London club Speed, the 'intelligent' sector looked as much to the crisp harmonics of Detroit techno as it did to the rabble-rousing fury of jungle. Yet if Speed was for a while one of the finest clubs on the planet, it was also the place where jungle acquired an improbable veneer of 'maturity' and urban cool. Industry bigwigs like Pete Tong, who just two years before had derided hardcore as 'boring' and 'uninventive', rubbed shoulders on the dancefloor with Gilles Peterson. The A&R men descended like flies.

And yet for every Alex Reece or Wax Doctor, remaking jungle as suave ambience with beats, there was an Aphrodite or a Dillinja. Staying true to the percussive essence of the genre (and its roots in hip hop), the swift-rolling 'jump up' style of playaz such as Aphrodite sounded like G-funk on a hefty dose of PCP. Moody bass terrorists like Dillinja and Digital, meanwhile, further intensified the low-end frequencies to produce a kind of spartan, militarised dub.

The late Nineties was characterised primarily by a swing back to the darkside. Centred on Nico and Ed Rush's No U-Turn label, the new school of 'techstep' producers – reacting against the increasing vapidity of jazz-jungle – developed the clinical, dread-laden sound that still holds sway today. As ever, though, there are those who buck the trend. The warmer, intricately rolling vibe of new school producers such as Teebee, Calibre, Fellowship, Carlito & Addiction, Blue Sonix, DJ Patife (the list goes on) is once again pointing a way out of the gloom. Whatever you do, just don't look back.

FABRIC. Any Sunday. Let's say 11.55pm. Clutch a reasonably priced beverage, steady yourself and take a look around you. It's like a Seventies ideal of what a club would be like in space year 2001. Gay and straight; male and female; black and white; mashed people and, er, slightly less mashed people. Alright, it's mainly gay, male, white and mashed, but you get the point. The club is DTPM – Delirium Tremens Post Meridian. The post-Trade, post-sensible, eight year-old gay/mixed Sunday institution. In both senses of the word 'institution'.

Gay boys point elegant toes and move with what can only be described as a fly sashay. Straight boys do that straight boy dance like they're parodying Liam Gallagher's walk while wrestling with an invisible robot foe. And the music? It's a gay night in London, but the hard house that you might expect is not on the agenda. Instead, Fabric's astonishing sound system pours forth house deep enough to satisfy the most anally retentive 'spotter, but funky enough to keep the crowd moving, on – and we can't emphasise this enough – a Sunday night in Smithfields.

Some of the crowd have rolled through clubs, bars, house-parties and (perhaps, maybe, at some stage) a few beds in a haze of chemicals, hard house, house, Trade and trade since last Thursday's Atelier (at The End, DTPM's former home). And they're going to be here until 5am on Monday morning. And yet there are no stalkeyed, gibbering loons here. Just who the fuck are these people, and what are they on? And can we have some?

The people who go to DTPM are these people: fashionistas, music biz slags and hairdressers (London hairdressers never open on Mondays, apparently). And then there are always those others to whom Monday morning means nothing: students, people on holiday, boys who are kept, boys who are rent, the wealthy, and those who simply don't give a fuck. People who don't mind losing their job every few months, or going in on Monday in a state of mind more suited to a location where the jackets have arms that do up at the back.

Yep, it's a pretty mental scene – Sunday night fever, indeed. But get this – it's actually quite relaxed compared to how it used to be. For DTPM's story is one of drugs, the fuzz, madness, business and house music not all night long but all weekend long. And we have the publicans of Farringdon to thank for it all...

Laurence Malice, legendary/notorious club, er. . . person ("I'm not a promoter. I am an artist," he says) set up and has run the legendary/notorious Saturday night/Sunday morning club Trade for 10 years. But a few years into Trade's life, trouble was afoot.

"We used to keep having the police round every week and Turnmills [Trade's home] was talking about changing the closing time to 9am," the perma-shaded Malice rasps at his customary 220 words per second.

"The thing was, all the people leaving Trade at midday were heading for the pubs across the road. People would be going there for Sunday lunch and then all these... monsters would show up and terrorise them!"

Clearly, it was necessary to find somewhere to house the 'monsters'. Leaping into action, Malice approached a friend who ran an Italian restaurant in London's Holborn, a non-residential ghost town on a Sunday afternoon. A deal was struck. Lee Freeman, who had run nights at the Astoria 2, was brought in to promote the night, although Malice also remained involved with the club for five years.

"You can see potential in people and I could see that Lee was a good person," Malice reminisces, momentarily coming over like the guru in Kung Fu.

"I'm sure Laurence sees me as his protegé," says Lee Freeman. "Like he taught me everything I know. Of course, he taught me a hell of a lot, but I think I taught him a lot too. Without Laurence there wouldn't have been a DTPM, but I'm the one who's developed it through the years."

It's easy to see why Malice and Freeman got on, and why – despite a hint of professional frostiness between the pair now – there's still a lot of mutual respect. Freeman may lack Malice's machetesharp tongue, but the charming, gregarious "Essex boy made good" has a similar attitude to running clubs. That it's not a business so much as a vocation (or an 'art'). Giving people a great time week in, week out. Pumping the money not into offshore accounts but back into the club.

"We spend 100 grand a year on lighting and production," Freeman reckons. Sometimes, though, it's possible to get a bit carried away.

"We bought a 12-foot mirror ball," Freeman laughs. "But it's too heavy to put up! It's in storage – costs me a fortune. We really ought to try and get it up for the birthday, though."

DTPM is eight years old this month. To celebrate, there are to be multiple parties in multiple cities and the release of DTPM's first CD, 'DTPM – The Deep & Funky Sound Of Sundays'. Mixed by house to hard house cross-genre bon viveur Alan Thompson (who's been at DTPM from the start) and pint-sized deep house sex bomb Miguel Pellitero (who's been a resident for three years), the CD may confuse people who think the gay scene is all about hard house. It's not, but for purist clubbers, the reality is actually slightly worse. Back to Laurence Malice for a newsflash.

"There are only two gay clubs I actually consider to be true clubbers' clubs: Trade and



DTPM. The rest are just glorified bars. No disrespect, but the music's just wallpaper. The queens aren't interested in music any more."

This is, it must be said, a trifle unfair. Props are in order for the deep 'n' progressive business at Fiction (Lee Freeman's other night), Atelier and Habit and the New Yoik house of Queer Nation. And then there are the unique nights which only the gay scene can offer, a few of which are in that box on the opposite page. But you can see what Malice is getting at when you consider the other big gay clubs in London. Heaven hasn't had a real gay clubbers' night since the influential trance/ techno shindig Garage. The allegedly 'alternative' club Popstarz is essentially a very large student disco and then, of course, there's G.A.Y.

Possibly the most successful gay club in Europe, and a guaranteed top night out, G.A.Y. features, it must be said, some of the most atrocious music in the history of recorded sound. From handbag house versions of Phil Collins records to live PAs by the likes of Hear'Say, 5ive

Versus The Boutique and other bands with typographical affectations, G.A.Y. does what it does brilliantly, but it's not a night likely to find favour with the sonically picky.

What G.A.Y. and most other gay nights in London provide is a place to drink, cruise and dance, strictly in that order of importance. And in general the soundtrack is a genre for which we have coined the name 'hard-house-whichisn't-actually-all-that-hard-except-on-theoccasions-when-it's-far-too-hard'. But let's call it hard house for short.

Laurence Malice reckons that "hard house is dead". Actually, he goes a bit further than that.

"It's just relentless garbage now... It sounds like German pop music... There's nothing interesting about it... Those awful hi-hats – hello?... Women don't like it, and funnily enough, it's got to the point where queens don't like it either. They wanna be able to bounce. 'Hard house' is not what Trade's about."

You get the picture. DTPM's Miguel Pellitero has a different way of putting it.

"I went to Ministry for a hard house night and there was [A Certain Well Known Hard House DJ – Diplomatic Ed.] playing this music that went 'Duh-Duh-Duh-Duh'. I thought 'my God – if I was 18 and going out and taking my first drugs to this, I'd commit murder or something!"

But ironically, DTPM exists because of hard house. DTPM was the soothing musical balm applied to the confused denizens of Trade once they had reached that very special state of 'exhaustion' that only 12 hours' exposure to hard house (or nu-NRG, or hard techno or whatever one wishes to call it now, or wished to call it then), ending at noon on Sunday can bring.

"The music at DTPM was always very uplifting, with lots of vocals," Lee Freeman says. "That was what it was always about."

But while the music was relatively relaxed, the crowd was, as DJ Alan Thompson recalls, "hardcore". Stefano's, being an Italian restaurant, was in many ways not ideal for clubbing. The

venue was always packed to the gills, with big queues outside. Chairs and tables were left out on a hard floor that could get

wet to the point where you didn't so much dance as aquaplane. Add to that a whole load of extremely monged people and, in summer, large fans, and the potential for messiness was great.

"There was this time when a guy got his finger caught in a fan and had the top of it chopped off," Thompson chortles. "He kept on dancing though, with blood spurting out of his finger, until one of his friends noticed what had happened." Laurence Malice sums it up succinctly:

"It was madness. It was fantastic. People would go on from DTPM to [much missed Sunday nighter at Turnmills named after something awfully rude] FF, which I also ran. For the first couple of years I used to wake up on Mondays and literally not remember a thing."

But let's not get too misty eyed. Lee Freeman misses the Stefano era too ("they were crazy days – I'd fall out of Trade and go to work!"), but he knows that clubs have to evolve to survive. Since then, he's moved the club to Bar Rumba and then to The End and new opening hours of 6pm-4am; a move away from the Trade mothership. After a year there, Laurence Malice bowed out to concentrate on Trade.

"I love the club, but the time came when I had to say 'ooh no. I can't take this any more'. I was getting burned out. It was physically impossible."

Finally, 18 months ago, DTPM moved to Fabric. All the venue changes tell their own story – increasing capacity, increasingly slick operations. As competitors have come and gone, DTPM has accumulated the trappings of a modern club 'brand': web sites, one-offs in other cities, compilations and so on. But there are no super-league DJs booked, no travel agents and the compilations faithfully reflect what's played in the club, not what's played on daytime Radio 1.

"We have to spread our wings a bit to survive, but it's not like we want to end up with a DTPM Hotel," concludes Lee. "After eight years we're still an underground club, and I'm proud of that – we've got a lot of prestige with those in the know, and I won't prostitute the club just for<u>money.</u>"

And after all, a club that runs from 10pm to 5am on a Monday? That's still pretty fucking nuts, right? Let's have a peek...

Back at Fabric, it's midnight. Miguel Pellitero drops the Ben Watt remix of Sade's 'By Your Side' and the dancefloor, which has been steadily filling up, becomes a seething mass of bobbing gym-tits and Evisu labels, expensive hairdos and tattoos. And it keeps going off till the end, taking in great sets from Alan Thompson and Steve Thomas, both of whom are enjoying a night off from the boshing sounds with which they're more commonly associated.

If you fancy a break from the tribal and disco house on the main floor, detour around the big biceps of the crowd's muscle boy contingent and move towards the throb of tech-house in room two. The opening DJ won't be one of the promoter's mates pushed on to fill the opening slot, it'll be someone like Malcolm Duffy or Daz Saund. Now that's quality control. That's class. Like we said: DTPM is how big clubs were always meant to be.

The French Band are back. And they hope you like their new direction

FOR ALL THE PURPLE prose that they

inspired over the last few years, Air are a couple of shockingly regular guys. They may have provided some of the most pitch-perfect post-club music of the last five years, but they are not the stereotypical, beret-clad Parisian artistes you might expect. Jean-Benoit Duncknel and Nicholas Godin look, in fact, every inch the architect and teacher they once were. 100

Yet while the members of Air French Band may be exactly the same as last time they appeared on the cover of Muzik, the atmosphere of frenzied anticipation is entirely different. It may now be hard to imagine Paris as anything but the epicentre of stylish musical endeavour, but when 'Moon Safari' became 1998's essential soundtrack, the egocentric British music fan was still reeling from the realisation that French music din't begin and end with Serge Gainsbourg and Vanesea Paradis.

Suddenly, the smug sneering at the mere mention of Gallie pop was forgotten, and everyone wanted a slice of Francophile chic. Madonna's team of cred-scouts decided that a French producer would be the most appropriate to keep her name in the limelight, though a elapped-out copyist is all that even she could buy. And in the eye of this French storm, Air personified the seriously classy new chill out generation, confining potsmokers to their sofas and the chattering classes to their dinner tables on a scale that the sometimes toocool-for-school Mo' Wax label could barely have dreamed of a few years earlier.

In among the chaos, these two affable, unassuming late twentysomethings found themselves to be just about the coolest band on the planet. Who'd have thought it? Not Messrs Duncknel and Godin, that's for sure.

"People liked 'Moon Safari' for

Evens, then. Air appeal to just as wide an audience, but do so by chilling out while E,W & F are all about funkin' and groovin'. And how can Air hope to compete when they're only named after a single element, eh? Three years later and it's a whole different ball game for Nicholas and Jean-Benoit. With only the sullen and schizophrenic 'Virgin Suicides' soundtrack and a round of equally sullen interviews to fill the gap, the pair's second album proper arrives in a climate where people are once again grasping for something that little bit different, that little bit grander. With '10,000 Hz Legend', that's exactly what they're going to get.

Opening with the smooth, sleek hip hop beats and moody textures of 'Electronic Performers', the album is an astounding leap forward from 'Moon Safari'. Traversing country-tinged melancholia, orchestral moodiness and spiky, progged-out psychedelia, it's an album that sounds like nothing else you'll hear this year – or, indeed, like anything the band have ever done before.

"We are no longer naïve," declares Godin, sipping mineral water in a plush London hotel bar full of the well-to-do business types who bought 'Moon Safari' in their droves. "We are men now. We feel stronger. We know what concepts we want to follow now, and I think that in some of the music we are more extreme. We know that we can be more discreet because everyone knows us, especially in England now, so we can be what we want: a kind of special underground band."

The 30 year-old Godin is the more earnest of the two, and certainly the more talkative. Perhaps his mastery of English is more refined than Duncknel's. Godin is also a bit of a thinker, considering every answer with the air of someone who is about to write a lengthy dissertation on the subject. Jean-Benoit, however, is more unpredictable – distracted and uninterested one minute, wildly animated the next. Both seem genuinely surprised at the mark that 'Moon Safari' has left in the psyche of music lovers. So much so, in fact, that it almost seems as if '10,000 Hz Legend' has been deliberately designed to shake up preconceptions.

"I do wonder what the reaction will be," admits Jean-Benoit, a mischievous grin playing around the corners of his mouth. "It is interesting to wait for. We don't know the reasons why people like 'Moon Safari'. I'm afraid that some elements from 'Moon Safari' are not on this new album, and maybe it was these elements that people liked about Air. I think that some people will have a fantasy when they hear the album – maybe the girls, like in some Prince video, will be very affected by the emotion of the music, but I'm sure that some people enjoy that. It is like reading a book; you are in a strange universe with no limits of imagination. I'm sure that it will be hard for people to be ready to listen to this."

While the 'Virgin Suicides' soundtrack may not sound like '10,000 Hz Legend', the similarities in mood are hard to deny. In the likes of 'How Does It Make You Feel' and 'Sex Born Poison' the same bitter-sweet melodrama, the same tearful energy runs rampant. If the euphoric peaks of their debut reflected a band giddy with the prospect of imminent success, the follow-up seems to indicate that it isn't all quite as much fun as they anticipated.

