Indeed. The latest in a long line of dance music artists with an unhealthy android fixation (you know – everyone from Kraftwerk to Daft Punk), MRF is currently wowing electro kids with his Tetsuo The Iron Man-style fire-shooting metal penis and light suits.

"It's so rock 'n' roll, I could die," gasps Howard. "My lights could electrocute me and my penis could burn the audience."

JOHN PEEL'S SONAR DIARY

The jewel in Radio l's crown talks us through his Sonar '03 experience. Are you sitting comfortably?

"I don't like aeroplanes, so Sonar started the Saturday before, as we drove down through France. Tonight, we have dinner with the press and I'm sat next to Muzik's editor Malik Meer. After dinner we go on to Gilles Peterson's programme and I tell people I'm not a dancing man due to shrapnel in my buttocks from the Korean war. Rather embarrassingly, considering I was about 11 when the Korean War ended, people believe this story."

Thursday 12/06

"Today we're up early and off to the Sonar Record Fair. There's such a wealth of stuff you have no choice but to base your purchasing decisions on the most superficial elements: artists with amusing names or records with beguiling graphics. This is fantastically superficial but given the bulk of material available there has to be an entry point. Shitkatapult is one of my favourite label names and they put out some good records. We were told that there was a

record label from Uzbekistan represented somewhere, so we spend a lot of time trying to track it down, though without success. I would be immensely interested to hear drum & bass from Uzbekistan or Turkmenistan. . . Or any of the other 'Stans, come to that. "I'm sitting here with a beer in

the shade, then I'm going back to the hotel for a lie down. Then it's off to the studio to do a four hour programme for wonderful Radio 1, and to play records for 30 minutes in the company of Jeff Mills."

Friday 13/06

"My four hour programme went well, although I was knackered and frankly just wanting to go to bed. Tonight is the tenth year anniversary party, where I have to follow Jeff Mills in the 'every DJ does 20 minutes' slot. By any applicable human standards he is not an easy act to follow. It's the first time I've ever played a Jimmy Reid record at immense volume in this context, and I am enormously satisfied with the result, though whether the slightly puzzled people in the audience cared for it, I don't really know. I finish with Cop Choir's 'You'll Never Walk Alone' to stamp my individuality on the proceedings."

Saturday 14/06

"More record shopping. In the evening see some Akufen. I want to see The Hacker but give up and instead go to see Jamie Liddell, but can't get into the room, it's so packed. Like Glastonbury, Sonar are overwhelmed by their own success, but it won't stop me going again." (ER)

Berlin's top electronica innovator and Sonar veteran Pole (aka Stephan Betke) casts his eye over proceedings

How many times have you been to Sonar?

"Five. I first came in '98, the year my first album came out. I was on the main Sonar Village stage playing some really dub influenced music and the sun was shining. People really liked it. There was a lot of smoking going on!"

What about this year?

"I've been playing a melodica, my favourite instrument of the moment. This is my dub influence, right? People like Augustus Pablo used the melodica a lot for their recordings. In my live shows my dub and reggae influences are represented by the bass and by the melodica and the hip hop is represented by the MC, Fat Jon. I love this guy!"

How does Sonar this year compare to previously?

"It's growing. They choose bigger names - Bjork, The Pet Shop Boys - so it is no longer the intimate festival that it was in the beginning. On one hand that's bad because the focus is more on money, but at the same time the underground artists they still invite reach a bigger audience." Best you've ever seen?

"Super_Collider, for the first time, around four years ago. That was really good.

Who's surprised you most?

"Safety Scissors last year. He's performing this year as well. When I came in just now he was sound checking, so I was surprised again."

You pioneered clicks and scratches, yet everyone here is now using that exact sound. . .

"That's the reason I stopped doing it! On my new album there are no glitches, no crackles, no hisses. It's overhyped at the moment. Part of me is happy that so many people jumped on this type of music but most of them are just copying it. It's not the right way to do it."

Did the Levi's 'Rub Yourself' advert kill it?

"Oh, have you seen it? It was really interesting to do. I think it worked."

Sum up Sonar for us. . .

"Besides that it's in Barcelona, with good weather and good red wine? The audience are excellent. Very friendly, open-minded people. They can see all different kinds of music and they'll always give it a chance. That's a positive thing."







Music 3000 – The Future Shape Of Sound









MANCHESTER: HOME TO PREMIERSHIP FOOTBALL, BODDINGTONS, AND PIGMASK SPORTING MENTALISTS V/VM

Spawned by the north of England's fertile mid-Nineties electronica scene, V/Vm (James Kirby and Andy 'Animal' Macgregor) became disillusioned by the mediocrity they saw clogging the arteries of the music industry. They chose instead to follow their own uncompromising muse: do what the fuck you like, when you like, and have a laugh while you're about it.

It's an attitude that's led V/Vm ('Volume Versus Mass') to produce grinding noise assaults and pleasing ambient interludes, endless cover versions (from Spiller to 'Survivor'), and to DJ with cabbages. Here's five reasons why you need them in your life.

1. IT'S FAN-DABI-DOZI!

V/Vm's new double CD compilation, 'It's Fan-Dabi-Dozi' (disturbing kids' TV duo The Krankies' catchphrase), is their best release yet. Highlights include neo-poodle rock from Fast Lady (who sound like they were DNA-cloned from the Def Leppard drummer's missing arm), mutoid electro from Andy Calorie and a truly astonishing rendition of The Bangles' 'Eternal Flame' by Rank Sinatra. So, why choose The Krankies to 'spearhead' the project?

James: "I like the way these people just keep going. The Krankies, or Russ Abbott, or Bobby Davro. . . they're all shit but they just carry on."

Andy: "I like Russ because he was shit, but he tried his hand at many different styles. That's what we're like."

2. PUMP UP THE HAM

Why V/Vm love rave.

James: "We were 15 or 16 in about 1989, and at that time there was something new every month. You had the early rave and hardcore and drum & bass but then after that, in about '93, '94, it started going backwards. So we started doing V/Vm in about '96. This

year it's 15 years since the Summer Of Love. It's all love for us anyway, but we're gonna sit down and recreate acid house. Put some energy back into it." **Andy:** "Put the electrodes in and pump it up! [sings acid oldie 'Pump Up London' by Mr Lee] 'Pump it up.

Chicago, London, Miami, Didsbury. . . "

3. DANCING WITH MEAT

The least disliked of V/Vm's remixes is probably their cover version of Chris De Burgh's 'Lady In Red'.

James: "One of my friends is a teacher and there was a school trip to a TV studio. Then, the day before he calls me up and says, 'Chris De Burgh is gonna be there!' So I went down and gave him the record. I just said 'it's one you might recognise', winked at him and walked off. Brilliant. He looked at it, looked me up and down and that was it – didn't say a thing."

4. THERE IS NO LAW

V/Vm's guide to nicking other people's music and getting away scot-free.

Andy: "Other people just haven't got our attitude. When they used to waffle on about taking three-second loops, we were like, 'we took the whole fucking track and we don't even care'. Bootlegging has been absorbed by the industry now anyway. It's a commercial strategy. I haven't made anything out of it though."

5. UNBEATABLE BARGAINS

Everything must go. Everything.

James: "V/Vm is like the DFS of the music world. There's a sale every weekend and it's got to end. It's always going to end, it could be just one day away from ending, but it never does. One day we'll have Frank Bruno on the web site welcoming you, going. . ."

Andy: "'It's knockout Harry, that!" (TM)







Deep in the basement of Radio 1, 30 minutes into Tim Westwood's Saturday night show, Chicago's most famous 'conscious' rapper Common is getting mad love from the UK's streets.

Caller *1: "Common, Common? Fucking hell that's unbelievable, am I talking to the great man?"

Common: "What's her name?"

Caller *4: "Harpal."

Common: "Hey Harpo"

Caller *4's wife: "Is that really you Common? My husband's your biggest fan!"


Common: "I appreciate that man." Caller *5: "I'm ready to jump on the next album, but I'm still feeling the last one. Can I spit something down the line to you?"

Unfortunately for caller five (but luckily for Common) there's no time, as the self proclaimed "hip hop hippy" has to get back on air for an impromptu live rap session. He freestyles in his lazy drawl for a solid three minutes, rhyming Radio 1 with gun, Westwood with understood and peace with 93 Feet East (where Timothy will later be playing).

In town for a sell-out show in Shepherd's Bush tomorrow night, promoting his current album 'Electric Circus', Common looks humbled and bemused by the praise thrown his way. After all, Westwood's 'historic' show prides itself on thugged out, wannabe gangsta, 'ghetto black' values. In the hip hop stakes it couldn't be further opposed to what Common represents spirituality, soulful goodness, being yourself, "geeking out".

Being embraced by Westwood's listenership is proof that the old hip hop battle of thugs versus hippies is over. With Common's peers - The Roots, Talib Kweli, Mos Def and Erykah Badu et al - all sustaining million-selling album careers and the likes of Pharell Williams sprinkling soulful niceness on gangsta records, rap's landscape has changed.

"Hip hop is in such a brilliant place at the moment," says Common, on the way to tonight's second radio stop at XFM's All City Radio. "I think the 'keep it real' phase of hip hop became 'yo, I gotta prove to people that I'm street.' People equated having fun with being soft and cats wanted to prove they were authentic... and that's what was getting respect from the industry. § It's a shame because it took away the imagination, and imagination is



such a beautiful thing. We can't predict where hip hop's going, but it's moved to where we wanted it to."

Common's remapping of hip hop began in 1992 with his critically acclaimed debut album 'Can I Borrow A Dollar?' Three albums later (following 1994's 'Resurrection' and 1997's 'One Day It'll All Make Sense') he hit pay dirt with 2000's soulful, loved up 'Like Water For Chocolate'.

Since joining the hip hop big time he's starred in an 'ironic' Coca Cola ad and guested on Mary J Blige's 'Dance With Me' single. She returns the favour alongside Prince, The Neptunes, Stereolab, Jill Scott and girlfriend Erykah Badu on his new album 'Electric Circus'. It's an album that sprinkles a huge dollop of Pink Floyd, Hendrix and leftfield oddness all over the trad conscious rap rulebook.

Next month's ace single, 'New Wave' continues Common's ascent thanks to guest vocals from Stereolab's Laetitia Sadler, a Tom Tom Club sample and the shouldn't-work-but-they-do disco punk remixes courtesy of Trevor Jackson. Common has yet to hear the remixes, but as long they're progressive, he's happy.

"With 'Electric Circus' I wanted to push the boundaries of what people expect hip hop to sound like," he says. "I wasn't trying to please certain crowds. I listen to Hendrix, Miles Davis, Prince, Steely Dan and Pink Floyd – there's freedom in those records, not being scared to take the subject matter to a certain place. It's music that takes you out of yourself and that's what I'm trying to recreate." (MM)



Benny lives in Reggio Emilia, the birthplace of many a pop-house hit.

But best of all, every artist on the roster contributes to the central Toah Dynamic project. "We're like the Wu Tang Clan. You've got the main group, which is Toah, then all the solo projects," says Acne, "Um, only ours aren't all produced by one person, and they all sound different." We asked Toah Dynamic to sum up the Spies' ethos. They said: "Short fuses, long memories. Ain't

no feeble bastards, no fucking scapegoats. Yo





Only the previous week, we'd been complaining that clubs and gigs are too quiet these days, never leaving you with that familiar ringing, blood rush sound in your ears afterwards. Now, those words are coming back to haunt us. Or at least we think they are – it's hard to tell over the all-enveloping racket. We are in the sound womb, and our evil mother is The Bug.

"There's a physicality to volume," says Kevin 'The Bug' Martin later.

"Once music reaches a certain volume it appeals to people in a really primitive, fundamental way."

Carried at such high volume, The Bug's music is an overwhelming mix of sound system bass, electronic science and dancehall energy.

"So much music is like wallpaper these days," spits Kevin. "And people complain that music's not selling as well? Of course it's not fuckin' selling as well! The industry's just this big middle mass of 'tastefulness'."

From the industrial free jazz of God to the power hip hop of Techno Animal, Kevin's musical projects have always kicked 'tastefulness' away in favour of exploration into the outer limits. The Bug is his most balls-out, full-on incarnation yet, but the project was originally activated in 2001 out of a classic reggae combo of sufferation and vexation.







