Why music's cutest format is also its coolest

It's like James Lavelle says: "They're a bugger to mix, but sometimes I just can't resist it." He's talking sevens, of course - the small but perfectly formed format.

Seven-inches have always had staunch supporters: Lavelle, DJ Shadow, Norman Cook, David Holmes, Jon Carter and Richard Fearless for starters. In fact Fearless was recently inspired to remixed dancehall legend Capleton's 'Whoa New Way' after hammering the Greensleeves seven for ages.

Now everyone's going seven-inch mental. Every genre from dancehall to punk to electroclash to chill out feels at home on the diminutive discs, and they always look pretty damin cool. Certain labels have been waving the seven-inch flag extra vigorously for some time now: the eminently collectable Tummy Touch and Touch Tones imprints, for instance, but more and more exclusive seven-inch series are springing up, most recently from City Rockersand Puma Street. There's also no better format

Breeding Space (On U Sound) "This was a big influence on what I did in the early Nineties; it has reggae and African influences but it's not trying to be a Lee 'Scratch' Perry record or anything. My friends and I used to sit around at my parents' house and listen to this and just freak out on all the textures and sounds and the crazy bass and percussion lines they used to play."

A CERTAIN RATIO Blown Away (Soul Jazz)

"This is from a reissue. I knew a bit about the group, but Hannah [Carl's wife] would always talk about them and how great they were. She sold all her ACR records years ago so this album was the first chance I had to really get to know them. It's insane shit. This track sounds a bit like Liquid Liquid or ESG, it's very dreamy with a spacey kind of vocal."

REVOLTING COCKS Big Sexy Land (Wax Trax)

"What Adrian Sherwood and the On U Sound guys were doing with dub, these guys did with industrial. You put this on and the needle goes nuts and the speakers dance like crazy cos of the intensity of the music. I don't really know the history of the group or about all that devil worshipping stuff, but this is an insane cut."

ERRO Don't Change (Vobra)

"This has been a favourite of mine for the last year; it's such a wonderful, spiritual song. It's an uplifting vocal track with violins and guitar. It's a house tune, but it's not [laughs]. It's by a New Jersey producer called Osunlade and I love it because it has this really inspiring, amazing vocal."

SOHA

Balance (Silence)

"This is kind of going with the mood but bringing the tape down to a minimal, spiritual, mental kind of vibe. It's a thought track, it really makes you think. It's such a beautiful song with these really great textures. It's like a Basic Channel record in that it only has three or four elements, yet holds your attention and helps you to

Moody old d&b stoners become pop stars shocker!

okyo 1996. Marc Royal (aka T Power) draws on his umpteenth spliff as the rising sun bleeds across the horizon. For the past few hours he's talked everything from conspiracy theory to his position as the drum & bass fraternity's outsider.

"I've been spending a lot of time with Shy FX recently," he tells Muzik. "And he's got me bobbing my head again."

A month later Royal dropped the hugely non-head-bobbing album "Waveform". The Shy effect, it seemed, had yet to shake Royal's body.

"I never said it translated to the music," laughs Royal in the darkened east London studio he and Shy work from today. "Music was too formulaic and sterile. So I chucked in a lot of noise and spent the next few years pulling the noise back out of it until it got back to bare grooves, which is where I am today." the nectar of UK soul. And it's as funky as a mule on heat. "The first thing we do is make sure it works on the dancefloor," says Shy, "but the thing is, we listen to everything and that's what gets the vibe going. Shy, on the other hand, had been on his own, less noisy journey, into the hearts of r&b and garage. Since his classic debut 'Original Nuttah', and his subsequent, disappointing artist album, the lad known to his family as Andre has quietly walked his own, individual road in the drum & bass world, with genre-defining classics like 'Bambaataa'. Two years ago, however, Shy and Marc dropped a track which was to blow away any preconceptions people may have had about either of them.

'Shake Ur Body' was the carnival sound of drum & bass busting a few seductive moves with r&b. Since then, the single has reignited interest in the d&b scene, taken up residency on Radio 1 and stormed the charts. "I think the fact that we've both experimented has meant that we've been able to achieve what we set out to achieve," explains Royal. "It's very easy to be well produced but sterile, or grimy but unlistenable. Because we now both understand this, we've been able to avoid getting side-tracked."

Forthcoming single 'Don't Wanna Know', once again featuring 'Shake Ur Body' vocalist Di (with Skibadee MCing), ably displays just how the duo have perfected their art. It's the sound of drum & bass massaging its jungle roots with the nectar of UK soul. And it's as funky as a mule on heat.

"The first thing we do is make says Shy, "but the thing is, we listen to everything and that's what gets the vibe going. When I'm not playing out, we always parties, or whatever. We're always listening to different things. I find it strange that people talking about the new vocal drum & bass sound. ECSTASY DOD

It's the additive-laden sound invading a million kiddies' bedrooms and filling their heads with thoughts of clubbing, hedonism and trance-like states. . . And Lasgo are its shock troops

t's Teen Nite at the Abyss club. Slouching in the crumby wilds of Sayreville, New Jersey, the Abyss is a sweaty, hormone-ravaged dive where an inch-thick veneer of disco-dirt covers every surface. Teen Nite is a liquor-free snogfest, where swarms of shirtless Hispanic kids bump and grind with surly-looking adolescent girls. It's a bit like a school production of Mean Streets crossed with a Friday night out at Tramps in Pitsea. And it is where Lasgo are currently being introduced as "one of the biggest acts in the world," by an MC.

Big they may be, but Lasgo don't seem very cool. For a start, keyboardist Dave McCullen looks like a constantly cheery hybrid of Gary Barlow and Tintin and waddles about onstage clasping a Level 42-style synth-guitar. Peter Luts, the 30-year old architect of Lasgo's sound, exhorts the crowd to "Clap your hands... Come on!" and to "Put your hands in the air! 1-2-3-4!"

But then there's Evi Goffin. The 21 year-old Eurovision veteran from Antwerp looks like every teenage boy's wet dream, and from the moment she sets foot on stage, the crowd screech louder and more scarily than the kids in the mass-murder-by-telepathy scene at the end of Carrie. As Evi launches into their indecently huge hit

'Something', the crowd mouth every word and begins to part-ay Noo Joisey-style, which means shouting "Whooah!" and making fishy shapes with their fists.

At 285,000 sales and rising, 'Something' is the biggest dance single of 2002 (Elvis remixes aside). Like Ian Van Dahl, Paffendorf and Dee Dee before them, Lasgo offer a saccharine distant nephew of the Van Dyk trance template of yore. The infernally catchy 'Something' has all the elements in place for Pavlovian worldwide domination – anthemic, mournful chords, an insistent Depeche Mode-inspired keyboard riff, and an Abba-esque power

melody. Hitting Number 4 in the British hit parade last March, the Dave Pearce Summer Anthem staple has gone on to spearhead a global ecstasy pop phenomenon.

The genre has its detractors, but as the crowd reaction at Abyss proves, this poppy update of Euro-trance is a nursery rhyme bridge into dance music proper. It's the sound of choice for a new generation of clubbers in the first flushes of their infatuation with dance music. Now it's started to conquer America. Lasgo are such hot properties here, there are even two bands currently touring, purporting to be them – including one fronted by a transvestite.

in Manhattan's Millennium Broadway hotel, Evi Goffin sighs.

Clearly not a man too bothered about 'cool', Dave McCullen, who only two years ago was working as a truck driver, is a shameless fan of the Vengaboys and DJ Otzi much to the Tiesto-loving Peter's chagrin.

"People criticise us - but if our

kind of music is so easy to make, then have a go!" challenges Dave. "Have a Top 10 hit every week! The snobbery doesn't annoy me any more - I think of my

accountant at the end of the day!" Two days later, the group are at the PARTY 105.3 radio dance festival, held in an amphitheatre in the soulless Long Island town of Farmingville. It's like a municipal dump full of vestwearing, slack-jawed vokels with crew cuts. The DJ spins Tim

Deluxe and the crowd look bewildered, like sheep who have just been made to watch a performance art troupe.

It was all so different two years ago, during America's Summer Of Love. The USA finally fell in love with dance music, embracing the hard, melodic trance of Pauls Van Dyk and Oakenfold. But at Farmingville, the Candy Ravers (America's 'Crasher Kids), are notably absent. But while Sasha might bemoan "Mickey Mouse trance music", acts like Lasgo and DJ Sammy are having Billboard hits because, as Evi puts it, "We're very commercial and easy to sing."

Backstage at Abyss, Dave is countering Muzik's assertions about a lack of famous Belgians by invoking the Smurfs. "That's the band that really influenced us," he chortles. "Absolutely! I can even sing some lines from 'The Smurf Song'. They seem just like Lasgo tunes. . .'

We can't quite work out if he's joking or not.



The northern industrial and techno heartland putting steel into UK electro



atecrasher may have just gone monthly, and townie cattle may roam the city centre, but Sheffield is not

sleeping. In back-street boozers, funny little clubs and cluttered home studios, Sheffield is stirring. A raft of electronic pop pioneers, out of their heads on Henderson's Relish and

good bitter, are forging a new Steel City aesthetic. The likes of I Monster, Fat Truckers and White Trash barf up a peculiar mixture of monster Moogs and withering northern humour, electronic punks Cabaret Voltaire and bass culture.

There are no flash Svengalis controlling the scene. "Sheffield's a working class town," says producer/ DJ Parrot of the All Seeing I. "There's a suspicion of people who shout about things." Instead there are low-intensity labels like Parrot's Earth Records, Truckers' Roadtrain and I Monster's Twins Of Evil. Cottage industries, basically, that occasionally spring surprise hits on the world, like I Monster's 'Daydream'. Now, it's only a matter of time before the rest of the UK latches on. Fat Truckers have signed a European deal with DJ Hell's Gigolo label, I Monster have just finished their new album and there's renewed interest in the back catalogues of Sheffield electro originators The Human League and Cabaret Voltaire. So with Sheffield kicking off, it's time to meet the city's rising players...

■ Fat Truckers Madness with Moogs, Stooges with synths, Fat Truckers rock a buzzsynth riot, while tackling such topics as biker Carl Foggarty ('Superbike') and stick-thin celebrities ('Anorexic Robot'). They're very sarky, a bit larky and, quite possibly, the future of rock 'n' roll.

White Trash Sheffield's avant-electro

shock troops. Parrot and Ross Orton (Fat Truckers) twiddle the knobs, while provocative front-persons Pete, Barry and Alicia push your buttons. "I grew up in a time when you never knew what freaky cunt was going to be on Top Of The Pops," says Parrot. "I'd love White Trash to get on."

National Bandit

Due to his tendency to shelve awesome tracks in favour of new ideas, Jason 'JP' Buckle's output is limited to one single, 'The Wrongdoer'. Still, a genius. "I can't be arsed flogging my stuff," he reports, from his new London base. He is, however, currently, "pottering" with Add N To (X) and "messing about" with Jarvis Cocker.

Kings Have Long Arms

Salford-born Adrian Flanagan released his debut single, 'Rock 'N' Roll Is Dead' on Twins Of Evil earlier this year and album 'Hot Buttered Booty' (Chips) is out late November. "Sex, drugs and rock 'n' roll's everyday now," he says of his debut seven. "We're all at home getting a blow job, having a spliff and making music."

Mu Chan Clan

Nagano-born Mu arrived in Sheffield three years ago. Impressed by her MC Hammer-style dancing at parties, Honor and Orton helped Mu record her autobiographical debut, 'Smash It With A Brick'. ''I was innocent teenager, he was dirty older man, and he treated me not right. So, I broke his car," Mu explains, sweetly.

Man Atom

"People don't take risks," says Dave Nash. "Sheffield is better than most cities due to its history of interesting sounds." As if to prove the point, MA's debut album 'The Point About Gordon Black Being' is sizzling junk pop; Mark E Smithmeets-Money Mark.

Desperate Soundsystem

Iarvis Cocker and Steve Mackey's umbrella organisation for Sheffieldbased synth-nutters. 'Homelands [2001] was what made us do it," says Mackey. "There was an MTV poll where 85% people said we shouldn't play, so we did."

All Seeing I

When Erol Alkan, 27, first started DJing, 💭 was a typical north London raver. By night, he'd listen to Fablo and Grooverider on early Nineties pirate Fantasy FM. By day, he'd scour Pure Groove's racks for new LFO tracks. But then it all went weird. Alkan found himself getting into indie, and soon he was mixing The Happy Mondays into house tunes. "My mates thought I was crap," he recalls, "but it was just what I liked," It turned out, however, to be a stroke of genius. Alkan's indie/ electro-punk club Trash is now rated as one of London's best nights, his bootlegs (credited to Kurtis Rush) helped kickstart the mash-up mayhem and Alkan's energetic, eclectic sets are rocking the crowds at Bugged Out!. Some are even talking about Alkan as a new, and very different, future superstar DJ.

How would you describe the Trash ethos? "I just wanted to do a club where I wouldn't get told off for playing certain types of music. There's inventive people in every area, it's not a battle. Moving to The End made people sit up and listen." How's it feel to be described as 'the next superstar DJ'?

"I feel part of something at Trash, but I don't feel. self-important. I owe everything to the people who come down the club. I've been abroad a lot, but I, don't feel like a superstar, because the people I meet along the way are cool."

5 Metal Master

The work of Mathias Hoffman and Sven Vath, 'Spectrum' was a massive anthem in Germany that appeared on many trance comps in the mid-Nineties, Muzik's Thomas H Green still swears by it today.

6 X-Cabs

Another Hook classic, released under one of Barcelona resident Chris Cowie's many pseudonyms. James: "Infectious' was their first single and is a bit of a classic. This was the Hook Records theme tune and proof you could run a label from the north of Scotland. Nowadays, of course, Cowie makes techno music..."

7 Qattara

Come With Me (Paul Van Dyk Remix) A surging trancer from Alex Whitcombe, who was once one half of Chicane and Disco Citizens. Paul Van Dyk, then at the peak of his powers, provides a remix. James: "The Qattara Depression is an area of desert in Egypt, where people go to find themselves,"

8 Elevator Shinny (Original Mix)

Snapped up by a nascent React and the work of a young Blu Peter. Tony De Vit caned it at Garage at Heaven and Trade. James: "At the time, this sounded

like nothing else. The track's named after a flamboyant clubber called Shinny. Where is she now?"

9 Art Of Trance

Madagascar (Original Mix) Probably Platipus Records' defining moment. The Ferry Corsten mix did wonders for that boy's career, but the original mix still kicks like a mule. James: "A sensational track that was raw and electronic, but with amazingly melodic riffs. Back then, you could go into a record shop and sing the riffs!"

10 Commander Tom Are Am Eye?

The final track on the mix is also the fastest. This German stomper was one of the defining moments of hard trance and was unavoidable in Germany, James: "This record set standards. Hard trance is really happening in the UK now, but this was a benchmark for the hard house scene."