"It is never like the first time," shrugs Nicholas. "But each album needs to be different, because... we have a more interesting life like that. If we did something the same, people would just say "oh, it's not as good as 'Moon Safari'."

What do they think of 'Moon Safari' in retrospect? "It was so sweet, and very naïve," Jean-Benoit reflects. "It was very innocent. I understand why people put it on when they are having their dinner. It puts a good perfume in the room, y'know. This time round, they'll have to concentrate."

So is '10,000 Hz Legend' the opposite of 'Moon Safari's cheerful magic Moog ride?

"No – it is not the opposite, it is just another way," Nicolas objects. "The first revolution for us was to do some lyrics, and to make some stories. This album is more sexual, I think, too. It deals with some fantasies that we had. It's more extreme. If 'Moon Safari' was a dream, this was a deeper dream that has nightmares in it too."

One thing that hasn't changed, however, is the

having dinner and making love to

pair's astonishment at how often they are filed as a dance act, when the truth is far more complicated.

"It's strange," agrees J-B. "I was not aware that such a slow dance existed! I think perhaps it is because people who are into dance music are interested in electronic sounds."

It's not all just talk, either. Though they have often expressed an enjoyment of house music, they seem almost entirely disconnected from current club trends. They've never heard of UK garage ("is that like house?"), but they're big fans of r&b ("We love the beats!"). Indeed, the only typically 'dance' act they big up during the whole interview is, predictably enough, their Parisian compadres Daft Punk. (Nicolas: "I think 'Discovery' is going to be huge, because it's very, very different."). They seem equally perplexed, though, at the suggestion that '10,000 Hz Legend' has hints of the Radiohead about it.

"Fuck!" chortles a mortified Duncknel. "Maybe it's the production. I think that this album is far more electronic than 'Moon Safari', so. ..."

Pigeonholes aside, there's one aspect of '10,000 Hz Legend' that everyone can agree on: sex. From the sheer rudeness of the blow-job tribute track 'Wonder Milky Bitch' through to the unrequited lust coursing through the very fibres of 'Lucky And Unhappy', the whole album is infused with a libidinously expressed sexual charge.

"Moon Safari was erotic, 10,000 Hz is pomographic," smirks Nicolas. "That's the difference. It's strange that people liked 'Moon Safari' for having dinner and making love to. Those are the two things that French people are interested in, y'know? I hope it will go on for this one."

Nonetheless, while the pair's rampant libido courses through the album's entirety, it is not the album's raison d'etre. If albums are the summation of experience, then '10,000 Hz Legend' is the view from a band who've thrown themselves into the brain-numbing rigours of touring just as hard as any cock-rock band. The experience reached its peak during a one-month jaunt around the US – the first time that either Godin or Duncknel had experienced Uncle Sam's unique pleasures first hand.

"For this album, we were influenced by America," admits Godin. "You can feel it. It is a vision of America. That's why there are some nightmares in it, and some very dark stuff."

Aptly for a band who – this time around – seem hell-bent on destroying what they see as a kitsch and playful image, they admit to being most inspired by the US of A's most smog, drugs and weirdness ridden port of call – Los Angeles.

"We like LA a lot," explodes Dunknel, suddenly springing into life. "It is very exotic, very strange. It is a very timeless town, nothing is old, nothing is new. Everything is just on its way. It is the opposite of France, which makes it very interesting."

"New York is very much European, but LA is like outer space!" gushes Godin, his studied poise suddenly vanishing. "American people have filled the space and they've put all their computers and technology into it. We were inspired by its kind of lazy atmosphere – the concept of lazy hippies, but with computers. It is interesting."

Indeed, '10,000 Hz Legend' deserves a place next to your battered and rock-burned Pink Floyd albums for more than just its sound. Air have recorded – whisper it – a concept album. The grandiose, future-retro result has taken them emphatically beyond the kitsch sentiments of 'Sexy Boy' or 'Kelly Watch The Stars', into a darker world of sex, dreams, ecology and, er, being in a radio.

"One of the concepts for the album is that we are in a radio," confirms Godin, matter-of-factly. "We want to give the people some quality waves of good music, and new music. It comes from our love of the radio stations in Los Angeles."

The album's sound most obviously manifests itself on the sinuous, almost Kraftwerkian machine odes of 'Electronic Performers' and the mellifluous 'Radio Number 1', though it also filters into the glorious, 2001: A Space Odyssey style, sci-fi

A fairly high mark, really, but that's inevitable when you listen to the classical/ rock fusion on tracks like 'Don't Be Light' and 'Radian'. Alas, Sky fall at the final hurdle for the technical discrepancy of 'not being any good'.

N: "We are fascinated by special experiences – like near-death experiences. It gives you some distance, because you realise how big things are, and how little you are. We never had one, but we would like to have one!"

melodrama of 'Don't Be Light' and 'Radian'.

"We are interested in the gaps between people's expectations of technology and the reality," Godin points out. "In everybody's imagination, we would have cars that fly and go to space for holidays in 2001, but it's a common fact that nothing happens like that, which is disappointing. But if I realised that if you go inside yourself, the mystery of human inspiration is bigger than the mystery of the universe."

He pauses for a moment before unleashing a stream of quintessentially French, stream-ofconsciousness philosophising worthy of footie intellectual Eric Cantona.

"I think now that the development of human beings on Earth looks more like a cancer, or a disease, than a progress in space. It looks more like a global pollution where we are destroying ourselves. This science fiction vision of nice humanity, very well-organised with technology is not real."

So it's a pessimistic album then. . .

"No, it's not pessimistic, because we still feel

optimistic, but we wanted to have a more developed range of emotion," Godin emphasises. "'Moon Safari' deals with 'okay, I want to space out and listen to great music', and we wanted to develop the emotions we were putting into the music. We wanted to record the love, the sexual love that you can feel for a woman and the fantasy. When you are shy, and you are forced to reveal your love to a lover, sometimes you don't care."

He searches for something more specific.

"We are inspired by the fact that when people go to church to sing, and there is all the love and the races are all together. The songs are about love, the love of Jesus. We liked this concept, we like the atmosphere of the church. That's why some of the songs are written like that – so we are influenced by Jesus Christ, I think!"

That mischievous grin reappears.

"We have a vision of a new, modern Jesus Christ doing a special internet site, reading about love and enjoying the power of the internet!"

In the end, though, whether you think it's a

pseudo-progressive rock workout, a post-modern eclectic masterpiece that defies classification, or simply some of the classiest, most refined music you've heard in a while, all that matters is that, despite a first run-through that may sound unfamiliar, this is 100% Air.

"This album is very personal," Godin agrees. "We didn't plan anything. You make songs until you feel that they all make a beginning, middle and an end. If you don't have this feeling, you go on composing in the studio. It needs to be like eating a dinner – you have a starter, main course and dessert. It's all about balance."

Even more importantly, it evidently doesn't matter how many of the Chardonnay-swilling cocktail party set are shed from the fanbase when '10,000 Hz Legend' hits the streets. As Godin observes before Muzik leaves the band to the tender mercies of Harpers & Queen, "I think we have it in us to be a long term band. I think the challenge for us is to be getting older, and getting even more broadly different. We have to keep changing the vibe."

Orbital

Hartnoll brothers back for album number six to mixed Muzik reactions

IF YOU'LL EXCUSE the

allusion, Orbital are a bit of an enigma these days. Starting out life as an all-dancing, all-not-singing advert for the M25, London brothers Phil and Paul Hartnoll took the template laid out by Kraftwerk and Derrick May and pushed it into sweaty clubs and tents all around the world. But in the words of lan Pooley, things change. Where once Orbital soared, now they skim around the edges of techno mediocrity, lining up collaborations with Tom Baker and Leonardo Di Caprio along the way. Even Satan would balk at that one.

So when did the madness dissipate? Through the hazy glow of nostalgia, Orbital's back catalogue reads like a must-have collection of dancefloor gems. 'Belfast' captures that watching-the-sun-rise-in-a-field acid house E-uphoria like no other track, 'The Naked And The Dead' is a racheting, tribal trance anthem and 'Chime' is still powerful enough to light up half of London. The Chemical Brothers still rate Orbital's second eponymous album (the brown one) as one of the most important dance albums ever. And they're probably right.

It's hard to imagine the same excitement erupting over 'Altogether', though. Tackling the 'Doctor Who' theme was questionable enough. Calling up David Gray to warble over 'Illuminate' is like Ladytron inviting Snap's Turbo B to add his inimitable 'rapping' to their next single. What next? A remix for bad-haired indie sensations Toploader?

Of course, like any Orbital album, 'The Altogether' has its moments. New single 'Funny Break (One Is Enough)' is Orbital near their best,

melding a pop melody to the sigh of family friend Naomi Bedford. Similarly, 'Oi!' resurrects the acid house ambition of 'Jack Your Body' and force-feeds it to a hungry crowd at Elements. Which is a good thing, obviously.

'The Altogether' is slick, selfassured and has its melodic moments, but it captures a group in decline. If it's raw, unfettered energy you're after, try hunting down the latest Timo Maas slate instead. **Ralph Moore**



ONCE A GROUP have

been around for a certain number of years, knocking them becomes almost irresistible. After all, every act have certain trademarks to their sound, and by the time they come around to their sixth album, the very facets that drew you to a band in the first place can often make them repugnant.

Thankfully, Orbital still have a long way to go before they reach that stage. 'The Altogther' is an assured selection of tracks that even outstrips 1999's 'Middle Of Nowhere', painting as it does on a far broader canvas than that album's slightly onedimensional production.

'Tootled' and 'Tension', for example, are more organic and breakbeat-fuelled than anything the brothers Hartnoll have recorded for years, while the serene, austere beauty of 'Shadows' and 'Last Thing' recalls the symmetrically precise beauty of 'Snivilisation' and 'Insides'.

What really makes this album, though, is the fact that the Hartnolls' ability to surprise

remains firmly intact. Take 'Oi', for example. Old skool acid lines wiggle beneath parped-out brass and a sampled Ian Dury screaming "Hit me" to create probably the most overtly housey track Orbital have ever committed to vinyl. Then there's 'Funny Break (One Is Enough)', which sounds like Clannad if they made dance music and were any good. There are even some guitars on the Penguin Café Orchestra-sampling 'Waving Not Drowning' that will get all but the most sceptical listener in an

unaccountably good mood. Indeed the only moment of bleakness is when David Gray's hoary tones grate the ears on 'Illuminate'. And even that would have been a great track if sung by anyone half decent.

Not to worry, though. The main thing to remember is that Orbital not only remind you how good the 'Dr Who' theme is - but they can make you dance to it as well. What more do you need? John Hall

Many-legged, highly hyped Antipodean groove machine deliver in sampledelic spades

IT'S not often that an Antipodean dance act makes a big impact on these shores, but after remixing Badly Dressed Boy and being selected as the only remixers on the new Manic Street Preachers' single, suddenly The Avalanches are trailing a breathless, salivating press in their wake. And not without justification. 'Since I Left You' deftly straddles the indie/dance divide. Their block party layered mix technique is one of hip hop's oldest traditions, yet there are enough rough and ready beats, toothy guitars, second hand goods and defiantly quirky moments to keep them under the broad umbrella of anarchic rock 'n' roll.

The Avalanches are production artistes, knowing instinctively that an album is a broad canvas on which they can paint their vision in bold strokes. Following the epic example of Coldcut's 'Journeys By DJ' and David Holmes' Essential Mixes, they establish a narrative thread and pursue it throughout the length of the album's 18 tracks, moving through juddering thunderfunk lunacy, willful opacity, naked soul and impish humour without skipping a beat. By the time they reach 'Frontier Psychiatrist', a kind of maniacal, foaming-at-the-mouth peak has been achieved.

Taking a leaf out of the dusty book of psychedelia, this album sounds like something Jimi Hendrix might have produced if he'd had decks and a sampler. Horses whinny on the downbeat, street hydrants gush cascades of samples and the cultural heat haze of the late 20th Century shimmers by. Like a crooked but beautiful smile, this album is unusually pleasing. Claire Morgan Jones

LIKE their French chill counterparts Air, Zero 7 are utterly essential in this era of post-club spliffage. Ambitious without being vicious, their cool take on ambience is sleeker and smarter than anything Alex Paterson could come up with these days. Almost as inventive as The KLF circa 'Chill Out', it's little wonder Gilles Peterson has jumped on the Zeros with such ferocity. That two humble studio bods from Nottingham could come up with something so enormous is a testament to both their production expertise and their soul.

You only need to hear their remixes of Radiohead and Terry Callier to know where they're coming from. Blissful yet clubbased, it's hard to believe that 'Simple Things' is only their debut album. But don't be fooled into thinking that we're in 'Little Fluffy Clouds' territory. Though 'I Have Seen' and 'Give It Away' are smooth as a baby's bottom, if it's fluff-free beats you're after, just listen to the edgy hip hop drama of 'Simple Dreams'. Better still, check the heart-rending passion that bleeds messily all over 'Distractions' or 'Destiny': it makes D'Angelo look like Terence Trent D'Arby. THE fact that Blur's Damon Albarn might actually be seen as cool outside of Kingdom Indie in 2001 would have seemed unbelievable only six months ago. Indeed, the only clue was a slightly bizarre appearance at the Notting Hill Carnival with rising UK garage star Ed Case, something that suddenly makes all kinds of sense when you hear the booty-shaking remix of 'Clint Eastwood' that propelled the track to the Top Five.

The concept, of course, you're probably familiar with – that Gorillaz are a team of disaffected malcontents who only actually exist in the paintings of Tank Girl artist Jamie Hewlett. Lock the doors, shutter the windows and tell your children reassuring and/or cautionary tales. And if T Power and Photek are providing the house-influenced rapier and Panacea a lump of 2x4 with nails through it, then the more purist drum & bass sound of Stakka & Skynet is a shiny aluminium baseball bat - concussive and deadly, but sculpted and elegant too. That's what 'Confield' sounds like too. For the record, and for those who don't know/remember, their first album, 'Incunabula', had sweet little melodies amid the chaos, but those have long gone. Autechre don't surprise any more - the only shocking thing they could do would be a pop album - but their faithful following will enjoy this, serious and stoned in darkened rooms. PLACE the entire back catalogue of Warp and Rephlex in a white hot crucible and smelt it into a fine but very potent dust. Then you might get closer to understanding why so many are compelled to produce endless variations on braindance's timehonoured themes. The lessons of UK garage have not been ignored it seems, as numbers like John B's 'Diversify' do just that. adding looser-limbed moves to d&b's repertoire. The junglist revival continues apace. (JH)

Rome resident Santos, who hit the Top 10 with 'Carnels', fires out a dementedly energetic exercise in metallic drilling noises, hip-wrigglin' rhythm, tinklin' jazz piano and firin' techno attitude. The B-side is dark, funky and moody.

Annie Nightingale: "I wish I'd made this, it sounds like a Formula One chainsaw. Oh yeah, this is very good, a lovely ironhand-in-a-velvet-glove bass. I like this better than 'Camels' actually.'

X-Press 2

Muzikizum (Skint)

One of the year's most eagerly anticipated records so far (round here, at least). Beedle, Rocky & Diesel's singular return on Skint is certainly going to be unavoidable on every floor where progressive tribal beats and tough-edged house are causing folk to sweat. Chantitnow - "MUZIKIZUM!" They even spelt it right!

Annie Nightingale: "Ooh, I like this, it's giving me shivers down my legs. This is a pleasure. When you play a tune like this out you think to yourself, 'Oh fuck, how am I going to follow that?'." ک ک ک ک

House Of Glass

Disco Down (Azuli)

She wants to "disco down to the morning light". Don't we all, lover. A doublepack of throbbingly cheerful fun from Bini & Martini who understand how to make disco for 2001 - tough but still retaining a poppy edge (consequently already a Numero Uno hit in Italy, Sweden and Spain). Antoine Clamaran chops some of the melody away in favour of dubbier renderings.