"I was extremely broke and pissed off and questioning whether I wanted to be involved with music," recalls Kevin. "I was looking for something that was different, personal. Everything I've ever done has involved dub but still, I felt I hadn't gone far enough into that, and I hadn't worked with enough vocallists from that culture. I wanted to make the dub/reggae influence more apparent."

Initially making mesmeric, dubby techno, comparable to Rhythm And Sound, The Bug really began to take wing when ragga influences were stirred in. A stream of unstoppable seven-inches began to emerge – 'Politicians And Paedophiles', 'Killer', 'WWW' – all crackling with a raw, vibrant energy quite at odds with a white bread underground, obsessed with laptop abstraction.

"There's a punk side to dancehall," says Kevin. "A lot of the artists seem

to come from totally poverty stricken backgrounds, and that makes for a very full-on vocal performance. They're singing for survival, not some fuckin' careerist opportunity."

This desperation can lead straight to places that your average dance and electronica head doesn't really want to go, however – homophobia, lyrical 'slackness', big fuck-off guns...

"I've got contradictory emotions about dancehall's lyrics," admits Kevin. "On the one hand, I love it because it's uncensored and there's a ferocity to it. At the same time, sure, I find some of the sentiments repulsive, but for me there's an attraction to the dark side. I encourage the vocallists I work with to sing about what vexes them, but I tell 'em I'm not interested in any 'batty boy' shit, or any empty slackness."

The Bug's old fanbase of industrial goths may not like it ("I've had

comments along the lines of 'I don't want to hear some black guy ranting' or 'it's not industrial enough'. I really couldn't give a fuck.") but the love has flown freely from elsewhere. The Bug's been caned by everyone from the Muzik office's various factions to "Andy Weatherall, Adrian Sherwood, [The Specials'] Jerry Dammers, Aphex Twin... it's quite scary."


It was Aphex's label Rephlex that stepped in to put out The Bug's album 'Pressure' when a previous deal fell through. Although unfairly considered by some to be the home of beardy student music, Rephlex is arguably Britain's finest electronic label, with releases by such diverse talents as hardcore legend DJ Scud, horror-tech specialist Lory D and electro-acoustic sound sculptor Pierre Bastien.

"I wouldn't say I have an affinity with most of Rephlex's acts, but I like the label's open-mindedness. I like what they're trying to do," says Kevin.

It's that open-mindedness that sees the Rephlex crowd at Plastic People – who were earlier standing, slack-jawed in the gale of Aphex's exciting new noize DJing direction – bugging out to The Bug. "I was worried that they were all Aphex nerds and that The Bug would go down like shit," says a relieved Kevin afterwards. "I didn't think they'd get it."

Cramming the 'floor, endangering both their hearing and their coolness, trying to flex to The Bug's sensual off-beat riddims, Rephlex's crowd quite obviously do get it. Why wouldn't they? It's raw, it's rough, it's sexy and it's punk – perfect dance music, in other words. What's not to get? (DB)

hen Cream closed, we were told it was indicative of a crisis in British clubbing. 12 months on, however, it looks more like a liberation. And though the superclub era is over, British clubbing has rarely looked so vibrant. If the enduring success of clubs like Trash and Optimo proves a thirst for change, the death of the superclub has meant a raft of underground nights taking British clubbing back to grass roots level, where it belongs. These are people throwing parties not because they want to build a globally recognisable

'brand' but because they're bored with perma-tanned Ibiza 'n' coke elitism, predictable DJs, extortionate prices and dull, cattle-shed clubs.

More to the point, they love new music. And they want you to love it too. Even if there's only 100 of you. They're not really promoters and half these DJs can't mix, but in cheap pubs and grubby clubs, they're trying new ideas, making mistakes and doing magical things on a shoestring, for just as long as they find it interesting. It's not superclubbing – it's fuckin' ace clubbing. **(TN)**





JAMES MURPHY OF THE OFA'S SOLO PROSECT IS ALL ABOUT KEEPING IT REAL, KEEPING A SENSE OF HUMOUR, AND PISSING OFF THE SNOBS.

here are probably 100
things you shouldn't do on
ecstasy, and getting a tattoo is
surely one of them. But, that's
what James Murphy – front
man with LCD Soundsystem,
producer of The Rapture and Radio 4
and boss of DFA records – did one
Wednesday afternoon in New York in
1999. Before it happened, things
had got a little crazy, he says.

Murphy had signed up to produce David Holmes's 'Bow Down To The Exit Sign' album, which would have been fine if the Belfast DJ hadn't turned up with a head full of talk and little else. He couldn't play any instruments or work any of the equipment.

"I was like 'what am I going to do?" remembers Murphy. "I was used to working with bands who are like 'what kind of head do you use on your snare drum?' And there I was making a record for a guy who can't do anything." Still, Murphy managed to work his magic and there were certain side-benefits too. "I spent the entire summer dancing, E'd out of my fucking gourd," he recalls. "It was my summer of love."

However, there was trouble in paradise – Murphy was unable to reconcile the idea of producing "trendy dance music" with his roots playing in various keep-it-real indie groups. As he was coming down one afternoon while listening to free jazz legend Ornette Coleman's 'This Is Our Music', it hit him. If he made music the way he wanted to, if he was true to himself, then it didn't matter. So, he charged down to his friend who ran a tattoo parlour and got the words THIS IS OUR MUSIC emblazoned on his right forearm.

We mention this, not just because it's a good story, but because the dilemmas of what you're meant to and what you're not meant to do, and what's trendy and what's not, surrounds everything James Murphy does. Famously, it was the subject of his 2002 LCD Soundsystem single, 'Losing My Edge', with its aging

hipster narrator, who was there at the first ever Can show and who sold his guitars to buy decks. It was a big hit with DJs and club promoters.

"Most of them were like, 'hey, you really showed those trendy losers with that one!'" he says. "I'm like, 'I'm making fun of myself, jackass!' It's not like I'm the real guy and all these tragic poseurs are crowding me out. I'm a tragic poseur, too."

Eventually, Murphy got so fed up with everyone telling him how clever he was, he recorded a song called 'Here Comes The Backlash'. "I wanted a song that would erase that song. Then I thought, 'don't be so fucking stupid.' Thank God I didn't put it out. But, I wasn't used to getting that attention, so I went through a stage where I was both chuffed and paranoid."

'Losing My Edge' was the single that turned the world on to DFA – the New York-based production outfit Murphy runs with Tim Goldsworthy. By this stage though, DFA (it stands for Death From Above) had been a sound system and desk-bashing team for a couple of years and through working with The Juan McLean, Radio 4 and The Rapture they had become very fashionable indeed.

"Luckily", he says, "everyone loathed everything I did as a kid, so I'm in no danger of running off and believing the press when they say I'm 'the Pharrell Williams of punk-funk'."

People were astonished by Murphy and Goldsworthy's accomplishments behind the desk, but this was only achieved through a certifiably old school work ethic. The antithesis of how a cool recording outfit should behave, in fact: Murphy is in the studio 16 hours a day, seven days a week. "I have no interest in our indie credibility," he states.

"'Independent' is supposed to mean open-minded, yet that scene has some of the most close-minded, judgemental, formula-following fucks I've ever met. That attitude is reprehensible. People like David Bowie and T Rex – massive pop stars – were far more punk than the people who consider themselves underground now. You're going to make a tougher record than 'Queen Bitch'? A crazier record than 'Low'? No. You're fucking definitely not."


So, between trying to finish the LCD Soundsystem album, promote DFA, produce The Rapture and keep his business head on straight, Murphy is happy to answer the phone to any Big Popstar Seeking Remixer.

"I'm not an asshole," he explains.
"We could make more money
remixing one song than putting out
an album now. We need funds and I
want to engage with popular culture.
I would love to do a Madonna or
Britney mix and produce Radio 4.
But, we won't touch the middle stuff
- those fake, major label, 'sensitive'
rock bands who want cred."

The point is: you've got to mean it. Trendy, indie, punk, dance, major-league pop star, super-cool New York producer... James Murphy has resolved all these things. It doesn't matter. Just so long as he never forgets: THIS IS OUR MUSIC. (JD)


Aphex Twin heads up the new entertainment through pain revolution





The boys are letting nothing out of the studio for the moment, but we're led to believe that what they've recorded so far is 'the trademark Jaxx sound, but pushing in new, soulful, angry, and beautiful directions.' Finally, producers to the stars NERD (aka The Neptunes' funk-rock-hip hop band) are ready to drop their new LP in October. There's little word on it so far, but a smattering of special guests would surely not be out of place and, if Pharrell's word is to be believed it'll be called 'Fly Or Die'. Wot would you loike me to saay?" says Outkast's Andre Lauren Benjamin, aka Andre 3000, aka (not Doctor) Dre, in his best English accent. Muzik suggests that on this murky Californian day, the more flamboyant half of the world's greatest hip hop duo pretend to order some fish and chips, gor blimey.


"Ca' get a plate of fiosh and chiops?" says the nattily dressed Dre, fingering his cravat.

"Woz that awright?" he asks, the odd Georgia vowel slipping into his Esuary English. "I do it all the tiome. I loike to say 'youknowwhatlomean?' youknowwhatlomean?"

It's more than awright. In the world of hip hop, producers never act silly, but then they never talk politics and religion as eloquently as Dre's partner, Antwan Andre Patton, aka Big Boi. They are seldom to be found drawing a neat analogy between society's attitude to pit-bull terriers and the black experience, speaking of the trials of single parenthood, or recounting the occasion their aunt saw a flying saucer. The likes of MF Doom and Kool Keith may make music of comparable genius, but they don't, alas, do it while selling bazillions of records.

Outkast, Dre and Big Boi, are mainstream hip hop's leading savants and scholars. Their latest ploy? To step up to their thuggish, increasingly tired contemporaries and breezily scuff their Hi-Tops, by recording the best - and only psychedelic-drum&bass-heavy-metalsoul-gospel-funk album with ballads about penal reform and necrophilia of the year.

The album in question – the twin CD monster 'Spearkerboxx/The Love Below' – is stuffed with joints that leave Outkast's international smash hit 'Ms Jackson' in the dirt, and make even the supa-fly deep south psychedlia of its parent album 'Stankonia' look pedestrian.

First single 'Ghetto Music', "inspired by heavy metal," is a deranged, bass-heavy barrage of techno beats and slices of Patti Labelle. It's a perfect introduction to the album, on which the duo have written and produced one CD each.


Big Boi's disc 'Speaker Box', is a 74-minute, funkin' weeded-out party of a record with Killer Mike, Jay-Z and Bubba Sparxxx making appearances. Dre's CD, 'The Love Below', by contrast, contains no rap songs. He apparently had "nothing to talk about". Guests include Norah Jones and actress, Rosario Dawson. It sounds, simultaneously like The Byrds, Prince, Rick James, XTC and µ-ziq with Benny Hill crashing the party. You definitely won't be hearing such, wit, verve and freakiness on Murder Inc or Bad Boy any time soon.

Records Outkast like:

Dre: "Some people blow my mind. Like when I listen to Prince; he humbles me and lets me know, hey, I've got a long way to go. But, Squarepusher and Aphex Twin? They BLOW my mind. Because, when I'm listening to their music, there's so much going on, you don't know where a song started. They freak computers, and I love it." Big Boi: "I love Kate Bush. I don't think enough people know about her. Her music opened me up to everything. I was maybe in eighth grade when I listened to her, 1988-89. I love that fucking shit man, I love Kate Bush. I might have to get her to do me a track. I gotta call my record company, try to contact her, cos we're going over to Europe in July."

We meet Outkast at a recording studio in Los Angeles, where Dre is frantically putting the finishing touches to the album. He draws up alone in a cream, four door Mercedes, his triangular Afro bobbling as he steps out. Big Boi marches through the back door, flanked by his girlfriend of four years and his tour manager.

Big Boi is the easiest to approach. He flew in from Atlanta yesterday, and on touching down he went to the Snatch club, drank Bailey's and smoked some weed before







"murdering the mic" with an impromptu freestyle performance. 12 hours on and he's smoking again, offering Muzik a toke – "That's smoker's etiquette."

Dre has brought his own clothes to the photo-shoot, donning an informal selection of traditional men's tailoring. Speaking as a part time clothes designer, Dre's favourite material at the moment is tweed. The last garment he made for himself was a nice pair of slacks, and he is currently drawing sartorial inspiration from 'the gentleman'. He's initially shyer, avoiding eye contact, but he soon warms up, clicking his fingers and slapping his legs when he's had fun answering a question.