The So Solid Crewmen heading up the UK urban revolution

t Choice FM, London's leading legit urban radio station, next to a sign saying 'please refrain from stealing', the Don

Gorgons of UK urban are slumped at the interview table of DJ CK Flash. Neutrino looks gym-healthy. Oxide, with his toothy grin and neon-tube complexion, looks like a recently deceased young vicar. They're bravely facing down such difficult questions as "You recently played a gig to 10,000 people - was that good?"

Other than that, talk is of typical yout' man tings (as we say in Hampstead): swearing (Tariq their Promotions Manager has spent the previous day removing "56 cuss words and references to Down's Syndrome and crack" from a track to make it playable on the radio), clubbing, girls. . . but above all, 2 Steps Ahead', the impending follow-up to their half-a-millionshifting debut album 'Execute'.

"The easy thing to do would have

been to just make the same album Flash's verbal grilling. "We could have sometimes misogynous lyrics with just knocked it out, said 'there you go, humour, but the main attraction is where's my money?'. But this album's about us developing our skills."

This isn't just idle chat. '2 Steps Ahead' will pump up still further the reputation they forged with 'Execute'. That record fused UK garage, hardcore, hip hop and techno into a brilliant whole, pulling off the enviable trick of sounding alien and snottily youthful, yet accessible. But '2 Steps Ahead' is what is technically known as 'some next level shit'. Musically and vocally it leaves its little bro' for dead, moving away from UK garage tempo whenever it feels like it, and employing a far more sophisticated palette of sounds without losing the cut 'n' paste excitement of 'Execute'.

Highlights include the Kraftwerksampling (via Jay-Z) new single 'Dem Girls', the hilarious drug paranoia of 'Amsterdam', and the triumphant, musically electric 'Return Of The

Supa'. Neutrino leavens his bleak again," says Neutrino, recovering after and - it must be said - repetitive and Oxide's second generation beats, which are frequently touched with a quality little short of genius.

Beefs with the older wing of the UK garage scene seem a long time ago. Ox and Neuts have transcended their UKG roots to become that classic British combination - a duo of charismatic frontman and dour production genius. Neutrino isn't noticeably moist-eyed when the UK garage scene is mentioned, either.

"There's no more garage scene man, that's all gone," he says firmly. "It's fucked up."

Because they have thick London accents and didn't go to university, the duo will never win over the musical snobs (a recent interview in a low-rent indie mag was headed 'Dumb And Dumber'). But Ox and Neuts, their So Solid associates and those who are influenced by them

Over the last two years, a raft of German labels like International Deejay, Gigolos, Ware, Kitty Yo, Ladomat 2000, Bpitch Control and Kompakt have made electronic music interesting again. "Chicks On Speed, Canadian emigrée Peaches, DJ Hell et al have given dance music a new charisma and Intelligente. They are at ease mixing performance art, fashion and punk attitude. "It has something to do with the genetal approach to life in Europe," says Chicks On Speed's Alex Murray-Leslie. "People are more convinced by a good idea than professional guitar playing."

Producers at underground labels like Bpitch and Kompakt are further refreshing techno with an Irreverent, eclectic vigour, straying far from techno's obsession with 'purity'. "I love to mix styles to find a new sound," enthuses Bpitch head honcho Ellen Allien. "I love to break walls. This is modern art."

Which makes it all the more remarkable that in Germany, such artists regularly interface with the pop world. Tok Tok's 'Missy Queen Is Gonna Die' spent 10 weeks on the German chart, while Chicks On Speed also clambered into the mainstream (just as Muzik predicted they would, back in 2000), with their Top 20 st 'Kaltes Klares Wasser'. "We're ready to take on Top Of The Pops again," warns Alex, "but this time, we will destroy the set." "While the UK frets about what is and isn't cool, Germany is enjoying its freedom." I hate this. Hollywood soundtrack king enlists supporting cast for the performance of a lifetime

Despite the fame and fortune, the last 10 years must have been frustrating for David Holmes, the man who first garnered recognition through uniting his native Belfast under an incongruously lethal techno groove. He's always been cool, no question. Looked cool, said cool things, had cool mates, hung out in the coolest places. Hunkered down in the studio, however, it hasn't gone so smoothly. He's struggled to distil the promise he's shown and his standing in the industry into maxis that live up to the hype; albums that 'matter'. People have been running out of patience, wondering if, while he's got the soundtrack thing locked down, a complete, compelling album was beyond him. And then 'The Free Association' came along.

It begins unpromisingly, with the gloomy, clonking hip hop of 'Don't Rhyme No Mo". But by the time 'I Wish I Had A Wooden Heart' starts up, jumping you with just about as huge a wedge of modern psychedelic soul as anyone's going to hear in '02, it becomes clear that 'The Free Association' has indeed got Holmes out of a rut and into thinking big.

The Free Association, you see, is a band as well as an album, a four-piece headed by vocalists Sean Reveron and Petra Jean Phillipson. The group format allows Holmes to take his music live and, clearly, realise his potential. Its double-barrelled attack combines lush, filmic, retrotinged songwriting with hard, freaky, sleazy, faintly psychotic collages of beats, fractured samples and creeping urban noise. So, one minute you're cruising amid the lazy-as-you-like

rhythms of 'Pushin' A Broom', the next you're hanging on for dear life as 'La Dolce Vita' threatens to destroy your speakers, then you're off floating again aboard the delirious vibrations of a track that's proud to go by the name of 'Paper Underwear'.

Highest marks for fucking up the English language go to 'Free Ass O-C-8', the band's anthem, on which distorted brass roams freely and the seedy, frosty vocals crawl across your skin. And for a stylish album closer, you'd be hard pushed to top the electro-flavoured jazz blues of 'Whistlin' Down The Wind', where Petra Jean Phillipson thrusts her voice into the same strange and beautiful orbit that Billie Holliday once occupied.

So, heading up his new gang, David Holmes has found direction and purpose in an album that manages to be sweet, tender, daft, eccentric, irate, loud, quiet, emotional and steely eyed and chooses the right mood for the right moment. Oh yeah, and to prove that Holmes still has that cool thing under control: this was recorded in just 10 days in the studio at the famous Sunset Marquis Hotel in Hollywood. Now that is cool. **Andy Crysell** ****

With many of their peers watering their music down, full marks to Oxide & Neutrino for sticking to their guns. While others seek to incorporate mainstream r&b flavours, the south London MC and DJ duo have elected to keep their beats and lyrics strictly street on this, their second long-player.

The duo are often bracketed as 'UK garage', but that term doesn't even begin to cover the genremashing mix of sounds they employ, from scratching to jungle basslines to whining synths straight out of the West Coast. This album may lack the obvious Top 10 hits of their debut, but the current single 'Dem Girlz' shows that they are still capable of keeping it gritty but chart-friendly.

Ground' is either a load of drifty old hippy-synth nonsense or soothing, balmy, spacey chill of the highest quality. It's so laid back it can be annoving, but late at night or early in the morning it sounds just perfect. It also works as part of a carefully controlled hangover cure. Elsewhere, cuts like last years 'Rap 2 Dis (U Can't Stop Dis Shit)' and 'Return Of The Supa' demonstrate Oxide & Neutrino can still hold their own against the new wave of underground UK MCs currently tearing up the airwaves.

Like So Solid Crew with 'They Don't Know', Oxide & Neutrino have made the UK equivalent of a US hip hop artist album, providing their young audience with an album of MC-based material and an alternative to just taping stuff off the radio.

Rather than paying stupid money for one-off singles, sooner or later the record companies will have to realise that it's by developing UK MCs to album level that they will one day make more serious money. In the meantime, full marks to Oxide & Neutrino for being '2 Steps' in the right direction. **Tony Farsides**

Astonishingly still alive after a lifetime of excess and self-destruction that makes Iggy Pop look like Richard Whiteley, Suicide are back, looking like corpses and sounding very, very pissed off. Considering that they haven't made a decent album between them since Suicide's second, eponymous album in 1980, we weren't exactly looking forward to this, but parts of 'American Supreme' work very well. Alan Vega blurts and yelps in vintage style over Marty Rev's music, which has evolved into a uniquely disturbing techno/hip hop hybrid, and standout 'Misery Train' is like a 22-year psychic echo of their classic 'Diamonds, Fur Coat, Champagne'. The mysterious Genaside 2's Kris Bones reveals all. Well, a bit, anyway. . .

'RETURN. ..' IS G2'S FIRST ALBUM FOR THREE YEARS. WHAT HAVE YOU BEEN UP TO? Kris: "I've just been in the States, doing stuff with Tricky and Durban Poison, a lot of DJing, ... YOU'VE RELEASED THREE YOU LAZY OR WHAT? Kris: "Well, we've put out shitloads of other albums, but under different names. See, I got fed up with doin' Genaside 2 a while back. I always hated that name - we just used it cos the NME said one of our early things was gonna 'cause the death of music', whatever. So it seemed funny at the time, but I'm 31 now, djuknowotamean?' Especially if you're in the right wine bar, you get chattin', they do a coupla lines, fuckin' whatever. . . the next thing you know they're singin' on your album! Fuckin' simple. ARE YOU OBSESSED WITH STAVING UNDERGROUND? Kris: "When I was on BMG they told me I had to take it more seriously or leave, and that's askin' a lot from me. I'm like 'nah. mate' and so forth. I never

wanted to do the big pop starry thing, so I don't know what I was doing there in the first place. Apart from takin' their money, of course. I mean, I'm only fuckin' human." WHAT'S 'REVOLUTION **REVISED' ABOUT?** Kris: "There ain't no more revolution, djuknowotamean? We've been fuckin' conned and if we protest we get our fuckin' heads kicked in by the old bill. The whole protest thing has been beaten out of us, the cost of living is so high that the thought of gettin' a criminal record for something like that. . . fuck that. It's like you meet someone and they've got arrested at some protest, chucked in jail and they've lost their job, so they're homeless. And I'm like 'remind me what it was you were protesting about? Tibet? Oh that's nice. And you're homeless now? Okay'."

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GROOVE ARMADA

A speedy follow-up to 'Goodbye Country, Hello Nightclub' sees the Armada heading for rockier shores

roove Armada have spent much of their highly successful career trying to escape the pigeonhole that their chill out classic 'At The River' put them in. The interestingly titled 'Lovebox' sees them motorbiking over the barbed wire with aplomb.

Featuring guest appearances from the notquite-premier-division likes of Sunshine Anderson, Neneh Cherry and soul survivor Richie Havens, it seems as if the freakishly height-mismatched duo's intensive touring schedule has moulded their sound

into a rockier, stockier

beast. But this has been achieved without sacrificing any of their radio-friendliness.

There are plenty of ampedup electric guitars pumping through the likes of 'Purple Haze' (not a Jimi Hendrix cover, we're glad to say), 'The Groove Is On' and 'Madder' as guest rappers like Red Rat, MC MAD and the Jigmastas' Kriminul battle against the Armada's bombastic boogie.

'The Final Shakedown' pits the lyricists against a filterdisco house outing in another attempt to ensure that the Armada experience works on dancefloors as well as chill out lounges and Drivetime FM. Likewise, 'Be Careful What You Say' approaches tech-house territory, while the Sunshine Anderson-vocalled 'Easy' marries disco strings to a warped, analogue bassline for a full-on big room moment, before the bassy break-house of the title cut and the kitsch bump 'n' roll of 'But I Feel Good' ensure that there's plenty of uptempo action all round.

That's not to say that it's all party-starting stuff: 'Remember', 'Think Twice' and in particular the Richie Havens number 'Hands Of Time' all demonstrate that their ability to knock out languid ballads is undiminished. So although no one could class 'Lovebox as anything other than a mainstream pop-dance album, it's a decent attempt to marry club sensibilities to commercial concerns nonetheless. **Cal Gibson**

Proving that house music is a serious business, Tom 'Superchumbo' Stephan DJs at south London loony hole Crash wearing the look of a man contemplating Gordon Brown's six tests for entry to the ERM. It's this rigour, founded

perhaps on a childhood love of leather pantswearing sturm und drang stormtroopers Nitzer Ebb, that makes this remix retrospective both a pleasure and a chore.

A pleasure because the best work here – the whiplash syn-percussion of Love Tattoo's 'Drop Some Drums' and Basement Jaxx's 'Get Me Off', for instance – jacks along like a big, camp choo-choo train. Stephan on a good day marries industrial synth strafing to NYC tribal better than practically anyone else.

A chore because his fixation with the groove occasionally leaves his work dancefloor-functional and cold, making a whole album's worth seem repetitive. And because his re-lick of Tenaglia's version of Front 242's 'Headhunter' is just plain rubbish.

So what's the verdict then on this yin and yang album? An unmixed version on vinyl would be a must for any serious house DJ. There are eight tracks here that are as good as tribal house gets. The omission of Tom's remix of 'Get Ur Freak On' is a bummer. Any future artist album will have to be more varied. That is all. **Duncan Bell**

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TRASH COMPANION #1 (Palare/End Recordings)

Trash is The Strokes' favourite club, and Trash resident and compiler of this compilation Erol Alkan has not one, but three Batman T-shirts. But don't let that prevent you from checking out this, the first Trash compilation.

Alkan has to get drunk before any gig cos he gets so darn nervous, and you'd have to get very drunk before dancing to the selection of live recordings on the unmixed 'Part One' of this album. Peaches rocks out, Gonzales dabbles with audience participation as sadism, and Moldy Peaches get all mock coy on the charming/ sick-making (delete according to your level of cynicism) 'Anyone Else But You'. Overall, 'Part One' shows a side of Erol that's overly enamoured with the work of Courtney Love and Kitty Yo. We're sure he'll get over it soon.

On 'Part Two' however, he really excels. Kylie's classic 'Confide In Me' is resplendent in its full sixminute glory (why on earth did Deconstruction drop her?) and Duran Duran's 'My Own Way' is a reminder of why we can still smile at Le Bon prancing around at Pacha. We can take or leave The Slits and Huggy Bear but Felix Da Housecat precedes them, so we're happy to put up with them on this occasion.

As a whole, 'Trash Companion #1' may feel like an idea only three quarters formed, but that only means Erol's next mix will be greeted with even greater anticipation. **Ralph Moore**





BIG BEACH BOUTIQUE 2 (Southern Fried)

n a year marked by club closures, poor sales and bleak forecasts for the future, few events put a bigger smile on dance music's face than Brighton's Big Beach Boutique, aka Normstock. In true acid house style, this year it found itself splashed across the front pages of the nation's tabloids. The Outrage! The Horror! Nah, fuck that. The Fucking Great Time, more like. Here's a perfect memento of that day, complete with background cheers and security advising you to leave safely. The sound of Fatboy Slim and Midfield General giving it some to 250,000 disparate revellers, jam-packed on Brighton beach as the UV rays melted their heads and the tunes did likewise to their ears.

