**SO THERE I AM**, lying a-bed, God knows what draining from my system, a raven-haired beauty lying on my arm, dawn's coming but sleep isn't, the Viagra's spent and the party's over – though the audio-ghosts of Dave Clarke's techno beats still throb in my ears and my eyes keep popping wide open.

What now? Where next when consciousness refuses to make its timely exit? Music, of course, the universal soother and spirit-raiser. The stereo goes on and a selection is perused. Alongside Groove Armada and Royksopp's new albums is a CD which has been in the shops for a few months: 'Since I Left You' by The Avalanches. # Obituary Aaliyah

THE MUSIC world is in mourning after the tragic and untimely death of US r&b singer/actress Aaliyah in the Bahamas last month.

On August 25th, Aaliyah, 22, was on board a Cessna 402 with eight others, departing the Bahamas' Marsh Harbour for Florida, when the plane crashed shortly after take-off. Six people, including the New York singer, were killed instantly, while the remaining passengers died later. An inquiry has been launched after claims were made that the aircraft was overloaded with excess baggage. Aaliyah had just completed filming the video for her single 'Rock The Boat', directed by Hype Williams, who was not on board.

By the age of 22, Aaliyah Dana Houghton was already an r&b veteran. She released her debut album, 'Age Ain't Nothing But A Number' (which carried her breakthrough single, 'Back And Forth') aged just 15. Her two subsequent albums, 'One In A Million' and 'We Need A Resolution' heralded a darker. more intense sound. She made her acting debut last year in Romeo Must Die, and had just finished filming for The Matrix 2.

Aaliyah will be remembered as a lovely person and an artist who was in the business for the sake of the music, rather than to be a star. She will be much missed.

#### The Chicago techno eccentric currently inhabiting 'La La Land'

CURTIS JONES wears many hats. He's the man behind Cajmere and the influential Cajual and Relief imprints, but it's his larger than life Green Velvet alter ego that has always attracted the most attention. His forthcoming album 'Whatever' combines Eighties new wave and industrial influences with his famously hard-hitting Chi-town beats and vocals. We caught up with the 'Preacher Man' at the start of his European tour.

#### Your stage performance is very theatrical. Has it always been that way or is your Green Velvet persona something that's developed over time?

didn't start out as a singer, so it took a bit of time for me to get comfortable doing it, but I'm okay with it now. But show as well as sing because my past role models are people like David Bowie and Grace Jones. Not that I do anything on that level, I just do it in my own little way, but I am definitely inspired by them. I do it in an underground way [laughs].

So are Curtis Jones and Green Velvet very different people? They are. My Curtis Jones face is my mask, but when I'm Green Velvet I can be who I really want to be (laughs).

#### You're from Chicago, the birthplace of house music. What's the house scene like there at the moment?

It's got a lot better again. There was a time when it was really big, in the late Eighties it was underground but really huge – there was a lot of radio support as well. And commercially, house was doing really well back in the early Nineties with Crystal Waters, Ce Ce Peniston, Black Box or whatever. But since then it's not been at the same level. I think the house heads in Chicago turned to hip hop, so now it's a different scene. There's this one club that I really like right now called Slicks, they have some really good music there. It's good to see that there is some place to go in Chicago that's cool. Most of the clubs in Chicago play really commercial stuff or trance. Trance is really big in America.

#### What's your opinion of trance and why do you think it's become so big in the States?

It's not something I listen to myself, but it's not like I'm really bothered by it because, if anything, it helps introduce the things that I'm doing to people who probably wouldn't notice them otherwise. Trance has that easily digestible format that people from the suburbs or whatever can understand, and I think that maybe after listening to trance and other more commercial forms of music, they might start to appreciate other forms of electronic music like house and techno. It's basically a good thing. Trance is a gateway music [laughs].

#### In your new single 'La La Land' you sing about "little pills killing a million brain cells". Is the song pro or anti drugs?

It's just a song about the club experience and partying in general. It has an obvious drug reference in it, but I think basically I've said everything I want to say in the track. I don't like to make the things I do too obvious.

# Techno god Carl Cox's international escapades

MOST OF this month has been taken up with the Area One tour of the States. This is the first time a major touring company (SFX, who normally deal with people like Madonna) has got involved in a dance music tour. They wanted to do a Moby tour, and he suggested having various dance acts touring throughout America. Alongside him, Outkast, Nelly Furtado, Incubus and Roots were playing in the live arena. There was a separate

(air-conditioned<sup>I</sup>) dance tent for myself, **Paul Oakenfold**, Rhinocerose, The Orb, Kevin Saunderson, Derrick May and **Juan Atkins**. Quite a line-up.

One of the most interesting things about it all was driving everywhere in a tour bus, something I'd never done before. I played in 13 states – starting in Atlanta, Georgia and finishing in Denver, Colorado – and really got a sense of how vast America is. It was just me and my tour manager in a 40 foot, 12-bunk bus, so it was all quite civilised! And at each event the sound systems and production were the best I've ever experienced. It really makes a difference touring with



promoters who have the money and the expertise to do things properly. I think it was the best representation of dance culture the USA has ever had.

From America I went straight to my birthday celebrations in **Ibiza**, at Sven Vath's Cocoon night at **Amnesia**. It was the busiest Monday night I've seen there for years. When I arrived, at about three in the morning, there was still a huge queue outside. Inside it was absolutely

jammed, and when I finished my set (at half eight!) it was still full. Then Sven came back on and played until 11. Not even **Manumission** do that.

Then I headed off to Brest in northern France, for a techno festival called The Acropolis that's been going for about five years. It was quite small-scale – only about 3,500 people – and held in the grounds of a beautiful chateau. I was on after **Dave Clarke**, who also really enjoyed himself. It's nice to go back to your roots.

Last, but absolutely not least, I headed off to Holland for the mighty **Dance Valley** Festival. I'm glad to have seen this event from the very beginning

# The Philly poetess proving that rhyme pays

"WHEN I was 11 or 12 I used to talk to little boys on the phone," coos Philly poetess Ursula Rucker over mid-morning coffee in Hammersmith. "And they'd go crazy about my voice! I was shy and I think that's where it came from, talking quiet all the time. All the boys would try and get a kiss by saying my name was sexy. But I can do loud too!"

Heaven forbid. Born and raised in deepest Philadelphia, Ursula Rucker is a nu-soul star in the making. Her debut album on !K7 – the sultry, sensuous 'Supasista' – follows a series of high-profile hook-ups with King Britt, 4 Hero and fully conscious hip hop collective The Roots. In fact, The Roots crew have so much respect for Ursula that her voice has graced the final track of every single one of their studio albums. Just don't mention fellow silky soulstress Jill Scott.

"We're different," she shrugs matter-of-factly. "A lot of people are quick to compare us because we're from Philly. We respect each other but her entire album can be played on the radio: mine cannot. What she does is more acceptable to the mainstream whereas what I do is a little more hardcore!"

Don't get her wrong, though. Her

core may be hard but her beats and rhymes are anything but. King Britt, 4 Hero and French deep house hero Alexkid have all contributed to her latest album project. And that title? It's an allusion to her good self.

"A supa sista? That's what I consider myself," she says. "I came up with the track in the car one night. I was thinking about my life and what I was doing at the time and it became an autobiography. I'm up against a lot of obstacles – being an artist, being a black woman in America. But I feel like I'm winning."

But even struggling poets need to put food on the table.

"I have a family and I have to survive," Ursula says. "To make money from your art has to be the ultimate but I refuse to compromise. For me, it's all about sincerity."

#### "OBSCENE. DIRTY. Filthy.

Immoral. Ah, yeah." Sample lyrics from King Unique's 'Dirty'.

"It's a policy statement for what we're doing," reckons Matt Thomas, one half of the red-hot DJ/

production duo. "There's too much nice music around. We're bringing a bit of filth back to house."

Muzik is on the blower to Wrexham to catch up with Matt and coconspirator Matthew Thomas, the brightest new producers on the Junior roster. Having remixed cognoscenti favourites Mojolators and Mutiny into dark, slavering Space anthems, their debut single for Junior – the X-Press 2-style prog anthem 'Dirty' – has now made its way into the crates of Tong, Tenaglia et al. "We're on a dirty mission," says Thomas, warming to his theme. "Dirty's where it's at!"

And let's not forget 'Black AM' by Watkins, a slightly more subtle hookup with vocalist Natalie Arnold on new Sony offshoot Direction. Like Todd's mix of 'Missing', 'Black AM' balances contemplative soul vocals with enormous house hooks. Ibiza adores it already. "It's moody but uplifting," says Thomas proudly. "It's all quite contradictory, actually. It's not a doom-laden indie chant and it's not Balearic noise. It's sort of both!"

Following in the footsteps of Peace Division and Futureshock, King Unique are fast becoming more ubiquitous than Atomic Kitten on a weekend promo trip. But here's some news just breaking. For reasons best left undisclosed, King Unique will now be mostly recording under the Dirty moniker.

"We're a bit like The Chemical Brothers!" laughs Thomas. "In more than one sense," Roberts adds. "Bands like Basement Jaxx and The Chemicals have gone on to become proper artists. We're just hoping that dirty records are in." Don't doubt it.

#### No-nonsense techno Scot with pseudonyms aplenty

**CHRIS COWIE** is sitting in a London pub and reflecting thoughtfully on his newly adopted home town. "It's a shit-hole," he muses, gazing thoughtfully into his pint glass. "I mean it's not just London, the whole country is going down the tubes. I've just got back from a holiday in the south of France where it was lovely, clean and organised. And then we came through Brixton and drove along Camden Road."

After operating from his native Aberdeen for the last eight years ("lovely place if you can drill for oil or fly a helicopter"), Chris moved to the Smog

around nine months ago. He brought along with him his established Hook and Bellboy imprints, his relatively new Astrotrax label, and a desire to get himself finally recognised for his production work. After all, despite being the author of over 500 records – 200 of them his own tunes – many dance fans still wonder who the fuck he is, possibly due to the fact that he's been through more monikers than your average cold war spy unit.

"I did all the pseudonyms because no one likes a smart arse," shrugs the man variously known as X-Cabs, Vegas Soul, F2, Havana, Scan Carriers, Percy X, Landlord, Dawntreader, DeNiro and Frank Le Fever, among others. "At one point I was doing one track a week, either remixes or productions, and I was already getting shit back home from people who were outraged that I was not only DJing but also making the music and running the label. I've realised now that having too many monikers is a problem. It just doesn't work. It's time to get my real identity out there."

To this end, Chris is releasing 22 of his tunes on a compilation called 'Best Behaviour' under his own name. Although only a fraction of his output to date, the document serves as a tasty snapshot of his adaptable talent, swinging from the odd downtempo moodscape through trance-esque excursions, musical house missives and sexy underground techno. No wonder Cowie's productions have found favour with DJs as disparate as Danny Tenaglia and Jeff Mills.

"I like all music," he says. "I don't care if it's progressive or house or whatever. Most of my influences come from techno, though if I had to pigeonhole myself, I'd say my stuff is more techhouse. I haven't really changed my style very much over the last eight or nine years. There's no secret to making records though, they've basically got the shelf life of a sandwich. How the fuck can people say 'My record is brilliant'? There's only been 50 or so brilliant dance records made in the last 10 years!"

Another reason for Chris's move to London is to increase his DJing profile. "I've played a lot and get asked to do gigs all over the world all the time, but never in the UK," he confesses. "I get more respect from Holland and Australia than I do from this country because I think things here are very monopolised. It's always the same old faces. Like the progressive scene where hundreds of DJs and producers are just trying to get acceptance from John Digweed. No disrespect to John but that's fucking shite."

So what's the best way to behave?

"You make the music that you feel. . . The music that's in your heart."

# French decknician who wants to give you some jazzual healing

"IT STARTED like a joke," laughs Paris jazz-houser Ludovic Llorca, recalling the birth of F-Comm's occasional 10 deck DJ extravaganzas. "Alexkid, Jori (Hulkkonen), David Duriez, Thomas Salmela and I were at a club one day and thought we could do a four turntable act. One of us said, 'Six decks', another answered, 'Eight'. In the end Jori said 'Okay, I'll find a venue . . .' A month later, the gig was booked. But we'd never tried it, only talked about it. When we were on stage we realised it wasn't a joke! We did the job seriously, trying to be creative and not too messy - five

records together can be total chaos." Such dexcess, however, is only for kicks for Llorca, as he spends most of his time creating charming electronic jazzualization for F-Comm. His debut Vewcomer' album has just reached

the UK, having already sold 60,000 copies in Europe, touting deep house cuts with vocals by Nicole Graham and Lady Bird. While acknowledging that it was his pal Duriez introducing him to techno at 18 which inspired him to make music, it was another source that provided the final part of the jigsaw.

"I only discovered jazz very lately when I was 21," he explains, "I'm a big fan of Charles Mingus for his roughness and soul, Joshua Redman for his lack of attitude, and Booker Ervin for his twisted solos."

Luckily for those of us without beards, Llorca's music filters his influences through a love of clean, classy US house. He will be bringing the, undoubtedly very Gallic, live Llorca experience to our shores later this year.

# **Kid 606** Electronica prodigy who won't shut up

BEING TALKED at by Kid 606 is like being hit from behind by a speeding truck. And then finding the driver berating you for not looking where you're going.

We merely pointed out that the nitro-fuelled California motormouth's latest efforts for German label Mille Plateaux (the reflective, melodic 'PS I Love You' album and its click-house remix follow-up 'PS You Love Me') were, perhaps, a little more 'mature' than, say, the frenetic breakbeat gabbacore of 'Luke Vibert Can Kiss My Indie-Punk Whiteboy Ass' from the Kid's excellent 'Down With The Scene' CD.

"Aaaagghh! All these people are like 'Kid 606 is all grown up now' and I'm like JESUS CHRISTI I'm 211 Every fucking 21 year-old I know is making stupid fucking melodic Boards Of Canada glitchy minimal techno, so I wanted to make a minimal techno record to say 'look, here's me acting my age!' Ha ha ha!" Mmm. Okay. But what about. . .

