The world's least fiery Latin on life after Café Del Mar

SOME PEOPLE claim to have graced the dancefloors of Ibiza before 1988's Summer Of Love. José Padilla can justifiably claim to have done the same before disco. He arrived on the island from the mainland in 1975 in a quest for adventure and enlightenment and found his niche behind the decks at Café Del Mar, playing the sunset sets and recording the chill out albums that became one of the island's trademarks.

Why have you called your new album 'Navigator'?

Every track tells a different story, so it's a way of navigating through all those experiences, using the music.

Is the track 'Adios Ayer' about your departure from Café Del Mar? When I do a track or a piece of music it is because of my emotions so that's what I wanted to express – it was Café Del Mar, it was my girlfriend, it was many things that I was leaving behind. Sometimes you have to move, you cannot take all the decisions. For me, music helped me a lot to make my negative emotions and sadness into positive.

The album features two notable collaborations – how did they come about?

I had the 'Look Of Love' cover version, and in Ibiza I couldn't find that voice I wanted so I suggested names. I'm a big fan of N'Dea Davenport – I've loved her ever since she was in the Brand New Heavies, and I thought that she was right for the track. And we wanted to make 'Adios Ayer' appeal to more people so again we needed a voice. The company offered me different names and I split them into the ones I liked and the ones I didn't. The one on the top was Seal.

Do you enjoy weaving different influences into your music – from traditional flamenco to more contemporary drum patterns?

The music is more Mediterranean, of course, because that's my roots and that's where I'm coming from. But if I travel to India then that music is in my head and that influences me; if I go to Brazil then Brazilian music will influence me. That's the album – a mix of styles. I think in music you get very positive results from this fusion, from these experiments.

Playing music as the sun sets, in front of the natural elements that feed into your own music – will you ever do that again?

This is something that I did, so it's finished for me. But of course sometimes I miss it, so maybe I will do it one day – when I get poor I'll go past somewhere and play a few records...

What do you think when you walk into a record store nowadays and see shelves stacked with Ibiza chill out albums?

That's the industry, isn't it? Sometimes I feel proud that I started something that now is so big. Sometimes I feel pissed off because it's just copies with little imagination – albums called Café Del This, Café Del That. . . it's a bit sad, you know.

If someone came to you and said "José, I need to chill the fuck out," what would you suggest?

The place. . . we all know the place can be anywhere. We always say in front of the sea watching the sunset, so now I'm going to say under a tree in Ibiza with a nice picnic, on a nice blanket, with a nice bottle of wine and a nice girlfriend.

Coxy's DigColumn

★Techno god Carl Cox's international escapades★

THE MONTH began with a huge party in **Amsterdam**, an event for about 35,000 people at The Rai. It was called Shockers, and they'd filled the venue with these vast, 40-foot high industrial containers – they had about 150 of them, stacked up like Lego bricks! It looked incredible. The overall production was second to none, sort of like Homelands indoors.

Up speed

Almost as amazing was the technological equipment of John Acquaviva, who was playing before me. He had this programme called Final Scratch, which allows you to download your entire record collection onto a PC and then play tracks (via special, digitally-connected pieces of vinyl)

just as you would on a pair of decks. You've just gotta pray the computer doesn't crash [And there's more on computer-based DJing on page 136 – Ed.]. Then it was off to Ireland to play at Planet Love.

Everyone was there – **Dave Angel**, **Mr C**, **Pete Tong**, **Paul Van Dyk**, **Judge Jules**. . . Our room, for about 3,000 people, was hosted by the guys who do **Shine** in Belfast. At the end of my set, Mr C grabbed the mic and did some of his rapping over the tracks. He wasn't bad!

Florida 135 at Fraga in northern Spain is a club that's got to be put on the map. It's one of the most amazing places I've ever played in, constructed inside like a real street with shop fronts, pubs and lamp posts! The whole place was carved out of the side of a mountain about 60 years ago, and has rooms for films, Spanish music and rock. I played outside, on the house terrace, before driving back to Barcelona at about eight in the morning with the sun in my eyes.

Casey Spooner demonstrates why you should always use a mirror when applying eye make-up

DANGER, subversion and cheap thrills. Three things you'll be hard pressed to find among the insipid eunuchs populating today's designed-bycommittee, made-for-TV pop groups, not to mention dance music's glut of determinedly unglamorous DJs. So when Casey Spooner performs his sticky Human League-meets-Munich electropop tunes dressed as a Yeti, or wearing red rubber tights and spitting fire, while a coterie of singers, dancers, choreographers, freaks, weirdos and hairdressers attend to his every whim like Caligula's naked slaves, you've got to admit it – a star is born.

Erm, have you always been this way? "I grew up in the south, and hung out with a bunch of country fried rockers." Casey explains as Muzik's

of country fried rockers," Casey explains as Muzik's crack team of psychologists lies the now-native New Yorker down on the couch. "I had a great time! I lived in Athens, Georgia for a while. . . and had an

affair with Michael Stipe. It was very scandalous – I was 18, and had a complete nervous breakdown. So then I decided to go to art school in Chicago."

Ah, the hallowed home of house. Marshall Jefferson, DJ Pierre, Frankie Knuckles. . . the perfect education. Or not. "I used to go to house parties, but I never knew what the hell I was listening to. Mostly the people I meet are completely baffled at how clueless and stupid I am. Warren Fischer is the music man. I'm just the head of style and bullshit – the charisma department," he admits gleefully.

Casey met Warren in New York when the pair worked on various "young and earnest" performance art projects. Later Fischer made music with postrock luminary Jim O'Rourke, while Spooner faced the inevitable and ditched art for pop. "I was tired of people scratching their chins and pretending to be aloof," he elaborates, displaying a touching naïvete about the habits of the house and techno community. Inspired by the "100% entertainment" of

Bollywood musicals, peculiar strains of histrionic pop music from Egypt and Russia, and Dutch electro producer I-F – "Warren loved the flat, prefab quality" – they met Munich mogul DJ Hell by chance while on holiday in the Bahamas. Hell's now releasing Fischerspooner's debut album on his International Deejay Gigolos label. "He didn't like us at first, until we made a video," Casey says. "Then he basically fell in love with me. The rest is history."

Now he's set his sights on a Muzik front cover. "Just tell me who I have to sleep with and I'll do it! I'm sure I've done worse. . ."

The mind boggles.

The Rhythm Masters

Muzik catch up with the sexy duo who are about to go stellar

ROB CHETCUTTI and Steve McGuiness met in Malta in the late Eighties. The former was a native, playing in a jazz band, while Steve was an enthusiastic b-boy from the UK who had come to the island to DJ in the clubs "for a laugh".

After an initial booze-fuelled meeting, the pair's first musical adventure was a hip hop group. This foundered due to the rapper being, as Rob confides, "a total wanker," so in the early Nineties, the duo moved to the UK. They started making house tunes as The Rhythm Masters and moved to Brighton shortly afterwards. "It's full of nutters so we fit right in," chortles Steve.

They embarked on a remix career which eventually took in high-profile work for the likes of Michael Jackson, INXS and Jocelyn Brown. Since then they've drummed up an incredible 200 remixes. Why so many?

"For the money!" they chorus heartily. "We had £250 and a 14 second sampler when we came here. We needed money for a studio so

all the money we made from the mixes went back in. Now we can do what we want."

That includes their first long player, 'Disconnect Your Head', which will be preceded by a single, 'Underground'. That starts life as a dark, moody affair but changes halfway through into a hands-inthe-air shuffler, and the focus on innovation and energy persists throughout the album, aided by some distinctive vocal collaborations, including one with Heaven 17's Glenn Gregory.

Avoiding "anything too gospel or disco", the record's UK house sound compares favourably with the more influential US version.

"I think we've achieved our own sound on this album, and it's a UK sound," stresses Steve. "We're trying to apply the same originality to our live show. We've got a guitarist, breakdancers, a percussionist and vocalists..."

And none of them will be wankers, hopefully.

DRUM & BASS artists often tend towards one or other of the genre's illustrious forebears. For a label like True Playaz, it's the witty sampling and crazed breaks-manipulation of early hip hop that features most strongly. For artists such as Bad Company and Ram Trilogy, it's the terror-drone and clipped beats of Belgian hardcore techno. And for Dillinja, above all else, it's the sub-bass brutalism of dub.

AN vords

This, though, is dub reinforced and toughened almost beyond recognition. Dub on steroids, if you like. Dub whose trainers you don't step on if you want to get home alive. Tracks like the commendably vicious 'Valve Sound', which opens the new 'Dillinja Presents Cybotron' album, bear the same relation to the pastoral skank of King Tubby as an armoured vehicle does to a haycart.

William Burroughs once said that a truly great author would be able to write something that could kill people. Does Dillinia have a similar desire to hurt people with his music?

"Definitely. That's the intention. On the dot, man. I wanna make 'em feel their ribcage, make 'em bleed."

There are other sounds and influences discernible on the album: 'Human B Bop' looks back to old skool hip hop, while 'All Aboard' has a distinctly Caribbean flavour. But these are never more than settings.

"The jewel is always the bass. Building the track around the bass, that's the thing," Dillinja comments. "Then you can take them into another world - my world. Like they say, sometimes you gotta be cruel to be kind."

John, it transpires, is half French and half Irish, while his slightly quieter studio partner Stephane is half French and half Japanese. So if their nicknames are amalgamations of those country's leading character traits (which they might be), we'll leave it to you to work out who's who.

Brought up in the melting pot of the Big Apple, John and Steph have provided blistering studio productions for Celeda, Kosheen and New Order, fusing the best parts of Danny Tenaglia and Deep OLAS Dish. They revel in the extreme reactions their records elicit. "I want to fuck with your head," says John. "And then make you move. I do think you can play with people and have fun!" hoto

Having turned down over 25 remix offers this month alone, Creamer and K have discovered that bigger is better. Most of their productions push well past the 10 minute mark, for example.

"It's all about anticipation," says Creamer. "It's like sex. If we can keep you there and you've got a groove going, why would you wanna stop?'

Bedroom Bedlam winner one minute, on tour with Sasha the next. It could be you...

"IT'S AMAZING for someone so young to have such a defined sound," says Sasha. "His energy is fantastic and the way he puts records together really can make a club go off . Fuck knows what the future holds, but I do get a great vibe off of James. The next couple of years will be tough but the signs are really positive. He's a diamond geezer!"

When Sasha speaks, people listen. In the few short months since Sasha's management company Excession signed up one of Bedroom Bedlam's brightest stars, James Zabiela has travelled to Helsinki with Nick Warren, flown to Holland to spin alongside Sander Kleinenberg and warmed up for Sasha in Northern Ireland. This weekend he's about to repeat that warm-up performance at Foundation in Newcastle and Cream in Liverpool. Not bad for a boy who was working as a graphic designer in Southampton six months ago.

"As soon as up-and-coming DJs get a bit of action, it sends them a bit mental," shrugs Sasha. "But with James there's a different attitude: people take a shine to him straight away. Now he's lapping it up. . . I think I get more nervous than he does!"

He's got a point. Returning to Foundation for a Global-sponsored shindig in Newcastle, James looks perfectly at ease as he drops mid-tempo cuts like 'Saudade' by Coco Da Silva. He's found the perfect blend of cool house chuggers and darker, techno-influenced material. Spinning until just after midnight, James does his best to hide that smile. And fails miserably. Everything's fallen into place for you, hasn't it?

"It's all been too perfect," nods James, chomping on an Opal Fruit after his set. "It's very strange. I won Bedroom Bedlam last year, gave a mix tape to Lee Burridge at Bedrock who gave my tape to Tara at Excession, and somehow he got Sasha to listen to it. Amazing!'

James says "amazing" an awful lot. The word crops up in his conversation about once every five minutes.

"A month after that, a meeting was called. It was the week before Christmas and I was only in their office for five minutes. But I got the best Christmas present ever!"