A comp containing Mint Royale's 'Sexiest Man In Jamaica', X-Press 2's 'Lazy' (an exclusive mix from Norm), Camisra's 'Let Me Show You' and Groove Armada's 'Superstylin'' might not warm the cockles of clubland's more specialist sorts but that, of course, was never the point. This is dance music for the people, taking in everything from the fizzing groove of Lo Fidelity Allstars' 'Tied To The Mast' to Cook's accomplished rejig of All Saints' 'Pure Shores'.

In short, it's a stellar snapshot of a great summer moment in dance music. And even better, this CD doesn't expect you to hang around at Brighton Station once it's finished. Andy Crysell

(Industry) What's It all about? Confused by the ambiguous title? Pay attention, now. This is the second of React subsidiary Industry's comprehensive, three-disc, yours-for-a-tenner mixes. Of drum & bass. From the 21st Century.

What's on it? Cause4Concern's set sticks closest to the spirit of the first instalment, namely dark, sneery, hot rod-naced ghost train themes. But it's the two bass-laced mixes from label bosses Chris Industry and Killa B (think High Contrast, Carlito & Addiction, Influx Datum and Calibre) that really get with the iungle zeitgeist.

Any cop then? Aficionados will find a fair few of these tracks in their boxes already, but as a low-cost, highly discerning snapshot of the current scene, this can't be bettered. (ND)



CARL CRAIG **The Workout** (React)

What's It all about? The Detroit legend mixes up two CDs of cutting edge tech-soul in his inimitable style. What's on it? Deep house, techno and electro(clash) from the likes of Recloose, Anthony Shakir, Gus Gus, Adult. and Bugge Wesseltoft. There's a smattering of Craig exclusives too, including the burbling 'Experimento' and his rewiring of Bill Laswell and Jah Wobble's 'Alsema Dub'.

Any cop then? If all techno producers possessed one tenth of Craig's musical knowledge and mixing intuition, the genre would be in a far healthier state than it currently is. 'The Workout' is a wide-ranging demonstration of the art of the DJ. (CG) * * * *

This features a funky, incessant groove, a rolling bassline and the vocals of Marcel and Kimra, adding up to a real treat of a tune: dirty, tracky and more than a bit sexy - just like old Kenny. Well, at least the dirty and tracky bit. (TF) ***

DEEP SENSATION Stay A While (Junior)

Fans of Colin Gate and Paul Hunter's jazzier creations should look to their wonderful 'Broadway And 52nd Street' seven-inch for their latest hit. Those looking for some Saturday night distraction should drop a needle on this latest release from Junior, which boasts big room beats, swirling synth lines and a vocal hook to leave 'em singing all the way to the record store. (KM) ****

VARIOUS ARTISTS Loaded Fine House Music Volume 2 (Loaded)

There are two reasons to buy this twelve from Loaded - Ashlev Beedle and Erot. Beedle provides a string-soaked, disco-influenced workout while Erot leaves us another timeless cut with Annie. Smoky beats, warped bass and disco claps don't even begin to describe the backing, while Annie's song is vintage pop. Don't miss out. (KM) ****

KEINZLE & IBERLE Touch Me (white label, Germany)

This is prime-time weekend entertainment from southern Germany, in the same vein as lan Pooley and Magik J's recent NRK outing. Unashamed disco filter romping. (KM) * * * *

This Time (Remixes) (8th Dimension, US)

You can sometimes miss out on Naked Music songstress Lisa Shaw's really great songs because she performs on so many records, but this team-up with Michael Donaldson is a real killer. The 'Rivera Rotation' mix is a smooth, Rhodes-fuelled excursion guaranteed to up the female male ratio on your dancefloor. (KM) * * * *

PLANT Oil And Steel (Plant Seed)

Off-kilter beats, old school basslines and quirky keyboard lines are the order of the day on this twelve from Marcus and Dominque. So if Mr Fingers' early Trax output (with some added boom-tish) sounds like fun, this is the record for you. (KM) * * *

BERNARD LEON **HOWARD III FEATURING 80** Mascarter (Shinichi, US)

A typically well crafted, tech-edged slice of house from the Deep Dish stable. Already featured on Satoshi Tomiie's Global Underground mix, it works best in 'Debo And Porter's Deported Vocal' (for the techheads) and 'Joshua's Dub' (for the more organically minded). (KM) * * * *

MOTON 18 Summer Gone (Moton)

This, apparently, is a re-edit of an unreleased deep houser from around 1995. Moody pads and basslines provide a classic MDMA sofa moment, and it's flipped with a couple of further strange, long lost classics. This is hot in more ways than one. Ask for it under the counter along with your monthly copy of Mature Babes. (TF) * * *

SEAN DIMITRIES Searching For Venus (Peak)

Out of Vancouver, this is a wonderful EP, packed with soul. A couple of way-cool jazzy grooves are balanced by a pair of house tunes, with the outstanding pick being 'House Without A Home'. where a sensual female vocal sits perfectly on an acidic groove. A must-have house head record. (TF) * * * *

KERRI KAOZ

Trionisphere IV (King Street) Lovers of real/soulful/proper house - or whatever we're calling it this week (I prefer 'modern soul' myself) - have always kept a special place for the man Kerri Chandler, a purveyor of heavy drums and hand-raising moments. 'My Paradise' is atmospheric, deep, New York house that's just right for skinning up next to a speaker to, while 'Nigerian Travels' is a great horn-driven trip through Afro-beat territory. As usual, the drum programming is ridiculously funky and rockin'. Hot. (TF) ****

MARTY THOMAS Thank You/Power Of Love (West End)

This Blaze reworking is the first fruit from a planned double album of remixes of West End's Seventies classics. The 'Blaze Shelter Mix' is a typically spiritually uplifting moment that works so well with the evergreen vocals, you'd think they actually did this in the studio together! Hopefully the new DJs on Radio 1 such as Yousef and Lottie will start to get behind more soulful house such as this. It's a great radio record and deserves not to remain a purists' secret. (TF) * * * *

KING BRITT PRESENTS OBA FUNKE Uzoamaka (Karma Giraffe)

If you're done with Britt's mix of Josh One's 'Contemplation' and it's left a gaping hole in your record box, look no further than the 'Scuba' mix on this release from Karma Giraffe. It's not quite as 'big tuuunah' as 'Contemplation', but a tempting addition to Britt's remixography all the same. (KM) * * * *

KASKADE The Gift EP (Jamayka **Recordings**)

While the superclubs/superclub mags twiddle their thumbs. something is happening among the grass roots followers of real house. Clubs such as Secret Sunday. Sunday Sonic and the ITK parties are pushing a more organic, soulful vibe - and this beauty of an EP is a mainstay on the scene. This is a jackin' late night track with real horns, basslines, tribal drums that don't remind you of that k-hole and snatches of sultry vocals. A great introduction to what's hot among the new urban house heads. (TF) * * *

CUBA COMPUTERS

Haunting Me (Shinichi, US) This is more haunting, driving vocal electronics from Yoshitoshi's deeper offshoot. Best served in the 'Chus & Ceballos Iberican Vocal'. (KM) * * *

KINDRED The Family Of Soul / **Rhythm Of Life (Hidden** Beach Recordings)

Just read a piece in a rival mag where Nick Warren (nice fella!) talked about how he didn't like singers such as Robert Owens. "Too soulful" was his comment - but isn't that the point of house music? Real house is just uptempo soul music after all, and this is about as soulful as it gets. Produced by Elise Perry and remixed by King Britt. 'Rhythm Of Life' features a fine collection of voices, led by Fatin Dantzler and Aja Graydon, If this doesn't further blur the lines between modern soul and US garage, then my name's not Richard Searling. . . CHRIS LUM Feeling High (Thinking Of You)/You're Mine (Hooj)

ESTABLISHED: In 1995, by Windy City freak Derrick Carter and tousle-haired founding father of the legendary Space night, Luke Solomon. Now operating out of both Chicago and London. **MISSION STATEMENT: "If there's one** underlying purpose to Classic," says label manager Leon Oakey, "it's just to put out some bad-ass records, really. Oh, and to bring down the government as well. Luke and Derrick don't want to release records that pander to the zeitgeist. They just want to put out tracks you can return to in five years' time and still play them out."

HEROES: "Jesus. . . [long pause], everything from Stevie Wonder to Prescription Records, musically. I don't bloody know. I suppose people like Ron Hardy, too. . .

FIRST BIG TUNE: "It built up over a period of about 10 releases. There was 'Classic Herbert', by erm, Herbert, which was our biggest seller up to that point (1996), and then it went Blaze's 'Lovelee Dae',

then DJ Sneak's 'You Can't Hide From Your Bud' (1997). That was like, 'fucking hell, what are we doing here? Why are we selling so many records?'" BIGGEST ARTIST ALBUM: "Derrick's 'Squaredancing In A Round House'. That's the one everybody's been waiting for, and because it's Derrick's label it's seen as his big thing, It's fantastic, really diverse. It showcases his artistic ability so well. He's such an incredibly talented person."

KEY COMPILATION: "'Sounds You Can Feel' mixed by Doc Martin. It sold millions of copies [This is perhaps a slight exaggeration - Ed.]. It's because Doc is so big in America and across Asia. It's done really really well for us." IN THE PIPELINE: "There's a new single coming up from Isolée, and Tiefschwarz are releasing 'Never' with Beloved remixes. In terms of albums, there's a Greenskeepers one, Rob Mello's artist album, a DJ Sneak mix CD, a Rob Mello mix CD and a Home & Garden artist album, which is really good."

GLASGOW UNDERGROUND

ESTABLISHED: By Muzik's Kevin McKay in 1997, initially to reflect the extraordinarily vibrant and mature house scene north of the border. GU quickly established itself as a label of international repute with its dancefloor-slaying twelves and post-club albums.

MISSION STATEMENT: "We try not to do anything too cliched," explains Kevin. "Interesting, innovative 12inches in a house template is what we're about. We used to do straight-up house albums, but over the past two years we've been mixing it up more." HEROES: "In terms of record labels, what Warp has done is pretty much how to run an independent label." FIRST BIG TUNE: "A record that me and Omid 16B did under the name Sixteen Souls called 'Late Night Jam'. It was the third one we put out and people really went for that. All the DJs I admired at the time, from Jim Boyd to Andy Weatherall, were playing it." BIGGEST ARTIST ALBUM: "DJ Q's 'Music As We Know It'. It's his first

album for us. He got really well known at the same time as DJ Sneak, when that kind of cut-up disco was coming to the fore. He did a record called 'We Are One', that had softly spoken Scottish poetry over the beginning with filtered disco loops and Detroit keyboards over it which was an Essential New Tune as well as getting quite a lot of respect from people like Carl Craig."

KEY COMPILATION: "Glasgow Underground Volume 5' is the one that particularly details what we're all about. It's a mix of chilled tunes and dancefloor stuff."

IN THE PIPELINE: "In terms of 12-inches, there's a Mateo & Matos limited edition album promo out shortly. At the end of October we've got GU100, which is our 100th single, strangely enough. There's various people on there from Romanthony and Jersey Street to Groove Assassins, all remixing other people on the label, and a few unreleased things, too."



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LOADED



ESTABLISHED: By DJs-turned-clubpromoters Tim Jeffery and JC Reid, in Brighton, in 1990. Brighton may be Hoxton-On-Sea now, but at the time it was still grotesquely unfashionable. Loaded lost out in the publicity stakes to its ill-behaved sister label Skint for many years. but a decade on, it's now as de rigeur as Rub Yourself Levi's. **MISSION STATEMENT:** Label head Andy Mac explains that, when not functioning as an unofficial Brighton And Hove Albion supporters' club, Loaded is all about "championing cutting edge music, house music all night long, er. . . oh all right just a cheeky half then. Viva acid house!" HEROES: Somewhat predictably, Bobby Zamora (Brighton's 22 year-old top scorer two seasons running, better than most strikers in the premiership, etc), as well as "The Zap Club circa 1989, the Sound

Tom's productions over the past couple of years have set the standards for others to follow and he's become one of the most respected producers and remixers in the world. The quintessential house producer, he's able to create powerful pure club music which is at the same time accessible and has appeal way beyond the dancefloor." IN THE PIPELINE: "Loads more artists with the prefix 'Super'. Top house tunes from Kidstuff,

Mr G, 16th Element. Laid are starting work on their debut album plus we hope to be working with James Holden very soon. Just you try and pigeonhole us. . ."

ESTABLISHED: Initially as a DJ management firm by Bristolians Nick Harris and Redg Weeks, NRK has since evolved into perhaps the label most responsible for pleasuring the UK's aural palettes with the West Coast delights of Miguel Migs and H-Foundation, among others.

MISSION STATEMENT: "I guess our actual goal is to really keep house music forward thinking and not try and be too clever or set trends," explains label manager Redg. "Just to really keep house music on track. As long as it's got that edge to it we like, that's what we look for. Something with a bit of feeling."

HEROES: "My true heroes aren't just house pioneers. They include people like Stewart Copeland (The Police), Billy Corgan (Smashing Pumpkins) and Glen Danzig (The Misfits). For dance music I have a lot of respect for people I consider innovators, like Farley & Heller, Joey Negro, Jon Acquaviva, Global Communications, Claudio Coccoluto, Warp Records and early Strictly Rhythm."

FIRST BIG TUNE: "Number two, Nick Holder's 'Paradise'. We were pretty inexperienced at the time and the

week after we sent it out we had single of the week in Mixmag Update. It wasn't until NRK25 onwards that we really started to reap the benefits of the label though."

KEY ARTIST ALBUM: "It would have to be Nick Holder's 'From Within' from 1999. It's full of really good home listening tracks as well as some really great club tracks, and it was an album that crossed the boundary between being a straight-up DJ album, to something you're more likely to find on Wall Of Sound or Warp.' KEY COMPILATION: "Gotta be careful

on this one. . . people still chasing royalties. But it was lan Pooley's 'Nite:Life'. It was a very underground mix, which really proves that our ethos stands. We want to let the DJs play an underground set.'

IN THE PIPELINE: "There's a big lan Pooley record coming on Honchos called 'Piha'. The next 'Nite:Life', by Danny Krivit. Then there's a Lexicon Avenue 'Nite:Life' CD of underground tech-house. Good singles from Q-Burn's Abstract Message, with mixes from Joey Negro and King Britt. And the third Nick Holder album is due next year."