He only looks sad when talking about his side of the album. He's written all his songs, but he can't get them finished right.

"It's been a long, strenuous process. Pretty much at this point, I'm sick of it. I'm just ready to put it out as it is."

Outkast on stealing cars

Dre: "We used to do it at high school. It was easy. You'd break the steering column and stuff a screwdriver into the ignition. I did it with three of my homeboys. One of them just got out of jail and the other one will get out in eight, nine years."

Big Boi: "Volkswagens were the easiest. I remember one time we were trying to get one from a church. Just as we were taking it this big dude came out from nowhere and was like: 'Hey baby, that's not cool.' I thought I was going to jail that night."

Dre and Big Boi met at Atlanta's Tri-City High School, having both transferred there in 1991, when they were 16. The boys bonded early, during a window shopping expedition to the nearby Lennox Square Mall. Big Boi caught the train back to Dre's that evening and stayed the night.

To begin with neither had a great many friends, yet soon their social circle widened, and their clique of around five other pupils rose to the top of the collegiate social order. They began to smoke spliffs, chase girls and write rhymes together, recording with local production heroes, Organized Noize.

Extra-curricular activities grew to dominate and the pair quit full-time education when they were 17. Jobs at

various fast food outlets and trainer shops followed. They tried drug dealing too, but found they weren't very good at it, breaking the dealer's first rule by getting high on their own supply before they could sell it.

Then, ten years ago, in 1993, swing beat magnate LA Reid signed them to La Face. They haven't worked conventional jobs since.

Outkast on The Church:

Dre: "The church has had a huge influence. Church gave me my first introduction to songs and spirit and the way people let loose and do screams and hollers. Jazz and gospel is where funk comes from. American music was born in the South, no question."

Big Boi: "I used to have to go to church every Sunday, to both Sunday school and regular church. The church and gospel music are strong in the south, because of slavery being down there. People needed a place to celebrate, down there."

Andre commits necrophilia in the video for the first single taken from his half of the album, 'The Love Below'. He sings a love song while he prepares his dead girlfriend's body for the grave. Called 'She Lives in My Life', it's a bit like hearing 'The Ballad of Dorothy Parker' after necking half a bottle of Rohypnol.

"The video has a lot to do with the movie," explains Dre who is starring in the first of a series of movies made by cable TV channel HBO. "My parents own a mortuary, and I work for the funeral home. I fall in love with this girl, Rosario Dawson, she dies, and I have to prepare her body."

Keen to get his acting career off the ground ("I'm getting practising, trying to study acting a little more.") Dre may also play Jimi Hendrix in a forthcoming biopic, and is working on a period piece, set in New York in 1976, in which he is a pianist, framed for the murder of his punk girlfriend.

Although initially reticent, once he's hit his stride, Dre speaks very openly, willing to talk about everything from the first time his heart was broken to the longest he's ever gone without sex.

"In tenth grade, a girl named Tracey broke my heart. I went away over summer and I came back and found out she kissed – and probably more than kissed – one of my homeboys. There was this Leila Hathaway song out at the time called 'I'm Coming Back' and I used to sit and listen to that song and cry."

"Another time I got my heart broke by a girl and I didn't have sex for almost a year. I did a lot of prayin', hoping god would send me some girl with her head screwed on straight. Then I met Erykah [Badu, for who's mother he wrote 'Ms Jackson' after they split up and Badu was left to look after their child]."

If Dre's half of the album is about anything it's stripping away pretension, bearing your love for all to see. Dre talks about the track he's cut with Norah Jones, called 'Take Off Your Cool'.

"When a guy and a girl first meet each other, they put on this facade, trying to act a certain way. This song is about really just taking that all off and being yourself."

And the title, 'The Love Below'?
"It's that feeling. Everyone has a
front or facade they put on and that
love below is that real thing you can't
hold down. Almost like a weed that
grows up through the cracks. That's
what the love below is, that
undeniable feeling that surges up no
matter what you try to put on top."

Dre on Moby

Dre: "My boy Moby ran up on me at the MTV awards, and said 'I want to do a song with you.' Now, I was like 'Noooooo! I like you Moby, but everybody else hates you!' [Laughter from everyone in earshot.]

"'If I work with you, they're going to hate me too. That ain't good. I can't go down with your ship.' I'll produce it, but God damn, brother. . ."
[More laughter.]

Dre says the most commonly misunderstood aspect of Outkast is that "Big Boi is a street thug and that I'm crazy. And that's totally wrong. Big Boi is way more than that and I'm not crazy at all."

At only 5'8" tall, Big Boi is hardly the most imposing hoodlum. He's never cold or abrupt and illustrates almost every point with a story about one of his family, some highlights of which are his uncle introducing him to weed and his late aunt Renne having spotted a UFO when driving between Atlanta and Boi's hometown of Savannah.

Though seperated from them, Big Boi still keeps in touch with his kids and their mothers.

"We're all real close and cool," he says. "I've been there on the first day of school and graduation. Gone on field trips to the aquarium, hay rides with the kids, all that type of shit."





Outkast on success, regrets and pride

Dre: "I regret not paying attention to the business aspect of the music earlier. I'm most proud when people say stuff like they couldn't have finished college without our music."

Big Boi: "Success is when you're satisfied with your self as a person; you've set goals, achieved them and are about to set new ones too. Not sticking to my piano lessons like I should have, that's what I regret. I'm most proud of the music"

Big Boi is also the more politically committed of the pair. It was he who rapped about airport layoffs after September 11th. On the new album he addresses the penal system, the war in Iraq and the Presidential elections.

"That microphone reaches the world. I'm going to let motherfuckers know that that shit was bullshit."


Rather than the sappy airhead/ thugged-out meathead Dre/Big Boi divide, it's probably better to think of Dre as an aesthete in lofty isolation, while Big Boi remains grounded, keeping his ears open and recognising what hooks will work in the clubs. Their manager Blue reckons that the pair worked best together on 'Aquameni', the album before 'Stankonia', and have been on diverging paths since.

Don't expect any solo deals just yet, though. Despite inevitable differences of opinion, Outkast remain good friends, and good for each other.


Seeing them together during the shoot – Dre, laughing, in high waist pinstripe pants, as Big Boi in Adidas throws


shapes and growls "Old school!" – it doesn't appear that the musical marriage of hip hop's odd couple has reached crisis point yet. That's something we should all feel damn grateful for, because Outkast, at the peak of their powers, have made the best record of this summer. Free your mind and your ass, heart and funny bone will follow. . . (AR)

ot so long ago, dance music worked pretty simply: big DJs played big tunes in big clubs for big money for us – the lucky public.

Today, the Napster-assisted bootleg craze, CD burners and mixers, cheap virtual studio technology and new music sharing networks like Limewire are conspiring to reverse the orthodoxy and topple all monopolies. A revolution is happening – at 128kilobytes per second.

Unsigned Brighton duo Radio Slave -Matt Edwards and Serges Santiago – don't just produce, remix, play and share music. Like a million other laptopians round the world, they're fundamentally remixing the way dance culture thinks about itself.

Their approach is to take hype tracks of the moment, tweak a few frequencies and re-edit their own versions in double quick time. Kylie, Britney, Daft Punk, Justin Timberlake, Lil' Kim, The White Stripes, Lumidee,

Kardinal Offishall, Tiga, Adonis and 50 Cent have all fallen into the Radio Slave toaster and emerged with a sunny remix complexion, often far in advance of official record company releases, and their speediest turnaround was just 45 minutes.

"It was for a Beyonce track," says Matt. "In the post Wednesday, played on Pete Tong's show Friday. We can get two re-edits ready in a week and then play them out on Friday."

Anyone with a computer, a phone line and an ear for a tune can rattle out their own re-edits, in the process transforming themselves into a new model of unitary producer, remixer, distributor, CEO and DJ, capable of wresting dance music back from the control of the few.

If it seems easy, that's because it is. Advanced DJ/producer lifeforms such as Osymyso and Four Tet's Kieren Hebden have long eulogised the simplicity and flexibility of digital technology, and 2001's bootleg fad happened expressly because
Napster allowed easy access to digital
acappellas and instrumentals – the
kind of highly-prized fodder that saved
Erol Alkan, Richard X or Freelance
Hellraiser hours of rooting around
second hand record shops.

Napster also fundamentally re-drew the laws of music commerce in ways


platforms. Apple are even rumoved to be in talks to acquire global record label Universal. Warners and Nokia, and Motorola and MTV have both done deals to deliver music content direct to your mobile phones.

For now, however, fighting the tide of highly personalised, freely available,

that made those in the industry more jumpy than ever, and are only now being properly understood, liberating the way music is produced, shared and consumed. It's significant that the on-line music sales market leader at present is not an established music company, but Apple, whose iTunes/iPod/iMusicstore interface is the current state of the art in digital music

illegal music seems impossible. Digital technology places power in the hand of the consumers, and those with the tools at their disposal have evolved a DIY mindset alongside it: somewhere between punk spirit, acid house initiative, techno geekdom and streetlevel ducking and diving (or 'theft' if you prefer). The revolution will be digitised, and it will be fun. **(KB)**



Sugababes and Liberty X cool works the same

When the first Girls On Top single, 'Being Scrubbed', appeared almost three years ago, it felt special. It was fashioned from retro raw materials -TLC and the Human League - and it sounded like the future. But quite frankly, no one could have predicted the rise of its

creator, Richard X, from amiable Northern studio bod to star-making pop colossus. He used to make obscure bootlegs that got spun down Trash; now he's one of the most sought-after producers in the world, last heard attempting to resuscitate TLC's flatlining career (oh, the irony!) in the

same magical way he rescued Sugababes and Liberty X. At the point where you heard he was out in Ibiza. making pilled-up acid house with P Diddy, on rented Casio keyboards, you realised that absolutely anything could happen if Richard X was involved



Even better, he's still remained the amiable Northern studio bod, despite getting phonecalls from Janet Jackson, and despite being able to convince Jarvis Cocker, Kelis and Tiga to guest on his debut album. That's what makes him so cool: he's not in it for the fame or money (kickstarting your career with copyright-infringing bootlegs isn't a fasttrack to a ton of cash). He's in it to

make great pop music.

Admittedly, 'Volume One' is not so much a cohesive album as a showcase for a series of stellar collaborations. Incredibly, the two you know ('Freak Like Me' and 'Being Nobody') are completely outclassed by the likes of 'You Used To',

a stunningly beautiful, Moroder-esque slice of robot dreampop that features 'Popstars: The Rivals' reject Javine. The Tiga hook-up 'You (Better Let Me Love You x4)' is great Heaven 17-style powerpop, while 'Just Friends' is like Matmos remixing the Blade Runner soundtrack.

And then there's 'Into You': Jarvis Cocker, pneumatic r&b breaks, and a luminescent sample from Mazzy Star. It recalls the work C Swing did on the Beta Band's 'Hot Shots II', but more specifically sounds, ladies and gentlemen, like you're floating in space. It encapsulates what Richard X is all about – mashing together the very best elements he can get his hands on into

something magical.

Given the ambition of Richard's vision, it's little surprise that there's the odd misfire. Caron Wheeler's cameo 'Lonely' is a bit of a mess, Prince-funk squished to fit electro patterns. Elsewhere, the cover of 'Walk On By' with the Flying Lizards' Deborah Evans-Stickland is a joke only Neil Tennant would find funny, while Mark Goodier's appearance, yapping about "The best

album in the world ever", is a joke that nobody would find funny.

No matter. The meat of this album contains some of the greatest pop music since Donna met Giorgio, since Burns met Waterman, since Bangalter met Guy-Man. It's Richard X versus The World from now on, and you can bet that he'll come out on top.

"Because it seems lately people have been renting out hip hop, thinking they can borrow it. This album's about taking it back."

Do you think the industry can sustain a hip hop artist's career in the same way as, say, AC/DC or Michael Jackson?

"Definitely, so long as the records are marketed and promoted right. It really depends on how much money is put into it. We can't always control that." How important was it to you that your last album, 1998's 'Moment Of Truth', went gold?

"Very important. Up until then, we had received critical success and gained an underground rep, but it really hadn't been reflected in the sales."

What was the first record you rhymed over?

"Good Times". This was three months after hip hop started, and everyone was rhyming over that record then." Your father was the first African American judge in Boston. Did he approve of your chosen career?