When Sasha arrives, the two hug warmly and James lets his new boss take over.

"The trick is not to play too hard or to play 'big' records," notes James. "Nick Warren tipped me off about that!" Turning the heat up till four in the morning, Sasha drops killer tunes like 'Rapture' by Vaiio and Pete Heller's mix of Moby's 'Southside'. Deep, trippy house music for E-heads, basically. But James has never gone down that road. He doesn't drink, smoke or take drugs. His only vice is a sweet-toothed craving for Opal Fruits and M&Ms.

"People can do what they like, it's up to them," reckons James. "I'll never judge anyone. But I've never been tempted. I had a drink on my 18th birthday, though, I think it was Grolsch. I'm happy the way I am." He's not a total pussycat, though. "Coffee sends me loopy," he says. There's a brief pause. "You wouldn't like me on coffee!"

Despite his hectic new schedule, James still works in his local record shop one day a week. "I got given decks for Christmas when I was 15," he reminisces. "A local promoter called Gary Bennetton taught me what mixing was. He's the only hope for music in Southampton - he runs the High Tide boat parties so I guess I owe him a drink. Or a hundred!"
The impressively trim Sasha tries to remember if he left the gas on before setting out on tour

James Zabiela: ". . . and Mister Sasha says that if I'm very good, he'll let me have a second deck. . ."

For a Friday night out, though, the evening ends quietly. "I got a good night's sleep," says James. "I was in bed by five!" He won't be saying that again in a hurry. Driving up to Liverpool to join Sasha, Judge Jules, Tall Paul, Darren Emerson and Yousef at Cream, the mood of our party is excitable to say the least. Unsurprisingly, the next night is nothing short of outstanding. "The kind of night you read about," says James, not quite realising what he's said.

Waiting to spin in front of the biggest crowd of his career, James is joined backstage by Darren Emerson, Yousef and Steve Gerrard (the latter pair both former BB winners themselves), all on hand to offer some support. It's a big night at Cream. Sasha's not spun here for over a year and there's a queue of punters waiting to squeeze in. James plays a selection of deep underground cuts that sends them flying. After his set, he's elated. "It was amazing," he smirks. "I felt sick before I

"It was amazing," he smirks. "I felt sick before I went on but Cream couldn't have been more perfect." Sasha ends his set with 'Xpander' – and it works. "It just felt right," he smiles. "One for those special nights, definitely. The reaction was mental!" Twenty minutes later, we're back at the hotel, eager to find some fun. Everyone's buzzing on the night's adrenaline and there's no reason to stop now. James retires to his room and we drag Darren Emerson back for some post-club natter. At 5:30am, James get a knock on his door. Wearing nothing but a pair of South Park boxers, he's greeted by Sasha who tells him to get dressed. An after-party awaits!

What follows is rather surreal. It's now śix in the morning and James and Sasha are playing back to back. In someone's kitchen, no less. This goes on for hours. And it rocks. Post-set, Sasha sits down for a swift drink and a much-needed Marlboro Light. Tired but elated, he's keen to reflect on the weekend so far. Looking over at James – who's still slightly shellshocked from that Cream reaction – we can't help but notice how unaffected he remains.

"Hah!" smiles Sasha mischievously. "Give it two years and it'll be flights on business class, hookers and huge mounds of cocaine!"

Tsk. What would his mother say?

off to Tribal Sessions in Manchester. It turned out to be one of the best nights I've had out for a long time. It was just a fantastic atmosphere, and I'd recommend it to anybody.

The month's high point, though, was the following week, back at Cream, one of the best nights I've had there for years. I was playing alongside Sasha, Darren Emerson and James Zabiela.



There were about 3,500 people there, and it felt just like the old Cream: fantastic.

By the time you read this I'll have started my summer-long fortnightly residency at Cream at Amnesia in Ibiza. We're going to try to recreate the atmosphere of the Annexe. With an extra 10k of newly installed sound, hopefully the venue will be up to it this year. See you there!

Though this wasn't one of his really big hits, for me it's one of his finest moments. The musicianship is brilliant, the groove is really tight and there's an understated energy throughout.

2. M.F.S.B.

K-Gee (Philadelphia International, 1975)

I first heard this when I bought the 'Saturday Night Fever' soundtrack back in 1978. It's a big string and brass-led instrumental, but isn't overplayed like 'We Are Family'.

3. The Osmonds

Crazy Horses (MGM, 1972)

I was mad about this when it came out – well, I was only eight. It was their attempt to shrug off the ballads and the clean-cut image and reinvent themselves as dangerous glam rockers. There's a really distinctive horse-like guitar sound in the chorus that I've spent years imitating.

4. B52s

Song For A Future Generation (Island, 1983)

I love the B-52s. They don't take themselves too seriously, but I really rate their music and they know how to come up with proper, ridiculous lyrics. This track is a semi piss-take of The Floaters' 'Float On' which was used on the Cadbury's Creme Egg ads about star signs!

5. Visage

Pleasure Boys (Polydor, 1981)

A bit of a b-boy anthem in New York for the electro breakdown, but I must admit I like it in its camp entirety! I was never much of a New Romantic myself, but I did have a friend who claimed to be a Futurist. Apparently there's a difference...

6. Kraftwerk

Numbers (EMI, 1981)

It's always been hip for dance producers to cite Kraftwerk as the prime innovators of electronic music, but don't let that put you off. If you

7. Underground Resistance Jupiter Jazz (UR, 1993)

This came out in the mid-Nineties when I may have sported the odd bandanna or two. Though this is a techno record, it has a dark, futuristic, but very musical, jazzy approach. It has an attitude about it that isn't easily faked or manufactured.

8. Will Powers

Adventures In Success (Island, 1983)

This is a really unique tune. A slowrolling hypnotic groove with a Paul McKenna style motivational diatribe about self-belief. I once briefly saw a clip of the video and there was this image of an enormous rotating head. It's stuck with me ever since and I'm always trying to get video directors to let me wear one.

9. De La Soul

Stakes Is High (Tommy Boy, 1998)

This samples Ahmad Jamal and was responsible for turning me on to him as an artist. What De La Soul have done with the sample is better than the original track, which is very rare.

10. Erykah Badu

Next Lifetime (Universal, 1997)

I first heard this being blasted out of a bar on the beach in Greece. Although I was pleasantly pissed and half asleep in the hot sun, I made the effort to get up and ask what it was. I'm more old age than new age, but the idea of meeting up with a lost lover through reincarnation appeals.

11. Nancy Sinatra You Only Live Twice (CBC, 1968)

John Barry's output is phenomenal. His songs always have a very distinctive, haunting atmosphere and a great use of orchestration. This track is probably the most memorable thing about the Bond film it accompanied. Whenever I hear it, I'm compelled to sing along very badly and loudly.



12. George Benson Star Of The Story (Warner, 1979)

This is a song from his 'Gimme The Night' album. It's produced by Quincy Jones and written by Rod Temperton, the team behind many of Jacko's best. It's the sort of thing you'd play if you had an early hours radio show. The tone is very moody and mysterious.

13. Dusty Springfield

Nothing Has Been Proved (Parlophone, 1989)

Produced by her sometime collaborators the Pet Shop Boys and taken from the film Scandal, this was one of Dusty's last UK hits. There's an evocative string refrain which makes the track a real tear-jerker, especially if you're a bit of a girl – like me!

14. Blue Six

Music & Wine (Naked Music, 1999)

This is definitely one of my favourites from the last few years: it's what the term deep house should mean. Naked Music have deservedly gone from strength to strength in terms of profile, but I still feel this is their best release to date.

15. Fifth Dimension

My Beautiful Balloon (Bell, 1973)

I've always loved this song: it's so upbeat and happy! There are quite a few covers of this, but this is the best one – they keep it simple and don't ruin it with over-the-top harmonies.

16. George Duke

Brazilian Love Affair (Epic, 1979)

This reminds me of the summer I left school. I got this job on a local onion farm and for the first time I was able to spend loads of money buying records. Prior to this, I preferred forcing shops to take back the record I'd bought the previous week, because it was so crackly (the metal polish never failed me!). The Rhodes solo at the end means it should never be cut short.

17. Miss Kimberly

My Boyfriend Is A Communist (Bob Cat, 1983)

"I've always had a thing for hilariously bad records. This appalling rip off of Joe Jackson's 'Steppin' Out' by hi-NRG producer Bobby O has the most stupid lyrics I have ever heard, and as for Miss Kimberly's voice... Well, let's just say she ain't no Aretha! Always brings a smile to my face.

"This is really funky but hard at the same time which is all good for me. It just pumps along."

8) Kidstuff Alright

"This always gets the crowd going. There are lots of nice elements and the nagging vocal sample really pulls the track along."

FLUENTIAL RECORDS started

in the summer of 2000 with the intention of releasing quality underground house music that would profile the productions of both up and coming and more established DJs.

An offshoot of Defected, Fluential's creation came as a response to that label's overnight and continued success, intended to take things back to basics. However, the Defected 'sound' began to creep into the Fluential roster and at the beginning of 2001 it was decided that the label should be more than just a less commercial version of Defected. So out went the double packs with untold remixes and in came musical diversity and underground credibility. After 10 releases in just over a year, the less-is-more philosophy has returned to the forefront of Fluential's ethos and the original aims of the label are being adhered to.

Musically, the releases are getting slightly edgier and much cooler – records that DJs will play out because they bought them from their local independent shop rather than because they received it as a promo along with 800 or so other DJs. Ironically, the distancing of Fluential from Defected by minimising marketing and promotion and letting the music speak for itself has left the label with some of its biggest releases so far. With forthcoming tracks from Tom de Neef, Seamus Haji, Kidstuff and Smokin' Jo, Fluential are on fire.

Like a Felix from the flames, Da Housecat is back

FELIX ISN'T FEELING HIS BEST when we meet in the bar of Brighton's Blanch House hotel ("the Groucho Club by the sea", according to a recent article in London's Evening Standard). Perhaps a little later than scheduled, he emerges from his room dazed and jet-lagged, and somewhat, ahem, the worse for wear. He's just been playing alongside Richie Hawtin in Mexico City, you see, and chose to ignore the warnings about not eating Mexican ice. "Man," he sighs, "someone should've put a cork in my ass!"

After a single mineral water, though, his plans for teetotalism are shelved and he introduces Muzik to a cocktail of indeterminate name. It contains lots of rum and mint and resembles pondwater. "Man, I have got some crazy shit to play to you tonight!" Slowly, he's beginning to feel more human. He enthuses about Armand Van Helden's libidinous new B-side, 'I Can Smell You'. 'Spotter. Felix, it transpires, is a mate of America's dopest mutha. Is Armand as superfly as his interview persona suggests, then?

FELIX DA HOUSECAT

"He's really not like that at all. Armand's just this really shy, reserved guy. . ."

Our conversation is interrupted by a drunken Scot who insists, for reasons known only to him, on addressing Felix as The Count. We respond by christening him The Pimp and making fun of his hat. He gets lairy. He gets chucked out. We get some more cocktails.

For those similarly in the dark as to Felix's true identity, his full title is Felix Da Housecat. A house pioneer at the tender age of 15 (when he produced the raw, 303-embedded track that underpinned DJ Pierre's 1986 classic 'Phantasy Girl'), he went on to make some of the most original house albums of the Nineties.

Now he's back with perhaps his most accessible work to date, 'Kittins And Thee Glitz', which takes the retro-futuristic sheen of Eighties pop and turns it into something exhilarating, elegiac and frequently very beautiful. Best of all,

it features the Eurotrash-sexy vocals of Miss Kittin on a series of tracks which show that Felix's beloved Prince is never far from his mind.

Alcoholically challenged Felix may be (the following day, he'll claim that he was too drunk to mix properly) but there's a show to be done and Brighton's Boutique is the suitably ramshackle venue. Felix comes on at one and proceeds to play two hours of sounds that you wouldn't find at your average wedding.