JOSH GABRIEL Wave 3 (Nebula)

ebula single of the month? That can't be right - can it? Well, let me tell you it is right. In fact, nothing else even came close. Put simply, 'Wave 3' is one of the tunes of 2002 and if you don't know it yet, you soon will because this is yet another example of the simplicity of great house music. You don't need much when what you've got is this good - the riff couldn't get much simpler and couldn't be much greater. The track

romps along into a bonkers swirling effect,

then the filters open up and we're off again - genius! To get us progressive fans going even more, Nebula have even commissioned Sasha cohort Charlie May to create two new mixes. What's the point in going on? If you've any sense, you'll have bought it already. . . ****

KELLY D Moonburn (Pure)

Following the juicy 'Tribalism' release comes 'Moonburn', which once again leaves you pondering which of the mixes, across two twelves, to play. The first carries mixes from Krome Avenue and Mats Versus Hardware that are cool and uppy and techy and percussive respectively. It's Kelly's mixes on the second twelve that really do the damage though bottom end power, mental effect and a tantalising melody just to finish you off. ****

REDANKA **Out Of The Dark Remixes** (Whoop!)

The melodic original gets the remix treatment from Maurice and Situation2. The Maurice mix is a funky electro take, full of quirky electronica madness, a cool funky

rhythm and gritty bass. It's got old school attitude, but modern, polished production. For some reason the promo didn't have the other mix on it so unfortunately I can't comment, but Situation2 are yet to fail, so fingers crossed. * * * *

BERNARD LEON **HOWARD III FEATURING 80**

Marscarter (Shinichi) This continues with the Kosheen, 'Hide U' style that everyone and his dog seems to be on at the moment. But while many of the pretenders come nowhere near that classic, this - in its 'Morel Pink Noise' form - certainly does, mixing as it does interesting percussive moments and a funky live sounding bass guitar and 'Eighties' vocal, reminiscent of Funky Green Dogs' 'Release Me'. * * * *

THOMAS PENTON

Dirty Sanchez (white label) As you may expect from Penton, this is edged with very heavy techno influences. But where sometimes the techiness overpowers the progressive elements and the groove is the main part to latch on to, 'Dirty Sanchez' is distinctly different. Solid breaks, crazy riffs and grinding stabs take both mixes of this little monster to a new and dizzy heights. Are you brave enough to drop it though? [It's named after something really nasty too - Sexual Positions Ed.1 ****

BOMBDOGS Dum De Dum (white label)

This is the second release I have had from these guys and both of them have been quite exceptional records. This has a fantastically emotional keyboard line to thank for its success. Think Cosmos meets Stardust and you won't be too far wide of the mark - this is an anthem that will be around for many moons.

SIMON NOBLE PRESENTS REDBAK Closing In (Sunkissed)

More progressive-based brilliance from the Sunkissed guys. It's wonderfully laden with great sounds and chunky, subsonic bass in its original form and - as per usual -Powerplant deliver an exquisite trademark masterpiece for the remix. Whichever mix floats your boat, this is a winning package, mark my words. ****

MEZO

Superconscious (Source Of Gravity)

Get ready - this is by far the biggest release yet for Source Of Gravity, thanks to the awesome talents of Justin Scott Dixon (Voyager) and Chris Hand, Oozing that bizarre, out of this world Voyager style, this has a massive riff reminiscent of 'Xpander', and the usual, rock-hard, pounding drums. Boy this leaves you breathless! Sure to be huge. ****

HAMISH Life Song (Global **Recordings**)

One of the lesser known and less prolific of the Australian labels is back with a rather great piece. It's got deep pads, but also a punchy, driving kick that makes it more apt mid-set rather than for the warm up. A simple, well made release that won't blow the roof off, but will hold the floor while you select a record to follow that will. ****

HEADSTATE Missing (Teknology)

More deep, dirty and devastating house from Teknology. Very groovebased, which ain't no bad thing, with techy grit, growling bass end, and a light sprinkling of vocals and explosive, crashing FX. Again, more of a mid-set filler than a warm up. Swain & Snell remix. ****

21ST CENTURY FUX Night (Saw Recordings)

The latest release from the superb Saw brings together three of our favourites - Austin Leedz, Martin Accorsi and the new boy Luke Chable. 'Night' is a rather special release, relatively dark, techy and twisted, with a distinctly deeper, progressive feel. 'Thinking Of You' on Am I On Your Mind (Switch) the flip is also well worth a check. ***

FLIMPLAST Istanbul (Hope)

Remy, back on form provides the standout mix here. Those unique Dutch rhythms combine with a simple enough building groove, with the all-important Remy magic sprinkled all over. A real dancefloor tune. The 'April Sun' mix on the B-side brings out the old 303 for some tasty, acidic madness. ****

ANDY PAGE & BABS **Oblivia Newton Bomb** (Thunk)

Page and Thunk: a match made in Heaven! Page is one of the most innovative and exciting producers (he's previously worked with Sasha), while Thunk, although at times too far out and erratic, are on the whole an intensely ground

Funky rhythms - very funky rhythms and a Funk D'Void-style melody, ethnic chants and an all-important, hidden energy. Simple really! ****

KING UNIQUE Sugarhigh (Junior)

It's another of those house-cumtechno-cum-progressive releases that could equally be reviewed in any of those sections. King Unique are on one hell of a roll at present - be it original works or remixes they knock the socks off the rest. Incessant, plucky Funk D'Void-style melodies (again!) and chord structure build perfectly. This is an absolute joy to play. ****

OXYGEN

D Ramirez here gets everything right, after a string of strong but not mind-blowing mixes. This is a simply stunning mix of a track that should become a huge crossover hit, thanks to its trancier lan Van Dahl and Lustral mixes. Solid, driving progressive grooves with more than enough lift to give it excitement on the dancefloor. Hunt out the limited dub mixes - they're never to be fully released. ****

SMITH & LAVELLE Legend (POD)

Just as everyone turns their back on all that is dark comes a record that will get everyone running back in again. 'Legend' is not as sinister as it could be - it's dark, but with a wry smile and plenty of fun lurking beneath its hardened exterior. As with all POD releases, more than a passing glance must be given. ***

ULTRACOLOR Eventful (Scandium, France)

echno may have started in towns like Detroit, Berlin and Sheffield, but in the last 10 years its focal point has shifted continuously. For the last two or three years, the south of France has been arguably the epicentre of the genre. And even though Nimbus Ultracolor doesn't yet have the same kind of status as Grenoble's The Hacker, Oxia or Kiko, 'Eventful' certainly suggests that situation may soon change. Built around a truly emotive string line

BLACK OPS B Rave Volume 2 (B Rave)

The second release in a series that allows some of the world's most famous jocks to go through their old rave-era techno records and mercilessly sample the fuck out of them. Anonymously. This time round whoever is doing the pilfering obviously has a soft spot for Baxter, Atkins, May and Saunderson and the result is a lot like listening to Colins Dale and Faver at Knowledge in 1991. (DM)

RUSS GABRIEL Flip Down To Break (Emoticon)

The Ferox man returns with yet more razor-sharp funk, liquefied by warm analogue sounds and a bass funk hook so beefy you could make it into burgers. It's the details – the little flourishes and tweaks – that breathe an organic



some seriously driving rhythms and a killer arrangement, this is a proper end-of-night techno anthem. Add to that an equally strong, Carl Craig-esque remix by The Youngsters and you've got one of this year's best techno records. Tres bien! (DM)

life into Gabriel's work. Joining the dots between new styles of broken beat programming, Herbie Hancock and abstract techno, Russ flips a big one to all those who ever doubted. Genius. (JS)

PERCY X/ ACTIVE SERVICE UNIT Wrong Way Round/ Zavtoon (Dublon)

A release that gets the new collaborative label between Dublin's D1 and London's Pure Plastic (Dublon – geddit?) off to a flyer. Tony Scott (aka Percy X) serves up a nitro-injected, Derrick Maystyle, string-laden anthem, then hands the baton over to Mr Service Unit, who whips in a wonderful fusion of home listening pads and chords over a robust dancefloor groove. Solid foundations for the new Anglo-Irish Alliance. (JS)

METALDOGZ Wish On (Rescue)

Terry Francis and buddy Danny M get this new label off to a fine start with two typically dark tech-house grooves. The title track revolves around some ominous, almost gothic-sounding strings, while the flipside is a more rolling, bass-led track with lots of toms and Latin percussion. Good start. (DM)

KAO Above And Beyond (Earisistible)

Earisistible, eh? Is this the most appallingly named label in techno, ever? Never mind, the music's good and this is their best for a while. The Valentino Kanzyani mix stands out – he's used a lot of the original sounds but improved the track no end. Deep, funky, string-led Euro-techno doesn't come much better. (DM)

FLOPPY SOUNDS Remixes (Wave, USA)

When you see the words 'Floppy Sounds', 'Remix' and 'Carl Craig' next to each other on a record, you know you're in for a bit of a treat and this does not disappoint. In fact it's classic Craig stuff with big strings, mad, off-kilter sounds and the fattest, funkiest snares outside of a Timbaland production. Ace. (DM)

GRANT DELL & RICHARD PHONEMAN Sub-Strata (Macumba, USA)

The first release on a new Californian label sees Tribalation's Grant Dell and newcomer Richard Phoneman let rip with some full-on tech-house vibes. A million miles from the dull, plodding, formulaic nonsense that gives the genre a bad name, this is tech-house with feeling and loads of energy. (DM)

TONY THOMAS Tight Rope (Soma)

With a style that lies somewhere between tribal, progressive and tech-house, Tony Thomas has been well placed to capitalise on the last couple of years of genreblurring. And quite right too, seeing as his bassy, percussive loops are at least partly responsible for this more open-minded approach coming to the fore in the first place. Funkytribaltechfunk – it's the new style. **(DM)**

SPACE DJZ Faces Of Pain EP (Tortured)

Further proof that when it comes to making big room, 'avin' it techno, the Space boys do it better. The Detroit influence still looms large, but equally noticeable, particularly when it comes to the arrangements, is the duo's hip hop obsession. The tracks constantly shift around and drop in and out and one of the cuts even features a straight out, b-boystyle lift from Earth Wind & Fire's 'Let's Groove.' (DM)

VARIOUS ARTISTS Broken Branch EP (Pyramid Transmissions)

Three-track EP that's a must for anyone into the deeper, more reflective side of electronica. Ranging from to atmospheric UR style techno to super-dark electro, the EP's highlight is ADJ's Delsin meets Black Dog broken beats track 'Take A Step'. (DM)

MODEL 600

Magic Juan returns with an upgraded model of the nom de plume under which he defined the futuristic sound of techno. More importantly, 'Update' sees him back at the production pinnacle that put the 500 series on the winning podium with Kraftwerk and George Clinton, Warm, analogue electro bass, a hefty helping of funk and Juan's own vocodered voice reshape his futuristic vision, and with a more bumping UR mix on the flip, 'Update' stands comparison with classics like 'No UFOs'. (JS) ****

JAY TRIPWIRE Denver Diner EP (Household, USA)

Jay Tripwire is the man right now in tech-house circles. Go to any techhouse bash anywhere in the world and you're guaranteed to hear a load of his tracks through the course of the night. For my money though, this is his best effort since his last Tango release. Bassline of the month! (DM)

UR

Analog Assassin (Underground Resistance)

The fat bass and chord stabs of UR's latest, aptly named dancefloor killer exist somewhere between the worlds of house, techno and electro. The unmistakable drum programming, dark, sinister sounds and funk-infected groove stealthily creep up before delivering a fatal body blow. Not as instant or anthemic as the recently unleashed 'Inspiration'/Transition' but still an essential weapon in any DJ assault box. Vive la Resistance! (JS)

HERWEIJER

Feeling Cool EP (Filthy Gold) No idea who this Herweijer fellow is but he certainly gets my vote. After all, anybody with the balls, suss and ability to combine funky, percussive tech-house beats with classic Detroit strings and sped-up r&b vocals has to be some kind of a genius. Okay, that's an exaggeration, but this really is a wonderfully refreshing record. Like Derrick May and DJ Buck playing Twice As Nice. (DM)

COMMUNITY RECORDINGS Mountain Nights (Totem Music, Canada)

Back in the early Nineties, Plus 8 released 'The Wipe' by Teste, one of the trippiest records ever made. Weatherall loved it, Eddie Richards finished his sets with it and everyone from Richie Hawtin to Sasha spanked the fuck out of it. This sounds an awful fot like said record and is certainly the next best thing for those searching for a truly spaced-out set finale. (DM)

STATE OF THE ARTIST D'ARCANGELO Rome's Marco and Fabrizio, the men behind one of the year's most emotive techno albums, tell us why they

hate techno. . .



WHAT'S ROME'S ELECTRONIC SCENE LIKE? "It's a bit samey, although there are labels – Nature; for instance – that are still producing good stuff." YOUR MUSIC HAS CHANGED A LOT OVER THE YEARS. WOULD YOU STILL DESCRIBE WHAT YOU DO AS TECHNO? "We couldn't possibly describe what we do as techno, a term now used to talk about

electronic dance music by people who haven't got the slightest idea what they're on about! Techno means very little to us these days, the term's been so badly abused." YOUR NEW ALBUM IS ALL BREAKBEAT DRIVEN. DO YOU LISTEN TO A LOT OF HIP HOP AND DRUM & BASS? "We do indeed. We're fascinated by it, though we know we aren't really part of it." VITAL RELEASE SECTIONED

TEKKIE Lost In Space (Sectioned)

ots of people will be losing it to this hairwhitening hard trance track from Tekkie. Tekkie is Blutonium Boy (of Blutonium Records), who is Dirk Adamiak, and this track is amazing. thanks to 25 year-old Daniel Roe. Based in Cambridge and resident at Logic at the Fridge in Brixton, Daniel was summoned to remix Dirk's, sorry Tekkie's, original mix. His interpretation is outstanding, with the evil vocoder voice

sounding phenomenal through a big system.