"... I'm making music in the same way that the original ragga and hip hop was made and it's just total pilfering of ideas. You've just got to put your own mark on it." And to prove the point further, he's releasing no less than 10 seven-inches of "fucked-up hip hop" on his own Tigerbeat 6 label. "But I'm not gonna hire a publicist and have someone convincing people they should hear them. The beauty of the underground is that people can choose for themselves." Enough said.

2. Jackson 5 I Am Love (Motown, 1973)

This starts as a ballad before lifting off

into a psy-funk wig-out! The Jackson 5 were pretty underrated towards the end of their time together – their last three albums threw up some cool extended funk jams, especially on the awesome 'Get It Together'.

#### 3. Isley Brothers Summer Breeze (Epic, 1973)

One of those tracks I remember hearing on the radio as a kid. My mum and auntie would always play it as well, so it's been with me quite a while now, Perfect Sunday morning soundtrack.

## 4. Harold Budd/Brian Eno

Steal Away (EG, 1980)

Just a brief piano interlude from the 'Ambient 2' album which leads us nicely into slightly rockier territories...

#### 5. John Lennon

How Do You Sleep? (Apple, 1971)

Lennon (with possibly a little help from Yoko) gets maybe just a bit too malicious towards McCartney on this track from the 'Imagine' album. But musically it provides him with one of his strongest post-Beatles moments. The strings during the choruses help somewhat.

#### 6. David Bowie

Heroes (RCA, 1977)

My favourite track from one of my biggest heroes, although practically anything he made during the Seventies rates very highly (apart from bloody 'Peace On Earth'!). An absolute anthem - the moment where he goes histrionic half way through is one of power-rock legend!

### 6. Jimi Hendrix

And The Gods Made Love (Polydor, 1968)

From the unbelievable 'Electric Ladyland' album comes this rather brief exercise in weird!

#### 7. Babble

Beautiful (Elektra, 1993)

The Thompson Twins, minus the fluorescent fingerless gloves and with a different name, brought us this mellow beauty from their sadly ignored 'The Stone' album. Cool and laid back, it's one of the tracks myself and Ashley Casselle would sit around and get blitzed to a few years back!

8. Towa Tei Technova (Elektra, 1994)

The former Deee-Lite man knocked out this little bossa nova 'n' sax extravaganza. It's like all of my favourite easy listening gems rolled into one. Bring on the Hammond!



Nightflight To Venus (Atlantic, 1978)

Welcome aboard the Starship Boney M. Apologies for this, but I faded it out before it kicks into 'Rasputin', so it could be worse.

Party Fears Two (Beggars Banquet, 1982)

One of my favourite tracks from the rather wondrous early Eighties, by the sadly deceased Billy McKenzie. Excellent production and a great song.

**11. Pete Shelley** Homosapien (Island, 1981)

Ex-Buzzcock Pete Shelley sounded quite ahead of his time on this 'Elongated Dancepartydubmix'.



This is a 12-inch that my uncle got me into when I was bit of a Madness fan!

#### 12. It's Immaterial

Driving Away From Home (Siren, 1986)

Subtitled 'I Mean After All, It's Only 'Dead Man's Curve", this mix was introduced to me by local DJ Mark Rolfe. It still sounds great now, and I'm sure it still pops up in back rooms from time to time.

## 13. Siouxsie & The **Banshees**

Kiss Them For Me (Polydor, 1991)

This is the 'Snapper Mix' with Talvin Singh. A beautiful downtempo track with amazing vocals from Siouxsie. One of the tracks I used to play when I'd do back rooms with Ashley years ago. I still take it out sometimes to play early if I'm doing a long set. Big up the Hastings goth massive!

## 14. Johnny Moon & The Shiners

Executive Relief (label unknown)

A brief, dirty, downtempo funk interlude from the 'Sterling Breaks 2' compilation, which takes us nicely into...

15. Patti Jo Make Me Believe In You (Scepter, 1975)

Written and originally recorded by Curtis Mayfield on his 'Sweet Exorcist' album, Patti Jo's vocal took it to the next level. The production is reminiscent of a beefed up, early Seventies Norman Whitfield. One of the best dance records ever.

#### **16. Creative Source** You Can't Hide Love (Sussex, 1973)

This is on the same album as the classic 'Who Is He And What Is He To You'. It's another cover (of Earth, Wind And Fire) but the vocals and UNBELIEVABLE strings on this version mark it as definitive. Another adorable Sunday morning track.

## 17. Martha Reeves & The Vandellas

Nowhere To Run (Motown, 1965)

With only three minutes left, it was a toss up between this or Dionne Warwick's 'Walk On By'. (I would have gone for Isaac Hayes' version but at 12 minutes I wouldn't have even got to the first verse!) So, I'm ending on this Sixties dance anthem. Not the kind you hear on Dave Pearce's show, sadly.

# **Mute: Assume Nothing**



**"ASSUME NOTHING'** is not a mix CD, but it does play as a continuous album," explains Mute's Howard Corner, who put it together with label kingpin Daniel Miller and Novamute's Seth Hodder. "It's a collection of the various sounds and styles that Mute have released over the last 20 years or so, lovingly pieced together with a pair of decks, a mixer and the trusty Pro Tools. Some of it revolves around loops and effects, some of it was done live."

The trio felt that recording an album this way not only gave them the chance to include lots of different music, but also reflected the ethos of Mute – "experimental yet accessible, forward thinking and challenging."

"Inevitably we couldn't include all our artists," says Corner. "Apologies if your favourites didn't make it! We've included tracks from most of the Mute imprints, spanning over 20 years of releases, many of which were defining moments of their era. We've also included some unreleased bits and bobs too." Here 's a selection of the highlights...

### Throbbing Gristle Hot On The Heels Of Love

Daniel Miller: "A proto-house tune from 1979! Throbbing Gristle were best known as the originators of industrial music and much maligned and misunderstood. This was recently sampled to great effect by Critical Phase on their recent Fuju single. Respect is due."

#### Renegade Soundwave The Phantom

Howard Corner: "The classic breaks track, which still sounds amazing now, and was recently reworked by Bushwacka!, among others. This little section has a really nice, old skool vibe to it; the RSW sound is really evocative of the early UK dance scene. Where would the Chemical Brothers be without them?"

#### Robotman Do Da Doo (Plastikman's Acid House Remix)

Seth Hodder: "The mysterious Robotman remixed by Richie Hawtin to great effect. Represents an era when house and techno co-existed and influenced each other like good friends. Hammered by X-Press 2 at the time."

#### Erasure Moon & Sky (Murk Remix)

Howard Corner: "There have been some brilliant mixes of the hugely influential Erasure over the years. Here's one by Miami's finest we haven't released yet, which we've had out on acetate test press since the end of last year."

## Desert Lettin' Ya Mind Go

Howard Corner: "One of our more recent signings, to the Future Groove imprint, Desert have been making peak-time crunchin' tribal house for years. 'Lettin' Ya Mind Go' was released a few years back on Glow, but these are all new mixes, from Lottie, King Unique and Desert themselves. There are also Doc Martin mixes of this track, scheduled for release in October. The CD also includes a segment of their recent remix of 'I Feel Loved' by Depeche Mode."

### Luke Slater All Exhale (Futureshock Mix)/ Body

Freefall (Jon Carter Remix) Seth Hodder: "The don of UK techno remixed by the kings of the progressive scene, 'All Exhale' remains one of Futureshock's strongest remixes. Jon Carter's remix of 'Body Freefall' blends seamlessly into Luke's 'Needle Damage' remix. Slater's move over to Mute from Novamute may or may not herald a change in direction. His new album drops in February."

### Depeche Mode | Feel Loved (Umek Remix)

Howard Corner: "The Mode. Their choice of remixers over the years has always been radical for such a huge band – KLF, The Orb, Kruder & Dorfmeister, Air, Speedy J, Underworld, Francois Kevorkian, Tenaglia, Thomas Brinkmann... and Kid 606. They're risk takers."

## Nitzer Ebb Join In The Chant

Howard Corner: "The original Balearic electronic pioneers, from Essex. Remixed here by Thomas Heckmann, who boots the original into the 21st Century with typical Teutonic gusto."

#### Speedy J Krekc

Seth Hodder: "Marking Speedy's overdue and welcome return to the dancefloor and hot on the heels of the enormous club hit 'Electric Deluxe'. Due for release at the end of this year, with some top notch remixes to follow."

#### Holger Hiller Egg

Daniel Miller: "Holger was a very early exponent of sampling. His understanding of the potential of collage and cut-ups shone a torch down the path trodden by so many digital manipulators over the years."

## Mark Stewart And The Maffia

Consumed (Program Mix) Daniel Miller: "Prescient as fuck. Both musically and conceptually, his mid-Eighties album 'As The Veneer Of Democracy Starts To Fade' would be the ideal soundtrack to the recent anti-capitalist actions in Genoa and elsewhere. With his sonic weaponry and long time collaborator Adrian Sherwood at the controls, red zones and globalisers would have been dust in seconds."

#### S.I. Futures We Are Not A Rock Band

Seth Hodder: "Si Begg's latest pseudonym for Novamute. Si is undoubtedly one of the UK's premier producer-remixer-DJs. Likes his bass. A lot."

# Getting In Tents at...

IF YOU'RE TOO YOUNG to remember, dance festivals used to be known as 'raves'. Over the years they graduated from word-of-mouth parties in warehouses, barns or quarries to huge events promoted with garish, fractalenhanced flyers and the words 'Ratpack – exclusive set'. To some, they were a rebellion against the traditions of rock festivals, places where a bottle of Vicks was a more fashionable accessory than a Hawkwind T-shirt. Places where anything went. Like the pigs in animal farm (no, not THAT version) time has slowly seen dance festivals evolve into the embodiment of what they once opposed. While for many years only lone stalwarts like the now-deceased Tribal Gathering flew the flag for BPMs, now there are a wealth of similar festivals vying for your sweat and hard-earned cash. 2001 was the first year when legal dance festivals seemed to outnumber their rock siblings – so much so, in fact, that in August if you wanted to have a decent bop and weren't in Ibiza, you'd probably be in a field.

# Sknebworth 01

# Saturday August 11th at Knebworth Park

**THEY'VE DONE IT ALL** – T-shirts, record labels, equipment, a magazine, and somewhere along the line, even opened a club. So the fact that Ministry have taken so long to jump on the festival bandwagon is surprising. When they do things, though, they do them with style. So, shunning the usual locations of airfields and the like, they've hired the grand surrounds of Knebworth.

Billed as the biggest dance festival of the year, by day Knebworth '01 looks anything but. Later we're assured that the numbers will pick up, but for the moment everyone just seems grateful that they don't have to buy over-priced wellies.

Jamiroquai, though, are the perfect headliners; Like MoS, they (or, more specifically, their front man Jay Kay) have evolved from champions of the underground into a national institution, with a wad of tracks just too damn funky to resist. More importantly, they AREN'T omnipresent festival fixtures Faithless. Past glories rear up every now and again, but they're few and far between as the night takes the form of a showcase for material from the forthcoming 'A Funk Odyssey' album. Luckily the new stuff sounds as strong as their beefy re-workings of 'Return Of The Space Cowboy' or the funk-laden live beast that is 'Canned Heat'.

Earlier, Bent looked like a band out of time despite raising smiles with the appearance of dancer Kid Dragon. Alex P and Brandon Block are the victims of a bigger fall though. Bewilderingly accompanied by two guitarists, they play to only a gaggle of people throughout, while their axewielding mates struggle to be heard above the sound of fat frying at one of the nearby chip vans.

Surprisingly, the house-centric Ministry grant the punters not one but two drum & bass arenas. Their faith is amply rewarded, as both Planet V and World Dance cram them in and mash it up as Roni Size, Andy C and the cream of the drum & bass elite bounce rough sounds back and forth between



the two tents. Unfortunately, placing the chill out arena downwind of the drum & bass arenas proves a tad foolish, as huge wafts of breeze-borne subbass really, like, fuck up the vibe and decrease the peace, man. The Chill Out Zone is still a treasured entity, though. The stench of skunk smoke is kept at bearable levels and the likes of Gilles Peterson,

Chris Coco and just about every other chill out chappie entertain the troops propped up on makeshift pillows fashioned from Stella cans.

Late additions are plentiful, Public Domain are loud and Scottish, Stanton Warriors deliver another hour of the best pirate radio station Hertfordshire has never

heard, and Pied Piper and his mates give everyone a song to bounce around their head for the rest of the night. But it's So Solid Crew's appearance that sends most ripples of excitement across the site. Equally loved and loathed, the last-minute arrival of their MCs into the Smoove tent for a premature chart-topping celebration is really wicked, and we really like it (apart from those of us who don't).

The arrival of Judge Jules in the Golden tent is about as welcome, in Muzik's eyes, as a pint of acid, but he gets the job done and even gets people oohing and aahing over his fantastic dress sense and 24/7 moody expression. Mario Piu is the real hero in here tonight, playing it so loud, precise and downright hard that the spikey-haired ones' glowsticks light up twice as bright as usual.

Having rocked it eclectic style all night, Headstart finds bosoms for pillows in the shape of Felix Da Housecat's familiar Chi-town grooves (and his own 'Silver Screen, Shower Scene'), the earlyevening acid-squelch of Josh Wink and a typically energetic show of spirit from the Lo-Fi Allstars. The Renaissance & Muzik arena, meanwhile, rocks all night with everyone from the very cool Steve Lawler to the perhaps not quite so cool Paul Van Dyk, with a mammoth six hours from the mighty Deep Dish rounding everything off.

Knebworth might have been more of a huge secret party than the roaring success Ministry had hoped for. But rest assured, all they need to do is stand on their head and drink a glass of water, before ironing out the creases for next year.

# Creamfields

# Saturday August 25th at Old Liverpool Airport, Speke

WHILE THE RUBBLE-STREWN, disused runway of Speke airport might not quite match the historic beauty of Knebworth, Ministry's northern superclub rivals are more than a tad learned in the art of pulling off festivals large in both stature and sounds.