From Dave Clarke's seminal remix of Felix's own 'In The Dark We Live (Thee Lite)' to the aforementioned Van Helden track, this is the kind of music that sounds like someone's hotwiring the centre of the earth. Big Beat Boutique's Curly is concerned that the Brighton crowd will be turned off by Felix's Chicago crowd-working styles (which largely consist of turning down the volume periodically in order to whack it back up and give everyone a fright), but they seem to be doing fine. No one's complaining. He finishes with a current favourite, the twisted disco of Yoko Ono's 'Walking On Thin Ice' (the last track, according to Felix, that John Lennon was working on before he was shot). The lights come up on the normal scenes of sweat-licked devastation and, more disturbingly, a quintet of Felix groupies. Jaws grinding in a manner that suggests tipples stronger than Bacardi Breezers, they say things like "I know you Felix" while struggling to keep their eyeballs from swivelling, dervish-like, in several different directions at once. "That's nothing, man, I've seen far worse," Felix says later over hamburgers (Muzik, Felix and the cab driver – the after-party of the year). A fucking frightening thought.

The following day, we're struggling through Gatwick's South Terminal when Felix stops dead in his tracks. "Man, did you hear that announcement? She said, 'Will Stacey Pullen please make his way to the information desk'! Stacey Pullen, man? What's he doing here?"

"Sorry mate – there's no room left in the cloakroom

The Detroit techno luminary is nowhere to be seen though, suggesting that this might be a little aural hallucination caused by scant sleep and the strange acoustics of Gatwick airport. But this is just the first in a string of strange coincidences that'll see us sat next to Hear'Say on the plane and, later, bumping into Reuben from Muzik faves (and Felix remixees-to-be) Ladytron on a Manchester street.

Manchester is, as always, a grim landscape of Gotham City-style clocktowers, whole blocks awaiting redevelopment and 20-strong groups of shouting girls wearing lipstick like warpaint. Felix is due to play at Planet K. Intending to lay off the alcohol this time, he snoozes in his Malmaison boudoir whilst Reuben Ladytron and Muzik prop up the bar downstairs.

Later on, at Planet K, we're just beginning to wonder if Felix is going to turn up at all when the sweet sound of electro fills the air. We turn to the stage and, sure enough, there's his diminutive form hunched over the decks. Felix doesn't like playing on a stage. "It kinda feels like you've gotta perform. I like a nice little booth where you can just concentrate on doing your thing."

Not that it seems to bother him unduly tonight. Darker and tighter than his Big Beat Boutique set, Saturday's performance climaxes in the wonderfully over-the-top swagger of new single 'Silver Screen (Shower Scene)'. There aren't many dance tracks you can conceivably play air guitar to, but this is one of them. Then again, there aren't many house producers with the maverick genius of Felix Da Housecat.

surrounding our taxi at a deserted gas station at 6am are clearly not here to wash our windscreen. We might be suffering the after-effects of a Herculean night on the town, but through our quickly clearing alcohol fug it's plain to see we're about to be robbed blind and possibly hurt very badly. But while we booze-addled passengers are aware of the imminent danger, our utterly sober and impossibly naïve cab-driver - the same guy who somehow lost us here in the first place - is blissfully unaware. When the gang begin trying to open the doors and start banging on the windows, he considers aloud what it is they might want and moves to wind down a window. "They're trying to fucking mug us!" we scream, rattling the back of his seat frenziedly. It works. Reality kicks in, and we drive off with life and property intact.

Welcome to Johannesburg. South Africa's capital is the current holder of the ignominious title, 'Murder Capital Of The World' and home to just about every social malaise you can think of, from an AIDS epidemic to extreme poverty and racial tension. In the Central Business District (CBD), things got so bad that office buildings and homes have been abandoned by those with enough money to move (mainly whites), leaving the place in anarchy. Here, car-jackings are so frequent that running red lights is semi-legal, violent muggings so likely that walking is considered a mode of suicide rather than of transport.

Transitions from authoritarian rule to democracy are rarely smooth, and South Africa's transformation to a 'rainbow nation' from the evil apartheid system is no exception. But for all its ills, Jo'burg also has one of the most creative undercurrents of any city. Racial oppression and financial deprivation may have forced many into crime, but many others have turned to the arts as a channel for their energies. Among these positive forms of expression is, of course, music.

Like many children of the Nineties, the youth of South Africa were seduced by the electronic dance sounds that spread from America in the late Eighties. When house began to emerge it became popular not only in the mixed urban centres of Jo'burg but also in the townships, among a predominantly black audience previously raised on a diet of disco, r&b, hip hop and bubblegum pop. "Not every song sounds good slowed down. It has to be instrumental or a contain kind of sexy vocal tune"

While the white South Africans began to take the pounding beats and chemical basslines to ever-faster speeds, the black communities sought a slower vibe. Tracks were pitched down to between minus two and minus eight; some were even played at 33 rpm instead of the 45 rpm they'd been pressed for.

"The township people had their own vibes, their own shebeens and clubs right from the start," recalls Graeme Hector (aka G Force). one of the city's first DJs and party organisers, and now a member of record shop and label House Afrika. "We would go and visit friends in the townships back then, at a time when it was very rare to do so, and listen to them play these deep house tunes at slower tempos. There'd be just one turntable in the place usually. The owner of the place would sell beer, there'd be a designated spliff roller and someone would just play a track like Frankie Knuckles' 'Tears' end to end, if not the second mix as well. When we started doing parties with decks in the townships later on, people would be offended when we cut the track short to mix it because they were used to hearing the whole thing!"

These slowed down beats became known as 'mid-tempos' or '45s' and became a genre in their own right, distinguishable – but not disassociated – from the normal speed deep house scene that was still popular with the black populace. Early champions of the sound were DJs like DJ Fresh, Vinnie 'Da Vinci' and Glen Lewis.

"A big catalyst for the mid-tempo sound as far as I was concerned were tracks by bands like the Brand New Heavies," says Lewis, these days the foremost exponent of torpid grooves. "Their remixes were quite slow, which made us feel like playing other tracks at slower speeds to



match the pace. We used to play parties back in the day which would go on all day and we'd want something to play in the background while people were getting into it. We'd start with r&b and hip hop, then move up to these mid-tempos and then into deep house. The tendency was – and still is – to move from 80bpm to 120bpm with no break, on average for about six hours. You have to be careful, though, as not every tune sounds good slowed down; it usually has to be instrumental or a certain kind of vocal tune that's very sexy with nice keyboards and nice breaks."

Glen bagged a show on nationwide black station Metro in 1996, and his constant spinning of mid-tempo popularised the sound. He currently spins six days a week, peak time between 3 and 6pm, and has a listenership of 2.5 million. Meanwhile, Graeme and friends Tim and Dana White (a husband and wife team with whom Graeme once put on Jo'burg's first raves) started up House Afrika. Disenchanted by the growing commercial vibe of the white rave scene, the trio – later joined by DJ Vinnie 'Da Vinci' – entered the realm of deeper house music and began putting out compilations.

Following on from regular deep house mixes by DJ Vinnie and Theto 'Fresh' Sikwaine (aka DJ Fresh) and label compilations from popular imprints like Guidance and Peng, House Afrika finally issued South Africa's first slowed down house compilation last year. Compiled and mixed by Glen Lewis, 'Mid-Tempo 2000' instantly became the label's biggest seller, shifting 90,000 copies in SA alone. Though the trend for midtempos had passed its zenith (these days most DJs spin them as part of their sets rather than all night), this confirmed the popularity of the slower grooves on a grand scale.

5 Jo'burg Clubs

Sublime, Carla Lita, Club 206, Reality, The Foundation

On the album, tracks by Byron Burke, Lexicon Avenue, Rude Boy and Da Players are pitched down to the point where they initially sound like they're wading through toffee. But by the third or fourth track it's easy to get sold on the idea of house at fast hip hop speed; music that puts you more in the mood for beer and weed than a hectic chemical buzz.



5 Kwaito Acts

TKZee, Bongo Maffin, Jacknife, Brothers Of Peace, Mandoza

Slowly but surely these deep house sounds have been crossing over into SA's white dance scene (still ruled largely by progressive, trance and commercial house). And although, for the most part, clubland is still divided along racial lines, if you really want to go and find out what's happening at a white or black club, regardless of your skin colour, it's generally only your own paranoia that will stand in the way.

Carla Lita is a club in Pretoria run by Vinnie and ex-House Afrika scenester Christos. Vinnie drives us there on a Friday night after dropping a smooth set at the 206. It's a truly commercial establishment, something along the lines of a TFI Friday. But instead of men-in-suits grooving with diamond blush girls to Cindy Lauper, the place is full of 500 clubbers frugging to the deepest of underground house grooves. We are, we realise, the only two white faces in the venue.

We timidly nod and smile as we traipse through to the DJ box, sticking close to Vinnie at all times. As he begins to drop his own soulful brand of four-to-the-floor (Vinnie tends to play the slightly faster end of the spectrum these days, usually at around minus two), we venture out into the crowd. Hands slap us on the back in greeting and it doesn't take long for us to feel more comfortable and start frugging.

Given the popularity of house here, it's a surprise not to find any locally produced grooves. As it turns out, we're looking in the wrong place. Many of the people we meet have indulged in production work, but haven't focused on house or mid-tempo. Instead they've been getting busy with another, more commercial form of African-flavoured house music. That music is called kwaito.

Kwaito can be loosely described as a mixture of house beats (usually slowed down), local lyrics and singing, and elements of r&b, disco and indigenous pop music. Since its emergence in the early Nineties, kwaito has become one of the dominant local music forms. Every label worth its salt holds a roster of kwaito acts, the biggest of which - acts like TKZee, Bongo Maffin and Boom Shaka - regularly sell in excess of 100,000 copies of each release.

Oscar - along with other kwaito pioneers like Arthur, Christos and M'Du - is a prominent producer and a DJ at Jo'burg radio station YFM. Like many, he started out playing deep house and set up his Kaluwa Jazzme label way back in 1990. Initially putting out compilations of house cover versions at slowed down tempos, he later began using the imprint to push the emerging kwaito sound of artists like Bongo Maffin, Boom Shaka and Brothers Of Peace. Today he mixes kwaito and house on his radio shows and is considered one of the main DJs flying the kwaito flag.

"All the early house was about 110 bpm and the local kwaito music started to be produced at the same tempo," Oscar recalls. "Whereas before we had been re-recording house 45s at 33 and then selling them as covers, we started putting our own African lyrics on the beats and it became more our own thing."

Unfortunately, much kwaito is dismissed by house fans as being overly commercial or poorly produced, and not many DJs will spin the music next to high quality American or European house. The lyrics are also a problem for some. Kwaito artists tend to sing, hip hop style, about life in the townships, black empowerment and an overbearing obsession with material wealth that makes Puff Daddy look like Ghandi.

"Hip hop is a parallel for kwaito but we haven't copied it," counters Oscar. "We've based our music more on house. There are some acts, like TKZee, who have a lot of hip hop influence, but mainly we're about house-style vibes. Lyrically, we can talk about many things, but mostly it's about what is affecting our community. Stuff like why the police are stopping black people because they think we're driving stolen cars, why someone in the township is stealing other people's wives, why the divorce rates are so high. Things that are more derived from everyday life."

While much of the commercial kwaito can seem a million miles away from deep, melodic house with its shiny pop edge, the last year or

so has seen people like Oscar and local crew Jazzworx actively seeking to fuse the two styles and achieve a full African house hybrid.

"Our act Brothers Of Peace is more like house with an African feel," he says. "It links the two scenes together, it's much more African. We don't want to do what the guys in the USA or around the world are doing. We've got a track at the moment by Mafikizolo called 'Loot' that's going to be remixed by Masters At Work. It's a kwaito track but a little bit faster and hopefully it'll help get our music played abroad." House Afrika are also seeking fusion:

"African music is always being looked to and used by music producers," reckons Graeme. "There's been lots of tribal house. People have

done what they think is African, but there's a culture here with kwaito and slow house music that is quintessentially African. We want to take this and make it more accessible to overseas audiences by beefing up the production."