VINCENT STORMFIELD Sweet Harmony (Independiente)

Vincent's mum was a singer in the Asian community, so it's little surprise that he became a trance producer [Are you sure? - Ed.]. Vinny aims squarely for a hard hitting dance floor mangle-fest, while JamX & De Leon add their usual production flair. ***

IAN VAN DAHL Try (NuLife)

I reached for my cheese helmet before listening to 'Try', but half way through I smiled, before carefully placing it back into the fridge. What? No cheese helmet?! Indeed. Although several of the mixes on offer are Stilton-y, the Alphazone mix, followed by Rob Searle's version, are excellent and worthy of a place in any trance DJ's box. ***

Daniel - the spawny bastard - is currently on a two month tour of Australia DJing, and hopes to get a walk on part in Son Of Skippy. If you don't think this tune is as good as I do, then I suggest you sell your house and become a monkey smuggler. * * * *

PETE GAWTRY Remorse (Tune Inn)

Casually dropping his trousers, a cunningly concealed record box pops open in Pete Gawtry's bionic leg. "I don't really like to talk about my leg, but man, it's totally wicked and I just love it!" he says. Hardy & Heller and DJ Remy compete admirably with two cracking remixes. ***

NATHAN PROFITT Acceleration (Moonshine Blue)

US based Moonshine split into several sub labels last year, and Moonshine Blue - encouraged, perhaps by the blossoming dance scene across the whole of America - continues to release exciting and innovative music. The latest venture, with the rather biblicalsounding Nathan Profitt, will surely be another trance-smasher in the States. I don't think he's in it for the money though! * * *

TOKYO Rise (Drizzly)

There's no getting away from it: the ladies just love girly vocal trance. When a big vocal monster blasts out in the club, a wall of attractive PVC and Lycra-clad flesh rushes to the dancefloor. 'Rise' will definitely become one of those musical magnets, causing the male population to surge after the females, as we always do! * * *

THREE KINGS Tokyo/Vancouver (Overdose)

Trance always seems to be the target of the style elite: "Hey, let's rubbish trance because we haven't had an award or a shag for weeks!" But how quickly they change their minds when trance becomes financially attractive. Big rigid donkey's cock to that malarkey! Trance is brilliant. Oh, this is mint! ****

NÜW IDOL & SOL RAY **Temple Of Sound** (WellWicked)

WellWicked's energetically prolific dance producer Michel Spiegel allies himself with E-Traxx's Sol Ray for a numning trance combination that is far from run of the mill. In an effort to capture an underground vibe that has commercial appeal. they have ended up with an intense, forceful soundscape. Immediately flip to the 'Stadium Mix', which really should have been the main mix. ***

CORDEROY

Sweetest Dreams (Relative) Amidst the mountain of CD-Rs he receives, Graham Gold happened upon a showreel from Greg Murray. After limited initial interest, a couple of Kicking Cuts plays on his Kiss show and a bit of gut instinct, Graham decided to release the track with his son Ben, on newly formed Relative Records. This has promise. ***

CRW PRESENTS VERONIKA Precious Life (BXR UK)

Slipping into his more 'commercial' guise, everyone's favourite bonecrunching techno fiend, Mauro 'I appear to be playing everywhere simultaneously' Picotto once again

delves deep into his bag of audio tricks, and comes up with a big, gooey handful of pumping club music sweeties. Lost Witness, RAF, Mark Richardson, llogik and Pro FX are the remixers chosen to do Mauro's bidding. Kneel, you filthy dogs, or it's another 50 lashes! ****

ABOVE & BEYOND Far From In Love (Anjunabeats)

Jono Grant, Tony McGuiness and Paavo Silijamäki (try saving that after 15 vodkas and half a tin of gas!) must have an army of cloned slaves at their disposal; it is the only logical explanation of how they can be producing so much material as Dirt Devils, Ocean Lab, Tranguillity Base and A&B. Now we know the earth shattering conspiracy! Anyway, this is a jolly vocal number, so enjoy! * * *

FALLOUT BOY **Hallucination Generation** (Bulletproof)

Bulletproof has really started to kick out some amazing music and make a lot of DJs and bigger labels take notice. The UK stable is now home to some of the most ultrahard trance available, and 'Hallucination Generation' has an Überdruck remix, so you just know your skull is going to be smashed to bits, in a good way. Awesome. ****

FRED NUMF **Universal Rhythm (Fred** Numf Productions)

Fred's putting himself about these days; he seems to be popping up in toasters everywhere. Hong Kong, Hungary, Brazil, Sweden, and a secret Martian colony on the dark side of the Moon have all seen Fred play his unique style of, and I quote, 'futuristic funky progressive tribal housey retro electro funk pop'. Now, we can all sleep easy, knowing exactly what Fred is all about. Check the 'Night Mix'. * * * *

DAVE JOY

Second Chase (Planet Traxx) The impression left by 'First

Impression' was certainly felt by the clubbing masses, as the debut

single from Dave Joy was belted out across the UK's finest clubs. With his distinct brand of techno trance, throbbing with life and dark energy. Dave triumphantly returns with 'Second Chase'. Kaylab Versus Reeloop make a formidable remix, but darlings of the moment, Alphazone, steal the show with a remix that will leave you breathless. ****

TONY TRAN VERSUS **PIERRE KNOTT** Enjoy (Blutonium)

Do not let the seemingly vague artist title put you off this fantastic German trancer, 'Enjoy' is aptly named. Once again, good old Blutonium strikes into the very heart of dance music with a credible track that will not just take the roof off, it will neatly stack the bricks into several pallets and rearrange the double glazing! Blutonium Boy, Norman DJ and DJ Virus are on call for banging remixes.

* * * *

TOM HARDING & CHRIS HAMPSHIRE

We're Back (Recover) There's no set formula to the output of this label, but that's not a had thing, allowing as it does swings between hard house and trance. Here, Recover slips smoothly up a gear and proudly launches the record that will more than likely catapult them into the public consciousness. Tom Harding knocks heads with Chris Hampshire in a searing, vocodered, robotronic trance mash-up. Simon Eve is also back with a remix. * * *

HOLLY SHWARTZ **Crossing Glow/Menace** (Wash/972)

Music is the global language that everyone understands without the need for translation. Holymen, aka Holly Shwartz, is one of the original pioneers of the Israeli trance and electro scene and his music is incredible - he strives to push the boundaries of innovation with every new project. The evolution of the Israeli scene can almost be mapped from this man's work. Both of these trance tracks are a must for any collector.



WHAT'S IN A NAME? "Five AM was created three years ago as a sister label to UK Bonzai, reflecting the sort of music that would be played in clubs at that time of the morning. Since then it's developed to encompass a range of danceable club music." WHO'S ON THE LABEL? "We began in 1999 with artists like Sunscreem, The Traveller & In

Motion and Leama. More recent releases include Sunscreem Versus Push, Binary Finary, Hemstock & Jennings and QED." MOMENT? "The key ingredients for us are musical originality and firing up dancefloors. We've always strived to provide something a little bit different. Supporting the up and coming producers that really know

Mark Kavanagh is still getting over his triumphant homecoming (from Ibiza, of course) at Creamfields Ireland, where tricolour flags with the Baby Doll logo waved while chants of "moomoo" almost drowned out the beats...

VITAL RELEASE

JUSTIN BOURNE & JAY PIDGEON Hardcore Noise (Short Circuit)

his is the sound of the new breed in full effect – fast-rising DJs Justin Boume and Jay Pidgeon, remixed by one of the busiest programmers on the block, James Lawson, all kicking off Justin's brand new label. Justin and James are hardly newcomers, but in the past few months both have really come into their own, Justin with killer cuts like 'Save Our Souls' on Stimulant; James with ace tunes like

'Energize'. Young

Sea Of Orange (Carnal)

An 'Access'-style stab introduces this bouncy Dutch creation. Tough beats kick in, followed by a gargantuan bass, with grungy stabs and eerie strings leading to a quirky breakbeat drop, before gorgeous warm synth pads take over. Classy and fresh, and flipped by last year's cruelly overlooked hard house and trance fusion, 'The RDP'.

DUTCH COURAGE Slammin' (Tidy White)

Shades of 'Access' here too, but in the juggernaut beats department. This noisy European effort sounds like a hyper Warp Brothers in its 'Alibee & Voi Remix', but its middle section sounds a bit lightweight. Flash Harry's funky, filtered disco thang is on the filp.

RECORDINGS

Pidgeon, meanwhile, has been impressing all and sundry with his stunning DJ sets. 'Hardcore Noise' is an impressive enough effort with its own unique groove, but on his chunky remix, Lawson adds a killer riff that takes dancefloors to Heaven every time. Welcome to the future. ★★★★★

Buzzer (Hotwax)

New boy Rob debuts on Hotwax with a bouncy affair given a tougher edge by some nasty synth stabs and strapping beats. On remix duties is an old Hotwax favourite, Sam Reeve, who delivers in the more techy style he's been developing of late, with choice fills and wild filtering adding to the momentum.

KNUCKLEHEADZ The Freakz (Tripoli Trax)

Using what sounds like a re-vocal of Cevin Fisher's 'The Freaks Come Out' refrain, Knuckleheadz are back in the fray and hissing like a rattlesnake. The flip is a thumping contemporary update of their wicked 'House Rocca' debut, which 'The Freakz' resembles in the way it lascivously bumps and grinds.

BLACK AM X Versus Y (white label)

Prime Mover on the mix here, tripping us out on what they hope is a potential crossover tune. Tough and trancey rhythms and a kingsize b-line underpin a very familiar riff and slightly less familiar vocal (to these ears). The production's not quite as razor-sharp as recent efforts from Aron and Dave, however, with the 'Instrumental Mix' sounding a lot brighter and beefier.

SAM REEVE & JON RUNDELL Africaine (Retek)

Sam and Jon (of Kaktai 18 fame) blend hard house and techno elements and come across sounding like Ingo after 15 rounds with Andy Farley, with African drums and ethnic chants adding an air of mystique. Nick Sentience supplies a dark and moody alternative with pulsing techno rhythms providing the backdrop on a mix that will delight the likes of Farley and Keen.

TOM HARDING & CHRIS HAMPSHIRE We're Back (Recover)

The fresh 'Original Mix' has German vibes and techno overtones over a tuff UK house groove – it could sound confused, but the elements actually blend together well. However, Simon Eve's more direct approach is likely to win most support. His bubbling bass and twittering synths build in funky style to a cleverly filtered breakdown that introduces a devastating riff, and from there the tune never looks back.

JOY KITIKONTI Joydontstop (BXR)

Another crazy techno cut from BXR. On the 'Joy Energiser Mix', acidic analogue mayhem meets an insane screeching breakdown – early Harthouse and gabba influences rein supreme here – while on the 'BK Remix', a more straightforward approach adds thumping drums and spiralling 303s. There's at least one more twelve to follow.

JUSTIN BOURNE & JAMES LAWSON The Soultaker (Short Circuit)

Release number two from Justin Bourne's new stamp is in a similar vein to Justin & Dynamic Intervention's recent effort on Stimulant, with an equally OTT breakdown and build up. Driving beats, trancey elements and energetic rhythms are layered with razor-sharp synth work, and interjected by the "I'm the Soultaker" vocal. There's a Paul Glazby remix in there too.

LAB 4

Requiem (Tidy Trax) 'Requiem' features classic Lab 4 rifferama over the usual blistering

rifferama over the usual blistering beats – it's easy to see why it's a live favourite. Likely to give them wider dancefloor appeal is the excellent '4th Floor'. Taken from the imminent Tidy album 'Virus', the unmistakable Lab 4 synth work sits atop crisp hard house beats and a pumping, off-beat bassline; it's almost like someone else's remix of Lab 4!

DEFECTIVE AUDIO Sling Shot (Hotwax)

A gailoping bass and aggressive beats drive the latest outing from Dom Sweeten on Hotwax. The "Can't stop" vocal is then introduced as it erupts into a frenzied climax with lots of filtering. On the more extreme 'Styli Burn', dark and noisy is the order of the day as the ace percussion is fused with sinister FX and nasty stabs – hardcore, man.

ALAN PULLEN Get The Fuck Up (Baby Doll)

The star of Creamfields Ireland in fine form: well I would feel that way, or I'd not have signed it, eh? Nepotism aside, this is loved because its tasty, OD404-esque groove bounds incessantly, with quirky synths and a catchy vocal that sounds like "Shut the fuck up". DJ Love adds a threatening twist on the remix. Both have a contagious riff and big breakdown. Be warned.

ENERGY UK DJS & NICK RAFFERTY Wizard (Energy UK)

The first release on the offshoot label from the popular website, www.energyuk.net sets its stall out with Nick Rafferty on the A-side. 'Wizard' starts with chaotic drums and a bubbly bass, getting manic with grungy stabs before its breakbeat-led and tranced-out breakdown. The EUK DJs work alone on the flip: 'Zone 5' is your more underground slab of techno bliss.

SUSHI

The Earthshaker (You Clash) To the best of my knowledge, the opening salvo from Paul Masterson's label has already been snapped up by Dave Pearce's Nu Life for a full release, and it's no surprise as it's got the most memorable, uplifting riff you'll hear all year. Huge all summer for everyone from Anne Savage to Mister Spring, let's hope for much more of the same from the Irish

more of the same from ex-pat's new imprint. $\star \star \star \star$

BILL & BEN, THE IRISH MEN The Beautiful Hoover (Give Me Dub) (white label)

Who says that the hoover is dead? Who says that the hoover is dead? Not these daft Paddies, that's for sure. Following on from the summer hit 'The Age Of Dub', the boyos are back in town with a contemporary take on the Diddy classic 'Give Me Love'. The 16-bar Diddy section is but a tease, however, because out of nowhere comes that beautiful hoover and a riff that screams "Resistance is futile... darling". * * * *

Boys And Girls (BXR UK)

Fuck, it doesn't seem like 10 years since I was wrecking people's heads by playing Marco's 160bpm+ hard trance singles on Harthouse to nutty rave teens. Today's so-called 'hard trance' is often so wimpy in comparison. Marco's not sounding anything of the sort on 'BAG', incidentally, an almost gabba-style assault with twisted techno attitude and a Blur sample. It's got balls.

WHO THE HELL IS... JAY PIDGEON

The Irish invasion continues apace with the Dublin ex-pat who's blowing up in London



WHEN AND WHERE DID YOU START DJING? "Dublin '97. I was on for an hour every night before the main DJ at a student venue called Club USI. The first mixtape I had was Slipmatt & Lime, and I got my first set of decks for Christmas." MOST MEMORABLE PARTY? "Creamfields Ireland 2002: 45,000 hard house fanatics under one roof. Never seen in Ireland before."

MOST EMBARRASSING MOMENT BEHIND THE DECKS? "Taking the stylus from the record that was playing, three times in one set." WHICH CLUBS ARE BEST – IRISH OR ENGLISH? Muzik's semi-legendary drum & bass reviewer lives above a baptist church down a festering Peckham alley, writes proper art reviews for The New Statesman, can't mix for toffee and has never, ever passed through the portals of El Divino.

VITAL RELEASE

VARIOUS ARTISTS Studio X (Good Looking)

S calar's opening 'Sonar' might raise the prospect of another selection of effete beats from Good Looking, but it's well worth persevering with this one. Chosen by LTJ Bukem, the 10 tracks here fuse the high-gloss sound that Bukem has long championed with the currently big 'liquid' style. Thus Avid Nation's 'Constant Motion' crosses

the brittle funk of Defunked with Kenny

X10DB(1CD) (ICD) (ICD)

Larkin's electronic harmonies, and Soul Purpose's massive 'Where You At?' delivers a percussive upper-cut worthy of Calibre. The deepest, loveliest, most inventive showing of the month. (ND)

JONNY L Synkronize (Metalheadz)

The start may be disarmingly pretty, but Jonny L's latest piece for Metalheadz pulls no punches. That opening keyboard shimmer continues throughout, but a viciously simple break, some livid depth charge effects and a snarling sub-bass all enter the fray, while the vocodered vocal holds it all together nicely. Better still, 'Phreak Show' supplants a hardstep, headnodding break with darkside stabs. rave hiccups, a Missy Elliot-derived keyboard motif and some glacial synth shivers. Casts a spell. ****

SPIRIT Final Chapter – The Alternative Ending (Timeless) A final outing for one of his first

Timeless releases, where the slightly leaden break and cliched darkcore-isms are redeemed by the insane echo chamber snarls and flowing dub bassline. But how many rehashed hardcore licks can a man take? Flip for 'Raygun VIP', the eponymous death blasts being powered by a sluggish, spacious break. It's cold in there.