Annie Nightingale: "I tell you what this makes me think of. When I go on holiday in Sicily, it's in this nice house next door to a hotel where they do aerobics in the pool at 11 o'clock in the morning and they're really loud. You haven't been to bed till 5am and you have to listen to somebody shouting numbers in Italian over. . well, it'll be this track, I bet you."

Plaything

Into Space (Manifesto) As Muzik predicted at the beginning of the year, the Italians are all over everything like a rash, due mostly to their innate understanding of dance-pop, both good and terrible. This veers towards the latter but will undoubtedly be massive. Luca Moretti & Ricky Romanini (aka remixers Triple X) invent epic disco-trance (?!) using a hunk of Sheila B Devotion's 'Spacer' alongside some other less salubrious samples. Public Domain bring out the trance and Hatiras does his filter-distortion thang

Annie Nightingale: "A San Antonio smasheroonie, I think, don't you? Take any old thing that comes along, put it through a computer and see

what comes out."

Eminem's posse - Bizarre, Kon Artis, Proof, Kuniva and Swift – along with the lad himself, let rip with the first 'knowledge' from their forthcoming album, 'Devil's Night', 'Shit On You' is low key filth which

doesn't stand up too well when compared to familiar B-side 'Under The Influence' It's already in the charts as this goes to press, but much as we still think the boy is great, this isn't as good as Gonzales 'Come On You'

Annie Nightingale: "I go on and on about Eminem. This is so funny-is

there a poster with it? [There is]] wan to get it signed! Eminem raps not on the last syllable but on the one before last. Once you know that you can see how his rhymes are different. It's not going to be A-listed on Radio 1 but kids love him - he swears, the naughtiest thing you can do... he's a pussycat.



Annie Nightingale: "I don't see how a combination like this can allow things to go so wrong. Voyager's mix is okay, but it isn't what I thought it'd be."

Norman Bass

How U Like Bass? (Substance) Horns, crowds screaming, Hi-Gate-ish synth squeals, extensive usage of the word motherfucking', wah-wah bassline, 909 build-ups, nuclear sirens, rush-inducing whooshes - this has got the lot. A right stomper with Krupp steel production values that brook no dissent.

Annie Nightingale: "There's nothing very unusual about this but it works. I can't resist it - that frog noise! It's very commercial and huge but I could play this - really brash and unpretentious."

Mr G

Get It Got It Good EP (Defected) G Flame and Mr G have long been a staple of serious house sets that verge on techno territory - everyone from Mrs Wood to Terry Francis. Now separated from Advent partner Cisco Ferreira, Colin McBean heads down onto four sides of pure tracky mixability. Faceless housification at its finest.

Annie Nightingale: "This is an almost

edible kind of sound which I'd like to get if I ever went into production: funky with a hint of the future. It's sensual and erotic, which is why girls will dance to it. I'd play it on the radio."

Skynet UK Featuring Alex Way Of The Wave (Whoop!)

Van Dyk and Fontaine's boxes are packed with this tune, so the press release tells us probably hundreds of copies which they spin back to back while crowds suck ketamineflavoured soap and stick Mitsis up their rear. Mental, mate, fucking radio rental. Actually

it's cheerful though poorly produced vocal trance to which the Surge remix gives a hard house edge. Disposable.

Annie Nightingale: "No, no, sorry, not trying hard enough. It says in the press release that there's a killer hook-where is it?'

Jose Nunez

Harmonizer (Sondos)

Endlessly and nigglingly tedious, but like the monotony of 'Get Get Down' it will probably be massive. An incredibly simple, Parkinsons-inducing synth riff revolves endlessly until you think the asylum's calling. Whereupon a load of 'Feel My Drums' noises pop up. Big, our experts inform us.

Annie Nightingale: "This is not going to be a massive hit like Norman Bass but it's got atmosphere, a hint of menace, something a tad more sinister. It's taking us to a dark place where something's going to do something nasty to you. From behind."

Ink

Kaos Theory EP

(Renegade Hardware) A mixed four-hitter from Metalheadz boy Ink on Muzik's favourite nasty junglist massive imprint. This lot never forget their hardcore or, indeed, their darkcore, as is born out by the shrieking vocal of 'Need You', the sinister horror film grinding of Twisted Anger's 'Murder Ink' remix, and the grunting yelps on 'Kaos Theory'. Baaaaadl

Annie Nightingale: "This is entertaining. A lot of people would come back from clubs and actually like something such as this to listen to in their room [Yeah, right. People like Peter Sutcliffe, maybe - Ed.]. I won't have things that are too chilled out on my show."

Raven Maize

The Real Life (7)

Yet more from the apparently never-unused studios of Dave 'Joey Negro' Lee. This time the enterprising fellow has regurgitated his oldie, a sliver of 'Bohemian Rhapsody' over a disco-house beat and added Numan-esque synths for good measure. Curiously, this unlikely re-jigged combo works in an Alan Thompson sort of way, with acappellas, dubs and beats aplenty.

Annie Nightingale: "NO!"

Double 99

Freekazoid (Satellite)

An unexpected move for Double 99. which is presumably the point. 'RIP Groove' was undoubtedly one of the essential speed garage tunes of yore, but probably wisely, the duo have dumped that style. What we

have instead is a curiously unappealing electro-house hybrid with mediocre mixes from Pete Heller and Chris Simmonds.

Annie Nightingale: "A bit weird being called 'Freekazoid' after that Freq Nasty tune was called exactly the same thing, but I like this and have already played it on radio. The 'Pete Heller's Freaked Dub' mix is the one."

Marco Zaffarano

Weitklang (Nukleuz) Zaffarano, a survivor from the days when trance meant Eye Q and Sven Vath was God. signs up to the new regimen of Nukleuz hard-house-tech-trance, which no one has yet come up with a neat sobriquet for. The Speech Lab Remix' is rather unpleasant bantamweight cheesiness but Zaffarano's remix and original cut through the nonsense with a Teutonic scythe.

Annie Nightingale: "Interesting in an industrial sort of way, kind of alright but not special enough. A techno dirge."

Starecase

The Hopeless EP (Hope)

A title that's just begging for a negative review. It's fortunate, then, that General Midi and AI 'Eels' Watson turn in four tracks of rumbustious rolling thunder which rub sweaty basslines all over you. Pure progressive bounce with a James Holden mix for good measure. Annie Nightingale: "You can't judge

this immediately, it's one of those records that you have to bear with. I'm enjoying thinking about this on the airwaves travelling round the world, very spacey. Yeah, good."

Rhythm Masters

Heavy Soul (Black & Blue)

Nothing to do with Paul Weller's stodgy alburn of the same name. Sadly, this is even worse. The RM lads have obviously been damaged by big beat down in sunny Brighton because this comes on like the Freestylers brandishing guitars and munching fists full of steroids. Thug-beat! An unlikely change in direction not aided by so-so mixes from Steve Mac and Piece Process.

Annie Nightingale: "This is not going anywhere."

Peak (NuCamp)

You never know what to expect of Dino Lenny-from narco-anthem 'Cocaine' to disco efforts with Romina Johnson, he's always up to something different. On 'Peak' he gets together with his mate Sante Pucello and boggles our minds with harsh, computer-generated electric guitar action. Hendrix house, indeed, and not for everyone. 'Stretch's Rotunda Remix' removes some of the fret-wankery

Annie Nightingale: "The guitar noise is really good, I've never seen anyone do that before. I'd like to play this to Andrew Innes [of Primal Scream] because it's up my street and it would be up his too. Very good indeed."

Bedrock

Beautiful Strange EP (Bedrock) John Digweed, alongside Muzik's latest office pin-up, the Noddy Holder-alike Nick Muir, drops more faceless techy prog gear Digweed is a fine DJ but this kind of stuff is inexplicably overrated by the back-slaphappy dance media (that's us, kids). Rui Da Silva's mix is plodding tedium incarnate while Voyager inject a touch of trancey charm. Moonface is in there somewhere tco. Oh, how close to (oh-so-unhip) Goa trance it all sounds.

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MUZIK'S SINGLE OF THE MONTH

Slam

Lifetimes (Soma) Despite mixed feelings in the Muzik offices about the swooping male vocal, overall we reckon this is a winner. No dubs or other versions as yet but the original surfs aloft on a

hoovering bassline while a string section inflicts addictive melod damage. Vague flavourings of Felix Da Housecat aside, this wipes out the taste of Slam's recent, rather mediocre UNKLE collaboration and harks back to their highest peaks.

Annie Nightingale: "Absolutely beautiful, not just a dance record-it's on a different level completely to what we've been listening to so far. When I was three I heard a violin on the radio and burst into tears. I still feel that right now. This Is for everybody."

Journey Man DJ Can You Dig It? (Neo)

We reckon this is someone we know under a pseudonym... but we can't put our finger on whom, exactly. Neo finally kick off the let'smake-a-few-bob blues and release some tasty nuggets. A rattling, dark 'percussive chugger' (as they say) with Cut La Roc doing dubby breaks duties.

Annie Nightingale: "One or two echoes of big beat here but there's enough going on to make it a bit more memorable. It's going somewhere tucked away, not necessarily dancefloor, but it's still definitely late nightlistening. Cut La Roc's mix may be more commercial, but I like them both.' -

Airheadz

Stanley (Here I Am) (AM:PM) Utterly piss-poor 'reply' to Eminem's 'Stan'. Two career producers, Leigh Guest and Andrew Peach, one of whom was in Double Trouble, put out a jokey trance white based on 'Stan'. They couldn't get the rights to the Dido sample and should have left it at that. but instead revocalled it with a slightly different tune, and hey presto-dog vomit Money banked, credibility shot.

Annie Nightingale: "What's the thinking behind this? It sounds like it's been sung by his missus underwater. I think she's been caught in an air pocketshe's still in the boot! [Snorts] Stanley. here I am... it's hilarious! [Roars with laughter] Rubbish!"

Funkmaster Flex Featuring Faith Evans Good Life (Loud)

A sonal Three minutes and 49 seconds of luuuurrrve from the man like the Flex. Oochhh, sweeeeetnessssss. Are we soulful enough? Nah, but seriously-Gwen Guthrie samples, Faith Evans' languorously sensual delivery, lyrics that say something, an 'Explicit Mix'. You KNOW what we're saying, girlfriend-dabomb, etc, etc...

Annie Nightingale: "This isn't

something I can get involved with but I can appreciate it in a second hand sort of way. This style is not something that drags me in. Eminem may cross all barriers but this doesn't."

Marco Bailey

Kombatonen EP (Electrix) It takes guts to be Billy Nasty-leaving the obvious cash-lined route behind and heading into techno waters. Now he's dragged in Belgium FUSE regular Bailey to create four electro creakers for Tortured's experimental sister label Electrix. Weatherall, Dave Clarke and Nasty should attempt a collaboration. This is good, if not quite outstanding.

Annie Nightingale: "I'm not antitechno but it doesn't work on my 4am Radio 1 slot, except maybe Dave Clarke's mix of Midfield General. This has got Daft Punk sounds in though, so points for breaking away from the classic techno sound."

Rocket

Revolution EP (Grayhound) DJ Garth from sunny San Fran brings down the darkness with the capable assistance of Eric James, Abassline moodier than Jack Dee and sleazier than Jordan's undies slithers along while someone mutters about revolution (naturally), and then a sizzling flute attack (no, really) arrives to add to the badness. Two leftfield oddities on the flip.

Annie Nightingale: "It seems to sample the same source as Subsonic Legacy's track 'Revolution' and it works again. I love the firework display effect in the background but I get a bit nervous when I hear flutes, they make me start thinking of Jamiroquai, It's a worry."

T-Bov

Monkey Spank (Sacred) Danny McMillan continues to carve an elegant niche for himself in the sprawling world of beatz. His are beatz of the more spacious kind, the Tavo kind, the Rennie Pilgrem-on-not-too-much-303 kind. T-Boy will shortly be releasing an album on McMillan's Sacred label but for now this slightly doomy chugger will surely do the trick.

Annie Nightingale: "This is more my cup of tea, like TCR. These records are very good at building - they keep you hanging around. I listen with two sets of ears - radio and playing out - I think this could work for both."



Transa

Rotation/Escada (Hook) The Aberdeen trance monster Hock, recently relocated to London, put out a

newie by brothers Dave and Brendan Webster, also previously trance monsters. This two-pronged attack, however, sees the whole kaboodle head Sasha-wards at high speed. Nothing exceptional, but perfectly 'rounded' fodder for the modern dancefloor. Geddit?!

Annie Nightingale: "You know when you're looking for that party out in the middle of nowhere and you can actually see the green lasers piercing the sky? That low thump you get on the wind as you park the car? This sounds like that."

Jan Johnson Flesh (Perfecto)

Long term BT cohort Johnson (she sang 'Remember', remember) teams up with her old spar to cause our ears a great deal of cringing. Despite being fans of Brian Transeau's mid-Nineties pomp-house (all that fluttering classicism and excess somehow suited for a while), the sweeping yet curdled bombast on offer here just sounds soggy. Mixes by Oakey, Tilt and Tiesto.

Annie Nightingale: "I actually like Perfectol Jan Johnson's from Salford and so are my family so I'm going to benice. No. it's not me. Oh dear.'

Terence Fixmer

Warm/ Body Pressure (International Deejay Gigolos) Robot techno from DJ Hell's Munich label, which has long known its rosy apples from its, er. . . mouldy ones. This is cyber-disco for Terminators and those squid androids out of The Matrix. Two fierce foot-blisterers which should be doing Bugged Out damage somewhere near closing time.

Annie Nightingale: "There are girl tunes and boy tunes - this is definitely a boy tune, very short hair nodding, not even dancing, a bit too speedy. Terence Fixmer may be French but he's not Air or Etienne De Crecy, is he?"

'Muestra Me' is the standout, coming across like a cross between those Carl Craig mixes of Tori Amos and Joe Claussell's reworking of Ten City's 'All Loved Out'. What were your initial aims when you started the label?