So it may not be too long before we're grooving to the slow beats of kwaito or mid-tempo here in Europe, but in the meantime only a visit to Jo'burg will get you the full experience. While the city is undoubtedly a dangerous place, it's worth remembering that for every rough spot there are several exciting places to hang out. Make sure you choose a taxi driver who knows his arse from his elbow and you should be just fine.

Muzik goes mad in Ibiza's coolest club

IBIZA LEGEND holds that when Space opens, the island opens. When Space closes, so does lbiza. Between these two bookends of summer

out of the Mr Muscle adverts

lies a whole rack of good times because, while magical things can happen elsewhere in Ibiza, magical things always happen at Space. The day before the opening, the offices of the club are a manic flurry of activity. Staff scurry between rooms while a queue of visitors wait for a chance to see key people. It's amazing just how

much is involved in throwing a party. "We are not nervous because it's always the same," chuckles Pepe Rosello, the owner of Space, as we sit in his office. "Every year we hurry. I've never found a way to do it better."

Pépe's organisational skills derive from a hotel background, but his ownership of Space derives from travelling the world and coming to a realisation:

"You give music to people and it's something that makes them dream and cry. The magic thing about music is that you can be old or young but everybody can feel the same thing."

Love will terrace apart: Yes, we know that sentence has no literal meaning, but it's quite clever, isn't it?



Pepe opened his first venue, the Playboy Club, in San Antonio in 1965 and was the first person on the island to come up with the notion of placing one turntable next to another, although admittedly without a mixer. He took ownership of Space some 14 years ago, already aware of the clubland ripples that were spreading across the island.

"I left San Antonio because I had a feeling that something big was going to happen and I was ready to do it."

The building in Playa d'en Bossa on the site of Space was originally used as a conference facility but Pepe's concept was to create a superclub.

"Because it's so huge, we created the concept and the name around its size. It's no more than that."

All the action originally focused on the cavernous inside room, with the now legendary outdoor terrace as a quiet after hours bar. But in 1990 Alex P leased the terrace, installed a sound system and a clubland institution was born. Disco al fresco.

For many clued-up clubbers worldwide, the terrace at Space is the number one party destination on the planet. A major part of the magic is that there are no VIPs in Pepe's dancefloor democracy.

"In my opinion music should make us equal. Here we have no special VIP areas because we believe everyone has to feel the same things at the same place at the same time. And the crowd seem to love it." That love spreads to punters and DJs alike.

"This is the magic thing," he says, energised, "this is why the DJs want to play here, because the crowd follows them! When Sasha plays a record it seems to be connected through his fingers to the soul of the crowd. This is the magic story of what is happening here."

Fritz Pangratz arrived in Ibiza from Germany nine years ago, began working the bar in Space and has progressed to become part owner. "For us, when we are preparing to re-open the club it's like we're opening a new club," he says, surprisingly relaxed. "And especially this year because we've changed a lot of stuff – the sound system, most of the lights, the inside bars and the DJ booth, which I hope will work really well."

Sundays have also changed, affected by the demise of Home in London. However, Home's Darren Hughes has stayed on to promote a new Sunday knees up called We Love Sundays At Space, with partners John Kennedy and a DJ by the name of Sasha. And if those guys don't know how to throw a party I'll eat my own sandals.

"The name of our party sums up what we feel about this legendary club," Hughes enthuses. "It's not every day that you feel you're contributing in to an important piece of clubbing history."

"Anybody who's ever been there will never forget it, will they? I can't think of anywhere else I'd rather be on a Sunday afternoon in

the summer - it's just so magnificent. There's a really good camaraderie as well, across all the people - the Spanish, Italians, Germans, English everyone always gets on in Space. There's something for everybody, it's like a world party. I think that's what makes it special. I remember sitting in there one time with one of those old brass ornamental telephones I'd nicked out of a villa, pretending people were on the other end. I was that off it that I just carried on with the charade all day. I was passing it to people of different nationalities, saying 'it's for you'. And it's weird how many of them thought it was their mums, picked it up and said, 'Mama?' There's something weird and twisted there."



Fritz is equally excited.

"We're really happy to have them running the party. They know what they're doing and they bring a lot of famous people here. Always people are saying '10 years ago it was better', but 10 years ago was a different time. Last year was a different time. As to whether it's better or worse in Ibiza this year, I don't know. We're happy with it. I just hope people accept our programme."

Well Fritz, there's a fair chance people will be more than accepting, because Space is close to clubbing perfection. It allows for a tidal movement of people around the terrace and through the guts of the club, the bars are all accessible and there is that polar, quasi-religious contrast of darkness and light. The theme of day and night, of inside and

out, forms part of the Space logo and is fulfilled with a whopping 22 hours of disco lunacy on a Sunday. But when all's said and done it's still all about two decks and a dancefloor. What really raises Space into the outer reaches of the club stratosphere is the people, the vibe of human beings really indulging in their lives.

"It's the crowd that makes the club," Fritz smiles. Of course there are Space albums, so you can take a slice of Space home with you, invite your pals round, fling open all the windows (weather allowing), kick back and have a little think about how fucking great it is to be alive.

But sitting in the offices of Space, so close to the actual terrace, just makes me itch with

"The first time I walked in there was to meet Alex, the first year the terrace was open in 1990. I just remember seeing all the bods that

we knew and it was like a home from home out in the sun. Overwhelming. All the memories are special at Space. When Alex used to own the bar we drank what we wanted because it was his bar. you know. We used to have birds laying on the bar, pouring drinks down them and licking it off. We've done some great things in there, just great memories, mate. I look back and I'm chuffed. The terrace has made it the most exclusive club to be honest, it's an amazing thing - it just epitomises the whole thing of having a good time in the sun and doing exactly what you want."

anticipation. That night I go to bed like a kid on Christmas Eve - I just want to get to sleep and get the whole bothersome business of bedtime over with so I can get up and get fully involved in the action, elbows out.

I arrive at the club at 3pm, disco solo and primed to make a mad, carnivorous lunge for chaos and anarchy. It's my third Space opening on the hop and it's like coming home. I am absorbed into the party, my day constructed of hazy sketches rather than any coherent image, finding friends - some I'd just met that weekend and some I've known for years. The terrace seems like a stretched-out, amoebic catwalk, planes passing low overhead, greeted by cheers as more people arrive to join the party - tanned bodies inside beautiful clothes, handshakes and hugs, music like a comfort quilt wrapped tight around the dancefloor - wall-to-wall smiles, glamour dripping from the walls like Gucci sweat, lithe bodies gyrating in the sunlight to the

magical music. A gorgeous chaos is unfurling in front of my eyes.

Jonathan Ulysses, Jason Bye, Sasha, Digweed, Steve Lawler - they all play music that bounces the crowd around the club as if in a game of punter ping-pong, the hours melting into a kind of Sunday mush. Then a voice pierces the miasma. It's a girl I first met at the opening of Space two years previously; a girl from Ecuador who's made the same pilgrimage for the opening. Spooky. We dance around for elastic hours, until I am all danced out and make my way out of the doors sometime around midnight.

I come round on Bora Bora beach, stretched out with a bottle of bubbly and a girl from Ecuador, a girl I only ever seem to meet at the opening of Space, as if in a recurring dream. As the waves of the Mediterranean lap gently at my feet I look up into the stars and am gripped by a sudden notion that magical things really do happen in Space.









"It's my favourite club in the world but my best memory is getting thrown out. I was lying upside down on a wall with

a joint in my mouth and I was dragged out from one side of the terrace to the other. I shouted to Alex P who was DJing at the time to sort it out and he ran off. I thought he was going to sort it out for me but he came back and videoed me getting lobbed out the gates. Which I thought was highly amusing."

FELIX DA HOUSECAT

Kittenz And Thee Glitz (City Rockers)

The house don with a poor grasp of spelling returns with something a bit ruder in tone

HE MUST be grinning like the Cheshire cat, that Felix, or perhaps even a Chicago one. In life and on the album's Hello! magazine pastiche cover, he seems like a nice fellow – stocky, drenched in drawled US mannerisms, wild dread-Einstein hair, slobbish American football shirt. You can picture him relaxing with a Coke or a six-pack, hauling his buds round for the Superbowl and a burger or 10. Kinda normal guy. Yeah, right. So from what well does he draw the deep-sleaze technoir sex-electro which comprises 'Kittenz And Thee Glitz'? As with a number of the best albums referred to over the next few pages, it's full of Eighties references, early Eighties Euro-pop references to be precise – The Human League, Soft Cell, Depeche Mode, Telex, that sort of thing. The clinically seductive sound which drew on the heritage of Kraftwerk's icily melodic romanticism is now itself being stylistically pillaged, and the result is simply, err, lucky us!

Which isn't to say this is a cartoon tribute to said era; far from it. Felix is still abusing his kit with all the rabid investigative enthusiasm he started out with as a 15 year-old studio prodigy. And topping off an already potent musical brew, clinching the deal, are the deadpan heroin-chic tones of Melistar and Miss Kittin.

Connoisseurs of porno electro will be familiar with the latter from her masterful collaborations with The Hacker. She's the lady you may have heard flatly intoning the lyrics to current Housecat single 'Silver Screen (Shower Scene)' with all the ennui of one of the Reeperbahn's finest during a dull bit of business. Kittin also appears on 'Madame Hollywood', a paean to hollow fame and empty hedonism.

Melistar more than matches the contributions of her French counterpart on equally low-life cuts such as 'Harlot' and the overly catchy 'Happy Hour' ("Happy hour/ Sun shower/808s give you power") while the pair play off each other on the B52's-alike 'What Does It Feel Like?'. But when Felix wants to head into more directly emotional waters, he turns down his noise boxes and lets Harrison Crump, a renowned, if stupidly named, pure house vocalist do the singing, as on 'Pray For A Star' or 'Runaway Dreamer'.

Elsewhere there's a stomping collaboration with Junior Sanchez, witty sonic tributes to Giorgio Moroder ('Glitz Rock'), synth guru/ twat Jean Michel Jarre ('Magic Fly') and Kraftwerk ('She Lives'), and even, as a sneaky hidden bonus track, the old 'My Life Muzik' gem. So anyone wishing to attend a party hosted by a genial American at which The Passions are playing 'I'm In Love With A German Film Star' while Weatherall and Dave Clarke man the decks and jaded deities pay for the nastiest sort of sex, this is your entry ticket. Get down. On someone. Thomas H Green



DILLINJA

Cybotron (Valve)

A very, very boshing 80 minutes in the company of a junglist original

GRRRR. That's the sound of this album. It's not clear why Dillinja is so pissed off, but the unremittingly dark and occasionally downright furious tone of 'Cybotron' would suggest that at the very least he's been passed over fora last Rolo or two. Perhaps a clue can be found in 'Go Dillinja', where a sample spits "Think I make music for fucking money?/Does it look like I'm making any money?". Or perhaps the key to his ire is on 'Together'. There, a female vocal begs the listener to "keep this scene together", over a ratcheting break and a brilliantly deployed clarinet sample. The 'scene' could be a failing relationship, or it could be the oft-afflicted junglist milieu of which 'Cybotron' is so resolutely and unfashionably a part.