KLUTE Part Of Me (Hospital)

Klute blesses Hospital with his best release for ages. 'Part Of Me' feels like a male counterpart to the beautiful, female-voiced 'Phone Call' from his Certificate 18 album, the vaguely Robert Owens-esque vocal buoyed up by lush drum-mutterings and echoing, 'Pulp Fiction'-style trumpets. Classic, taut Hospital funk. The instrumental version focuses attention on the wavering trumpets and the compressed flicker of the break. Ace.

DRUMAGICK Easy Boom (SambaLoco, Brazil)

Having been instrumental in developing the Brazilian drum & bass scene (and licensing all the tracks to V Records for their wonderful 'Brazil EP'), SambaLoco Records come with their first proper UK release. Drumagick's 'Easy Boom' and 'Funquiada' don't depart hugely from the wired bossa vibe of the V release, but then that's the essence of the Brazilian sound. Horn stabs, trotting bongos, casually sauntering double-bass and, as ever, some effortlessly soulful vocals (no melodramatic divas here) make for two more potential anthems. Beautiful. ****

DEEP BLUE The Helicopter Tune (Cause4Concern Remix) (Moving Shadow)

A partially welcome return for the track that had it all - wickedly chopped breaks, a heartbeat bassline, 'Pacific State' birdcalls and that unforgettable signature bongo rattle. One of the Top 10 jungle tracks of all time. Bringing it rudely up to date, Cause4Concern rapidly plunge into plodding, techy monotony. Altogether better is the languid pace and semi-congealed 'Think' break of Deep Blue's bongoless 1997 re-lick, but personally I'd have let one of the new breed producers (such as Calibre or High Contrast) have their way with it. ****

VARIOUS ARTISTS Air EP (Renegade)

The minutest of tweaks to the darkside template, and a new track sees the light of day. But Universal Project's 'Tempest' is some heavy, heavy shit, the steel-shadowed, Phantom Force-esque break giving it far more clout than your average piece of hardcore warmongery. Future Prophecies' 'Rage' is all steely drums and grandiose Arctic vistas, whilst Concord Dawn's 'Aurora' is so fast as to be totally uninvolving. Lastly, Raiden's debut 'Fallin'' impresses with its 'Papua New Guinea'-like wailing, sticky bass-drone and frantic drums. * * *

D PRODUCT

Already Mine (Full Cycle) I haven't really got to grips with the strident discordancy of D Product's previous releases, but this one gets a slot by virtue of its wickedly rolling groove and somewhat elegiac feel. The bassline in particular is lovely, throwing itself about with cartoonish abandon beneath a simple, looped horn lick. A real grower, But 'Running Scared' finds him back to his customary, sub-Ram, acid techno-leaning tricks, Don't go there.

FUNK 'N' FLEX Flow With Me (Defunked)

Drummer/singer partnership Funk 'N' Flex debut with this punchy little roller that's reminiscent of 4 Hero at their most uplifting. Fans of Robert Owens should also certainly check. Flipside 'Feel The Love' comes across initially as a second rate 'LK', the guitars referencing the current Latin vogue without adding anything new to it, but matures on subsequent listens into something absurdly sunny and unaccountably cute.

CHRIS SU Airlift (Music Forever)

There's been no little hype about this guy and the burgeoning drum & bass scene in his native Hungary, but the original of 'Airlift' is far too coldly techy for my liking. Better turn to Mathematics' excellent remix which warms the whole thing up with a beautiful male vocal, a gently stepping bassline and some percussive complexity reminiscent of Flynn & Flora. That scuttling, flickering bongo business never fails to enchant.

DJ SS FEATURING

Like A Bird (Formation) The promo has a whopping six different versions of 'Like A Bird', the original being laced with those omnipresent flamenco melodies and running on an airborne, High Contrast-esque bassline. Influx Datum's remix dispenses with both bassline and guitars in favour of sweeping synths and a half-

glimpsed 'Kid Caprice' break, but it's the incongruous darkside stabs and luminous birdcalls of the 'Hard Mix' that strike by far the most interesting note.

JOHN ROLODEX Dragon EP (Dread)

It's got to the stage where producers have got to do something new with the darkside sound, and John Rolodex's debut EP doesn't quite rise to the challenge. Granted, 'The Dragon' is a mighty piece of cinematic sound-weaponry that's sure to be adored by fans of Digital & Spirit, Rufige Kru and the whole Renegade Hardware industrial beats thing, but it's a minute variation on themes we've heard a million times before. The same goes for the Ray Keith-aping drum battery of 'Dark Obsession' and the bass drone, scything beats and cataclysmic 'Amen' bursts of 'Badman Soundboy'. Sorry Ray, it's getting boring. * * *

BLUE SONIX This Feeling – The Remixes (Phuturistic Bluez, USA)

In which Ricky Blue's delicately jazzy classic gets the once over by fast-rising producers High Contrast ('Ultramaximized Disco Dub Mix') and Influx Datum ('Intoxicated Mix'). The former marches solidly down the disco-jungle route and boasts a typically big, velvet swathed bassline, but it's Influx Datum's timely revival of the loveliest, laziest stepper's break ever that steals the show. Proper deep.

DANNY C The Mexican (Portica)

You'll know this late-summer anthem by the tinpot percussion, snatches of Spanish and the floating, teasing guitar lick. An addictive amalgam of Suv and DJ Marky, and only slightly spolled by the presence of Ram's one-armed drummer. Flipside 'Days We Live' starts well with a nicely frenzied bongo-flicker, but the break's lame and the track just doesn't seem to go anywhere. Yep, it's that drumming amputee again...

LABEL STABLE SAMBALOCO RECORDS

Bruno E of Brazil's premier drum & bass label tells us what's what



HOW AND WHEN DID THE LABEL BEGIN? "In 1998. I wanted to provide an outlet for the drum & bass producers from the eastside ghettos of Sao Paulo, so I teamed up with Trama Records and founded the label." WHAT'S THE SOURCE OF THE BRAZILIAN SOUND? "The musical heritage of Brazil, which draws its influences from

native Indians, European immigrants and African slaves. Bossa nova provides those smooth chord structures as well the simple offbeat; sambarock, which was the style ploneered by the likes of Jorge Ben in the Seventies, gives us that special swing in the basslines, and pure samba is all about the assshaking grooves and beats!" WHAT'S NEXT? "I'm putting together a compilation at the moment called 'SambaLoco D&B Classics', with big, big tunes on it and a few hard numbers on it too. The other news is the new, more leftfield sister label we're starting called Nova Vida." (ND)

TRAINSPOTTING

ZOMBIE RATS untitled (white label)

An artist determined to keep his identity secret, and good luck to him. A combination of 'funky' guitar licks in a mid-Nineties, CJ Bolland fashion and suitably chunky breaks make for a minor dancefloor explosion. (T) * * *

DEE KLINE, NU BREED, RANSOM & PHIL K

Bushpig (Supercharged) While DJing Down Under, pirate radio breakbeat supremo Dee Kline seems to have hooked up with most of Australia's finest, with the resulting studio session giving birth to 'Bushpig'. I'm not sure who contributed what to the track, but when it's blasting at full volume, nobody's going to care. One for the big sound systems. (DB) ****



devastatingly effective, and crowds everywhere go mad for its awesome energy. With its relentless groove and sustained momentum 'My House' is a must have for anyone wanting to smack up the dancefloor. Big up. (DB) * * * *

K-WARREN New Religion (white label)

Normally associated with the better end of the two-step scene, Mr Warren gets all forward thinking with this beat-driven, techy track, which is more Detroit-sounding than your average London-produced underground joint. It would be good to see some other producers break the mould a little. (DB) * * * *

INITIAL RESEARCH Killa Instinct (Mob)

A moody breakbeat roller from old school jungle veterans Pulse & Tango, who now record and remix under 300 different aliases. This works well in a late-night set, utilising warm pads, strong drums and a distinctive, trademark low bassline. These boys are on it at the moment - let's hope they keep their 'Killa' skills. (DB) * * * *

VARIOUS ARTISTS For Vini (Botchit Breaks)

A sampler from the forthcoming 'For Vini' release, where some of the artists inspired by the late Botchit & Scarper/SOUR Records legend keep the fire burning. The on-form Evil 'Flex' in that digital funk way of theirs, while Funk Monster electro-thrashes his way through the flip. (T) ****

TERMINALHEAD

Mind Of Your Own (Kilowatt) Another taste of what to expect from the forthcoming 'Weekend Warriors' album. Aware that the excellent original is over two years old, the band have helpfully reworked it for the now, also enlisting the talents of Zed Bias and The Light, just in case all bases weren't already covered. (T) ****

APOLLO KIDS **Hustlers** (Fat!)

Firing out tunes at the speed of sound, Pulse & Tango return for Paul 'Trouble' Arnold's label in fine fashion. Mixing the future-jazz vibes of Manzell and the space funk of the Mizell Brothers with the breakbeat nous of Kevin Beber, this manages to sound more IIs than IIs himself. A gem. (T) ****

LAYO & BUSHWACKA! Love Story (Stanton Warriors Edit) (white label)

Yes, the tune is old, and yes I am reviewing our own version of it, but this edit works for the breaks floors and gives new life to this house classic. It basically underpins the strongest elements of the original with our own beats and groove. It's hopefully gonna see life on XL, in which case you can make your own mind up. (DB)

QUIET KILLAZ The Warning (Distinctive Breaks)

The Ouiet Killaz add a breakbeat lick to a sample of the old New York classic of the same name. originally by Logic. Workable drums and deep basslines are the main features of a track that doesn't break any moulds but keeps them on the floor nonetheless. One for the early part of the set, as a warning of things to come. (DB) * * * *

AUDIO BULLYS Real Life (Remix) (Source)

The Bullies - one of the most refreshing new acts to come along for ages - remix their own 'raw to the floor' 'Real Life' number into an equally rockable breakbeat number. Simply keeping it rugged with that phat bass sound does the trick, making this a great one for dirtying up the dancefloor. And you can even mix both versions together to look and sound really clever. More please. (DB)

ANDY PAGE & BABS **Oblivia Neutron Bomb** (Thunk)

* * * *

Everybody's favourite studio wizard, Andy Page, steps in front of the camera, so to speak, on this Aussie release. The precision cuts and sculpted sounds are augmented with a very snazzy flute solo that sounds better than you might expect a flute solo to sound. Down Under breaks do it again. (T) ****

TIM DELUXE It Just Won't Do (Stanton Warriors Edit) (Underwater)

In which Mark and Dominic whine their way through the recent chart smash inna bogle breaks fashion, sensibly keeping the vocal refrain back the end of the track. serving merely as confirmation for the head as to what the feet have been shuffling to previously. We asked Dom Stanton if they were really doing an electro remix of Blazin' Squad, but he told us to piss off. (T) ****

SIR DREW **IPU** (Kingsize)

Sir Drew is one half of Chicken Lips, purveyors these days of the sort of very good, sexy, dancefloor electro kitsch that is all too often erroneously lumped together with the very awful, unsexy, nondancefloor electro kitsch championed elsewhere. This rocks in a get-your-lino way, as well as a shake-your-boots fashion, and the album is also ace. (T) ****

SOFA SURFERS Selling Souls (Leaf)

This Austrian outfit have always been worth paying attention to. Licensed to the equally experimental Leaf label, the A-side is midtempo, industrial skunk music featuring Berlin-based MC Santana, while the Christian Candid mix is the one for this page with its dirty, techno funk. A surprise success. (T) ****

A nice intro with cool drums is let down - in our humble opinion - by a comedy bassline. Other people will like this, so feel free to ignore us if you like. But among the bassline beats and bashment breaks, a rising female star has emerged with a story to tell, sending a positive message to all young songwriters out there. 'Messy', which sold its first 1,000 vinyl copies in two days, was the

first track played on 1Xtra, and with the Dubaholics & Dexter Rico's



outstanding re-rub, this 22 year-old North West Londoner should go all the way to the top. 'Messy' is about the bitchiness between girls on the street, and it's a brilliantly refreshing and accomplished debut. (DC)

DONNELL JONES You Know That I Love U (X-

Men Remix) (white label) It seems UKG producers have finally learned how to pitch r&b vocals and the days of Pinky & Perky remixes are long behind us, thank the Lord. Continuing the success formula of two-step remixes of r&b's finest, remix kings X-Men do the business here, and it's guaranteed to make you shake your arse – but watch yourself. (DC)

BATTLE OF THE MCS VOLUME 3 We Wild Tonight (Battle Of

The MCs) The third instalment in the

'Battle Of The MCs' trilogy, and easily the best. The UKG starstudded line-up includes Slarta John, Specialist Moss, Pickens, Ms Dynamite and Juice Man, with fiery production by Jameson. If you like any of the above artists, grab a copy now – this is a must! (**DC**)

DJ MAC AND TIM McEWAN R U Feeling Me (Pure Garage)

'R U Feeling Me' is the debut release from EZ's new label, Pure Garage (named after his successful compilation series). The best part of this package is the Dubaholics' mix, which flexes a serious bassline but nonetheless maintains a sweet calypso flavour, weaving perfectly into the soulful vocals and cool guitar riffs of the original. RHINO, TUBBY T

Music is 4 Life (LongTime) Tubby T, who already has an underground hit with 'Tales Of The Hood' under his belt, gives this track an extra edge with his reggae-style vocals. On the mixer, DT & Rhino bring their familiar production trademarks to the track, while 2 Digital deliver

stomping dark mixes which are currently tearing up the airwaves. Definitely a track about to blow, this is a great anthem with conscious lyrics. (M&M)

JAMESON True (V2)

Moving from remixer to producer, Jameson, a man known for his killer beats, brings out his own track, which has a Foxy Brown feel. Starting with classical-style pizzicato strings, 'True' launches in to what can only be described as 'Jameson' style, demonstrating the more musical side of this in-demand producer. (M&M)

GROOVERIDER What Do You Do? (Ed Case

KIKO NAVARRO FEATURING CONCHA BUIKA

The Perfect Place (Flamingo, Spain)

With an outstanding mix by DJ Chus & David Penn, this feisty offering from Senor Navarro's own label is a neat mix of driving bass, soulful chords and a gutsy vocal from Concha Buika. The beauty here is in the balance of tough beats and sweet melodies, typified by the sparse sax and mellow Rhodes that temper the beefy, tribal-tinged beats. Call it tribal soul, deep garage or whatever you like, but don't let this pass you by.