"To release good quality, independent underground music. Not to compete with anything else, just to make music we love. Musically, we're quite broad-reaching, from Latin to deep house and soulful vocals. Who currently records for your imprint? "Well, I don't sign artists for long term deals, but Spen, Miguel Migs, Tedd Patterson, Seattle nu-breeder Brent Laurence and Tim Trace all release records on Black Vinyl. Other artists we are working with include The Groove Assassins from Sheffield, DJ Chus, David Penn from Madrid and Paulo Rocha from Portugal. **Describe Black Vinyl** in six words or less. "It's music from the heart." (RM)

The 'Many Shades of Black Vinyl' compilation is out now. You can catch Alan at Soul Movement on the first Friday of every month at The Clinic in Soho, London

Singles

DJ Sneak

Smokey Hill St (Magnetic) After kick-starting the whole disco loop thing way back in the day, Sneak has been keeping his head down while the whole filter thing went Cheesy Peas. This relentless, driving groove shows how creative, fresh, twisted and dark things can be when in the hands of a master. Chicago still does it better. (TF)

Autokat

Gimme The Beat (Yoshitoshi) Fab hard 'n' funky prog from our own Gordon Kave (not the one from 'Allo 'Allo). Tough, tribal drums push along the track nicely, with cool sounds and a great hook. A quality British track that stands up with the rest of them. (TF)

José Nunez

Harmonizer (Sondos)

On José's new label, this sees a real departure from the trad Subliminal sound to something much more Tenaglia than Morillo in origin. Not much more than a damn fine, funky clav hook, great drums and a hooky lil' vocal sample - simple, understated, yet essential. (TF)

Mr G Get it, Got it, Good EP (Defective) A sharp left turn for Defective, home of the Saturday night party groove. Mr G takes things harder and funkier, twisting disco

loops, toughening up the rhythms and working the tracks as far as they can go. Nothing really new for Mr G, but a step in the right direction for Defective. (TF)

Floris

Shake It (white label) Haven't got a clue who are behind Floris, but Inland Knights step up and work that Lolleatta Holloway/Carl Craig thing to good effect with what sounds like a bit of 'Sandy' and a cool sax solo thrown in to keep the party working. Dead cool. (TF)

Boogie Boy

Girl Of My Dreams (Azuli) The Stevie Wonder feeding frenzy comes to a head with the definitive version of 'Too High'. Out of the original soulboy stable, it's funky, hooky, groovy and soulful boogie wonderland indeed. (TF)

Harry 'Choo Choo' Romero

Beats Volume 2 (Subliminal) Long-awaited follow up to the first sensational DJ tool. Harsh, tribal beats; dark spoken vox and some moody breakdowns - nothing new, we know, but nobody does this big room thing better than Romero, and it fills that gap between the genres nicely. (TF)



Fertile Ground

Let The Wind Blow (Counterpoint)

The elusive Lex Blackmore (Blueboy) joins up with Nick The Record to become oneness of two' and provide cool jazz heads with a smooth house groove that they can bounce African guitars, soulful sax and a fab, warm female vocal over. One for the soulboys. (TF)

Mayaku

Mayaku's Theme (Wha? Roots, Belgium)

This twelve finds Mayaku recreating the type of groove that appeared on U-Star circa 1997. You know the type of thing: loose drums, flowing live bass and some fly keyboard and guitar solos. All with very heavy delay action. Our preference is the original 'Mayaku's Theme'. At 11 minutes, it's the perfect trippy number to warm up with. (KM)

DJ Jes

Musical Ethics EP (NRK) NRK's latest hot ticket comes from the mysterious DJ Jes. 'The Visit' heads the twelve with a warm house groove filled with tough beats, subtle keyboard pads and a moody haunting sax break. For those that require something a little tougher, flip to 'I've Fallen In Love (Remix)' for a hardassed tribal workout. (KM)

Various Artists

Trip Do Brasil (Rhythmix, France)

The second volume in this tasty series sees Doctor Rockit, Isolée and DJ Armand getting in on the action. Isolée provides the most sonically groovy message on the twelve with a live electronic Latin jam packed with wonderful sounds, scratching pads and oddly working rhythms, all tied together with his usual flair for funky-ashell keyboard solos. Herbert drops in with his usual swing-time kit - albeit in its midtempo easy-ish listening guise - while DJ Armand provides the most useful rotation with a solid tribal house workout. (KM)

Induceve

Jazz Chops EP (Classic) Classic's latest gives up four tracks of dirty dancefloor business from Induceve (Jesse Rose - best known for his work with Jamie Anderson - and David Taylor of Slip 'N' Slide act Solid Groove). 'Jazz Chops (No Hang Ups)' is the tune to check, a feisty, full-on beating with Sandy Rivera-style beats and twisted, cut-up jazz hooks. Loads of FX later and there's something amiss if your dancefloor's not full! (KM)

Petalpusher

Rely On Me

(Naked Music, USA) Naked unleash another wistful song with Si Brad style production. This one would melt in with all the others save for a tidy dub from Miguel Migs. Here he drops cuts of the vocal over his usual combo of tight beats and sweetly struck chords. Not his best, but better than that nonsense with Britney Spears. (KM)

Bah Samba

So Tired of Waiting (Nick Matar Mixes) (Estereo)

Nick Matar is DJ Pippi's co-resident at Pacha. Aside from that, he is from New York and has the kind of DUing credentials most people would die for. Expect a huge hit from this guy this year.

The Virus (white label)

No fluff, no frills, just pure niceness. Not one line of a song, didn't spot a big drop, but boy, oh boy (or girl, oh girl) this is pure heaven for a DJ (and an MC for that matter). EL B, formerly of Groove Chronicles, hits that spot with the snare like no other, and as much as the tune is a dub, it rolls and rolls, keeping you interested till it's finished. Front of the box stuff.

Maxwell D

Serious (Relentless)

Fresh from the Pay As You Go Cartel, ladies and gents, here's Maxwell D. Just giving this young MC the sort of intro he'll grow accustomed to if he keeps dropping tunes like this. A full MC track that's up there with the best of the rest. He's warning all and sundry not to let him get 'Serious', in an articulate, jovial manner, while not forgetting his east London roots. Quality.

Morgan & AC Burrell Tripping (Pure Silk)

After a slightly bemusing intro, this hard-steps straight to the front of the box. It's the dub mix that has me bubbling, featuring MC Scandalous who is definitely on form here. Check all the different elements: snares like EL B, a booming bass and some vocoder stuff out of the Eighties. Another of those dubs that is smashing clubland – you have to dance to it. Have to!

TJ Cases

One By One (Big Drop Remix) (Cut 'N' Play)

Prolific, consistent and hard-working. No, not Robbie Fowler, but another of our producers that we need to enthuse over. Master Cases is one of our finest and has here ventured into a territory quite new to him, a track fuelled more by the dancefloor than the song, on this version of it, at least. As the title of the mix implies, it's all about the clubland here – big bass, that calypso style kick drum and Kat Blu wailing over it like no other can. Check both mixes, one will be for you.

Sandy Rivera provides the darker mixes but if you prefer his dub mix then you need to find the Italian copy, as it's not been given a UK release.

Knuckleheadz

Jon Langford guides us through the choicest cuts in his designer record bag

"BUMPING along at 138bpm, the Mr Bishi mix of Ian M's 'Body Burnin" (Ov-dode) is a good funky number with all the Mr Bishi elements – real party time stuff. On a similar tip, the Alan Thompson remix of 'Let's Rock' by E-Trax on Tidy Trax does the business. The kids love bouncy tunes like these – and I guess I'm just a big kid at heart.

"I always play a few Knuckleheadz tunes in my set. Our take on 'Kick Up The Volume' from Justin Bourne (Honey Pot) is tough yet funky and it was good to get some good parts to use in the remix for a changel We've also done Beat Reality's 'Get Hooked' (Y2K) which is like our 'Dial M For Moquai' mix, though I think it's better. Luuurve the bassline.

"Nick Sentience's 'Ride The Groove' on Nukleuz is THE sound for 2001 if you don't like straight trance. It's raw. Or is that ROAR? Someone else to watch is Paul Glazby. His Vicious Circles label is superb – check out the Pants & Corset remix of 'Feel It' from **Eufex** to see what I mean.

"Last but not least, you either love or hate **Ingo**. Personally I find if you need some bouncy and banging hard house, his 'Pump The Pressure' (white label) is hard to beat."

Singles

Alan Thompson & BK Out There (Nukleuz)

Ben Keen's on a roll right now, as this cheeky collaboration with Alan Thompson testflies, taking Alan's Alter Ego style and delivering a tune that manages to be a lot of fun without being too obvious. The B-side 'Do Tha Do' is cool as funk, marrying disco licks and percussion tricks to a bumping b-line from heaven – one that will be in the box for months.

The Crow

What You're Lookin'? (Tidy Trax) There's a massive hype on this one, a dark and moody cut originally on the German Pulsive label and overshadowed here by the new UK remixes. Bulletproof add a gargantuan Paul Janes style bass to great effect, Lashes & Savage Versus Ingo tread the offbeat path, and Steve Thomas rides a menacing groove that builds superbly to a monstrous breakdown.

Revilo

Don't Stop (Y2K)

Licensed from Germany last year, and one you might recognise from the 'Welcome To The Club' album. Mr Bishi's remix of 'Don't Stop' could well be their finest hour - they keep the zany vocal and real drums in a monstrous breakdown driven by contagious buzzing synths that you'll be humming for days. Kicks like a mule, too.

llogik & M Ramone

Make A Bassline (Elasticman) Release number six from the Elasticman stable sees the crew on fine form. The 'Original Mx' is propelled by a big phat bubbling b-Ine, with acidic stabs and shimmering synths dropping in and out of the mix. The more energetic 'llogik Mix' is a bouncy, offbeat number that utilises more of the rap vox, adding ye olde hoover in its quirky breakdown. Take your pick.

Disco Brothers Let's Go (DP)

Two cats to keep an eye on this summer, Disco Brothers are dancing to a different beat. A squeiching bass and thudding kick underpin the crisply produced and clevery programmed 'Let's Go', which revolves around a lengthy breakbeat drop that works a treat on the floor. The remix is a variation on the theme, with more hoovers and less breakbeats.

Scoop

Drop It (Enriched) This caused a stir when it launched Enriched back in 1999, but sample clearance problems held up its onward march until now. New versions from Rich B (a marathon run picking up many familiar elements) and Alan Thompson's Alter Ego (a cheeky and bouncy affair emphasising the melodies) should finally see it get the attention it deserves.

Contact Assist

Human Resource (Medikal) "Check the rhythm coming straight from the mind" intones tune number three from the Medikal boys, a thunderous effort which beats you into submission with fierce kicks and a subsonic bass, before catchy synth riffs and a melodic hoover whip a beaming smile onto your face. Those who like it a little less raucous will find the 'CP Mix' satisfies their needs admirably.

Fiasco

Live In Bilbao (Sunrise, Holland)

Hot from Holand, and Edam-free, this little curio could blow up in the coming months. The 'Original Dub' is a dark, percussive affair that wears its techno influences on its sleeve yet could slot into sets across the board with ease. The 'E Craig Remix' takes the sharp stabs and builds a stomping new grocve around them, without the drums you might expect.

Madam Zu

Amun-Ra (Nile) The mysterious Madam Zu returns on Mohawk's sister label with a sinister pounder that's got more than a hint of Eastern promise – big drops with ethnic flavours collide with familiar vocal bites and snalling synths. 'Scared', meanwhle, adds a similar rhythm track and drops to a spocky but spritually charged vocal before a nagging synth hook takes over.

Jody Osman

40 (Cheeky Little Monkey)

I was handed this TP while visiting the very nice Cheeky bunch in Bournemouth. I'm not 100% certain that Jody Osman is the artist behind this double-header, but suffice to say, the record lives up to the club's name. Both tunes are brazen, offbeat bounders – the A-side builds nicely to a well-known old skool riff, and the tougher B-side samples Beats International, among others.

Squelch (Spot-On) We'll leave the 'it's not hard house'

A peak-time moment, with the more subtle 'Cloud 9 Mix' providing an equally sizeable alternative, with an extra breakdown.

The Captain

Blue Oyster (Tinrib)

The Tinrib classic with the wonderful "Darling, come here, fuck me up the... vocal is back, and it's bad. On the first of three remix twelves, Weirdo pumps up the tempo for a turbo-charged hard trancer that rocks hard, while the normally reticent Mr Bishi keep the 303s and plenty of gusto for a version which also rocks, though obvicusly not as hard as Mr Weirdo.

Justin Bourne

In Effect (Stimulant) Justin Bourne rides two bumpy house grooves similar to his recent Honey Pot effort. On 'In Effect', teasing synths, actic stabs and a 'work that beat' vocal bring us nicely to a hoovertastic drop, which erupts into an infectious riff. Hoover-free 'Scratch The Bass' wiggles as wonderfully – if you can't move to this

then you may be dead.

Fatboy Slim

Star 69 Remixes (Skint) DJ Godfather's bass-driven electro is quality enough, though still an acquired taste. Timo Maas' interpretation, however, is the funkiest, stankiest stone groove this side of the mothership: big in all the right places with a killer plano riff to boat. If Skint are trying to get their records back into the boxes of cutting edge DJs again, then this is the way to do it. Heavy like a Hero sandwich. With all the trimmings. Love it quick before you get sick of it.

Future Funk Squad

Beatfreaks (Default) Future Funk Squad are following in the footsteps of friends Stanton Warriors and Dee Kline. Named after the night of the same name, 'Beatfreaks' is a steppa slyle breakbeat garage workout with enough funk and drive to rock both arenas hard. A burgeoning production talent on a burgeoning scene and their best dancefloor bomb to date.

2 Sinners Siberia (2S2)

Siberia' is actually the B-side, but this humble scribe rates its Detroit-style deepness, tightly programmed beats and understated b-line as the winner. 2 Sinners have saved the best for the own label, but check out their recent offering on TCR for proof of their progress.

Beber & Tamra

Travelling On Remixes (Mob) Koma & Bones add to their growing reputation with a stunning darkside re-rub of Mob's fifth release, staying the right side of epic to keep the purists in their boxes for a while yet. Meat Katie houses things up on the flip. This biased label boxs cum reviewer loves it, but considered dancefloor opinion appears to back me up. So there.

Orbital

Funny Break (Plump DJs Remix) (ffrr) In which the Plump DJs add their chunky beats, renegade snares and dancefloor sensbillies to the Hartnol brothers' atmospherics. More control and less obvious pyrotechnics make this a better tune for this po-faced purist and possibly their best remix to date. Large, guy.

Various Artists TCR 50 Sampler 2 (TCR)

Dark, progressive breaks from Koma & Bones (on 'Morpheus') are the order of the day for TCR's 50th release celebrations, but this is not their best work of late, good as it is. Better still is the broody, 303 thunk of Breakneck's 'Atomic Flip' on the other side.

Dave Tipper

Bass specialists Fuel are back on the block – Dave Tipper tells us what's been going on

Describe your music style for the 21st century...

"Somewhere between breakbeat and electronica, but we could quite possibly venture out into other directions." What can we expect from Fuel this time around?

"We're launching a new brand of bass-fuelled breaks compilations called 'Sound Off' in April, coinciding with a tour of the same name. A vear of top tunes dancefloor bombs that will rip your gut out and implode your mind - and a sonic assault on every major city in Britain!" What's happening with the Fuel cars? "The cars have always been a major part of a Fuel night, from promoting the gig by destroying the streets with our sound, to being the sound system (or part of it) at the venue.

the sound system (or part of it) at the venue. This year universities and clubs across Britain will be introduced to the Fuel concept, cars, artists and sound. Liquid Injured Hearing for the masses!" **Tell us about your new artists...**

Si Begg as Buckfunk 3000; Cold Fusion Mafia – north Londoners who are more electronica driven, and US-based Salim Rafiq, who's more on the straight electro side of things."

BT Smartbomb

(Plump DJs Remix) (Nettwerk) Another high profile remix for Lee Rous and Andy Gardner sees the chubby formula funk in full effect once more. Perhaps because the original song isn't up to much, perhaps because I've just listened to their superior Orbital remix or perhaps because the space invader-onacid sound effects are sounding a little too familiar at the moment, this is a less daziing moment for two of the scene's brightest stars. Can't see a frugging dancefloor analysing things so anally somehow, so don't mind me.

Only Kismet

Game Boy (Terminalhead Remix) (Lemon Groove)

INCredible signings and one of the bestkept breakbeat secrets Terminalhead flex their production muscles in style. Followers of their sound will love the tight, electro-breakbeat snappy snares, the insistent bassline and their always intelligent handling of a vocal. Now let's have some of that original material the dancefloor deserves, chaps.