Whatever the reasons, if having the hump causes Dillinja to continue making records as breathtaking as this, we should all go round his house every night and keep him awake by throwing stones at his bedroom window. From the moment the first sub-bass kicks in on 'Valve Sound', through the frantic, hip hopinfluenced 'Human B Bop', to the watery grave of 'All Aboard' (source of the album's sole moment of humour – a west country accent bellowing the title: a real side-splitter) and the aforementioned 'Go Dillinja' and 'Together', this album is as unstoppable and implacable as Gort in The Day The Earth Stood Still. And just as out of time, in its way. This is music for boys, all hard surfaces and 'futuristic' noises. It's a vibe only slightly tempered by the sweet female vocals, used here as another looped texture rather than in any traditional 'song' context. Who cares about fashion anyway? This is magnificent – too hard and long for the masses, but a head-pounding delight for the strong. Duncan Bell



Moloko

All Back To The Mine (Remixes 1995-2000) (Echo)

A few crackers save what's otherwise strictly B-side fodder

CYNICS would be forgiven for taking this release as evidence of moneyhunger on Moloko's part. Kinder souls might discern a more noble motive – to provide 'the fans' with superb mixes of their classics. But this theory loses water faster than a punctured colostomy bag when you bear in mind that out of about 150 tracks, there's exactly three stormers on 'All Back...'. Undeniably, the dancefloor-igniting DJ Plankton mix of 'The Time Is Now' is praiseworthy. But do we really need two further versions of that tune? Most especially not one which sounds like it's been lifted from the early Eighties, stripped of any decent instrumentation, then left abandoned, frightened and alone on CD 2. Quite frankly it would be more entertaining to hear Moloko try to justify releasing a double CD of remixes than it is to listen to the music. **Funke Kugbola**

Jose Padilla

Navigator (East West) Over-produced coffee table chill out from the White Isle icon

JOSE Padilla's Café Del Mar residency was one of Ibiza's musthears for a number of years in the Nineties, and 'Navigator' sails in those same hazy, lazy waters. Unfortunately, however, this is one of those albums that have simply had too much damn money lavished on them. You know you're far from the underground when Seal pops up as guest vocalist on one track, while an 80-piece orchestra saws away on a cover of Burt Bacharach's 'The Look Of Love'. 'Navigator' comes nowhere near what Zero 7, say, achieve with minimum resources but maximum ideas: the blandness is simply overwhelming. Cal Gibson

Crystal Waters

Gypsy Woman (Spectrum) Dodgy lower end of Top 40 fare circa '91-'96

THIS not even vaguely useful roundup of Miss Waters' hit has supposedly been released to celebrate the 10th anniversary of 'Gypsy Woman' reaching number two (aptly) in 1991. That tuneless 'classic' aside, it's hard to see why anyone would need this album. '100% Pure Love' and 'In Da Ghetto' are acceptable dancefloor tunes but the tribal take on 'You Spin Me Round (Like A Record)' is so dire you may start having nightmares about Pete Burns' mid-Eighties frightwig appearing at your bedroom window and cavorting with David Morales at his blandest. **Ralph Moore**

Earl 16

Cyber Roots (ePark) Toasting, boasting and other, stranger directions from the Leftfield collaborator

SOUNDING like a covert government death squad, Earl '16' Daley is in fact not a steelyeyed killer, but an innovative music producer. By combining reggae, dance, soul and chilled outbeats, he's managed to craft a unique, vibrant, fusion of sounds. Apparently the reggae market is 'slow' at the moment but this has not perturbed Earl, who strives to invent new opportunities and sub-genres at every turn. Intensify (Distinctive)

West Country duo hold the pace but don't increase the pressure

IT'S been a long and rocky road since 'The Gift' kick-started a brief but furiously intense bout of excitement for progressive's odd couple. The meeting of minds between techno whizz-kid Jody Wisternoff and Balearic progressive house veteran Nick Warren should never have worked, but somehow it all ended up as a widescreen, danceable fusion of their respective strengths.

Move the story on a few years, though, and the pair are left with everything to prove once again. With the 'The Fall' single barely grazing the Top 60, and the pair's subsequent dumping by BMG, 'Intensify' is going to be put under the microscope. Happily, the album more than stands up to such scrutiny. Having toned down some of the big room excesses of their eponymous debut, 'Intensify' presents a less showy, more likable side to Way Out West. Having been mercilessly honed on Warren and Wisternoff's international club jaunts, the likes of 'Hypnotise' and 'Shark Hunt' shimmer with tightly reined dancefloor energy. 'Intensify' and 'The Fall' even go one step further and pull off a combination of club kick with the kind of intricate delicacy lacking on previous releases.

Destiny (IDJ)

This percussive builder is very different from anything he has written to date. Check it out. **(LF)**

Tarantella

Karma (Whoop!)

Whoopl are once again on a roll, as they follow the wonderful 'Motherlode' with this classy piece of work from Tarantella. 'Karma' has the flavour of the moment: twisted, dark house with balls, presented in a quirky way, with an awesome female vocal to boot. **(P)**

Greed Featuring Lesley Fatal (Beak)

DCM

Elemental (Plastica)

After a simplistic, tribal intro that actually sounds quite removed from all that is progressive, we launch into a rather dirty, grunged-out funky monster. Eerie, drawn-out breakdowns and spocky female vocals give it the all-important pizazz. (P)

Salt Tank

The Energy (Bedrock)

As so many seem to be jumping on the deep house bandwagon it's good to see some of the old school still producing full on, full throttle masterpieces. Salt Tank have never been ones to sit back and go with the crowd. Instead, they create no-holds-barred tracks that excite the crowd. DJ Remy does his fabulous thing on the remix – funky, driving Dutch stuff. **(P)**

Cass & Slide

Opera (Evolution Remix) (Fire) Lifted from the forthcoming 'Prologue' compilation on the wonderful Fire, 'Opera' – one of the grandest progressive records of the last few years – gets the Evolution treatment. And that treatment is mighty fine, taking the avesome melody and plonking it over a kick ass beast of a track. Classic track – classic remix! (P)

Ralphie B

Massive/Disclosure (In Trance We Trust)

Tiësto dropped this at a recent gig in Amsterdam, causing me to think my liver was going to fail and the crowd to explode. It later transpired it was 25 year-old Ralphie B's first track. I dare say it will not be his last. **(LF)**

RR Workshop

50 K (Journey)

One of the more progressive Dutch labels, Journey, follow the debut RR Workshop release with a more traditionally Dutchsounding track. '50 K' starts harmlessly enough but wait as it builds – the simplest of riffs soon comes along to destroy any hope of an easy ride. One for the tuffer floors or those 'avin' it moments. (P)

Scanners

Superhighway (Limbo) After a rather long break and a few too many weak releases, Scottish label Limbo is back on track with a simple yet highly infectious, deep, club-bound groover. Screeching sirens add the all important lift and give it a purpose. Very cool. (P)

Central Mix Volume 1 (Central Intelligence) Now three years old, DJ Kalm's Central Intelligence imprint has established itself as a purveyor of experimental drum & bass the equal of Bristol's more celebrated Full Cycle. What the tracks collected here share is a ferocious energy, an unstinting rhythmic inventiveness and, above all, the vision to bring some weird new sounds into the fray. Kalm's contributions in particular (witness the strange fanfare of 'Violet') have an authentic glint of the future in their eyes. Essential.

Legacy

Global Spin (Bear Necessities) Legacy is one of the numerous aliases of Total Science, as the tin-sharp breaks and intermittent electronic outbursts of 'Global Spin' should make fairly clear. It's competently done, but you wonder whether they're not getting stuck in something of a rut with this hardcore revival sound. 'Point 7' is better purely on account of the tougher breaks, underpinning the assorted ghost-calls like the perfectly-oild workings of a munitions factory.

Sinthetix

Gateway (No U-Turn) Releases from this legendary label are few and far between but always worth the wait. Washington's Sinthetix, the first Americans to guest on No U-Turn, come with a mighty piece of sci-fi trickery and lethal radiance. Unsurprisingly, the sensation is something like being sucked into the incandescent heart of a computer, ground up and spat out again. Phew. The same goes for Anomaly. Something very dangerous surrounds you. A new force. You know that.

Sappo

Wheel Up (Advisory)

There's nothing particularly sophisticated about these four tracks from Manchester's Sappo, but they have a utfrieck charm of sorts. The title track sets the tone, looping the eponymous vocal sample over some particularly novious bass tones. The others are variations on this theme, all having the dark enveloping aura that's become Sappo's trademark. Bounce to this.

Exile

Bad Diet (Moving Shadow) Skip the noxious but rather overdone 'Amen'-assault of the title track and head straight for the aptly named 'Vermin Run'. It uses the same sludgy bass drone but with tighter drums that build but don't break the tension. 'Kryptonite' veers into filter house territory, albeit with a nifty little break, while 'Only If' combines Gerry Rafferty jazz licks with some edgy beats.

Spirit/Digital

Mayhem/Gateman (Phantom Audio)

Excellent stuff from Spirit, sweetening the industrial clatter of recent releases with a congo-driven break that rolls and rolls. Over on the flip, Digital comes with a brand new take on a classic (and long-neglected) steppers' beat. His much-loved ragga samples, a voluminous bassline and metallic panic tones create a mood of dub-inlimbo psychosis. Deadly.

κ

Oblivious (Subtitles) More overtly hardcore-influenced than most of his previous releases, K's 'Oblivious' uses a delicately galloping break as the skeleton on which to hang a host of spectral sounds. The best is the one that evokes Neptune blowing a conch in some far off ocean waste. 'Still Moving', slower and more electronicsounding, further demonstrates K's originality and willingness to experiment.

Q Project

40 Below (Function)

This uses the tried and tested language of jazz jungle but at a velocity that renders familiar motifs strange. Best of all is the interplay between the svelte beat-flicker and the half tempo swagger of the bass. Turn to 'Safety Clause' for a ragga-tinged number reminiscent of Digital, but with the same tight flow and Total Science's trademark soundhallucination weirdnesses. Fire 'pon youl

Aquasky

Ghost (J-Raq Remix) (Sonix) J-Raq's 'Ghost' re-lick is an improvement on the original, the fragmented flow of his breaks creating considerably more tension than the allout attack of Aquasky's version. Uncomplicated but effective. Turn over for a treat, namely Tech Itch's stunning version of 'Lords Of Motion'. An opening of barely credible sublimity turns into a typical Tech Itch sci-fi destroyer, fluid breaks underpinning the malevolent bass-tones like robotic scorpions under a leaden sky. Music for killing to, natch.

State Of The Artist Shee Been

Luca and Michele of Milan's Shee Been Records give us a label lowdown

How did the label come into being? "Shee Been Records is a collaboration between Royalty Records and Guidance Kru. The two organisations set up Shee Been in 1999 to advance the sounds and styles of Italian drum & bass alongside their international counterparts.' Is there a distinct Italian sound that you try to represent? "It's really hard to pick on singular influences in our productions. The common background is mainly bass-oriented music from reggae to hip hop, jazz to hardcore, filtered by a Mediterranean attitude." Favourite release so far? "Of our own stuff, it's our first international twelve - Digital's 'Fool Bwoy' backed with Alpha V & Hellen's 'Sound Witch Project'. If you mean drum & bass in general then we'd have to say most of the stuff on Partisan and Reinforced. Doc Scott's remix of 'NHS', Adam F's 'Metropolis' and Photek's 'The Seven Samurai'." What's next? "To keep connecting Italian and worldwide artists."

Klute

We R The Ones (Klute Remix) (Certificate 18)

Bringing a much-needed inventiveness to the neglected art of breaks manipulation, Klute's remix of his own 'We R The Ones' is tailor-made for Goldie's relaunched Metalheadz night. It takes its cue from Rage-era hardcore, sure, but in a way that's a thousand times wilder and funkier than all those Total Science soundailkes. Over on the other side, Doc Scott comes with a stripped-down version of 'Chicks'.

Polar 5am (Certificate 18)

Fairly subdued stuff from Polar, combining a minimal drum pattern with a simple melodic motif. A grower, perhaps. 'Airlock' utilises more typical Polar rhythms – metallic, delicate and with a mercurial swiftness – in a slow building

roller with echoes of the early Warp sound. Competent and unusual but curiously bloodless.