"It was difficult. Our family were well known in our community. When the city wanted to appoint a judge, my father was the obvious choice. But when I started doing this hip hop shit he went crazy. Premier went through the same thing. His father was the head of the Chemistry department at the same university down in Texas, where Primo was the big DJ on campus. Moving to New York helped me step out of his shadow, and now its okay, because I'm a made man." (AR)



Patchy album from American hippy house legends

Veterans of the San Fran house scene Dubtribe Sound System, aka – don't laugh, now – Sunshine and Moonbeam Jones, have earned a fine reputation on the basis of their singles 'Equitoreal' and 'Do It Now'. Unfortunately, their album doesn't deliver the same high quality throughout. When Sunshine and Moonbeam avoid cliche and tone down the overly poppy elements the musical magic of 'Do It Now' appears like a

genie from a bottle. It can be heard on the dubby, sunset-friendly 'The Rhythm In Your Mind', Rideline', 'Nothing Is Impossible' and 'Make Me Stronger'. But on the weaker 'Freeway', disco-lite 'This Is The Time' and awful 'Autosou' the quality wanes drastically, leaving you even more upset that they've left off the excellent 'Equitoreal'. It's quite a relief when 2000's 'Do It Now' rounds off the LP with 12 minutes of pure, deep house excellence, complete with the sweet fusion of E-shiver plano chords, insistent bass and laid back, Beloved-style vocals.



welrd world of Kid Acne

Comin' through like "a right fat knacker," Kid Acne's debut is a bus ride through warily observed council estates full of inbred babies with "pierced ears, skinheads and thick wrists", truckstop caffs where you can drink "bottomless teeeeea!" (it's all in the styling, guy) and the id and ego of man like Acne. Music is provided by Reg One, and the Warp beat assassin delivers a whirlwind of dope scratches, foul drums and dementedly tinny cocktail pianos, leaving bare space for Acne to drop lyric. And what lyrics, they are. Laugh out loud funny, sometimes brilliantly clever one verse works an elaborate wordplay about word processor fonts and siege weaponry around the word 'Trebuchet' - sometimes brilliantly stupid. Our particular favourite? Gotta be "I step out the pub and say/Girls have you seen this?/I can write my name with the piss out my penis". Funnier and more pointedly observant than The Streets, this is a benchmark for UK hip hop and, come to that, for the representation of UK culture (specifically northern culture) in popular music.

Whenever a band pops up with a single as dreamily magnificent as 'Daydream In Blue', you can't help but wonder how they're going to follow it. Yet when 'Neveroddoreven' opens with a 'Little Fluffy Clouds'-echoing cock-crow, before launching into a chunk of otherworldly electro-pop, you almost think they're going to match it. Then, alas, the vocoder rears its ugly head and it all takes a downward turn. Here's how it goes down guys - Daft Punk's 'Discovery' was officially the last time that anyone could get away with this. Why ruin an otherwise good record by making it sound like some dodgy Cher cast-off? That's not to say that it's all bad from there on - you only have to listen to the electronica-county fusion of 'Stobart's Blues' and the quirky Juliaby dub of 'The Blue Wrath' to realise that these Sheffield reprobates are genuinely talented individuals - but to make a truly great album you need consistency, something that's unfortunately just not much in evidence here.

There's a coterie of Brithoppers for whom the Daisy Age never ended. After DJ Format's Tribe-ish excursions come The Nextmen, with what seems at first listen like little more than a pretty good Blackalicious album. Luckily, Bristolian producers Dom Search and Baloo are steeped as much in dancehall, reggae and UK garage as they are old Tribe Called Quest and Jurassic 5 twelves. So while they can do consummate East Coast jazz hop like 'Marlon Brando' and '20 Round Bout', they really come into their own when they splice this with booming electro bass and rough toasting from Cutty Ranks on 'Silent Weapon' (not, as you might think, a song about farting), or underpin Dynamite MC's rhymes with skittering jungle breaks on 'High Score'. 'Get Over It' isn't as as muscular and fresh as Fallacy's 'Blackmarket Boy', but they both share an admirable desire to pinch the best bits of American and British street sounds and mould them into a truly innovative transatlantic hybrid.





MOTORBASS Pansoul (Labels/EMI) Timely relasue of the seminal French Touch classic

More than even Daft Punk's debut album, 'Pansoul' was the foundation stone of the French Touch. A collaboration between Philippe Zdar (La Funk Mob, Cassius) and Etienne de Crecy (Super Discount) the album offered the sounds of Detroit and

Chicago rewired through the grooves of French hip hop and Parisian cool. What resulted was a delicious mixture of dark, aching grooves, kitsch melody and liquid ambience all fused into a series of slow burning, emotional epics. When 'Pansoul' was first released, almost eight years ago, Muzik made it album of the month after just one listen. Today it still sounds stunning. Timeless in fact.

So, eight years on, does 'Pansoul' still stand up?

"Ah yes, I think so. I hope I never put out an album that doesn't stand the test of time. So many people over the years have told me how much they love this album. I knew it was a good record back then, but at first not many people were interested in it. At that time no one did house albums and the shops like Rough Trade wouldn't stock it. Then Muzik reviewed it and the media got onto it, but I was too disorganised to get more copies into the shops!" Didn't you distribute the

record vourself?

"Yes, out of the back of my car. I would load up and drive to Germany, The Netherlands and England and sell records to the shops, but when people really started talking about it, I'd sold out. I didn't have any more pressed up for maybe six months."

In 1995, Thomas Bangalter said everyone from Paris wanted to sound like Motorbass. Were you aware of how much you influenced people? "Not really. People kept on telling me so, but I'm always the last to hear the similarity. I meet people who say they started producing because of Motorbass, but I try not to think about this really."

We hear that another Motorbass album is in the pipeline...

"Yes. Etienne and I have just started work on it. We've done a few tracks and we're very happy about it. We could have just produced another Motorbass album when 'Pansoul' was being talked about a lot, but it wasn't right. It had to feel right because for us, the music is everything. It's never a question of what's commercial for Motorbass. We don't care for the hype." (MJ)



A TRIBE CALLED QUEST Hits, Rarities And Remixes (Zomba)

Oddly-flawed collection from daisy age rap guvnors

Now here's a rap crew who were more than the sum of their parts. A Tribe Called Quest never had the direction of De La Soul, the gravitas of Public Enemy nor the malevolence of BDP. No, the Tribe's legacy will be great, simple hip hop; no frills, no bombast, just beats and rhymes. That said, this collection does dip when veering from material culled from their magnificent first three albums ('Can I Kick It', 'Electric Relaxation' and 'Scenario' all stand tall here). Hip hop's relationship with movie soundtracks has proved to be one of several Achilles heels and the lumpen 'Same Ole Thang' proves why. Still, while 'Hits, Rarities And Remixes'

is hardly definitive, it's a timely aide

memoir to this trio's talents.

Bite-sized introductions to three reggae legends

Island's 'Introduction To. . .' series has provided nifty primers on everyone from John Cale to Nick Drake. Now three rootical pioneers get the bluffer's guide treatment, allowing those daunted by their large and obscure back catalogues to dip in at minimal expense and hassle. These three artists represent different parts of reggae's body politic. Burning Spear is the voice, heart and soul, his almighty vocals propelling black power and sufferation anthems like 'Slavery Days' (used, with quite unbelievable incongruity, in a building society advert a few years back) and 'Marcus Say Jah No Dead', a great tune with possibly the most archetypal reggae song-title ever. Linton Kwesi Johnson is the stepping razor-sharp brain, his slo-mo, patois poem-raps over Dennis Bovell's huge UK dubscapes providing an incisive and chilling indictment of racism in British society. Finally, Jah's own rhythm section, Sly & Robble are the - if you will - batty, pum pum and dicky. Kings of the rocksteady era, there was a time when it was required BY LAW that every single release coming out of Jamaica boasted one of their heavy, heavy drum and bass arrangements. 'Boops (Here To Go)' remains one of the maddest and greatest records of all time, and there are another 13 examples of their art here. Which of the three comps should you get first? England's Hidden Reverse (SAF)

nanying a book on three of Britain's greatest underground musical pioneers

This CD, which comes free with David Keenan's excellent book on the postpunk, post-industrial - fuck it - the post-everything sonic alchemy of Nurse, C93 and Coil, is breathtaking, 70 minutes of genuine, Heaven (or Hell)sent genius, from Nurse's indescribable psyche-electro-rock-jazz, to C93's overwhelmingly powerful apocolyptic folk and Coil's disturbing, drug-fried pagan electronica. Transcendent, magical music that could only have come from these shores, drawing a line from trad British music through William Blake, Aleister Crowley, Krautrock and a million and one other things. 



FELIX DA HOUSECAT

A Bugged Out Mix

(React)

Cats like Felix like. . . this sort of funky electroid braindance

Artist, DJ, Muzik Award winner with 'Thee Glitz' and patron saint of all things electro, Felix Stallings is a man whose time has come. At 31, he's managed to tease more ice-kool dance music from his purple-hued cranium than most of his peers put together. But, given the glut of electro swamping clubland of late, can the Aphrohead still dazzle on disc?


Well, Da Housecat rarely disappoints and this double CD set is no exception. The first disc offers clinical, finger-clicking poptronica (Metro Area, Frankie Knuckles, The Droyds' mix of Ladytron) and darker dreams from Justus Kohncke, Anne Clark and Carl Taylor, whose 'Space Disco' is almost as brain-fryingly good as

Benni Benassi's 'Satisfaction'. Brittle, trashy, and just a little bit paranoid – in the current climate, Stallings' style makes more sense than ever.

The second half, 'Bugged In' (geddit?!), offers some of the sounds that made Felix what he is today. Giorgio Moroder opens with 'Night Drive', Art Of Noise body pop in slo-mo with the ace 'Beat Box' and Depeche Mode shimmy with the electroglam stomp of 'Personal Jesus'. Not every track has dated well – some, like Chaz Janekl, are downright irritating – but there's ample proof here that Felix is still miles ahead of the litter. As a stop-gap before the next Felix artist album, this will do just fine.

Visceral drum & bass from the Ram Records scene leader

Billed as the first mix that Origin Unknown and Ram geezer Andy C has obtained complete freedom to compile, 'Nightlife' contains a wide variety of unreleased gems, previews of the hottest new Ram material and the best that the worldwide d&b scene currently has to offer.

A consummately skilled DJ and production genius, Andy C is at the top of his game on 'Nightlife', unleashing an absolutely tearing selection of hardcore mind blowers. Kicking off with the superb 'Skittles' from his own Ram Trilogy, with a 'Bodyrock' mimicking triplet beat subtly slipped in midway through, there are 27 tracks in all. Twisted Individual, Bad Company, A Sides' huge 'What You

Don't Know' and the wicked Origin Unknown mix of Shy FX & T Power's 'Feelin' U' all put in an appearance while other standout cuts include Hive's atmospheric homage to the Matrix, 'Neo', and hot Hungarian export SKC with 'Free My Soul'.

If you're a d&b addict, or Muzik's cover CD last month has rekindled your interest in the genre, 'Nightlife' is a must. Refusing to get bogged down in jazz samples, house crossovers and slowed down, weak-ass beats, it's the sickest drum & bass mix of the year so far, and likely to be one of the best compilations you'll hear in 2003.

Revealed: where Output, DFA, !!! and the rest nicked all their ideas from. . .

Shocked and appalled as we are by the shameful revisionism, shoddy packaging and half-arsed licensing of most retro compilations, Muzik thanks the lord every morning for Mute and Rough Trade's ace series of historical primers.

Having already 'done' electronic music logically and garage rock bitchingly, they now turn their attentions to post punk, piling together 44 tracks of magnetic punk-funk and bolshy, scratchy experimentation – mainly from the late Seventies and early Eighties, but with a few latter-day discopunks like The Rapture and Erase Errata.

Astounding moments are routine here. Most of it was made during the Thatcher/Reagan era, in the

shadow of nuclear annihilation, so it all feels urgent and exciting – dance before the bombs drop or they cut off our dole! – but that manifests itself in so many ways – the snarling funk of PiL, the industrial swing jazz of Shockheaded Peters, the luminescent beauty of Young Marble Giants, the absolute, vein bulging rage of The Pop Group. . .

Combining dance and rock with a fierce intelligence and a determination to move people physically and mentally, the music made by the rule-breaking, often 'difficult' artists on this album will probably never be surpassed. Brilliant.

What's it all about? Eclectic electronic label !K7 round up 28 of their best moments, alongside a rather nifty DVD of some of their videos.