Reflex Featuring MC Viper Put Your Hands Up (Gusto)

The tune that launched a thousand copycat grooves rears its head again with MC Viper in tow to ride the riddm. 187 Lockdown/Nu Birth producers Julian Joseph and Danny Harrison master another style with a breakbeat garage pirate favourite that's been big for Messrs Pilgrem, Nasty, Kline, Warriors, Bias 'n' all for the last 12 months. Huge like Hattie Jacques.

Freq Nasty

Amped (Skint)

Freq Nasty's strength has always been to absorb the sounds, sights and smells of the dance world, mix them up and regurgitate them in his own style. Here, breakbeat, garage and the disco swing hinted at back in his 'Freq-a-zoid' days mash up the dance in a unique fashion. With his last track' Goose' rinsing prate radios every weekend, the Freq has successfully broadened his audience without compromising his vision. Wicked.

Buckfunk 3000 High Volume (Fuel)

Si Begg is one of those hugely talented enigmas, capable of great things yet equally capable of being as contrary as a Luke Vbert or Aphex Twin when it comes to confusing the dancefloor. 'High Volume' does both over two contrasting mixes, getting the eyes down, feet shuffling and brain working with Begg's unique sonic sorcery.

Dub Marines

Cayo La Luna (white label) 'What I Got' was one of our favourite breaks records of last year, and the



electronic funk of the Dub Marines is in full effect for this, their second TCR single. Rolling beats, a well-chosen Latin vocal and a hint of two-step programming gives this a fine, fluid funk feel.

Spec X Ray

Revamped Raver (Plastic Raygun)

A fillet of funk breaks from Cardiff's Plastic Raygun label. 'Revamped Raver' is disco party breaks, strings 'n' all, 'Shake It' invites you to do just that accompanied by a break-house-acid squelch, but only Vandal's electro break remix made this evebrow head skyward.

Danmass

Time To Kill EP (DMI)

Always good to see Danmass on vinyl and this EP of midtempo grooves fuses hip hop, guitar, dub, house, electro and metallic funk, which will please their regulars and introduce their path of beat righteousness to a new flock.

Scuba Z

Instant Whip (white label) With normal remixer ILS away on LP duty, Terminalhead are called upon to tidy up the mess left by the original song. Why this policy persists isn't for us to question, especially if the remixes are as good as this. Ho hum.

Rennie & Meat Katie Rubba (W9Y)

Rennie Pigrem and Mark Pember hold a summit meeting in the bowels of the TCR studio. Possibly referring to the easy elastic funk on display, 'Rubba' is the bottom-heavy result. As you would expect, a combination of tech-dub-house-breaks of spiendid proportions ensues. The 4/4 mix on the flip is wicked too.

Dirty Hany is on remix duties. Smoking! (LF)

Natious

Lift & Another World (Bluestone) Tim Ratcliffe is definitely a name to watch out for as the year progresses. With favourable feedback for his 'Thrust 1+2' tracks, and continued high profile DJ support, it is only a matter of time before he goes bigger than Noel and Danny out of Hear'Say's eyebrows combined. This has more energy than a sheep tossed onto overhead povertnes. This is baaad! (LF)

Vincent de Moor

Fly Away (VC/Combined Forces) Vincent de Moor, or Vinny, as we like to call him, has written a string of club hits, possibly the best known being 'Flowtation'. Hailing from America – the Big Apple, to be precise – Andy Wedeen, Frank Lamboy and singer J-Cee are going to storm the UK and Europe with their euphoric style of music. Members Of Mayday

10 In 01 (Deviant)

Sounding like some crazy religious cult that worships Derrick May's cock, the curiously named Members Of Mayday are a German institution. For the purposes of this release, Westbarn perned the original version, and then Paul Van Dyk turned in three kicking remixes. '10 In 01' celebrates, wait for it, 10 years of the Mayday festival. Do not confuse this with May Day bank holday, which is a rather boring, laid back affair, this is a world famous music festival [Cheers – Ed.]. (LF)

Aria

One (Fire)

Yes it's back again! That awesome classic US progressive house release from yesteryear has been picked up by the superb Fire, remixed, repackaged and re-released. For those who missed the original it's here in full glory with an incredible remix from the mind-bending Voyager. Typically, they rock, with their unmistakably powerful yet bizarre rhythms topped with the bassline of the year! An absolute must! (P)

Nukem Versus Chab

Deepset Level (Cyber) Cyber are on the brink of something very big and Nukem and Chab could be the guys to take them there. 'Deepset Level' is almost too simple. The groove sucks you in, then the vocal break spits you back cut. Dutch progressive house meets Twilo. (P)

Solid Sessions

Janeiro (Additive)

Appearing in the middle of last year on Dutch import, 'Janeiro' looked in danger of being overlooked in the progressive product avalanche. Thankfully Additive have saved the day with a whole host of great new mixes. The original's cool, classical guitar based melodies have been used to great effect by Subtech, Lemon 8 and Saffron. (P)

Avid

Fierce Affection (Steel Yard) Over the past few years, Steel Yard have proved their worth, bringing new ideas to a very copyist progressive house world. Their production is always second to none and 'Fierce Affection' is no exception. It builds quickly then launches into a larger than life bassline driving ever

How did Tune Inn

start? "The shop started in January 1996. The label naturally followed in January 2000. Our first signing was Roland Klinkenberg's huge 'Inner Laugh'. What influenced the label's direction? "Progressive trance was a major influence. We've always admired the Dutch sound, and we still love the noncheddar variety of pumping trance. Who would you like to license or remix for the label? "We are negotiating with Pascal FEOS, the little rascal! I would also like to work with Oliver Klein. I loved his remix of Robert Armani's 'Circus Bells'. What is the Medway connection? "I wanted a remix from Medway (Jesse) for the 'Hong Kong Junkie' release. I asked him if he would like to work together on some tracks for Tune Inn and Decipher. We came up with three tracks, all with a lot of funk. Every one's a killer!"

Future plans? "To keep the quality tracks coming – and believe me, we have some big ones lined up!"

Prototype's 'Control Of Sound' is out now on Tune Inn onwards and upwards – oh so simple, yet painfully powerful. An evil, techy dub can be found on the flip. (P)

Tunnel Vision (Bluestone)

The more underground offshoot of the great Stonehouse have once again put together a release that will capture the hearts of a wide cross section of our favourite DJs. Bill Hamel Presents Innate & Andy Moor Barotek (Sunkissed)

The prolific US label is fast growing into one of the best on the planet. 'Barotek' sees the coming together of Baroque's Innate and Andy Moor, and features, as you would expect, an underground groove revolving around deep pads and subile tribal rhythms. Blackwatch remixes. (P)

CTRL

Casa Del Regardo (Niche Blue)

Niche and sister label Niche Blue are becoming two of the most important labels around, consistently releasing mind numbingly brillant records that have the whole essence of pure, progressive house at their heart. 'Casa Del Regardo' is to date the pinnacle of all their releases, bringing together a simple groove with a moody melody. If anything can brighten up your day, this is it. (P)

Massimo Vivona

Down/Sabotage (Headzone) Ay carambal Innovation is the name of the game, as far as Massimo is concerned, each new project having a different direction. It is hard to classify his work as trance, techno or progressive, it is a combination of all of these and more. This is possibly his best work to date: two sides of the most sublime music. A little piece of perfection which once again shows the new confidence in the UK scene.

Apathy & Celph Titled No Joke/Science Of The

Bumrush (Stonegroove) More nasty, nasty battle rhymes from man like Apathy. On this particular occasion, Celph Titled concentrates on rhyming rather than the beat, which Apathy loops up nicely - a loping bassline straight from the funk blueprint. If you don't like stinky rhymes about hoes this isn't for you, but if you think hip hop begins and ends with Eminem it's worth checking out.

D12

Shit On You (Shady/Interscope) In which Eminem and his crew D12 first offer up a coprophiliac's anthem before getting down to the real business continuing the feud with Everlast, with a pisstake of a Whitey Ford track. While this is throwaway, it has to be said that 'Shit On You' - despite being utterty reprehensible works brilliantly on its own terms.

57th Dynasty

Ghetto Gold (FasFwd)

The Dynasty return, this time with support from Peoplesound.com (where you can download these tracks). With a speeded up, skipping beat which signals a slight change of direction from their previous Wuinfluenced music, the whole crew spits out rhymes with animation and energy, making for a genuinely exhilarating ride.

Stylee Cee

The Crusoe EP (Son) Lost Island are no more, but main man Stylee Cee continues onward with his brand of beautifully produced, funky-asfuck hip hop. Actually, it's not clear that he's lost anything vocally and the beats are as absolutely tight as ever. Throw Cappo and others into the mix and you've got a very strong EP. It may not be fashionable but it does the business.

Boca 45

Gather Round (Hombre) Somewhere between Hombre's straighter hip hop projects and their not-really-hiphop-projects-at-all is this fine and dandy party single from Scott Hendy. Reminiscent of Deee-Lite without the kooky singing (and not quite so camp), this is no nonsense dancing music. Schwang.

Big Dog

Raise The Alarm (Jive) Kermit has travelled a long way in a career which took in both Ruthless Rap Assassins and Black Grape, and Big Dog is where he's arrived - a guitar-laden, shuffling thing that's slightly reminiscent of a Manc take on Cypress Hill. There's some interesting twists in the production and MC Kermit La Freak seems determined to recapture his RRA style, but perhaps a little too much generic rock guitar, lads?

So Who The Hell Is...

Killa Kela?

Mild-mannered beatboxer Kela only kills with his mouth...

He's a beatboxer? What, like that Rahzel guy who plays with the Roots? Kind of, but

Kela has a style that's totally his own, honed from the age of eight, long before he even knew there was any such thing as hip hop, let alone beat-boxing. It is, he claims, "all about the mid-brain, baby!" So how did the world get to hear this beatbox savant? He sent a tape to DJ Vadim and then got made redundant. Vadim invited him on tour and,

after 250 dates last year alone, the rest is history. History? Something like that. He's not only worked with Vadim, but DJ Punk Roc and the Unsung Heroes and was the only non-DJ member of the Scratch Perverts before they disbanded. Oh, and he was inducted into the legendary Rock Steady Crew last year, an honour not lightly given. Is he any good, then? Oh yes. A human orchestra, a giant rhythm section for a chest, Kela is also openminded in the extreme, planning to set up a drum & bass outfit with DJ Plus One and Nicky Blackmarket as well as keeping the hip hop coming, saying "the more I can experiment with how far I can go with beatboxing, the better."

Killa Kela's debut 12-inch, 'Heavy Artillery', is out on Jazz Fudge on April 23rd



Executive Lounge

Big Tyme/Heat Wave (75Ark) With 75Ark rumoured to have bitten the dust (internet money backing being shaky backing), who knows if this laid back slice of West Coast hip hop featuring Encore and Persevere will ever see the shelves? With a nice guitar loop put together by the Architect, that would be a shame, but not a historic loss.

Troy Scalpels

I Must Not Spit In Class (Personal)

Scalpels is apparently the current UK National Freestyle champion and his clear, clipped style shows his roots in battling. On record, he could do with stretching his voice and flow a little, but this is a strong debut, with a variety of moods and ideas showing a real talent.

Phife Dawg

Miscellaneous (Superrappin') Phife keeps moving. After the terrible 'Ben Dova' came the rather good 'Ventilation' album. Then, just as you thought that Phife was set to be the most successful ex-Quester, comes this. The remix is from HiTek, but we don't care. It's homble. and the local lines for

The Bad Seed

Uhhnnh (OBS, USA)

Mainly distinctive for its "born-bornbombombombom" choral backing that sounds like it was filched from a Sixties soundtrack, this record also has the best title of the month. And overall, it's pretty good, the sample silliness continuing on the flip and elevating this beyond the straight-up and into something pretty good.

Albums

Self Scientific

The Self Science (S.O.L, USA) The highly-rated duo from South Carolina via Los Angeles come through with the album everyone was hoping for musically varied and clever with lyrics to match. A record that exemplifies what's best about the 'underground' scene by loosening up the straitjacket just enough to show what was good about being in it in the first place. Quality.

Jeep Beat Collective Death Race 2001 (Ruf Beats)

The Ruf returns under his most successful and accomplished moniker, Jeep Beat continuing to cut it up, make Python-style jokes and mix up the electro with rock, old skool and whatever else the man fancies. It's a mixture perhaps best experienced live, but still worth checking here.

Various Artists

Urban Revolutions (Future Primitive Sound, USA)

The Future Primitive Sound sessions in SF specialise in mixing up the cream of the USA's turntablists with drum & bass and whatever else takes their fancy. But while the sessions themselves are meant to be explosive, this comp doesn't quite ignite.

Radio Inactive

Pyramidi (Mush, USA)

Radio Inactive comes through with one of the oddest, funniest, most lo-fi yet lovely hip hop albums you'll hear this year. All speeded up vocal flows, Persian rhythm, slick exotica and free jazz squirting, this is one of those utterly unique experiences you're either going to love or hate, but should just love. Like being stuck in a film which re-imagines LA as Babylon visited by Captain Kirk. Only much, much better

Beatnuts

Take It Or Squeeze It (Loud/Epic)

After their rather disappointing last album, the Beatnuts are back on fine form with an album packed with Latino rhythm, electric squelches (plus their more straight up beats) and, of course, some off colour rhyming about drinking, smoking and fucking. Greg Nice is on here, too. A straight up, funny, superfunky mainstream hip hop album.

Nobody

Soulmates (Catskills)

Originally released on Ubiquity, Catskills have rescued this very odd free-jazz-spacerock hip hop album of mainly instrumental tracks with the odd contribution from the likes of the mighty Freestyle Fellowship, Ab Rude and Medusa. And very good it is too, a little like what DJ Shadow would sound like if he spent more time smoking weed and less looking for breaks.

The lady comes on strong with yet another smooth cut from her giant debut album 'Who Is JII Scott?'. This time the remix honours go to one of the UK's most prolific creators of the good groove, Dodge. His rewash is even more inviting than the orginal and he treats the lady with utter respect. A faultless performance from all involved.

Ne-Grove Let It Ride (Pure Filth)

The west London collective are truly riding the wave at the moment with quality material from the likes of Nathan Haines, Modaji, Bugz In The Attic, Phlash et al, and this will add another borus point to the equation. Featuring the highly attractive vocals of Marcus Beggs and the cool production of Lercy Smith, this is a beautiful performance.

Bayaka & Jephte Guillaume

Mande Lanme Ya (Flower) Japan's Flower comes of age with a production and distribution deal in the UK at last. This is extremely deep, and should be treated with the utmost respect. Leftfield? Certainly. But music of the highest quality in feeling and production. Not to be taken lightly and one for true afficiandos only.

Afrix

Zacamucyo (Chilli Funk) This is the brainchild of London-based French DJ and producer Nicolas Laugier, who previously released material under the guise of NLE for Acd Jazz back in 1999. Here, he shows off his Afro-funk groove, diving into raw, rougher beats and enlisting the amazing vocal talent of 18 year old Dorothee Ningabire. The end result is nothing short of stunning and for a harder edge, Peace Division control the floor.

Sunshine Anderson

Heard It All Before (Atlantic) I must admit that my knowledge of this young lady is somewhat limited, but after hearing this outing from the newest songstress on the block, it's clear that Miss Anderson has made a great start in the business. The vocals are wonderful, production spot on, and the beats ruff and ready – just the way we like it. Oh yes – can't wait to hear the maxi.

Bilal

Soul Sista (Interscope) Already getting shouts from those with the right ears and also from the big guns, the young man is the latest great talent to step into the spotlight. Shades of the late Mr Marvin Gaye, but that (quite rightly) comes out of his respect for what's gone before. A slow, slightly jazzy vbe, drenched in emotion, make Bilal one of the classiest acts on vinyl.