Dylan & Loxy

End Of Days Remix (Cylon) You can get a fair idea of the sort of stuff that comes out on Loxy's Cylon Recordings by just glancing at the track titles. Names like 'Dark Skies', 'Disease', 'The Enemy' and 'Hammered Head' all suggest an output wholly free of false optimism and sub-Bukem jazzwank. This one's no exception, the real treat being Mindmachine's uncomplicatedly nasty 'Epidemic' on the flip. It's punk, baby.

Albums

Omni Trio

Even Angels Cast Shadows (Moving Shadow)

While lacking the punch of his seminal early Nineties EPs, Rob Haigh's work still has a certain charm. Not that it bears any relation to the current state of drum & bass – the dinky beats and manna-fromheaven sweetness of tracks like 'Higher Ground' would be more at home on 'Ibiza Sunset 6' than the dancefloor at Fabric. As ghoulish fuel for nocturnal car journeys, though, some of this can't be beat.

Various Artists

J Majik Presents Infrastructure (Infrared)

For the most part, the material on this follow-up to last year's 'Nightvision' compilation falls prey to the recurrent sin of so much current drum & bass. Tracks like Future Bound's 'We Analyze' wholly sacrifice funk to flow, resulting in dully plodding darkcore that seems a million miles from the radicalism of early jungle. Honourable exceptions are Future Bound & Protocol's slow-tempo 'Iron Eyes' and Dillinja's brutal remix of 'Love Is Not A Game'.

Messrs Butler and Yardley – more commonly known by breakbeat junkies and hungry A&Rs as Stanton Warriors – summon up all their funk, drive, skills and street savy and ... give it to someone else for a remix. S'blody brilliant so we won't complain too much. Sneak previews of their recent original material further proves they're more than the Emperor's new clothes.

Unreal 2

Enter The Darkness (Unreal) A colossal tune, possibly not for easy home listening. Rennie Pilgrem is behind this breakbeat behemoth, already the highlight of Freq Nasty's set and more drum & bass than most drum & bass records. If you get my drift. Guaranteed to tear the roof off the sucker and more instant than Coco Pops. Whether you want to hear this every morning is another thing.

The Guidelinez

Higher States Of Nu Skool (Unstable Label)

Hmm. The title will give you just a little hint of which tune has been cut and pasted over a sub-stepper breakbeat garage beat, and cranked up to 11. 'Noise Bringer' tampers with the best hip hop group ever for more of the same. Lots of (other) people will like this.

Sons Of Slough Omegadent (Skint)

X-Press 2, Freq Nasty, and now this. . . . blimey. Minimal machine music to get Electrocuted with. Disdainful of commercial appeal and mindful only of the pleasure this release will bring to the connoisseur, lan Weatherall (yes) and co serve up a Detroit delight.

Subvert

The Therne (Vertical Drop) PM Scientist Damian Lazarus opens his new label's account with this breakbeat garage effort on target with the likes of the Stanton Warriors. Obvious samples aside, there's more than enough bass and beats here to move the crowd for the requisite four minutes. Watch out for future developments.

Twisted Future (Pulse) Glenn Future Funk hits hard with a well produced slab of breaks from the dark side. What the hardcore blips and staccato breaks lack in warmth they make up for in energy, with the track actually improving as it progresses. Phantom Beats continue their upward curve on the flip.

Chabilian

Stabiliser What It Takes (Plastic Raygun)

Busy boy Stabiliser gets a percussive shuffle bump funk on. Keyboard stabs sneak in behind breaks that are tighter than a mouse's ear, while muted 303s and sensible atmospherics are nicely underpinned by sexy bongos. The best release on this label to date.

Foxy Brown

Oh Yeah (Def Jam)

The long-awaited return from the 'ill nana' Foxy Brown comes in the form of this regae-ish single which samples Toots & The Maytals. Infectious and very club-orientated, this is one of a number of strong cuts featured on Foxy's forthcoming album, 'Broken Silence'.

PYT

Same OI', Same OI' (Epic) A thinly disguised take on Dre's 'Next Episode' works as the backing track for the debut from this new adolescent rap/r&b girl group. On paper it sounds cheesy, but it actually works really well. A very nice little piece for DJs.

Keke Wyatt

Used To Love (white label)

A really strong track which exemplifies a welcome shift, noticeable in a few current r&b tunes. Built around a hard-hitting backing track, the debut cut from this new female singer manages to have a soulful feel without being retro, and a hard contemporary edge without sounding like just another post-Timbaland r&b production. Great voice as well.

Nivea

Don't Mess With The Radio (Jive)

In a similar vein to the above, this is another original-sounding, strong track which in this case heralds a welcome return to form from Atlanta legends Organized Noise. An instantly hooky synth bassline drives this tune from a new teeny r&b girl vocalist Nivea. Great backing track, cute voice, but the song itself doesn't quite deliver what it seems to promise, annoyingly. So a good rather than great tune.

Missy 'Misdemeanor' Elliott Featuring Ludacris

One Minute Man (East West) On the third release from her recent LP, Missy bemoans all those one minute men out there, with a tune whose lyrics probably took about that amount of time to write. A bit lacklustre all round and nowhere near as strong as its predecessors.

The next single, 'Life' is due out in mid summer on Def Soul Sunshine Anderson main man Mike City, and typical of his slightly retro style, this deceptive track has an uptempo feel, but Cozier's almost crooned vocal gives it an almost independent soul feel. If you like Carl Thomas you'll definitely like this.

JA Rule

Unreleased Shit (white label) JA Rule's pill-popping take on Barry White's evergreen 'Ecstasy' forms the backbone of this white label of unreleased cuts. A nice track for DJing. The other tracks and freestyles are more for the collectors and radio DJs.

Torture

Screwball (Featuring MOP)/ Turn It Up (Hydra)

New group Torture invite MOP to scream along to their debut 'Screwball' with predictably hardcore results. However, the track that swung the purchase for me was the Lyn Collins-sampling B-side, 'Turn It Up' which has a good floorwarning feel to it.

Hi Tek

Hi Teknology (album sampler) (Rawkus)

A radio sampler from the Hi Tek album but featuring a sneaky little r&b cut, 'Round & Round', which I'd advise anyone to pay a listen to. A guitar-led beat is the backbone for a nice, soulful r&b song from singer Jonell. With three other tracks, including 'The Sun God' featuring Common, this 12-inch is definitely worth hunting down.

Eight Unreleased Red Peppers (white label)

From the naughty people who previously brought out two EPs of hard-to-get Mary J remixes, comes another very slickly packaged set, this time focused on Jodeci. Included are Mr Dalvin's superb mix of 'Freek'N'You' featuring Ghostface Killa and Raekwon, as well as a Def Squad mix of 'Get On Up' and some unreleased tracks. A must for fans.

Philly's Most Wanted

Please Don't Mind (Atlantic)

Yet another Neptunes production with the group's various MCs taking turns at the mic, while an r&b singer knocks out the chorus. A solid piece of work (even if one of the group raps like Puffy) and quite club-friendly to boot.

DJ AP Featuring Jaheim & Shoznuff

Let It Go (AV8)

A typical AV8 mish-mash throwing Jaheim's vocals into the pot with a naggingly familiar backing track and a rap from Shoznuff. Interesting rather than earth shattering.

dark arts? Sensory derangement? Let's have a party! Coil's 1991 masterpiece arrived in a Britain going hardcore acid house bonkers, and warned us that "darkness is rising".

musique concrète, acid beats filtered through Coil's weirdisation machines and vocals from John Balance, Marc Almond and loopy chanteuse Annie Anxiety, 'LSD' (do you see?) took dance music's quest for new sounds and new drug experiences to its logical confusion. The band nearly killed themselves in the studio, painstakingly piecing together the album's aural tapestry, and William Blake (artist, poet and visionary), Aleister Crowley (occultist) and Satan (popular religious figure) came along for the ride.

'The Snow' remains the group's most commercial release to date, while 'Windowpane' and 'Further Back And Faster' similarly married Coil's brooding sensibilities to acid structures. The result was like a Monet painting – apparently simple from a distance, incredibly complex up close. Darker matter like the live evil of 'Titan Arch' and 'Chaostrophy' laid bare the potentially negative effects of all that naughty ecstasy taking. All this invocation of dark

All this invocation of dar powers couldn't go unpunished, and 'LSD' has been unavailable for five years. But who know what the future holds. . .

'Love's Secret Domain' may or may not be re-released via World Serpent in the next two months resulting beatless, rather morose algorithm 'n' blues suggests that while machines can be beautiful, they're probably not much fun down the pub. (TM)

Universal Indicator

Universal Indicator (Rephlex) "A compilation of Rephlex's 'egendary' acid twelves mixed by Mike Dred? This'll be wicked." That's what we thought as we put this on, anyway. But by the time the album finally ended, 303 minutes of industrial strength, laudaby tune-free acid techno later, we were jerking spasmodically, our teeth were ground down to stumps and the peasants from the local village were at the gates of Leftfield Towers, angrily brandishing pitchforks and torches. Approach with cution. (DB)

Kid 606

PS You Love Me (Mille Plateaux) Adding substance to rumours that Kid 606 has "gone mature" since eschewing his customary spazz-jerk digital discombobulation on the understated 'PS I Love You' album, the 'sensible' remixes here mostly aim for that refined Germanic sound for which the Force Tracks stable is renowned. On the other hand, you get the feeling Mr Kid wanted to make a 'click-house' record but couldn't be arsed, so drafted in Atom Heart, Matmos, Twerk et al to do it for him. Slacker. Still, he's also added four new, un-remixed tracks of his own (the standout being the closer, 'Goodbye'), just for the sake of perversity. (TM)

Nils Petter Molvaer

Recoloured (Universal Jazz) An album of remixes of the 'legendary' Norwegian jazz person, this is far better than it has any right to be. That's testament to a varied, expertly chosen panel of remixers well-known (Herbertl Funkstörung) Deathprodl) and perhaps not so (Jan Bang? Joakim Lone?). The highlights of a lovely jubbly set are Herbert's beautiful, syncopated 'Merciful' and Mind Over Midi's 'Dead Indeed', which is the best slow-burning doombient head-nodder since Biosphere's 'Mir', Brains and beauty inna ya area. **(DB)**

Ruby

Altered And Proud (Wichita) Ruby's 'Short-Staffed At The Gene Pool' gets re-rubbed, re-worked and re-zerrected by Kid 606, Schneider TM and some other people who aren't household names even in their own households. Nearly every track ends up with a more interesting arrangement than it had originally, with Leslie Rankine's smouldering, sexy/scary vocals left largely intact. Three good remix albums in one month? What's going on? (DB)

Phonophani

Genetic Engineering (Rune Grammofon) This starts with a throb, before looped, vocodered vocals come in and nag at you like double-glazing salesmen. What follows is 50 minutes of sublime sonic experimentation that seldom loses your attention and – hoorah! – doesn't sound anything like Autechre. Or anyone else, come to that. Serious music that doesn't rely on pissing about with more popular forms but instead gets down to inventing its own, runic musical language. A quiet triumph. **(DB)**

Little Nobody Action Hero (If?)