Unfortunately, there's disappointment for fans keen to catch a rare glimpse of Aussie wonder boys The Avalanches. Darren's broken his leg at their recent London gig and as a result, tonight's performance is limited to a four-deck DJ set from two of their more intact members. Sadly, when they ease into an easy listening intro and a peal of flowery Hawaiian beach sounds, a bemused crowd take time to roll that essential reefer or seek delights elsewhere.

An hour later at The Boutique tent it's a different matter. With 'Knights Of The Jaguar' pouncing as powerfully as ever from the PA, the place is bouncing with a vitriolic buzz that sets the stage perfectly for the breaks onslaught of the Stanton Warriors and Freq Nasty.

Though not known for their timekeeping, put them on stage and the Stereo MCs are still bountiful hoarders of tunes that are near impossible to resist. Rob Birch is still the funkiest combat-clad skeleton the world has ever seen, with Cath Coffey and her fellow backing singers summoning the ghosts of Motown and Stax. 'Deep, Down And Dirty' grinds with a deep funk but it's the later clutch of classics – 'Step It Up', 'Connected' and 'Ground Level', still kicking and screaming with eternal youth – that makes everyone realise exactly what we've been missing while they've been away.

While the Radio 1 trio of Pearcey, Julesey (gabbling away like a mobile disco owner) and Fonty summon the largest crowds to the station's stage, it's local boy Yousef who rightfully lands the task of concluding the outdoor activities. As the wind billows across the Mersey, the Cream resident puts the Scouse into house with a selection of prime cuts.

In the Serious arena, Commie and Luke Neville warm everyone up before Chocolate Puma 'treat' the crowd to a 15 minute PA that is as pointless as it is crap. Thankfully later sets by John Kelly, Scott Bond and Sonique get the groove back, although Corvin Dalek proves that he's not just a stupid name and misjudges it completely, banging it out rather than following everyone else's funked-up flow.

There's funk aplenty in the smaller of 1 Cream's two arenas. Here, the theme is US House and the spinners have credibility oozing from every pore with Lottie, Danny Rampling and David Morales stepping up for sounds that are as sublime as Erick Morillo's smile is joyfully wide.

Whether they're the future of pop or merely cartoon chancers with a lead singer who changes styles every time the wind changes direction, there's little doubt that the presence of Gorillaz on the bill adds a bit of intrigue. Casting silhouettes onto the screen that mask their true identities and onto which a more colourful selection of alter-egos and smirk-worthy slogans are projected, they're a rock band playing at a dance festival and trapped in their own pop icon status. Needless to say, they prove to be one of the highlights of the night.

Though Sasha controls Global Underground's crammed marquee like a general, Oakenfold exercises his right to swim in deep hypnotic channels and and Cox provides equal measures of familiarity and futurism, it's Fatboy Slim who triumphs tonight as the people's champion.

Teasing the crowd time after time with 'Star 69"s forceful vocal, he thrives on people's anticipation, dropping the mix down, booming the bass out and then conjuring furious build-ups from thin air. Even when the speakers suddenly stall, you wonder whether it's all just part of a wonderfully corrupt plan, as he moves and shakes behind the decks before ushering Groove Armada's ram-raiding 'Superstylin" back into the mix, twice as brazen as before the technical hitch.

By the time the Chemical Brothers enter the fray, riding in on the slipstream of another roof-raising display of power by Orbital, there's not a stationary shoe on the whole of the site. The Chems' penchant for rugged techno and those beloved block-rocking beats is unaltered, as their set gives an insight into the aural joys that lie in wait when their fourth album is finally unleashed.

For now though, as the morning sun catches the ripples of the Mersey and hands filled earlier with glow-sticks and laminated guides reach for the comforting shield of a good pair of sunglasses, it's apparent that, in the last hours of the festival season, Cream has once again sneakily risen to the top.

**T IN THE PARK** might have established itself as Scotland's favourite festival, but Gig On The Green has now provided it with a rival. Nestled on the edge of the infamous Gorbals area of the city, overlooked by tower blocks and snugly tucked in behind rows of neighbouring back gardens, Gig On The Green is about as intimate as festivals get.

Sometimes, it's intimate enough to be alarming, as Eminem proves. Three songs into his set, 40 or so fans eager to get as close to their hero as possible are involved in a crush that stops the show and sees the curfew-abiding rapper returning for only a clutch more songs.

Sunday night sees hometown boys Travis on the main stage. Thankfully the Colours dance tent provides the sanctuary from Fran Healy's dismal tones and stupid haircut. Conspicuous by his absence, though, is Sander Kleinenberg – a victim of a rather determined tackle by a member of the Metalheadz team in the Creamfields footie tournament. Luckily, as Timo Maas and John Digweed are scheduled to play the adjoining sets, there's little in the way of disappointment. Maas whips into shape the bold basslines and deep gurgles of sound that have become as essential to his set as a plug for the mixer. Digweed then finishes the weekend off with a selection that has more peaks than the Highlands.

Alas, it all ends at a rather disappointing 10.45pm and as Digweed takes the needle off his last tune and salutes the adoring mass before him, people spill from the site in search of a party or two. Thankfully in Glasgow that's one thing they're not short of.

THE BIG CHILL is the antithesis of the huge corporate superclub events which have come to dominate the outgoing clubber's summer. Consequently, and also due to the music on offer, the clientele is a little older and wiser, children are present, and while caning is on the agenda, it's done with subtlety rather than goggle-eyed eagerness.

The weather attempted to put a dampener on things for the whole of Saturday, although a headlining Kruder & Dorfmeister rescued the mood despite their speakers catching fire. But the undoubted highlight of the whole event was a glorious Sunday afternoon in the sun, champagne cocktails from the Cocktail Courtyard, and Norman and Joey Jay showing the assembled what Good Times really means with a joyous selection taking in everything from Aretha to Azzido Da Bass. Norman even hauled organisers Pete Lawrence and his girlfriend Katrina on stage to "do their Pan's People" bit.

Also doin' it to Muzik's earholes were our own Chris Coco replete with live band, proper singing and hummable tunes, FSOL's Gary Cobain laying down a set that began with ethnic wibbling but eventually managed to take in Adam Ant and David Essex's 'Silver Dream Machine', and Mr Scruff proving as reliably funky as ever.

The real star, though, is the concept itself, a beautiful location with acts that haven't bartered their way onto a bill but have been brought in to sate a love of leftfield tuneage. You're not going to hear much above 110 bpm and occasionally there's monstrous self-indulgence and way too many flutes, but it's a one-off, a true original. See you in Naxos for the next one...

YOU KNOW THINGS are going well when at three in the morning the bar staff clothe themselves in bubble wrap and start lobbing ice cubes onto the dancefloor while throwing the craziest shapes this side of Kandinsky.

Battlestar Galactica laser funk blasts out of the PA in Manchester's Phoenix (no, Peter Kay is not in attendance), creating a very special kind of bedlam which the good folk of Manchester have not only lapped up, but drowned themselves in for six solid hours.

The break-thirsty kids came prepared this evening, with one particularly sensible lad sporting a rather natty pair of mustard-coloured earplugs. But there's no point trying to avoid it, mate. Rest assured, fillings will be found on the floor

tomorrow morning, eased clear of their ivory berths by the apoplectic ferocity of the low end on offer this evening.

That The Phoenix is in danger of crumbling to its foundations tonight is due to a pair of speccy sound scientists. They're residing behind the world's smallest DJ booth, located at a T junction from the dancefloor, facing the wrong way. But Chris Kirkbride and Andy Duckmanton couldn't care less.

So weedy and consumptive-looking is Kirkbride that you suspect lifting a Dick Francis paperback would leave him in traction for a couple of months. It's a wonder he can even raise his head when he's got a pair of silver cans strapped to it. But strapped they are, apart from when they're being swapped with Duckmanton.

They're an odd couple. Andy's got a pair of ashtray-bottom specs that, if turned towards the sun, would make the Death Star's laser look like a streak of piss from a particularly sickly child. Then we have Jude Sebastian, the strictly studio-only third of the trio. He's been spectacularly compensating for the fact that his pair of DJing sidekicks have been on the mineral water all evening (still for Andy and sparkling for Chris). He's also the 'looker' in a group who, with the best will in the world, you have to say resemble the school special needs class on a day trip to Brighton.

But nobody's here to salivate over their boyish good looks anyway. Ignoring Belgian trance colonel Yves De Ruyter, who's caning some top

fluoro action downstairs, the Phoenix upper-deck resembles an explosion in a people factory, as our boys smash the dancefloor into tiny, tiny pieces. Every breakdown, however insignificant, results in some potentially hazardous toxins being released into an atmosphere where oxygen is a commodity not, for want of a better phrase, to be sniffed at.

Braving the sweaty fug is nu skool supremo Rennie Pilgrem. He's here to look after his boys (for it's his label, TCR, they're signed to), and he looks every inch the proud father. He tells Muzik on the way up that this'll be the first time he's been to a club that he's not playing at for more than half a decade. As a result, you'd have thought Pilgrem – a man who used to have party accessories couriered to him – would be spannered. But he takes it easy and gracefully bobs to the electro/free-funk spankery, like a serene breakbeat Buddha.

So just who are those responsible for this super fish-frying mentalism? Three lads from Lancaster. Three of the most charming, modest men in the North West. Press them and they might tell you a little bit about 'Blinded By Science', their debut album. It is – finally – a nu skool breaks album that isn't just a random hotch-potch of whizzing beats and mecha-robot bass. An album that may drag the breaks scene out of its own humourless self-importance and bag a cross-section of new listeners.

Press the modest buggers a bit further and they might tell you about the tidal wave of remix requests landing on their desk. Mystifyingly big-in-the-States stadium breakbeaters Crystal Method demanded the master copy of the beats used on the remix Koma & Bones furnished them with to incorporate into their live sets. And then there's legendary producer and Islington pool hall impresario Arthur Baker. Chris eloquently recalls how "I nearly shat meself" when he rang personally. "Mind you he's been ringing up every fuckin' hour since."

The threesome met at the fag-end of the Eighties when acid house was exploding. Andy would be there playing anything from "freestyle hip hop to Detroit techno, dubby house through to full-on, big crescendo piano house." They were "hip hop kids listening to the Happy Mondays and soaking everything in."

Ten years of bollocks employment followed, in which time Chris got a job in a record shop, Jude knocked out a couple of drum & bass records as Proteus and Andy qualified as a butcher. How many DJs have had to curtail their stay at the last Miami Winter Music conference because of a particularly





important delivery of pork loin? "People have got to eat," Andy offers by way of defence.

There followed a brief and unsuccessful flirtation with Belgium's R&S label. Then, at the arse end of 1995, when the carcass of big beat was being dragged around town only being kept alive by farting noises and klaxon sounds, Koma (Andy), Bones (Chris) and Jude finally got it together to pool their resources.

And what an idea that's proved to be. With remixes already under the belt for nu skool heroes like Beber & Tamra and PMT, and a Y4K mix album ready to hit the shelves, things are looking up. And if they can translate the floorfilling power of their DJ sets into record sales, they'll be able to afford all the eye-surgery and gym memberships that money can buy.

**1993** Fed up with chipmunk vocals and ever-increasing tempos, Rhythm Section disband. Rennie sets up TCR. Releases 'Rock Da House' as Thursday Club and is hailed as a master of funky house.

**1994** While playing in Florida, Rennie is introduced to the housetempoed breaks/electro scene. On his return home, he releases the 'New Electro Sound Of London' series of EPs.

**1995** Rennie sells 12,000 copies of 'A Place Called Acid', helping to re-launch British breaks.

**1996** Rennie DJs all over the world, neglecting to tell people he's never done it before. His first gig is to 2,000 people in Florida. Also records a trip hop album as Philadelphia Bluntz. A young Adam Freeland is his press officer.

**1997** Meets Tayo in Soul Jazz record shop. Adam, Tayo and Rennie start a club called Friction. They describe the music policy as 'nu skool breaks'. A genre is born, to the joy of music journalists everywhere. **1998** R&S release Rennie's 'Blowpipe'. It becomes the first 'nu skool' anthem. Carl Cox has it in his chart for three months.

**1999** Rennie remixes anything that moves, including Freq Nasty's 'Freakazoid'.

**2000** Rennie releases 'Selected Werks' compilation.

**2001** 'TCR50' celebrates 50 releases. Rennie signs Koma & Bones and BLIM for albums. 'Eskimo', Rennie's collaboration with BLIM, is Number One in the breaks charts and a Muzik Single Of The Month. Most recently, Rennie has just completed a tribal breaks collaboration with Meat Katie called 'Atmosphere', which is due to be released in November or December.

# Macy on exorcising her demons and following THAT album

THE PROBLEM WITH Macy Gray is that she increases the risk of you breaking out into the same song as your mum. Or your dad, for that matter. She has the kind of infuriating crossover appeal that attracts everyone from anti-Nestlé protesters right through to old uncle Norris.

After a commercially wobbly but critically acclaimed start, her debut album 'On How Life Is' wound up shifting over seven million copies worldwide. The sympathetic break-up anthem 'I Try' clung to the airwaves like a scorned ex-lover for what seemed like forever. Now, two years on, the raspy vocalist with the distinctive fashion sense is back with her second, 'The Id'. Oh, and a new perspective on food.

"Coconut shrimp," Gray smirks as she attempts to describe the impact the last two years have had on her. "I had never heard of coconut shrimp." She's sitting behind a pair of oversized, purple-tinted sunglasses. That mass of Afro hair remains in a state of permanent, electric arousal; as though she's walked through a wind tunnel then emptied a tin of hairspray on to the results. "When I used to get seafood, I'd just get whiting and shrimp, you know? But these days, I get lobster and coconut shrimp. There are more and different foods in my life and that gives you different perspectives."

Despite the worldwide success of the straightto-the-heart lyrics of 'On How Life Is', at 31, Gray had never left the States. Growing up in Canton, Ohio as Natalie McIntyre, the furthest she had travelled was to Los Angeles, where she made money singing jazz standards with a hotel band. Since then, her horizons have expanded exponentially, coconut shrimp and all. But with that increased wisdom came a greater self-consciousness about her music. The result was a mild case of second album syndrome when she came to make 'The Id'.