Blvd East Featuring Kaaye

Shout (Next Move)

It is so good to hear that the inspirational is gradually gaining new friends in the world of black music. This is a highly charged piece of modern soul drenched with 'that' feeling of well-being and happiness. Jovorne is the producer and his superior technique can never be questioned. Yes, my friends, this will be an anthem on our more discerning dancefloors for many years to come.

India Arie

Acoustic Soul (Motown) Now let me say this only once: this lady will be massive and has an incredble future in today's music industry. Her voice is just superb, and the songs hit home, with every track having the potential to be a single. The only danger is that it might be too classy for your average set of ears. Hopefully not, as this is the future of soul music. Faultess. Absolutely, 100% faultless.

Bob James

An Anthology (Castie) Back in the Seventes, this man was the king of theme tunes. His legendary CTI Records autuput turned the younger generation on to the sometimes unapproachable world of jazz. His production and writing are easy on the ear, but the arrangements were so deep at the time and listened to again some 25 years later, still sound inviting and fresh. Another "must have" for the collection.

Curtis Mayfield Live At Ronnie Scott's (Castle)

Chicago's gentle giant put down this classy live recording during his UK tour back in 1988. Recorded in the intimate but highly funky setting of Scho's Ronnie Scott's jazz club, it captures all the classic cuts from the man some people dubbed 'Mr Soul'. Curtis may not be with us any more, but his memory lives on with timeless music and songs as featured here. Pure, unadulterated, deep and then some...

Shaolin Soul Episode 2

(Hostile)

This French complation is made up of 'unknown' Seventies gerns from the world of collector's soul. Sngers and songwriters who are unknown to the general public yet fill the hearts and speakers of the world's most ardent vinyl junkies. From George Jackson to Baby Huey, and The Mad Lads to Syl Johnson, this is a hard act to follow.

Urban Essentials

Proprietor Bigger on why the soul scene's newest label aims to see justice done

Urban Essentials is a new label project for 2001. What led to it? "It was born out of frustration at all the great tracks I was getting sent on promo that would just never go on to be released. None of the major labels would pick them up, because most are concerned only with shipping big units by mainstream artists, rather than with investing in new talent. I felt people deserved an opportunity to hear good, new soulful tunes, so this was the outlet." What have you put out so far? "The first track was 'Ooo Ahh' by Kornastone, which has been doing really well on radio airplay, and has been remixed by Blacksmith, We're following this with 'If You Get To Know Me' by Shah Bailey, and 'Now That I've Found You' by a UK group called Nu Life, with mixes by Linslee." Any albums on the way? "We plan to put out a compilation to act as a showcase for all the stuff we've released. We also hope to use the singles to springboard album projects for our artists," (MD)

As well as running Urban Essentials, Bigger also operates Rhythm 'N' Bass Records in Barking, and organises UK-wide Urban Essentials club tours

Etta James

Matriarch Of The Blues (Private Music) Another voice from way back then that sends your temperature soaring and sets pulses racing. A big woman with a voice to match, Etta can shatter a glass at 50 paces. This collection of bluesy covers will not please everyone, but for real nostalqia the lady cannot be beaten.

Isaac Hayes

The Ultimate: 1969-1977 (Ace)

The man with the huge, raw voice is a true giant among the wold's top creators of quality soul. His arrangements are nothing short of genius, and his innovative production techniques are vital to the history of black music. A true icon in every sense of the word and this collection of his finest moments cannot be ignored at any cost. In short, you need this. Believe me.

Fertile Ground

Perception (Counterpoint) Another highly attractive outfit whose debut album last year certainly hit home and gained a credible amount of praise, but somehow dich't quite make the grade. This time the record has been set straight with some new songs and stronger publicity and an album that is full to the brim with all things eclectic because it's simply overflowing with peace, love and affection.

Jaheim

Ghetto Love (Warners) Wow! This guy is certainly raising dancefloor dust and causing quite a stir in the disposable world of modern r&b. His path to success has been a little bumpy, but his respect for his musical heritage has paid off. As with his female counterparts like Stone, Scott and Badu, Jaheim can rest assured that his unquestionable talent will give him a very comfortable future for many years to come.

Dave Pike

Jazz For The Jet Set (Atlantic Masters)

This 1966 set by one of the world's leading players of the marimba has been rewashed and remastered to bring the best out of it. This groovy set of jazz-soul movers features heavyweight support from the likes of Herbie Hancock, Bob Cranshaw, Bily Butler, Grady Tate and Clarke Terry. A Sixties gem that sounds incredible fresh today.

Latin Deluxe (ID & T Music) A real melting pot of Latin-influenced dance music from the likes of Stephane Attias, Modaji, Soulcamp, Pathless, Daniel Ibbotson and more are all included here for you to savour. A fresh package and some future stars. Very, very nice.

Missy 'Misdemeanor' Elliot

Get Ur Freak On (East West) The first track from Missy's forthcoming third album, 'Missy', reunites her with longstanding musical collaborator Timbaland. An Eastern flavour pervades the track with tabla-style drum samples and exotic instrumentation throughout. The song/rap is less innovalive and there's a slight sense of going over the same old ground, though.

Nicole

Bangin' (Don't Lie) (East West) A timely return for US singer Nicole Wray, who's sampled very Iberally on Phaze One's current UK garage smash 'Nicole's Groove'. This is the first release from Nicole's forthcoming abum 'Elektric Blue' and reurites her with Timbaland on production. A guest rap comes courtesy of ex-MobD Deep man Prodigy. Not as immediate as 'Make It Hot' or 'Can't You See', but strong nonetheless.

Ludacris

Southern Hospitality (Def Jam South)

Fans of the 'dirty south' could do a lot worse than check out the Ludacris album 'Back For The First Time', In the meanwhile, producers The Neptunes hit form on this single. Similar in feel to Mystika's 'Shake Ya Ass', this track will grow and grow on you.

Craig David Rendezvous (Wildstar)

What at first appeared to be a bootleg gets an official release. Blacksmith are apparently behind this remix of David's current single which sees his vocal slot effortlessly over the beat of Royce Da 5-9's DJ Premier produced cut 'Boom'. Simple but very effective.

Ray-J Featuring Lil' Kim

Lil' Mo

Superwoman (Part I & II) (East West)

Female rapper Lil' Mo seemed to have been releasing promos for literally years with no sign of her debut album. This finally locks set to change and this popular new single will proceed an debut album in April. It's the remix courtesy of the aforementioned DJ Clue, 'Supervoman Part II', that's getting the attention. A solid track.

Eric Benet

Love Don't Love Me (Warners) A treat for Eric Benet's legion of UK fans. Taken from the soundtrack of new film The Brothers, this track walks the line nicely between a retro feel and more contemporary production sounds. With strong dancefloor appeal, this is certainly worth tracking down.

Dave Hollister Featuring Redman

One Woman Man (Def Squad/Dreamworks) Taken from Hollister's strong current abum, the original album version of f

'Emotional', this new single sees Erik Sermon give Hollister's track a rough street edge remix to good effect.

Eve

Let Me Blow Ya Mind (Featuring Gwen Stefani)/ That's What It Is (Featuring Styles Of The Lox) (Ruff Ryders)

The second single from Eve's new 'Scorpion' album is a double header produced by Dr Dre. The A-side features No Doubt vocalist Gwen Stefani but it's the brooding B-side which grabs the ear. Featuring a rhythm similar to Dre's own 'The Watcher', Styles Of The Lox is on hand to help drive home the hooky chanted chorus.

Sticky Fingaz

Get It (Universal)

A boisterous debut from Sticky Fingaz who was previously a member of the early Nineties Def Jam act Onyx, much loved for their slam-dancing hip hop classic, 'Slam'. The years obviously haven't done much to calm him down, and there's even a trace of Onyx's 'Throw Ya Guns' in this new track. Good fun.

DJ Clue Featuring Mary J Blige & Jadakiss

Back 2 Life 2001 (Roc-A-Fella, US)

DJ Clue reunites Mary J with The Lox's Jadakiss (remember the 'Give Me You' remix) for this new take on Soul II Soul's classic 'Back To Life'. Teebee & Future Prophecies

Dimensional Entity (Subtitles) The judicious combination of two wildy differing elements – the predatory snarl of tech-step and the words of a love song – is what makes 'Dimensional Entity' so spnetingling. That the beats are Teebees and the song the sublime 'the first time ever I saw your face/ I thought the sun rose in your eyes' raises the whole thing to another level. A hymn to the abyss.

Marcus Intalex And ST Files

Universe (Metalheadz)

Next up on Metalheadz is this majestic relicut from Manchester's Marcus Intalex. What's wonderful about 'Universe' is the way it combines the kind of warm, glowing breaks you hear at clubs like Swerve with an immense. Bad Company-style terrorhock. Truly the best of both worlds. Flipside 'Lose Control' layers fragile beats over soundscapes reminiscent of Aphex Twin at his chillest. We feel this.

Deep Rooted

Chi EP (Moving Shadow) You may already know Deep Rooted from previous releases on No U-Turn or his material as Cool Breeze. Here, you should skip the densety percussive but almost wholy beatless title track and head straight for 'Tokyo No Yoake'. Sounding very like Dom & Roland, it's a sturning fusion of steel-cold breaks and distantly tinkling Oriental raptures. 'Hz' combines watery gutar licks and rivet-gun breaks to hypnotic effect. Drumsongs from Heaven.

Spirit

Russian Roulette (Timeless) Sometime Digital colaborator Spint (aka Duncan Busto, formerly of this page) fully indulges his taste for rattling discordancy here. A clanking behemoth of a track that evokes images of horniby mafunctioning uranium factories, 'Russian Roulette' is uncompromising to say the least. Flipside 'Back Up' is fractionally more accessible, if only because the breaks flow as opposed



to hammer you into the ground. A poor advert for industrialisation, though.

J Majik Featuring Kathy Brown

Love Is Not A Game (Defected) All respect to Defected for pricking up their ears and releasing (at long last) this excellent vocal track. J Majik's beats are tighter and sharper than they've sounded for ages, but it's the filtered charms of Kathy Brown's singing that really sets this one apart. Dilinja's bass-laden remix takes the hardstepping tendencies of the original a stage further. Garage music with bite.

Exile

The Other Side (Beta) A decent pair of industrial-tinged drumscapes from Exile, who's currently mired in a philosophy degree at Durham University. The tille track occupies familiar tech-step terrain, shrill snatches of melody and some delicate vocals counterbalancing the piston-racket of the beats. 'Ticker Tape', a sparser and somewhat mooder piece, benefits from some into-the-void snarks and omnous bass tones.

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Blame

Sigma EP (Good Looking) While retaining a fair number of Good Looking traits – an enduring obsession with the techno sound of Detroit, for example – Blame manages to come across as somewhat less fey than most of his labelmates. "Spectre' is the embodiment of restlessness, its scurrying drums and lithe glmmer-sounds seemingly fleeing some implacable foe. Best of the rest is 'Binary Sunset', a rigid bleep track that reinforces the customary synths with a nicely stabbing bassine.

Various Artists

Ram Raiders 3 (Ram) More 21st century vocdoo music from Ram. First up is Origin Unknown's 'Equinox', that here-comes-the-Kraken riff introduced by a resiless percussive tic. Shimon & Andy C's 'Mind Killer' is a more prosaic voyage into the darkside, while Moving Fusion's 'Black Hole' takes the Ram tendency towards discordancy

'Jah Witness' adds atmospheric disembodied ragga-chat to the hardcore flourishes, and will turn heads with the taut ferocity of its breaks. Digital would be proud of it, Grooverider will love it. 'Bad Magic' occupies similar terrain, rippling bongos and paranoid synthtones creating an aura of undituted (if somewhat theatrical) menace.

The Dragon

The Dragon's Theme (Noocles Remix) (Poison) Remixers often work on the principle that the tiniest changes made to classic tracks can strip away the cobwebs from our ears. Sometimes it works but here it doesn't, Noocles' bass-dirty reworking of 'The Dragon's Theme' being competent but unexciting. Far better is 'Green Dragon' which blends the whole sound-

Flip to 'Outboard' for a lightly stepping roll-out reminiscent of Nico & Rukkus's 'Defender', nimble beats and digitised menace paving the way for a tough Beltram-esque bassline. Sounds for the witching hour.

John B

The Gate (Beta)

Being the first of a series of missives from John B's newly upgraded studio. The title track – exploring similarly sharpedged territory to recent Phantom Audio releases – pants the celestial gates as a perilous, blade-bristling portal. 'Music For Lost Cittes' is just as bleak, its discordant synth stabs overlaid by some creepily theatrical harpsichord playing.

Various Artists

The Brazil EP (V Recordings) Like a ray of light cast into a dungeon, this doublepack of Brazilian beats should provide welcome relief to a scene bloated with half-arsed darkcore. 'Secrets Of The Floating Island' and 'Samba Raro' are pure pleasure, those inimitable Latin flavours laid over the most nonchalant of rhythms. On the second disc, two superb collaborations from DJ Patife approximate the kind of sounds Stan Getz would be making if he was alive today. I Monster

Daydream (Cercle) This cute, fat little seven-inch single is rather special. Kinobe

Slip Into Something. . . (Pepper) The chill out classic gets a re-release by popular demand after its use as the soundtrack in that Kronenbourg beer ad. Belgrade Coffee Shop (Magix, France)

This one is much more than just another compilation from a bar. It's all new material from downtempo artists working in and around the city of Belgrade in the heart of the Balkans. The title is used to sum up the vibe rather than to celebrate a single café. The music is the familiar mix of lounge, deep house, mellow drum & bass, beats and jazzy bits that you might expect to come out of Vienna, But the whole collection hangs together well, there's a mood there and an excellent, self-consciously lo-fi production quality. It's easy to picture the imaginary smoky, steamy, dimly lit coffee shop where these guys hang out and talk music. Quality gear and a good vibe. (CC)

Jori Hulkkonen

When No One Is Watching We Are Invisible (F Comm)

The cover is a woodland scene in winter, the sunshine laying deep shadows in the snow as it cuts through the bare trees. The music inside soundtracks the image perfectly. Mr H mixes very moody deep house with a few more experimental tracks - ambient, jazzy - to create a beautiful, melancholy soundscape. It sounds like it's inspired by early house pioneers like Mr Fingers and Virgo 4, which means it's got that big emotional punch without losing subtlety. The finest moments are the current single 'Wanna Do You' and his all time classic deep house tune 'Let Me Luv U'. (CC)

Simon Jeffes

Piano Music (ZOPF)

A collection of piano pieces from the late founder of the Penguin Café Orchestra. Featuring various tracks recorded during his life and some new compositions which were destined for future release, these are tunes which have all the trademark warmth and melancholy of Penguin Café, and are a timely reminder of Simon Jeffes' genius. By adding a subtle, chunky breakbeat and extending some parts, 'Strawberry Letter' is turned into a soulful downtempo Balearic gem. A brilliant record which deserves to become a huge hit this summer. What marks it out from most so-called 'inteligent dance music', though, is the fact that it conforms to at least two of said criteria. But which two? (TM)

Kruton

Nice Motor (Unexplored Beats) 'Granular Plateaux #3' starts off sounding exactly as you'd expect, with some pleasing clarks and squelches towards the end, and for completists there's also an Autechre remix. So far so predictable, but on the flip, 'Nice Motor' welds some menacing speech samples ('your big end's gone, mate' etc) to ke human drumming to create mechanical hip hop for JG Ballard fans, while 'Pissy Brick' who tille of the month hands down. Mouse On Mars

The Cologne duo's musical manifesto

"Our music is about seeing things in a nonhierarchical way. We don't start out with any idea of what we want to achieve, and it's not intended to create a single result, but lots of smaller results in a single piece.