What's on it? Demonstrating !K7's commendable refusal to focus their attentions on one single genre, there's everything from the ironic cover version electroclash of Tiga's 'Hot In Herre' and Playgroup's 'Behind The Wheel', to the lovely hip hop of Rae & Christian, and the sensual house of Recloose and the incomparable Herbert.

Any cop them? Impressively disparate, but of consistently high quality, this is a must for those who have so far resisted !K7's charms. (CS)

(Hooj)

What's it all about? The shaggy-haired international Bedroom Bedlam prog DJ superstar tries to prove that he's not really a prog DJ.

What's on it? The bleep-funk of Earth Deuley's 'Spacial Gathering' and the militant thumping of Natural Rhyhm's 'Your World' find Jimmy Z

demonstrating his 'diversity'. But it's only when he gets back to the prog that made his name, about halfway through CD1, that things start rocking. CD2 continues in a similar vein but is marginally more techy.

Any cop then? Not a patch on recent Hooj offerings like 'Le Future Le Funk' and 'Further', 'Sound In Motion', though incredibly technically proficient suffers from Zabiela swerving away from what he does best, and losing sight of the fun factor along the way. (CS)



FABRIC 11 Swayzak

(Fabric)

What's it all about? Backroom Brithouse bods Swayzak reveal that there's always been a disco punk element to their sound with a 60-minute parade of cerebral, but dirty electro.

What's on it? Negativland's 'Michael Jackson' sets the digital disco agenda immediately. Akufen ('Skidoos'), Luomo (the shiversome 'Present Lover') and Royksopp's career-defining remix of Felix's 'What Does It Feel Like?' up the paranoia level, before Mr Oizo, MMM, Metro Area and Marz show a preference for great music made by groups beginning with 'M'.

Any cop then? "Our mix is definitely challenging," says Swayzak's David 'Broon' Brown, but it's only going to baffle those who find progressive trance a little too leftfield for their tastes. What's it all about? Why sleep, drink or get laid when you can bosh out comps?

You produced three of Grace Jones's albums. What was she like?

"She's a great person. Was she scary? No, you see we're Jamaicans, I was always so relaxed with her, she was so cool. The best record we did with her was a version of 'Private Life'. with Chrissie Hynde, who originally wrote it, but a lot of people liked 'Pull Up To The Bumper

You've worked with lots of different artist, many from outside the world of reggae. Why is that?

"I look at myself firstly as a musician. We used to have to play music on stage with a band and we tried different things to see if they would work. We listened to a lot of Philadelphia International records and found all these great producers. We tried to do what they were doing, so we could be in the same boat as them, although it's reggae."

Where do you fit into the Jamaican music scene now? It seems basslines have been ousted in favour of a more hip hop/r&b style

"Dancehall is propelled by drums, rocksteady was propelled by basslines. In the last couple of years, no-one's been making any original pieces, so there's no new basslines anymore. We need something new, because dancehall is more drums and keyboards, but it is really working, because it's selling in America as it's very close to hip hop.

How do you and musical partner Robbie Shakespeare maintain your friendship after such a long time working together?

"Just because of the total respect we have for each other. I love it, man. I really do. I've had a lot of time in this business and I still love what I'm doing." (AT)

That's evidently the thinking at Whoa!/Azuli, who have now added the big daddies of reggae rhythm (see above) to their list of compilers. What's on it? Dub trickery, deep smooching, weirded-out hip hop and, most of all, big fat soul slammers, with Shirley Brown's 'Woman To Woman', MFSB's 'Love Is The Message' and Jones Girls' 'Night Over Egypt' all sounding mightily impressive. Any cop then? Soul vibes delivered without overbearing trainspotter baloney, the 'northern' prefix, and, consequently, pointless stuff about talcum powder and Wigan. (AC)



NEW YORK NOISE Dance Music From The New York Underground

(Soul Jazz)

What's it all about? NYC's original punkfunk/electro/no wave interface made accessible by the routinely enlightening and inspiring Soul Jazz camp. What's on it? Lots of brilliant, Eighties underground moments, including Liquid Liquid's acknowledged genre classic 'Optimo', ESG's cute 'The Beat', and the louche gutter funk of Dinosaur L's 'You're Gonna Be Clean'. Glenn Branca is on hand to deliver earthier thrills with the fucked-up power pop of 'Lesson 1' and - as part of his earlier band Theoretical Girls - absolutely unhinged speaker abuse, on 'You Got Me'. Any cop then? Just about the hippest thing you're likely to stick in your stereo all summer, 'New York Noise' will furnish you with the skills to approach art school types and record shop employees and comprehensively outcool and out-bore them. 4 HERO Life Styles (Harmless)

What's it all about? Frequently impenetrable jazz-junglists 4 Hero select rare slices of soul to soothe pained limbs and lubricate brains. What's on it? The obligatory, but nonetheless brilliant 'I Am The Black Gold Of The Sun' by Rotary Connection, noodly jazz-funk from Pleasure with 'Jammin' With Pleasure' and some honey-sweet soul with Debbie Taylor's 'No Ifs Or Buts'.

Any cop then? There's the occasional lapse into gold lamé funk naffness, but this is a strong, sultry collection. Hard to fault, really. **(TW)**

What's it all about? Collating a 12 year quest to prove there's more to Hull than The Housemartins and hrrrr-rugby league-uh, Pork Recordings slice together their favourite offcuts. What's on it? Departed downbeat kingpins Fila Brazillia put in five appearances, alongside Baby Mammoth's slumbering spliffbeats. woozy ambience from Moss, Leggo Beast's languid funk, Muscovite intruders Tetris and more daft titles than you can shake a stick at. What's on it? A splendid mish-mash of styles and artists that's often dark but never moody. There's a couple from Gothenburg's Andreas Saag (as Stateless and Swell Session), High Contrast's 'Return Of Forever' and the gorgeous 'A Little Trouble' from Brotherly, aka Zero 7's bass player.

Any cop then? Deffo – this is a compilation that underlines Hospital's progress from jazz-jungle also-rans to broken beat and bass heroes. (VG)



KIRK DEGIORGIO Fx.Mix.01

(Keep Diggin')

What's it all about? Degiorgio hooks up with Ableton software and loads tracks into his computer, presses a button and they come out the other end mixed and looped and all that.

What's on it? 'Smoking causes a long and painful death,' it says on fag packets now. On this CD it warns 'Note that these tracks are in no particular order because of the nature of this mix.' So, snatches of Kyoto Jazz Massive sit on top of Panoptica, while loops of Victor Davies tangle with Ourtime. It's all done with computers, you see? Any cop then? As an example of modern mixing technology in action, it's very interesting. But no matter how you mix together the type of electro-jazzy stuff found on here, it's never going to sound anything other than worthy. (CS)



OMNI TRIO VOLUME 1993-2003

(Moving Shadow)

What's it all about? Having survived the torment of being dubbed 'intelligent drum & bass' at the beginning of his career, Omni Trio (aka Rob Haigh - yes, there's only one of him), gets misty eyed and rinses out the nostalgia. What's on it? 'Higher Ground', 'Diffusion Loops' and 'Renegade Snares' ie crisp. bleepy, stretched, contorted, tech-soul science. It's very Nineties, but still sounds pretty spunky in '03. Any cop then? Even if you didn't pay much attention to Omni Trio along the way, this comp of his uniquely meticulous d&b sound is well worth checking. Here's to 'Volume 2004-OAP', (AC)



BIG ROOM TUNES

Mixed By Trevor Reilly & Organ Donors (Nukleuz)

What's it all about? The massive-selling Anglo-Italian label serves up more trance, techno and 'hard style', whatever that is. What's on it? Some techno and 'hard style' tracks that are skillage (CRW's 'Like A Cat', CJ Bolland's mix of The Moon's 'Shake It' and Mauro Picotto's classic 'Pulsar') and a load of trance tracks ('Sunshine On A Rainy Day' being the worst offender) that are so trite, tedious, artistically bankrupt, beige, smelly, cliched and poo, they made us cry. Any cop then? The hard choons are great. The trance stuff, still regurgitating those same old 'epic' synth noises, quiet/loud/breakdown/ LOUDER song structures and shitty female vocals, is twunting awful. (DB)

(International Deejay Gigolos)

What's it all about? Continuing this month's strong retro-disco punk theme, not one, but two comps of primitive, early Eighties, German post-punk. What's on it? Gomma offer wiry, neanderthal funk from a magnificently obscure set of back-in-the-day Teutons, including Nervosen Deutschen's paranoid delusion classic 'Stukas Over Surrey' and Starter's 'Part Of You', where the German singer's attempt at a punk sneer ends up sounding like Peter Sellers's 'Indian' voice on 'Goodness Gracious Me'. Gigolo, by contrast, offer a set of bands who, if hardly household names, are at least known to Muzik. With the emphasis on a sexier, more electronic sound than Gomma's, the likes of Pyrolator, Der Plan, Grauzone and the exceedingly manly DAF show today's electro imitators how it's really done. Any cop then? This sort of thing has been co-opted by style wankers, but that's no reason why people who actually give a shit about music shouldn't seek these treasure troves out immediately. Highly recommended. (DB)



THE FAINT Danse Macabre Remixes (Astralwerks)

What's it all about? Nebraskan disco punk leading lights The Faint rope in some fashionable people and Paul Oakenfold to recontextualise their recent album of tuneful, camp, overwrought electro-goth rock, 'Danse Macabre'.

What's on It? The Thin White Duke aka Les Rhythmes Digitales aka Stuart Price airs his Eighties fetish once again, putting neon ankle warmers on 'The Conductor' and turning it into a nouveau glam-disco romp. The Oakenphant throws a breakbeat under 'Glass Dance'. But the most interesting mixes are Photek's highly crunchy interpretation of 'Total Job' and the propulsive speed-disco of Jagz Kooner's versioning of 'Agenda Suicide'.

Any cop then? Remix jobs are generally as appealing as a home visit from

as appealing as a home visit from Harold Shipman, but this is Faint-astic. Ha ha! (CS)







MEGA BANTON

Badman A Badman (John Shop)

Mega Banton's implosive baritone is resigned to a terminally violent endgame in this darkcore tour of corpse-strewn war zones. Re-routing the relentless proto-techno of DAF to Kingston, an incessant 303 line propels this brutal floorhugger, as the raggatronic gyrations put electroclash lightweights to the sword. Bounty Killer's 'A to the K' is the choice cut on the 'Let's Ride' rhythm, but his homo-cidal sentiments are pitiful.

A welcome return to the black market dubadelica pushed on Wordsound's earliest compilations. Teledubgnosis simulate the drugged displacement of Paul Bowles's hallucinatory travelogues, as their musical mirages invoke the spirit of King Tubby, expand upon Sherwood's spatial explorations and echo the global meltdowns engineered by Laswell's prime material. When Ted Parson's thunderous drums and Tony Maimone's seismic bass combine, Babylon truly trembles.

SOUND MURDERER

Wired For Sound (Violent Turd)

With its booming bass, fragmented drums, gun shots and ruffneck vocal samples, jungle dragged dub screaming into the next century. That manic headrush and lethal bodyblows are in full effect on this mix by Sound Murderer. Cutty Ranks, Ninjaman and more are spliced, as Hype, Krome & Time and Remarc dissolve into the mixing desk madness.

SOUL:UTION Series 1, Volume 3 (Soul:r)

Not only a magnificent EP, but a truly international one too. From Brazil and Germany respectively, Marky & XRS and D Kay bring two tracks. Like Larry Heard on a diet of pure liquid funk, 'Real Good' and 'Devotion' use delicate, fluttering percussion, hall of

mirrors electronica and the warmest of airborne bass hums to envelop and enchant - elegant and visionary. Even better is Calibre's joint, which might well be the finest track this Belfast beat magician has produced so far. 'It's. . .' is laced with disembodied chimes and brass licks that swoop in and out of the mix like destroying angels. As ever with Calibre, it's all about the bongo-fired beauty of the break. Stunning.

HIGH CONTRAST

Basement Track (Hospital)

Against all odds, this works a treat. Effecting an unlikely fusion of the cocktail bar sax licks of mid-Nineties Good Looking and the playground jungle of Ram's 'Bodyrock', 'Basement Track' is rather more than the sum of its slightly confusing parts - dumbness and, erm, sophistication in perfect harmony! It's such an infectiously mindless mash-up, that you almost don't notice the slapdash break and inexcusably corny drum rolls. Face it: if they sound shit in trance, they're still going to sound shit in drum & bass!