"It took a lot of temper tantrums and drug binges to get through this album. It was hard. It took eight months from last October. It really took it out of me. It's different, because you know more what to look for and you have to be aware of those things, which makes it all harder."

What must have helped was that she couldn't wait to begin work on new material. She ruefully recalls a night where "I got up to sing 'I Try' and I thought 'oh, I don't know if it'll come out again!"" Funny that.

# Wizards of Oz

# Willy-waving sample warriors coming <sup>will</sup> up from Down Under

>

IT'S NEARLY 12 O'CLOCK and the Electric Ballroom is packed as tight as the proverbial gnat's chuff. But far from minding the crush, the crowd are buzzing. This is, after all, the first London gig for young Aussie sample manipulators The Avalanches, an outfit who have built up a reputation for incorporating everything from genital exposure to spontaneous arson and live legbreaking into their act.

For the last hour or so the band's DJs have been providing aural foreplay. Diminutive deck demon DJ Dexter (runner up in the recent UK DMC Mixing Championships) and fellow Filipino James De La Cruz (enjoys whipping his tackle out at unexpected moments and setting fire to things while screaming "Revolution!") are on stage. They're teasing the crowd with casually segued, minute-long snippets of exotica, calypso and jazz, Hammond cocktail music, Seventies surf rock and a smattering of intense party tracks like Azzido Da Bass' 'Dooms Night' and The Jacksons' 'I Want You Back'. 4 \*

At midnight on the dot the lighting changes dramatically and a familiar guitar riff fills the room. Before they can stop themselves a couple of hundred previously supercool members of the audience are jubilantly fisting the air to Guns 'N' Roses' 'Welcome To The Jungle'. The rest of The Avalanches - DAT controller Robbie Chater, drummer/singer Darren Seltmann and Sicilian keyboardist Toni Dablasi - tumble onto the stage. As they launch into a cacophony of guitar squeals, live drums and incoherent shouting, they also manage to fall into each other, dive dramatically off speakers and swap instruments with promiscuous abandon. Their antics suggest they may have been a bit over-keen with the pre-show rider, but after a few more pseudopunk shenanigans, they begin to play what the audience came to hear - segments from their debut album 'Since I Left You'.

The title track – the magical first single that has helped launch them to stardom – comes complete with a minute-long middle segment of Marvin Gaye's 'What's Going on?' and brings the crowd out if its slightly shell-shocked state. More album tunes follow. 'Electricity', 'A Different Feeling' and more are discernible amid the hour-long fusillade of musical cut ups, sonic snippets and free-falling instrumentation. By the end of the show, there's been plenty of amateur dramatics and some well-executed tunes, but no instruments are ablaze, no one is physically wounded and there hasn't been so much as a pubic hair publicly revealed.

The next day, as the band relax in Hyde Park, Muzik expresses its disappointment at the lack of bad behaviour.

enquires Toni, looking slightly worried.

"Probably," replies Darren nonchalantly. But he didn't. After several intense shows in Europe – Spain was their most destructive to date – the band seem to be tiring of having to perform extreme acts to please audiences. Robbie, one of the band's main producers and its most quietly enigmatic character, sits cross-legged and peers pensively into the middle distance.

"I don't think the show works so well sometimes," he confesses. "When we're in the studio everything is so meticulous, which is a pressure, so when we get out there we get a bit crazy. The trouble is we can't do it constantly as it just takes too much out of us. Half the time now I'm on stage and thinking that this isn't what I want to be doing. It also detracts from our original musical mission, which is quite serious; people just end up wanting to know about what we set on fire. The other guys are still absolutely loving it though. . ."

The other guys are currently scattered around him. The ever-hyper Dexter is clapping his hands together excitedly at the prospect of locating an ice cream van. Darren and Toni are singing opera songs into a camcorder and attracting the attention of the local canine community. James is sleeping face down on the grass. In the last couple of years the lives of the people in this group have changed dramatically. It wasn't so

long ago that they were (relatively) normal people hanging out in their home town of Melbourne. Then Darren and Robbie – previously members of rock bands with names like The Swinging Monkey Cocks and Quinton's Brittle Bones – picked up a sampler and started to sift through old records.

A concept emerged, other members were brought on board ("the main criteria for joining the band is a sense of humour," confides Robbie. "We work out what they can do later.") and a year afterwards 'Since I Left You' was completed. The band suddenly found themselves supporting the likes of Public Enemy and the Jon Spencer Blues Explosion back home and landing a deal with the UK's XL Records. Since then, things haven't stopped.

"It doesn't feel like we've been that successful though," muses Robbie. "Maybe because over here this album is the first representation of what we do. Back in Australia there's been a progression of singles and EPs – some bad singles and bad tours. We've learned a lot, but here we're starting at a quite advanced point."

A colourful patchwork of insouciant pop melodies, breezy disco house, raw hip hop, insane humour and heart-wrenching melancholy, wrung from literally hundreds of sample snippets, the band's debut album is a truly stoic and visionary work – Darren describes the intricate building process as requiring "mindaltering patience". This is a magical pop world where The Osmonds can casually groove with Madonna and Kid Creole & The Coconuts can get down with Paperclip People.

"The last thing we wanted it to be seen as was 'ironic' or trying to make shit things sound cool," states Darren, taking a break from his barber shop antics. "It's a serious project. Using things like Kid Creole or Blowfly or whatever wasn't about re-inventing the connotations that these things had, it was all just taken first hand and added. We don't tend to go for records that are considered rare or classic in the cool sense. In general we find sounds that will usually get thrown away and find the inner beauty in them."

"In many ways the album was this incredible challenge to use records as tools to write songs," comments Robbie. "We wanted the project to be quite anonymous, so that we didn't feel completely connected to it. We wanted it to feel like it could have come from a different time or place... somewhere a little more unique than us, I suppose. The original idea was a story about someone who was following their love around the world but was always one country or one step away. That turned out to be a bit too literal and we realised that the music would have suffered if we'd stuck to it too much. We wanted to do an album in the tradition of Marvin Gaye."

But while the buzz around 'Since I Left You' continues (during the interview Robbie doesn't hide his disappointment when he points out that they have another 10 live shows to do around Europe after this), the band are keen to begin working on something new. Given the long, laborious nature of their debut – it took a year just to clear the samples – will the band be taking the same approach again?

"It's a situation we wouldn't like to repeat," says Robbie, grinning at the sight of Dexter running frantically towards us with ice cream melting onto his hands. "We know how to do it all now and it was a hell of a lot of work. The next album will be more fractured and more sonically adventurous but there'll definitely be more pop songs. We want to get to the stage where we get really good melodies and nice, clean production. Since Darren and I met we've had a clear understanding of what we wanted to do, which is just to try and make beautiful music."

If the concept highlights the underlying seriousness of the project (the travel idea remains a strong subtext, hinted at by track titles like 'Stay Another Season', 'Flight Tonight', 'Pablo's Cruise' and 'Little Journey'), mad moments of pure hedonism and wilful insanity illustrate the band's indubitably maverick spirit. The next single to be plucked from their kaleidoscopic swirl-pool is 'Frontier Psychiatrist', a silly but infectious mix of goofy dialogue (where "He's as white as a sheet" is made to rhyme with "And he also made false teeth"), hip hop beats, wide screen cinematics and wonderful equestrian noises. The tune has been

# RÖYKSOPP

Melody AM (Wall Of Sound)

You don't often hear this said but, for one month only, leave it to the Norwegians

SO, TWO GUYS with unpronounceable names from a nowhere town in Norway produce an album with a title that sounds like an easy listening radio station, for the label that unleashed Derek Dahlarge upon the world. Bin it without even lending an ear, eh? It's probably either unlistenable Mille Plateaux 'tone music' inspired by the constant darkness of northern Scandiwegian winters, or Oslo's answer to Bentley Rhythm Ace, innit? Wrong on both counts.

Pay attention at the back there. Muzik Award-nominated compilation 'Tellé' was an introduction to the wonderful, quirky, melodic scene which the Norwegian town of Bergen has been quietly cultivating. Röyksopp were present and correct with their easy-listening classic 'So Easy' (of course) which now opens this album. Svein Berge and Torbjørn Brundtland had been together before, recording for R&S chill label Apollo, but it seems that whatever magic resides in Bergen rubbed off on them, and hence spawned a whole new kit'n'kabcodle of ideas and lovely low-key tuneage.

Since 'Tellé', the duo have brought a touch of quality to the EU remix mountain with their spartan take on Kings Of Convenience's 'I Don't Know What I Can Save You From' and their floor-slaying disco revision of Mekon's otherwise forgettable 'Please Stay'. The final temptation to begin a sordid affair with Röyksopp was the single 'Eple', which managed to be just fast encugh for beatsy

DJs, but also too damn cuddly and hummable to be simply floor fodder. It's present here, and probably the most gloriously catchy tune aboard 'Melody AM'. That's saying something though, as the other eight tracks all vie for listeners' attention in their own gentle way. Probably the most upfront number is the delightful strummed guitar house of new single 'Poor Leno' (though the 'Istanbul Forever Take' on the 12-inch is even better), which takes full advantage of Röyksopp's uplifting way with a well-timed key-change. As does 'A Higher Place' which sounds like the sort of thing Captain Nemo might listen to if he decided to have an underwater disco with his mate, the giant squid. A couple of proper songs also turn up, subtle things that gradually creep up on you rather than bash you round the head. 'Sparks' contains a sweet, hardly audible vocal over low-slung noodling while 'Remind Me' is like the song of a siren in a bubble bath.

Mentions in dispatches should also go to the driving, film soundtrack flute-and-string epic 'Röyksopp's Night Out' – if this is their night out, it must take place in grand style and quite possibly in monochrome. The rest provides gentle ambience and saxophone cruising, all soothing, none dull – a hard feat in these days of endless compilations called 'Chill Out 947: The Ultimate Herb Party'.

We won't end by saying, "Turn the lights down low, draw a loved one close, skin up a phat one and let Röyksopp pour all over you," because that would be utterly shit. Just listen to the damned thing. It's really rather fine. In a Scandinavian-easy-listening-meetscheerfully-well-thought-out-electronica-at a-post-modern-disco sort of way (Oh well, that's much better, isn't it? – Ed.). **Thomas H Green** 



# **GROOVE ARMADA**

Goodbye Country, Hello Nightclub (Pepper) Business as usual in the Armada camp. . . which turns out to be a good thing

TAKING GA's new album title as a guide, you'd be forgiven for getting the impression that the duo are intent on swapping their floral sun-loungers and ice-cooled cocktails for the grit and sweat of the dancefloor. Indeed, the first single, the feisty, reggae-tinged 'Superstylin", would seem to confirm a new, punchier direction. But it's not so.

The truth is that 'Goodbye Country, Hello Nightclub' is as overtly supine and spacious as its predecessor Vertigo', and similar enough in form and function to be considered a direct continuation of it. While 'Superstylin" and other tracks such as 'Fogma' have been carved with the frugging

fraternity in mind, they are outnumbered on the album by myriad excursions into song-based territory, downtempo and hip hop tracks, many of which are embellished with vocals from the likes of Jeru The Damaja, Tim Hutton and veteran folk crooner Richie Havens.

These vocal tracks are, for the most part, well produced and highly listenable - just as well, as

the instrumentals sometimes veer off into indulgence and feel a bit sickly rich.

The strength of this album, like 'Vertigo', ultimately lies in its diversity and its clean, easy going sound. Many artists attempt to secure wider appeal by offering a broad selection of dance styles, but not many possess the steady hands and careful ears of Cato and Findlay. The downside is that some material here seems over-ambitious (a natural enough occurrence given the high expectations for this album), and some cuts sacrifice colour and passion to attain their horizontal vibe. What had occurred to us, however, is how entirely divorced from the contemporary this album is. 'High Plains Drifter' throbs and pulses like the Whirl-Y-Gig seven years ago. 'Varkala' pounds like a small child overdosing on herbal highs in the healing fields at Glastonbury. System 7 do have exceptional production values. # **RICHIE HAWTIN**

DE9 – Closer To The Edit (Novamute) The compilation CD that isn't, from the bespectacled techno genius with no discernible sense of humour

AFTER a project as ambitious as his 'Decks, EFX & 909' it simply wouldn't do for Hawtin to return with a straight up mix album, and he hasn't. What we get instead is an update of the old cut and paste process pioneered by Eighties acts like Steinski and the Art Of Noise (to whom he's paid homage via the album's title). Splicing over 100 tracks into 300 separate loops and re-shaping them into one flowing piece, Hawtin succeeds in making the average DJ compilation look more than a little outdated. Most importantly though, he's also made the album work as a whole by contrasting the backbone rhythms with other reappearing parts to create a kind of verse/chorus effect.

Conceptually, it's all very highbrow, of course, but Hawtin's biggest strength has always been his ability to balance intellect with entertainment and once again he's succeeded. The super geek strikes again.

Like Blue States, the King's drawn to cinematic British chill out, but he's borrowing from a wider sonic spectrum. Playgroup (Source) Disappointing album follows classic single – just like Hear'Say

'MAKE It Happen', Playgroup's homage to PiL's 'Death Disco', was one of the best tunes of 2000. Sad to recount then, that this similarly Eighties undergroundthemed album frequently ends up sounding closer to also-rans like Big Audio Dynamite than innovators such as Cabaret Voltaire or African Headcharge. There are some top tunes on it – the aforementioned single, a Dennis Bovell/Adrian Sherwood-style dub rogering of Paul Simon's '50 Ways To Leave Your Lover' and the funk of 'Overflow', for instance. But too much insubstantial noodling, too much slavish devotion to the past and the presence of some truly horrible vocals make this a disappointment, if hardly a disaster. Duncan Bell

CHEEKY chappies, those Rhythm Masters. Despite the abum's nomination for a Muzik Award there are still voices of dissent here at the magazine who reckon 'Get Me Off', 'Where's Your Head At?' and possibly 'Romeo', are the only stand-out tracks. And not this sapp,' Hying high' strumpopster with a cloying Boris Diugosch remix. Sunship's two-step version is worth a peek, mind you.