"We could maybe create, for example, a house record, but it wouldn't be interesting for us – why should we do it when it's already there? Every single part of a piece should be something that touches you – it shouldn't be there because a certain style dictates it should be that way.

"But our music is not about being different or experimental. Often the most normal things are the most interesting.

"We like to use old things as well as new. We're trained to think that you always need something new to progress, but you don't. You progress more when you need less and less – you become independent and you can get closer to your own vision and your own power that makes things come alive.

"Mouse On Mars is not about electronic music – it's about finding new ways of seeing things every day, every possible minute."

Mouse On Mars' album 'Idiology' is out on April 30th. The single 'Actionist Respoke' is out now. Both are on Domino provides an early Autechre beat-box-andchords opener with 'Potent Concoction'. Then he does 'Ambient Works' and 'Richard James'-era Aphex on 'Blim Blom' and 'Vex Hectic' respectively. We're not sure how much we should endorse this sort of slavish devotion to the past, but these tunes are oh so good. **(DB)**

King Of Woolworths

Stalker Song EP (Mantra) The retail monarch flicks the switch and turns on the dark for the follow-up to his wicked 'Kentish Town'. The acid sturm und drang of the tilte track is a paranoid, fear-choked delight, but the claustrophobic, relentless 'Mnitlel Conspiracy' is even better. A freaked-out woman repeats 'I just keep feeling this music', as if Mr Kirk's wife, trying to discover the reasons for her son's death, has instead fallen into a psychic netherworld of repetitive beats and bad drugs. Music Is A Hungry Ghost (City Slang)

This month sees the return of two German electronica heavyweights. In the blue corner it's To Roccoc Rot with their latest collaborator, New York DJ/producer I-Sound, creating what's protably their best album to date. It's pristine, polished and ever-so-modern, but although TRR may embrace technology, they're never determined by it: there's enough melodic massage and joiting dissonance here to remind you you're still more 'mensch' than 'machine'. Enjoy it while you can. (TM)

Mouse On Mars

Idiology (Domino)

Inserting their gumshields in the red corner are MoM's Jan St Werner and Andi Toma. While many are currently 'going deep' in a bid to prolong their shelf-life, Mouse On Mars have been going sideways, back to front, inside out and upside down for nearly a decade, and have rarely sounded more enthused about their own unique creations. Absorbing everything from string quartets to ska, Dixieland jazz to two-step, industrial breakbeat to pastoral ambience, and sweating it all out as curious, severalheaded hybrids, MoM are probably the only group ever to mix deconstruction with dance and still sound fun. So confident are they in their own abilities that they've even let the drummer sing - and we all know where that can lead. . . (TM)

Phill Niblock

Touch Works For Hurdy Gurdy And Voice (Touch)

Producing music "without rhythm or melody" is merely an occupational hazard for many musicians, of both mainstream and experimental persuasions. But for veteran (he's pushing 70) minimalist composer Phill Niblock, it's a raison d'etre. Two incredibly rich, droning sound sources (the clue is in the title), three tracks, 58 minutes: like all great minimal music it's all about the details, but no single moment disrupts the whole, and although its movements are almost imperceptibly slight, you've no idea how it's going to end. Truly hypnotic and almost psychedelic in its intensity, this is a fantastic, if demanding, album. (TM)

the record buyer's guide to...

david Morales

The muscley one's marvellous mixes

ARGUABLY THE WORLD'S most renowned house and garage DJ/producer, David Morales has been much in demand as a remixer for the past decade and a half. Major labels clamour for his smooth garage mixes, to the point where Morales was once knocking out two of them a week. So Morales' re-rub back catalogue is extensive to say the least.

Most people's earliest memory of Morales is for his classic mixes of Mariah Carey's 'Dream Lover' from 1993: indeed, Morales himself reckons the 'Def Club Mix' is his best ever. Subsequently, a lot of his strongest work has been with female garage vocalists, creating classics such as Sandy B's 'Feel Like Singin" (Nervous, 1992), Alison Limerick's 'Where Love Lives' (Arista, 1990), Kym Mazelle's 'Was That All It Was?' (Arista, 1990) and Ce Ce Peniston's 'Finally' (A&M, 1991). It's also worth checking his mixes of artists such as Madonna, Björk and Janet Jackson.

Not that Morales ever had a problem with male vocals, as anyone who's heard Robert Owens' 'I'll Be Your Friend' (Perfecto, 1991) will testify. There are also the promo-only mixes of Ice T's 'New Jack Hustler' (Giant, 1991), the many club mixes of Frankie Knuckles (check his 1992 Virgin 12-inch of 'Rainfalls' or 'Tears' (ffrr, 1989) and the dark and dirty remix of Shabba Ranks' 'Mr Loverman' (Epic, 1992).

Morales has even weaved his magic on the likes of U2, on 'Lemon' (Island, 1993) - of which there is a very rare yellow vinyl 10-inchand 'Discotheque' (Island, 1997) as well as Jamiroquai's 'Space Cowboy' and 'Cosmic Girl' (Sony, 1994 and 1996). Surprisingly, one of Morales' all-time classics is his mix of The Thompson Twins' 'The Saint' (WEA, 1991), though he's been known to delve far lower. The man has no shame, judging by his reworks of the likes of 'Pump Up The Jam' by Technotronic (BCM, 1989) and 'Doop' by Doop (MCA, 1994) but he always redeems himself with bullets like Black Sheep's 'Strobelite Honey' (Mercury, 1992) and Clubland's 'Love Strain' (Clubvision 1994). Duried treasure

Pet Shop Doys 'Miserablism' (Parlophone)

"Deny that happiness is open as an option/And disappointment disappears overnight." Ah, the Pet Shop Boys. The Smiths you can dance to. The Muzik office was wracked with schisms when it became the turn of this British institution for the Buried Treasure treatment. What to choose? The first 'Disco' compilation? 'DJ Culture', the song that turned dance music mores into a metaphor for the Gulf War? One of their many remixes (with a choice from MK, Frankie Knuckles and Tenaglia to, er The Trouser Enthusiasts)? Worthy – nay, excellent – choices all. But this, we reckon, is the track that sums up their perversity and perfection. It's a B-side. Of a terrible song ('Was It Worth It?'). A fourminute dissection of the British tendency to mope, set to one of their best tunes and a sequenced, warmly analogue bassline that bubbles up like water from the well of loneliness. And it's on their unfeasibly good B-sides compilation, 'Alternative'. (DB)

IT'S NOT EVEN 10 o'clock and there's a lengthy queue snaking around Kelly's Complex. Inside, the space is rammed as resident Col Hamilton kicks off the night with his signature tune, Phil Fuldner's 'The Final'. It may be Lush's fifth birthday, it may be that it's Saint Patrick's Day. It may be the fact that they've got Pete Tong and Dave Seaman playing an Essential Selection live. Or it could just be Lush!

Set in the beautiful seaside resort that is Portrush, Kelly's is not your average Pontin's night-time entertainment, although from the outside, you could be forgiven for thinking so. Empty caravans surround the freezing complex (it is March, after all), waiting for summer to rear its head. Until then, while it's deserted outside, it's heaving on the inside.

Live at The Leadmill, Sheffield Friday March 9th, 2001.

IT WAS NEVER GOING to be an easy gig. Although Mark B and Blade's debut album 'The Unknown' has been successful enough to lend its title a degree of irony, here in Sheffield, at a gig headlined by indie rockers Feeder, there really weren't many people who had heard of them.

Instead of the baggy jeans and baseball caps normally associated with a Mark and Blade event, tonight's crowd were kitted out in long hair, tight jeans and T-shirts with slogans like 'Volume Over Talent'. But Mark and Blade step confidently onto the stage nonetheless, accompanied by the enormous hype man they call Mr Lex and Mixologists decks-pert Benny G.

The atmosphere is a little tense to say the least, as most of the crowd hang back and eye proceedings suspiciously. Wasting no time, Mark lets his record go and the intro bars to 'From The Word Lab' smash through the speakers. Blade drops straight into the rhyme, delivering incisive verbals to an audience who look at best bemused. Sensing that a rapport with the crowd might be handy, Blade jumps off the stage and mooches around the venue, shaking hands and making friends. After 'One Shark, One Piranha', Mark and Blade get busy with their Radio 1-caned 'The Unknown', which results in some mild moshing. The audience – save for a fish-faced Yorkshire youth who offers such suggestions as 'Fuck off you southern wankers!' – are by now eating out of Blade's hand and at his request they bounce, wave their hands around and throw themselves head first at each other.

Towards the end of the show, the duo unleash a guitar-heavy version of 'Ya Don't See The Signs' as remixed by Feeder's Grant Nicholas. Excitement reaches a peak at this thrashy workout and Blade stagedives. The amply proportioned Mr Lex decides to follow, but proves too much for the weak-armed youngsters and sinks slowly to the floor, sadly not crushing fish-face in the process.

After the show, Blade is surrounded by hordes of newly converted b-children who delight in tagging the rapper's jumper. Okay, it was never gonna be an easy gig, but an MC with the charisma of Blade and a producer with the club-rocking beats of Mark B can't fail to win hearts wherever they go.

IT'S HARD NOW to imagine Berlin as a divided city. But the thriving bars and restaurants lining the main streets of the Mitte district, in the heart of the former East, are as much an indication of today's prevailing ideology as the hammer and sickle motifs on the few remaining Communist monuments are symbols of the old order. Mitte could perhaps be compared to London's

Shoreditch: as local industry shrivelled, artists and sundry 'creatives' moved in to take advantage of cheap rent and picturesquely distressed studios. Dubbed a 'bohemian community' by style press and estate agent alike, property developers soon muscled in on the act. And as one Mitte resident puts it, "as soon as big money gets involved, everything becomes more and more crapshiltousy."

Starting life with illegal squat parties, and taking in a stint in a former toilet under the Potsdamer Platz, the WMF club has weathered these economic storms and is celebrating its tenth anniversary with its reputation for musical

innovation and unabashed hedonism firmly intact. Now housed in a cavernous but decidedly plush former post office building, the club's latest development is the Komfort.Labor lounge. Here the beautiful people 'relax' and snog feverishly – if slightly incongruously – to dubby and experimental electronic sounds courtesy of local celebrities Gudrun Gut (currently riding high in the German national charts alongside Chicks On

Speed) and Stefan Betke, better known as Pole. On the main floor cocktails are quaffed enthusiastically and the WMF residents create the kind of charged atmosphere you'd normally only find in a dingy sweat-soaked hell-hole at 5am. Ironically, even this salubrious venue is soon to make way for offices, loft apartments, or who knows what. But tonight, at least, east is still East.

For all those dance music pundits who reckoned techno was dead and buried – guess again, gimps. Danny and the rest of the Atomic Jam crew have filled Birmingham's monstrous Que club with 2,000 punters eager to listen to Dave Clarke, Trevor Rockliffe and DJ Rush. The huge, inflatable spiky balls dangle from the ceiling, the green lasers have been powered up and are spewing patterns across the cavernous main room and Dave Clarke's set has got the entire crowd bouncing on the dancefloor.

The décor and the group of sweaty lads with their heads shaved and tops off down the front are like the 1995 heyday of The Orbit and Megadog. What's surprising is that in 1995 most of the people here were probably thinking about which GCSEs to take. Techno has not only sustained itself, it has attracted an entirely new generation of clubbers. Also remarkable is that, despite the intensity of the tunes, there are no drug casualties littering the place. Granted, this isn't a Mormon convention, but there are none of the prone bodies, vacant, glassy stares or little knots of human wreckage that normally characterise the tougher, younger end of dance music in the Midlands. While the pillpopping equivalent of beer monsters (E demons?) shallow fry their brains with teeth-grinding hard house and predictable, uplifting trance riffs as the background noise to their drug-taking, the punters at Atomic Jam are actually here to enjoy the music.

The result? A better vibe. None of the desperate, chemically induced euphoria of a room full of clattered morons – the smiles and the energy are still here but they're warmer and more genuine. There's excitement about hearing the likes of DJ Rush and, in the back room, Andy C and checking their skills as DJs, not as providers of pop music for pillheads.

Atomic Jam and techno – bringing it back home to the ways things were. And are. And always should be.

Remixing & Production

We're taking time out from our product round-ups this month to bring you a masterclass. Fresh from their epic US tour supporting Moby, we caught up with Swansea's own Chris Healings and Mike Truman, aka Hybrid. They're about to lock themselves away to finish their long anticipated second album, but over the last year or so they have been remixing all sorts of things. A small percentage of their remix work is gathered together on their sonically diverse and all round impressive 'Remix And Additional Production By. . .' album, which is out now.

Remixes: do people approach you, or do you go after stuff you want to work on? Chris: "Pretty much everything we've done in the last year we've been approached to do. Recently though, we've been trying to A&R some stuff we wanted to do for ourselves. We wanted to do The Doves' 'Catch The Sun' but they weren't into it, and there are a couple of other things that we're after at the moment. Stuff that we think we can do a good job of, we'll go after." Mike: "We've got the art of turning things down that don't fit now. We did do a few things that maybe we shouldn't really have done. We thought we'd done a good job but they turned out to be not what the record label was expecting. They didn't have a lot to do with the original. We've had it done to us before where somebody remixes a track and it doesn't sound anything like yours at all, they've just written their own tune and maybe used one little vocal loop. You've got to grab the heart and soul out of a track and then do your own version of it but you should be able to

compare the remix and the original and there

should be at least some sort of similarity."

What do you look for in a track? Chris: "Good vocal content and instruments."

So melody rather than beats, then? Mike: "We always do our own beats. We'd never just take somebody's loop and put our own stuff on top. It's much nicer to work with vocals or at least interesting noises which can send you off in different musical directions. The hardest thing to do – although it can turn out alright sometimes – is when you've only got a two bar arpeggiated loop and a bassline or something and that's it. That sort of thing is kind of set in stone already so all you can do is effect it and arrange it. You can't add an awful lot to it, so we're trying to avoid those."

Do you share all of the production duties or do you split the workload in any particular way?

Chris: "Mike's the golden ears." Mike: "Yeah, I'm the platinum ears." Chris: "Oh they're platinum now are they? Going up in the world are we?" Mike: "Basically, because I started about eight years ago, I've been engineering and programming longer than either Chris or Leigh, so I do all of the EQing and the nitty gritty bit of it all. Chris is more on the noise front. Between us there's lots of chin-stroking business when it comes to arrangements. We both play when we spin, we're always back to back or a deck each so the actual arrangements and club dynamics come from both of us. So Chris throws in sounds and I make 'em fit. Leigh doesn't write with us guite so much at the moment, but he's moving back down to Swansea to do the LP. He's coming more from a DJ point of view too, so we always end up with three laptops with sounds flying back and forth, and whoever grabs the mouse first gets to start the arrangement."



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You obviously use compression a lot. Why is that?

Mike: "With a lot of our breaks, we want our hi-hats to be really sharp and to really cut through and sit on top of a mix, so we'll get the dynamics really tight by using compression. You can change the groove of a track completely with compression. It changes the relationships between the sounds, the way things sit, so that things just poke out in the right places. But then you can overdo it, so that things start to sound a bit too hard. You know you've gone-too far with compression on kicks when the bottom end starts to drop out."

Do you use a lot of reverb?