VARIOUS ARTISTS Kingz Of The Rollers EP 3 (31)

There's something of a bleep revival going on at the moment, with Pendulum's 'Vault' burying them deep into the coldly pistoning heart of a subterranean machine. 'Can Opener' from Total Science brings some more metallic breaks with a typically

predatory edge, but it's D Kay over on the second disc who comes up with something special. 'Reach Inside' is one of those majestic pieces of neohardcore that the Germans excel at, the densely structured break as funky as it is punishing. Beautiful. Finally, 'Sapphire 7' from Usual Suspects rolls out a classic break alongside vet more bleeps and some mind bending, percussive eccentricity.

THE INSIDERS

True/Just Won't Stop (Nu Directions)

This pair are popping up all over the place at the moment, and 'Just Won't Stop' is one of their best productions to date. There are more of those ice-cool Detroit flavours, a nicely complex, impacted break and a surging bass warmth that's heating up many a club. 'True' brings some interesting effects and a quaking bass tremor, but the break's too much like a canteen of cutlery in a tumble dryer for our sensitive listening equipment.

CALIBRE

Run Around (Defunked)

One of the most remarkable things about Calibre is the deceptive simplicity of his productions. Needless to say, though, this simplicity is born of a subtle mind. Neither track here is on quite the same level as his Soul:r stunner, but both have a low-key beauty that grows with every listen. He works wonders with the most basic of tools - and that's a magical, alchemical thing.

UTAH JAZZ

Techno Artois (Utah Jazz)

More akin to a piece of hyper-kinetic garage than the title might suggest, 'Techno Artois' rolls out a halfsubmerged, compressed break alongside a running, DJ Zinc-style bassline, while, the odd gunshot straight out of PFM's 'The Western' and some '93 terror tones up the pace. Flipside 'Herman's Groove' brings another nimble break, but what sets this one apart are the spectral bleeps, sci-fi harp shimmers and the nervy, cartoonish guitar theme. All in all, the very essence of ghost train fear.

TRONIK 100

You And Me EP (Renegade)

This German duo have an elegance and rhythmic fierceness that few can match. For their latest EP they move away from the sleek neo-hardcore of cuts like 'Eternal' and 'Keep On Reaching' and towards a more conventional liquid/disco sound. In places it's a little tame, but the title track and 'That Feeling' have something of the intensity of their early stuff.

60 MINUTE MAN AND DJ TOUCH

Ten Love EP (Intercom)

For those of you who know and love the poppy, wired Intercom sound, 'Ain't Nobody' and 'Good For You' should slip down splendidly. But the real gardenfresh flavours are to be found on disc two, 'Ten Love' itself has a minimal, mesmeric, intensity that thrills and the epic 'Looking For' is even better: a stunning drum assault that has shades of Alpha Omega and Marcus Intalex. Disco hardcore anyone?

TEEBEE

Life Continue (Photek)


Teebee's debut for Photek's label finds him at his most chilling. Like an even harsher and more industrial take on the current Full Cycle sound, 'Life Continue' careers relentlessly onwards like Richard Dawkins' selfish gene armed with a switchblade. Overleaf, the razorwire break on 'Tech G' scythes through a landscape composed entirely of dark matter, digital snarls and piercing, nocturnal screeches. Cold.

CALIBRE

Peso (Signature)

Honestly, we are not in the paid employ of the Celtic king of the beats, but this is genuinely exciting - a new label wholly dedicated to his rhythmic musings. 'Peso' kicks things off with plucked guitars, horns and a taut break. It is, however, 'My Chances' that shows Calibre at his best. Essentially a d&b dub of Bob Marley's 'Chances Are', it rides the crisp, kick-ass breaks that this guy excels at. Proper jungle soul.

Think Shane MacGowan crossed with ODB, then. A really strong single from a brand new label, with another good 'un from beats veteran Hazo in hot pursuit. The Celts have found something in hip hop that works for them. Have a check...

ACEYALONE

Love & Hate (Project Blowed/Decon, USA)

If there were any justice, Acey should have been a star for a decade. Instead the Left Coaster and member of the seminal Freestyle Fellowship is still trying to break through. 'Love And Hate' gains strength as it goes on. Check out 'Takeoff,' the incredible 'So Much Pain,' The Saga Continues' and 'In Stereo' for both ace music and some stunning lyrical moments. Always a must.

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Suspect Files Volume 1 (Suspect Packages)

Disorda starts his series of showcases for under-exposed UK acts with a strong 14 tracker that mainly revolves around solid boom bap, punchlines and sampled vocal intros. The highlights of a good batch are 18 year-old Skeptik's 'Proper Gander', Dan Shaw's asthmatic re-work of Nas's 'One Love' and Stretch & Pseudo's comedy take on the UK underground's fave pastime – slagging George Bush.

C-MONE

UK Chant (Son)

Son continue their love affair with Nottingham with C-Mone, a young woman with enough talent and poise to suggest that the likes of Est'Elle and co should be looking over their shoulders. Whether giving the UK a big up, or telling tales on girls sleeping with their mates' boyfriends, she comes through with style, peaking on the Wu-ish 'It's Bad', which is.

RAWDOG

Arrest The President (Lowlife)

The production team behind Lowlife's 'Rockstarz' return with a couple of new tunes to promote the Louis Slipperz 'Ten Pound Bag' mix CD. 'Arrest the President' (featuring Braintax and Task Force) sounds like a slowed down, less catchy Sticky tune, while the chaps slag Dubya. Much better is 'Spies In The Coffin', which is superbly poised both musically and lyrically – a mini-classic, in fact.

DOZEGUYZ FEATURING MASTA ACE & SEANIE T

Hospitality (Dyna-Mic)

It's always good to hear Sean T and Masta Ace, while Dozeguyz have the potential to be one of the very best production teams in the country. This doesn't quite explode in the way you might hope, but it's still a pleasure, even if Seanie sounds more comfortable on the skank bass rhythm than the Ace.

KID ACNE

Radio Music (Invisible Spies)

The second Acne single in two months, and a trailer for his 'Council Pop' album (check the Hot 50 and the Albums section this issue). With Req on the beats, the Kid comes through with a lo-fi and eccentric take on UK hardcore: "If you don't like the way I spit/ Then fuck you, fuck your mates and fuck your mates' mates". You heard him. . . .

NO GUNZ NO DINOSAURS

Fresh Out The Can (Aerolsolik)

Away from the latest fashions and battles in the capital, this Scarborough-based label and collective continue to make some of the most refreshing hip hop in the UK right now. The star of the pack, Troglodyte, makes The Streets sound over-dramatic and self-satisfied by "Showing more dedication than the late, great Roy Castle". Just watch 'em be the best, and beat the rest.

THE NEXTMEN

High Score (Scenario)

The Nextmen bid to disprove the theory that they're leading exponenents of 'tidy hop' with a paean to video arcades featuring d&b MC Dynamite that switches up half way through and becomes – would you believe it? – drum & bass. Good beats and bass, and lyrical agility from Dynamite. Only the chorus lets it down a little.

KEITH LAWRENCE & MYSTRO

Step By Step (Musik-Ed)



P Diddy on the Prog page? Whatever next - Kylie goes techno? Actually, stranger things have happened. . . As you'll have read in last month's cover feature, 'Lets Get III' - Diddy's bid to 'go house' - has been given a

thundering prog re-rub by Deep Dish - and it's suitably massive. A bizarre blend of old and new that's 'cheekler' than those terrible Transylvanian twins, 'Let's Get III' fuses old school favourite Adonis's 'No Way Back' with Donna Summer's 'I Feel Love', with vocals from Diddy (shouty) and Kells (sing-along). Darren Emerson's mix an 'homage' to 'Energy Flash' - is damn good too.

DAVE GAHAN

Dirty Sticky Floors (Remixes) (Mute)

After 22 years of pioneering electronica, the Mode front man launches into a solo career with an incredible package of mixes to complement his compellingly raddled voice. Junkie XL turns in a scuzzy, fuzzed-up interpretation that's equally hypnotic in vocal and dub formats, while Lexicon Avenue offer a trademark, gritty vocal version with a healthy smattering of synths. Sticky floors will swoon accordingly. . .

CASS

Hoofinanny (Sabotage)

Cass - ever the experimental one returns with a techno release. Yes we know this ain't the Techno page, but this record wouldn't even get a look over there and this record demands careful attention. Think Eighties Juan Atkins; pure electronica from its golden age, fused beautifully with post-Millennium Cosmos - yeah, it's that good. Add Satoshi's fabulous remix of 'Mind Rewind' on the flip and you've got a must-buy package.

PANOPTIK

Surface (Minimal)

Deep, underground, understated progressive house, perfectly produced. Tight, interesting percussion with an awesome, dark, growling bassline unfurl, before the break introduces one of the best melodies of the year so far. Catch this one raising rafters globally in the months ahead.

CHRIS FORTIER

Whateveritis (Fade)

It's great to see Chris back in the studio producing for Fade after his massive remix of Fortunato & Montresor's single. 'Whateveritis' is a deep groove, laden with scintillating, chiming synths and melodic riffs, rapidly building into a real peak-time monster.

WEEKEND WORLD

Chilli Sauce (Weekend World)

The prog house pioneers again blow the pants off the competition with this winner of a release. Tough, stab-led rhythms ride over an incredible hooky (or should that be Hooky?) bassline,

with a monster synth break to boot. Flip it to find a deeper house cut that's typically Weekend World in nature. You can't go wrong with either mix.

PETER LAZONBY

Everything is Burning (Kamoflage)

After hibernating for almost a decade, the genius behind 'Wavespeech' and 'Sacred Cycles', finally wakes up and unleashes another future prog classic. With a clever use of percussion, crazy, phasing effects and choppy vocal samples, 'Burning' will be - aha ha ha! - quite literally on fire all summer long.

REMY

Bang (Additive)

This double-pack from Remy and Roland Klinkenberg shares a rhythm and spirit with Sander Kleinenberg's 'My Lexicon'. Given a tough, technoorientated groove for '03, the superior, insistent 'Scrambled' is flipped with the less impressive title track, which although cool enough for hardcore proggers - is maybe a little too '99 for its own good! (RM)

It's time for another rin roaring musical missive from one of Muzik's favourite UK trance labels, the humourously named Sectioned they're mad, you see! From the off,

Digital Pressure turn up the pressure, with Teutonic, brain-melting hard trance that ain't for girls. The flawless production is dark and brooding, complete with chilling, sci-fi atmospherics, while intergalactic devils Alphazone turn in a remix that's harder and even more euphoric than the original. Strap yourself down kids, this is going to be a bumpy ride!

PHOTON PROJECT

Brainwave/Thoughts (in Trance We Trust)

The Black Hole sub label ITWT is home to more innovative artists than Charles Saatchi's personal boudoir. 'Brainwave' stimulates your grey matter with a dynamic, melodic cascade of vibrant pads and strings. Lush.

ANDORA Melody (DDE)

Italian producer Andora has been with DDE since its inception in 2001; its

inaugural release was one of his first projects. He's influenced by Vangelis and synth guru/twat Jean-Michel Jarre, but don't let that put you off this poignant, emotive, but nonetheless energetic little trancer.

OCEANFORCE & FACTORIA

Conductivity (Elevation)

'Euphoric Dream' by OceanForce (aka Kevin Meade) may have had one of the ropiest titles of all time, but countless DJs around the globe loved it. Now, along with Dave Dowsett, he's conjured up a searing blast of peak-time trance. Keep your eyes open for more Elevation releases later this year.

AALTO Rush (Anjunabeats)

Paavo Siljamäki and Miika Eloranta are the two Finnish musicians responsible for this future anthem, and it's clear that Finns ain't what they used to be. On 'Rush', ghostly female vocals delicately shift around a powerful, rolling bassline, while intermittent, 303-style keys stab through the mix. A classic in the making, we'd say. . .

LOST ANGELS

Storm Of Trance (Illuminate)

Frankfurt's Illuminate is unquestionably one of the most consistent German hard trance labels, with a worldwide profile that's steadily increased thanks to the ruthlessly efficient approach they take to quality control. 'Storm Of Trance', sucks you into a dark, pounding expanse of colour and sound that - like having a plastic bag held over your face - will leave you breathless.