Richie Hawtin: "I can't believe how much promotion these guys get in the UK. I didn't read one bad review! They've done some amazing records, a couple blow my head off, but they're not doing it how they were."

#### Felix Da Housecat

Harlot (City Rockers)

Another stormer from Felix's excellent 'Kittens And Thee Gitz' album, dsplaying a host of charm, retrotastic kitsch and the sleazebag vocals of Meistar. On the flipside, Justin Roberston drags it off to the modern dancefloor without losing any of its sex appeal.

Richie Hawtin: "Out of this whole Eighties revival, there's only a few bands I like – Fischerspooner, a couple of other people doing new takes. Some of them are just rehashing old ideas using a sampler and this would've been better left on acetate. Felix is going to be pissed at me but..."

#### Versatile Featuring MC B-Live

Curn Cakes (Honey Beat) Another of those tunes which proves how irrelevant the term 'garage' is to describe such music, this duo combine dynamic rapping, aggressive posturing, jegy beats, the requisite bassline and a squiggling acid 303-worm. Way more Silver Bullet than Artful Dodger, and we at Muzik welcome this new hardcore with open arms.

Richie Hawtin: "It's called 'Cum Cakes' so because of that I have to give it zero."

#### Kurtisrush

George Gets His Freak On (white label)

Notorious bootleg that has failen into Muzik's hands. It's the one wherein Missy Elliott's 'Get UF Freak On' runs headlong into George Michael's 'Faith'. And, for some reason, it works in a giggly, throwaway end of summer sort of way. The chopping around and editing is a preasure to behold, even if you don't like the results.

Richie Hawtin: "I give this a zero. In Ibiza 'Get Ur Freak On' was the most played track in our villa and I've actually done a really weird re-edit which I play out once in a while. I never liked George Michael so why fuck with the song by putting him under it?"

#### Watkins

Black AM (Direction/Shaboorn) A song! With subject matter! And a tune! Hurrah! Upon the first few listens there's something overly fussy about this melancholy soulful house number concerning a New York photographer, but eventually Natalie Arnold's soothing vocals and the gentle piano licks drag you in. Clever, competent and haif original.

Richie Hawtin: "This could have been good but goes downhill fast. My new album is based on small snippets of records and I could

The Sound Of Smitten EP (Smitten)

\*One Hackney itinerant, four labels, five years, seven core artists, 150 tracks, 100% independent, 0% music press attention. How much more underground do you want?\* it says here. But we at Muzik like the odd bit of Chris Liberator, D.A.V.E. The Drummer, Lawrie Immersion and Geezer spread over four sides of acid techno viryl. So there.

Richie Hawtin: "I met D.A.V.E. The Drummer a couple of years ago in Wisconsin and ever since I've

In wisconsin and ever since the always checked his records. Nothing would ever fit into my set but live he was blinding. These tracks don't seem to be doing anything different from what we were doing nine or 10 years ago with acid."

#### Talking Heads/ Liquid People

Once In Lifetime (Eternal) Subtitled 'Same As It Never Was', Talking Heads fans, and indeed music fans in gereral, will curse that it never should have been. A chugging house beat is attached to David Byrne's fine tune and the results stink to high heaven. The only thing to say in its favour is that Muzk has heard an even worse remix currently doing the rounds. Richie Hawtin: "It's funny because in the interviews I've been doing I talk about how the idea of there being only one definitive version of a track is becoming outdated, as people can use technology to re-evaluate it every step of the way. That's good and bad because there will be interesting re-evaluations and useless, terrible re-evaluations, and I think we just heard the first of the latter."

#### Common Factor Rise EP (Soma)

Soma love a bit of Detroit techno, so where better to find it than from Nick Calingaert of Retroflex, who used to record for Carl Craig's Planet E label. Phew! The 'spotter facts, however, rather outweigh the usablewithout-being-very-thrilling contents of this EP, Chipper deck-fare for tech-housers but far from essential.

Richie Hawtin: "I always thought Soma was a bit more varied, but a lot of their output of late has been Detroity techno things with strings on, a bit disappointing. The tune 'Red Earth Below' is a bit more exciting, going back to a deeper hybrid."

#### Captain Tinrib & The Nun

Work It Out/ Is Everybody Ready? (Tinrib)

Never one to piss about with subtlety and hanging around by the bar when he could be working up a chemical sweat on the dancefloor, Jon Bell and his Tinrib label consistently deliver the hard house bollocks. It stings in the best possible way.

Richie Hawtin: "There's some Belgian hoover noises in the middle – I haven't heard those for a couple of years. It's a galloping, riding-a-horse record. Not for me. Derivative and so fast you'd need to be on speed to listen to it."

#### **James Holden**

One For You (Direction/Silver Planet) Youthful studo prodigy James Holden usually sways away from trancey learings, but 'One For You', while retaining bass threat and rhythmic drive, also swishes around with tinkling keys and swathes of female vocals. A great doublepack to get most parties going. The original 'Song For Shelter' sounds like the Velvet Underground's 'Heroin' but the Chemical Brothers and 20:20 Vision mixes certainly don't. 'Ya Mama' is breakbeat rock 'n' roll. Populist, fun, funky and on it. 

#### Richie Hawtin: "It's a good record in the genre that's doing really well in America, so close to rock and alternative it's easy to see why. I like the 20:20 Vision mix - if I was at Space in Ibiza on Monday after Cocoon, I wouldn't be embarrassed to be seen dancing to this. I was probably dancing to worse records last year!"

#### 4 Hero

Les Fleur (Talkin' Loud)

The Café Mambo and Renaissance resident chooses the choons

I'D better start with my own 'Twister'/'Guam' 12-inch on Renaissance, my first release with studio partner Adam Routh. 'Twister's my favourite, a deep, chunky rolling house track with quirky edges to it. Steve Lawler played it first and now several other big DJs are on it.

Next up is Robbie Rivera's 'Feel This' (Strictly Rhythm). I've had this a while now but love it more with every play. It's just a simple beat track. but it really stands out the drums all groove so well together and it gets a massive reaction everywhere I play it. More unexpected is Fatboy Slim's 'Song For Shelter' (Chemical Brothers Mix), on Skint. It's an awesome track that really goes off and with an acappella included it's going to stay in my box for quite a while. "I get deep. . . Wooohh".

Then there's Eagles Pray's 'Tonto's Drum' (Lexicon Avenue Mix) on Plastic Fantastic, This is an early progressive track originally out around 1992, but with a great new mix that's very cool indeed percussive and driving. Finally there's K.O.T's 'Finally' (Danny Tenaglia's Dub) on Defected, an obvious track that's been around months in its original form but now, with the new DT mix, it really does it for me. Definitely my tune of the summer in Ibiza this year.

Hard Life (UR) A Ron Mitchell-sung slice of modern soul from everyone's favourite keepers of the faith. More in the vein of a classic Jersey record than, say, 'Jaguar' this still oozes Detroit in the drums and attilude. Aaron Carl does a fine job on the flip remix, but it's the original that will get the headz jumpin'. (TF)

#### **Tim Deluxe**

Sirens (Underwater) Actually it's the B-side, 'We All Love Sax' that is getting played in proper rooms. Since the 'Believers' classic I've been a sucker for the old sax solos – too many nights spent in jazz-funk clubs, perhaps – but Tim Deluxe uses his experience and touch to create a fabulous party tune that still stays cool. (TF)

#### 68 Beats

Free Your Mind (Asphalt) Robble Rivera – a man who usually goes a little too far down the 'big room/muscle Mary' route for this page here turns out a winner. Props should go to the soulful voice of Niccle Graham, who kind of evens things out against Robble's dark tribalism. **(TF)** 

#### A Million Sons

Misti Blu (white label)

Dorothy Moore's classic erection section anthem gets a deep house re-rub. The lady's soulful angst works a treat on the deep groove, and while soul boys will no doubt have a wry smile, the floor will just dig its bottomless soul. **(TF)** 

#### Wolf 'N' Flow

I'm Feelin' Moody (Moody) Basics veteran Ralph Lawson and partner Carl Finlow come up with what might just be their finest moment on vinyl. Absolutely dead simple yet devilishly clever – a rolling rhythm, great vocal hook and a releatless vibe. Ace, **(TF)** 

#### Fatboy Slim

A Song For Shelter (Skint) Fatboy Sim on the house page? Hold on, he's made a first class job out of Roland Clarke's ramblings and Norman's mix is as funky as any other fucker on these pages. Ralph Lawson and Carl Finlow produce another winner with their '20/20 Mix', but don't underestimate the original. (TF)

#### Frankie Knuckles

Keep On Movin' (Junior) Ever since the great man's last Indulge gig

in Brixton in April, this has been one of those elusive CD-R specials, Soulful tribalism is a good description, with flashes of female and male vocals working effortlessly against the dark drums. Danny Krivit provides a Balearic take on the flip, changing the whole mood to something a lot more jazzy. Quality. (TF)

#### Tiefschwarz

Thru A Little Window (Classic) This has been described as 'the next Isolée'. And while the jury is out on whether it's really that good, you could do many worse things with a fiver than pick it up. Most of the cognoscenti seem to be plumping for the funky, heart-warming house of 'On Up'. That's good, but much better is the driving groove of 'Schwanitz' where heavy-duly lee percussion and a hypnotic, floor-spinning bassine underpin some floating chords and shimmering voices to great effect. (KM)

#### Frank Maurel

House Negro (Shaboom) Shaboom deliver some more tough, uncompromising house with this handy DJ tool from Frank Maurel. This should be neatly filed by the fasticious beside twelves from Mainframe, Peace Division and Halo Vargo. Like UBU's 'Pixels' (Shaboom's previous hot potato) this heavyweight workout should more than satisfy. **(KM)** 

#### Airgap/Eddie Amador

Resolve/The Funk (Yoshitoshi) Two fine, trippy grooves from the Dish. With Argap, they offer up some serious Wild Pitch-y house complete with pulsating rhythms, rolling bass and revolving analogue touches. Like a modern version of Kevorkian's 'FK EP' on Wave, this is the kind of killer spacey electronica that you can't call trance any more. Eddie Amador's twelve is all about a set of remixes from King Unique. Mathew Roberts delivers a more main room feel than the Airgap boys, and on his 'Unseen Force Dub' outdoes himself with a turbo-charged beat session that fires things up nicely. (KM)

#### Mint Royale Featuring Pos

Show Me (Faith & Hope)

Faith & Hope serve up a real mix of styles with this latest release from Mint Royale. #### When did you start DJing and producing?

"I got my first decks when I was 16 and started playing parties at about 18. My first gig in a club was in April 2000." What were your first and most recent productions? "The first solo record was 'Purple Twilight' on Nukleuz Green, and just out are 'Flash' by myself and BK and 'Back To Front' with Phil Reynolds." Who was the biggest

influence on your sound? "When I was starting, it was bands such as Fluke, Leftfield, Prodigy, The Chemical Brothers and even Rage Against The Machine. Lately, it's been BK because we work together so much; we always bounce ideas off each other." Who are your favourite producers now? "I'm addicted to Layo & Bushwacka's album 'Low Life' at the moment. I love the Chemical Brothers, Mauro Picotto, Futureshock, Timo Maas, Electric Tease and of course BK, Andy Farley, Phil Reynolds and Tinrib.' Who would you most like to remix and why? "The Prodigy. They were the biggest thing ever when I was at school, and I was a full-on addict Just let me at 'Speedway' - I'd take it apart!"

'The Edison Factor Remix' is a moody update with tougher rhythms and nifty synth action, not sounding too unlike a new BK remix.

#### Syacoda Versus Ben Kaye

Reach Up Don't Stop (Rudeboy)

A bouncy and pacy offbeat number, with a neat bass building superbly to a big drop, where the disco vocal gives no warning about the huge and infectious synth riff that kicks in after the break. 'Incredible' is equally pacy and another party anthem, where swirling Dutch fairground synths and familiar vocal samples lead the way.

#### **Derler & Klitzing**

Nuclear Device (OTR)

Apparently Judge Jules was cheesed off when Anne Savage played this at Eden recently, as he thought he owned the only copy of this nutty German nu-techno treat. It's a departure for the new lock OTR, and while it won't suit everyone, it should be massive, revolving as it does around a bonkers riff that you won't forget in a hurry. Ner, ner, ner-ner; nerner ner ner-ner, ...

#### Various Artists

Two choice cuts from the Captan's table. The Fish residents on board are DFO and Steve Thomas. The former opts for bleeps, bubbling bass and breakbeats on 'Revenge', while the latter injects some techno attlude into 'Bigger & Bolder', a scratch-FX laden acid groove with a familiar vocal.

#### Various Artists

International Big Room Tunes Sampler (Nukleuz)

Two exclusives to whet your appetite for the forthcoming Nukleuz album of the same name. Lee James blends subtle trance riffs with energetic techno rhythms on his remix of Nick Sentience & Tim Healy's 'Feel Surreal', and Champion Burns drop shrieking, high-pitched strings atop the brassy stabs of lazy house groove 'Pow'.

#### Superfast Oz Versus DJ Kristian Malpractice (Kaktai)

The hard-working owners of the amazing bangingtunes.com web site finally deliver Kaktai 14 (after 15 and 16 have been released). Both sides are quite sparse: Oz & K weave filtered riffs and hoovers into a spacious groove with knocking kicks and a rumbling bass, while Base Grafift's Dom Sweeten comes over all dark and menacing.

#### Charlie Mike Versus The X-Static Boys

Play It Again Man (Full Blast) The first release on Rebel's new hard house offshoot finds the talented Charle Mke in good shape. 'PIAM' is propelled by an almost NRG bass after a lengthy intro, with a cocl, trancey riff nicely breaking up the barrage of hoover and techno stabs. 'E-Rattic' (by The X-Static Boys) is a more intense fusion of the same elements.