MICHAEL PROCTER

Spirit (Deepless, Switzerland) Well, the gang's all here now, as one-time UBP vocalist and all-round good egg Michael Procter returns with a useful cut that will please lovers of the soulful garage groove. We could have done with a little more of Michael's singing voice in addition to the spoken-word elements, mind you.

Things U Do 4 Me (Papa) Following the excellent 'Dawn' by Jon Cutler, Oli Lazarus' Papa

Records keeps up the quality with this very cool offering from Dominic Jacobson, aka Modaji. It's thankfully less noodly and jazz-tastically 'hmmmm, nice' than most of his work, being a straight-up, soulful house cut with quality vocals from this geozer called Jag, some feisty percussion, sweet keys and rumbling bass. Good stuff.

JAMAICA UNDERGROUND FEATURING JOHN LEWIS

Love Existing (Wave Music) Featuring remixes by the rejuvenated Blaze and a strong vocal from reggae singer John Lewis, this soulful gem from Francois K's Wave label also boasts lush sax and heaps of soulful Jersey garage elements on both the 'Shelter Vocal' and 'Shelter Dub' versions. As usual it's the dub that does the job in the club, but that vocal version is mighty fine.

BRENT LAURENCE FEATURING CLAY ACOX AND MAUREEN PARKER Spirit Remixed (Black Vinyl)

Spint Remixed (Black Vinyi) Moulton Studios mainman Jay-J reworks this vocal anthem from last year, taking the dark and dirty dub approach and delivering a real corker. This has been my secret weapon of recent months, but now the secret is out. Vienna's Deep FM provide the smoother version on the flip.

MATTHIAS HEILBRONN PRESENTS THE II DEEP ALLSTARS Justice Mercy (Remixes)

(Nite Grooves, US) With characteristically polished production, heaps of live elements and a strong vocal contribution, in a Stevie Wonder/George Benson stylee, from James Preston Jnr, this is another quality offering from Matty Heilbronn. It will delight the Shelter heads and anyone else who digs real soulful, funky, Latin-tinged, classic garage music in its truest form.

JOE BUDDENS

Focus (Spit/Def Jam) Hip hop tune of the month is definitely this grimy slab of New York City hip hop from New Jersey's Joe Buddens. Around on the mix tape scene before getting signed to Stretch Armstrong's Spit Records, Buddens track delivers completely. With a rhyming style a little reminiscent - to these ears - of Craig Mack and a b-line copped from David Bowie's 'Fashion', this will no doubt be huge in the Big Apple, Hardcore hip hoppers you need this record. ****

BENZINO **Rock The Party (Elektra)**

Another highly recommended hip hop cut comes from the fearsome rap veteran Benzino. A slightly Eastern, Timbaland-style beat propels this cut, and it more

His rapping might be as bad as ever, but when a typically catchy Bad Boy group chorus featuring Foxy Brown kicks in, mimicking a riff from Cam'ron's 'Horse And Carriage', the result is another irresistible slice of credible but commercial hip hop. * * * *

BLU CANTRELL **Breathe (Arista)**

Sticking an r&b song over a wellknown Dr Dre backing track is as close to a sure bet as you can get in music. Accordingly, Blu Cantrell's new single is reaping the benefit of using Dre's own album cut 'What's The Difference?' as its musical accompaniment. Starting with a reggae-style chat, the tune then switches into a song showcasing Cantrell's distinctive vocal style. The song isn't great but the instant familiarity of the loop will mean it gets the benefit of the doubt. * * *

DONNELL JONES Put Me Down (Arista)

This latest single reunites Donnell with producer Eddie F. who provided him with the monster hit 'II Know What's Un?' While 'Put Me Down' isn't quite in that league, it was definitely the stand out uptempo cut on the singer's current album. The backing track has a synthy, Eighties vibe to it and Jones's vocal is as smooth as ever. A remix features Styles P and Lady May for added interest. Recommended. ****

I Do (Wanna Get Close To You) (Epic)

The three little women who enjoyed a Top 10 hit with 'No More' last year return with a new single which, alas, is nowhere near the same standard, Sometime Bad Boy producer Mario Winans produces

LAVERNE Mesmerized/Keep It Movin' (white label)

A nice little white label from UK singer Laverne, who released a track called 'Natural Thing' earlier this year. This keeps that track's song over a loop of Mobb Deep's 'Up North Tip', making 'Mesmerized' a radio-friendly cut. The flipside, 'Keep It Movin'', cleverly takes a loop from Dwavne Wiggins' 'Hey You', which appeared and disappeared without trace last year. Laverne does more justice to that backing track than Dwayne himself could manage. * * * *

FOXY BROWN

Stylin' (Remix) (Def Jam) Foxy's debut single from her forthcoming album, which has been knocking around since early summer, is given a new lease of life prior to release by a remix featuring N.O.R.E. Loon and Baby Gavin [Excellent names! - Ed.]. It's hard to go wrong with a guitar-sampling beat this infectious, and the addition of the original on the flip makes this doubly worth picking up if you missed it before. * * *

Given the brilliance of Amerie's debut single 'Why Don't We Fall In Love?' some found her album a bit of a disappointment. However, there are tunes on there and this follow-up single is a case in point. Set at a lazy tempo, this song is all about the chorus, which implants itself in your head like a virus and will no doubt be a laydeez' anthem. This could definitely be played out to a more discerning audience. * * * *

DEBORAH COX Up & Down (In & Out) (J)

Deborah Cox is yet another Clive Davis protege who's followed the legendary record exec from Arista to J Records. This new single. produced by Jam & Lewis, is getting big props but doesn't entirely convince these ears. The beat is heavy and moves along nicely, but the song just isn't all that. * * *

ERYKAH BADU Love Of My Life (An Ode To Hip Hop) (MCA)

Taken from the soundtrack for a new film called Brown Sugar, 'Love Of My Life' teams Erykah Badu with producer Raphael Saadig, This beat-led track is sparse and modern sounding and leaves lots of space for Badu's signature vocals before building to a nice chorus. It's probably too slow to play in a club, but it does at least suggests that Erykah's moving in the right direction again, after the disappointment of her last album. * * *

SHAUN ESCOFFREY Space Rider (Oyster)

The theory is you never break a toy that works, so as DJ Spinna has already worked his magic once on young Shaun (on 'Days Like This', which was huge in the soul clubs and then a Miami 'discovery' ages later) why not get him to pull off the

SPECIALIST ALBUMS

DONNA GARDIER Home (Dome)

The former vocalist with Raw Stylus reaches out on her own to prove once and for all that she is indeed a force to be reckoned with. This lady is a massive talent who's been in the premier division, but wasn't treated with the respect she was due. Now Donna's found the right home and created the album we've been waiting for for years. Pure gold all the way.

JULIE DEXTER

Dexterity (Ketch A Vibe) It really says that there's something wrong about the music business in the UK when homegrown talent such as Birmingham lass Ms Dexter has to leave our shores and settle in Atlanta, USA just to gain recognition. She's recently played sold-out dates in London and is now eyeing projects with Donnie and maybe Jill Scott. Come back Julie – we love you really!

TIMOTHY WILSON Timothy Wilson (Expansion)

A rarer than rare slice of classy soul, originally put down on New Jersey's H&L Records in 1978. Some of the label's output made it to the UK, but alas for Mr Wilson it was not to be in this case. The original vinyl is selling for stupid money, so you should grab this while you can. It's bursting at the seams with soulful gens.

Their distinctive tunes, best viewed as an off-kilter British response to the 'Sleng Teng' Casiotone revolution, balanced lo-fi cheese with sparse instrumentation, as oddball keyboard melodies bounced off sweet-toothed vocal hooks. Artists like Peter Bouncer, Kenny Knots or Mikey Murka may have lacked class, but they compensated for it with sheer infectiousness.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Rough Inna Town: The X-Terminator Sound (Maximum Pressure) VARIOUS ARTISTS

Reality Calling 2 (Jet Star) Luciano producer and X-Terminator label boss Fatis Burrell has fought a successful war against ragga's low-comdenom, with his melodically crammed, modern dancehall anthems brimming with musical craftsmanship and positivity. 'Rough Inna Town' is an indispensable intro to his label. Jet Star's release may not maintain the same consistency, but the likes of Freddie McGregor, Sandeeno and Admiral Tibbett are illuminated ambassadors for this tuneful reality check.

Jehst returns once again with another look at life *"living with benefit cheats and no hopers/ Stoners, deadbeats who sleep on their sofas".* The beat booms but the music is subtly dislocated, a perfect complement to the rhyme, generating a real feeling of disillusionment but also of hope. Perfectly judged.

DJ REVOLUTION Trading Places (B9000, Belgium)

On which the LA-based DJ gets together with Baby Blak to trade lines with cuts over a spacious, funky beat to good effect. It's on 'Your Arms Are 2 Short To Scratch With God' that things really move though, a sparse electronic bass pulse used as a canvas over which to splatter the scratches.

CLIPSE Grindin' (Star Trak/Arista)

Not out in the UK until January, but you're going to hear it long before that, as it's the latest killer production from The Neptunes. Basically, it's just a beat with absolutely no music – either the pinnacle of their minimalist-funk philosophy of the Emperor's new clothes, depending on how you look at it. Whatever, though, the 'Selector' mix is the one – and let's face it, this is completely fuckin' avant garde and will still make the charts.

EPHEMERA Last Thing (Fuego)

A cool 12-inch with two tracks from the rather excellent 'Scando-Nova' compilation. 'Last Thing' is a very funky, dubby, electro/reggae groove remixed by Bjorn Torske. On the flip is another album track remixed by Royksopp. (CC)

D*NOTE

Shed My Skin (white label) Rob Da Bank and Jim Eliot from Sunday Best have twisted this tune into a proper Balearic, late-night magic moment. You can't exactly hear what the vocals are saying, but they drift beautifully in and out of the string flourishes and the skippy beats. On the flip is an ambient, sunset version for playing outside. Spacey. (CC)

FUSSIBLE Odyssea (Sonic 360)

Originally released a while back, 'Odyssea' is an excellent, spacey, percussive track complete with rolling bassline, guitars, and Tijuana-style brass. With new mixes from Jay Tripwire and Latiniser, and support from Mr Scruff and Groove Armada, Fussible will become a big name to watch in the future. (PM)

Beautiful Crazy (Skint)

This track started life as a limited seven-inch over a year ago, then found its way onto Muzik's 'Ibiza By Day' covermount CD. Now, after its appearance in an Adidas commercial, it's getting a re-release and could well be the hit it deserved to be the first time round. **(CC)**

Frogtoise (City Slang)

Schneider TM tunes are always a little strange. This one is about a dream of attaching a frog's head to a tortoise's body. There are three mixes to choose from on the vinyl, including some neat electro and electronica, but the most successful is Schneider's own country/electro 'FM Remake'. Once you get over the initial sense of dizziness, it's actually rather good. (CC)

ELEMON JELLY Space Walk (XL)

The first single from the new album 'Lost Horizons', 'Space Walk' starts with an astronaut describing his time in space before drifting into a typically rickety Jelly piano groove. The single comes as a lovely, leather bound 10-inch with 'Return To Patagonia', a new version of 'Homage To Patagonia', on the flip. Very nice. (CC)

Get Misunderstood (PIAS)

A good selection of mixes of a rather Moby-esque tune. The album version is a soundtracky mix of a blues singer and some Sixties strings, and the mixes come from Jori Hulkonnen (deep house), Quantic (a quirky lounge groove) and LB Thomas (downtempo strangeness). Emotional and effective. (CC)

NOSTALGIA 77 Brother (Tru Thoughts)

The first tune from a new signing to Tru Thoughts. This is one of those funky seven-inches that at first sounds like some Seventies rare groove find, but is actually much stronger and more dubby than anything made that long ago. It's dirty, raw dance music for dark, sweaty basements. (CC)

Before/After/Now (white label)

If melodic electronica is your cup of tea, then this is for you. Tracks like 'Mindboxin'' and 'Salami Safari' combine fragile beats, mellow pads and moody effects, putting Whatever up there with the likes of John Beltran and World Of Apples. Yet more quality music from Scandinavia. (PM)

BUDNUBAC Eight (white label)

A midtempo salsa/lounge groove, this is perfect for building a vibe in a bar or as a warm up in the back room of a club. On the flip there's a similarly Latin-influenced, house-tempo groove that is also rather good. (CC)

KARUNESH Punjab (Stoned Asia)

This track became a bit of an anthem down at Pathaan's Stoned Asia night, so he decided to release it as a single on his own label. The original version, with its haunting Indian vocals, flutes and violins, is included, along with some more dancefloor-friendly mixes courtesy of Orchestral World Groove and Chiller Twist. (**PM**)

SPECIALIST ALBUMS

SONDRE LERCHE Faces Down (Source)

Sondre Lerche is the latest extraordinary new talent to emerge from that hotbed of cool musical activity – Bergen in Norway. He has a charming voice, reminiscent of early David Bowie. He also has a Bowie-like talent for writing catchy, clever, affecting pop songs like the brilliant opening cuts here – 'Dead Passengers' and 'You Know So Well'. A star in the making. (CC)

THE FUNKY

Cartouche (Stereo Deluxe) This is a nice collection of those light, funky, acoustic lounge grooves that are an integral part of the chill out scene. The standout tracks are an indie chill affair called 'Breathless' and the Ibiza vibing 'Stay', both featuring the gorgeous voice of one Claire Szembec, Very groovy. (CC)

VARIOUS ARTISTS Pacific Hotel Mixed By Electromana (Inca)

In a similar vein to his 'Jet Lag' album, Electromana takes the theme of mixing ethnic sounds and electronic music, this time for a compilation. 'Pacific Hotel' features various artists who take influences from Australia, Hawaii, and Fiji, and turn them into a cool soundtrack for a jetset hotel. (PM)

STATE OF THE ARTIST MANHEAD

Zurich-based Robi Insinna produces under the names Headman and Manhead. Spot the theme?



WHO THE HELL IS MANHEAD? "Manhead is a more melodic, electronic and Balearic side project from Headman! The project works quite similar to Headman: I write the songs and co-produce them with Ralph Peter." WHAT'S YOUR

BACKGROUND? "I've been into dance music since I was 15, beginning with early hip hop. At the moment I'm into Balearic, electro, punk-funk, disco... and rock."