NEW ENERGY

Take Your Air (Stik Trance)

Since the early Nineties, Italy's welldressed inhabitants have taken time out from gelling their hair, painting, making really gruesome horror films and electing crooks to high office, in order to deluge the world with quality hard trance releases. Here, Stik Trance continue that tradition with another bass thumping dancefloor rocket. With its subtle vocoder effects, clever filtering and pulsating arrangement, New Energy's track cries out for peak-time play.

SUN DECADE

I'm Alone (Euphonic)

Fans of Mirco De Govia's 'Epic Monolith' will be turning in their skins, when they discover that the latest Euphonic release has a larger than large remix from the man himself. In his typically uplifting style, this track makes a wicked addition to any trance mix and will have your local cyber patrol frothing at the mouth in appreciation. Ronski's 'Speed Mix' is a good alternative remix.

BEYONCE **FEATURING** Crazy In Love (Columbia)

Kelly Rowland's solo career might be firing on all immaculately manicured cylinders, but fellow Destiny's Child temptress Beyonce Knowles isn't about to be eclipsed. This incendiary new single, produced by Rich Knowles (the man behind Rowland's quirky 'Can't Nobody') reunites Beyonce with her 'boyfriend' Jay-Z over a percussive, infectious Chi-lites soul break. From the strident opening horn stabs, this tune swings its hips relentlessly, with Beyonce returning to the belting, retro vocal style she used so brilliantly on 'Work It Out'. Funky as a mosquito's tweeter and twice as sharp, this record is inescapably great.

PHARRELL FEATURING JAY-Z

Frontin' (StarTrak/BMG)

A surprise solo single from Jade Jagger's sometime boyfriend that - just for a change - features Jay-Z in a supporting role. It's standard issue Neptunes material, featuring that well worn, staccato guitar sound and warm, soulful groove, but Pharrell's unique vocals and a couple of unexpectedly lovely musical shifts lure you into 'Frontin'' completely. Bigger than 'Rockstar', we'll wager.

MYA

My Love Is Like Wo (Universal)

Mya returns with Missy Elliott in the producer's chair, and together the pair come up with a straightforward, mid-tempo r&b tune with relatively tame production. Fortunately, the whole enterprise is saved from the large-ish pile of duff Mya tracks by a lyrically clever and melodically memorable chorus. A deceptive record made with the radio rather than clubs in mind, this also wins the prize for most incomprehensible song title of the month.

BONECRUSHER

Never Scared (Remix) (So So Def)

Totally thugged out Southern hip hop smash whose opening bars will give the faint hearted an attack of 'the vapours'. Around on white label for a while, the official release sees Cam'ron, Jadakiss and Busta Rhymes joining in this mosh pit sing-a-long, Good, clean, moronic family fun, as you'd expect from an artist called 'Bonecrusher'.

NICK CANNON FEATURING B2K

Feelin' Freaky (Universal)

R Kelly's run of slamming hits as producer or artist had to come to an end at some point and unfortunately for newcomer Nick Cannon it's happened on his debut single. All the current elements

of the Kelly sound are present - shuffling guitars, little vocal riffs and even B2K but they fail to come together and raise this to Kelly's recent heights.

BLAQUE FEATURING MISSY ELLIOTT

Ugly (white label)

One time Lisa 'Left Eye' Lopes proteges Blaque have a new record label and, judging by this Missy Elliott-produced single, they could end up filling the gaping hole in the girl band market left by TLC. A nagging, minimal, Chinese-style beat is the foundation for this playful song about ugly people - think Daphne & Celeste but considerably less awful. A great little tune.

SUN CYCLE

Hanging Out (Jamdown UK)

An impressive hip hop/ragga track from this UK collective. Over a looping guitar figure, various posse members take turns on the mic, building up a steady momentum with alternating US and ragga rhyme styles. 'Don't Lie', on the flip, features the youngest member of the Sun Cycle crew, Shorty Kwarmz, who's only ten years old. Promising stuff.

KILEY DEAN

Make Me Strong (Universal)

Tim 'Timbaland' Mosely promises his latest protege, Miss Dean, will change the face of r&b. We think he might be on to something too, which is why we've slotted her into our Hot 50. Snatches of 'Rapper's Delight', Tweet's 'Call Me' and Aaliyah's 'Rock The Boat' are all qouted, making this a most teasing debut.

FABOLOUS FEATURING MIKE SHOREY & LIL' MO

Can't Let U Go (Elektra)

In its original album form, this song from Harlem MC Fabolous was almost sensitive, However, remixer Just Blaze has roughed it up considerably, without losing the great chorus, courtesy of Lil' Mo and Mike Shorey. Deservedly getting the plays at the moment, this once again confirms JB status as the hottest production talents around at the moment. As an added bonus, the B-side features the excellent 'Damn'.

WAYNE WONDER FEATURING LL COOL J

No Letting Go (Atlantic)

Wayne Wonder's version of Lenky's mega-reggae 'Diwali' rhythm hit gets reworked for the American market. While these sort of US-only remixes can often be hit and miss affairs, this one ticks all the right boxes, with the beat beefed up, LL Cool J appearing on the intro, and some additional girly vocals added to the chorus. More dancefloor friendly than ever and just in time for summer.

DAVE HOLLISTER **FEATURING PHIFE**

Baby Do Those Things (Dreamworks)

Ex-Blackstreet man Hollister teams up with Tribe Called Quest's Phife Dog on his new single, which also resurrects the Minnie Riperton 'Baby This Love' sample once used by ATCQ. For Tribe fans it will all be about Phife's cameo appearance on the intro, but everyone else should note there's a decent enough r&b tune in here as well.

Who the hell is...

They're calling him the new 50 Cent. But are 'they' talking shite?

Who's responsible for this hype?

Def Jam employees mainly - people paid to promote Joe Budden's records.

So, it's just bollocks, then?

Well, no. They both came up through the mixtape scene in the States and Budden has been fiercely championed by Jay-Z's DJ Clue, which led to his deal with Def Jam.

Sounds fantastic. What's the catch? Some US critics are uncharitable about Budden's MCing skills. They aren't convinced that he's actually any good at rapping. Plus, the album's hardly a smorgasbord of rhyme skills.

But, what's Budden's view?

"I was always a brilliant writer, very talented and very, very musical. I don't need to do anything, but continue being myself."

He believes he's no one-hit wonder.

"People have been doing two singles and putting a lot of bullshit on the rest of the album. Fuck your singles! You need to be respected."

He gets divine inspiration

"I'm spiritual, God works through me." He's put a troubled past behind him

"When I stopped getting high and started living, positive things started to happen to me.

And what does he think of his supposed rival?

"50 Cent is extremely successful and I'm very happy for the brother." (MF)

BASIL KIRCHIN Quantum (A Journey Through Sound In Two Parts) (Trunk)

Recorded 30 years ago but never released, and featuring such interludes as 'the sounds autistic children make when trying to communicate'. 'Quantum' is certainly not for everyone. But there's no doubt it's a stunningly

original and incredibly accomplished, if rather troubling, album. Joining the dots between avant-garde jazz (saxophone duets with doctored recordings of birds), the farthest reaches of psyche-rock and pioneering electronics and tape manipulation, it hangs together with its own curious logic, and you'll find yourself discerning strange narratives in it even while your mind and ears boggle. (TM)

KID 606

The Illness (Tigerbeat6)

It's 1992, midday, you've spent 12 hours jogging on the spot to the Top Buzz sound system at some provincial dung-heap, the ceiling's turning black and your tongue's the size and texture of an ostrich steak. The music pounds on relentlessly, its once reassuring repetitive beats now an agonising treadmill. Why won't it go away? 'Ecstasy Motherfucker', indeed. 'The Illness', meanwhile, sounds like Squarepusher remixing Oceanic: ersatz insanity for California rave goblins. (TM)

MORDANT MUSIC

Dark Side Of The Autobahn (Mordant Music)

On the subject of nostalgia, some joker by the name of Baron Mordant has sullied the memory of our formative years by chucking Pink Floyd, Kraftwerk, Throbbing Gristle and Joy Division together on one bastard pop/bedsit angst crossover seven-inch picture disc (picture disc!). There's even a sneaky bit of Simon & Garfunkel in there, just like on Current 93's 'Dogs Blood Rising'. The B-side's the same but backwards. Have you been stalking us since secondary school? (TM)

CHRIS WATSON

Weather Report (Touch)

A departure for the former Cabaret Voltaire bloke turned BBC natural history sound man, as he condenses his customary location-specific field recordings into three dense, 18-minute soundscapes, focussing on the impact of the seasons on various environments. Stripped of populist anthropomorphism and David Attenborough's soothing voice, nature as Watson hears it is stark, brutal and almost as disconcerting as yet another terrible 'Nag Nag Nag' remix. (TM)

BOULDER DDASH

Alien Folk Trash (Angelika Koehlermann)

Boulder dDash (aka Jean-Baptiste Hanak of nut-job rock duo dDamage) supplies a jagged, but effective mixture of lo-fi spazz-beats, acoustic strumming and home-brewed electronic fuzz on this solo project, topped off with some deranged singing. With 20 tracks and a whole additional album's worth of mentalist MP3s included, it's a bit of a hit and miss affair. But when it works, it is formidable. (TM)

ARNE NORDHEIM

Dodeka (Rune Grammofon)

This selection of 12 tracks made by the Norwegian composer three decades ago is akin to the BBC Radiophonic Workshop's work in the same period shimmering with possibilities, suggestions of melody and atmosphere as yet undefined. If that's not enough to pique your interest, perhaps we should add that it also sounds a bit like Autechre. But, for once, in a good way. (TM)

PATRICK WOLF

Lycanthropy (Faith And Industry)

We met Patrick once and he's uncanny and unnatural, but very nice. He also makes gorgeous, elemental music, reminiscent of Angels Of Light and Current 93 (again) with violins, accordions, harmoniums and other acoustic droney things. You do feel a bit queasy when he opens his gob, and unleashes a stream of solipsistic GCSE poetry in a voice that's like the man who came last in Morrissey Idol, however. (DB)

KEVIN BLECHDOM

Bitches Without Britches (Chicksonspeed)

. . . But just to prove that we don't discriminate against singers who can't sing, here's props for Kevin Blechdom, a lady whose relationship with tunefulness is like Tony Blair's with the truth. Going where other singers understandably won't, she celebrates 'Interspecies Love', covers Tina Turner's dismal 'Private Dancer', and sings like her hair's being dragged into a threshing machine. This jollity could become rather exhausting, but Kevin slips the odd tin-tack into the candy jar, as on 'Binaca', which starts out goofy-funnee, but becomes increasingly lyrically demented and dark. (DB)

NEOANGIN

Music To Hide And Seek (no label)

Beautifully packaged, and available by mail order from Berlin artist Jim Avignon, this contains 16 chirpy meditations on misanthropy, depression and everyday madness, scored to a baroque 'n' roll assortment of laptop noises, guitars, organs and harpsichords. It's like Serge Gainsbourg and The Stranglers jamming with To Rococo Rot. Nice one. (DB)

TSURUBAMI

Tsukuvomi Ni (Riot Season)

KAWABATA MAKOTO

I'm Still Here Now (Ochre)

Quality control's got to become an issue soon for the ever-expanding, increasingly prolific Acid Mothers Temple family, but they're on safe enough ground here. Improvised bass/drums/guitar trio Tsurubami are repeatedly savaged by wolves in lengthy passages of feedback squeal, only to lick their wounds with some gentle strumming; while on Kawabata Makoto's umpteenth solo set (recorded live in Toulouse last year) he purports to be channelling sounds from 'ever higher dimensions' solely by means of a chorus of drones and a remarkably voluminous Frank Zappa hair-do. Do you want to believe? (TM)

AURELIE

Desde Que Naci (Swim)

Aurelie make music of such minimalism it's sometimes barely there. It's hard to elucidate why one record of this type is good and another isn't, but, er, this is one of the good ones. Will that do? No? Okay, it's fuzzy, melancholy, spacious, warm, and would work well as an alternative soundtrack to the scenes of Bowie's space-family karking it in The Man Who Fell To Earth. Quietly affecting. (DB)

He hated them so much that he took it upon himself to berate them about how bad they were until they had no other choice but to attack him physically, and he was ejected from the premises."

Where do you go from here?