#### Pureal

Ease The Pressure (white label)

One of those curious little white labels that make the trip to the record shop worthwhile. 'Ease The Pressure' won't win any prizes for originality, but that's unikely to worry anyone who fancies teasing his crowd with the hook from Bizarre Inc's 'Playing With Knives', mixed here into a bubbling acid groove (à la Hardlloor) with an uplifting climax.

#### The Organ Donors

Bomb Thrush Remixes (Rock Hard)

The original version (from the first twelve) revolves around the same tune as the Alton Towers TV ad, and it's utilsed here by Fall Out Boy in a bouncy, offbeat remix that does the trick. On the A-side, Justin Bourne ditches the hook in favour of a thunderous groove with chunky beats and phat bass topped with just the right amount of quirky stabs and scratch FX.

#### South East Players Music (Tripoli Trax)

Following on from the massive success of 'Horry Drum Machine' comes another guaranleed SEP smash. The remix package is impressive: Ian M bangs the hell out of it with carefree abandon, Steve Thomas adds a trance breakdown and 303s, and Mr Bishi perform their party trick to perfection.

#### Wrecker

Go Crazy (Purgatory)

The boys from Ballymena return with another case of fresh madness. With a clever arrangement and lols of snappy reversed edits, the boys ooze confidence as they warp filtered vox in and out of a dark techno-infused groove that's not as minimal in its appeal as you might think. 'Sexercise' is camp and cheerful, with a twisted side that makes it most intriguing.

#### Paul Glazby

Here We Go (Vicious Circle) No nonsense banging hard trance from the Insomniacz resident, with acidic touches throughout and a full-on breakdown. I actually prefer Kaim's more suble take on it, a tough but funky groove with dark effects and hoovers slithering in and out of the mix, and lots of snappy vocals and laser gun effects chopped in intermittently.

#### Various Artists

The Cell EP (Re-Entry)

Guy McAffer & Mark Tyler's 'Hardcell' is a slamming percussive techno workout that builds to an atmospheric drop, before helish synths sneak in and the whole thing erupts. And there's a Jennifer Lopez vocal. Accompanied by Dynamic Intervention & Mark Tyler's ' Not Real', a strong, pumping, acidic belter with perhaps more appeal.

#### Lab 4

Creator (Fragmented)

The masters of uncompromising hard trance with what some will find a surprisingly accessible offering. A frantic NRG bass laced with squelches, piercing stabs and the "I am the creator" vocal drives incessantly to a big climax topped with a classic Lab 4 synth. "The Energy" is more typically frantic trance with a huge, dare I say it, Rollo-esque riff in the breakdown.

#### Riksta

Hard On Motion (Fevah House)

Number eight from the useful Fevah stamp sees its resident DJ Riksta taking the spotlight. The dark 'Filthy Mix' has pounding kicks last heard in TdV's golden era, a fierce bass, and production that's better than most of its ilk. The wobbling bass on the similarly savage 'Sweet Baby Mix' is stunning, with stuttered vox and sharp stabs holding the interest.

#### What's the difference between the labels?

"Adult Only is more house. It has more of an American influence Combustible is a bit harder and more tech-housey." Which artists have you released so far? "Actually, me and my partner Chris Carrier do more than 80% of the releases ourselves for Adult Only, Combustible and our other labels (Taka, x86. Chronobrain and Direct Art). There aren't too many people in France making our style of music, most people here do that French disco house stuff. It was very difficult for us at first, but I think now it is good because we are the only ones making this music in France. Your stuff always sounds amazing on a big system. . . "That's because of the mastering. You have to be careful with the levels - if one sound is too bright or too bassy it disappears when it's loud. We learned that in England. When you listen to English records at home sometimes they don't sound so good, but when you play them in a club they come to life. . . What have you got coming up? "We're doing an Adult Only album and we'll be releasing a lot more records. We're Also doing a remix for Hooj Choons and a single for Visitor." (DM)

Bodyrock (Rann) Pure lunacy from Ram. Bearing almost no resemblance to anything else around at the moment, 'Bodyrock' rises above its childishly simple beats and Hanna Barbera bassline to create something that's hard to ignore. It's those techy touches that do it, adding a canny note of darkness to the prevailing mood of juvenile dementia. Turn to 'Orient Express' for some kung fu-tinged melodrama.

#### Stormtroopas

Reincarnation (Dread) Second single from Ray Keith's latest prodigies. The title-track's constructed along smillar lines to their bistering debut, blending intricate drum patterns with a deep, driving bassline. Jazzy darkcore. Flipside 'Neutron' is a more conventional drum assault, the relentlessly rolling breaks seeming to be pleasuring some sacrificial maiden. More of those voluminous basslines, please.

Change (Fuze)

Synthetix EP (Full Cycle)

Flat beats, freaky sounds. Instantly recognisable as Full Cycle productions, Rollerball' and 'Stop' are defiantly clunky cyberfunk jams that evoke nightmares of demonic pursuit. The 'Amen'-driven title track's lighter on its feet and reminiscent of early Bukem or Zinc releases, while 'To Step' swaggers along in more of a future-disco vein. Well-executed and impressively varied.

#### Pappa & Gilbey

Skindeep (Choo Choo)

When these two get together, monumentally mind-blowing music is made and 'Skindeep' is by far their best yet! It is dark and deep and flying straight to the top. Male vocals in a Placebo/Mansun style with crazy synth lines and spooky stabs make this an absolute must - a tune of the year! (P)

#### Singles

#### Seanie T

SOS/Formidable (III Flava) Formerly a cameo king in the vein of a UK Busta, Sean T comes through on the solo tip. 'Formidable' is probably the pick of the tures, but you can't really argue with either of them – good, solid beats over which Seanie can roll out his trademark toasts with all the confidence you'd expect. Great stuff.

#### **Psychic Phenomena**

Slip Stream (Stonegroove) They're back! It's been a long time but Domnant G and Drew return with their second EP, five years after their first, this time on the ever-expanding Stonegrove. The trademark touches are there (Drew's abstract-jazzy producton, G's speed of thought and tongue) but they've also improved in every area. Excellent.

#### Princess Superstar Keith 'N' Me (Rapster/!K7)

Helio? In all the fuss over dity-talking white gil Princess Superstar, one thing seems to have been overlooked. She can't rap. Is everyone who works with her (both Kool Keith and Mighty Mi on this particular twelve) taking the piss or are they so enamoured of the idea of a pale skinned indie Lil 'Kim that they don't bother to actually listen? She's so bad you can't even call her a novelly rapper.

#### Commonwealth

That's The Way It Goes (Edel) This sounds like a fairly transparent attempt to do a Missy-meets-UK garage number (but by men). But while it's true you'l have come across better lyrics, this gets inside you and ends up sounding like a genuine UK take on Parliament/Outkast territory. Pure pop but interesting with it.

#### **D-Stroy**

The Matador (Matador)

There's sometimes a fine line between being a 'character rapper' and producing novelty records. Former Arsonist D-Stroy walked the right side of that line last time out, but this Spanish guitar and clés number splatters right through the boundary. Still quite good, though...

#### Basbombing

Maximum Overlarge (Insiduous Urban, USA) In which Basbombing seems to be explaining, over a superbly swinging beat, how God is really quite big. Or maybe not, but whatever he's saying, he does it with so much style and panache, it's great. Two extra tracks on the flip just add to the feeling that a new underground star has been born...

#### 

#### Breaking The Illusion

Jiggy/underground/UK – distinctions oollapse on 'I Need A Job', where former Low Life man Breaking The Illusion hooks up a beat which sounds like the missing link between 'Get UR Freak On' and Rockers HI-Fi combined with broad Leeds lyrics about being on the dole. Hard.

#### Mister Jason Presents The Brews Bros Ready For War/Happy Hour

Ready For War/Happy Hour (Wordplay)

The Porn Theatre Usher combines with Louis Logic and Charlie Bawls for the next instalment in Wordplay's 'Behind The Boards' producer series. Surprisingly (especially considering Louis Logic's show-stealing 'Going Postal' on Stonegroove's recent underground comp), it seems a little subdued, but 'Happy Hour' still raises a smile.

#### Mission

Home (PUTS/ Deep Concentration) With both tracks produced by PUTS mainman Thes One, and Mission running more jazzy, conscious vibrations through the hip hop world, you know you're going to be feeling this. Alongside the new Unspoken Heard album, this should keep all of us who still miss Tribe happy.

#### Albums

#### Crucial DJ Pilchard Beats In Brine (Roc)

Despite the slightly forced jokiness of the titling, these boys from the south coast programme a series of interesting beats where the funk always comes first. Packed with odd little twists and psychedelic touches, you can't really fault these if you can live without an MC now and then.

#### Phoenix Orion & Team Eloheem

MasterControl Program 3000 Presents: Secret Wars (Atomcandy, USA)

Phoenix Orion returns with more of his apocalyptic sci-fi, as pioneered on "Zimulated Experiencez". This record has more funk that that one, but you can't help thinking that in the end – despite some fine dancehall and even d&b moments – chatting about sci-fi can get as obvious as chatting about your car or about the four elements.

#### Various Artists

Fishin' In Troubled Waters (HHI, Canada)

From the excellent hiphopinfinity.com web site comes this 14-tracker of under-underground sounds from the US and Canada. What holds the comp together is a musical, rockist take on the beats and a downbeat, ultra-personal lyrical delivery. But the standouts – The Unseen, in particular – transcend any genre within hip hop and are just dope, infinitely.

#### Akbar

Big Bang Boogie (III Boogie/Groove Attack) With an album recorded in the Bronx,

Chicago and California, no one can accuse Akbar of putting geography before quality. Unfortunately, the beats are the best thing here – it's not that there's anything wrong with his rhymes, it's just that they don't match up to the imagination of tunes like 'Those Who Say' or 'Bigga Dey Come'. Still, they're good enough that this probably isn't surprising.

#### Various Artists

Substance Presents Lyric Superbrand (Substance/ Different Drummer)

The best known hip hop night in Brum brings us a little of their flavour on this consistently quality comp. Highlights come from the likes of Mad Flow, Haych, Cipher Jewels, Elementz and M God, but there's no real weakness on here. Do yourself a favour and look beyond London.

#### Eyedea & Abilities

First Born (Rhymesayers, USA)

The Rhymesayers are prolific and producing pure quality right now. Not everything on this record works 100% but you can't argue with the musically inventive use of samples here or the range of subject matter covered. The record carries real emotional weight because of the subjects dealt with and that's still all too rare in hip hop.

Got Me Saying Ooh (BMG) A UK release which straddles that post-Craig David space between r&b and garage. Lemarr possesses a gruffer, lower voice than David and debuts with a song whose hock is reminiscent of Lucy Pearl's 'You'. Of the various mixes, the darker, synth led BKS rem'x is the one that got these ears. Interesting.

#### The Beatminerz Featuring Caron Wheeler

Open (Rawkus)

A very welcome return for the ex-Soul II Soul diva Wheeler. She's teamed up with the Beatminerz and Pete Rock for a slice of instantly catchy hip hop soul. If you like Hi Tek's 'Round And Round' you're gonna love this. Could be huge.

#### Babyface

Baby's Mama (Arista)

Babyface follows up the excellent 'There She Goes' with another cutting edge track, this time produced by himself and The Megahertz. A socially aware lyric is delivered with some Curits Mayfield-style vocal inflections over a chunky beat, with Snoop adding a double Dutch rapped intro. Good stuff,

#### Blu Cantrell Featuring Foxy Brown

Hit Em Up Style (Ocops) (Remix) (Arista)

To these ears a vast improvement on the annoying. Charleston-sampling original, this has ben roughed up considerably and given a club-orientated reggae feel. Blu Cantrell proves she's got quite a set of lungs on her as she trades verses with Foxy Brown.

#### Method Man & Teddy Riley Party (Def Jam)

Here he splits the sets into 'Beautiful Sunrise' and 'Beautiful Sunset' then does what he normally does, which is build very slowly from ambient at the beginning of CD 1 to deep house at the end of CD2. There's plenty of those Arab influences that the French love so and even some Japanese vibes alongside the more obvious -Dzihan & Kamien, Cantoma and Jori Hulkonnen. How long he can keep up the quality with his heavy release schedule is questionable, but so far he's managing just fine. (CC)

Two CDs demonstrating the current leftfield fixation with the mechanics of sound production. Radulovich melds field recordings, bits of static and random feedback noise into musique concrete. The results are oddly inhuman and icily elegant considering it's just basically a load of orchestrated 'whoosh' and 'thrrppngg' noises. So unrecognisable are most of the sounds that when at one point the ghostly sound of an ice cream van's chimes filtered through the mix, we had to play it back a few times to make sure it was actually on the recording and not our local van selling crack to voots. Rieman, meanwhile, fucks about with the Fender Rhodes (basically). His reverb-heavy proddings, vandalisms and unusual playing methods (employing "rocks, a bass bow and marbles," as you do) turn the jazz-twat's keyboard of choice into the coolest sound source since the Mellotron. Sonic Boom remembers the first lady of Radiophonics

#### **REMEMBER** scrambling

for cover at the opening sounds of Dr Who, freaked to fuck? Ever wondered who it was who strung together tape loops as long as your night, and predicted Kraftwerk's electronica by a decade? Who first used electronic montage and cut-up beats? Delia Derbyshire, unquestionable 'Queen of the Dream' has sadly checked out for pastures new and planes and levels still unexplored.

Listening back to her 1963 theme tune now, it's hard to comprehend how this pioneering genius can go so unrecognised. I won't go on listing her firsts. Let's just say that Stockhausen, Paul McCartney, Yoko Ono and Syd Barrett all sought her out. Getting the picture?

Gaining entry to the BBC Radiophonic Workshop, Delia immediately began work, using equipment today considered antique, but then at the cutting edge of experimental music, to make the sounds we now take for granted. Perhaps no one will believe she invented sampling, but check out her tape-cutting compositions from the early Sixties to hear her pre-empt everyone from The Orb to Norman Cook.

Delia was, of course, a Trip. I suspect most people found her nutty at the very least. One of the joys of my life was persevering with her and discovering what was without doubt one of the sharpest musical minds of the century.