GROWING UP IN ITALY, DID YOU EXPERIENCE THE COSMIC AFRO SCENE? "I lived in Italy from 1989-99. At the end of the Eighties that scene was still around in Brescia, where I lived. DJ/RUPTURE Minesweeper Suite (Tigerbeat6)

Js. They're either 40-odd has-beens playing the same record for five hours in desperate pursuit of diminishing returns, or 'punky' young bucks splicing pop tunes in that hilarious and challenging 'bootleg' fashion that major labels are belatedly clamouring to sanction in their thirst for illusory underground kudos. So it's heartening to see DJ/ rupture taking his decknology seriously,

Do You Know Squarepusher? (Warp)

The title track's a mutant breakbeat pop tune to rival the brilliant 'My Red Hot Car'. Then comes 'F-Train', which sounds like The Streets weaned on JG Ballard and brown acid rather than Del Trotter and pills. There's the bellicose braindance banger 'Anstromm-Feck 4', a strangely faithful rendition of 'Love Will Tear Us Apart', and a second, slightly pointless CD recorded live in Japan. "I aspire to make music useless as a commodity," he says. Warp must be thrilled. (TM)

MEAT BEAT MANIFESTO R.U.O.K? (Quatermass)

Jack Dangers, Swindon's leading breakbeat hero turned remixer to the stars (Bowie, Byrne, um, Bush) is back with his first album in aeons. He hasn't changed all that much, but when he's on top form



mixing up ragga, noisebreaks, r&b acappellas, North African rhythms and squawking improvisation into an original and confrontational whole that's rough, inventive but thoroughly danceable. Hear him live if you can. (TM)

(as with the 23 Skidoo-sampling second track on this promo), Dangers' way with a hefty dub bassline and a spacey acidic bleep is still second to none, despite the legion of imitators it's spawned. His hip hop stuff's not weathering so well, though. (TM)

RHYTHM & SOUND Aground/Aerial (Rhythm & Sound)

Every Rhythm & Sound release seems to move closer to some transcendental form of tech-dub which causes time and space to stand still. 'Boring', some might call it, but these people are soulless philistines. 'Aground' is almost too slow, with bass so bassy you can feel it in your bones, while 'Aerial' features wordless vocals from Tikiman over a characteristically understated ticking pulse beat. They're in a world of their own. (TM)



THE HUMAN LEAGUE Dare (Virgin)

We dropped big cusses on the League's futuristically coiffed heads last month, so consider this a making of amends if you like. 'Dare' is the best synth-pop album ever. Every track with the possible exception of 'Open Your Heart' is a classic. Now it's been remastered so it zings and burbles out even better than before, and it's in lavishly hand tooled packaging AND it comes with the remix (well, extended instrumentals, really) album 'Love And Dancing' stuck on the end. If you don't love its love action, you must be dead or in PR. (DB)

JÓHANN JÓHANNSON Englabörn (Touch)

This is a play score by one of the founders of Iceland's excellent Kitchen Motors collective. Destined to become as revered as Morricone's finest soundtracks a few years after everyone had forgotten about them, it's a serene combination of strings, harmonium, glockenspiel, subtle electronics and Latin poetry that's far too proper to be sharing column inches with the likes of Phil Oakey's mob. (TM)

KAITO Special Life (Kompakt)

Kaito is one Hiroshi Watanabe, who released records on housey labels like Nite Grooves and King Street before sending a demo to Kompakt, who found he fitted in perfectly with their idea of 'neotrance'. 'Special Life' has the kind of synthetic sounds and simplistic melodies you might expect to hear on an old Paul Van Dyk record, but pitched down to house tempo and filtered through muslin to extract all traces of cheese but leave friendly bacteria intact. And like those microbes, it'll grow on you. (TM) * * * *

FOOD

Veggie (Rune Grammofon)

Improvised jazz is a forbidding foreign land to most sane people, but this Anglo-Norwegian quartet are like a crisp autumn day in Prague compared to the genre's usual perma-frost winter in Gdansk. Sparse, breathy and melodic saxophone and trumpet drift through an austere electronic landscape provided by producer Deathprod, making this album well worth an Easyjet fare of anyone's money. With titles like 'Tofu', 'Chickpea' and 'Mushroom', we assume the peculiar yodelling noises at the end are a result of doing the whole menu in one sitting. (TM) ****

KNIFEHANDCHOP Bling The Noize (Irritant)

KHC's been lured away by the glamour and cash of Kid 606's Tigerbeat6 label, so this is his last release for Irritant - what an ungrateful little fuckpiece. Oh well. This compilation contains all the fervid pixie of gabba-pop's finest moments, from the vinegar stroke ragga-jungle of 'Bounty Killer Killer' to the spunky hardcore stupidity of 'Dancemix 2000', which does things to Destiny's Child that they probably wouldn't approve of. The energy that's gone into it is all too obvious from the way Billy's gone from looking like a 14 year-old queuing at G.A.Y. to resembling a 30 year-old quantity surveyor who's secretly into hip hop, in just the last two years. (DB) ****

BIG TWO HUNDRED Your Personal Filth (DC)

Big Two Hundred used to be postacid house megastars Bizarre Inc. But if this is anything to go by, all that time they were living in a house with walls made out of made of drugs, with a lavvy that flushed Champagne, they secretly wished they were actually early Eighties punk-funkers The Pon Group, 23 Skidoo and PiL. This is a perfect facsimile of that death disco sound, from the first exposed-bone drum and bass riff to the last spidery guitar line and sociology-teacherrocks-out vocal. As such, it sounds great. But it's still a facsimile. (DB) * * *

IKARA COLT Basic Instructions (Fantastic)

mix CD cemented its reputation.

A legion of record collectors, chisellers and dealers have dedicated themselves to hunting down all the 12-inches used on the CD either for pleasure or for profit. Obviously some tracks are harder to track down than others, especially some of the Italian imports and there had been much bootlegging going on out there, so this month we're giving you a cross selection from the Renaissance CD, which came out gulp! - 10 years ago this month.

APOLOGY: For complex technical reasons, we inadvertently said last month that Blaze 'continue to record for Deconstruction, to this day'. Rather obviously, they do not, as Decon is no more. Blaze actually still record for Slip 'N' Slide, original UK home of their De'Lacy hit, 'Hideaway'.

What's the best way of getting hold of upfront promos? Increasingly, it's from record companies - or, more specifically, from their websites. Record Store (recordstore.co.uk), operate mini-stores on behalf of a large number of different companies including Ministry

Global Underground, Bedrock and Wall Of Sound.

NET AGAIN

But many labels are busy doing their own thing, including Nukleuz (nukleuz.co.uk/shop/promo.html) and Baroque (baroquerecords.co.uk), who both offer pre-release promos. Novamute (mute.co.uk/store.htm),

have their extensive back catalogue available on-line, and Soma (somarecords.com) recently offered promos on their website which, they claim, will never appear in shops. Hooj (hooj.com) run a promo

service, allowing DJs to get hold of their releases up to four weeks

before full UK release, although you have to sign up and buy credits in advance (£25 for five credits). Hooj also supply records from several dozen other labels. Bear in mind that promos are often released in small quantities, so if you want them, be quick.

21st Century Bodyrockers: electro tunes and pukka clobber

P 11.30pm, phuture phun pub Cynthia's is stuffed full of beautiful people, with a huge queue of hopefuls still snaking down the street. When you realise that this is the last London appearance (after eight short months) of City Rockers' club night, you'd be forgiven for thinking them mad. But then they are a label known for swerving convention.

Rockers boss Phil Howells has described the club as "Nightclubbing in the Grace Jones sense," which basically translates as 'everyone dressses up, and the soundtrack is salacious'. Electroclash is what hotwires the Bodyrockers' sound system, and the scene's major players have all appeared, from DJ Hell and Tiga to Andrew Weatherall and the LCD Soundsystem.

Like the Heavenly Social in 1994, Body Rockers started inconspicuously (zero publicity, word of mouth promotion) at a time of uncertainty for the big club brands, and has come to an end at its peak, having defined a music scene and inspired many to start their own bands and nights. Tonight perfectly reflects that inspirational quality,

and how international the

scene has become. Ellen Allien from Berlin's influential Bpitch Control is playing alongside Fat Truckers from Sheffield, the ultra-camp Scissor Sisters from New York (whose live set is unfortunately scuppered by a sound problem) and bootleg mavericks Soulwax from Belgium. The UK contingent is made up of residents Lazarus, fast-rising star Erol Alkan and acid house evangelists FC Kahuna.

Despite some of the crowd having taken Billy Ray Cyrus as their sartorial inspiration, with mullets and trailer trash chic abounding, the night is far from pretentious. In fact, the place is a seething, sweaty mass, especially when Erol and Soulwax's party mix of pop (the traditional and electro variants) is in full swing. Pogoing and hollering fill the venue when key tunes -Alkan's favourite record 'Blue Monday'; New York punkfunkers The Rapture's 'House Of Jealous Lovers'; the noisy techno of tonal terrorist Vitalic - are aired.

And though the London night may be no more, a national Bodyrockers tour starts on October 25th in Glasgow. The robot army marches on...

s the sun blasts down, a local 'vendor' offers her wares on a Lisbon street corner disarmingly early in the morning after the night before. Rows of shiny sunglasses wink and a stall selling hand-held fans beckons. And a few brave pints of blood valiantly swim against the tidal wave of booze coursing through Muzik's system. It's all MTV's fault.

Having regularly delighted throngs of Euro clubbers with their annual blowouts in Ibiza, MTV last year came up against local regulations which forced them to move their party to Privilege a mere three weeks before it was due to be staged. Wishing to avoid any last minute venue changes this year, the Isle Of MTV superparty flounced off to Lisbon. And went off spectacularly.

Now a firm fixture in the summer clubbing calendar of any self-respecting party seeker, Isle Of MTV unfailingly attracts stellar line-ups, and this year is no exception. Three stages, set in the historic surroundings of the Torre De Belem on the waterfront, pump out a classy mix of homegrown and international talent. Local trio Yen Sung, Lux club resident Rui Vargas and big hitter Rui Da Silva are handed the early part of the evening to get the Portuguese party started. Not that the assortment of hyper-chic clubbing fashionistas, wide-eyed teenagers and an inexplicable number of middle-aged men with tidy moustaches and sweaters tied around their necks need much encouragement. Diminutive home town hero Da Silva drops 'Touch Me' and Portugal responds in dynamic fashion, with a cheer that might be heard back on the White Isle.

With the Torre twinkling in the darkness, French funkateers Cassius take to the stage for a brief but blinding set. They splice 'Get Ur Freak On' into a track from their new 'Au Reve' long player like a pair of twisted geneticists. Or a pair of DJs. Then Phillipe and Boombass wheel out the extraordinarily tonsilled Jocelyn Brown and the sweet Steve Edwards to show that da funk is still alive and thriving on the continent while the crowd go merrily merde de singe.

Genial host Roger Sanchez condenses his regular four-hour set into a rollickingly exciting disco hoedown. He tweaks and squeezes the EQ until everyone goes rightly ballistic when he drops 'Another Chance'.

The next part of the show is taken up by some very welcome British tourists. The blissfully laidback Morcheeba dazzle, while the Gorillaz make a rare live excursion with Damon Albarn joined by former Special Terry Hall on mic duties. Layo and Bushwacka! grin and gurn for Blighty, before the masterful X-Press 2 serve up a devilishly hypnotic peak time DJ set. Finally, as the sun peers over the top of the tower, the Minister Of Funk, Erick Morillo, finishes everyone off with a heady dose of Subliminal soul and dirty funk.

The bureaucrats on Ibiza should be weeping into their overpriced vodka-andcranberries at the moment, having let one the best parties of the summer slip from their grasp. But then Ibiza's loss is Lisbon's gain, as every partied-out punter here would agree.

The DJ Manual



his month I've mostly been in America! I've just finished touring with Sasha for his 'Airdrawndagger' tour, one of the best experiences of my life. Every gig was just brilliant, one after another. The American crowds are wonderful - so excitable, enthusiastic and open-minded – and the best thing is, they love their breakbeat.

So day one in New York was at The Arc, which I was told is like a mini Twilo. All they had was a mindblowing sound system and a strobe light. That's all that was needed. Danny Tenaglia is now the resident at this club, so I felt very privileged to play there.

Day two was at Avalon in Boston, where the venue hosts concerts and other events before it becomes a nightclub in the evening. I was on first and when I showed up, LL Cool J was just finishing his encore. It was bizarre, he had a woman crawling between his legs while filming her with his home video camera. When

the booty shaking was over, I found something more amusing - there was a life-size cardboard cut out of William Shatner (aka Captain Kirk) stood next to me in the DJ booth. The club kindly let me keep him and he too toured America with us, until we tried to book him in on our connecting flight to Houston, only for Continental Airlines to tell us that they wouldn't allow him on the plane because we had "too many items of luggage." So now I'm the proud owner of just William Shatner's head. He comes to all my gigs in my record box

Day three was in Miami, which is as bonkers as everyone says it is. Men looked like women, women looked like men – and at the venue I even had my name in lights!

The ego massage continued on day four in Washington, where a flamepainted limo picked us up – people were whooping as we drove through town! The interior had fibre optics and lava lamps – rock and roll! Day five in LA was amazing, as was day six in Chicago where we did a show promoted by the legendary Spundae organisation. They were the promoters for the gig on day seven in San Francisco too – a mind-blowing boat party for 400 people, with the Golden Gate Bridge as a backdrop. For someone like me – who until recently led a pretty sheltered life in Southampton – this was a pretty unbelievable introduction to the US.

The final gig of the tour was also in San Francisco, at an old theatre where they didn't seem to have changed the decor since the Twenties. People were dancing on the balconies on another brilliant night.

Since I've been back in Britain, I've already played at my regular haunt at Club Soda in Derby and Chew The Fat in London, as well as a marathon session at Lush in Northern Ireland, where I shared Jaffa Cakes with the crowd and scared them with some acid house from DK7. This was, inevitably, followed by an after-party. Post-Lush house parties have become kind of a ritual now – there was even a custom-made DJ booth for me in the front room! After recording six hours of mix tapes I had to get my flight home. Zzzz. . ."

Kicking off with ragga-tinged house, building and building via an audacious Stranglers bassline, his own productions and frantic displays of energy, Louis Edwards blew the roof off. While his fellow competitors walked away with a Sony MiniDisc player each, Louis celebrated his victory with a final set at the end of the night.

Involved in drum & bass and hip hop nights in and around Maidstone for some years, Louis says the Sony MiniDisc Cream Resident Competition gave him the chance to branch out.

"On the night I went into Nation confident I'd be trying something a bit different," he says. "So it wasn't so much about winning, more about turning a few heads. People seemed to like my sound and so did Cream, I guess. I'm not doing anything ground-breaking, just doing my thing and playing house music the way I like it."

The way he likes it turned out to be a joyful melee of influences drawing from all over the shop.

"For the last three years I've been at a design college doing a national diploma in 3-D design and had recently finished my first year doing a BA in architecture." he explains, "Design was my career, music is my passion, and I'm prepared to sacrifice my career to follow my passion, no doubt. I'm going to take time out from uni to focus on music.

"All I can say is there is hope for anyone with a real passion for what they're doing. I got into music because I loved it and I loved the dea of having your own interpretation of how it should sound. People are so rejuctant to

give opportunities, I know from experience, but believing in yourself is what it's about. Self-belief is the key. It'll be a shame if more people don't give more opportunities following this example. Cream have opened the door to me and I'm gonna jump through it and wave my arms around like a proper muppet!"