Action Fiero (ii?) Sample-heavy Australian record that if we were being terribly lazy we might describe as 'a bit like a more leftfield Avalanches, only better'. Generally quite old skool industrial in sound, this periodically throws some incongruous acid/filter house party shapes, which is a bit like Gordon Brown breaking off from talking about monetary policy to dance the Can-can. And we all know how great that is. (DB)

Panoptica

01/ 02/ 03/ 04 (Certificate 18) Russell Haswell

Live Salvage 1997-2000 (Mego)

Minimal titles and interesting covers are the (faintly desperate) 'theme' here. Mexican Panoptica's interesting if over-stretched deep, techy house comes packaged in four of the most beautiful 10-inch packages we've ever seen. Haswell – Aphex DJ partner and purveyor of screeching laptop mutilation – goes the opposite route and features a cover that's so black, you have to ask how much more black it could be. It reminded us of death. But death sells! As will 'Live Salvage' – though mostly to smug wankers who like to confuse their less 'artistic' friends with a barrage of outré unpleasanthess. (DB/TM)

Flowchart

Wishworm (Endorphin) Certain deep house aficionados of our acquaintance almost managed to rouse themselves from their comfy sofas in appreciation of this curious Philadelphia, USA duo's recent 'Gee Bee' EP. High praise indeed. With its clipped Art Of Noise-style vocal sampling, deceptively straightforward beats and eccentric space age demeanour, the follow-up LP 'Wishworm' is more of the same. A tiny bit too much more, perhaps. (TM)

John Oswald

Plunderphonics (Seeland) John Oswald may only be 'legendary' in the sense that nobody knows who he is, but you'll recognise many of the songs contained on this double-CD-with-freebook retrospective of his career. The techniques he pioneered - he was sampling (or "creatively appropriating", as his devotees would have it) Led Zep records as far back as 1975 - are as commonplace now as camp celebrity chefs on cable TV. Oswald also bore the brunt of the music industry's first wave of huffiness over 'intellectual property' and has become something of a cause celèbre as a result. On the whole we'd rather listen to Raven Maize 'doing' Queen and Simple Minds, but Oswald scores extra fortune-telling points for naming a 1993 track 'Horrendous Trance Sigh Trend'. (TM)

Desert Island Disco the inside track on hunting rare vinyl



TERRY FARLEY and Pete Heller came together as part of London's legendary Boy's Own collective at the end of the Eighties. Though Pete is probably the better known half of the duo due to his recent chart success, Terry was initially the more influential figure and was the back-room president at both Shoom and Spectrum, spinning reggae and rare groove. But changing with the mood of the times, he was also behind the much sought after 'Balearic Beats' compilation on ffrr in 1988.

Farley and Heller's first release together was as part of the Bocca Juniors – who included Andy Weatherall – with 'Raise (63 Steps To Heaven)'. The first release on Boy's Own productions, 'Raise...' lifted the piano hook from the Balearic classic, 'Jesus On The Payroll', by the Thrashing Doves and came out in summer, 1990. 'Substance', the indie-dance orientated second – and last – Bocca Juniors

twelve came out the following year. In 1992, Farley & Heller teamed up as Fire Island, the first release being the hip house-influenced 'In Your Bones'/'Ripe Island' - again on Boy's Own. That same year, after splitting from ffrr, Boy's Own became Junior Boy's Own, and 'In Your Bones' and 'Fire Island' became respectively the first and third releases on the label. In 1993 came a cover of Machine's disco classic, 'There But For The Grace Of God'. Another cover followed in 1995, this time with Blaze's garage anthem, 'If You Should Need A Friend', receiving the Fire Island

treatment. In 1997 the rather subdued 'White Powder Dreams' lacked the impact of its predecessors, but the following year they teamed up with Loleatta Holloway to put matters straight with 'Shout To The Top'. The last Fire Island release was remixes of 'There But For The Grace Of God' by Futureshock and Joey Negro in 1999 on is the third incarnation of the Boy's Own label, Junior.

Farley and Heller are also well known under their Roach Motel moniker, which they debuted in 1993 with the classic double A-side 'The Right Time'/'Movin' On' on Junior Boy's Own. In the same year, 'Transatlantic' kept it deep and funky with an American flavour. 1997 saw a reworking of Billie's 'Nobody's Business' called 'Happy Bizzness'. In 1995, as the Heller & Farley Project on JBO offshoot Jus' Tracks they put out 'From The Dat Volume 1', which included a remix of Ultra Naté's 'How Long', called 'Ultra Flava'. This went on to become a dub house classic and was picked up by AM:PM the following year.

At the end of 1998, Pete Heller's 'Big Love' was released, becoming a massive hit. As Stylus Trouble he put out 'Sputnik' in 2000 – both on Junior. Also on the same label, Terry Farley's Second Hand Sneakers treated us to 'The Ride'.

Farley and Heller were remixing together throughout the Nineties under the guises of Roach Motel, Fire Island and Boy's Own, to name but a few, for everyone from U2 to Green Velvet. Here are some of the best...



Buried Treasure Joyce Sims: 'All 'N' All' (London)

BEFORE acid house, Spectrum, smiley faces and pills, there was electro. But electro wasn't just about Adidas-clad b-boys spinning on their heads. It was also about soul – and the Mantronix mix of 'All 'N' All' is probably the greatest electro soul record of them all.

For starters, it boasts what has to rate as one of the best 808 breaks ever recorded, but better still is the way Mantronix laid Sims' longing, almost desperate vocals over his urgent rush of synths and strings. It was an absolute triumph – a truly perfect record. Ironically though, it was also the last of its kind, as a few months after its 1986 release, 'Jack Your Body' ram-raided the charts, house music took hold and the 808 drum machine was banished in to obscurity for a good few years. The end of an era, then... but what a way to go. (DM)

'Flash' (Open promo 12-inch, 1996) Promo 12-inch on the now-defunct Open label includes the Roach Motel 'Junior Funk Mix' as well as a Carl Craig mix and the original.

10. Francois K

'Time & Space' (NRK 12-inch, 1998) Farley & Heller's main mix gives Kervorkian's deep house classic a touch of their own, inimitable flavour.

Gatecrasher Summer Sound System

WHAT GOES AROUND comes around, as Cypress Hill once observed. Whereas 2000 saw a sun-scorched Gatecrasher Summer Sound System guffawing through its fluorescent dummies at the rain-sodden Homelands, this year's bone-dry, Pulp and Orbital bolstered Homelands leaves the 'Crasher kids laughing on the other side of their silver faces, as they're forced to wade around with mud caked all the way up their furry boots.

Inevitably, then, the afternoon's rain-lashed proceedings are something of a damp squib. Musiq Soulchild pours his heart out to the wind and the rain and not much else, while the vehicle containing Mos Def doesn't even manage to make it to the site at all, thereby avoiding becoming Mos Damp.

Indeed, the whole thing would be a massive disappointment were it not for the small matter of the 20,000 rabid club kids rammed into the sweaty confines of the Gatecrasher Arena. Yes, despite rumours to the contrary, trance is still the daddy on this manor. You can be as cool as you like with your prog house and what have you, but give the fluoro massive a bombastic synth run and Pavlovian breakdown and what you have is not far away from pandemonium.

And for more of the same, how about the return of Faithless on the outdoor stage? Their first UK gig in nearly two years looks set to end in a soggy disaster but cosmically, just before they come on stage, the sky turns blue and the sun peeks out for the first time. The result is pure hands-in-the-air, goose-pimples down your neck territory, as they tear through a tight, tight set of classics ('Insomnia', 'God Is A DJ') and equally impressive newies ('Tarantula', 'We Come 1') to a rapturous reception.

After all that excitement, there's just time to nip into the Chemical Generation Arena for a blotter of acid house from Slam before Craig David takes to the main stage. Slam's live set-up – a drummer and MC adding to the standard two blokes behind a desk – adds a considerable kick to material from their 'Alien Radio' long player, and when early Nineties classic 'Positive Education' rumbles forth, it all goes nice-one-sorted-on-one-matey, in unarguable fashion, as acid teds hug each other and reminisce about 'back in the day'. It all seems a bit perverse, then, to leave in favour of Craig David's sanitised r&b bizness. True, the Artful Dodger-goes-Timbaland version of 'Re-Rewind. . .' is itchily impressive, but all this beardy jazz-step and adolescent bedroom funk cannot compare to the tent-bound lunacy at this midnight hour. Especially when you've got Suv mixing up Zinc's 'Casino Royale' in a blasting drum & bass tent just around the corner.

It's left to the Chemicals to put us back on track. Tom Rowlands may have lopped off his trademark long, flaxen blonde locks, but he's suffered no Samson-style loss of potency. Indeed, if the monster of a track which is the armlifting 'It Began In Africa' is anything to go by, the next Chemicals album is gonna be their most visceral and clubby work to date. Can't wait.

After the Chemicals, the night gradually blurs into a muddy ascent towards bliss. A slice of Morillo perhaps, followed by a large portion of Cox? DJ and producer Nicky Holloway trades his vinyl for thin air

"I'LL CARRY THAT FOR YOU."

It's a sound as common in the DJ world as the mellifluous glide from one tune to the next, or the urgent tattoo beaten out on the nation's toilet seats with credit cards. It's the sound of a shapely young lady (in a spray-on dress and chopstick-thin heels who looks like she might collapse any minute under the weight of her tiny handbag) offering to carry a 30-kilo box of records for a strapping, boozed-up DJ with a face like a root vegetable and a show on the radio. It's midnight on Friday night and this is the sound of now. But not, it seems, the sound of the future. Yes, DJ groupies beware: digital technology could well be on the way to rendering vinyl - and record boxes - obsolete, MP3 files have well and truly arrived.

Old news you may say. But now you can mix MP3 files and, shock horror, it's easy. It can even sort out tempo differences for you. Webheads have known about the software behind this for



months and between them have downloaded over 4 million copies of Visiosonic's groundbreaking program. But now this technology is finding its way into the clubs. And leading the way is none other than house music

pioneer Nicky Holloway. But, before we get on to that, what exactly are MP3 files? Well, MP3 files are an offshoot of DVD



technology which first used MP3 to carry audio information. The MP3 format allows you to squash an otherwise enormous amount of audio information into a space that is 10 or 20 times smaller. Very handy. And, what is more, you can move them around in the digital world with the same ease as you would a Word document or a downloaded JPEG (picture file) from a porn site.

As Nicky points out, "the thing about it that makes it so good is that if you have a network of friends who make records, well, I could be around the other side of the world and Paul Oakenfold might have just finished a track, and he can e-mail it to me. I haven't got to get an acetate made up for £80. I like the flexibility of it."

Of course, MP3 has its sceptics. Purists say the sound quality is not what you might expect from a digital format and, technically, they're right. MP3s are not recorded at 44.1kHz (CD quality) and the sound is

compressed. But this is done in a way that can actually improve what you hear over a sound system because of the nature of the frequencies that are removed.

Nicky Holloway is certainly a fan. Considering the MP3 format in a club context, he says: "Most clubs you play in have got the system set up so you can't touch the amps, you can't touch anything. You've got what you're given and that's the way it's gonna sound.



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"Half the time the EQs don't work on the mixer anyway cos they're fed up with people playing about, messin' around with it. I've found that I get a better sound with my laptop than a lot of sound systems are set up to produce. If you put on a record and an MP3 next to each other, I think MP3 sounds better - I really do. Some people will argue the toss on that. I've talked with other DJs girlfriends, who've pooh-poohed it, you know, going to me 'you can't beat the warm sound of the record and it don't sound as good,' and all that, and I'm thinking, 'You twat, you've just heard that from some DJ or something'.

Point taken - but there's more. "I think it is revolutionary as far as DJing goes and if I were starting to DJ tomorrow I'd get into this. To me, when I go to a club, I judge the night and the DJ on what comes out of the speakers, what I'm listening to. I don't care how it's delivered to me; it's not the technology - I don't care if it's played to me off a CD, MP3 or a fucking eight track. So all this snobbery to do with vinyl - I'm not even interested. I don't care about it. People who practise that sort of snobbery are probably narrowminded and not into a lot of things."

Nicky has been pioneering MP3 use in his DJ sets now since he first came across the Visiosonic PCDJ software about a year ago. The mixing software was first dreamed up by Swede Jorgen Hedburg. He came over to the USA to try to develop the product and teamed up with Joe Vangieri in Tampa, Florida – in the process setting up a company, Visiosonic, with such luminaries as Nile Rodgers (ex-Chic man and producer for Sister Sledge and



many more) sitting on the board. Nowadays, 130,000 people are online, mixing on their site, at any given moment.

Numark have made a prizewinning controller, much like a varispeed CD controller, to make the software DJ-friendly. Oh, and the software is distributed worldwide and they are making friends in high places, such as Universal Music International.