#### Him

New Features (Fat Cat) Usualy the word 'fusion' has us fleeing in terror, vie Bill Laswell-style attempts to splice disparate genres (by making them all sound equally rubbish) inging in our ears. But in this case it's both appropriate and complimentary, as Doug Scharin's US post-rock/ jaz supergroup combine Seventies-era Mles Davis with spacious dub and electronic experimentalism without compromising the integrity or vitality of any of them, steering well clear of the land of 'difficult'. Lovely. (TM)

#### **Stephan Mathieu**

FrequencyLib (Ritornell) Mathieu takes 'popular songs of the past 100 years" or something, and shoves them through his laptop to make eerie little revisions, like half-remembering a song in a dream. Or a bit like an electronic version of The Strokes. The only track whose source we could readily identify was 'Some Of Today', which samples Smashing Pumpkins' 'Today'. Actually that's rather a sharneful admission, isn't it? But whatever the source material, this album has 26 tracks that are so short, if you don't like any given one of them, you can be confident it'll be over soon, and the centrepiece, 'Für Frans', is one of the laptop bombs of the year. (DB) 

#### Various Artists

Open Source.Players (Source) At last! A chill out compilation that doesn't make you feel the perpetrators have ripped off your head, scooped out your brains and filled the cavity with human poo. This rare commodity comes courtesy of David Moufang's Source label (not the French one), and Moufang himself (in his Move D guise) sets the tone with the interstellar dinner jazz, 'Twin Peaks' atmospherics and Peter Frampton/Daft Punk-style guitar of 'Tar Funk'. He's one of the few contributors we've heard of, in fact, but the quality's excellent throughout. (TM)

#### Symptoms Apathy (Swim~)

An album of one-man-and-his-laptop antics with a difference, from Fred out of Slo's brother (no less). The difference is the use of guitars, continuing their rehabilitation into polite society after their community service on Fennesz's album last month. The results are neo-ambient slices of urban melancholia, with similarly hypnobic, serialist structures to Silo's tunes, but a more frosted, less slow-crushing-ofthe-skull-style sound. That throbbing menace is similarly present, though. **(DB)** 

#### Various Artists

If I Was Prince (Rex) And just as all this pristine Powerbook noodling was sending us into a higher, or possibly more bored, state of consciousness, here's a proper album – with songs on it and everything! We were always bigger fans of Prince's films and clothes than his actual music, but these respectful reinterpretations show that with his horrid Eighties production values excised, the purple satyr is as good a songwriter as his fans insist. The tonedeaf rendition of 'Under The Cherry Moon' by latterday King Crimsonites Simian is particularly jolly. (DB)

#### Various Artists

Now Thing – 15 Dancehall Instrumentals (Mo' Wax)

Typical Mo' Wax, on the face of it – take a well-established but under-exposed genre (ragga, in this case), dress it up like the proverbial emperor and sell it to credulous novelty seekers. But for once they've done us a favour – tunes like Steely & Clevie's 'Nightcrawker' and Ward 21's 'Bada Bada' pound, throb and pulse like nothing else on earth, even if they do sound a bit flat without the vocals (you can't have all that misogyny and homophobia putting the students off). Hey – why not provide your own? **(TM)** 

#### Pole

'Urban dub' vendor Stefan Betke may be

plotting a new direction he hopes you'll like, but despite the welcome addition of some clipped guitar to these reworkings of his 1996 'Raum' tracks, it seems he's not yet ready to share it. 'R' clicks and pops and booms and skanks in all the right places, but it's nothing you haven't heard before. Remixes from Kit Clayton and Bumt Friedman don't shed a great deal of light on the matter either. (TM)

#### Jendreiko

Planeten Suite (Flesh)

#### Bogdan Raczynski My Love I Love (Rephlex)

Jendreiko's from Dusseldorf, likens himself to Kurt Weill and has written a suite of anguished ditties about 'cosmic loneliness', which involve a variety of disturbing robotic voices over some deft jazz guitar strumming. You can imagine him performing at a Thirties futurist cabaret before being dragged out by the authorities and shot for deviance and subversion. Brilliant. Bogdan Raczynski is from Poland and has written a suite of anguished ditties about love, longing and loss. These involve his, um, melodically challenged vocals over curious beats and vaguely east European, folky sounding instrumentation that's a far cry from his usual braindance style. He's either sensitive and beautiful or a sinister, obsessive stalker of the Jill Dando-slaying variety. Only Rephlex know the truth. (TM) 

#### Stasis/Remote

Clapped Out/Silvergun (Smalfish) First release from a new label run by the London record shop of the same name, and a nice heavy seven-inch it is too. Remote's contribution is a superior slice of supine dub-techno, while Stasis does John Carpenter-style low-budget slasher flick music. A promising start – but print the labels the right way round next time if you want us to know who's who. Tsk. (TM)

# Desert Island Disco the inside track on hunting rare vinyl

# Music Factory

**ROBERT CLIVILLES** and David Cole will probably be remembered by most for their commercially successful but hardly credible pop house incarnation C&C Music Factory, which won them a Grammy and some heavy rotation on MTV. But delving a little deeper, many newcomers will find a few phat garage gems as well as some classic house anthems.

The duo's first excursion as a production team was in 1987 under the guise of Two Puerto Ricans, A Black Man & A Dominican, with David Morales and Chep Nunez. Their first release was the cut and paste classic 'Do It Properly' (Groove Line), based around Adonis' 'No Way Back'. Selling over 100,000 copies, it catapulted Clivilles and Cole into the lucrative world of remixing. A follow up, 'Scandalous' (Cooltempo, UK) was released in 1988, the year in which they began to hone their production skills, creating some of the slinkiest basslines to hit the house scene to date, as well as employing a number of talented female vocalists.

C&C had already achieved a minor Billboard hit with the Cover Girls' 'Because Of You' in 1987. But in 1988 they achieved one of their finest moments with Sandee's 'Notice Me' on Fever, a superb deep and dubby vocal anthem essential for any collection. The same could be said for Seduction's 'Seduction' from the same year on Vendetta, which had an equally corpulent bassline and was much sampled over the following years. It was followed up by 'You're My One And Only True Love' in 1989 and 'Two To Make It Right' in 1990 (both on Vendetta). C&C also recorded as the Brat Pack, with tracks such as the instantly forgettable 'You're The Only Woman' (Vendetta, 1989).

With an ear for a catchy pop tune and one foot remaining in the underground, C&C had hit the crest of a wave until they released an appalling cover of U2's 'Pride (In The Name of Love)' on Columbia in 1991. But – phew! – help was at hand in the shape of the remix on the B-side. Simply called 'Pride (A Deeper Love)' it was catchy and funky with the traditional C&C bassline and thankfully no traces of U2. It was massive and went on to be re-released the following year with new mixes as 'A Deeper Love' (Columbia, 1992).

It's also worth mentioning C&C's version of Bill Withers' 'Its Gonna Be A Lovely Day' as the S.O.U.L. S.Y.S.T.E.M. on Arista (1992). Track down the double pack for some wicked dubs and instrumentals.

The C&C Music Factory project began life in 1990 as a vehicle for singers such as Martha Walsh, Zelma Davis and Freedom Williams, while retaining some of Clivilles & Cole's trademark zest and funky basslines. To a certain extent a more commercial ethos took over, and they had an instant hit with 'Gonna Make You Sweat' (Columbia), and repeated the formula the following year with 'Things That Make You Go Hmmm'. The theme followed right up till 1994 with two albums, 'Gonna Make You Sweat' (1991) and 'Anything Goes' (1994) – both on Columbia – and various throwaway singles such as 'Keep It Comin" (1992) and 'Take A Toke' (1994). David Cole unfortunately passed away in 1995.

A good reference for late Eighties and early Nineties Clivilles & Cole production work and remixes is the 1992 Columbia compilation 'Clivilles & Cole: Greatest Remixes Volume 1', which was released as both a four-album box set and double LP. Mixes not included there that are of interest are the reworkings of Natalie Cole's 'Pink Cadillac' (1990), Suzanne Vega's 'Blood Makes Noise' (1992), Mariah Carey's 'Anytime You Need A Friend' (1994) and Denise Lopez's 'Don't You Wanna Be Mine' (1990), a tune that still brings a tear to Muzik's occasionally nostalgic eye.



# Buried Treasure BT:Remember (Perfecto Doublepack)

BT hasn't always produced boy bands and Britney Spears. Back in 1997, Perfecto promoed one of the most sought-after doublepacks in recent times with 'Remember', the third single from Transeau's esoteric 'ESCM' opus. Massively underrated by the dance fraternity at the time, this dangerously scarce record featured two excellent electro-tinged takes from Paul Van Dyk as well as BT's contemplative 'Blue Memory Dub' mix. But it was Mood II Swing's (Lem Springsteen and John Ciafone's) thundering bassline take that took the tune to higher states. As strident and sexy as their recent re-jig of Lucy Pearl's 'Don't Mess...', Mood II Swing sealed their reputation as the finest un-hyped heroes on the scene. Magic. (RM)

**COMPARED TO IBIZA**, Ayia Napa's clubland is young and unsteady on its feet. That's a state shared by Jimmy, the manager of the castle club, who has an ever-so-slight Greek Cypriot Mafioso air about him.

"The club scene here is always evolving and getting more exciting. It's really gonna change over the next four years," he enthuses.

The unmistakable imprint of Brits-on-the-piss party-hunting that has made the fortunes of Ibiza, Corfu and the most infamous British haunt of them all, Torremolinos, has now similarly transformed a malleable Napa into a Mediterranean clubbing, pubbing Mecca.

Of course, it was garage and r&b that made Napa's fortunes. But battling on foot through the manic congestion of 'The Square' (The pre-clubbing metropolis of Ayia Napa) it's noticeable that with every passing season the island's umbilical link to those genres lessens as it starts to embrace housier clubs like Cream, Ministry and God's Kitchen.

Inside the Velvet Room, we find DJ and aspiring thespian Goldie, accompanied by a five-man entourage flexing muscles to rival the beefiest of Cypriot doormen. The BPMs are hitting the maximum speed feasible for it still to be considered rhythmic and the avid junglists are nearing hysteria. An outsider watching this crowd move to every deep, dark beat could be forgiven for thinking these were rag dolls suffering synchronised epilepsy. With the added hype of MC Moose's vocals, it's evident that the crowd will be doing Bill & Ben The Flower Pot Men impersonations for some time to come. Tonight the original bad boy of drum & bass silences the sceptics and proclaims that this genre will live on.

Meanwhile, in the other two arenas, Funky Smith stays true to his name and provides some furiously funked-up garage, while Tony Palas distributes grooves that keep the raunchiest of couples gyrating on the dancefloor all night long.

On Saturday, the Castle Club hosts The Lick party, which never fails to deliver the goods. The omnipresent Trevor Nelson and his urbanite crew deliver all the flavas that the new jack swinging, ghetto fabulous, hip hop loving, party going lads and lasses need to sate their taste buds. They lap up every single note. 4am comes and goes but for the true Napa clubber, the night has only just begun. They head in their droves to Insomnia – a favourite haunt of the hardcore garage heads.

With the season's imminent closure, Ayia Napa will soon lie dormant once again. The exotic cocktails ordered by clubbers barely out of their teens will turn to Irish coffees served up to a more mature clientele, here solely for the sun rather than the clubs, booze and whatever else they can find to entertain them. Better book your tickets for next year, then. . . "If only I could look as good as those girls in the bottom photograph"

# Kosheen at The Jazz Cafe, London. Monday July 30th 2001

IT'S ONE OF the muggiest nights of the year, and a very warm welcome greets Kosheen as they slide on, stage right at Camden's Jazz Cafe. After a brief exchange of pleasantries – enough time for a cellist, bassist and drummer to settle down beside Markee Substance, Decoder and Sian Evans, the core of the collective – a raucous, sultry rinse of their belting third single 'Suicide' sets the tone of what's to come.

Earlier in the evening, the warm up DJ gave a reminder of just how massive Creamer & K's remix of 'Hide U' is. But that's pushed from the

crowd's minds when the Bristolians rip into their own, live take. It's testament to their roots in the legendary Roughneck Ting parties, with old school drum loops and tearing, chunky basslines ripping through the sedate, chilled Jazz Cafe crowd.

Eventually relaxing into the live environment, they cut the tempo with tunes like 'Catch' allowing us to fully appreciate the subtle structures of singer Sian Evans' lyrics. The fusion of breakbeat science and organic, soulful grooves has the kind of effect that will see Kosheen jump from Helter-Skelter to the Jazz Cafe, to Radio 1's Ibiza bonanza and beyond within the space of a few days.

You sense they feel they've got something to prove. Maybe they have, with a recent step up to a major label, one of the most eagerly anticipated dance music albums of the year and a brace of gold from the d&b awards creating waves that reach far beyond their immediate peers. But, as they succumb to a little persuasion for an encore (a repeat performance of 'Suicide'), it's clear that their ability to conjure deep dark cuts with decent tunes leaves them a step or two ahead of the rest.

WHATEVER TURNS YOU ON


T'S tough at the top. EQ's here to meet the multi-talented Andy Cato (partner Tom Findlay is elsewhere), of Groove Armada fame, to review two of the latest synths, supplied to us by those good people at Korg and Roland. But we're just the first in today's lengthy queue of hacks clamouring to interview Andy (Radio 1 is next) and this is just the latest phase in Groove Armada's crazy schedule of touring, studio boffinry and general ongoing media circus. It's not easy being a very tall dance music star. . .

"We finished the album, the Vertigo thing, went all over the place – including going to Australia for a day, which was one of the most ridiculous things I've done – and went to Japan and all around Europe," Andy recalls. "And then, because of 'I See You Baby', we spent about six months in the States, a lot of that time in a bus, going around with the band, and that was interesting. But we never want to do that whole promotional thing again. It was just totally soul-destroying and exhausting after a while."

"By the time we'd finished in America, everyone was saying, 'Where's the next record? Where's the next record?'. So without stopping, we went into record mode, which involved going to the Cotswolds for nine months – away from home again. And as soon as that stops, the promotion starts and you're off again, so the whole thing's like a four or five year cycle, which obviously has its high points but also has its low points."