"I just heard about a recording from Adelaide where somebody recorded every fart they did for two years. Apparently it lasts 20 minutes. Hopefully I'll secure the rights to this," (TM)

Reminiscent of early classics like 'Sincere' and 'Grass Ain't Greener', this is essential vinyl for all MJ and Matt Jam heads. (DC)

DELINQUENT

Finale (Spoilt Rotten Entertainment)

The second offering from one of the hottest new groups on the underground circuit, 'Finale' is four-to-the-floor nastiness that's already causing mayhem on acetate. If you were a fan of 'Bruckout', this is more must-have vinyl. (DC)

JAMMER

Feedback/Burnout (Jahmek Da World Productions)

Feedback is exactly what this is - four and a half of minutes of pure, grimey bassline feedback, to be precise. This is blowing up in the clubs, receiving up to eight rewinds a time on the MC circuit. AA-side 'Burnout' samples the eponymous Playstation 2 game, underneath Jammer's trademark, dramatic strings. The best from Jammer so far - beats for youts! (DC)

DUTTY DOOGZ

Hold Me Down (Platinum Performers)

Dutty Doogz - instigator of the east London battles - is undoubtedly one of the most exciting new talents on the scene and this track backs up all the talk. Produced by Fusion (the production genius behind Fallacy's 'Groundbreaker'), 'Hold Me Down' is a bouncy, catchy morsel of slick, high energy, heavy hip hop beats, topped with Doogz's distinctive ragga flow and snappy lyrics. He's gonna be huge. A Skibadee remix is set to follow. (CF)

NIO

Do You Think You're Special? (Todd Edwards Remix) (Echo)

Ice Rink (white label)

Wiley takes his winning, minimal but arty formula to another level with Dizzee Rascal spitting some classic lyrics. If you can't afford to book them for your rave the next best thing is to take this vinyl and play it a number of times. This isn't quite a Wiley classic, it's big but there's bigger to come however, it suits us just fine. (CF)




Pedro (Melodic)

Brighton based Rob 'Backini' Quickenden wanted to be "the next Jason Donovan" when he was 19. but one day he woke up and saw sense. "I decided the computer had more skill at writing music than I did," he modestly explains.

After many 20 pences pressed into the wrinkled hand of pensioners in charity shops, an album's worth of material materialised.

"At 20 pence a pop you can afford to make mistakes, but I've found that the more awful and unlikely a record looks, the naffer the cover, the more likely it is to yield a good sample." And there's another important

"I've got a good friend who plays bass and guitar and I get him to come round and play," says Rob.

The earliest sample he has used is from the Andrews Sisters, recorded in the Thirties. The latest is from back in 1975. Why nothing more recent?

"In the early Eighties everyone went digital and it put me off a bit." No electroclash on the way then?

"No way, but I might sample Level 42 nextl" (CC)





riginators of the Miami house sound, Ralph Falcon and Oscar G have been enjoying a renaissance of late. Ralph originally started recording with Aldo Hernandez and debuted on their Deep South Recordings label in 1991 as Deep Six with 'We're Going Deep'.

A year later, he released Mission Control's 'Outta Limits' on the same label, and after parting company from Hernandez, Ralph joined forces with Oscar to launch the Murk label as Intruder with 'U Got Me'.

For the next two years the soulful pairing produced dreamy, bass-heavy house classics like 'Reach For Me', Liberty City's 'Some Lovin" and Deep South's 'Believe.'

1992 saw Ralph Falcon start the Miami Soul label with 'Every Now And Then' and in 1994 the Murk Label hooked up with Tribal and several of their early classics were re-released.

By 1996 Tribal had mutated into Twisted Records and the Murk alter ego Funky Green Dogs was taken out of retirement with 'Fired Up', 'The Way' and 'Until The Day.'

Darker prog outings such as last year's 'Space' on Future Groove and Tenaglia favourite 'Dark Beat', have seen them jamming many a box. Now Murk look set to have a huge club hit with 'Alright' on Tommy Boy Records. Their time, it appears, has finally come.

In 1991, Warp had the foresight to license these four tracks from DSR including 'We're Going Deep'. Murk: "Wow, this makes us feel old! It was a BIG deal for us that Warp recognised our music."



MISSION CONTROL

Outta Limits (DSR/ESA 12-inch, 1992) A dreamy, hypnotic voyage from Ralph Falcon and Aldo Hernandez that featured on Danny Tenaglia's 'Choice'. "Aldo Hernandez had little to do with this record other than keeping all the revenues for himself."



LIBERTY CITY Some Lovin' (Murk Recordings 12-inch, 1992)

The classic vocal mix sucks you in with its incessant vocal and the dubs are rolling, sublime deepness. "We walked into the Sound Factory in '92 and Junior Vasquez played this song for 30 minutes straight."



FUNKY GREEN DOGS FROM OUTER SPACE Reach For Me

(Murk Recordings 12-inch, 1992) Another fantastic elastic b-line with a bit of slap bass. "Definitely the dumbest artist name in house music! We were in an altered state when we came up with this."



RALPH FALCON Every Now And Then (Miami Soul 12-inch, 1992)

This deep house classic is a schizophrenic journey through the mind of a rejected lover over a trancey groove. "Originally the vocal was recorded as a guide, but after listening to it repeatedly, we ended up leaving it as it was."



THE FOG Been A Long Time (Miami Soul 12-inch, 1993)

Another Ralph Falcon production, another much remixed track and another spurned lover.

"The vocalist on this record had a great voice, but horrible timing, so the entire vocal had to be sampled."



FUNKY GREEN DOGS FROM OUTER SPACE High Up

(Murk Recordings 12-inch, 1994) A tribal house wig out with intertwining male/female vocals and some serious shouting. "This song began as a mistake, but we loved it."



RALPH FALCON That Sound (Miami Soul 12-inch, 1994)

Featuring the vocals of Dorothy Mann this rocks along big time with its tight, hissing, percussive beats. "This was 'progressive' before that term became whatever the hell it is that means today. . ."



LIBERTY CITY If You Really Love Somebody (Tribal/Murk 12-inch, 1994)

Probably the last of the true Murk classics for the purists. Another soulful garage classic.

"We still play this one out - and every time we play it, trainspotters run up to the booth and ask us what it is!"




INTERCEPTOR

Classic Hardcore

s the bleeping, breaking, hardcore scene crept out of grey suburban cities like Coventry and Braintree, acts like Liquid and SL2 swiftly made the transition from club acts to megaselling, arena-filling artists.

Of course, none flew higher than The Prodigy, whose 'Experience' debut included the Top threetrouncing 'Charlie', but acts like Praga Khan, Altern-8 and Bizarre Inc soon followed in their wake. However, for every 'Narramine' there was a kiddie-rave track like 'A Trip To Trumpton' to contend with and by the time Baby D's 'Let Me Be Your Fantasy' hit the top spot at the end of 1993, the trip was almost over.

With hardcore revivalism finding favour once again (check the B Rave label and DJ Scud) and the value of classic tracks undiminished, now is the time for you to reappraise the genre that fashion forgot.



It's been sampled loads since. The first time I heard it was when a local DJ played it in 1992. I spent the next nine years

searching for it. I even e-mailed the record company but they were no help!

Eventually, I walked into the Record And Tape Exchange in Notting Hill and it was sat there staring out at me from the front of the racks for three quid! I nearly passed out."



"As usual, you should expect nothing but the worst in clubbing from Dublin this month. Gigantic kips like **Spirit** continue to thrive by playing the cheapest handbag house music they can get hold of. And the miserable **Tivoli** – which last month seemed to have graciously fallen on its sword – is back to inflict its hideous ice rink atmosphere on everyone (one thing – they are opening the upstairs theatre part of the club, which is a fair bit better than the culchie disco downstairs).

To compound matters further, July will herald an influx of stag party types from dreadful **England**. These knobs will be seen all over town, trying to dance in front of buskers, throwing kebabs at each other and singing 'Rule Britannia' in **Temple Bar Square**.

There are one or two positive new developments worth mentioning, though. Until recently, Dublin was desperately in need of some more small clubs. Two places – **Traffic** and the **Metropolitan** – have moved into that void and are doing well. D1's Friday night techno bash at the former is well worth checking out, as are Thursdays and Saturdays at Metropolitan, offering electro and d&b respectively.

The big news, however, is that psychedelic trance is taking over Dublin. **Moon Emotions** are the only promoters in town who make

even the remotest effort at decorating their venues, and for their troubles they've got regular monthly spots in big venues like the **Red Box** and the Tivoli.

Check out the Slate if you're looking for more info on what's on in Dublin. 'There's fuck all else worth reading,' they reckon. It's available in clothes shops, record shops and cafes around the city







Why has R Kelly has been at number one for three weeks? Is there a musical or scientific explanation? Simon Swaine, Camberley

It's not really science, Simon, it just comes down to a great deal of money pumped into a very well executed marketing campaign. Mr Kelly's promotion is a perfect example of the music industry machine in action. Shadowy figures ensure massive radio airplay, lots of TV promotion, the video on MTV months before it's released and posters and adverts in all the press and bus stops up and down the country. That, sadly, is how it works. However, it's also down to the enormous popularity of r&b and the fact that Kelly is one of the biggest selling artists in that scene.

Hello

Hip hop DJs often talk about a DJing technique called 'crabs'. What are they and are there any other techniques I should know about? Dex, Warrington

I'm no expert on turntable wizardry but I believe 'crabs' refers to how, if you tickle the crossfader, your fingers look like crabs legs. I can only manage to pull off the snail manoeuvre, though. Check out www.dmcworld.com for the DMC/Technics World DJ Championships on video or DVD for inspiration, or book yourself on a scratching course.

Dear Tom

I've recently started making music and have sampled three seconds of a track on Relief records. Do I need to get it cleared or am I okay to put it out on a white label? Ben. Leeds

The unofficial protocol for this sort of thing is to go ahead and promo your record on white label and put a sticker on the record stating it's 'for promotional use only and not for commercial resale'. Also, put an e-mail address on the record for potential licensors. If you've got a hit on your hands you'll know from the DJs' reactions and you'll probably be inundated with calls from labels trying to sign the track. Let them clear the sample! I'd say go for it.

Hey Tom

I've only been into dance music for a couple of years, but can you explain to me why grown men in record shops

wet themselves at the mere mention of Underground Resistance? Sarah, Pontefract



Well Sarah, this incontinent reaction is a common phenomenon for men over 25. The highly revered Underground Resistance is the legendary Detroit label responsible for helping define the original, experimental, lo-fi sound of techno. Founded in '89 by Mad Mike Banks it has an astounding back catalogue of

ground-breaking records that encompass techno, acid, house and electro. With

a history of rarely doing interviews or having photos taken, UR is probably one of the most 'real independent labels in existence.

Tom's essential kit of the month

Korg Microkorg synthesiser/vocoder £330

The fun size keys, built in mic for Royksopp/Daft Punk-style vocoding battery powered operation and a plethora of super phat, analogue sounds make this the bargain of the year. For the novice it really is as simple as turning two knobs. With useful, genre-grouped sound banks you can melt your bass bins with the d&b section, squelch yourself silly with acid noises or reach for the lasers in the trance bank. Hip hop, electronica and 'vintage' sounds and effects complete the presets, Brilliant!



Tom's DJ top tip

If you're serious about DJing and clubbing then please consider protecting yourself from premature hearing loss. To avoid permanent damage to your listening gear (which is quite likely if you spend every weekend with your head in a bass bin) I suggest investing in a pair of sound attenuators (ear plugs to you and me!). I can, personally, recommend Dr Geraldine Daley, an Audiometrician, based at 55 Harley Street, London. For £45 you get a hearing perception test (to see how knackered your ears already are) and for £165 Dr Daley will custom fit a set of attenuators to your inner ear shape that will reduce sound levels by either 15 or 25 decibels. 15dB is what the good doctor recommends for DJs. The mega 25dB plugs are suggested for stadium rock roadies. If this is too steep then Boots and most chemists have a range of earplugs.

A frankly remarkable thingle called '155 Days in The Electronic Hermitage', from Joel in Cambridge, On 'Rain Song', beautifully recorded layers of laptop-treated acoustic sounds that wouldn't sound out of place on Leaf <mark>or Clea</mark>n Cut are mystifyingly blown awa<mark>y halfw</mark>ay through by Joel's 'widdly-weeeooow' guitar playing. When you're used to guitars in electronic music being used as just a bit of texture, this feels faintly outrageous like the vicar's suddenly got his cock out. 'Highway Song' is similarly odd but great, in a commercially suicidal kind of way.