So what's all the fuss about? Visiosonic gives you an on-screen representation of two varispeed CD players in the top half of the screen, with the lower half devoted to the tracks you have loaded into the system (a virtual record box, if you like). Nicky Holloway has 4,500 tracks in his, including all the old favourites. "It's the mobile DJ of the future!" he says.

But do promoters buy into it? Do you have to take some records along, just so people can see you do something?

"Yeah, I feel that sometimes they're acting like you're cheating. But anyone can play records. At least I'm doing something a little bit different. You can't just do this overnight; you have got to put a good few months' worth of effort into it to get started.

This lack of instant gratification could also be considered a drawback. Even for a DJ like Nicky, with over 500 years experience (possibly), getting started hasn't been straightforward.

"It took me a year to get to this stage, working at weekends and in the evenings in fits and starts. You've got to get a lot of tracks into your hard drive, file them in a way that makes sense, normalise them all, so they're all the right level. It even takes time just getting it so the names come up right."

Rats! But there are up-sides. You can record any music that takes your fancy – yours, your mates, your mum's – if you've got the patience. And your patience will be rewarded, because once you get the songs in the software, the PCDJ will do most of the beat-mixing for you. It will work out the bpm of any given song. Then, when you want to mix that song in, it will adjust the tempo appropriately. So, with no tinkering at all, you can mix a new tune in,



knowing that it is running at the same speed.

"It's much easier to get speeds right – it does it for you – but it only works on tracks you've already bpm'd. The preparation is the bit that takes the time."

But can this system ever replace vinyl? Surely you can't scratch on MP3, for starters?

"Well I can't do it, but you can scratch on them. John Acquaviva showed me what he was doing and it's like two records with timecode recorded on them and that timecode runs the MP3 track. It's coming out in September. I can't wait to get one, so it actually looks like you're playing records."

There is still the odd teething problem though. The software can clash with other applications on your PC if you don't set it up sensibly (as with most music software). Nicky's getting a portable PC, dedicated to MP3 mixing, to get around the problem.

But there are also more cool features than there is space to write about here. You can, for instance, save multiple cue points through any of the tracks in your virtual record box and hop between them instantaneously, creating your own remix in real time. But it's easy to get carried away with this, which as Nicky points out, can be bad news for the punters.

"There's nothing worse than hearing DJs fucking about with records all the time. If, during a set, they do some trickery three or four times, it has impact. But when someone does it every other fucking record, you're like, 'leave it alone, I want to hear the record!'

"It might make people more adventurous though. I can see myself sticking records together that I would never have thought would go together."

So while the DJ/producer may not evolve to the next level just yet, you may soon get to hear Nicky Holloway drop the Beatles into an underground house set. And you can catch him every other Sunday at El Divino, in Ibiza this summer, or next summer in any one of the 38 countries he plans to tour – all of which he's played before. Naturally, he'll be taking his MP3 mixer with him wherever he goes.

Logic Audio Platinum 4.7 update

AVAILABLE now for a few weeks, the 4.7 update is available free to Logic users from the EMagic web site. Improvements include:

- More advanced TDM compatibility (for Pro Tools users)
- Unified MIDI and audio engine
- Hierarchical menus for easy access into the environment and to your plug-ins (which is a bit of a shock at first for about five minutes!)

But what does all this mean to you if you re already familiar with Logic? Does it feel significantly different? The inclusion of the unified audio and MIDI engine was a feature that EMagic were going to introduce with Logic 5, but – as they felt it was ready – included it here for Version 4 users. Being able to loop audio is very useful and I'm sure there are other advantages but the unified engine does appear to have slowed down some basic functions (eg cutting midi patterns takes a little longer than before). Something else we've clocked is that when in Cycle mode, the cursor occasionally continues along the Arrange page instead of returning back to the left locator even though the tune is actually looping.

standard and the filter is powerful, enabling you to Norman Cook the mix up as much as you like.

There are 16 DSP effects, each with five control parameters, including various reverbs, delays, chorus/ flangers and the like. Auto-Tune 3 Sure, she's gorgeous, but can she sing?

UNLESS you've been living on the dark side of Planet Dull for the last two or three years, you'll have heard the effects of Auto-Tune. Basically, it's a very nifty piece of software that could make The Spice Girls sound like Sister Sledge or the Pet Shop Boys like The Five Blind Boys Of Alabama. . .

Okay, that may be a slight overstatement, but at least you'd end up with vocals that are in tune and deliver a "performance".

Consider the situation in year 1 BAT (Before

Auto-Tune) – the dodgy singer would yowl along to the backing track and the producer would have two rather depressing choices: either to 'drop in' on the track, to record every phrase/word/letter individually, resulting in a technically in-tune, but lifeless performance; or record many takes of the vocal and then splice together the best bits. Again, it tends to result in a technically improved but emotionally challenged result. But with Auto-Tune, you can obtain a far better result because you can correct all of the out of tune bits in an otherwise kickin' vocal performance.

Of course, like any piece of kit designed to do a specific job, certain sonic alchemists will always devise some wild and wacky ways to (ab)use it. . Perhaps the first widely heard use of extreme auto-tuning was on Cher's 1999 hit 'Believe'. Since then, the effect has been used on countless r&b tunes – in many cases on sweet voices that have little trouble staying in tune in the first place.
So, how does it work?

Well it is, of course, all a matter of periodic and aperiodic waveforms, but let's not worry too much about that. Suffice to say, so long as you tell it what key you're trying to sing in, it'll analyse what you're singing and convert it into what you'd ideally like to sing.

There are two modes...

Automatic (dead easy) or Graphical (more difficult, but more fun). You also get a bewildering array of choices for dialling in the song's key. The latest version, Auto-Tune 3, adds a snazzy new look, support for stereo audio files and the magic 88.2/96k sample rates. You also get: • A revised 'Core Pitch Detection Algorithm' that greatly improves pitch detection reliability in both Automatic and Graphical modes. • The ability to select the pitch range of the voice/instrument you're working on, from Soprano all the way down to Bass Instrument at 25Hz, so your subs will be knockin' down the house in a truly phase-coherent stylee. • The ability to set target pitches in real time via MIDI from a keyboard or sequencer track. • A new 'Make Scale From MIDI' function for occasions when it is not clear exactly what key a melody line is in - as with, say, Underworld's Karl Hyde - or where the line has too many accidentals to fit comfortably into a conventional scale. For those occasions, this function allows you to simply play the line from a MIDI keyboard or sequencer and let Auto-Tune 3 make a custom setting containing only those notes that

you may think that's all it can do. Actually, lots of instruments can use it to great advantage. Fretless bass, violin, trombone and the theremin all feature continuous pitch potential

Here are some other ideas for using Auto-Tune 3 – download the demo version and try 'em out.

• To produce instant double tracking in one take, record onto two tracks, processing only one of the tracks through Auto-Tune 3. If you're going for a tight double track, set Retune Speed rather fast and Detune Auto-Tune 3 slightly. Increase both of these parameters to broaden the doubled effect. You can also use some vibrato to make a more dynamic effect (small depth and rate values are best, with medium delay). Of course, you can also decide to record a single virgin track and bounce that to another, processing through Auto-Tune 3. This way you can dial in the effect while auditioning the mix.

• Recording with two mics (as above) while improvising can also produce 'heterophonic' effects (the effect of two players and instruments playing the 'same' melody, which actually varies with some different pitch material). The more constrained your scale is in Auto-Tune 3, the more variation there will be between the two performances.

• To set up a drone or ambient aura behind a melodic performance, try sending some of the signal to Auto-Tune 3 with an extremely constrained scale (for example, in the key of C: C, F, G, A#) and then on to a lush, long reverb. The effect produced will be a steady backdrop of chanting tones behind the main melodic material.

 Don't be afraid to use just as little of Auto-Tune 3 as you need. It's quite possible that a performer has really quite good intonation but fails consistently on one or two notes. In this case, use Auto-Tune 3's individual Bypass function (in the Edit Scale display) to bypass all the notes except the ones which need the retuning. This way, Auto-Tune 3 is working in a completely transparent mode, and only when needed.

The Auto-Tune 3 demo is of the kind that we at EQ fully approve of (ie fully functioning) but it'll turn into a pumpkin after 10 days. So, get your lethargic butt in gear, point your browser to www.antares-systems.com, download the demo, and run this puppy round the block a time or two. . . you'll be glad you did.

The arrival of your latest solo album, 'Stranger Things', came as a bit of a surprise, given the recent, triumphant return of Soft Cell. Why the timing?

Me and Dave Ball were asked to play at The Ocean in Hackney when it was originally due to open back in November, but then it got postponed until March this year. As my solo album's just come out the Soft Cell album's been put back to the end of the year.

With the Soft Cell reunion, were you wary of being lumped into the Eighties nostalgia trend sweeping the country at the moment?

Oh yes, definitely. As far as I was concerned, the Eighties were vile. Alright, you had some exciting music at the beginning of the Eighties – the new romantics, the whole electro-pop thing, . . But then later it was all about Huey Lewis & The News, Genesis, Thatcher, AIDS and for me personally, lots of drug problems, watching a lot of friends die. So it's not as if I want to say 'the Eighties were great!'

You looked less than enthused when you hosted Channel 4's Electro-pop Top 10...

[Nervous laugh] Oh really? I was trying very hard to look as enthusiastic and as happy to be there as I could! I agreed to do it so I could make sure Soft Cell were left out of the chart, because I knew otherwise there'd be some smart Alec voiceover taking the mickey.

Were 'Non-Stop Erotic Cabaret' and its 'extended remix' companion 'Non-Stop Ecstatic Dancing' the first ecstasy albums, as many (well, several) people claim?

Er, well, 'Erotic Cabaret' is an ecstasy album in the sense that we were on ecstasy all the time when we made it! Not really in any other way, though.

... Ecstatic Dancing' was more like that, but it's not an album I remember very fondly. It was a real missed opportunity, because here we were, hanging out with the cream of New York's clubland at Studio 54, The Paradise Garage and so on, and we could have got them to do it for us, but instead we ended making this rather pointless bodge job. So that was an ecstasy album, but it wasn't very good! The main thing it said about ecstasy was 'don't take it before making an album!'.

But you were there in the very early days of E?

Yes. In those days, though, it wasn't a going out drug. People would take it at home and talk, be intimate, relax. Also, the only way you could get it in London was when people smuggled it back from New York. It was an elite drug, really – the New York club crowd knew about it, and in Britain, people like the Wag crowd.

Do you think taking drugs while clubbing can be a more positive way of having a drug experience?

Mmmm, I think you have to be very careful talking about this sort of thing, because you can end up in all kinds of bother. Personally I think there's nothing worse than an ex-druggie telling people not to do drugs - people have to find out what works for them, and the amount of speed I've taken and ecstasy I've necked and dope I've smoked and heroin I've snorted and... oh, ketamine, MDA, cocaine, you name it... I had some good experiences and some bad ones, but for me, of course, the bad experiences began to totally outweigh the good ones. But clubbing and drugs will always go together, and the government should realise that. I think this new law saying club owners are responsible for any drug taking in their clubs is such a bad thing. You end up with a situation like New York's, where if someone overdoses in a club, rather than calling an ambulance, they go and dump them in a back alley somewhere.

Finally, what's the new Soft Cell album going to sound like?

Like Soft Cell! Me and Dave have been writing together again for two years - we were just waiting for the opportunity to get back on stage to see what the reaction would be. I actually write in a different way for Soft Cell than I do for my solo records - more cynical, whereas my solo stuff's more romantic. Dave Ball's still using all his old equipment, and he has his particular ways of doing things and sounds that he s. He always writes for me in a higher re than I would use on my solo reco oo, and the end result is a very dist e sound. People were saying to us 'oh, /ou should try and sound like The Chemical 1 Brothers', but they already sound like that, so what's the point?