And the cycle ain't over yet.

"We've got a tour in October, which we're actually looking forward to, because we've never done a tour of the UK before, with a European tour preceding it. Then just a few dates in America; we're not going to do that whole trans-American megatour thing.



"I mean, playing on the coasts is fine, but trawling through Texas, trying to persuade people to buy Groove Armada albums is just not worth it. And both Tom and I want to play more football this away with leads. Now that the synths are all plumbed in, he gets stuck into the very technolooking Korg MS 2000. He follows the workings of the box through from the oscillators that produce the basic tones or waveforms, through the various envelopes, filters and so on that add enriching characteristics to the sound.

Even Andy finds the scientific notation all over the front panel of the synth confusing, but joyfully, this turns out to be misleading. We have the synth up, running and sounding mighty fine within 20 minutes.

Essentially this keyboard is a traditional-style analogue synthesizer (think acid sounds, whooshy pads, speed garage bass-sounds and ambient wibbles and you're in the ball park) with extra processing tweaks to give a very rich, modern sound. Andy's instantly taken with it.

"It's quite impressive," he says, playing a rich Fender Rhodes organ sound. "Initial fiddlings suggest one could be on order. . . impressive openings."

year, we missed a lot of games last season." You play for a football team?

"Yes. I had to set up one of my own, cos I'm rubbish. It's called Eastern Promise; it's actually full of DJs, like all the Nuphonic people, Tim 'Love' Lee was in there, the Idjut Boys. . . But we were in the cup final and we finished third in the league. So I've got to organise next season's fixtures as well at some point."

During our conversation, Andy's been beavering

Andy soon discovers that you can create really rich, complex sounds with the MS 2000, by programming 'modulation sequences' which are themselves enriched by excellent onboard FX.

"You can assign any four different parameters to be controlled by MIDI or other controllers. . . get pitch to wobble around, or pan left and right. In other words, any sound can be pumped through a sequence of these various parameters in a chain. It's a bit daunting, but it could be devastatingly effective."



A quick audition of some of the more complex onboard sounds proves it. Andy is sold. Not only is this a fabulous super-analogue synth, it will also work as a vocoder to process an external vocal signal, or even filter other instruments in the mix. Groove Armada's friendly giant loves it.

"It's basically a lot more simple than it looks. There are two waveforms, which make the noises for the single patches, (double patches combine sounds of single patches) - that side of things is pretty straightforward. The sound is very impressive. It goes from Paul Van Dyk moments to Stevie Wonder moments with incredible ease

And the sounds?

"There seem to be absolutely hundreds of them. I imagine the vast majority of these will end up in studios with people just using presets. You've got seven banks of 128 - that's over 1,000 different noises, and if that's not enough you can plug in memory cards with extra sounds or use samples from another machine [with a small upgrade]." Again, the box looks scarier than it is.

"The screen is incredibly un-user friendly. But then, the old JV 1080 is one of the easiest things in the world to use, but it looks very complicated."

But the layout of the XV 5080 control panel is a big improvement. There are more buttons on the front allowing you instant access to the patches and the sounds that make them up. So what about those sounds?

"Presets A, B and C are exactly the same as on the 1080 - D, E, F, and G are newer with sounds like Fat Pad, Morph Pad, Rockin' Rhodes, Buster Bass, 700 Bass Boy - they're moving into the P.H.A.T. arena, which everyone's got to do these days. The great thing is, anyone who used the industry standard 1080 will be able to get their head around this. So I'd have to renew my Roland contract - if I'd ever had one. . ."

But is it accessible to the newcomer?

"I've spent a lot of time explaining how 1080s work to people who are good in the studio and it's

and these modulation sequences seem to be a way of creating guite complicated, programmed sounds. We haven't really got into that yet, but it looks do-able with a cup of tea and about threequarters of an hour. I'm going to get one."

So the Korg MS 2000 is a winner. The only thing we can find fault with is the rather intimidating scientific scrawl all over the front panel.

But what about the Roland? Well, their XV 5080 is a different kind of beast. This is a sample-based synth, which means that the waveforms for each patch (sound) are digital recordings of sounds, played back through the only because at the time I got it, it was the only thing I had, so I really know the nuts and bolts of it. I think, as a newcomer to this one, you will have to be very patient. The layout looks confusing, but actually it's not. Once you get your head around it, it's got '21st century workhorse' written all over it."

While it can be initially confusing, the XV 5080 has got such a range of sounds - and you can play 32 of them at once - that you could write a whole tune without even plugging in another sound module. In short, it looks set to be another industry standard synth. So that's another Best In Class award for Roland, then.



synth's filters and envelopes. The versatility and quality of the results mean this kind of synth is used in studios as a bank of sounds which can be used to quickly find an approximation of the desired sound. It would complement a synth like the MS 2000 rather well and is an upgrade of the old (industry standard) JV 1080 and JV 2080.

"You've got a 32 MIDI channel machine and it's got a SCSI port for saving your noises to a ZIP drive or something. It's also got digital audio in and out for audio at the back - they're going with the times."

Meanwhile, the new Groove Armada album, 'Goodbye Country, Hello Nightclub' is now done and dusted and being prepared for release. It was a labour of love. . .

"The effort involved was completely ridiculous, bordering on the obsessive. There's loads of live strings and guitars and drums and everything, so we had to learn the science of recording all that live stuff - which is a whole different ball game. We made lots of mistakes, like spending two weeks recording drums and not using any of them and things like that. And once we'd gone through all that we just become totally obsessed with making it brilliant because we'd put so much effort in. We had to go the whole distance. There's one tune where I actually spent three days mixing it down, and then we went home to London. Tom had a copy and I had a copy and we phoned each other and basically had to agree that the triangle was too loud and we had to do the whole thing again. Lots of things like that."

Oh, for a simple life, eh?

The new Groove Armada album, 'Goodbye Country, Hello Nightclub' features Jeru The Damaja, Criminul, Richie Havens and the tonsil-tastic Tim Hutton and is out soon. Groove Armada will be resuming their residency at London's Fabric from late August as well as continuing their M Herbal bar knees-up sessions

# HALION STEINBERG

# Possibly the greatest software sampler yet, courtesy of Steinberg

The digital sampler has been the number one weapon in the sussed creative DJ/ producer/ musician's sonic arsenal for nigh on 20 years.

The original samplers of the early Eighties were custom-built using dedicated, cutting edge hardware and cost as much as a decent threeg bedroom semi in West Hampstead. That all changed in 1987 though, when Akai introduced the S900, bringing affordable sampling to the masses. Then the fun really started.

For many years, Akai held the market pole position, favoured by studio engineers and most DJs. EMU and Roland offered solutions that incorporated enhanced real-time control, which appealed to the gigging musician. These days however, with the ever-increasing speed and power of modern computers, software-based 'virtual' samplers have become a relatively cheap and mega-powerful alternative.

The first software-based virtual sampler was probably Sample Cell by Digidesign. This was released some 10 years ago, but cheated somewhat in that it required you to install a new hardware board in your computer for it to work. This was due to the comparatively under-powered processors in PCs of the day.

There have been some fine software samplers released since then. In the last couple of years, the likes of Bitheads' Unity and E-Magic's EXS24 have upped the ante. But, if first impressions prove correct, Steinberg appear to have trumped the lot with their new program, Halion.

# EQ PRODUCT REVIEW

The first thing we liked about Halion was the wide range of file formats that it supports. Not only can you import WAV, AIFF and Akai format samples, but also Digidesign Sound Designer 2, Rex files (used by Steinberg's marvellous ReCycle software) and EMU3 files. Thus, you can make use of the huge EMU library of great sounding sounds from EMU, any Akai CD-ROM (the most common format for sample CDs), together with all the common computer recording file formats. Basically, this baby plays back every sample in your library. And your brother's.

The way Halion is laid out will be comfortably familiar to anyone who has used an Akai sampler. The basic unit is a sample. Samples are then arranged into 'keygroups', depending on how they are laid out across a MIDI keyboard. These keygroups then become part of a 'program'.

Halion consists of eight pages. The default page is **Macro**, which displays a scrollable piano keyboard. It also shows controls for filters and amplifiers, which will be familiar to anyone who has



ever used a traditional synth. There are also controls for two LFOs (low frequency oscillators, used as traditional synths usually use them). You've also got turning controls and real-time portamento (note glide) stuff, as usual. So far, so good.

Your next stop, however, should be the **Options** page, because it's here where you load your sounds. As we've already noted, you can import sounds from all common audio file formats or Akai and EMU CD-ROMs. Of course, software samplers don't actually sample in the same way that hardware samplers do (plugging in your turntable and digitally recording it into the sampler's memory). With software samplers, the sound is recorded (via your PC soundcard) into your computer music program (Cubase, Logic, etc), and can then be imported into your software sampler, and treated, modified and warped into hyperspace to your heart's content.



Once you've imported your sample into Halion, your next port of call is the **Waveloop** page. This is your audio scalpel. Here you can zoom in on



any part of the sample waveform, set loop points, and the sophisticated crossfade function automatically identifies zero crossing points in the audio waveform to give glitch and pop free loops – magic! These functions are dead easy to use, with the clear mouse-driven graphics making effective looping a breeze.

Once you're happy with your sample, you'll want to place it across a group of notes on your MIDI keyboard. The **Keyzone** page is your destination for this job. Halion's flexible and powerful Keyzone window makes creating complete programs and layers fast and intuitive, regardless of whether the intent is to pitch, modulate or reverse samples. Loading samples is done with a quick 'drag and drop' directly to the Keyzone window, where they appear as graphic elements on the screen. Velocity and layers are determined by simply re-sizing and moving the Keyzones. Samples are then streamed directly from the hard disk, eliminating any memory limitations of RAM based systems. Once you've done it couple of times, you'll find it's quick and easy, with no annoying waiting time.

The **Env/Filter** page provides all the usual filtering (low pass, high pass, band pass and notch), together with envelope shapers, allowing you to vary filter and amplifier parameters over time. Again, this page will be self-explanatory to anyone who's used a hardware synth.

We've only got space to cover the basics of what this baby can do, but we reckon it could well be the only sampler that you'll ever need. It's quick and intuitive to use, and it passes that acid test of any piece of technological kit: you don't have to take off your musical-vibe hat and don your techno-geek hat to use it. This baby kicks butt, and, no, I AIN'T sending the mutha back! Anyone want to buy a pair of fully loaded Akai S3200 XLs? Oh, and an EMU 4?

There's no demo version available, so if you want to go for it, you'll have to put your hand in your pocket to the tune of 250 Great British Pounds. That's around the same price as the E-Magic EXS24, but you can't use that in Cubase and its file choices are less comprehensive.

# Herbie Hancock

The evergreen jazzbo and 'Rockit' man on Miles Davis, techno and sharing his name with a VW Beetle

## Do you smoke, Herb?

Ha! I've heard that before. The answer's no. I tried it, but I didn't like it.

Hmm. Okay. The new album ('Future2Future'). Pleased with it? Sure. I've never done a record like this before. I've never heard a record like this before. It's very difficult to describe. So much of what went into the record was very spontaneous. [Producer] Bill Laswell just put this stuff on and told me to just respond. Not to intellectualise or ponder or figure out, just respond on the spur of the moment.

# We heard 'Strings Of Life' in there somewhere. Plus there's a Carl Craig collaboration. Any danger of you 'going techno'?

Not hardcore. I don't like it. What I hear when I go to clubs in Germany sounds like marching music to me,

which is a dangerous thing in Germany. So no, I'm not that attracted to techno from the standpoint of the beat, although there are techno elements in the record, just as there's drum & bass, there's hip hop in there...

## Is there a musical style you haven't tackled that you'd like to? What about a folk-country fusion album in the future?

Well, first I'd like to tackle the musical style that I'm currently tackling. Folk? Well, one idea I did have was a blues album, and that's a folk music, but if you're talking about folk in a traditional sense, I hadn't made plans to... You worked with Miles Davis in the Sixties. Spill: what was he like? Miles? He was always innovating, always creating, always attempting to capture the moment. He taught us to find our own solutions, which is what a true master does. And he was a very funny guy. He had an unbelievable wit and intelligence.

# Have you got a cool Miles story

that you always trot out at parties? I tell this one a lot. The band was playing this concert in Stuttgart, and we were 'on'. It was special, exciting. The night was building, you know? Anyway, we were playing this tune, 'So What', that Miles wrote, and the whole band was cooking. Then Miles steps up to do his solo and in the middle, just when he was peaking, I played this chord that was so wrong I wanted to crawl under the floor. But Miles took a breath and played certain notes that made my chord right. I don't know where he found it, but he made my chord fit. And that taught me a lesson: whatever happens, try to make it work for you, rather than reject it.

# We've seen Boogie Nights. Were the Seventies really that cool?

Do you mean did we party? Sometimes I partied but the music we were doing was so demanding that you had to be sober and, you know, very 'there' in order to play. But there was other stuff. I became a vegetarian for a while. We got into Hinduism and Buddhism. We were looking for answers then. When you were vegetarian, did you consider changing your surname to 'Vore'? Huh? Oh, I get it. Well, you know, I still could. I don't eat red meat or pork.

# What do you think when you hear your work sampled by hip hop artists?

You're hearing parts of tunes that have been almost forgotten, and they're put in a context that makes them more accessible to a wider audience – so, yeah I like it. It's a compliment. Plus I get paid.

# What drives you to keep changing?

Boredom. If I just did the same record over and over again, or did a record that sounded just like someone else's, that to me is boring; it's cheating. What I like to do is figure out perspectives that other people haven't thought of. That to me is exciting and interesting.

# How does it feel to be an icon?

Well I don't feel like an icon. It may be someone else's perception, but it's not mine. I'm just one of the guys that's still around, because so many of the others are gone. For me, I'm more interested in doing the next record, figuring what I'm going to 'do', not what I 'did'.

# Finally, do people ever mix you up with Herbie, the amorous VW? Oh yeah, especially when that movie came out. All the time: 'Hey, Herbie, the Love Bug!'