Mike: "Er yeah, loads. On drums, we try and get a funkier, more tribal sound at the moment. We'll maybe have little bells at the top with a big room reverb over the top of it, then big toms down the bottom with a small room thing on it, then a reverse plate on something else. So we might end up with eight or nine reverbs running just to place things. You get different reverbs poking out that do different things. Some are very narrow stereo, some are really wide and short. Just to add a bit of depth of field to things."

Mike: "I always try and tune everything to the track too, particularly kicks. If you're adding a little bit of resonance to a kick to make it cut through, you have to tune it to the rest of the track, so that

the drums are making their own melodic pattern. It's a good idea to tune the whole kit with each sound on a different note, so that when you get a few things happening together you get chords occurring that fit the track."

Have you got into the Andy Page school of time correction (see the Feb 2001 issue of Muzik)?

Mike: "All of our stuff is heavily time corrected. The only drawback is that once you've got your ear in, you can hear the time correction going on,

especially when you're DJing. When you get a Way Out West, or Deep Sky record or one of ours it's so easy, because they're all perfectly in time. So when you're record shopping, you tend to drift towards records that are that way inclined, rather than a Tenaglia record or something where you can hear the kick flamming around. It's a new realm and you can do incredible things with it." Chris: "It makes everything sound better straight away. It's all tighter, funkier and more solid." Mike: "Also, because you've got so much more control you can get that air, that space in between all the sounds. You can really fine tune everything to make sure that it fits perfectly and then change frequencies in things as you go just to shift things around. It's the same thing as old school proper engineering; everything is still done with compression and EQ and everything else that you'd do with a normal studio so you still use all the same tools, but you're doing it in the digital realm. You can do everything you can do with a SSL desk but it's infinitely more flexible. It's a wider engineering palette to work from."

Don't you think all this computerisation makes the process of making music too complex for beginners?

Mike: "I think you've got to come at it from the right angle. You've got to know why a compressor works and what an EQ does to frequencies and how they all fit together. I did the gateway course in Kingston 10 years ago and that was great because it really did go through the fundamentals. I think if you get a kid who's just getting into it now and is just sort of landed with all of these compressors and EQs and everything, they may understand what needs to be done, but they won't know why. I had the benefit of spending months with dbx and Focusrite compressors with proper engineers from a rock background being shown why I should do things and all the microphone techniques and everything. So when I use a microphone modelling program, I realise what it's supposed to be doing. Without that you won't really grasp the concept. People should go on courses, do a lot of research, read up about it. Knowing that the computer is more than a pretty interface helps get the best out of it."

So if somebody has only got a thousand quid and they want to get into making music, do you think they should get a computer or go hunting for hardware? Mike: "I think if you've only got a grand to spend,

you're going to get more flexibility out of a computer. If you go down the old school route, you've got to spend a lot of money. You have to get a proper mixing desk and proper outboard and it costs a fortune, whereas you can get any old compressor plug-in off the net, there's loads of free ones out there for you to download. So yeah, if you haven't got much money I'd go for the computer. But then maybe you should also spend a couple of hundred quid on some courses."

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Intuitive Fun A bargain

Not so good bits A few Rewire niggles

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A little bit of history repeating. . .

Propellerheads make groundbreaking software. Reason is their third release. Their first, ReCycle, automatically chops up loops into individual notes or drum hits which makes re-arranging the rhythm of breaks loads guicker and makes it possible to change the tempo of loops without altering their pitch. The second, ReBirth, is considered by many to be the best emulation of a Roland TB303 synth around in soft or hardware form. It's so groovy and user-friendly that it brought huge numbers of new users to music software.

The concept

In much the same way that Rebirth gave us software emulations of old hardware, Reason tries the same thing with a complete studio. It provides a collection of virtual instrument and mixing 'modules' which aim to give you every tool you need in one package.

Part of the idea is that in a hardware studio each machine has a dedicated purpose. This makes learning what it's all for much easier to get to grips with, because each machine in isolation is actually very simple... it's only when you try and understand a whole studio at once that it looks scary.

The gloss

The graphics and animation in Reason are stunning. It looks fantastic and the attention to detail is incredible. The on screen graphic responses are smooth and reassuring, compensating a little for the shortcomings of the mouse. The resolution of all of the controls is good too, so making fine adjustments is not too fiddly. However, as with all software, depending on your system and sound card, there will be a time delay between you playing notes or making physical adjustments and you hearing the results of your actions. This is known as latency. If you have a pro sound card it will be a small enough delay to be acceptable but if you are using a budget card it may not. You will get more out of Reason if you have a hardware MIDI controller covered in knobs. but again beware the latency thing. This is not hardware so don't expect it to behave like it.





The Rack





The rack

In any studio you need somewhere to put everything. Reason starts with a 'rack' for you to place your instruments or 'modules' in. There are 14 module types and it's easy to load up as many copies of them as your computer can handle.

The Modules: The sequencer

The heart of Reason is a grid-based sequencer. This is a lot like Cubase, with a grid window for creating patterns and arranging them into songs. It's brilliantly organised and an absolute joy to write with. It isn't as sophisticated as Logic or Cubase but it's got everything you need, and for beginners the simplicity will be a benefit. When you select a track in the sequencer module, the graphic interface for whichever instrument you have assigned to the track is brought into view. This brings the process of writing patterns and editing sounds together into one process beautifully.

The Matrix Sequencer

As an alternative to the grid-style sequencer, Reason also has a 'Matrix' which is an analogue style pattern sequencer. This is very beginnerfriendly and well suited to simply messing about, finding out how melodies work.

Instruments

There are four sound generating modules (although you can incorporate all of the individual outputs from ReBirth if you already have it on your machine).

ReDrum

ReDrum is an eight part, analogue style drum machine. It uses the classic Roland style. pattern-based programming system which makes the whole process of experimenting with rhythm extremely simple and intuitive, and requires very little prior knowledge of how beats are built. You can load in any sample you want to any channel and each channel also has mute, solo and audition buttons. Each channel also gives you a selection of sound manipulation controls: two auxilliary sends for direct access to effects; pan control; level; velocity sensitivity and velocity to either level or start point mapping. An extensive library of rather good drum samples is included.

NN19

The sample player in Reason is NN19. You cannot record/make samples in Reason. NN19 is extremely easy to use and very well endowed, being as good as most hardware samplers although with perhaps less filter types. Each module allows you to set up either a single sample spread across a keyboard or a multisample (usually used to set up a bank of drum sounds). There is no velocity layering so NN19 is not as good as most hardware samplers when it comes to setting up a complex multisample of a 'real' instrument such as a piano or orchestral stuff. Also, NN19 reads .WAV and .AIFF but not Akai, EMU, Yamaha or Korg format samples, so it cannot access ready made orchestral libraries in those formats. For sound twisting, each module has five types of filter, an LFO, two envelopes, a sub oscillator and a comprehensive set of facilities for mapping them all to the modulation wheel, velocity or incoming MIDI controller information.

Dr Rex

.REX is the file suffix Propellerheads use for sample files which have been automatically chopped up with ReCycle. Dr Rex is very similar to NN19 in terms of available filters etc but it plays .REX files. The point is that with Rex files you have control over the individual beats or 'slices' within a loop - which means you can alter tempo without affecting musical pitch. Dr Rex has less modulation controls than NN19 but replaces them with controls which let you alter the pitch, pan, level and decay of each individual slice of your sample. This is a very nice touch and far quicker than trying to achieve the same thing with hardware.

Subtractor

For virtual synthesiser type sounds there's Subtractor. It sounds fantastically rich, warm, punchy and very impressive all round. It amounts to about 10 different analogue style synths in one, with an incredible selection of preset programs demonstrating a stunning range of classic analogue synth sounds. It has a predictable but powerful set of edit controls including two oscillators, noise generator, two filters, three envelopes, two LFOs and plenty of velocity sensitivity controls. It also has modulation and pitch wheels.

One of our only gripes with Reason occurred with Subtractor, due to its lack of an audition facility. If you want to know what one of the hundreds of patches sounds like, you have to load

it up (which takes a few seconds) and then play it. If it's not what you're looking for, then it's a case of opening the load window again and loading in another patch. It takes about six times as long to find what you want than it would with an audition and, although there are doubtless sound technical reasons for this, it began to send us purple with frustration after a while.

Mixing tools: The mixer

The mixer module offers 14 stereo input channels each with four auxiliary sends (for effects), basic but sweet-sounding two-way EQ, pan, mute, solo and individual level meters. It functions much like a hardware mixer (it allows you to listen to 14 instruments at once through a stereo system) and serves its simple purpose well. If you need to use more than one mixer in a track they have some natty features which allow you to use the same effects for all the aux sends.

The effects

The effects take the form of little half rack modules. There are four designed for use with the send/return system on the mixer: reverb (with 10 types), tempo delay, chorus/flanger and distortion. There are also four units designed as insert processors (connected directly to sound modules): compressor, phaser, envelope controlled filter (which is absolutely wicked - a bit like having a TB303 filter for everything!) and a stereo two-band parametric EQ. The Reason effects sound very good in comparison to your average budget hardware counterpart, although they lack sophistication, both in terms of performance and editability, when compared to professional stuff.

Interconnectivity

This is where Reason is unique and the potential of what follows is vast. Hit the Tab key on your keyboard and the whole rack is turned around to reveal the back panels of all of the modules you have in your rack. Just as with hardware, you will find loads of jack sockets. Click on a socket and move the mouse and a virtual patch cable appears. Move the mouse to another (appropriate) socket and let go and the two sockets are connected together. This is primarily for connecting up the audio outputs of your modules to your mixing desk, or hooking up effects units, etc. To help make life simpler, when you select a new module of any sort, Reason will automatically connect it up for you in "the most logical way it can find", which is usually spot on.

However Subtractor, for example, has a single mono audio output (nice and simple) and a further 16 jack sockets which are for sending and receiving virtual 'Control Voltage' and 'Gate' signals (not so simple). These are usually found on very old modular analogue synthesisers where the CV and Gate system was the precursor to MIDI. They are used to trigger notes or to achieve things like having the LFO on one synth control the filter cutoff on another. It can get an awful lot more esoteric and weird than that, though, and is usually strictly nerd territory. Propellerheads have put inputs and outputs for the filters, modulation systems, etc. on everything - sample players, ReDrum, effects, the lot. The CV and Gate system was abandoned before samplers became widespread and no system which allowed a sampler, drum machine, synths and effects to fuck with each other on the equivalent of a sub atomic level has ever existed. There is potential for totally unique sound creation here. Unfortunately at the time of writing, time constraints have prevented a sufficient degree of testing to draw any serious conclusions, but first trials are interesting.

Installation/system

There are currently complications surrounding the implementation of Rewire2 in relation to Logic and Cubase, so check the Propellerheads web site if this is what you have in mind. Reason places extremely low demands on your computer's resources. We managed to get more stuff up and running at once than you could ever dream of needing to use to put a track together (60 audio tracks on a PIII500 !?!). It will run on anything upwards of a 266MHz PC or 166MHz Mac (check web for details).

Downers?

Nothing is perfect, and we have one worry about Reason. This is a digital, virtual model of a real hardware studio, so the potential for sonic mayhem has finite boundaries – any noise that Reason makes has been defined by Propellerheads. Although the range of tools on offer is broad, they all have the same underlying and predictable digital sound, without the essential analogue unpredictability which is a major part of ground-breaking music creation.

Most producers use equipment by a number of different manufacturers specifically to ensure a diversity of basic tone. There is a danger here you'll be making music which essentially sounds exactly the same as all the other Reason users. Overcoming that, of course, is dependent on your own ingenuity.

Of course, having the tools at hand does not mean that you know what they're supposed to be for or guarantee you create cool music, but Reason is without doubt the most comprehensive and easily recommendable beginner's music package anywhere.

HAVING created a load of really clever, complex stuff in the last couple of years, RED have seen fit to release another dead clever product with simplicity and ease of use the central themes. Cycloops is a damned near perfect DJ sampler. It can hold up to six samples and those samples can be one, two, four or six beats long. Thanks to a system that can figure out the tempo of any incoming audio, Cycloops always knows precisely how long, say a two bar sample would need to be for the tempo of the audio you are sampling. So if you set it off sampling at the right moment (any DJ who can't do that is in trouble!) it will instantly chop the sample to the right length and start looping it. It totally removes the need to edit the start and end point of loops. So within a few seconds of taking a sample you can be mixing a loop of it back in to the music you just sampled it from! 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Check Your Head

Why are you re-releasing your Nineties solo albums?

I wanted to bring back to people's minds the time I did these albums and why I did them. It was in the middle of the Nineties when it became clear that our generation had fucked up, and techno and dance music had completely failed. The British press hated the fact that here was this German anarchist who had taken this critical, destructive look at the dance scene while everybody was still raving on about how "revolutionary and life changing" dance music was,

So what's your opinion of dance music in the 21st century?

Good question. I think garage and two-step are the most boring forms of dance music. The dance scene's got fat, and into barbecues, family life and proper jobs and they need lame, boring music to go with it. I dance a lot and I feel so bored at most clubs. There's no real dirty funk around these days that makes people sexy and crazy. I would love to see that changing again.

Do you believe that the path of wisdom is paved with excess?

The path of wisdom is definitely paved with glory, the fast rush and burning out. It's not about drugs. Drugs can do the job, but they also can prevent it. I'm in it for the euphoria, and for the energy. It feels real good, But you've got to be careful that you don't get fucked up.

Do you have any religious or spiritual beliefs?

I believe that we will all die, and we don't matter after that, and if we don't get the fuck up off our asses we will have a real bad time in a few years on this planet. I believe that I could kill the leaders of our world and go down in history if I wanted to. I believe in Satan as an energetic force that drives people when they cross a certain line in their lives. I believe in self-determination. And if many of the self-determined species unite, they can move a part of the universe.

Have you ever felt like you're wasting your time?

Oh, yes. Every time when I see how stupid people, especially younger kids, deal with information that they are given, I get so frustrated. Nobody is questioning it. People think the internet is a supermarket of truth where they can choose what they like, Sometimes I could just stop forever, but then I think 'fuck it' – I move on.

Some people say your music is aggressive and unlistenable. Wouldn't it be easier to persuade people to listen to your point of view with a pleasing tune, like, say, Bob Dylan?

I don't know... I know people who find Bob Dylan's music unlistenable. When I DJ or play live people are so excited, Their eyes are glowing in the dark. It channels their aggression to make things change; to hopefully become better. Pop music is intellectual murder, produced to keep people stupid. If I wrote nice pop songs with political lyrics, I wouldn't reach anyone, because people wouldn't listen. I think my music is pop in its true sense.

If the inside of your mind was a record, what record would it be?

If the inside of my mind were a record, I would call it 'Intelligence & Sacrifice'.

Don't you ever just relax in front of the television with a nice glass of wine?

No, I don't drink alcohol. Also I don't really have TV, I just get a bad local Berlin station and BBC World in black and white. When I relax I read French philosophy, put a Schoenberg record on and load up old video games and pause them. I eat Japanese seaweed and drink an ice cold glass of Evian water. I do the same when I can't get to sleep,

If you could spend half an hour talking to any one historical figure, who would it be?

I would talk to Miles Davis, mostly about music and how he sees it.

What's your next musical project?

My new solo album will be out in the next few months. I've finished my collaboration with Dave Grohl from Foo Fighters – I was singing, adding noise and mixing the tracks. It's called 'Probot'. And I'm turning down two or three remix offers every week.

What eye shadow do you use?

In Atari Teenage Riot [Empire's agitprop noisecore band] the girls used to give me theirs, now I have to buy my own, I have a collection, most by Chanel and Bobbi Brown. **(TM)**

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
